## TURKS ARE ANNIHILATED

### BRITISH SEW OTTOMAN PALESTINE ARMY IN SACK; MANY CAPTURED

#### BRITISH TAKE 18,000 TURKISH PRISONERS IN PALESTINE AND CAPTURE FAMOUS ARMAGEDDON

**British Aid Operations; British Losses Surprisingly Light Considering Importance of Advance; 120 Guns Taken and Troops and Transports Captured.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, September 23.—General Allenby's forces in Palestine have taken 18,000 Turkish prisoners and captured 120 guns. This means the virtual annihilation of Ottoman forces in this region. The British losses are surprisingly light considering the importance of the advance.  
British cavalry operating in Palestine have advanced some thirty miles from the original positions and captured Nazareth, Beisan and Beisan. General Allenby's forces are collecting the organized masses of Turkish troops and transports arriving from the south. Although the Turks at some points offered considerable resistance to the British, at no point were they able to delay the advance even on the famous Field of Armageddon which the British cavalry swept across and occupied Nazareth to the north. In the operation of sewing the enemy within a sack, air played an important role, vigorously bombing the retreating Turks and inflicting enormous casualties on them.

#### VICTORIA GETS TWO SHIP CONTRACTS

Victoria, Sept. 23.—Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Federal Minister of Marine, has completed arrangements for carrying out the Government shipbuilding policy as far as Victoria is concerned. A contract will be let to the Victoria Machinery Depot for two 8,000-ton steel vessels. The Minister agreed to give the company enough contracts to keep the firm busy two or three years.

#### MIDNIGHT ATTACK RESULTS IN CAPTURE OF REDOUBTS LOST PREVIOUS SATURDAY

With the British Army in France, Sept. 23.—A midnight advance of London and English county troops resulted in the regaining of a large portion of the ground lost last Saturday after an attack along fragments of the Hindenburg outpost line between Cambrai and St. Quentin. During Saturday morning these battalions with yeomanry and Australians on their right, stormed a series of redoubts and farms forming the backbone of the outpost system opposite Bellengico and Vendhuile, a mile and a quarter west of Schedt canal between St. Quentin and Cambrai. They occupied Zellempotte and Queenemont Farms and Little Priel. The Tombois redoubts and chain of strong trenches were heavily banked with wire connecting these positions.

#### SERBIAN TROOPS PRESS FORWARD MORE THAN TWENTY KILOMETRES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Washington, September 23.—Serbian troops pressed the Bulgarians and Germans in Central Macedonia advanced more than 20 kilometres on Friday and now are within four miles of the Uskub-Saloniki Railroad, the main artery for the supply of Austro-German and Bulgarian forces opposing the British and French armies on the Serbian front. An official despatch from Serbian General Headquarters at Saloniki, received by the Serbian legation, said the Serbians had captured sixteen villages and 12 guns, and are now several kilometres to the north of the village of Kavadar. Fresh Bulgarian-German troops are arriving continuously to reinforce the enemy lines.

#### CHRISTIAN SCIENCE SUBJECT OF LECTURE

Christian Science is Essentially Democratic, Says Randall Dunn; Mr. Patmore Introduces the Speaker.  
An interesting lecture was given yesterday afternoon on Christian Science and Patriotism by Randall Dunn, of St. Louis. He showed that everywhere Christian Scientists were doing their duty in the present great war. He showed that they stood for the inalienable and universal rights of men and were essentially democratic. They were however doing more than their material bit. They were working for the healing of the world. They prayed with joyous confidence for the triumph of the right and a realization of the all-potent law of gravitation.

#### BIG MAUL OF DRAFT EVADERS

Seattle, Sept. 23.—Seventy employees of Libby, McNeill & Libby just returned from the Alaska fishing grounds were arrested yesterday by the Naval Intelligence Department charged with attempting to avoid the draft. The officers say they are members of a party which last spring escaped from San Francisco officials.

#### NEARLY \$5,000 TAKEN AT FAIR

Financial Condition of Association Best Yet—Showing of Exhibits Poor—Meeting Tomorrow.  
That the recent fair and carnival was financially the greatest success in the history of the city, but that the exhibition itself was a failure was the gist of the informal report submitted to the meeting on Saturday evening by Secretary Stuart. The meeting was poorly attended, there being not enough present to make a quorum. However Mr. Stuart gave out a few figures which are of particular interest. He reported the takings as follows:  
Collections by girls in concert ..... \$3,441.60  
Takings at the gate ..... 1,451.35  
Total ..... \$4,892.95  
The gate receipts were made up of amounts taken at the door of the building, \$440.40; at sports, \$463.50, and at dance, \$540.45. Never in the history of the fair had there been so much money taken, but it was all needed, as the building had to be put in shape.  
The meeting was not formally called to order but it was decided to hold it on Tuesday evening at the same time and that an effort would then be made to have the businessmen attend.  
It was also suggested that the ladies should be better represented and that at least two should be on the directorate.

#### EFFORT TO ALIGN CIVILIZED WORLD AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Washington, September 23.—In an effort to align the civilized world against the terrorism in Russia under Bolsheviki rule the United States Government has directed its ambassadors and ministers in neutral as well as allied countries to ascertain whether the governments to which they are accredited will join in some immediate action to "impress upon the perpetrators of these crimes the aversion with which civilization regards their present wanton acts."  
The proposal is to take steps entirely separate from the conduct of the war, that all civilized nations register their abhorrence of such barbarism.  
Amsterdam, Sept. 23.—At a recent meeting of members of the Russian Duma and Russian Imperial Council at Kiev it was resolved to issue an appeal to the public opinion of Europe and all governments to put a stop to "the Bolshevism Terror."

#### MRS CLENDENNING DIES AT HOSPITAL

The death occurred this morning at the hospital of Mrs. Catherine Shaw Clendenning of this city. She was a widow living at 839 Third Avenue, West, where she managed the Somerset Rooms, and formerly she conducted the Talbot Rooms on Second Ave. A brother, Duncan P. Shaw, lives at Stayner, Ontario.  
Mrs. Clendenning is well known here, where she has lived for a number of years. She formerly lived in Vancouver. She is well on in years and had been ill for some time past.

#### PRIVATE R. WHITE KILLED IN ACTION ON SEPTEMBER 8

Was Popular member of Sons of England and well known Citizen of Prince Rupert.  
The war was brought right home to the people of Prince Rupert again yesterday when news was received here of the death of Pte. R. White who was killed in action on September 8. He leaves a wife and four children here and a mother, one sister and two brothers in England.  
Pte. White enlisted three years and three months ago in the 62nd leaving for overseas from Vancouver. He was 35 years of age and before joining up was a member of the City Hall staff and a popular member of the Sons of England. Two years ago he received a bullet wound in the abdomen and two shrapnel wounds in the legs, and as a result was laid up for fourteen months before returning to the firing line last March. He was a highly respected citizen of Prince Rupert and was deservedly popular.

Arrived From Ketchikan Yesterday and Will Open Series on Tuesday Evening With Lecture.  
After spending a month in Alaska the Chautauqua party arrived here from Ketchikan last evening and are ready for the opening tomorrow evening. When seen last night Dr. Rader said that they had had a most enjoyable trip. They had been received well everywhere and at each place they had signed for next year. At Petersburg the mill had shut down in order that the men might attend a lecture. At Juneau he had been extended a special invitation to address the businessmen and this he had done, giving them a talk on "The Making of a Man."  
At Juneau too they had given a benefit concert for the Armenian Relief Fund and were instrumental in raising \$700 for that worthy cause. The first Chautauqua ticket sold at Juneau had been auctioned and fetched \$32.  
Dr. Rader is an able speaker. Last night he gave an address at the Presbyterian Church here. He was associated with the San Francisco Evening Bulletin at the time when Abe Ruef was landed in prison through the instrumentality of that newspaper. He also had been connected in an editorial capacity with the Philadelphia Public Ledger and other papers. He will give the opening address tomorrow evening on "Uncle Sam and John Bull" or American and Canadian ideals.

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#### COUNT TOERRING WORKING FOR PEACE

Amsterdam, Sept. 23.—The Cologne Gazette's Berlin correspondent admits that Count Toerring has approached the Belgian Government concerning peace. The newspaper says Toerring is related by marriage to the Belgian royal military families and is acting on the conviction that the Belgians had the greatest interest in a speedy conclusion of peace. It says he approached the Government privately. It is added by the Cologne paper that Count Toerring's step had, of course, no official character whatever.

#### BIG CONCRETE SHIP HAS BEEN LAUNCHED

London, Sept. 23.—The first concrete ship built at the Barrow shipyards was launched successfully yesterday, being the first of the 10,000-ton barges now under construction for the Department of Control of Merchant Shipbuilding. Barrow shipyards did not begin operations until the beginning of 1918.  
John T. C. Williams, inspector of Fisheries, returned on Sunday night from a visit of inspection to the Naas river fisheries. He reports that both canneries and fishermen have had a most successful season, a good average pack having been secured.

This week a famous group of entertainers and instructors are here in Prince Rupert. A Chautauque Festival has been organized and it has been arranged that there will be five splendid programmes of music and oratory. The object of the party is to provide for just such places as this, where it is difficult for the ordinary touring artists to call, owing to the immense distances. This group of men and women have been visiting the larger centres in Alaska. From Ketchikan, Mr. Stacpole wires to the local committee: "Chautauqua best thing ever came to Alaska. Boost it. We have signed for next year." This is an encouraging message and is probably the best kind of advertisement it could get. Prince Rupert will have to make it worth while for institutions of this kind to come here, and it is well to commence right now.

**St. Andrew's Society Commendable Action.**

The St. Andrew's Society has decided to arrange that every member of that organization overseas shall have at least one regular correspondent. There is a tendency to forget after men have been away a long time, or rather to have the desire to write crowded out by the stress of business or other calls on one's time. In order to insure that all members shall be kept in mind a special meeting of the society has been called for the purpose of arranging for one member at home to correspond regularly with a member at the front. The plan is a most commendable one and it should be a reminder to those who are not connected with any organization to remember the claims of the boys who have gone overseas to fight for us.

**Granby Sailed Away With Speed Boat Trophy.**

Prince Rupert waterfront people are rather worried over the fact that Granby took the speed boat cup back with them on Saturday. Ackerberg Thomson Co. made a good effort to capture the trophy, but the boat was not well balanced and was left hopelessly. Now there are a number of people who are keen on redeeming the lost position and they are already making plans to have that particular bit of silverware deposited in this port for a year when next they get a chance at it. Mr. Campbell sailed away with it on Saturday, just too late to get a challenge for another race. It is to be hoped that the present enthusiasm will keep up and that there will be a number of local boats entered next year.

**Exhibition Was Not a Success.**

The exhibits, taken on the whole were poor, they were not well staged, and little interest was taken in them. All this is wrong. 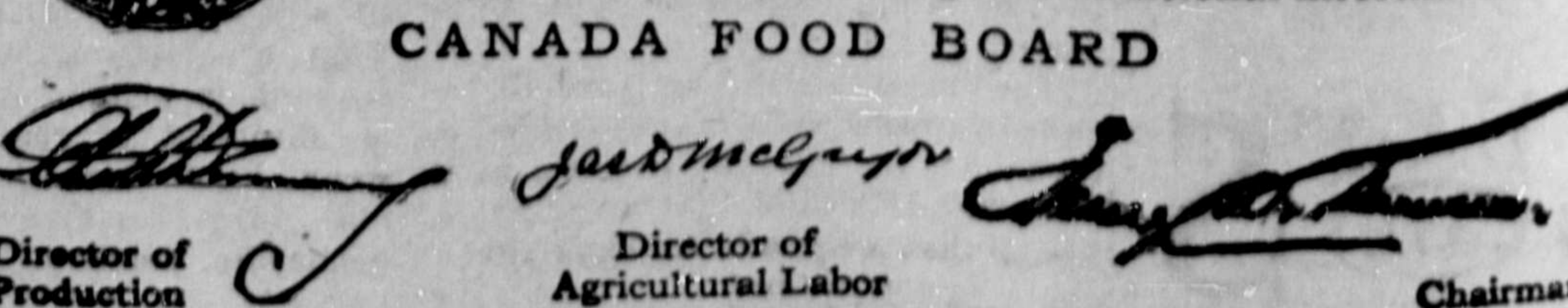

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties do not know that you may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
Pre-emptors must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, by reason of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.  
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims for less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the date of such person as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

### TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the seller or to any municipality. The Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

# THE FISHERMEN ARE ORGANIZING A NEW UNION

Meeting Yesterday Appoints Committee to Draw up Constitution to Submit to Later Gathering.

At the meeting of fishermen in the City Hall yesterday afternoon a committee was appointed for the purpose of drawing up a constitution for a new Salmon Fishermen's Union which it is proposed to form to take the place of the association which has become dormant. The committee consists of Messrs. Morse, Sennet, Bergman, Rutherford, Montgomery and Gibson. As soon as the committee is ready it will call another general meeting of salmon fishermen and submit its report and probably the organization will be formed at that time and officers elected.

Boat owners and businessmen will not be allowed to join the new organization but only those actually engaged in fishing or work connected therewith.

### Distribution of Licenses.

At the meeting Mr. Montgomery presided and Mr. Nickerson acted as secretary. There was a long and somewhat discursive discussion in regard to the salmon fishing industry, and especially criticism was levelled at the Dominion Government for the way in which the seining leases were given away. Complaint was made that many leases were held which were not fished and that fishermen were unable to get fishing rights when others who had nothing to do with fishing got them.

Mr. Nickerson advocated sending a delegation to Ottawa, but it was the opinion of others that it would be better to send a largely signed petition.

### Advocates Union.

Mr. Maher, secretary of the Halibut Fishermen's Union, said that the business men of the city had been the first to put up a fight. The fishermen's organization had started in what they considered the best way, but today he believed it would be better for them to organize as a union. The halibut fishermen would help them in every way possible. By forming a union they would get more united backing. If they formed a branch of the Salmon Fishermen's Union and affiliated with the Alaska Fishermen's Union and the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union it would strengthen their cause.

Mr. Nickerson, who had been secretary and moving spirit in the old Association, said that while he would not be able to join the union he would give it every support he possibly could.

The resolution to organize was moved by Mr. Morse and seconded by Mr. McLeman.

### AUSTRALIANS ADVANCE

London, Sept. 23.—The Australians have advanced beyond the Hindenburg line outposts and are right up against the main line.

## ALDERMAN CASEY IS WANTING TO KNOW

Series of Questions Posted on Board to Which He Expects Answers at Council Meeting Tonight.

Alderman Casey is again in the limelight with a series of questions which have been posted on the notice board and to which he has asked written answers at the council meeting tonight. The questions are addressed to the Superintendent of Utilities and are as follows:

1.—Why in the initial installation was a transmission line only capable of transmitting half the generating capacity of the plant installed for about the same money plus additional cost in copper.

2.—Why did Mr. Duncan inform the council that the Emerson power contract could not be fulfilled or what he then believed to be a 40 transmission line, when according to Mr. Anderson's advice, both the city and sawmill load could be delivered on a 20 line.

3.—Is it correct that Mr. Duncan requested the manager of the sawmill company to defer operation until the new transmission line was installed?

4.—Why did Mr. Duncan refuse promotion to an efficient workman in the telephone department after two years' service and make a wire inspector of a school boy after one year's service in the light department?

5.—Why did Mr. Duncan ignore Mr. Anderson during the installation of release valve on pipe line; and why was it that no provision was made for Mr. Anderson at the lake during the installation and testing out of release valve and adjustment of governor?

6.—What is Mr. Duncan's opinion of release valve and other adjustments directed by Mr. Anderson?

7.—Why did Mr. Duncan discharge Mr. Waddell after his faithful and efficient service to the department and employ Mr. Black when in previous years an unlicensed engineer or electrical operator filled the bill in the absence of Mr. Lamby?

8.—Why were the cedar poles in the woods adjacent to the transmission line not used in the initial installation of the pole line, instead of imported material?
