GERMAN ARMY KEPT ON MOVE BY ALLIES

CONTINUOUS ADVANCES REPORTED--ENEMY PREPARES FOR FURTHER RETREAT

ALLIED TROOPS DRIVING AHEAD WITH UNDIMINISHED VIGOR DESPITE COUNTER-ATTACKS

MARNE CROSSING EFFECTED WITHOUT OPPOSITION--ARTILLERY HARRASSING HUNS--ROADS AND RAILWAYS SHELLED

(Special to The Daily News)
With the American Forces in France, July 23.—The Franco-American advance continued today from Soissons to the east of Chateau Thierry. Oulehy Le Chateau has been penetrated, placing the railway and the main highway from the Chateau Thierry to Fismes under the fire of the Allied artillery, thus adding to the difficulties of the German retreat from the Marne. The American and French infantry are across the Marne, and their numbers are now heavily reinforced by battery after battery of the allied artillery, which effected the passage of the stream without opposition, although within sight of the enemy. The French cavalry is operating northeast of the Chateau Thierry far in advance of the infantry.

Counter-Attacks Useless.
Paris, July 23.—Heavy German counter-attacks launched for the purpose of checking the progress of the Allies between the Marne and the Oureq yesterday were made without avail, according to an official announcement made by the War Office. The French and British made further advances in the region of La Croix and Grisoles, as well as northeast of Mont St. Pierre. The British divisions in the front to the southwest of Rheims have again taken the same place in battle order which the British occupied when driven back in the May offensive. North of the Marne, the Germans are preparing for a further retreat.

American Advance.
Paris, July 23.—In the Marne region, the American troops on the southern bank of the stream have been shelling the retreating enemy east of Chateau Thierry between Chartres and Gland. At the last report their advance had been pushed forward four miles from their old positions on the southern bank.

Pershing's Report.
Washington, July 23.—Fresh successes for the Americans in their drive between the Aisne and the Marne are reported in General Pershing's statement for Sunday. The Americans were driving ahead with undiminished vigor and spirits. More than six thousand prisoners, hundreds of

guns, and many mortars and machine guns have been taken by the Americans during the last few days.

Another Marne Success.
London, July 23.—On the same day that the German troops were driven back across the Marne, a German submarine was sunk by the British torpedo boat destroyer Marne.

The Northern Front.
London, July 23.—Further ground was gained by the British forces operating in the Peulernie region on the front between Albert and Arras, according to an announcement made by the War Office here. The British in conjunction with the French carried out this successful enterprise south of Villers Bretonneux to the east of Amiens. Many prisoners were taken.

U. S. GOVERNMENT TO CONTROL DOCTORS

Washington, July 22.—The Government is about to assume control of the entire medical profession in the United States to obtain sufficient doctors for the army, and at the same time to distribute those remaining to the localities or services where they are most needed for civilian work. This mobilization is to be accomplished either by enrolling all the doctors in a voluntary service corps under pledge to accomplish whatever service, military or civilian, is assigned them, or, if the voluntary plan be not successful, by legislation providing for drafting them into the service. Medical officers of the government believe compulsory conscription will not be necessary.

PLANES BEING TESTED FOR FOREST PATROL

Victoria, July 22.—The department of lands is to negotiate for the lease of a hydro-aeroplane for a series of tests in the way of a forest patrol in the air. Should the experiments prove satisfactory the department will arrange to have an aeroplane patrol next year. It will not have to go outside of the service for aviators, as a considerable number of the forestry staff have been serving in the Royal Flying Corps.

It is believed that by means of aeroplanes a very much more effective scouting system for fire outbreaks can be maintained than by launch and horseback as at present. With the large shoreline and network of inland lakes it is believed that hydroplanes will have convenient landing places in abundance. Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who has been interested in the possibility of an airplane service for his department, is expecting to make a trip aloft himself during the course of the experimental trips.

ALLIED VICTORY NOW BREAKS THE GERMAN SPELL ON HOLLAND

(Special to The Daily News.)
Amsterdam, July 23.—The Allied victory has created a deep impression throughout Holland, and the German army's spell has been broken on account of the great strategical advances achieved by General Foch. The German reputation for its army's invincibility is now discredited.

GOVERNMENT OFFICES GOING FROM HAZELTON TO SMITHERS ON G. T. P.

Victoria, July 23.—The Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, has practically completed negotiations for the removal of the Omineca government agency from the old town of Hazelton to the town of Smithers.

The reason for the change of location is on account of the central position of Smithers. Arrangements are now under way for the leasing of a suitable building at the latter point. Smithers is centrally located on the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

HOOVER TO BECOME FOOD CONTROLLER FOR ALL THE ALLIES

London, July 22.—Herbert C. Hoover, American food administrator, is scheduled to become world food dictator, according to reports circulated here today.

Hoover came here to confer with the food controllers of Great Britain, France and Italy. It was declared that the conference will take up the question of unified food control and that Hoover undoubtedly would be selected. "There is no danger of the Allies losing the war on account of lack of food. There are great prospects of the largest production of meat and grain this year," Mr. Hoover said today.

GREAT SHOALS OF PILCHARDS APPEAR OFF VANCOUVER ISLAND

Victoria, July 22.—A fish new to British Columbia waters—the pilchard—is stated to have made its appearance in vast shoals in Nootka Sound, off the west coast of Vancouver Island, according to A. H. Sherman, the prominent fish vendor of Vancouver.

The pilchard is practically unknown in the Dominion, but is chiefly obtained off the coast of Cornwall, England, where it represents the chief catch and is taken in vast amounts in seines. Curiously enough the run off Vancouver Island coincides with the period at which they are most prolific off the Cornish coasts, where the catch is heaviest in July. The fish is of the same species as the herring, but is of smaller size, usually from six to eight inches in length. It somewhat resembles a mature sardine and like that delicacy, is rich in oil. So prolific is the fish in Cornish waters that more than 10,000 hogsheads, each containing 3,000 fish, have been filled in a single day's fishing at one port. Should the shoals at Nootka Sound approach these proportions an important industry is predicted for this island, and a valuable addition will be made to the food supplies of the province.

It is particularly high in food values and according to popular belief in England the Cornish fishermen owing much of their extraordinary muscular strength to their consumption of pilchard, which forms the main item in their diet.

THE POLICE COURT

Before Magistrate Carss this morning a charge against the master of the tugboat Achaetes was heard under the Merchant Shipping Act. F. R. Walker was one of the crew of the tugboat, which is chartered by the Munitions Board. He wanted to quit, but could not get the money due him. He therefore sued for \$44, for which sum judgment was given.

Another case was also brought to the attention of the magistrate, although no charge was laid. A garage on Cow Bay had been used as a smoke house for fish, without any proper authority being given for this purpose. The garage was used by Spurr's Market, and while their car was there the fish smoking outfit was brought in and the business of smoking fish was started. The agent for the building, nor Mr. Spurr either, ever gave any permission for this being done, but permission was given by someone having no authority at all and now out of town. All the interested parties were on hand this morning, and the magistrate and the party complained of had a heart-to-heart talk. The city solicitor intimated that although no charge was laid yet, proceedings might still be instituted.

GERMAN CROWN PRINCE CALLS UPON COUSIN RUPPRECHT FOR HELP TO SAVE HIS ARMIES

GREAT DIFFICULTIES EXPERIENCED BY THE GERMANS IN THEIR RETREAT--FRENCH CAVALRY FAR IN ADVANCE OF INFANTRY

ANOTHER ENEMY ADDED TO GERMANY'S LONG LIST

(Special to The Daily News)
Washington, July 23.—The state of Honduras, which broke diplomatic relations with Germany on May 18 followed that action by declaring war upon Germany last Friday.

NOTES FROM THE COUNCIL CHAMBER

Last evening the city council held another of their snap sessions, the official proceedings lasting for about five minutes. At eight o'clock, there was a bare quorum present, and they dallied along until 8:15 before the meeting was called to order. The warrant book was produced by the finance committee, various supplies were voted, and it was moved by Alderman Kirkpatrick, seconded by Alderman Barrie that the sum of \$75 collected from Angus McLeod by mistake be refunded. This being agreed to, the city clerk intimated that that was all.

His worship then informed the council that a test had been made of the hydro-electric plant last night, when 700 kilowatts had been produced. On Wednesday night, a second test will be made after 6 o'clock sometime. The steam plant will be got ready to take the load, and on this occasion it is hoped to prove up to 1,000 kilowatts, or whatever the actual power is. The extra work and tests has cost the city something like twelve or thirteen thousand dollars since 1915, and it is hoped now to finally dispose of all dubiety regarding the hydro-electric undertaking. That being all, the council adjourned at 8:20.

With the French Armies in the Field, July 23.—The Crown Prince's Army Group is now in retreat everywhere north of the Marne, and Little Willy has been obliged to call for help from his cousin Rupprecht of Bavaria. Fresh German divisions from the army of the North have been hurried down to protect the western flank of the defeated army, which has been driven back from the Marne and ejected from the Chateau Thierry by the Franco-Americans.

Good Progress Made.

London, July 23.—The capture of the Brabillon Wood by the Americans means that the overseas men have advanced over three and four miles from their old positions on the Marne. Between the Oureq and the Aisne, the Germans are making violent counter-attacks, but the French are maintaining their lines. On every front, the Germans are resisting desperately, and are making violent counter-attacks. Nevertheless, the French troops yesterday made progress along the river Marne to a maximum depth of eight miles.

Germans Pocketed.

The object of the constant counter attacking is to expedite the extrication of the German troops from the pocket between Soissons and Rheims. Meantime, the German troops on the southern end of the pocket must be experiencing great difficulties in getting supplies. Southwest of Rheims, there has been heavy fighting and the French made good progress.

British In, Too.

At French Headquarters, July 23.—The British troops participated in the battle for the first time on Saturday between Rheims and the Marne in the region of the Ardre. The British forges took up three positions in the night time, and attacked immediately with complete success, advancing over a mile.

Objectives Gained.

London, July 23.—French troops in the Champagne district between the rivers Nippe and Mosignes have regained all their objectives, according to advices received here.

GETTING WISE

Although the German military authorities consider it good policy to belittle the fighting qualities of the American troops to the German people the Great General Staff is fully aware of the true character of the new forces now coming strongly into the war.

This report, which had to do with Americans captured in the Bouches sector, had a number of unfilled blank spaces opposite "essential information," "composition of American division," and "history," showing that the prisoners refused to give information on these subjects.

"American division may be considered a very good division, perhaps even an assault division. Various attacks of two regiments upon Belleau Wood were executed with dash and intrepidity. The moral effect of our fire was not able seriously to check the advance of their infantry. The nerves of the Americans are not yet shaken."

"The quality of the men must be characterized as remarkable. They carry themselves well, are well developed physically, and from eighteen to twenty-eight years of age. At the present time they only require proper training to make them formidable adversaries."

"The spirit of the men is fresh and full of naive confidence. The following statement by a prisoner is characteristic: 'We kill or we are killed.'"

"Details concerning their position. It was impossible to obtain any facts. The prisoners scarcely indicated the place they had occupied in the line."

General remarks: Morale—in general, the prisoners make a good impression. Their manner is alert. At present they still consider the war from the point

of view of a big brother who is coming to the assistance of his oppressed brothers and sisters, and who is received everywhere in a friendly manner. Their opinions have a certain moral basis: Most of the prisoners express themselves with an understandable naivete, and declare that they came to Europe to defend their country.

"Only a few of the men are pure American by race. The majority of them are sons of foreign parents. These half-Americans, however, most of whom were born in America and have never been in Europe, express without hesitation purely American sentiments."

That report ought to be useful propaganda material for the Allies. Undoubtedly there are in Germany and in the German army many people who know that the official announcements on the American war effort and the calibre of the American troops are utterly false, but so absolute is the control of the German Government over the minds of the German people that any communication labelled "official," no matter how fantastic, is believed by the great majority of them.

BANK OF MONTREAL AND BANK OF B.N.A.

Calgary, July 22.—The Calgary Canadian says: "It is learned here that the actual consolidation of the Bank of Montreal and the Bank of British North America will take place within the next four or six weeks."

ALLIED TANKS ARE FAR SUPERIOR TO GERMAN MACHINES

London, July 20.—An important element in the present battle will be the work of tanks. The German tanks are like fortified towers, much more heavily armed than the French and British, but are practically useless when they have to leave a road and slow up in their own length. The latest British tanks also have a power of mobility of much higher order than their forerunners. The development of tanks is a remarkable feature of the war, and as

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1918. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

AUSTRIAN TROOPS PLAINLY WARNED OF NATION'S POVERTY

London, July 20.—A dispatch from British Headquarters contains the following extracts from a memorandum circulated among the Austro-Hungarian company commanders, which throws an interesting light on the recent abortive offensive against Italy. Economic conditions forced the Austrians to use Italian uniforms and equipments.

"Our offensive will help effectively to finish the war if we drive back our hereditary enemy and penetrate deeply into his territory. We, without the help of our German brothers, must reckon on our own strength only. Our artillery forces will break down the enemy's resistance.

"Our own country is very short of foodstuffs and, therefore, as long as possible, the people must live on the country. Feeding corn to horses is strictly forbidden, because after July there will be no further supplies of bread from the year.

"Any uniforms and clothing found should be appropriated for our personal use, and may be worn after the removal of the Italian badges. We are in great need of uniforms. Underclothing, boots and ammunition must not be thrown away by the men in order to let them load themselves with booty.

"Let every man know that the present offensive, coupled with that of the Germans, is the most violent but perhaps the decisive blow against the Italians."

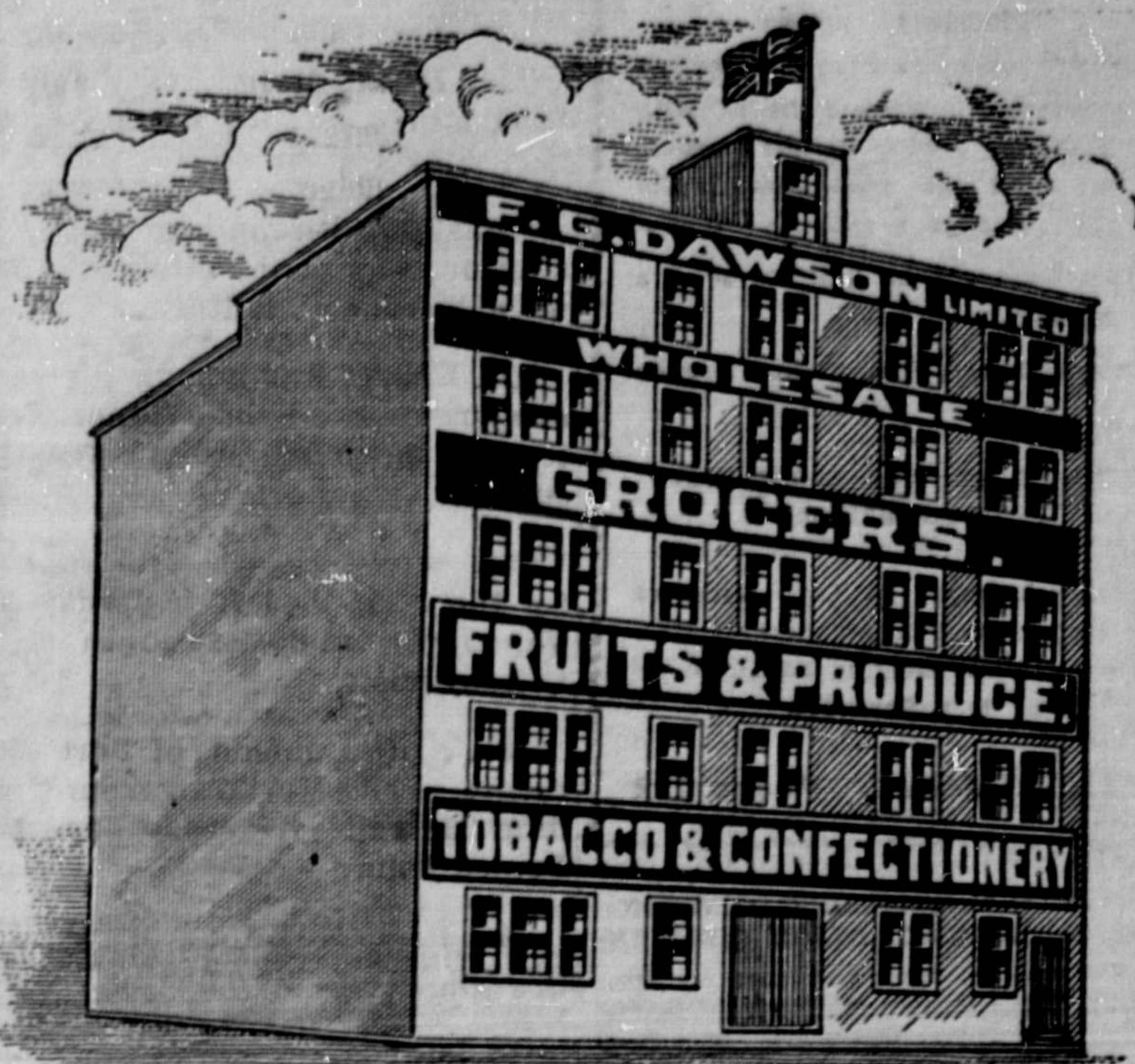

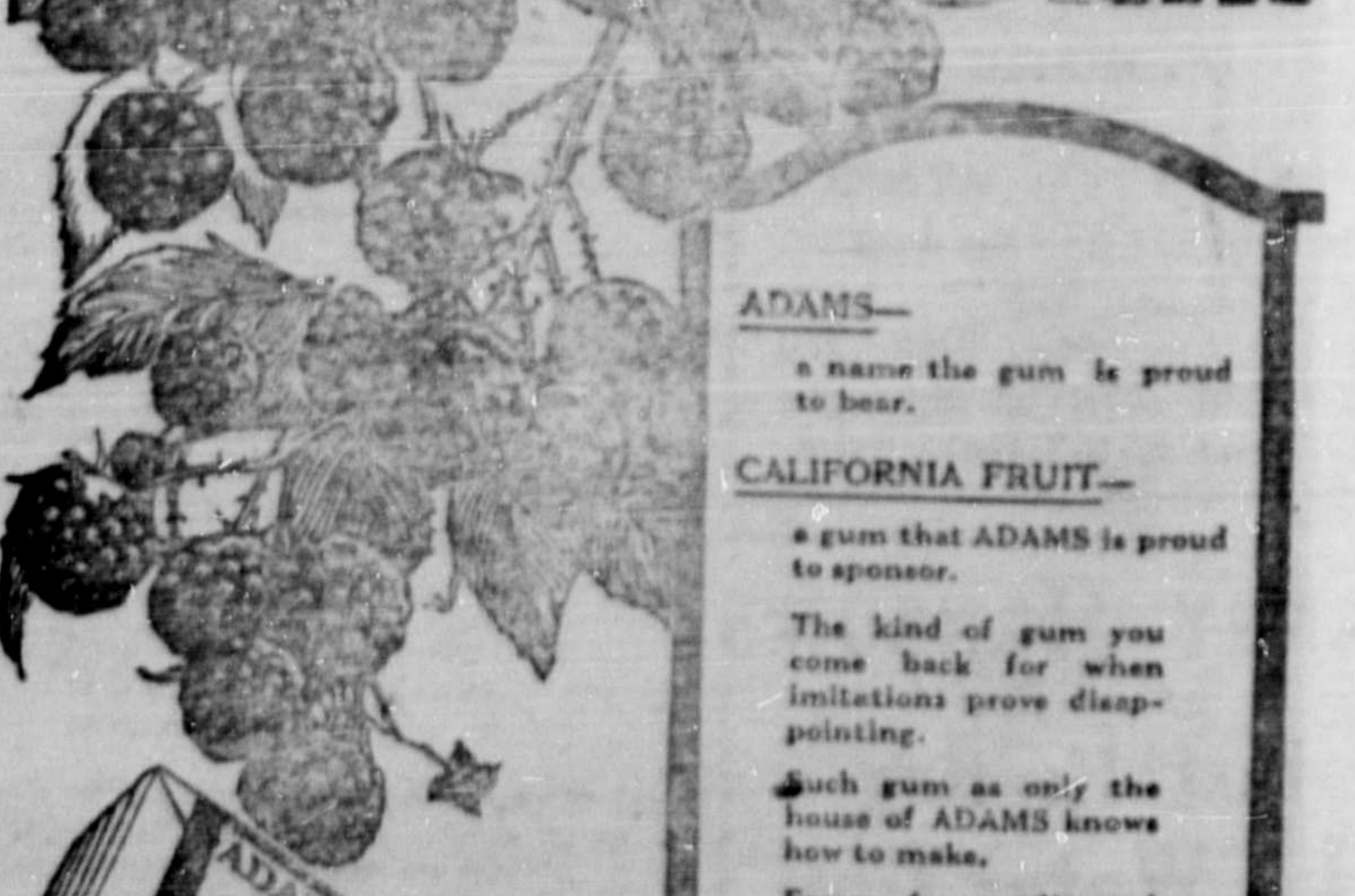
