COUNTER REVOLUTION AGAIN JARS RUSSIA

GERMAN AMBASSADOR ASSASSINATED--FIERCE FIGHTING IN MOSCOW STREETS

AUSTRALIANS CARRY THEIR LINE FORWARD ASTRIDE THE SOMME

Quiet Prevails on Other Parts of the British Front—French Repulse Hun Attack and Make Prisoners.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 9.—Last night, Australian troops attacked and carried their line forward astride the Somme river to a depth of six hundred yards, on a front of three thousand yards. This operation moved the defense of the river ahead to correspond with the push made by the Australians and the Americans on the Fourth of July attack just south of the river. Independence Day drive had left a triangular salient in the British line on the river west of Sully Laurette, which has now been straightened out.

Enemy Failure.
Paris, July 10.—A strong enemy counter attack was made against the positions near Chavigny Farm recently acquired by the French, in which the enemy forces were completely repulsed, with great losses. The German attack was made in force, and in the fighting which followed, great numbers of their troops were caught by the French artillery before they reached the French lines and immense gaps were torn in their ranks. The French machine gun and rifle fire was murderous, and ere long the enemy troops broke and fled for cover. The French also captured 530 prisoners and 30 machine guns west of Auteuil, which is an important place from a defensive standpoint and cuts down the area in which the Germans must manoeuvre. Quietness prevails all along the British front.

BRITISH SUBMARINE ATTACKED IN NORTH SEA BY GERMAN PLANE

London, July 10.—A British submarine was slightly damaged and one officer and five men killed when the underwater craft was attacked by a German seaplane off the east coast of England on July 6th.

London, July 10.—Dr. Richard von Kuehlmann, the German foreign minister, has retired from office, and the German Emperor has accepted his resignation.

CANNERS ON FRASER RIVER OFFER HIGH PRICE FOR SOCKEYE

Vancouver, July 8.—Opening prices on the Fraser river this season will be the highest in the history of the fishing industry of the province. At the meeting of the Fraser River Cannery Association it was decided to pay sixty cents a fish for sockeye, nine cents a pound for red spring salmon and five cents a pound for white spring. The association deferred fixing the prices of pinks, chums and cohoes.

Last year the opening price for sockeyes was thirty-five cents a fish and the run had been in progress but a short time when it rose to sixty-five cents. By offering a high opening price the cannery men are hopeful that rates will be stable throughout the season. Salmon fishing on the Fraser opened on July 1, but very few fishermen are out yet, the majority waiting, as in other years, until about July 17, when the run generally starts in earnest.

THE POLICE COURT

Pete A. Larsen appeared before Magistrate Carss this morning in the Police Court charged with the theft of a sum of money from E. Soderberg. The sum lost is between \$30 and \$40. The two men had been out together the night before, having a good time, and Soderberg stayed with Larsen at his apartment in the Occidental Rooms. Next morning, when he awakened, he found his pocket hanging out, and his money gone. He at once informed the police, who apprehended Larsen. At the station, he declared that he had only \$1.65 in cash upon him, but on being searched Chief Vickers discovered a ten and a five and a two dollar bill secreted upon his person. This morning he was committed for trial. Another party is supposed to be implicated in this theft, and the police expect to apprehend him shortly.

Yesterday before Magistrate McMullin, Robert Reid (colored) was committed for trial on the charge of the theft of the sum of \$72 from Fred Matthews on board the tug Achates. Mike Super appeared again this morning before Magistrate Carss charged with carrying neither birth certificate nor proof of his nationality. He claims to be a Serbian, and produced certain documents to this effect, which, however, were not altogether to the satisfaction of the court. The case, however, was dismissed and the accused will practically be treated as an alien enemy until he procured sufficient proof. He will, therefore, have to report his movements to the police until this proof is forthcoming.

TRADES AND LABOR NOMINATE OFFICERS FOR NEXT HALF YEAR

There was a large attendance at the regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council last evening which was held in the Carpenters' Hall. The prospects for increasing business in the city made for greater enthusiasm among the different unions in town.

Several matters of importance to Labor were discussed by the meeting. One of these was the employment of Oriental labor at the Seal Cove sawmill; also what was termed the "lack of patriotism" on the part of the management there by permitting their employees to work on Dominion Day. The question of the legality of employers getting their staffs to work on public holidays and Sundays was also gone into, and on receipt of further information on this point, the matter will be gone into further. It was felt that some action ought to be taken in matters of this kind, affecting labor.

The hours of the nursing staff at the General Hospital were also discussed. In addition to a twelve-hour day, additional hours were added to the staff, which was declared to be an imposition, and the matter will be further taken up by the executive. Regarding the returned soldiers, the local Carpenters' Union had done away with their initiation fees for them, and there was some criticism of some of the unions in the south who did not see their way to do this for the returned men.

Matters regarding longshoremen and labor in general were discussed, after which nomination of officers for the coming half year were received. There was a very large list of nominees, and the election will take place at the next regular meeting.

FIRE DEPARTMENT ATTEND TWO FIRES ON ONE RUN

Huge clouds of black smoke arising from the roof of the Hotel Prince Rupert caused quite a little excitement last evening about 7 o'clock. While no flames could be seen from the street, the pall of smoke appeared startling. The fire engine was soon on the job, and hauled their hose right up to the top of the high building, where the roof was found to be burning. Their prompt arrival prevented much damage. The roof, which is a tar and gravel one, heated by the brilliant sunshine of the day, had apparently caught light from a spark somehow, and for a little caused quite a little flurry of excitement. It was soon over, however. Before the big engine got away, though, there was another alarm from the old Empress Hotel building, now the Kaia Rooms. On running round the block, there was a great smell of burning and smoke, but no flame. Hot ashes from a stove, although there was a sheet of metal beneath it, had caused the flooring to scorch and smolder. The damage was slight.

RUSSIANS IN MURMAN JOIN WITH ALLIES AGAINST GERMANS

Copenhagen, July 8.—The entire population of the Murman coast, on the Kola Peninsula, bordering on the White Sea and the Arctic, has broken with Russia and joined the Entente, according to a dispatch from Vardoe, Norway, to the Kristiania Tidens Tegn.

British, French and American troops have recently landed at Kola to protect the vast quantities of supplies which had been landed there for the Russian army previous to the revolution, and attempts to secure these munitions of war are being made by the German and Finnish Red Guard forces. Supplies of provisions for the United States troops has arrived at Murmansk, the dispatch adds.

TYPHON IS EAST INDIES DESTROYS ISLAND OF GUAM

Washington, July 10.—Great devastation to the Island of Guam is reported by Captain Roy Smith, the governor of the island, and commandant of the naval station, to the Navy Department here. Guam, which lies between the Philippines and the Sandwich Islands, is an important naval station and belongs to the United States. It is on the direct trade route from Hawaii to the East Indies. The damage done by the typhoon is such that Governor Smith reports that half the inhabitants of the island are in destitution.

ASSASSINATION OF GERMAN AMBASSADOR IN CITY OF MOSCOW

Two Unknown Men Obtain Entry to His Office and After Altercation, Shoot Him—Dies Immediately.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Basle, Switzerland, July 8.—(Delayed). General von Mirbach, German ambassador to Russia, was assassinated today at Moscow, according to a dispatch received here. Obtaining admittance under false pretences, two unknown men entered the private office of Count von Mirbach this morning. A short discussion ensued. Then revolver shots were heard, followed by explosions of hand grenades. The ambassador died almost instantly. The assassins escaped and have not been captured.

GISCOME LUMBER MILL WILL RESUME OPERATIONS

Prince George, July 8.—Prospects are that the big mill of the Giscome Lumber Company will resume operations almost immediately, according to reports circulated here yesterday. Mr. Jos. P. Welsh of Vancouver, official liquidator of the company's affairs, is now at Giscome looking into conditions and is rapidly re-organizing things at the mill. A logging gang under the supervision of an expert man from Arrow Lakes is now in the woods, and it is currently reported that the mill will be operated at once on the big supply of timber now at hand.

Workmen who were in arrears in their pay have received all arrearages due them.

REVOLUTIONISTS AND BOLSHEVIKI FIGHT IN MOSCOW STREETS

Following Assassination of the German Ambassador, Kaiser Breaks Off Relations With Russians.

Washington, July 10.—Fighting took place in Moscow between the Bolshevik forces and the Revolutionary Socialists, following the assassination of Count von Mirbach, the German ambassador. On leaving the German Embassy, the assassins took refuge in a house occupied by Revolutionary Socialists, which was defended with machine guns.

Counter Revolution.
London, July 10.—A serious counter revolution has broken out in Moscow, according to a semi-official Wolff Bureau telegram, dated Sunday, from Moscow, and transmitted to London by the Exchange Company's correspondent at Copenhagen. Fighting of great severity is taking place in the streets between the Bolshevik troops and the Social Revolutionists.

Relations Broken.
Amsterdam, July 10.—The Kaiser, on hearing of the assassination of Ambassador Mirbach, who was one of his close friends, ordered Foreign Minister Kuehlmann to break off relations with Russia.

CZECHO-SLOVAKS AGAIN DEFEAT BOLSHEVIKI IN EASTERN SIBERIA

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 10.—The Czechoslovak forces in eastern Siberia have extended their sphere of influence up the Amur river to Nikolaysvak, an important civil station. The defeated Bolshevik troops with their Austrian friends are said to have retired towards Khabarovsk, the capital of the Manchurian province.

THE TARRINGTON CASE

A soldier's widow in Toronto has been left with eight children under thirteen years of age, and no means of support except her own labor. The country in whose service her husband enlisted at the beginning of the war tells her it owes her nothing. Thomas Tarrington went overseas in May, 1915, was gassed in February, 1916, and upon returning to the trenches after treatment contracted bronchitis and pneumonia, which led to his honorable discharge. While working in Toronto he was taken ill on April 13, 1918, and died on April 20. The Board of Pension Commissioners rejects his widow's claims on the ground that his death was not attributable to service. There is her word that he suffered daily from the lingering effects of gas. In such a case might not the benefit of the doubt go to the widow and her eight children without opening the door to abuses? Former soldiers unwounded in the war are drawing large pensions for organic complaints said to have been induced by service, but they are still able to perform other duties. But for the widow Tarrington and her eight fatherless bairns—not a cent!

A scheme of mothers' pensions would meet the case of this poor woman, but denied by the Pensions Board she can only look forward to a hopeless struggle with poverty, and probably a heart-breaking separation from the children whom she cannot maintain unless society comes to her relief. No country with a conscience can so dismiss any deserving woman, let alone the widow of a man who risked his life and may have shortened it in defence of the nation. It is not just or Christian that Mrs. Tarrington should be left to carry her burden unaided. The War Veterans' Association will do well to continue to press her case on the attention of the Ottawa authorities.—Globe.

ANOTHER'S GAIN

The discovery of another six-foot seam of coal in the property of the Telkwa Collieries is another one of the things which has happened so often in mining, when

the successors of the first party finds what he has failed to get. In this instance, several years ago, the G. T. P. spent considerable money in prospecting for coal in this Telkwa region, with a view of supplying their own requirements, primarily. The coal was known to be there, and the G. T. P. engineers were only a foot or two out, from hitting the seam they wanted. In the course of the development of the Ashman property, owing to a small landslide, the seam which could not be found then became exposed. The G. T. P. gave up their efforts, and that which they could not find will now prove of value to the new owners.

The same thing happened at what promises to become one of the biggest mines at Stewart. One outfit spent thousands of dollars in development work, and gave it up, eventually, when the next man who comes along finds ore only a few feet further in.

There is a time for everything, and the man who knows when to quit, and also when to keep on going is he who wins out.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 2 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he acquires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the pur-chaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

Mr. O. B. Bush, who is operating the Bush property at Stewart, arrived in town en route for the Portland Canal this morning.

Grow Your Own Vegetables

CITY people this year must help to grow their own food. Every pound of vegetables that can be produced in home gardens or vacant lots will be a positive addition to the supply of food. Moreover the cultivation of land in city, town and village will leave market gardeners and farmers free to grow wheat and other supplies for export.

It may be that the only contribution which you can make towards relieving the dire food needs of our Allies will be a vegetable garden. If 200,000 families in Canada would cultivate a garden of this kind it would mean a very important aggregate addition to our food supply.

In Montreal vegetables to the value of \$100,000 were grown on vacant lots last year. Calgary had over 1,100 lots under cultivation, covering an area of 200 acres. Splendid results were achieved in other cities.

There is even greater necessity for war gardens this year. Tremendous interest in the movement is reported from all parts of the Dominion. Are you a member of a vacant lot organization? If none exists in your community help to organize one.

Home garden and vacant lot cultivation is really needed and may truly be considered a patriotic service.

Organized Efforts Will Bring Best Results

Decide here and now to have a war garden. Persuade your neighbours to do the same. All the tools necessary are a spade, rake and hoe. The cost of seeds is a trifle. Grow only standard vegetables such as potatoes, beans, peas, beets, carrots, parsnips, onions and lettuce.

By growing your own vegetables you can not only perform a patriotic duty, you can also help to control the high cost of living.
