

# AMERICA'S PEACE TERMS

## ALLIES WILL PROBABLY SEND JOINT REFUSAL TO AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

### PRESIDENT WILSON'S REPLY TO AUSTRIA'S PROPOSAL FOR A PEACE CONFERENCE

LAYS DOWN CLEARLY TERMS ON WHICH WAR CAN END AT ANY TIME IF CENTRAL POWERS ARE READY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, Sept. 18.—President Wilson's reply to Austria's proposed peace conference calls attention to the President's previous utterances to the effect that before the Central Powers can have any peace they must accept the principles of, No secret treaties; freedom of the seas, except to suppress predatory nations that fail to respect international covenants; the removal of all trade barriers; reduction of armaments; adjustment of colonial claims with reference to the wishes of the governed population; the evacuation of

should be couched." All the London newspapers endorse Mr. Balmont's four's rejection of the German offer.

That the Allies will probably make a concerted reply, refusing the Austrian proposal along the lines of President Wilson's note, was learned from reliable sources here yesterday evening.

General Smuts, premier of South Africa, is expected to go to the United States soon to establish personal relations with President Wilson.

### BOLSHEVIKI PERFDY SHOWN

German Trickery was Successful in Preventing Spread of Doctrines and at Same Time Holding Leaders.

Washington, Sept. 18.—German trickery is breaking Ukraine away from the bought and paid for Bolsheviki Government, Plots against the loyal Russian soldiers and their leaders to insure the complete German sway after the false peace conference at Brest-Litovsk and further evidence of the precautions of the Teutons against Bolsheviki preachings in their own ranks, are shown in the latest instalment of secret service documents from Russia made public by the United States Government.

Communications written in January disclose that the Bolsheviki were fully informed of what the Germans were doing in Ukraine and knew that peace treaties with Ukraine and Roumania were coming. They also learned quickly enough that Germany was disposing of their hopes to see their revolutionary propaganda take root on German soil.

### SIXTY-SIX GERMAN AIRPLANES DOWN

London, Sept. 18.—Sixty-six German aeroplanes were accounted for by the British along their lines yesterday. Seven of the hostile machines were destroyed in one engagement by a British squadron.

### BULGARIAN DIVISIONS MAY BE RECALLED FROM THE WEST TO MEET SERB ONSLAUGHT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Sept. 18.—While the Serbs and French allies are wresting from the Bulgars some of the strongest positions they have held in Macedonia for the past two years, Marshal Foch's forces are nibbling successfully at the German lines on the western front in the face of more determined resistance.

The near East furnishes the most sensational news of the day, however. The offensive which has been launched there seems not only the most successful, but the most pretentious in many months. It appears probable that a further advance by Franco-Serbian troops will necessitate the recall of the Bulgarian divisions which have been loaned to Emperor William to bolster up the Teutonic resistance in France and Flanders.

An official Serbian report declares that the reconstituted army of the battered, but not beaten, little kingdom has taken not only 3,000 prisoners, but an important park of cannon. The Bulgars admit having retired but declare the attack has been checked to north of Gradeshnitsa. There is nothing to indicate, however, that the advance of the Serbs and French has been definitely held up. A lull in the fighting in the west is regarded by military critics as merely a prelude to further heavy blows at the foe by the British, American and French armies.

### CROWNING CEREMONY OPENS THE PERIOD OF FESTIVITY ACCOMPANYING FALL FAIR

MAYOR McClymont PLACES DIADEM ON HEAD OF QUEEN ELECT AS SHE KNEELS BEFORE THE THRONE SURROUNDED BY HER MAIDS OF HONOR

Amid the plaudits of an admiring throng the bejewelled diadem was gracefully placed on the head of Miss Margaret Westman and she was declared queen of the Carnival and reigning beauty of the three days of festivity by Mayor McClymont this afternoon in the Exhibition Building, where a throne had been erected for the purpose.

The queen who was beautifully gowned in white satin trimmed with ermine and with a robe of purple lined with gold, entered the hall at the appointed time from the rear door attended by her maids of honor.

### PRINCE RUPERT IS NOW COMING INTO HER OWN

H. Hulatt, Manager of G. T. P. Telegraph, Sees Great Future For City if All Work Together.

### URGES COLONIZATION ON A LARGE SCALE

H. Hulatt, manager of Telegraphs, Grand Trunk Railway System, Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, also manager and director of the Grand Trunk Pacific Telegraph Company, headquarters in Montreal, Que., is in the city, being the guest of Mr. and Mrs. H. McCall. Mr. Hulatt left Montreal early in August and has made a thorough trip of inspection of all Grand Trunk Pacific telegraph lines from Quebec west and anticipates he will remain in the west for several weeks, making his temporary headquarters at Edmonton.

In conversation, Mr. Hulatt stated he was much pleased with the evidence of good business plainly visible in Prince Rupert. He feels this city is at last coming into its own and that by the close co-operation of city and railroad the future will be bright. He had the pleasure recently of travelling from Prince Rupert to Edmonton with Lord Atholstan and party, and agrees thoroughly with the latter that prominent men of the east should travel more in the west and thus become thoroughly acquainted with western conditions and more particularly the wonderful possibilities of northern British Columbia.

### Similar Conditions.

Mr. Hulatt informed the Daily News representative that development along the Transcontinental Railway east of Winnipeg to Quebec was really astonishing; large acreage is being rapidly cleared and settled, and a similar condition will undoubtedly prevail along the Grand Trunk Pacific in Northern British Columbia where there are large tracts of splendid agricultural land, blessed with a much more congenial climate, awaiting development. This development can only be brought about by publicity, encouragement of migration to Northern B. C. and some systematic and scientific system of land settlement. This is the work not only of the railroad but also of the Province, cities and municipalities—if all "get on the rope" and pull together. "Having the goods," success only can result.

Good assortment of pipes at Gill's.

Miss Margaret Allan and Miss Florrie Jones, of Anyox, beautifully attired preceded the queen, the former carrying the crown and sceptre on a white satin sashion with gold tassels, and the latter the purple cushion on which the queen was to kneel. The trains were borne by little Laura Frizzell and Katherine Harvey dressed in white and following them were the other maids of honor, Miss Isabel Kelly and Miss Grace Shackley.

It was a galaxy of grace and beauty splendidly gowned, such as is seldom seen, and all carried out their parts with becoming dignity. The girls who preceded the queen wore pink georgette crepe with Gainsborough hats and those following were gowned in blue of the same material. The spectacle was one to be remembered.

### Band Played.

The procession entered to the music of a patriotic air, played by the Kinkolith Indian band and was met at the throne by Mayor McClymont who was surrounded by several hundred pupils of the city schools who joined in singing "O Canada."

A brief address of welcome to the queen was made by the mayor and then the diadem was placed on her head as she knelt in front of the throne. When she was seated the maids of honor were introduced by the Mayor and each was presented with the prize she had won in the contest.

### Cushions to Be Raffle.

A further interesting ceremony was the presentation of the cushions; the white one to the Red Cross, which was received on its behalf by Miss Rorvik in Red Cross costume, and the other to the Ladies Auxiliary to the G. W. V. A., it being received by Miss Kenny.

The national anthem closed the proceedings except for the cheers for the queen which were led by Mayor McClymont, who, in orthodox fashion, shouted: "Hail to the Queen!"

The exhibition is but a small part of the entertainment. The games and sports and the meeting of neighbors and old friends is three parts of the fun.

**Must Get Ready  
To Pay Our Way.**

While everyone is happy and everyone is having a riotous time it must not be forgotten that the fighting goes on as usual in France and Flanders. It must not be forgotten that cash is required to keep up the campaign and that within a very short time a Victory Loan campaign will be on and everyone will be asked to do his or her bit to keep things going until the Hun is beaten so badly that he will not again dare to raise his head, at least in our time.

The News would not in any way interfere with the time of relaxation, but at the same time the serious things of life have to be remembered and war is the most serious of all things. While we dance and sing and frolic the boys fight and suffer and die. We for our part must pay and pay and pay. Let us bear this in mind and not go to excesses at a time when the money is needed so badly to carry on the war and bring it to a successful conclusion.

**Wonderful Exhibits  
Show Resources of District.**

While at the time of writing the exhibits at the fair are not all in place some of them are most surprising. From east and west, north and south come products which are an indication of what the district can grow. Some of these are of such a degree of excellence that they are a great surprise to those who have never lived here and who have not yet been able to grasp the possibilities of the place.

This exhibition idea is a wonderful educator, not only to strangers but also to the residents, many of whom live in somewhat narrowed circles and are not aware what is going on around them. That is one of the complaints of the residents of the outside districts. People become concentrated and narrow in their outlook, but an exhibit of this kind tends to broaden their vision.

**The Now Drive  
Against Bulgaria.**

Nobody seems to have thought of Serbia as a factor in the war of late. So many of the brave men of the little kingdom were killed by the Huns and so complete was their demoralization at the time when all the force of the enemy was thrown against them, that it is a wonder they have been able to come back. They seem to have done so, however, with some purpose, as was recounted in the dispatches of yesterday. The Greeks too have rallied to the cause and the result of the long period of recuperation and training has been the complete overthrow of the Bulgars at the first onslaught. With a steady advance from the Macedonian front, with the Russians giving trouble on the east, with the Italians firm, and with the Allies driving forward on the west, the Huns are in a bad way and it is little wonder that they are howling for peace. But they do not want it badly enough yet. "Fight on," must be the cry until they are ready to throw up their hands, throw over the Hohenzollerns, and form themselves into a peaceable republic which will be freed from all the dangers of militarism.

**More Accommodation  
Needed for Visitors.**

There is still more need of accommodation for visitors to the fair. It is commonly reported that a number of people have rooms but refuse to allow them to be used by visitors. To take that position is hardly being loyal to the city. There is a great need just now and everyone should do his little bit to try to help out. The managers of the fair have done everything possible to induce visitors to come, and now it is the clear duty of all citizens to back them up and provide, so far as possible, for the needs of those who are here.

## RICH MINES ON WEST COAST OF GRAHAM ISLAND

Great Possibilities of Uninhabited Country—Possibility That Oil May Be Found There.

The most inhospitable country on the face of the earth is situated between Parry Passage and Rennell Sound on the West Coast of Graham Island, the largest island of the Queen Charlotte group. The Pacific Ocean, with a clean sweep of 3,500 miles, washes the rocky shore line along which can be seen caves and pyramids worn out by the constant lashing of the sea. Tidal waves have swept high on the rocks; in some places water-worn logs are seen fifty feet above high water mark.

Frederick Island is the largest of the islands between Parry Passage and Rennell Sound. It is covered with a growth of timber.

Almost opposite on the Graham Island shore is West, or Haines river. While further south an oil drill is located at Tian Point. A company invested \$25,000 in boring for petroleum at this point. After boring for three years, to a depth of 1,800 feet, the property was abandoned. To the uninitiated the prospects of obtaining oil in large quantities is evident. Tar exudes from the rocks in the neighborhood. Oil shale lines the shores in abundance. The geological maps of Graham Island show that "from Frederick Island to Otard Cove is an oil territory, the tarry matter occurring in the basalt rock." The whole country appears to have passed through volcanic eruptions, in which it is possible that the oil fields were burned out. At the same time the presence of "tar" and "oily shale" should prove the existence of beds of petroleum somewhere in the neighborhood. The company did not remove the "plant" which might be used in some other locality. It was unfortunate that no other parties took up the work when the one company abandoned the small territory on which they worked.

### Fishing Rights.

The New England Fish Company have the sole right to fish along the shores of Graham Island on the west coast. They have a plant at Rennell's Sound. It is doubtful whether salmon run in large numbers into the rivers and bays of the west coast. Vessels from the United States fish for halibut outside the three mile limit. Herring is plentiful at certain seasons of the year.

From Seal Inlet, further south, a trail runs to the head of Masset Inlet over a mountainous country. Few people brave the climate of the west coast of Graham Island and no permanent resident can be found over seventy miles along the shore line, or in the interior.

The timber is of little use and it is almost impossible to bring out rafts or scow loads of lumber on account of the constant swells from the ocean.

### Birds Nest There.

Millions of wild birds make their nests on the small islands off Tian Point. During the summer months a few daring navigators take chances on the weather and visit the bays and islands in search of eggs of sea gulls and other birds. Now and then an Indian trapper will winter near West river, isolated from the rest of the world. From September until May storms spring up, often without warning, bringing disaster to any craft unprepared to meet mountainous waves.

Continuing south, passing Rennell Sound, Kano Inlet and Dawson Harbor, the trolling grounds of the fishermen is reached near Marble island. Hundreds of Whites and Indians make a good living during the spring trolling in gasoline launches for king salmon. The fishermen have permanent homes at Skidegate. About the month of September the coho salmon are caught with lines and hooks.

### May Be Bridged.

Skidegate Channel is the dividing water between Graham and Moresby Islands, the two largest of the Queen Charlotte group. Should future conditions warrant a bridge may be thrown across this channel between the two large islands linking them together, but this important connecting link will not be taken in hand until the islands become settled.

### Valuable Mineral.

There is every possibility of the opening of numerous gold,

silver and copper mines on the west coast of Graham and Moresby Islands. Prospectors have discovered valuable deposits of minerals at Gold Harbor, Lockport, Jedway, Tasso and other localities. In one locality, at Gold Harbor, over \$50,000 has been taken from a small vein which is still considered a working mine. Large magnetic iron deposits have been found, while copper deposits are engaging the attention of prospectors and speculators. With a plentiful supply of timber, fish and minerals, the Queen Charlotte Islands are attracting attention and add to the wealth of the province, besides increasing in population.

# NOTICE!

## To United States Citizens in Canada

By the United States Military Service Convention Regulations, approved by the Governor-in-Council on 20th August, 1918, Male Citizens of the United States in Canada, within the ages for the time being specified by the Laws of the United States prescribing compulsory military service, except those who have diplomatic exemption, are made subject and liable to Military Service in Canada, and become entitled to exemption or discharge therefrom, under the Canadian Laws and Regulations. The regulations governing this liability are published in the Canada Gazette (Extra) of 21st Aug., 1918; copy whereof may be obtained upon application through the post to the Director of the Military Service Branch of the Department of Justice at Ottawa.

United States Citizens of the description aforesaid who were in Canada on 30th July, 1918, have sixty days from that date within which to exercise an option to enlist or enroll in the forces of the United States, or to return to the United States; and those who for any reason subsequently become liable to Military Service in Canada have thirty days from the date of the accruing of such liability within which to exercise the like option. It is stipulated by the Convention also that certificates of diplomatic exemption may be granted within the optional periods aforesaid. Every citizen of the United States to whom the regulations apply is required to report to the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, for the province or district within which he is, in the manner by the regulations prescribed, within ten days after the expiry of his optional period, and will be subject to penalties if without reasonable excuse he fail so to report. For the information of those whom it may concern, Sections 3 and 4 defining the requirements of registration, with which it will be necessary strictly to comply, are set out substantially as follows:

### REQUIREMENTS

1. Every male citizen of the United States within the ages for the time being specified in the laws of the United States prescribing compulsory military service, not including those who have diplomatic exemption, within ten days after the expiry of the time limited by the Convention within which the Government of the United States may issue him a certificate of diplomatic exemption, shall truly report to the Registrar by registered post, and in writing which is plainly legible, his name in full, his occupation and the date of his birth; stating also whether he is single, married or a widower; and if the latter, whether he has a child living, also if married, the date of his marriage; and stating, moreover his place of residence and usual post-office address in Canada; and, if he reside within a city or place where the streets and dwellings are named and numbered, the name and number of his street and dwellings; or if he reside in another place, the lot and concession number, section, township, range, and meridian, or other definite description whereby his place of residence may be located, having regard to the custom of the locality in which he lives; and if without reasonable excuse he neglect or fail to report in the manner and with the particulars aforesaid, within the time limited as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable upon summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars, and to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, and moreover, he shall incur a penalty of \$10.00 for each day after the time when or within which he should have registered during which he shall continue to be unregistered.

4. Every United States citizen who has diplomatic exemption, although not otherwise subject to these regulations, shall within ten days after the granting of the same truly report to the registrar, in like manner and with the same particulars as required by the last preceding section; and in addition he shall embody in his report a true and complete statement of the particulars of his certificate of diplomatic exemption. Neglect or failure without reasonable excuse to comply with the requirements of this section shall constitute an offence punishable in the manner and by the penalties provided in the last preceding section.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-forest land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes. Due to the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

It is not every day that there is a chance to see a champion.

When the boys are boxing at Vancouver, Tommy gives and takes and keeps himself as hard as nails. Just recently he got a splendid black eye from one of his pupils, but he does not care. Hit and hit back is his motto. That is the way to train men for the army.

### RESTRICTIONS ON THE SALE OF NEAR BEER

Last evening Dominion Constable Watkinson, acting under instructions received from the Indian Department at Ottawa, paid a visit to all the vendors of soft drinks in town and read them a sub-section from the Indian Act, regarding intoxicants.

It has reached the ears of the Department at Ottawa that two per cent and cider were permitted to be sold in British Columbia and oftentimes to Indians. Inasmuch as near beer and cider are intoxicants, this is not permissible, as according to the act, "intoxicants means and include all spirits, strong waters, spirituous liquors, wines, or fermented or compound liquors, or intoxicating drink of any kind whatsoever."

The necessary steps will be taken by the police department with regard to prosecutions of all offenders under this clause of the Indian Act.

## LIVELY TIME WHEN LABOR MEN DISAGREE

### Hostilities Threatened When the Trades and Labor Congress Discuss Asiatic Labor At Quebec.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Quebec, Sept. 18.—Hostilities which had been threatening the peace of the convention of the Trades and Labor Congress since it opened, broke out yesterday when the critics of officers came out into the open with a formal complaint which precipitated a disturbance. The Congress was discussing a motion condemning the introduction of Asiatic labor into the mines of Canada and an amendment by the resolutions committee changing a recommendation "That a general strike be called throughout the Dominion if more of such labor was brought in," to one authorizing the executive council "to take all means in its power to resist further coolie immigration." A faction in the Congress wanted the amendment defeated because of recent success in sympathetic strikes. The amended resolution was forced through after thirty minutes of uproar.

### TEACHERS MUST TAKE NORMAL SCHOOL COURSE

It was decided at the recent conference at Banff that teachers' certificates of the first and second classes will be valid in any of the four provinces. The Normal and academic training of thirty-three weeks being uniform in all provinces. An important change was made when it was decided that hereafter University graduates in British Columbia must attend a normal school before they are given their full professional standing.
