## OVER A MILLION AMERICANS IN FRANCE

### PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT--EXPLOSION IN SYRACUSE KILLS AND INJURES 1200

#### ALLIED TROOPS LANDED IN RUSSIA TO PROTECT STORES OF MUNITIONS AT KOLA

**BRITISH, FRENCH AND AMERICANS LANDED ON NORTHERN ARCTIC SHORES OF RUSSIA--GREAT AERIAL ACTIVITY IN WEST--GERMAN COUNTER-ATTACK CAN'T MOVE AMERICANS**

London, July 3.—American, British and French forces have been landed at Kola, on the Murmansk coast, on the northern boundary of Russia in order to protect the vast stores of munitions which were transported there before the collapse of Russia as a fighting factor. Warehouses there are filled to overflowing with military stores of all kinds, and it is known that the Finnish Red Guard, and later the German invaders of Russia have been casting covetous eyes in this direction. It is expected that the Allied forces in this northern portion of Russia will have to face a serious attack soon.

**Mun Regiment Wiped Out.**  
Paris, July 3.—German counter attacks north of Chateau Thierry against the positions captured by the American troops have failed completely. The village of St. Pierre Aigle remains in American hands. An entire German regiment has been virtually annihilated in the fighting west of Hill 201.

**Aerial Activity.**  
London, July 3.—British airmen yesterday disposed of forty-two German aeroplanes and three balloons. In an air battle between nine Allied aeroplanes and an equal number of German machines in the Chateau Thierry sector, at least three German planes were destroyed, while two American machines have failed to return from the encounter.

#### NEW ENGINE TO GET POWER FROM AIR WAS TESTED AT BOSTON

Washington, July 1.—An engine invented by T. K. Giragosian of Boston, who claims it will utilize an inexhaustible source of cheap power from the air will be tested at Boston tomorrow by scientists selected by the inventor, and approved by Secretary Lane. The test, which was authorized by congress, will be secret.

#### NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

One by one last evening the councillors dropped into the city hall, and it was after eight o'clock before a quorum was secured. That holiday spirit seemed to have invaded the Civic High Place and there did not seem to be much inclination to trouble too seriously with the larger issues. It was just as well then, that the city clerk had practically nothing to place before the meeting. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, sundry supplies were passed, and some tenders agreed to be held over, and that was all.

A question from Ald. Smith regarding the city's consulting engineer, Mr. Anderson, brought out the fact that there had been some squabble somewhere or other apparently in connection with his visit. His worship, the mayor, however, afforded the aldermen little information. The committee concerned is to meet today and thresh the matter out, and it will report in formal course next week.

In view of the attendance of the city treasurer, Mr. E. D. Johnson, at the convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities in Victoria within the next week or so, it was considered that the city ought to join the Union, and pay the dues. This being agreed to, the motion for adjournment was made, and by twenty minutes past eight, the council meeting was over.

#### GERMAN POPULACE NOW LEARNING TRUTH

Atlantic City, N. J., July 1.—The vital part which America is playing in the world war has at last begun to dawn upon the people of Germany, despite the efforts of the German government to conceal it, Lord Reading, British ambassador, declared in a speech tonight before the Maryland State Bar Association.

"I observe that in the Reichstag and throughout Germany," he said, "it is now known that a new, vital, dominant force has not only entered into this war, but is determined to throw all it possesses into the scale for the ideals upon which its political system is based and which are the only principles for which America has ever been drawn into the war."

#### MASSACRE OF SERBIANS BY BULGARIAN FORCES

Washington, July 3.—Advices received here from the Balkans give information of the massacre of three hundred Serbians. These people were rounded up not far north of Monastir, and were put to death near a monastery there. The general pillage of what remains of Serbian possessions has been organized by the Bulgarians.

#### FOURTH OF JULY TO BE CELEBRATED IN ALLIED COUNTRIES

**King George Will Witness Ball Game Between U. S. Army and Navy Teams at Chelsea.**

London, July 3.—The rivalry between the American army and navy baseball teams, which are to play before King George at Chelsea on July 4, increases daily and the general opinion among the Americans in England is that the game will be fast and closely contested.

Every American soldier and sailor in London will have evidence on all sides that the Fourth of July is celebrated in England as well as at home. The bells at St. Paul's cathedral are to be rung. The bishop of London has issued directions for the celebration of communion in every church in his diocese with prayers for the United States. In the city there will be special observations for the day.

#### Holiday in France.

Paris, July 3.—The announcement was made in the chamber of deputies last Friday afternoon that the Fourth of July will be regarded as a legal French holiday.

#### BORDEN CONSIDERS DRAFTING ALIEN ENEMY SUBJECTS

Toronto, July 2.—Sir Robert Borden today cabled to J. R. Nicholl, president of the British Imperial Association of Earlscourt, that he had received the message urging the compulsory enlistment of Canadian Allied alien subjects and had the matter under consideration. The association asked on Sunday that the matter be taken up with the Imperial authorities and a cable was sent to Sir Robert in London.

#### MME. PETROVA AT THE WESTHOLME THEATRE

"The Light Within" is the title of the photoplay to be screened at the Westholme Theatre this evening, and in it Mme. Petrova, the famous Polish star, scintillates to great advantage. The play itself is a powerful warning to young folks against marrying for money, only. The star in this play has the part of a doctor's daughter, who, in order to provide the wherewithal to complete her father's scientific researches, marries a wealthy man she doesn't love. It is not a happy marriage, and eventually the husband leaves on a long sea trip, is reported lost and turns up again in time to see his wife promise herself to a man she had loved before her marriage. The husband then plans a revenge as fiendish as it is novel, and some of the strongest scenes are to be witnessed in the fight for the life of the hero. But see the play. #### HON. T. D. PATTULLO, MINISTER OF LANDS, VISITING ISLANDS

**Leaves Tonight for the Queen Charlottes on Timber Business —Is Hopeful for Future of Northern B. C.**

The Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, and member for this constituency, arrived in the city this morning from Victoria. Mr. Pattullo is on his way to the Queen Charlotte Islands in connection with the logging industry there, which is intimately connected with his department. "I am going over to see for myself what is being done," said Mr. Pattullo this morning. "The large influx of population there has brought up many subsidiary problems to the great one of getting out the spruce for aeroplane construction. There are at present between two and three thousand people over there, and within the next eighteen months this number will be more than doubled, so you can understand that there are many things to be taken into consideration with such a number of people on a new part of the country. The output of spruce from the Islands has not by any means yet reached its maximum, and still more and more must be got out. This of course means a greater number of men and more machinery. These will be made available, and the Islands ought to be very busy places for some time to come."

Asked as to how the by-election in Victoria was regarded, Mr. Pattullo said that this could not, nor was it anywhere regarded as a vote of condemnation of the present Government. The people of Victoria are quite sympathetic with Premier Oliver, and are pleased with the manner in which he has been getting after the C. N. R. to implement their obligations. The vote for the returned soldiers was a sympathetic one. It does not affect the government the one way or the other, as they have a sufficient majority, and this consideration weighed largely with the voters. It was felt that the returned men should have their own member.

#### NO MORE SURVIVORS OF "LLANDOVERY CASTLE"

London, July 3.—The waters between the spot where the Llandoverly Castle was sunk, and the southwest coast of Ireland have been thoroughly searched by two of His Majesty's ships. Outside of some wreckage, and a U-boat which was found, it may be assumed that there are no more survivors of the "Llandoverly Castle."

#### OVER A MILLION U.S. TROOPS IN FRANCE ON JULY FIRST

**PRESIDENT WILSON MAKES STATEMENT OF RECORD ACHIEVEMENT, WHICH WILL CAUSE UNIVERSAL SATISFACTION—AMERICANS REPULSE ATTACKS IN FRANCE**

#### CANADA WILL MAKE REVOLVERS FOR THE UNITED STATES ARMY

Toronto, July 2.—Canada is to have another new and important industry, to be located at Quebec City. The line to be manufactured is automatic revolvers for the United States army. Originally the business was offered to the Russell Motor Car Company in Toronto, but as the order was so extensive and the latter company so busily employed on other war work, it was ultimately found necessary to organize a new company for the purpose. In this new company, however, Russell interests are largely represented. The company will be known as the North American Arms Co., Ltd., and will be capitalized at \$2,000,000.

#### EVACUATION OF PARIS NOT CONTEMPLATED BY FRENCH CABINET

Paris, July 1.—Proof of the great confidence which the French government has in its soldiers and their commanders, and also of Germany's inability to capture Paris, is found in a word uttered by a person close to the Clemenceau circles, who when asked if Paris was to be evacuated emphatically replied "no."

The question was asked following the authorities' decision not to crowd the suburban munition factories. This was taken as a means of preventing further catastrophes in event of a German bombardment from closer range than now prevails.

#### 1200 PERSONS KILLED AND INJURED IN EXPLOSION AT SYRACUSE

Syracuse, N. Y., July 3.—Great loss of life has occurred here in an explosion which wrecked a factory near the city. Fears have been expressed by the police that the dead and injured will number fully twelve hundred persons.

There were two terrific explosions in the huge plant of the Sennet Holvey Company located at Split Rock, a suburb of the city.

Magistrate Carrs this morning at the police court, when Andrew Kosko, an alien enemy subject, was charged with not reporting his whereabouts to the police. He had reported in Vancouver on the 25th ult., but had not intimated his change of address. He, being able to account for this lapse satisfactorily, was dismissed.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Washington, July 2.—That there were well over a million American troops in France on the first of July was the announcement made here by President Wilson. The statement of this record achievement will, he says, cause universal satisfaction, and give an additional zest to the national celebration of the Fourth. This news is significant for the forwarding of troops overseas in future.

**Americans Hold Ground.**  
Paris, July 3.—The Americans have been able to repulse enemy attacks and hold the ground they have won. General Pershing's men have captured more prisoners to the east of the attacking force, and practically wiped out the village of St. Pierre Aigle, on the Marne. The front has been re-established by the French troops. Artillery activity on the ground held by the British decreases to normal.

The people of Queen Charlotte City, through Mr. J. L. Barge, have sent a contribution of \$95; \$75 for the Red Cross, and \$20 for the Belgian Relief Fund. This is acknowledged with thanks.

A box has been received from Port Essington branch containing 120 pairs of socks. This has been forwarded intact direct to headquarters.

The "tank" made by the G. W. V. A. and used in the procession last Monday was kindly loaned to the Adair Carrs Chapter, I. O. O. T., to make a collection for the Red Cross. Headed by a soldier in a gas mask, the tank did splendid work among the crowds of people. Mrs. E. H. Shockley and Mrs. S. J. Evans for the Chapter, went everywhere with the machine, and the result of their afternoon's work was \$53.80, which the Red Cross gratefully acknowledge.

Mrs. F. W. Hart and Mrs. Keith will have charge of the sale of home-cooking next Friday. Miss Bruce, and American nurse, who expects to leave shortly for work overseas, and Mrs. Dalton are thanked for their efforts last Friday, when the sale of home-cooking realized \$69.20.

MURDER

The sinking of the British hospital ship Llandovery Castle by a German submarine off the Irish coast is another of these things which have caused the name of Germany and all things German to be cursed throughout the Allied countries.

Had the vessel been filled with wounded soldiers returning overseas; had there been hundreds of deaths occasioned by the torpedoing of this big vessel, instead of the units, from the German point of view there would have been so much more glory attaching to the act, that sent the ship to the bottom.

There will be no peace throughout the world until the possibility of a repetition of such actions is forever removed from within the reach of the Germans. They sunk the Lusitania, with its hundreds of helpless women and children. Now they have sunk a hospital ship, whereby more of the bravest have met death, without a chance at all.

If it be that Germany can see nothing of that will to peace amongst her enemies, she ought to know that it is by just such actions that she will get no peace until Great Britain and her allies are prepared for it.

ENTHUSIASM

Military Service Act, 1917.

Men 19 and 20 Years of Age. Harvest Leave.

Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship. Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence.

Men Nineteen and Twenty Years of Age.

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a widespread impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since October 13, 1917, as well as those who may become nineteen from time to time and who have been or will be called upon to register under the Military Service Act, are to be immediately called to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to so report for duty, nor has the question been brought before the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farm, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harvest is over, although of course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation incumbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

Harvest Leave.

Some enquiries have been received as to the possibility of granting harvest leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this point as advantage must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

Leave of Absence on Grounds of Extreme Hardship.

It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be widely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases:— (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the fact that the man concerned is either the only son capable of earning a livelihood, of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or under treatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more brothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or brothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being presently in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted, in determining the fact that the man is the "only" remaining son or brother; (b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship, loss or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

Procedure to obtain leave of absence.

A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of application have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned should on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.

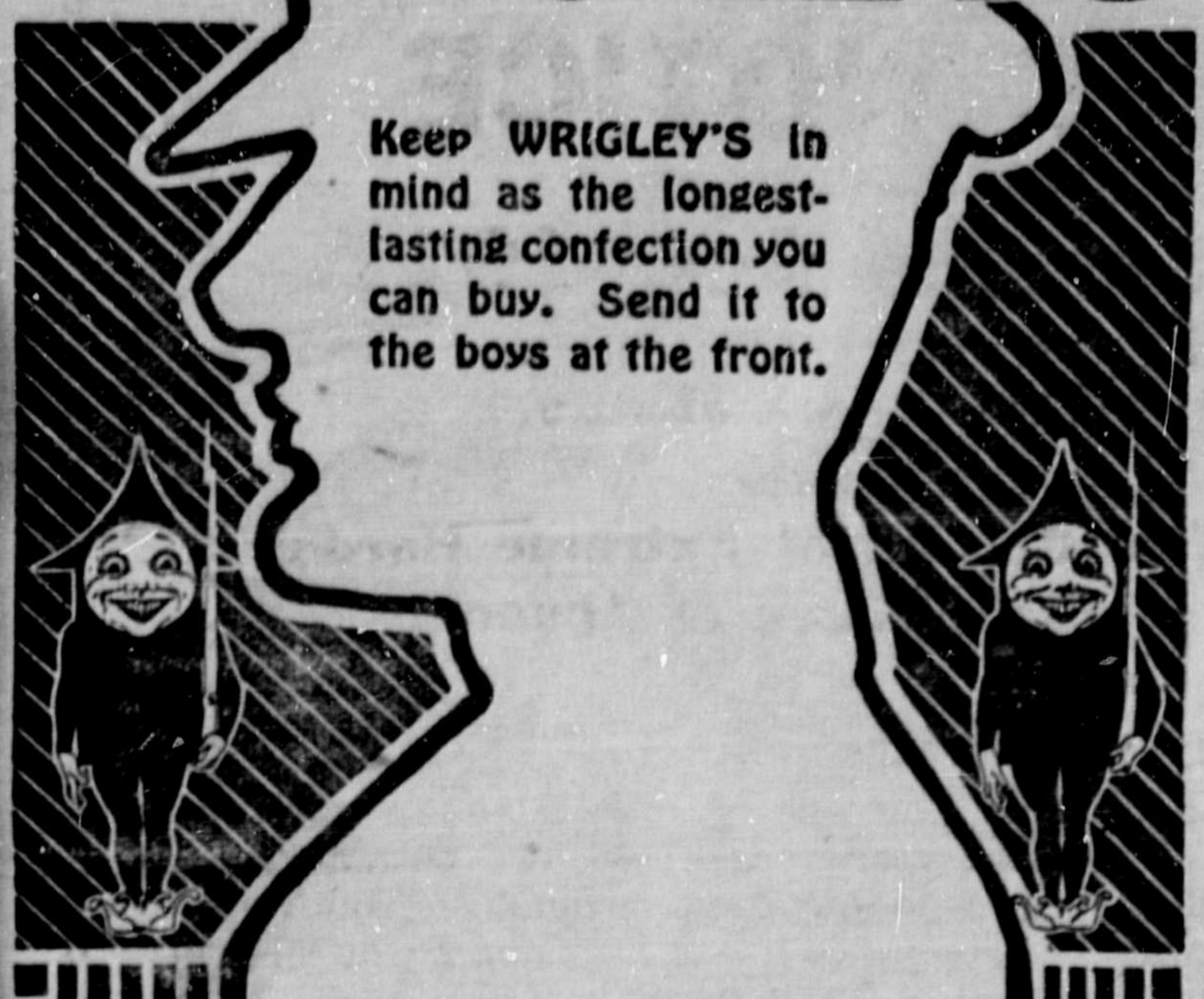

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties to the same may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he acquires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

### TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1918. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

# Grow Your Own Vegetables

**C**ITY people this year must help to grow their own food. Every pound of vegetables that can be produced in home gardens or vacant lots will be a positive addition to the supply of food. Moreover the cultivation of land in city, town and village will leave market gardeners and farmers free to grow wheat and other supplies for export.

It may be that the only contribution which you can make towards relieving the dire food needs of our Allies will be a vegetable garden. If 200,000 families in Canada would cultivate a garden of this kind it would mean a very important aggregate addition to our food supply.

In Montreal vegetables to the value of \$100,000 were grown on vacant lots last year. Calgary had over 1,100 lots under cultivation, covering an area of 200 acres. Splendid results were achieved in other cities.

There is even greater necessity for war gardens this year. Tremendous interest in the movement is reported from all parts of the Dominion. Are you a member of a vacant lot organization? If none exists in your community help to organize one.

Home garden and vacant lot cultivation is really needed and may truly be considered a patriotic service.

## Organized Efforts Will Bring Best Results

Decide here and now to have a war garden. Persuade your neighbours to do the same. All the tools necessary are a spade, rake and hoe. The cost of seeds is a trifle. Grow only standard vegetables such as potatoes, beans, peas, beets, carrots, parsnips, onions and lettuce.

By growing your own vegetables you can not only perform a patriotic duty, you can also help to control the high cost of living.

Write to your Provincial Department of Agriculture for pamphlets on gardening and any additional information.

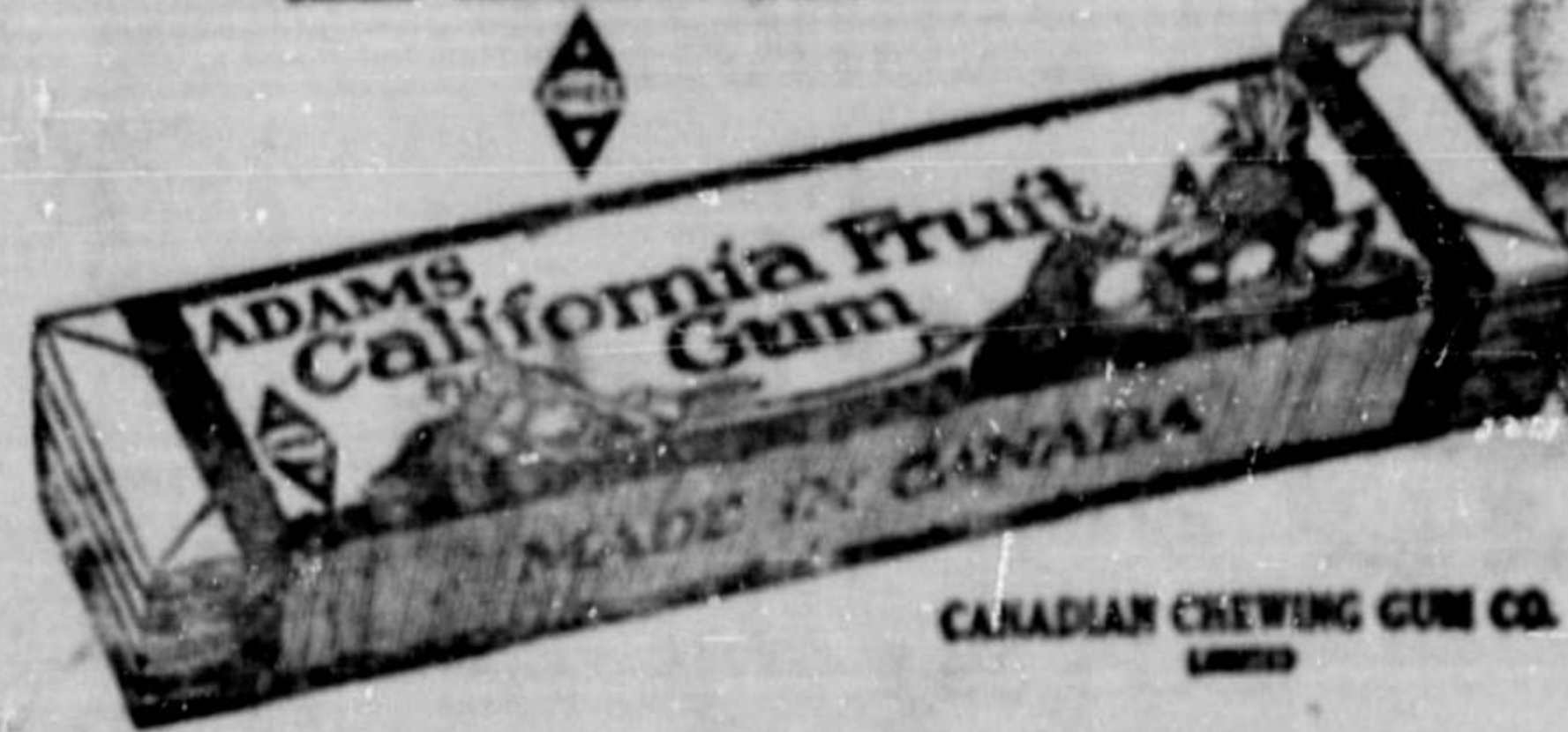
