AMERICANS TAKE 8,000

DOUBLE ATTACK ON BOTH SIDES OF ST. MIHIEL SALIENT BY ALLIES

AMERICANS AND BRITISH ARE PUSHING AHEAD AND TAKING MANY PRISONERS

London, September 13.—The British forces have made further important progress towards Cambrai. Having captured the towns of Havrincourt, Trescault and Moeuvres they have penetrated into the old British defense line at several places and crossed the Canal du Nord to the north of Havrincourt. Approximately 1,000 Germans were made prisoners in the operations.

Washington, September 13.—American troops operating in the St. Mihiel Sector have made considerable gains. Already 8,000 prisoners have been counted and the movement is still in progress.

The country over which the Americans are fighting is very difficult. High ridges and thick woods offer every concealment for enemy machine guns. In addition the Germans have fortified the line of resistance which has everything in its favor.

INDIANS FISHING BUT NOT ILLEGALLY, DECIDES THE COURT

Were Simply Taking Fish From Net Alleged to Have Been Set by Japanese.

Yesterday before Stipendiary Magistrate McMullin in the Court House here, three Indians were charged with illegal fishing. They had been brought to town last week by the fisheries cruiser, Thomas Crosby from Alpha Bay on Pitt Island along with their catch, consisting of some three hundred fish.

The three Indians whose names are Solomon Brown, Henry Brown and William Ridley, of Kitkatla, pleaded not guilty to the charge laid. It was alleged that they were caught fishing a quarter of a mile up the creek, across which was a net. The Indians admitted they were taking the fish from the net, but said that the net was not theirs, nor was it placed there by them. They did not want to see the fish go to waste, hence they were taking them out. They declared that the net had been put there by a Jap. The creek was only thirty feet wide, and required only that amount of net to block it. The Indians were therefore taking the fish illegally caught by the Jap, who for obvious reasons, had failed to materialize.

The Department of Fisheries failed to prove to the satisfaction of the court that these Indians had blocked the creek by placing the net across it, and the magistrate dismissed the case against them. The fish, however, had been sold, and the proceeds, along with the fragment of net, was confiscated.

HARKLEY ARRIVED ON PRINCE GEORGE TO AWAIT TRIAL

Last evening Constable Shiels, of Anyox, arrived in town by the Prince George, having in charge Johnstone S. Harkley, who is committed for trial charged with shooting Frank Martin, the road superintendent at Swamp Point, near Stewart.

The trial will not take place until the Assize Court sits, the date for which has not yet been fixed. Meantime, the accused is held in the city jail.

The funeral of the dead man will take place at Anyox, where his widow resides.

BARRAGE PRECEDED ATTACK ON SALIENT AT ST. MIHIEL

TWELVE MILES ON SOUTH AND EIGHT ON NORTH SIDES OF SALIENT WERE ATTACKED BY FRENCH AND AMERICAN FORCES

London, September 13.—An attack was launched against the German positions on both sides of the St. Mihiel salient by the French and American forces this morning. The attack was preceded by a barrage lasting four hours. The attack on the southern side of the salient was made along a distance of twelve miles. The attack on the western side was on a front of eight miles.

Paris, September 13.—Only raiding operations and artillery activity was reported today outside of the attack at St. Mihiel.

A supreme line of defence to be called the Parsifal line is being constructed by the Germans from Antwerp to Metz. The Germans are putting the Antwerp forts in a defensive condition.

FOOD VIOLATIONS ARE SEVERELY PUNISHED

Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—Six of the leading cafes of the city have been closed for seven days for violation of the food regulations. So far there have been few prosecutions under the act in Canada as there has been a general desire among keepers of restaurants to carry out the provisions to the full. In many cases it has meant increased profits for the caterers to curtail on supplies, as in only a few instances have the prices of meals been reduced to correspond with the quantities served.

PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE IS ILL

Manchester, Sept. 13.—It is officially announced that Premier Lloyd George is suffering from a chill. He has high temperature and may be prevented from fulfilling his engagements in his present tour of Lancashire.

News of the illness of the premier is received everywhere with a good deal of trepidation as he is the one man in the country who is able to hold the various factions together and thus present a united front to the enemy.

PROHIBITION ORDER

Washington, Sept. 13.—President Wilson yesterday signed the joint resolution passed by Congress empowering him to establish a prohibition zone around shipyards, munition factories and other war industries.

THIRTEEN MILLION AMERICANS REGISTER AND READY TO FIGHT

Washington, Sept. 13.—Americans turned out thirteen millions strong yesterday, listing itself for war. Men between the ages of 18 and 45 not already registered were in lines all over the land. In many cases father and son both presented themselves. The occasion was the extension of the national registration to include all men up to the age of 45.

BRUTAL METHODS

Amsterdam, Sept. 13.—About 25 British prisoners are confined much like birds in a cage with scarcely room to move about, near the flying sheds at Everex, a suburb of Brussels, for the purpose of protecting the hangars against attack.

WORST IS OVER

Manchester, Sept. 13.—"The worst is over," Lloyd George declared yesterday on receipt of the freedom of the city. "Only heart failure can stop us from achieving victory."

DEBS IS GUILTY OF ESPIONAGE

Cleveland, Sept. 13.—Eugene V. Debs, Socialist leader in the United States and several times candidate for the presidency on the Socialist ticket, has been found guilty of violating the Espionage Act. The jury was out for five and a half hours.

Under the law recently passed Debs faces a twenty year prison term and a fine of \$10,000.

AMERICAN TROOPS LAND AT ARCHANGEL

Washington, Sept. 13.—American troops have been landed at Archangel in order to reinforce the United States sailors and Allied marines which are already in that region. In view of the strong forces there now it was held here today that a proposed Bolshevik thrust in the north will be futile.

HIGH PRICES PREVENT BUILDING IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Sept. 12.—In spite of an undoubted demand for houses in Montreal, prospects for greater building activity are by no means hopeful. Since the war began few houses have been built, and Montreal's population has increased steadily. It would appear that this situation should lead to some enterprise on the part of builders or investors in new house properties to make realty holdings earn but any activity of this kind is negligible.

Everywhere there is the plea of too high prices, labor and material, and more lately contractors or owners of real estate, who otherwise would have been drawn into the erection of large apartments, declare that there is too much uncertainty about the supply of material, more particularly steel. This is available for what are termed the "essential industries," but housing has not yet been honored with that saving description. One or two fairly large buildings in the city of a public nature have been held up for months, one at three different stages, by the delay in the delivery of steel.

PROFITABLE BALL

Boston, Sept. 13.—Members of the Boston American ball team received over a thousand dollars each as their share of the proceeds of the World Series games.

VORWAERTS PROTESTS ELECTORAL REFORM COMEDY IN AUSTRIA

Amsterdam, Sept. 13.—The protest of the German Socialist party against the Prussian electoral reform comedy and the demand for the dissolution of the Prussian House of Lords is published by the Berlin Socialist newspaper Vorwaerts in display type on its front page.

German Socialists are becoming bolder every day and their influence is spreading throughout the country.

SALZMANN HINTS AT FURTHER RETREATS

Captain von Salzmann, German military critic, has written a significant article in which he says he anticipates soon a heavy British attack on Cambrai. He goes on to state that the German lines before Cambrai cannot be regarded as the final lines of resistance. He depreciates the importance of the St. Quentin canal and declares that the main defence lines lie further east.

PEACE PROPOSALS ARE COMING FROM GERMANY

Washington, Sept. 13.—It is believed in official circles that Germany is paving the way for an armistice with the hope that it may lead to peace during the coming winter. The speeches and actions of Germans in high places seem to indicate the possibility of such a move.

ELECT OFFICERS

Belleville, Ont., Sept. 13.—Jas. Morris of Toronto has been elected Grand Marshal of the Sovereign Grand Priory of Canada; Dr. W. H. Wright of Toronto is the registrar. Among the Pacific coast Grand Priors is Frank Wheeler of Vancouver, and representing the Kootenay district, A. C. Skunland of Cranbrook.

NOT POTASH

Regina, Sept. 13.—Analytical chemists state that the supposed potash discoveries on the prairies are nothing but sodium sulphite worth a few cents a pound. This sulphite contains merely a slight trace of potash.

KAISER TRIED TO SHORTEN THE WAR BY CRUSHING THE ALLIES, HE SAYS

Amsterdam, September 13.—Emperor William of Germany speaking at the Krupp munition works at Essen recently, said: "One side cannot end the war without crushing the other. Everyone in the remotest corner of the Fatherland knows that I have left no stone unturned to shorten the war as far as possible for you people and for the entire civilized European world."

Saving is a National Service

To save is a patriotic duty. At the present time Canada needs money for war purposes as she never did before. The war cannot be won without it, and it is from the savings of the people that the needed money must come, there being no other source in sight.

Considered from the standpoint of self-interest people should save, for the very demand for money experienced today puts a premium on savings.

Saving on things that are not necessities releases money for war work, or what are considered the essential industries. The war can be won more quickly if people discontinue their old way of living. The average person can readily think of a number of ways in which his expenditure may be curtailed without hardship to himself; indeed with a reduced scale of spending he would be greatly benefited.

Save and thus render a distinct national service. In so doing you also serve yourself.

RECOLLECTIONS OF THE MAYOR OF LENS

M. Basly, Mayor of Lens, who was lately freed by the Germans, publishes his recollections in the Petit Parisien. He gives an amazing account of the sacking of the town by German officers and men. The officers usually showed the way. They and their men broke into every sort of shop, chiefly clothiers', tore out boots, underclothing, shirts, suits, those what they wanted, then wantonly destroyed all the remaining stock, throwing it into the gutter. Jewellers' shops, tobacco shops, and glassware shops were thus broken open and sacked. M. Basly himself saw a German officer seize a crowbar from a workman passing by and force open a grocer's shop. The officer and his men then broke open with hammers tins of preserved meat, etc. They threw away everything except the meat, which they devoured, while vegetables, fruit, etc., were thrown away in the gutter. In a house where an old lady had just died, and where, according to French law, seals had been put on the furniture, a German officer broke the seals with his sword and rifled every wardrobe. In M. Basly's own house one night ten German officers burst in and between nine and midnight drank fourteen bottles of champagne, twelve of claret and eight of Burgundy. In every case of looting M. Basly lodged a formal complaint with the German commanding officer, but in no case ever received a reply.

**Mr. Carvell's

Members of the Union Government have not been very keen on meeting the people so far and if Mr. Carvell consents to speak here he will certainly get a good hearing. Mr. Carvell was one of those new members of the Government on whom the people rested their hopes at the time of the last election, and it will indeed be interesting to hear him give an account of the work of the Government and possibly explain some of the things which the people do not understand.

There is a feeling among a great many that the Dominion Government has not made good. They certainly have not given general satisfaction, but perhaps Mr. Carvell can set us all right. We shall welcome the opportunity of hearing him, if he comes, for he is said to be a very able speaker and in the past has been looked upon as one of the coming statesmen of Canada.

**Letters to Editor
Must be Signed.**

A letter was received yesterday from someone who signs the word "Citizen," but fails to add the name and address. The letter is a criticism of the newly registered Marathon Club and if published would possibly involve both ourselves and the writer in a libel suit.

The News knows nothing about the Marathon Club except that it is a local institution, but the account of its multitudinous possibilities as published in the British Columbia Gazette we thought would be of interest to Prince Rupert people. That is why it was used.

All sorts of reports about the conduct of some of the clubs in Prince Rupert have come to The News but none of them appear to be authenticated. If they are a menace to the city they should be suppressed by the police, but The News is taking no chances of publishing libellous things about them unless it is sure of its ground.

People wishing to get into print in this publication must in the first place sign their names and give their addresses, which names and addresses will be verified before the communications are used. It is not necessary that the names of correspondents be published, but as a guarantee of good faith it is necessary to know from whom the letters come.

Added to that, writers must be careful not to make statements about people or institutions unless they are prepared to go into the witness box of a court of law and back up their statements. Hearsay evidence is of no value. It must be direct evidence. They must have seen, not heard, about the things of which they speak.

It must be remembered that a newspaper has no license to attack people or institutions. It has no privileges except those which all possess. There are regular constituted authorities which deal with transgressors against the law and a letter to these drawing attention to irregularities would very likely be effective, but the police would take no more notice of an unsigned document than would a newspaper.

**Gasoline Shortage
Danger to Country.**

The news dispatches yesterday recounted the fact that there is a gasoline shortage and that for the year it will probably amount to a million barrels. Unless there is a definite attempt to save gasoline voluntarily it is quite probable that users will be put on rations by the Government. The supply for the tanks and transport wagons at the front must be kept up, whether cars here operate or not. That will be the first consideration and following it will be the necessary legitimate uses of the fluid. Joy riding as a pastime will have to be eliminated altogether, if not voluntarily, then by compulsion. That is the verdict of those in authority. In view of this owners of cars throughout the country are taking walks instead of going joy riding on Sundays and other holiday occasions. As has been said before there cannot be much gasoline saved here in Prince Rupert, but every little counts and doubtless the local people will fall in line with the rest of the country and curtail the output.

**RED CROSS STOCKS
BECOMING DEPLETED;
APPEAL FOR MORE**

A cable from England has just been received at headquarters, in Toronto, saying that although the Red Cross Society has been able so far to supply the demands made upon it, further tremendous drains as a result of the recent great battle are causing stocks to become depleted and the necessity for greater work is urged to keep up a sufficient supply to take care of the wounded. In Prince Rupert either food or money may be left at the Red Cross hut on Third Avenue any Friday and by doing so all can "do their bit."

CANADA'S CROP LIKELY TOTAL \$1,000,000,000

Ontario Makes Record in Food Production and Maritime Province and Quebec Do Well.

Totalling the crops of Canada from the census returns and from reliable estimates in the provinces, including Miss Cora Hind's reports, it is found that the whole field crops of Canada this year will likely total \$1,000,000,000 in value. Considering the heavy drought and frost damage to the grain crops of Western Canada in August where the wheat totals have been reduced by nearly 100,000,000 over 1917 returns, this is an amazing fine record.

Ontario carries a great crop in all departments, so does Quebec and the Maritimes, where advices state that the oats are record crops in many places. On the whole Eastern Canada surpasses in wealth her wonderful field crop returns of 1917.

Field Crops.

Field crops of Canada last year figured out by the Census Bureau at \$1,444,636,000 in value. The loss to the Western crops shows how strong the whole country is by reason of its mixed farming and livestock operations. Had the prairies held even an average wheat crop year the returns would readily have beaten any previous year. But the splendid crops in Eastern Canada have held up the totals to nearly last year's totals. Threshing returns are showing heavy weighing grain and big yields in Ontario. The Ontario government report for the week is optimistic in all lines, with comparatively little demand for labor. The good weather has assisted farmers to take care of their crops. In very few places in Canada will there be any shortage in money this year.

No Frost Damage.

Although the first week of September opened up with much cooler weather in Eastern Canada, no frost damage to buckwheat, tomato and corn crops is reported from south and central Ontario, where the bulk of these crops are grown. Warmer weather is expected and the outlook now is for a good month of fall weather. Corn crops have developed wonderfully, far exceeding all early expectations. The supply of fodder for stock and dairy feeding this winter is good. There is a fairly large acreage of buckwheat in Ontario and Quebec which will be harvested this month.

FISHING RIGHTS FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS LATEST PROPOSAL

There is a proposal afoot to reserve certain fishing rights in the province for returned soldiers. The following report of the initiation of the movement is from the New Westminster Columbian of recent date:

"A proposal that certain fishing rights be reserved to returned soldiers under the superintendence of the Invalided Soldiers Commission was before the local Unionist executive yesterday for endorsement, but after being discussed action was postponed till next Tuesday when another meeting will be held in the office of W. J. Whiteside, K. C., president of the Unionist Association. At this meeting representatives of the Great War Veterans' Association will be asked to attend and also representatives from the Burrard Unionist Association which fathered the scheme.

"The proposal, according to Mr. Annandale, secretary of the G. W. V. A. in New Westminster, is to reserve exclusively to returned soldiers all fishing rights in regard to Vancouver Island waters from Cowichan bay to Haro Strait. The government is to put up the money to finance operations to start with, and thereafter profits will be devoted to buying additional boats and gear until a large fishing fleet is built up. The Vancouver members are understood to have endorsed the scheme and the local organization put it up to W. G. McQuarrie, M. P., who asked that a meeting of the executive be called to consider it."

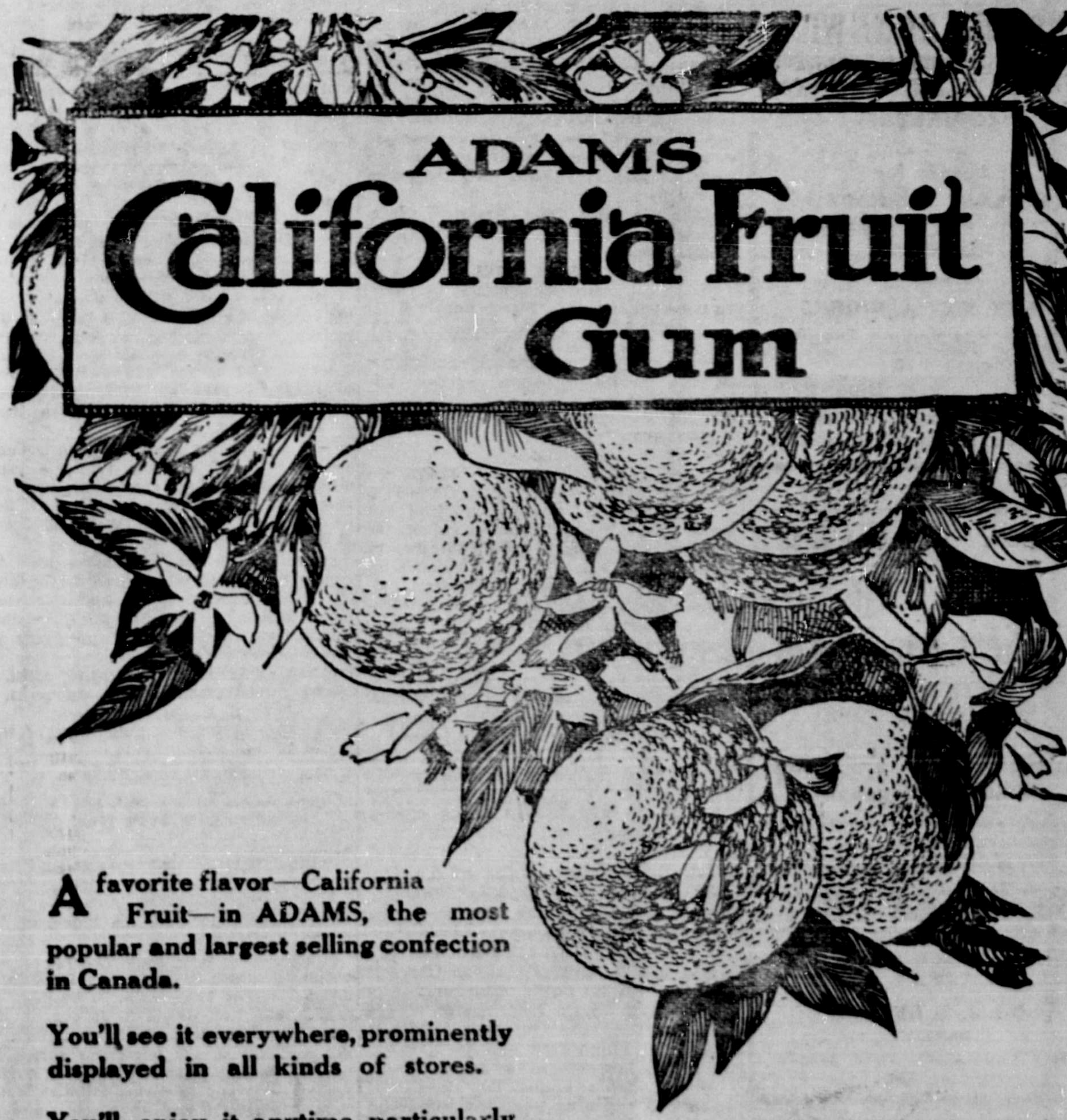

THE TRANSFIGURATION OF MESOPOTAMIA

Tremendous Changes Wrought in Bagdad Since the British Occupation Makes the Ancient Town Live.

Mr. Edmund Candler, the representative of the British press with the Expeditionary Force in Mesopotamia, describing the transformation which has been effected in the life of Bagdad, says:—"Things are alive. There are hotels—one excellent one—clubs, canteens, a morning paper, innumerable restaurants which outvie one another in their British names, employing a homely or patriotic nomenclature as a bait for the soldier—The Hyde Park Restaurant, The Union Jack, London, English, Empire, British, Prince of Wales, and Trocadero. There are cricket, football, or hockey matches every day. There is the soldiers' club next door to the open-air theatre, which has been built by the R. E., where touring parties with a sprinkling of professionals in most of them come in from various fronts to give entertainments."

The city is now a bustling hive of humanity, lighted by electricity with a police force and a fire brigade, schools, and all the characteristics of a well-administered city; and the municipality pays its way.

ARCHBISHOP FAVORS UNION OF CHURCHES

Toronto, Sept. 13.—The men will have nothing to do with any church which formulates religion in terms of division. These words were contained in a letter from a chaplain at the front and they gave the Most Reverend Archbishop Matheson, Primate of the Church of England in Canada, a text for a forceful appeal for church union at the opening address at the meeting of the General Synod of the Church now in session.

"What are we of the Church of England going to do about this?" he asked. "I plead that as a church do do something really tangible and practical." Among those present at the synod meeting are Bishop Du Vernet and Rev. Canon Rix of Prince Rupert.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only lands suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportional improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without affecting his occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 60 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

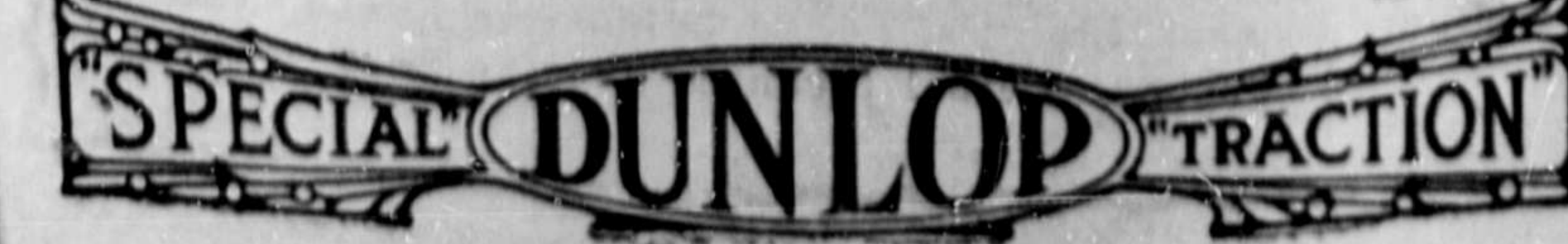

SEPARATE AMERICAN ARMY BEING FORMED AT THE BATTLEFRONT

U. S. Battalions Hitherto Brigaded With British and French Troops Join Pershing.

LARGE SHIPMENT OF AEROPLANES READY

Washington, Sept. 12.—American troops brigaded with the British and French forces, are being withdrawn as rapidly as possible to join the first American field army under General Pershing, General March said today in his weekly conference with members of the senate military committee.

The chief of staff threw no new light on the part Americans are playing in the present offensive, but the impression was given that the program of concentrating the army for action under General Pershing was going forward satisfactorily.

Shipments of De Haviland aeroplanes, which were temporarily held up on the order of Secretary of War Baker, so certain changes could be made in them, General March said, were resumed this week.

Reports received up to today by the war department show that 1,003 De Haviland aeroplanes had been completed and made ready to turn over to the government this week and 765 had been shipped or were already en route overseas.
