## TWO MILLION AMERICAN TROOPS TO BE OUTFITTED BY BRITISH MERCHANTS

People who visit Prince Rupert from the South are all very pleased to find fresh strawberries being served here. These berries are long a thing of the past in the cities even of southern British Columbia. The raspberry crop on Southern Vancouver Island is all \* picked and almost forgotten, whereas the crop here is just beginning to ripen. This is an advantage to tourists and others who like out of season fruits. The strawberries that are picked in this neighborhood are not as big as those grown to the south, but they are very |\* luscious and equally as good to eat as any found in any part of the world.

#### Forester too Busy To Write Report.

#### Are Prince Rupert Merchants Progressive?

One of the common expressions heard both on the boats and also around the city is: "The merchants of Prince Rupert havn't any get-up to them. They don't get out after business. They just wait for business to come while the Vancouver travellers come in under their noses and take it away." The charge is also made that the prices here are so much higher than they are in Vancouver that it pays to make a trip south to do the buying.

These statements are interesting in that they are exactly the same things that are said about the merchants of Victoria. It is claimed there that they have allowed Vancouver to step in and take away practically all the business of the Island. 

DR. LARGE SPEAKS presented with her diploma, and AT ESSINGTON ON pursuing her profession. THE WAR PROBLEMS

He Reviews the Gallant Deeds of The Past and Expresses Determination to Fight to The End.

Port Essington, August 7 .-- ] The meeting to commemorate the fourth anniversary of the entry of this country into the war was held in Cunningham's Hall on Sunday with Rev. A. E. Price presiding. An inspiring address was given by Dr. R. W. Large, who reminded his hearers that many difficulties had been faced with courage and doubtless many others were ahead. They were met however to state that they would continue the war, even though it lasted for forty years, until world freedom and peace be established.

"We think with gratitude and pride tonight of those who have given up all to fight for righteousness, truth and freedom," said the speaker. "Many of these have fallen. They gave their lives willingly and we honor them. We do not wish to call them back. The deeds of our gallant dead are written, penned with blood on the records of history."

Many interesting facts of the past four years of the war were touched upon, including the disappointment in Russia's failure to carry out her promises, and the great encouragement which the United States has brought to the Allies by throwing in her lot with us. "Her brave troops are now fighting side by side with our boys at the front and for this we must thank God."

The speaker, closed his address by reminding the audience that the German Ambassador in London and Krupp of the great firm in Germany both said that not upon Britain but upon the German Emperor lies the blame for this war.

Rev. W. H. Pierce led in prayer; and vocal solos were rendered by Dr. Large, Mrs. V. Aldous and Mrs. McMillan. The collection amounted to \$37.

## PROCLAMATION

GEORGE THE FIFTH by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India-

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern-Greeting.

A Proclamation of Conditional Amnesty respecting men belonging to Class 1, under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters, or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

Deputy Minister of Justice Canada

WHEREAS, considerable numbers of men belonging to Class 1, under our Military Service Act, 1917, called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada under our proclamation of 13th October, 1917, although they have thus become by law soldiers enlisted in the Military Service of Canada,

Have failed to report for duty as lawfully required of them under the said Military Service Act and the regulations thereunder, including new Order in Council duly passed on April 20 last, or have deserted, or absented themselves without leave from our Canadian Expeditionary Force.

AND it is represented that the very serious and unfortunate situation in which these men find themselves is due in many cases - the fact that notwithstanding the information and warning contained in our proclamation aforesaid they have misunderstood their duty or obligation or have been misled by the advice of ill-disposed, disloyal or seditious persons; and,

WHEREAS, we desire if possible to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their bounden duty and as is necessary for the defence of our Dominion of Canada.

Now know ye, that we in the exercise of our powers and of our good will and pleasure in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare and cause to be published and made known that the penalties of the law will not be imposed or exacted as against the men who belong to Class 1 under our Military Service Act, 1917, and who have disobeyed our proclamation aforesaid or who have received notice from any of our registrars or deputy registrars to report for duty on a day now past and have failed so to report, or who having reported and obtained leave

of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave or have become deserters from our Expeditionary Force, provided they report for duty on or before the Twentyfourth Day of August, 1918.

And we do hereby strictly warn and solemnly impress upon all such men and as well those who employ, harbor, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that if they persist in their failure to report, absence or desertion till the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued and punished with all the rigour and severity of the law, subject to the judgment of our courts-martial which will be convened to try such cases, or other competent tribunals, and also that those who employ, harbor, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfeitures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.

Provided, however, that nothing contained in this our proclamation is intended to release the men aforesaid from their obligation to report for duty as soon as possible or to grant them immunity from arrest or detention in the meantime for the purpose of compelling them to perform their military duty, our intention being merely to force or remit the penalties heretofore incurred for failure to report, absence without leave or desertion incurred by those men of the description aforesaid who shall be in the proper discharge of their military duties on or before the said Twenty-fourth Day of August, 1918.

Of all of which our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

In testimony whereof we have caused these our betters to be made patent and the great seal of Canada

to be hereunto affixed. WITNESS-Our right trusty and entirely beloved cousin and counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquis of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwicke, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter, one of our Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and St. George, Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order, Governor-General and

Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada. At our Government House, in our City of Ottawa, this first day of August, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the ninth year of our reign.



With the season only about half over the whaling operations off the west coast of Vancouver and the Queen Charlotte Islands have been particularly satisfactory to date.

When the whaling tender Gray, Capt. Billington, which arrived in Vancouver from a trip to the stations, left Kyuquot a total catch of 264 whales had been reported. The Kyuquot station has the largest haul with 150 mammals, the Rose Harbor station coming next with sixty-four, and at Naden! Harbor, fifty had been taken.
