GERMAN PEOPLE STILL BEING KEPT IN DARK AS TO CAUSE OF WAR

Washington, July 8 .- German activity in preventing the circulation of memoirs of Prince Lichnowsky and statements of former Director Muchlon of the Krupp works, blaming Germany for the world war, was noted in an officia! despatch today from Paris based upon information from Berne.

"Germany is trying by all the means in her power to prevent the truth leaking out regarding the causes of the war," says the despatch. "Immediately pamphlets containing texts regarding these causes appear, they are brought up wholesale by German agents. The memoirs of Prince Lichnowsky appear to particularly disturb the Germans.

"The circulation of the texts was not feared until it was realized that they had a demonstrative value. This is really the case in regard to the Lichnowsky and Muehlon memoirs, the arguments of which were confirmed by the Kaiser in a recent speech."







Own Vegetables

TITY people this year must help to grow their own food. Every pound of vegetables that can be produced in home gardens or vacant lots will be a positive addition to the supply of food. Moreover the cultivation of land in city, town and village will leave market gardeners and farmers free to grow wheat and other supplies for export.

It may be that the only contribution which you can make towards relieving the dire food needs of our Allies will be a vegetable garden. If 200,000 families in Canada would cultivate a garden of this kind it would mean a very important aggregate addition to our food supply.

In Montreal vegetables to the value of \$100,000 were grown on vacant lots last year. Calgary had over 1,100 lots under cultivation, covering an area of 200 acres. Splendid results were achieved in other cities.

There is even greater necessity for war gardens this year. Tremendous interest in the movement is reported from all parts of the Dominion. Are you a member of a vacant lot organization? If none exists in your community help to organize one.

Home garden and vacant lot cultivation is really needed and may truly be considered a patriotic service.

Organized Efforts Will Bring Best Results


