## SIXTY GUNS ARE TAKEN

### PRISONERS CAPTURED NEAR ST. QUENTIN NOW NUMBER 10,000

#### PRISONERS TAKEN NEAR ST. QUENTIN NOW EXCEED 10,000, MARSHAL HAIG SAYS

**FRENCH ARE CONTINUING THEIR ATTACKS SOUTHEAST  
OF ST. QUENTIN; TOWNS TAKEN BY SERBIANS  
AND FRENCH IN MACEDONIA;  
OTHER GAINS**

London, September 20.—The prisoners taken by the British in the operation begun Wednesday northwest of St. Quentin now exceed 10,000, according to Field Marshal Haig's report last night. More than sixty big guns have been taken during the action. Most of the fighting yesterday was around Gouzeaucourt and to the east of Epehey.

Paris, September 20.—The French are continuing their attacks on the southeast of St. Quentin and have reached the outskirts of Benay. In the Soissons sector numerous counter attacks west of the city were repulsed. The important town of Montescourt in the St. Quentin district is now entirely in the hands of the French who have also occupied Castrax further to the northeast.

London, Sept. 20.—Serbian and French troops have taken the towns of Topolets, Potshishta, Melynitsa, Vitolshta, and Rasimby. They have also taken the height at Kuchkov Kamen.

#### BABY SHOW HAS BEEN SET FOR WEDNESDAY

Chief Vickers, that competent judge of mankind, was in evidence, quite prepared to bear the name of disappointing nineteen of the parents.

Some one, however, had been negligent, as the rooms were not heated, and the chief would not take upon himself the responsibility of the little ones catching cold by being undressed in the chilly atmosphere. Chief Vickers therefore postponed his evil day until next Wednesday, and the time and place of this important event will be announced later.

#### BURNED TO DEATH IN MONTREAL FIRE

Montreal, Sept. 20.—One man was burned to death, four firemen injured and another fireman evercome by smoke in a fire that broke out in the premises of W. H. Dwyer Co., hay and grain merchants, Ottawa Street, this city, last night. The man burned to death was Wm. Howe. He was asleep in a shack adjoining the wall of the Dwyer building when fire broke out. The body was found undressed in bed.

#### BRIEF TELEGRAMS

The strike in the English cotton mills is now regarded as ended.

English newspapers welcome the appointment of John William Davis as American ambassador to Britain. They express the belief that he will continue the Anglo-American unity policy.

Trans-caucasia has been evacuated by the British who have withdrawn to north Persia. The evacuation has been made necessary by the lack of steadiness of the Armenian troops when they were attacked by Turks during August.

The Allies will issue a joint statement of their common war aims.

The Czarina of Russia and the three princesses and two of the grand duchesses met their death recently when their house, north of Ekaterinburg was burned by order of the local Soviet.

The advance of the Serbians and French on Wednesday was so rapid that it was impossible to count the prisoners and war material taken.

Ernie Unwin has arrived in town from Anyox to take in the Carnival.

#### RAILWAY STRIKE IN ENGLAND IS SETTLED

London, Sept. 20.—Announcement was made last night that a settlement had been reached between the striking railroad employees and their employers. The agreement provides for an increase of five shillings weekly for male and female workers over 18 years of age and two shilling and sixpence for those under 18. The Government also is to appoint a committee to inquire into the question of equal pay for men and women for equal work.

#### CHILDREN'S SPORTS WILL BE TOMORROW

Owing to the rain on Wednesday the children's sports which were part of the fair programme were postponed. It has now been arranged that they shall be pulled off tomorrow afternoon on the Athletic Grounds commencing at 3 o'clock. All the children of the city are invited to attend and take part.

#### SPEED BOAT RACES TO BE HELD TOMORROW

Owing to the unfortunate breakdown in the machinery of the Prince Rupert boat, the speed boat race will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock instead of today. The Rupert vessel is entered as A. T. No. 1, and will be in fine shape to put up a good showing.

Mr. Campbell, of the Granby Company, intimates if the Anyox ball team cares to stay over until after this race, he will hold the company's boat until after the event.

#### MURDER AND ROBBERY ARE COMMON IN PETROGRAD, SAY REFUGEES AT STOCKHOLM

**NO PUNISHMENT FOR CRIMINALS — ARMED GANGS BREAK  
INTO HOUSES — CZECHO-SLOVAKS ARE BEING  
HARD PRESSED IN EUROPEAN  
RUSSIA.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Stockholm, September 20.—Numerous refugees who have arrived from Moscow and Petrograd, having left Petrograd on September 13, say that the Russian Capital is entirely in the hands of Anarchists and that conditions are worse than ever before. There is no police protection or any other means to preserve order and persons are openly murdered in the streets, are being held up and robbed, and there is no risk of punishment for criminals. Armed gangs break into houses, stealing and murdering in their search for provisions, money and clothing. Several of the refugees have in this way lost all their property, even their clothes.

#### GERMANY HOPING FOR ARMISTICE

Amsterdam, Sept. 20.—Konstantin Fehrenbach, president of the German Reichstag, declared in a recent interview that it was impossible to hope for an armistice before winter "despite the enemy's bellicose shouting." The interview was printed in the Rhenish Westphalian Gazette, Essen.

#### GRANBY LOSES BALL GAMES YESTERDAY BY LARGE SCORES

Attendance Not Large Owing to Teams Not Being Evenly Matched — Fortin Pitches Well.

The baseball yesterday did not arouse the amount of enthusiasm that was expected, largely because the games were too one-sided. Bob Brown, the Vancouver ball magnate, managed the local boys and he brought two members of his team with him from Vancouver, and while they showed the locals some pointers in the matter of play, the games were not well balanced. Only a comparatively small number of spectators gathered to watch the evening match because everyone felt it was a foregone conclusion that the visitors would be beaten.

The morning game resulted in a score of 6 to 0 in favor of the home team and in the evening 13 to 2 was the tally.

Fortin, who pitched in the evening, did very effective work and the Granby twirler, De Hart, was also in good form, but the Granby fielding was rather loose and that gave the local men a chance to put on a number of runs which they should not have had.

The game this afternoon commences at 5:15 and it is understood that the Granby men have an idea that they can yet come back. The locals will have a new battery and some lively sport is looked for.

**Must Impress Ministers  
With Prince Rupert's Greatness.**

Several of the Federal Ministers are coming to British Columbia and in all probability will visit the land of spruce and fish, the centre of which is at Prince Rupert. In Vancouver and Victoria, great preparations are being made for their reception, all the public organizations co-operating with the Boards of Trade for the purpose of impressing them properly. In Prince Rupert something of the sort should be done. There should be no feeling of sectionalism nor should politics enter in any way into the matter. These men are ministers of the crown and they represent for the time being the whole people. They profess to have done away with patronage so there should be no reason for any person or group of persons trying to curry favor with them.

Prince Rupert should certainly arrange that at some public function the resources and needs of this district are laid before the ministers. We want to hear from them, but they should also hear from us. We should let them know that Prince Rupert is on the map as a live factor, and if they are the people who are holding up the shipbuilding here we should want to know the reason why.

The question of having Canadian productions shipped on Canadian railroads might well be considered also. While we have nothing against the American railroads we can quite understand what an outcry there would be if the production of the Tacoma Smelter were shipped to the east by the Grand Trunk Pacific line.

The Dominion Government can do a great deal to help develop this port. All port privileges come under their special regulation as do all fishing privileges. It is to the Dominion we have to look in almost all things pertaining to the development of this district and this will be an opportune time to consider them apart altogether from politics and lay them before the visitors. The occasion is opportune.

**Prussia Without  
Respectable Friend.**

We believe it was von Moltke who said: "Permanent peace is a dream, and not even a beautiful one. But war is an essential element of God's scheme of the world!" He is surely now awakening from a nightmare, in which "beer and sauer kraut" did not form a part of the military programme enacted before his sluggish brain.

Harden asked, in 1912: "Have we no friend in this wide world?" We answer, "not one, Max!" Austria and Turkey are your vassals, and Bulgaria was bought, with good, yellow gold.

Prussia owes her existence to cunning and deceit—to violence and conquest. Who stole the Eastern provinces from Poland? Who wrested Silesia from Austria? Who took Hanover from its legitimate rulers? Who took Schleswig-Holstein from Denmark. Where did Prussia get Alsace-Lorraine? Is it any wonder that Prussia is without one friend?

**Broken Pledges  
Of the Huns.**

Britain fought side by side with Germany to dispel the enemies of freedom. We handed over Heligoland, and what was made of that island? We met the rulers of Prussia at The Hague on October 18, 1907. Representatives of France and Belgium were present when the following rules, for the guidance of military authorities were laid down and solemnly agreed to by Germany:

Article 46. Family honor and right, the lives of individuals and private property as well as religious convictions and the observance of public worship are to be respected. Private property cannot be confiscated.

Article 47. Pillage is explicitly forbidden.

Article 50. No collective penalty, pecuniary or otherwise can be inflicted on populations as a punishment for individual actions for which they cannot be held responsible as a whole.

Article 55. The occupying power must consider itself only as the administrator and temporary recipient of the income arising from the public buildings and other public property of the occupied territory; it must safeguard the funds of these properties and administer them in accordance with the rules of usufruct.

Article 56. The property of Communes and of religious establishments dedicated to worship, charity, education and the arts and sciences will be treated as private property even when these institutions belong to the State. All seizure, destruction or wilful delapidation of such establishments, of historic buildings, of works of art or of science is forbidden and should be punished.

The preamble, adopted by the Powers and ratified at the Convention, states: "In cases which do not come under the regulations adopted by the Powers, populations are under the safeguard and governance of the principles of international law as manifested in the CUSTOMS ESTABLISHED BETWEEN CIVILIZED NATIONS, THE LAWS OF HUMANITY, AND THE DEMANDS OF PUBLIC CONSCIENCE."

The principle on which this Convention was based was that war should not be waged on non-combatants but should be waged between armies, and that everything should be done to spare the civil population.

What respect have the Germans shown for this international treaty? Go back down the ages; search history from the commencement of time, and where can be found anything to parallel the acts of vandalism and beastly ferocity shown in Belgium and France by the Huns?

## ATTENDANCE IS LARGE AT EXHIBITION THIS YEAR

ATTRACTIVE FEATURES ADDED SINCE OPENING DAY; LARGE CROWD EXPECTED TONIGHT FOR CLOSING; WINNERS OF PRIZES.

The attendance at the fair this year has been much larger than ever before and tonight it promises to be even greater than last night or the night before. It is the masquerade night and practically everyone will be there.

One of the late exhibits which had not arrived on the opening day is a fine collection of shells from Queen Charlotte Islands. They are shown by Mr. Harrison of Masset and have attracted a great deal of attention. They are worth a visit to the exhibition

to see. Not only are there large abalone shells but all sorts of the most picturesque varieties.

Mr. Harrison also shows a collection of grasses from the Queen Charlottes that are to be sent on to Victoria for exhibition in the Department of Agriculture.

There are a number of fine samples of vegetables, green fodder corn and other things from the Islands which indicate the fertility of the soil and the mildness of the climate.

There is a very interesting side show run by the Great War Veterans' Association. The interesting feature of this collection is a complete telephoning apparatus used by the Germans. This was recently presented to the city by Colonel Peck and through the courtesy of the mayor has been placed on exhibition. There are also all sorts of signalling apparatus, helmets, star and other shells and the famous little anti-tank shell which the Germans made in a vain attempt to stop attacks from the travelling forts which the British use.

## NOTICE!

### To United States Citizens in Canada

By the United States Military Service Convention Regulations, approved by the Governor-in-Council on 20th August, 1918, Male Citizens of the United States in Canada, within the ages for the time being specified by the Laws of the United States prescribing compulsory military service, except those who have diplomatic exemption, are made subject and liable to Military Service in Canada, and become entitled to exemption or discharge therefrom, under the Canadian Laws and Regulations. The regulations governing this liability are published in the Canada Gazette (Extra) of 21st Aug., 1918; copy whereof may be obtained upon application through the post to the Director of the Military Service Branch of the Department of Justice at Ottawa.

United States Citizens of the description aforesaid who were in Canada on 30th July, 1918, have sixty days from that date within which to exercise an option to enlist or enroll in the forces of the United States, or to return to the United States; and those who for any reason subsequently become liable to Military Service in Canada have thirty days from the date of the accruing of such liability within which to exercise the like option. It is stipulated by the Convention also that certificates of diplomatic exemption may be granted within the optional periods aforesaid. Every citizen of the United States to whom the regulations apply is required to report to the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, for the province or district within which he is, in the manner by the regulations prescribed, within ten days after the expiry of his optional period, and will be subject to penalties if without reasonable excuse he fail so to report. For the information of those whom it may concern, Sections 3 and 4 defining the requirements of registration, with which it will be necessary strictly to comply, are set out substantially as follows:

### REQUIREMENTS

3. Every male citizen of the United States within the ages for the time being specified in the laws of the United States prescribing compulsory military service, not including those who have diplomatic exemption, within ten days after the expiry of the time limited by the Convention within which the Government of the United States may issue him a certificate of diplomatic exemption, shall truly report to the Registrar by registered post, and in writing which is plainly legible, his name in full, his occupation and the date of his birth; stating also whether he is single, married or a widower; and if the latter, whether he has a child living, also if married, the date of his marriage; and stating, moreover his place of residence and usual post-office address in Canada; and, if he reside within a city or place where the streets and dwellings are named and numbered, the name and number of his street and dwellings; or if he reside in another place, the lot and concession number, section, township, range, and meridian, or other definite description whereby his place of residence may be located, having regard to the custom of the locality in which he lives; and if without reasonable excuse he neglect or fail to report in the manner and with the particulars aforesaid, within the time limited as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable upon summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars, and to imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months, and moreover, he shall incur a penalty of \$10.00 for each day after the time when or within which he should have registered during which he shall continue to be unregistered.

4. Every United States citizen who has diplomatic exemption, although not otherwise subject to these regulations, shall within ten days after the granting of the same truly report to the registrar, in like manner and with the same particulars as required by the last preceding section; and in addition he shall embody in his report a true and complete statement of the particulars of his certificate of diplomatic exemption. Neglect or failure without reasonable excuse to comply with the requirements of this section shall constitute an offence punishable in the manner and by the penalties provided in the last preceding section.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed  
lands only.

Records will be granted covering only  
land suitable for agricultural purposes  
and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption, abolished,  
but parties of not more than four may  
arrange for adjacent pre-emption, with  
joint residence, but each making neces-  
sary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for  
five years and make improvements to  
value of \$10 per acre, including clearing  
and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-  
fore receiving Crown Grant.

Where 1 pre-emptor in occupation not  
less than 5 years, and has made propor-  
tionate improvements, he may, because  
of ill-health or other cause, be granted  
intermediate certificate of improvement  
and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence  
may be issued provided applicant makes  
improvements to extent of \$500 per an-  
num and records same each year. Fail-  
ure to make improvements or record  
same will operate as forfeiture. Title  
cannot be obtained on these claims in  
less than 5 years, with improvements of  
\$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared  
and cultivated, and residence of at  
least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may  
record another pre-emption, if he re-  
quires land in conjunction with his  
farm, without actual occupation, pro-  
vided statutory improvements made and  
residence maintained on Crown granted  
land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20  
acres, may be leased as homesteads;  
title to be obtained after fulfilling resi-  
dential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes,  
areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased  
by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to  
include all persons joining and serving  
with His Majesty's Forces. The time  
within which the heirs or devisees of a  
deceased pre-emptor may apply for  
title under this Act is extended from  
one year from the death of such person,  
as formerly, until one year after the  
conclusion of the present war. This  
privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT  
ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to  
persons holding uncompleted Agree-  
ments to Purchase from the Crown of  
such proportion of the land, if divisible,  
as the payments already made will  
cover in proportion to the sale price of  
the whole parcel. Two or more persons  
holding such Agreements may group  
their interests and apply for a propor-  
tionate allotment jointly. If it is not  
considered advisable to divide the land  
covered by an application for a propor-  
tionate allotment, an allotment of land  
of equal value selected from available  
Crown lands in the locality may be  
made. These allotments are conditional  
upon payment of all taxes due to the  
Crown or to any municipality. The rights  
of persons to whom the pur-  
chaser from the Crown has agreed to  
sell are also protected. The decision of  
the Minister of Lands in respect to the  
adjustment of a proportionate allotment  
is final. The time for making applica-  
tion for these allotments is limited to  
the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applica-  
tion made after this date will not be  
considered. These allotments apply to  
town lots and lands of the Crown sold  
at public auction.

## TOMMY BURNS KNOCKS OUT TEX BRACKEN

Ex-Champion Allowed His opponent to go to the Fourth Round Before Finishing the Game.

The boxing match did not last long last night for Tex Bracken was put out of business by the ex-champion, Tommy Burns, in the middle of the fourth round. He was all in before the round started and a blow on the jaw after a certain amount of sparring sent him to the floor from which he had to be carried to his corner. The fight was short, but it gave the audience an opportunity to see what Burns was like in action. They watched a man who looked like an elephant in so far as size was concerned, but who was as nimble as a cat, alert, watchful, never missing anything and all the time having perfect command of the situation.

### Too Fast to Last.

Bracken looked hard and strong but he lacked the elasticity of his opponent. He put up a good fight and during the first round was the aggressor all the time. He rushed at Burns, hitting hard and chased him all around the ring. Those who watched, however, saw that it was too fast to last. Burns took the blows with good humor, parrying most of them and clinching now and then. Apparently he did not hit back throughout the round. In the second he fell and a lady in the audience made a remark which seemed to rouse him. Then he sent in about fifteen blows in half that number of seconds and it was easy to see that the fight was over.

### Punch Gone.

The Vancouver man came bravely back in the third round but his punch was gone and he evidently feared those short arm lightning blows which seemed to come when and where the aggressor wished. Once he was knocked down and the spectators feared the fun was over but at the stroke of ten he was up again and held on to the end of the round.

The fourth round was hardly a boxing match. Bracken, who had not been in training for some time, was winded and had no chance. He had the pluck, however. It was like leading a lamb to the slaughter to let him go into the ring, and when he went sprawling on the floor it was doubtful if he would come back. His backers were hopeful that he would rise before the count was over but they were disappointed. He was carried to his corner and a minute later was shaking hands with his opponent.

### Preliminary Bout.

As a preliminary a local boy, Tommy Sherman, boxed a few rounds with Hugh Fox of Vancouver. Both of these boys would benefit from a few lessons from the champion. They did too much slapping and not enough straight hitting. The little chap, Sherman, handled himself the best and although he was much shorter and lighter than the other, he stood a good chance of winning out if he had been allowed to continue. Fox relied on slapping, with well advertised uppercuts now and then. On the whole this was not a very satisfactory match although it aroused a good deal of interest among the spectators.

While the boxers were putting on their gloves, Corporal Nelson made an appeal for recruits to go to Siberia.
