BRITISH COUNTER ATTACKS BRING GAINS

DEFENCE STIFFENS--FURTHER ENEMY PROGRESS HELD--HUN ATTACK SMASHED

BRITISH COUNTER ATTACK REGAINS PART OF GROUND LOST: ALBERT EVACUATED

ENEMY ADVANCE IS CHECKED DEFINITELY IN THE SOMME REGION BY BRITISH DEFENCE, WHICH GROWS STRONGER EACH HOUR--FRENCH TROOPS BREAK UP GERMAN ATTACKS IN THE OISE VALLEY.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, March 28.—The British delivered a counter attack to-day between the angle of the Ancre and the Somme, recapturing Morcourt, and Chippilly, according to an announcement made by the War Office this evening. These villages lie immediately south of the town of Albert, and west of Bray-sur-Somme. The town of Albert itself has been evacuated by the British, who however, are strongly posted upon the railway bank immediately west of the town, and are maintaining their positions. Other counter attacks have also been made north and south of the Somme, where further ground has been regained, and the Germans driven back at various points. The British are standing firm along the front, which appears to be the strongest they have occupied since the battle began.

against the new British line south of the Somme. It was repulsed after severe fighting, the War Office announces. In consequence of attacks yesterday afternoon and evening astride the Somme, the British troops were forced back for a short distance in the region of Bray.

Seventy German Divisions
London, March 28.—The official British statement yesterday said that it has been established that more than seventy divisions of German troops have been engaged in the battle lasting for the past week. The usual estimate of the present strength of a German division is twelve thousand men, so that the loss of fifty per cent would mean casualties in excess of four hundred thousand men for the Germans in less than a week of fighting.

TRENCHES WERE WIPED OUT BY HIGH EXPLOSIVES

Artillery Preparation Described as the Greatest Ever Experienced—British Guns drenched with Gas

London, March 27.—The artillery preparations of the Germans in the drive against the British lines which is now in progress is described by those who took part in it as the most violent they ever endured, according to the Daily Mail's correspondent on the British front.

"The thing that stands out characteristic of the fighting up to the present," says the correspondent, "is that we did so well under the difficult impact."

Gun Every Few Yards.

Continuing, the correspondent says: "On one corps front there was a gun every few yards. The strength of the mortars which the enemy brought up in such great numbers, sent over such an overwhelming weight of iron and high explosives that in most parts of the front, wire ceased to be an obstacle and trenches were obliterated. At the same time all of our known battery positions were drenched with gas, but their gas shells failed to reach all of our batteries. At one point where the Germans found our wire unbroken they set to work with scissors until they had made a way through, an incident reminiscent of the methods of fighting inculcated by Frederick the Great. All of this was done under our machine guns.

"A curious fact reported by our airmen was that the Germans composing the special assault divisions wore new uniforms.

British Airmen Effective.

"Our flying corps did their very best work despite adverse winds. One of our men in the early morning reconnaissance spotted several thousand Germans moving westward south of Bullecourt, and another reported three thousand of the enemy in a sunken road in this area, waiting to advance.

"Few enemy machines were seen and they mostly flew low, peppering our trenches with their machine guns. This is the first battle where the British gunners had to serve their guns in gas

FRENCH TROOPS BREAK UP STRONG GERMAN ATTACKS IN VALLEY OF OISE

FRESH DIVISIONS OF GERMANS THROWN AGAINST FRENCH LINES EAST OF MONT DIDIER WITH BUT LITTLE SUCCESS--ASSAULTS REPULSED SEVERAL TIMES--OTHER ATTACKS BROKEN UP.

(Special to The Daily News)

Paris, March 28.—With many fresh divisions, the Germans attacked the French lines east of Mont-Didier, and although the assaults were repulsed several times, the enemy succeeded in making some little advance. Mont-Didier is some ten miles west of Roye, where the War Office announce that the French troops have taken up new positions. The enemy also made several powerful attacks around Noyon and Lassigny, which were broken up with great losses being inflicted upon the attacking forces.

The Drive Fails.

Paris, March 28.—Premier Clemenceau has declared that France may now be certain that the enemy drive has failed, according to the latest news which he has received from the front.

Heavy Casualties.

London, March 28.—The British forces in France are not only offering strong resistance to the heavy enemy attacks both north

and south of the river Somme, but have carried out numerous counter attacks, resulting in the regaining of the crest of the ridge, and driving back the Germans at several points. The report from Field Marshal Haig declares that in the operations, exceedingly heavy casualties were inflicted upon the enemy. In the north, the enemy has been definitely checked and in the south, where his latest and most important gains have been made, he has been unable to push west of Roye and Noyon. The British line from the Scarpe river southwest through Albert to the Somme has held fast for twenty-four hours, and the Germans have been repulsed in local attacks along this sector.

Situation Improved.

London, March 28.—Field Marshal Haig's latest reports have greatly raised the spirit of the public and the newspapers. Although uttering a note of warning that all danger has not passed, the newspapers consider that the situation is much improved.

GERMANY IS PREPARING FOR ALLIED OFFENSIVE

SERGEANT J. H. KELLY WINS MILITARY MEDAL

Word was received in town some time ago that Sergeant J. H. Kelly, of Prince Rupert had won the Military Medal, and only the other day the details came through. At the fight for Paschendaele Ridge, volunteers were called for the building of a light railway in order to carry up supplies of ammunition for the heavy British guns. The men constructing this light railway would be under fire, all the time, as the job was a dangerous one. A hundred men were required for the work, and although they had several casualties they managed to finish the building of the new line of track in record time.

Sergeant Kelly received a letter of congratulation from the Commanding Officer, and also the Military Medal in recognition of this share in the arduous duty which fell to him.

Building railroad tracks in the face of the enemy fire is no simple matter, and the feat of creating a record on this occasion over rough, broken and fireswept ground and having all the other difficulties of the front line to contend with, is no mean one.

A brother of Mrs. Kelly, Pte. R. Falconer, of the King's Own Scottish Borderers, also received the Military Medal for bravery on the field.

VANCOUVER LOSES THIRD HOCKEY GAME

Toronto, March 28.—Toronto took the lead over Vancouver last night in the World's Hockey series. Last night's score resulted in the Eastern team winning by 6 to 3. This third game was played under Eastern rules. Toronto is a two to one favorite to win the series.

Washington, March 28.—Official French dispatches received here today state that the newspapers in Germany are preparing the people for a Franco-British offensive. The entry of a powerful army of reserves, which the allies have kept in readiness and have not yet used during the past week, is forecasted. The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger publishes a dispatch received from the front declaring that the British forces, during their retreat, saved their entire complement of heavy artillery.

London Bombardment Coming

London, March 28.—General von Rohe, a German authority on Ordnance, states that the bombardment of Paris, which happened last week, is merely in the nature of a trial for the guns, which are really intended to bombard London.

MANY CANADIANS WERE IN THICK OF THE STRUGGLE VERY FEW CASUALTIES

Ottawa, March 28.—In the cable message given out at the Prime Minister's office, Roland Hill states in the stupendous gun duel, which was the prelude to the greatest of all battles which is raging between the rivers of the Somme and Oise, the Canadians did their part. The forces of

the Canadians which were engaged consisted of railway construction troops, horse artillery, and motor machine gun batteries which were in the thick of the great struggle.

The casualties among these Canadian forces were very light, and the losses sustained are not worth considering, in view of the good work they put in.

RUSSIAN TROOPS ARE ADVANCING ON MOSCOW IN THREE LINES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Moscow, March 27. (by the Associated Press).—Notwithstanding that peace with Germany has been ratified by the congress of plenipotentiaries and soldiers' delegates in Moscow, the German advance in Russia continues, the evacuation of Bryansk having served only to bring the German objective to Moscow. According to reports in the newspapers today the Germans are moving toward Moscow from three directions, from the southwest they recently advanced 25 miles from Bryansk in the general direction of Moscow, which is 235 miles from the west the Germans are approaching Smolonsk. In the northwest they have captured the town of Rosenovskaya, in the southwest they have captured the town of Vitebsk.

Intimation has been received by Chief Vickers of the murder of Mrs. Rachael Levine at McCarthy, Alaska. McCarthy is near Cordova. Mrs. Levine was a former resident of Prince Rupert, being married here some three years ago, before she left for the North.

NO FAILURE.

Under the ordeal of the great German attack, dispatches from the British Headquarters state that not a single battalion "failed or faltered," and responsible quarters are gratified at the manner in which the British troops have withstood the heaviest attack which the enemy has made since the war began.

The defence which has been put up by the British and their French allies so far, most assuredly constitutes one of the greatest epics in history. They have taken such toll of the enemy that the wake of his advance has been likened to a vast hetacomb.

the French commander have got a counter stroke all planned out, and will spring it upon Hindenburg at the proper time, is only a reasonable assumption. They have not been studying the art of war for the past four years under model conditions, for nothing. Knowing and expecting the offensive promised by Hindenburg, their plan of campaign apparently has been to permit him to wear his forces out in vain attacks, and when he is wearied sufficiently of this course of action, and his troops tied down against the growing activity of the allies, an offensive against the Hun may be expected to break out on some part of the line, where it will be most inconvenient for the German high command to meet it, and where it will endanger the whole German line.

Already some of the worn out British battalions have been relieved from the battle front. Worn and dog tired, they were ignorant of what part of the line they were on, nor did they know the day of the week. The experience of these strenuous days must have been a severe one, the memory of which will last.

LIQUOR TRAFFIC AMONG THE INDIANS IN NORTHERN B. C.

Ottawa, March 26.—A suspicion that an extensive liquor traffic has been carried on with the Kluahen and Champagne Indians in Northern British Columbia has caused the Comptroller of the R. N. W. M. P. to establish a new post at Camp Pleasant, on the international boundary between Alaska and British Columbia, near the Atlin district.

Two constables, Messrs. Vinall and Gur, will be established at the station. The exact location of the



post is given as latitude 59.5 and longitude 136.5.

The R.N.W.M.P. has ten divisional headquarters and one hundred and thirteen post detachments.

SETTLER'S POURING INTO CANADA'S FARMS

Winnipeg, March 27.—"Western Canada is experiencing an immigration movement the like of which she has never witnessed before in her history," according to J. Bruce Walker, Commissioner of Immigration here.

"In the four weeks ending March 2," said Mr. Walker, "the number of settlers coming into Western Canada was greater by over 200 than in the same weeks of last year. During that period the increase in value of stock and settlers' effects coming into the country was \$800,000. At North Portal I saw forty carloads of settlers effects in one train entering Canada. These people were from the state of Illinois and were going into Alberta and Saskatchewan. The demand for land has never been so tremendous. The C.P.R. is selling land, including ready made farms, throughout the West, chiefly in Alberta, at the rate of 80,000 acres per month. The Hudson's Bay Co. is selling land at the rate of 40,000 acres per month, and have kept up that record since August last. I never saw such a splendid class of immigrants come into the country, and I never knew prospects to be better for the country than they are today.

"An evidence of the way tractors are being brought into the country is instanced by the fact the the Moline Co. brought in thirteen carloads of tractors worth less than \$1,400 each in the week between March 2nd and March 9."

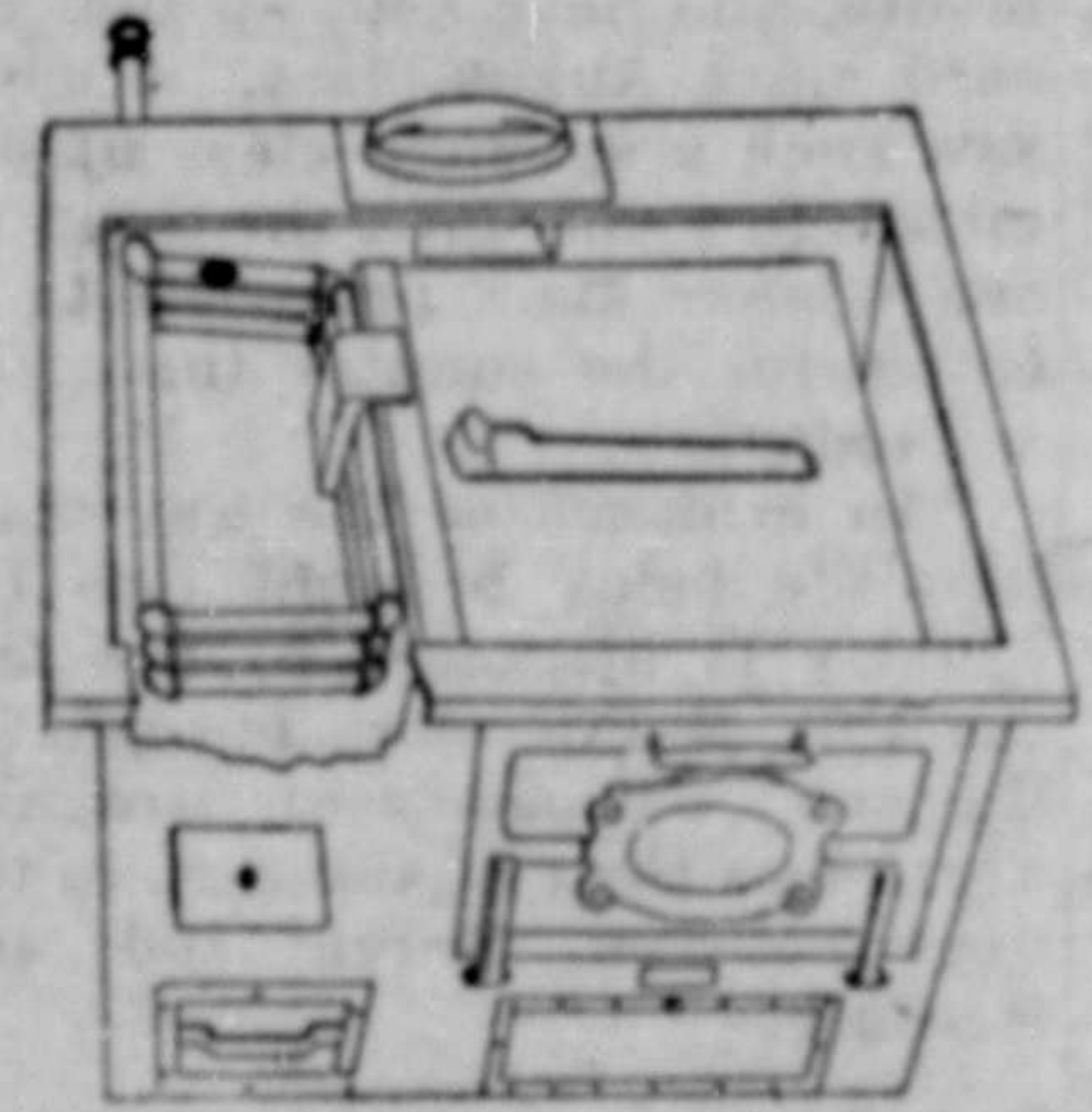

The Income War Tax Act

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows and widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Forms to obtain and Special Features to observe

Individuals—Get Form T 1 to give particulars of their own incomes. In stating Dividends received, give the amount from each Company, listing Canadian and foreign Companies separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Share-

holders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment. In the case of Forms T1 and T2, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two, with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.
