YPRES SECTOR IS NEXT GERMAN OBJECTIVE

ANOTHER GERMAN ATTACK IN FLANDERS—NEW WAR TIME SUGAR REGULATIONS

THE FOURTH GERMAN ARMY NOW ATTEMPTS TO CAPTURE YPRES

STRONG ATTACK MADE ON A FIFTEEN-MILE FRONT—BRITISH TROOPS AT YPRES SEND OUT S. O. S. FOR ARTILLERY SUPPORT—GERMAN ARTILLERY BOMBARDMENT IS HEAVY ON BRITISH FRONT

(Special to The Daily News)

With the British Armies in France, April 30.—The fourth German army this morning heavily attacked the Allied forces in Flanders. Prisoners captured have admitted that it is the intention of the German commanders to capture, or rather to attempt to capture what remains of the town of Ypres. Severe fighting is reported on both the British and French areas and the zone of the attack extends for some fifteen miles.

S. O. S.

London, April 30.—The British troops around Ypres several times after dawn this morning sent up S. O. S. signals asking for artillery support, according to a telegraphic communication from Reuters's correspondent. Although no definite report of an infantry attack in this region has been received, the correspondent adds that the tremendous German bombardment points to the certainty of an attempt being made by the Germans to advance. The bombardment now is progressing from a great concentration of artillery from La Bassée to south of the Houtholst Forest, and from Vimy to Lens.

Before Amiens.

Paris, April 30.—The Germans made several attempts last night to advance on the French positions on the Hangard Wood front before Amiens. All their attempts were checked by the fire from the French rifles and machine guns, assisted by the seventy-fives, according to the war office announcement here.

More "Berthas."

Amsterdam, April 30.—Three more of the new long-range German guns passed through Belgium last Friday travelling in the direction of France, with a view possibly of increasing the bombardment of Paris.

Up to Foch.

London, April 30.—Various writers in the London press are discussing the probability of the abandonment of Ypres, which for so long has been the northern buttress of the Allied line in Belgium, and quenched with British blood as no other battlefield has ever been. The fact is emphasized unanimously that it is for General Foch to decide whether this position is going to be too costly to hold, or whether it is so vital that every effort must be made to recover the positions whence the Germans are now threatening it.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

The regular meeting of the City Council held last evening in the City Hall was a short one. The bright shining of the setting sun streaming in through the large windows seemed to detract from the gravity of this gathering of the City Fathers—and Mothers, although there wasn't a joke sprung during the whole evening. First of all there was a petition from Mr. C. Hecker and others for a plank roadway on the lane between Sixth and Seventh Avenues, from Fulton Street westwards. The city clerk reported several objections to the petition as it was presented. For one thing, there weren't enough names to the petition, and their qualifications were not set out sufficiently to be proper, so between one thing and another, the petition was referred to the board of works for amendment.

The utilities committee recommended that the lighting of the Exhibition Building be granted free to the Cadet Corps, where they will install a miniature rifle range. The same committee recommended some increases in salaries to the staff, which they will doubtless welcome. The board of works committee recommended that the road to the recreation grounds be made more stable, but limited any ambitions he might have in this direction to \$200. Ald. Kirkpatrick found out that the road was not going to be widened. Not for that sum, anyway, however badly the road needs widening. And no one who has been on it in connection with some event on the hill will deny that it needs widening.

After hearing about a new drain between Seventh and Eighth Avenues in Section five, the council listened to the auditor's report for the past year, which showed a deficit of \$6,810.84. The treasurer accounted for this by certain expenditures, which being unforeseen, had not been included in the estimates when the rate was fixed, such as the extra costs of the Case lawsuit, the fisheries delegation to Ottawa, and so forth. The auditor reported the City Hall work to be in good shape, and applied for the job for another year. Tenders for the supply of 2,000 feet of galvanized pipe were opened, the matter of entertaining the distinguished visitors composing the International Fisheries Commission was discussed. Ald. Casey moved that a committee be appointed to act in conjunction with the mayor, Aldermen Rochester and Dybhavn were named and they will arrange for a dinner at the Hotel Prince Rupert. That being all, the council adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

ANOTHER REASON WHY PRINCE RUPERT SHOULD BE BUILDING SHIPS

In the near future, the people of Western Canada are going to realize in a new fashion what it means when there is a scarcity of shipping. A cynical wife once said that the way to a man's heart lies through his stomach. And possibly the way to shipbuilding at Prince Rupert will be through the stomach, too, of Canadians in these Western provinces. The fact is that the people of Canada will have to consume less sugar. There are just as many sugar canes being grown as ever there were, but—and here's the point—there are not sufficient ships to bring the sugar from the mills to the refineries in British Columbia.

The local wholesale merchants have received notice that the B. C. Refinery Co. can only supply them pro rata according to their last year's purchases. The local merchants will, therefore, have to supply the retailers upon the same basis. And the retailers will have to watch that the consumer does not buy two sacks, when only one is needed. There is probably enough sugar in sight to meet all legitimate needs for some considerable time, provided the distribution is looked after carefully, and no one takes more than is actually required.

The hoarder will get scant comfort in the fact that the Food Controller has issued a new order making hoarding of sugar an offence, with a minimum penalty of \$100, and up to \$1,000, or up to three months' imprisonment, or both fine and imprisonment. A fifteen-day supply is supposed to be sufficient for anyone living near a store.

When necessary foodstuffs cannot be got for want of ships, it is possible that people in other parts of Canada may begin to take a little notice of the facilities of this port, and to ask why, as the people of Prince Rupert have been asking in vain for years, the two or three million dollar plant here has not been doing its bit "to win the war."

TO DEVELOPE THE NATURAL RESOURCES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

(Special to The Daily News)

Ottawa, April 30.—A branch office of the Geological Survey of Canada is to be established in British Columbia, according to an official announcement made here today. Mr. Charles Cassell, one of the ablest and most widely-known geologists of the Department in Ottawa, will be placed in charge of the new branch. This is being done in order that the natural resources of British Columbia, which in mineral values, are of illimitable extent, may be developed.

FOOD BOARD MAKES DRASTIC RESTRICTIONS

(Special to The Daily News)

Ottawa, April 30.—Drastic war time restrictions in the use of sugar and shortening in the manufacture of biscuits, cakes and sweet dough products, the entire prohibition of the manufacture of certain of these products, the curtailment of the sugar consumption of candy manufacturers to one half the monthly average of last year, the limitation of the amount of fats and sugar which may be used in the manufacture of ice cream, are the principal provisions in an order just issued by the Canada Food Board.

THE NEWEST RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT GETS BUSY

London, April 30.—The newest Russian government in Petrograd has denounced the Brest-Litovsk treaty with Germany and calls for a new treaty with Estonia under Russian rule. Although there is little information coming through from Petrograd, information received from indirect sources would indicate that the new government is receiving very strong support, the great bulk of the people being wearied with the miseries which have developed since the revolution of a year ago.

EVERYBODY WELCOME

THE INTERNATIONAL FISHERIES COMMISSION SAT THIS MORNING

The International Fisheries Commission, consisting of important representatives from the governments of the United States and Canada, arrived in port on board the United States ship "Cedar." The Hon. Mr. W. C. Redfield, secretary of commerce to the United States government, and Mr. Justice Hazen, of New Brunswick, late minister of Marine and fisheries to the Canadian government, are the respective heads of the delegations of the two countries. Dr. H. M. Smith, commissioner of United States Fisheries; Mr. Edwin T. Sweet, assistant secretary of commerce; Mr. G. J. Desbarats, C.M., C.G.C., and Mr. Wm. Found, superintendent of Canadian Fisheries, are also on the Commission.

After a walk through the city this morning, the Commission got down to business in the Council Chamber at 10 a.m., Mr. Justice Hazen presiding. The Hon. Mr. Hazen in his opening remarks declared the object of the Commission in connection with Fishery matters. He intimated that the modus vivendi which now obtains between the two countries as a war time arrangement may become to be a permanent thing, when mutual concessions on the part of each country would establish the fishing industry on each coast free from irritating restrictions, so that the fishermen on the whole coast would be subject to the same regulations.

Mr. Redfield said that the Commission was here to discuss matters of international importance, to see whether there were any preferences being shown or discriminations made against either nationality. The Commission did not represent any particular interests, their primary consideration being fishery matters insofar as they affected the fishermen of the two countries. He said that up till two years ago, the United States was a small fish eating country, but in the time to come, the problem would be to get enough fish to eat.

The first witnesses to give evidence were Messrs. W. H. Tobey and Mr. H. S. Woods, of the G. T. P. with regard to waterfront matters. Mr. A. L. Carruthers, of the Provincial Engineer's Department, was also called. Thereafter the remainder of the forenoon was spent in hearing Mr. T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company. Questions covering a wide range were asked of Mr. Johnson. The fishing grounds, fishing vessels, classes of fish, the relative advantages of rail and water transportation, the advantages of Prince Rupert as a terminal and so forth, were all put up to Mr. Johnson, who will again be heard this afternoon.

The commission were entertained to lunch in the Hotel Prince Rupert by the city, the sittings to be resumed at 2:15 p.m.

PETROGRAD IS THREATENED BY GERMAN FORCES

Unless Russia Agrees to Exchange Prisoners of War, Germany Threatens to Occupy Petrograd.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, April 30.—An exchange of prisoners of war between Russia and Germany has been demanded of the Russian government by Berlin. This demand is accompanied by the threat that unless the Russian government agrees to the terms advanced, the city of Petrograd will be occupied by the German troops, which have been operating throughout the Baltic provinces and in Finland.

This new demand on the part of the German government is held here to reflect the growing scarcity of man power with which Hindenburg is now threatened on the western front. The losses which his forces there have suffered during the last few weeks are known to be irreplaceable in the immediate future, and for this reason, the hundreds of thousands of German and Austrian troops which the Grand Duke's once victorious armies captured during their triumphal march through Poland and Galicia would be the more welcome at this particular juncture. Many thousands of these are known to be in Siberia, and unless they care to march afoot on their way to the Fatherland, there will be little other means of transport, as the trans-Siberian railway cannot be depended upon.

Should the new government of the Grand Dukes in Russia become all powerful, it is not expected that the German invaders will remain longer than can be helped in Russian territory.

LOHENGRIIN

All lovers of good music will spend a very pleasant evening on May 8th, when the Wednesday Music Club will entertain their guests by putting on "The Romance of the Swan Knight," from Richard Wagner's beautiful masterpiece Lohengrin. This opera will be handled along the same lines as was Peer Gynt, given about a year ago. The concert will be given in the Presbyterian Church hall, and it will be well to bear in mind that the seating capacity and tickets will be limited to 150. THE FITNESS OF THINGS

This promises to be a busy week in Prince Rupert. Troubles are not the only things that decline to come singly. With the advent of the good weather and the probable resumption of the train service, the distinguished party composing the International Fisheries commission will be here this week. The Hon. W. C. Redfield, the colleague of Mr. Justice Hazen, is one of the distinguished members of President Wilson's Cabinet. There have been many of our notable cousins from across the line visiting in the West since their great nation joined in the common cause, but this is the first time that one of the executive chiefs responsible for the Republic's conduct of the war has been so far west in Canada. While the occasion of his visit here is not connected primarily with war effort, it has arisen from that closer comradeship of nations allied for that purpose.

The Hon. T. D. Pattullo is also expected to arrive in the city on Wednesday. He will address his constituents—and all are invited—in the Empress Theatre on Wednesday evening. The session of Parliament just closed has been a strenuous one and much important legislation has been put through. There will be many matters of interest to this community which the minister of lands will have to speak of. And anyone who has heard Mr. Pattullo speak previously will realize that he is a speaker of no mean order.

In addition to this, the campaign being carried on for the support of the Y. M. C. A. work at the front will culminate on Saturday, and will still further help to distract the attention of the citizens from the idle drydock, and the comparative absence of business where business should be.

As if these were not sufficient, Clean-up Day is also hooked for this week. A mere male always realizes the seriousness of domestic spring cleaning, and if this were carried out on the same scale, the

upheaval would be rather embarrassing for our distinguished visitors. The weather, too, is that which makes the gardener see visions, such as the pictures on the seed packets, and dreams of what he would like his garden to be, and this is the time of year when every day counts, so far as the crops are concerned.

After the placidity of the last few weeks, such a number of things coming all at once demanding attention, more or less, is inclined to make one, especially who has little leisure, question the fitness of things. Which, however, does not alter the circumstances in the slightest.

MR. O'CONNOR'S SUCCESSOR

The Minister of Labor assures Parliament that when a successor to Mr. O'Connor as High Cost of Living Commissioner has been named, it will be found that the public interest has not been injured by the change. As to that it might be observed that the new Commissioner will have to be a mighty good man to reconcile the public to the loss of Mr. O'Connor. The public thus far is not dissatisfied over the former Commissioner's resignation, but suspicious. The correspondence between Hon. Mr. Crothers and Mr. O'Connor which was submitted to Parliament, while it left a lot to the imagination, suggested that the Commissioner's organization was hampered by the interference of Mr. Crothers with the discipline of his staff, one of the members of which, apparently feeling confident of the Minister's support, acting in a most insubordinate manner. This we gather from the correspondence as brought down so far. There were other communications which Mr. Crothers declined to disclose.

Now, the public is aware that certain big interests have had their knives out for Mr. O'Connor for a long time, and that powerful pressure has been brought to bear at Ottawa to have him removed. And Ottawa knew that the public was watching the situation very

HOLE IN ZEEBRUGGE MOLE EASILY SEEN

Amsterdam, April 26.—A cor-
respondent of The Telegraaf
sends word from the frontier that
a hole fully twenty-five yards
wide was blown in the Zeebrugge
mole by the British submarine
which was loaded with explosives
and sent against the mole.

"One may see clear through the
mole," says the correspondent,
"when looking from a great dis-
tance on the dunes from east to
west. The beach is near; the
coast, showing that the subma-
rine went quite far into the har-
bor notwithstanding the barricad-
ing contrivances, such as nets and
old boats. On the shore side
two-funnelled torpedo boat.

WHAT THE "Y" DOES FOR OUR BOYS AT THE FRONT

When it is considered that in
France there are some ninety-six
branches of the Canadian Y. M.
C. A., dozens of these consisting
of dugouts in the forward
trenches and under fire, where
the boys are afforded hot tea and
coffee when they most need it,
and for which the Association re-
ceives no financial aid from the
government, it will be realized
how dependent they are upon the
voluntary subscriptions of those
of us who have not been required
to leave our homes through the
effects of war. In addition to the
branches in France, there are
seventy-nine in England, where
facilities are afforded to the sol-
diers for recreation. This is one
of the new features in modern
warfare, practically unknown in
previous generations.

Some indication of the work
carried on may be gleaned from
a study of a few specific illustra-
tions as follows:

(1) A total of 1,000,000 sheets
of letter paper are distributed
free each month in England and
France—12,000,000 sheets per
year.

(2) A total of 30,000 letters, it
is estimated, are written daily by
Canadian soldiers in the "Y" huts.

(3) One hundred pianos, three
hundred phonographs and twenty-
seven moving picture machines
are possessed by the Canadian
Y. M. C. A. in England and France.

(4) A single order for baseball
equipment for Canadian soldiers
amounted to \$25,000. All athletic
equipment is furnished to the
men free, and this year the out-
lay will total \$100,000.

(5) The sum of \$1,000 monthly
is expended on concerts alone
in England, these entertainments
usually taxing the capacity of the
buildings in which they are held.
These few facts are sufficient
to justify the carrying on of this
work, which has been made pos-
sible through the co-operation of
the Canadian Y. M. C. A. Their
ambitious programme is being
worked through voluntary sub-
scriptions which are sought in
all Allied countries. And every
