

ENEMY BRINGS UP MORE MEN FOR A STAND

RETREAT ORDERS COUNTERMANDED--MORE PEACE PROPOSALS--BIG LINER SUNK

THE ALLIES MAKE FURTHER HIGHLY IMPORTANT GAINS ON SOISSONS-RHEIMS SALIENT

SMASHING BLOWS COMPEL CROWN PRINCE'S ARMY TO GIVE MORE GROUND--CENTRE ADVANCES TWO MILES TAKING VILLAGES

(Special to The Daily News)
With the American Armies on the Aisne Front, July 24.—The armies of General Petain and General Pershing have forced their way through the rain soaked woods and fields further into the German lines. The strategy of General Foch has apparently called for the delivery of smashing blows today, and at various and numerous points, the shock divisions of the army of the Crown Prince were forced to give ground before the French and United States troops.

Important Gains Made.
Paris, July 25.—Highly important gains by the French and the American troops on the Aisne-Marne front were reported by the War Office here in an official statement late last night. In the centre of the line, an advance of nearly two miles was made. Desperate engagements in the direction of the villages of Epieds and Trigny-Epiards were fought which places the Americans again recaptured from the Germans, causing great losses to the enemy. To the north of Epieds, the Franco-American line is now beyond the village of Courpail. It is estimated that the Germans now have over half a million men in the limited salient which they are still holding.

ROUMANIANS REFUSE TO STAY PUT BY HUNS

Washington, July 24.—Germany has rushed 300,000 troops into Roumania to put down uprisings in the conquered Balkan country, according to official Rome cables today.

Clashes between the Roumanian people and the German troops have become so widespread and violent that the Austro-Germans have been compelled to draw upon their reserves in the west to send aid.

Cables state that the latest fighting resulted from the continued German attempt to transport grain from Roumania. The farmers are reported to have refused to plant their crops unless Germany guarantees to keep her hands out of the Balkan granaries.

Military authorities believe that the Roumanian trouble may be of much assistance to the Entente. It is held that the Bulgarian line in Macedonia and the Austrian forces in Albania and in Italy will be weakened.

SUGGESTIONS FOR A PEACE CONFERENCE FROM GERMANY

(Special to The Daily News)
Amsterdam, July 25.—Germany has made suggestions for a peace conference to the Spanish government, says the Socialist "Vorwaerts" of Berlin. Germany wants no annexations or indemnities in the west, and the peace treaties with Russia and Roumania may not be questioned. The principle of self-determination of the various races and peoples has not been discussed, but may be settled at a peace conference where the fate of Belgium may also be settled. The freedom of the seas, the dismantling of the fortifications of Gibraltar, and of the Suez Canal, and the right for Germany to use coaling stations throughout the world are some of the stipulations made, while the colonial question is to be settled upon the basis of the status quo. The "Vorwaerts" considers this to be a very reasonable peace proposal.

PERSIUS NOW SAYS GERMAN PEOPLE MUST BE TOLD THE TRUTH

Amsterdam, July 24.—On the occasion of the eighteenth month of unrestricted submarine warfare, Captain Persius, writing in the Berlin Tageblatt, said: "We must admit that the fantastic hopes entertained by some have fallen disappointingly short of realization. It is foolish to think that our U-boats can starve England, and we must tell the German people the truth."

CANADIAN MONEY IN U. S. AT A DISCOUNT —WANT RETALIATION

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 23.—It is becoming a hard matter to use Canadian money in either Niagara Falls or Buffalo, Canadians living near the border are finding out. The International Railway Company, which operates over the river and in Buffalo, and runs a railway between the two cities, absolutely refuses to take Canadian bank notes. Many Canadians going across to Buffalo and having nothing but Canadian bills often have to miss cars while they run about trying to find some place which will take Canadian money.

In restaurants and stores in Niagara Falls and Buffalo they charge a discount of as high as 3 per cent. on Canadian money. Canadians protest vigorously, pointing out that it is an insult to Canada, only to be met with the stereotyped reply: "We cannot help it. The banks charge us the discount and we have to, too, to protect ourselves."

Nevertheless, it is said the American banks are making a good thing out of sending big batches of Canadian bills over to this side and receiving par for the money from the Canadian banks. It is felt here that the Canadian banks should retaliate and charge a discount on American money.

BUILDING SHIPS IN JAPAN FOR STATES

Washington, July 24.—The United States, turning to its associates in the Orient for aid in meeting the shipping crisis, has let new contracts for ships to Japan which will make a total of more than \$400,000,000 to be spent for tonnage in the island Kingdom and in China.

Announcement was made today of the awarding of contracts for thirty vessels to thirteen Japanese yards. All of the ships will be of 6,500 tons or more, and the total tonnage will be 253,000. These ships are in addition to 127,000 tons purchased from Japan and 150,000 tons chartered at a total cost of \$78,000,000, of which \$20,000,000 has been expended.

GERMANS BRING UP MANY REINFORCEMENTS TO STEM TIDE OF ALLIES' ADVANCE

ALLEGED WITHDRAWAL ORDER HAS BEEN COUNTER- MANDED--EXPECTED ENEMY WILL MAKE STAND NOW AND STOP RETREATING

(Special to The Daily News)
Paris, July 25.—The Crown Prince has suddenly changed his plans for the strategic retreat in the Soissons-Rheims salient, and has determined to fight it out there. This decision is indicated by the stiffening of the resistance of his army. The fact of increasing reinforcements being received is borne out by German prisoners today, who declare that the withdrawal order has been countermanded. They could offer no explanation, but the military experts believe that the German politicians, fearing internal trouble through the effects of the huge retirement, have forced this change in the plans of the German high command. The Crown Prince continues to order new divisions into the pocket, drawing these reinforcements from as far north as the main British front.

Huge Losses.
The German losses in this region are now estimated at 180,000 which includes 25,000 prisoners.

Moving South Again.
With the American Armies in France, July 25.—The German movement within the salient north of Chateau Thierry, which has been northward since the enemy retirement began, today reported to be southward. It is believed that these are fresh replacements of troops, and that the Germans are preparing to make a stiff stand in certain locations. The French, British and Americans are still hammering at the flanks of the Crown Prince's lines.

Violent Fighting.
Paris, July 25.—Important gains were realized on Tuesday by the Allies, particularly by the French troops, who bore seventy per cent. of the effort, in which they vied in bravery with the British, Americans and Italians. The fighting has far surpassed in violence that of the March and May offensives, and the Germans are rapidly being worn out. The wild talk of the German official statements proves more than anything else the confusion in Germany resulting from the unexpected Allied blow.

British in Hard Fighting.
London, July 25.—A dispatch from French headquarters reads: "Some of the hardest fighting on the whole battlefield is now raging on the front astride the Ardre in Montagne de Rheims. The British arrived at the point of concentration south of the Marne on the 17th, and attacked on a front extending over five miles on the morning of the 20th."

THE TRIUMPHANT HERRING

Herrings were sold at three for a penny at Berwick on Tweed, Scotland, recently, says The Toronto Globe the other day. The townspeople of Berwick on Tweed, which has not belonged to Scotland for hundreds of years either, were able to get all the herring they wanted free, owing to the tremendously large quantities which were landed. Owing to the shortage of labor, the fish curers were unable to deal with the catches, which sold at ridiculously low prices. The Globe continues to rhapsodize over the herring as follows:

What a feast the people of Berwick must have had on that day! What appetizing incense arose from thousands of sizzling frying-pans and griddles! Men would be lured from their labors by the smell of the succulent fish. What if the beefsteak of old England has gone to the bottom, it has emerged from the deep in a rich—may, richer—silver harvest of the sea! The sportive little herring is immune from the torpedo, and laughs at Tiptop's shoal of ruthless sharks.

The besieged inhabitants of the Sea-girt Isle may yet be saved by the smell of a herring! It would indeed be poetical justice if a mere sprat should be the means of throttling the all-devouring submarine. For the herring are the most democratic of fishes, they are the common people of the sea—the masses—and are the most beloved by their prototypes on land.

The common people have always had the highest respect for the herring, which is fondly referred to in England as "the poor man's beefsteak." The war has done much to level things down, and, in some cases, to level things up, in Great Britain, and the advent of the herring into society may be regarded as a happy omen for the future. The sight of an Earl, or even King George himself, scrupulously picking the vertebrae of a bloater would surely satisfy the most ardent Socialist. One would imagine Robert Blatchford writing an ode to the occasion.

While a taste for red herring

is regarded in Great Britain as the unfailing mark of a plebeian, it has been known for a fact that certain aristocrats and blue bloods of both sexes did enjoy trifling with a juicy kipper in the secret of their private breakfast rooms. Such reserve and class-distinguishing marks will henceforth be abolished, and we may yet see the herring served openly in his divers forms and uniforms at state functions. Under its democratizing regime the "two-eyed steak" may become popular at the Savoy; and it may become a common thing for a substantial customer to announce in stentorian tones:

"I say, waitah, I will have a Digby."

A JOY RIDE

An official report has been sent to Ottawa from London, and given out to the newspapers for publication, outlining the proceedings at the Imperial War Conference. According to this report, the program followed up to date has little immediate importance in relation to either the conduct of the war or other imperial affairs.

The delegates, it appears, appropriately passed a resolution congratulating the king and queen on the event of their silver wedding anniversary.

At another meeting they discussed an Imperial Bureau of Microbiology, for the purpose of investigating fungoid diseases.

At a further session the Chancellor of the Exchequer explained a concession made to the overseas Dominions under the Finance Act of 1916, and the conclusion was arrived at that "further action is impracticable during the war"—in what direction or with what tangible object, the dispatch does not state.

Another session was consumed in a discussion as to the desirability of having a good news service between the Old Lands and the overseas Dominions.

Another meeting was spent in discussing ways and means of freeing Great Britain in future from dependence upon German supplies of dye stuffs.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

OTHER WOODS BESIDES SPRUCE BEING USED NOW FOR AEROPLANES

Washington, July 23.—A policy now effective in American airplane production is that of supplementing spruce wood supply by using selected timber of other more widely distributed commercial varieties. It is said exhaustive tests made by the forest service, followed by experiments in construction, have proved that requisite qualifications of strength and lightness for airplane building are possessed in varying degree by other woods, notably white pine, and that under orders of John D. Ryan, head of the Aircraft Board, use of them was decided upon.

It is not intended, the technical men say, to displace the invaluable but somewhat inaccessible spruce with the other woods except in making the fuselage, finishing the body and building up sections of the structure like the landing struts, where the strains and stresses of progress against air resistance do not centre. Spruce will still constitute the material for wing spars, struts, between planes and similar sections where these stresses do centre.

GOVERNMENT TO TAKE STEPS TO PREVENT STOPPAGE OF WORK

Ottawa, July 22.—It is rumored that the Government, on the recommendation of the Minister of Labor, is about to take such steps as may be found necessary to ensure prompt prosecution of any violations of the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act. This Act makes it an offence punishable with heavy penalties to participate in a lockout or strike, or to incite others to do so, before an investigation by a board of conciliation has taken place and an award made by it. Of late there have been several such hasty interruptions of work without any such investigation or any opportunity given the Department of Labor to adjust the differences between employers and workers.

ABOUT THAT EXTRA TRANSMISSION LINE FROM SHAWATLANS

To the Editor:

On April 20th of this year, the writer had occasion to write to the mayor and council in reference to the part taken by him, as superintendent of utilities, concerning the building of a transmission line to serve the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., the report about town being that I had neglected, either through incompetence or for some other reason, to advise the council that a line was required. The substance of the letter above referred to was that no such line was necessary, the old line having ample capacity to handle the load and in view of the fact that I had been blamed for an error which would cost the city in the neighborhood of \$20,000, I asked the council to look into the matter, suggesting that they refer it to an outside party in the person of Mr. Anderson, consulting engineer of Vancouver, and if it was found that I was correct in my contention, as much official publicity be given this fact as had been given to the statement that I had erred.

No reply to the above mentioned letter having been received up to July 4th, I again addressed the council asking for a reply to my former communication, which letter, as subsequently reported in the papers, was laid over without having been read.

In the meantime, Mr. Anderson, to whom the matter had originally been referred, had visited the city on two different occasions and upon the occasion of his last visit, the writer took it upon himself to ask Mr. Anderson just how the matter of line capacity stood. In reply Mr. Anderson stated, first, that my contention that an additional line was not necessary was perfectly correct; second, that he had never suggested that a line was required only after having been wrongly informed as to the conditions to be met; third, that he had, at a meeting of the council held on July 2nd, so advised the members present and had further informed them that the old line was sufficiently large to handle the city load, the sawmill load and leave a generous surplus to spare.

In my letter to the council of July 4th, I again asked for a denial of the statements which had been made in the early part of the year and which were to the effect that I was responsible for the expenditure of some \$20,000, but to date the council have not even had the courtesy to reply and in view of the fact that I propose making Prince Rupert my home, and in justice to myself and family, I feel that it is only fair that this whole matter be given publicity and that a contradiction of the statements which have been made concerning the part I have had in the matter of the supply of power for the mill should be forthcoming. These statements reflect to no small extent upon my ability as an engineer, my reputation as such and to the engineering firm with which I am now associated in the city.

I would ask, therefore, if I may encroach upon your generosity to the extent of publishing this letter in the columns of your valuable paper, to state the following facts which facts have already been put up to the council.

First—That the writer was perfectly correct in not advising the building of a line which was entirely unnecessary to serve the mill and the building of which would entail the needless expenditure of approximately \$20,000 of the people's money.

Second—That if given proper data Mr. Anderson or any other engineer would have no difficulty in substantiating this.
