CALM BEFORE COMING STORM ON WESTERN FRONT SAYS DESPATCH

TENSENESS FORESHADOWS DAWN OF GREAT EVENTS ON WESTERN BATTLE FRONT

NO MILITARY MOVEMENTS OF IMPORTANCE DURING DAY—DURING RECENT DRIVE ALLIES CAPTURED 1,000 GUNS, THOUSANDS OF MACHINE GUNS, MILLIONS OF ROUNDS OF AMMUNITION

Paris, August 7.—There is a tenseness along the battle line which seems to forecast the approaching dawn of big events. That is the news from the Marne district this morning. Conditions along the Vesle River between Soissons and Rheims remain unchanged. Relatively speaking there have been no developments of military importance on the line running from Montdidier to the English Channel. The Germans have been shelling the American and French soldiers who made their way across to the north bank of the Vesle river and delivering heavy counter-attacks among them, but everywhere they have met with a strength of resistance that has not permitted them to counter-balance their losses of ground.

Marshal of France.

The Council of Ministers have elected General Foch to be a Marshal of France.

London, August 7.—Since the Germans began their retreat from the Marne the Allies have captured a thousand guns, thousands of machine guns, and millions of rounds of ammunition.

WOMEN TO BOYCOTT ALL GERMAN GOODS

Pledges to boycott German goods for a generation to come in the event of maltreatment of American prisoners have been taken by several hundred Seattle women, including a number of organizations, who form the Women's League for the Protection of American Prisoners. Following the extension of the league in the Sound city, where the idea originated, the movement will be carried on in various parts of the United States.

The pledge which has been signed by some hundreds of women reads as follows:

"If during this German war any American soldier who shall be made prisoner is cruelly treated while in the hands of the enemy or in any wise maltreated contrary to the usages of war, we will not now, nor for a generation after the close of this war, buy any article made in Germany or that comes from Germany; and the sworn statement of American prisoners who have undergone such cruelty or maltreatment or were witnesses thereof shall be sufficient evidence of its truth."

During his six years in the Nechaco country, he had a very varied experience, and some exciting times. It was a party under his command that captured and had to kill the giant "wild man of the woods" who terrorized the Prince George district about a year ago.

A first-class officer Constable Evans has proved himself to be, and his promotion is certainly coming to him. He will take with him to the Stikine the best wishes of all his friends, for his future well being.

BIG CATCHES OF SALMON IN SKEENA

Arrivals from the Skeena say that the salmon catch on the river is most encouraging. On Saturday last it is estimated that there were over half a million sockeyes and humpbacks in the several canneries and in order to take care of the fish and keep them from spoiling it was necessary for most of the canneries to work all day Sunday.

Big catches were also made Monday and yesterday.

CABINET MINISTERS WILL BE HERE ON VISIT NEXT WEEK

Minister of Public Works and Attorney-General to Tour Through Interior of Province.

Dr. J. H. King, Minister of Public Works, and J. W. deB. Farris, Attorney-General, are expected here on Wednesday of next week. They are to make an inspection of the interior of British Columbia in order that they may be familiar with the problems which will present themselves when the Legislature opens in February next, and also in regard to soldier settlement problems.

The question of land settlement is one which more particularly comes within the purview of the Minister of Lands, but all large undertakings have to be passed upon by the whole cabinet. The other members have been through the country and seen its immense agricultural possibilities. After this projected trip the cabinet as a whole will be in a position to discuss the problems of Northern British Columbia with some degree of intelligence.

Naturally the Minister of Public Works is in great request everywhere because it is he who is sponsor for the expenditures on Government work generally. He will undoubtedly be interested in such matters as the upkeep and improvement of roads and bridges.

ENTIRE BATTALION WIPED OUT BY MACHINE GUNS OF AMERICAN ADVANCE FORCES

PARIS NO LONGER IN DANGER, SAYS PREMIER OF FRANCE AT SESSION OF MINISTERIAL COUNCIL — TWO HUNDRED VILLAGES RECAPTURED BESIDES LARGER PLACES

Paris, August 7.—American machine gunners protecting a location on the Vesle west of Fismes yesterday wiped out an entire battalion of German infantrymen and machine gunners who were endeavoring to get into position to attack a group of American bridge builders.

That two hundred villages had been taken in addition to the larger places captured by the French and Americans in the Battle of the Marne, was the statement of the Premier of France at a session of the Ministerial Council when General Foch was made Marshal of France. The Minister made the further statement that Paris was no longer in danger. The result of the fighting was that 35,000 prisoners had been taken and 700 guns captured.

RIOT ACT READ

Toronto, Aug 7.—Mayor Church announced last night that the riot act was to be read at noon today as a result of the recurrence of disturbances in which civilians and returned soldiers and police figured.

BOMBED PRISONERS

Rome, August 7.—Austrian airplanes bombed a camp of Italian prisoners, killing a thousand, according to an Italian girl who escaped with a group of refugees from the territory occupied by the Austrians.

SUCCESSOR ARRIVES

Amsterdam, August 7.—Count Kirbach has arrived at Kiev and has assumed his duties as successor to von Eichorn who was assassinated late in July.

MEET TO DISCUSS SHORTAGE OF ICE

Gathering of Parties Interested in City Hall This Afternoon to Try to Solve Difficult Problem.

A meeting of those interested is being held this afternoon to discuss the question of providing ice for the use of the fishing boats. Mayor McClymont has asked the representatives of the fishermen, the boat owners, the Railway Company and the Cold Storage Company to get together in the City Hall for the purpose of canvassing the whole question. The Grand Trunk Railway Co. has been giving the boats all the ice that could be spared, but the limit has now come and other means must be taken to provide.

Some of the fishing boat owners are proposing to make a run up Gardner Canal to get ice from the foot of a glacier there. It is rather a long run but if ice can be secured it would be worth while. The shortage exists at other places than here. The same difficulty is experienced at Seattle and other points.

H. J. Fetter, of Seattle, arrived in town this morning. The firm of Carleton & Fetter is doing the steam shovel work for the G. T. P. around Prince George. Mr. Fetter is also interested in the Mineral Hill property on the Salmon river near Stewart.

TWO MILLION AMERICAN TROOPS TO BE OUTFITTED BY BRITISH MERCHANTS

CIVILIANS IN THE BRITISH ISLES WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO PURCHASE CLOTHES EXCEPT UNDER PERMIT FROM THE GOVERNMENT

London, August 7.—From this time on no clothes is to be made for the use of civilians in the British Isles except under permit. One reason for the scarcity of clothes is that the British Government is outfitting American troops. Contracts have been let to British manufacturers for the outfitting of two million American soldiers. One reason given for delay in getting soldiers overseas in the States has been the impossibility of providing them with their outfits with sufficient speed.

MILL STRIKE NOW SETTLED

Mutual Concessions Made at Conference Yesterday With Result Satisfactory to Both Sides.

MASS MEETING LATER ACCEPTS AGREEMENT

The mill strike is settled and the men have gone back to work. Now the new industry, so far as this city is concerned, will have an opportunity to go ahead and everyone will be the better. Much satisfaction is expressed on the street at the successful outcome, for at one time it looked as if there was little prospect of the employers and employees coming together.

Yesterday a committee of the Trades and Labor Council met the management of the mill and they were in session from 10 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. by which time a basis of settlement had been reached. There were mutual concessions and both sides appear well satisfied over the outcome.

At a mass meeting of organized labor and millworkers held last night in Carpenters' Hall the tentative agreement was adopted in its entirety by a large majority. The great feature about the final proceedings seemed to be the very evident desire to keep the wheels of industry moving. Doubtless this was largely from patriotic motives because the spruce is so badly needed at the present time.

BIG OFFENSIVE IS DUE NEXT MONTH

Rotterdam, Aug. 7.—Although it is unwise to place reliance on such rumors it is stated that the big offensive of the year has been planned by Hindenburg to take place next month. It has been suggested that in view of the growth of the American army, September is absolutely the limit of time to which Germany could delay the final attempt to force a decision.

WHEAT CUTTING COMMENCES

Regina, August 7.—The wheat is ripening fast and cutting has already commenced in the Maple Creek, Lemsford and Lancer districts of Saskatchewan.

A FORMER FRENCH MINISTER BANISHED

Louis J. Malvy Found Guilty of Holding Communication with The Enemy.

Paris, August 7.—The former French Minister of the Interior, Louis J. Malvy, was yesterday found guilty of holding communication with the enemy. He was sentenced to five years' banishment. He was previously acquitted on a charge of high treason.

Forester too Busy To Write Report.

The report of Chief Forester M. A. Grainger to Hon. T. D. Pattullo on the work of the Forest Branch of the Department of Lands which has just been received, is an exceedingly brief one.

"Owing to heavy enlistment among the staff and the pressure of current work (especially in connection with the speeding up of aeroplane spruce production) it has not been possible to furnish the usual literary comment upon the events of the past year.

Mr. Grainger is a very keen official and a hard worker and if it had been possible and necessary he would undoubtedly have found time to write the foreword.

Are Prince Rupert Merchants Progressive?

One of the common expressions heard both on the boats and also around the city is: "The merchants of Prince Rupert haven't any get-up to them. They don't get out after business.

These statements are interesting in that they are exactly the same things that are said about the merchants of Victoria. It is claimed there that they have allowed Vancouver to step in and take away practically all the business of the Island.

Naturally a big city has a great advantage over a small one, even if only a psychological advantage. People find it difficult to believe that they can get as good results from buying in a small place as in a large place from large places of business.

It is to be assumed that Prince Rupert can get as good a terminal freight rate as can Vancouver. If so with the increase in business it should be equally as advantageous to the people in the various camps to do business here, as to send away to other points.

Ideals of Liberty Justice and Right Living.

Has it ever occurred to the majority that those priceless things—ideals of liberty and justice and right living—can be neither bought nor sold? They are not heirlooms and no parent can hand them down ticketed and tied like government bonds or enclosed, like jewels, in a strong box.

These facts offer food for serious thought on the part of those who are responsible for Canada's future. Whatever ideals it is desirable for the citizens of tomorrow to possess must be instilled into the consciousness of the children of today.

Had this truth been recognized from any other than a largely theoretical stand point by the men and women of the preceding and the present generation it would not have been possible for the vicious theories promulgated by Frederick the Great (wrongly so called) to be working themselves out today in Prussian atrocities.

DR. LARGE SPEAKS AT ESSINGTON ON THE WAR PROBLEMS

He Reviews the Gallant Deeds of the Past and Expresses Determination to Fight to The End.

Port Essington, August 7.—The meeting to commemorate the fourth anniversary of the entry of this country into the war was held in Cunningham's Hall on Sunday with Rev. A. E. Price presiding. An inspiring address was given by Dr. R. W. Large, who reminded his hearers that many difficulties had been faced with courage and doubtless many others were ahead. They were met however to state that they would continue the war, even though it lasted for forty years, until world freedom and peace be established. "We think with gratitude and pride tonight of those who have given up all to fight for righteousness, truth and freedom," said the speaker. "Many of these have fallen. They gave their lives willingly and we honor them. We do not wish to call them back. The deeds of our gallant dead are written, penned with blood on the records of history."

Many interesting facts of the past four years of the war were touched upon, including the disappointment in Russia's failure to carry out her promises, and the great encouragement which the United States has brought to the Allies by throwing in her lot with us. "Her brave troops are now fighting side by side with our boys at the front and for this we must thank God."

The speaker closed his address by reminding the audience that the German Ambassador in London and Krupp of the great firm in Germany both said that not upon Britain but upon the German Emperor lies the blame for this war.

Rev. W. H. Pierce led in prayer; and vocal solos were rendered by Dr. Large, Mrs. V. Aldous and Mrs. McMillan. The collection amounted to \$37.

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PROCLAMATION

GEORGE THE FIFTH by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India—
To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern—Greeting.

A Proclamation of Conditional Amnesty respecting men belonging to Class 1, under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters, or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

WHEREAS, considerable numbers of men belonging to Class 1, under our Military Service Act, 1917, called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada under our proclamation of 13th October, 1917, although they have thus become by law soldiers enlisted in the Military Service of Canada,

of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave or have become deserters from our Expeditionary Force, provided they report for duty on or before the Twenty-fourth Day of August, 1918.

AND we do hereby strictly warn and solemnly impress upon all such men and as well those who employ, harbor, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that if they persist in their failure to report, absence or desertion till the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued and punished with all the rigour and severity of the law, subject to the judgment of our courts-martial which will be convened to try such cases, or other competent tribunals, and also that those who employ, harbor, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfeitures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.

Provided, however, that nothing contained in this our proclamation is intended to release the men aforesaid from their obligation to report for duty as soon as possible or to grant them immunity from arrest or detention in the meantime for the purpose of compelling them to perform their military duty, our intention being merely to force or remit the penalties heretofore incurred for failure to report, absence without leave or desertion incurred by those men of the description aforesaid who shall be in the proper discharge of their military duties on or before the said Twenty-fourth Day of August, 1918.

Of all of which our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

In testimony whereof we have caused these our letters to be made patent and the great seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed.

WITNESS—Our right trusty and entirely beloved cousin and counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquis of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwick, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter, one of our Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and St. George, Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

G. T. P. ROAD IS BEING WIDENED TO PREVENT SLIDES IN WINTER

Several Steam Shovel Outfits at Work and More Coming; Widening Cuts.

The rattle and grumble of the steam shovel is again being heard in the Hazelton district along the line of the G. T. P. and the fussy dump trains are to be seen carrying away load after load of gumbo to safer places. The cuts, which are many, through the banks of gumbo are being widened, to remove the danger of the track being blocked next spring, when the thaw comes. One steam shovel outfit has been at work near Hazelton for several weeks past, and others will be started up within the next few days. Sims, Carey & Kerbaugh is the firm carrying out the work.

Further east, on both sides of Prince George, another contracting firm have their shovels going, and are also putting on more of the same class of work. These outfits will work continuously until the freezeup, and after that if possible.

Gumbo is the deadly enemy of railroad operating in this district. When the spring thaw comes, and the ice filling the fissures caused by the summer's sun melts, great masses break away from the sides of the cuts, and block the track. It is difficult stuff to work in wet weather and has been responsible for many tie-ups in former years. By widening the cuts more and removing the steepness of their sides, it is hoped to obviate such difficulties during the coming winter.

NEW YORK SWELTERS IN EXTREME HEAT

New York, August 6.—This city sweltered in the heat yesterday. A temperature of 90.7 degrees was registered at 5 p. m. At 10 p. m. the mercury registered 85 degrees, as hot as it was in mid-afternoon. This is the hottest August since 1899. New York's highest record is 91.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made.

These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the allotment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

MANY WHALES BEING CAUGHT ALONG COAST

Total of 264 Taken This Season To Date—Naden Harbor Station Lowest With Fifty Great Mammals.

ONE RIGHT WHALE INCLUDED IN BAG

With the season only about half over the whaling operations off the west coast of Vancouver and the Queen Charlotte Islands have been particularly satisfactory to date.

When the whaling tender Gray, Capt. Billington, which arrived in Vancouver from a trip to the stations, left Kyuquot a total catch of 264 whales had been reported. The Kyuquot station has the largest haul with 150 mammals, the Rose Harbor station coming next with sixty-four, and at Naden Harbor, fifty had been taken.

Officers of the Gray report that the whales have been running well, especially off Kyuquot, and unless the operations are handicapped by bad weather during the next few months the indications are that the present season's catch will be a record one.

Three months will elapse before the steam whalers abandon the hunt, and it is considered in whaling circles that the aggregate for the three stations now operating may be doubled before the season is brought to a close.

One right whale has been taken this season, the honor of securing this valuable mammal going to the Rose Harbor station. This species is particularly scarce in these waters, and the capture of one is quite an event. A shipment of gill bone from the Rose Harbor right whale has been delivered in Vancouver by the steamer Gray.

On this voyage the Gray brought down 180 drums of whale oil and a consignment of canned whale meat, amounting to 4,500 cases.

Cannery at Capacity.

The whale-meat cannery at Kyuquot has been running at its capacity ever since it was opened at the commencement of the season, and regular shipments of the new table delicacy are being delivered.

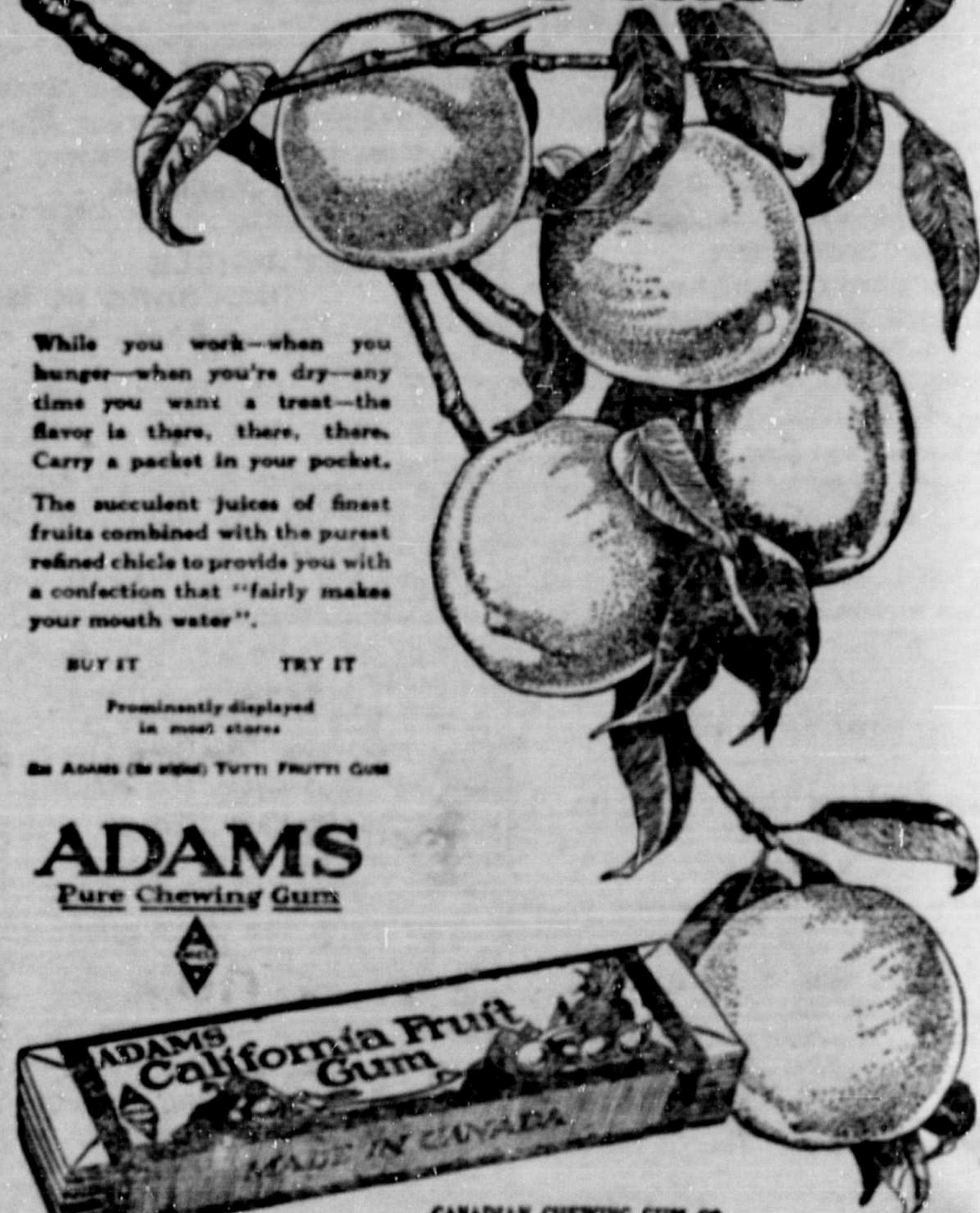
