## PRISONERS NUMBER 25,000

### CENTRAL POWERS BEING HARD PRESSED ON ALL SIDES BY ALLIES

#### EATING INTO VITALS OF GERMAN DEFENSIVE AT EVERY POINT; 25,000 PRISONERS IN PALESTINE

Entente Allies have Initiative in their Hands and are Pressing Advantage Rigorously. Turks are Absolutely Crushed by Allenby's Forces.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, September 24.—These are hard days everywhere for the Teutonic Allies. In Palestine the Turks are all but absolutely crushed; in Macedonia the Entente forces are harrying their forces and threatening them with similar disaster; in France, British and French troops are slowly but surely eating their way into the vitals of the German defensive positions, the collapse of which would result in important changes all along the western battlefield, and in eastern Siberia the Japanese have made additional strides forward in the process of reclaiming territory for the Russians.

In all the theatres of war the Entente Allies have the initiative in their hands and are pressing their advance rigorously.

The Germans and their allies now are able to do no more than stand on the defensive. In Palestine and Macedonia efforts in this respect have proved sorry ones.

From the north of Jerusalem to the Sea of Galilee, in territory lying between the River Jordan and the Mediterranean Sea the Ottoman forces have been caught by the swift drive of the British (General Allenby's) armies and virtually annihilated. Added to the heavy casualties suffered by the Turks, hordes of them were made prisoner, and many more are wandering without leaders in the hills, eventually to be brought in to swell the great total. At least accounts more than 25,000 of the Sultan's soldiers and 200 guns and large quantities of war stores were in British hands.

#### LONE BANDIT HOLDS UP TRAIN

Registered Mail From Vancouver Rifled on Great Northern Bound to Seattle.

Seattle, Sept. 24.—The Great Northern train en route from Vancouver, B. C., to Seattle was held up by a lone bandit near Mukilteo last night. The bandit rifled the mail car of some registered mail packages, forced the train crew to uncouple the engine, then carry him to Meadowdale, where he escaped.

#### FALLON SAYS POPE NOT AGAINST ALLIES

London, Ont., Sept. 24.—In a vigorous sermon here Rt. Rev. M. F. Fallon, Bishop of London, recently returned from France, and from an interview with Pope Benedict XV at Rome emphatically gave the lie to charges that the Pope is throwing his weight against the Allies in the war.

#### AMERICAN STEAMER SUNK

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Corunta, Spain, Sept. 24.—Three officers and 27 members of the crew of the American steamer Butnaventura arrived here. The vessel was torpedoed last Monday. Three boats with 64 of the crew are missing. The Butnaventura was proceeding from Bordeaux where she had unloaded cargo of petroleum from Philadelphia.

#### THIRIEY DEAD

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Madrid, Sept. 24.—Joseph Thiriey, French Ambassador to Spain, is dead.

#### GERMAN SUBMARINE SUNK

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 24.—A large German submarine which was lying in wait for trans-Atlantic vessels, 500 miles off the American coast, is believed to have been put out of commission and perhaps sunk by the United States Shipping Board steamer Nausemond.

#### SLACKERS TREATY

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Five hundred applications for exemption from military service under the "Slackers" treaty, have been received from Canadian residents in the United States.

#### PTE. ALFRED HARDY KILLED IN ACTION ON SEPTEMBER 3

Well Known Prince Rupert Man Loses His Life in France; Was Twice Wounded.

Word was received in town yesterday afternoon from the Director of Records at Ottawa in a telegram to George Hardy regretting to intimate the death of Pte. Alfred Hardy in action on September 3, in France.

This news will be received with regret by everyone who knew Alf Hardy. He was one of the sons of Mr. and Mrs. George Hardy, of Summit Avenue, and had many friends in town. Before joining up, he was employed with the Mussallem Grocery. He left here with the 102nd, and was later transferred to the 72nd Highlanders, (the Seaforths). He was wounded twice in France, and only returned to the fighting line for the third time a few weeks ago. He was born in Bolton, England, and was but twenty-five years of age. Mrs. Hardy, his mother, has been ailing for some time and is at present in Seattle.

#### BIG EXPLOSION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amsterdam, Sept. 24.—Three hundred and eighty-two persons have been killed and many injured in an explosion in an ammunition factory at Woellersdorf, a town near the Austrian capital, according to Vienna newspapers.

#### WAR LOAF

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Canada has adopted the allied war loaf. Twenty per cent. of substitutes must hereafter be used with wheat flour.

### FORWARD MOVEMENT BY BRITISH ON EASTERN MACEDONIAN FRONT; FRENCH HAVE REACHED OISE RIVER

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, September 24.—Between the Vardar river and Lake Doiran, on the eastern end of the Macedonian front the British troops have reached the line of Kara, Ogulara and Hamzali, and are advancing on Mrzentsi, on the west bank of the Vardar. As a result of the heavy pressure of the Entente Allied forces the enemy has evacuated the whole line from Doiran to a point west of Vardar.

London, Sept. 24.—The British have captured a German strong point northeast of Epehey which had resisted for several days.

Paris, Sept. 24.—French forces fighting along the line south of St. Quentin have reached the Oise river between Vendeuil and Travecy.

#### HARKLEY WILL BE TRIED NEXT MONTH

Five Divorce Cases Set Down for Civil Assizes at Same Time As Criminal.

At an assize court to be held in this city October 24, Johnstone Smith Harkley will be tried on a charge of shooting to kill Frank Martin at Swamp Point. The name of the judge who will preside has not yet been announced.

In addition to the criminal assizes there will be a civil assize at which five divorce cases will be tried. This is a large number, but since the war divorce suits have been numerous everywhere.

#### LITHUANIAN ARMY IS PLANNED FOR STATES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, Sept. 24.—Plans for organization of a Lithuanian army in America under the direction of the United States were formulated here today at a meeting of Lithuanians, at which Dr. John Szelupas of Washington, member of the Lithuanian Central Committee, presided. It was recommended that an army be sent to Murmansk or Vladivostok to aid in driving the Germans out of Lithuania and establishing an independent republic.

#### GOMPERS RECEIVED BY KING GEORGE; PERSHING CABLES TO FEDERATION OF LABOR

London, September 24.—King George today received Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and other members of the American Labor Mission. Mr. Gompers, who was first received alone, had a chat with the King on the subject of Labor problems and the mission of the American Labor leader to England. Subsequently the King saw all the members of the Mission together. Queen Mary joined them later.

New York, September 24.—A cable message from General Pershing, in which he asserted that "With organized labor behind us, victory is assured," was received here by the New York State Federation of Labor in reply to a pledge of support recently sent the American commander.

#### EMPRESS WAS TOO SMALL FOR THE FESTIVAL

Chautauqua Managers Take the Westholme Theatre to Accommodate Big Crowds Who Will Attend.

Owing to the way in which the season tickets for the Chautauqua Festival have been taken up, it has been found that the Empress Theatre would be too small to accommodate Prince Rupert's musical public. The Festival will, therefore, be held in the Westholme Theatre, starting tonight at 8 o'clock. Arrangements have been made whereby season ticket holders may choose their seats by booking at Orme's Drug Store, where admission tickets entitling the holders to the same seat for the five performances will be given out.

#### Treble Programme.

From the details of the programme for this evening and tomorrow afternoon, which are given elsewhere, it will be seen that the fare offered to the people of Prince Rupert is distinctly out of the ordinary. Either the MacDonalds or the Filion Concert Party alone would be a sufficient attraction to fill the Westholme Theatre, but this double attraction, coupled with the lecture by Dr. Rader, makes a combination the like of which Prince Rupert people have never before had the opportunity of enjoying.

#### Great Violinist.

The items to be given by Ruthven MacDonald have sufficient variety to make an appeal to every one who appreciates a good voice. Ferdinand Fillion and his concert party interpret for modern audiences the greatest music of the old masters in a manner in which it can be understood. As an instrument, the violin is the one which nearest approaches to the human voice, and Ferdinand Fillion makes his da Salo violin speak.

#### Great Speaker.

The subject chosen by Dr. Rader, "Uncle Sam and John Bull" or "American and Canadian Ideals" is one in which all are interested. Dr. Rader himself is ranked among the few great speakers on this North American continent, and to listen to him once, is to desire to hear him again.

The record of the achievement of this Chautauqua party is widely known in town, and appreciation is being shown in the manner in which the season tickets are being taken up.

#### RAILWAY STRIKE IN SOUTH WALES TIES UP MANY INDUSTRIES

London, Sept. 24.—A sectional strike of railwaymen in South Wales, who are dissatisfied with the settlement of the dispute arrived at last Thursday, began on Sunday in defiance of the union leaders and spread to a serious extent Monday, dislocating traffic over a large area and compelling the idleness of thousands of miners and metal workers and seriously delaying the output and distribution of coal. The trouble extended further Monday night and threatens the complete disorganization of South Wales industries.

#### SPANISH INFLUENZA

Washington, Sept. 24.—Over twenty thousand cases of Spanish influenza are reported in 25 camps in this country.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—Spanish influenza has broken out in the military camps in Quebec and Niagara.

**Injects New Life Into Agricultural Society.**

There is to be a meeting of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association in the City Hall this evening and it is to be hoped that a large number will make it convenient to attend. It is important to make a good start and elect a board of directors that will be real workers.

There are a number of things to consider in laying down a policy for another year. Certain it is that there should be no more happy-go-lucky way of doing things such as occurred this year. For exhibitors to arrive the day before the fair and find no place to put things, no water available and everything in a turmoil may be all right for the pioneer days but as the city becomes civilized it is necessary to do better. No man would run his own business that way with any hope of success. He has to please his customers, not antagonize them. When an exhibitor comes all the way from the Queen Charlottes or from Terrace or Hazelton he should find everything ready for his accommodation. To keep women exhibitors working almost all night in order to get anything like order out of chaos is to say the least unbusiness-like.

**Run Fair on Business Lines.**

What the News suggests is not new nor is it original. There should be a paid business manager whose business it would be to run the fair on business lines and he should be so good a man that he would get results. The Board of Directors could then be more in the nature of an advisory committee. In saying that the fair was a failure this year is not to reflect on any person, but it is to reflect on the general policy of a lot of businessmen who would not think of running their own business in a loose way. Running a fair is a business and should be considered as such all the time.

**Mutual Helpfulness Is Way to Success.**

The business manager should go up the line and visit the farmers early in the year and arrange for exhibits to be sent and also arrange to have them cared for when they arrive. He should go to the Islands and meet the growers there and discuss with them their needs when they arrive here. He should organize a campaign to get the local gardeners to raise garden truck for exhibition and show them the advantage of doing so. Just to give a prize after the work is done is of little value to the community. The value of an exhibition comes in only when the people are stimulated by it to grow more and better crops. If the business manager is appointed in time for the spring planting he will tell them how to do it. The exhibition must be in sight all the time and the work of the year be carried on with that end in view. If a real live man can be secured to fill the bill along these lines, and to do it without running the society into debt the success of the show next year is assured.

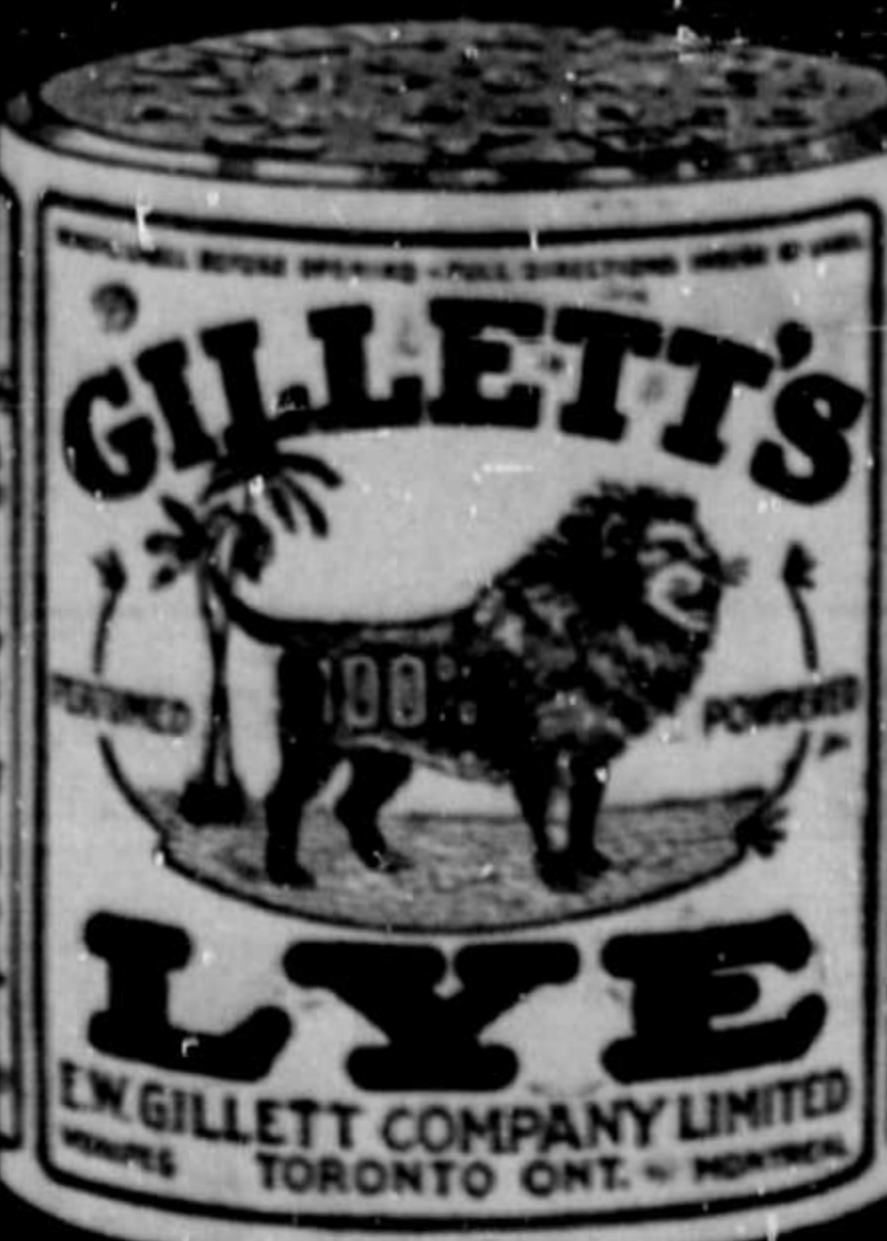
**Prince Rupert is Natural Centre.**

If Prince Rupert does not have the big exhibition of the north country some other place will do so very soon. It is up to the business houses here to see that it is kept here. Once it is established no other place can take it very easily. This is the natural centre but if the people here fail it will be the business of some other place to take it. This means more than appears on the surface. The amount of cash that a merchant takes in during the week is trivial. The sentiment of having this big city of the north, the centre where growers congregate and to which they look as a market, all these things enter into the permanent building of a city. It is necessary to make Rupert the big father that will co-operate with and help all the smaller cities. We can help them by encouraging their growers and by purchasing their produce. They can help us by supplying our needs and by spending some of their money here. If the fair does not help the outlying districts as well as Prince Rupert it is a failure. By co-operation only can there be success.

**Keep in Touch With New Residents.**

Just now the Provincial Government is about to enter into a colonization scheme for filling up the vacant lands of the northern interior and the more that country builds up the harder must Prince Rupert strive to get the business which will be done with them. To keep the fair going as a real live institution and to show an interest in the people that come into that part of the country is the best way to interest them in the city. Do that and the battle for supremacy is half won.

## ALICE ARM DISTRICT IS WONDERFULLY RICH IN ALL SORTS OF VALUABLE ORES

**COPPER, GOLD AND SILVER ABOUND; SEVERAL MINES  
WILL SHIP IMMEDIATELY; WATER POWERS  
ARE BEING SURVEYED FOR  
HYDRO-ELECTRIC**

"Alice Arm has a wonderful future," said C. W. Calhoun, the mining man who is in the city just now and who is most enthusiastic about the future of that district. He says that water-powers are to be developed to work the mines and that there are many rich properties besides the Dolly Varden, which will make it a prosperous camp very soon. In the course of discussion he said:—

"Very little has been said in the press regarding general mining development at Alice Arm, the comparatively new mining

camp close to Prince Rupert. Even local people know little about it, taking the camp as a whole. The absorbing interest in the war and the lingering feeling of scepticism which has followed the over-booming of Stewart has caused mining to be looked upon with more or less disfavor, yet it appears now that even Stewart is to a great extent justifying the optimism with which it was once regarded.

### High-Grade Ores.

"At Alice Arm there are fissures, veins and ore bodies of a uniformly high-grade of silver, copper and gold ore together with favorable rock formations and mining conditions and a possible tonnage outrivalling Anyox, yet it has taken a much longer time than usual for the pioneers of that camp to obtain for it recognition. That recognition has, however, been partly brought about by the high price of silver and copper.

The railroad is now about completed up the Kitsault river as far as the Dolly Varden mine, and E. E. Campbell, engineer for the Granby Company, was up to the property a few days ago to superintend the installation of an aerial tram with a view to beginning the shipment of ore as soon as possible.

### Railway Nearly Finished.

"It is given out authoritatively that the railway and tram line will be completed by the middle of October and there is a rumor that the Granby Co. has a seven-year agreement with the Dolly Varden Mines Co., Ltd., owners of the Dolly Varden and Wolf properties, to handle their ore on a percentage basis, and also that they are financing the straightening out and completion of the railroad.

The Granby Company are now engaged in surveying two different waterpower sites at Alice Arm, no doubt with a view to installing hydro-electric power plants.

### Engineering Skill.

"The building of the Kitsault and River Railroad has been an expensive and difficult piece of work, requiring considerable engineering skill. It runs through narrow high-walled canyons, with towering rocky cliffs above and the roaring rush of the river below. To walk up over the uncompleted section keeps a person on the qui vive to dodge the numerous blasts and requires about as much nerve as going "over the top" in France.

### To Ship Silver Ore.

"The Kitsault River Railroad will open up a large mining and timber territory but nothing like all the Alice Arm field which is very extensive. The La Rose mine located about eight miles up the road from tide water is expected to begin shipping high-grade silver ore in a few days, and it is expected that next year will witness the advent of a number of new producers on the Kitsault river.

"Prominent among the coming producers are properties owned by Messrs. Casey and Graham, and the North Star mine, which was recently acquired by Messrs. Zarelli, all of Prince Rupert.

"The Illiance river district is receiving considerable attention. A number of miners are employed on the property of the United Metals Co., taking out high-grade silver-lead ore, sacking it and preparing the mine for regular shipments.

"There is some talk of a railroad up the Illiance River if further development warrants it."

## AMERICANS TO REPORT UNDER NEW DRAFT LAW

Failure to Do So Leaves Them Liable to Conscription in Canada.

3030 ARE AFFECTED HERE AND ON ISLANDS

In answer to a representative of the "News" who requested a statement for publication as to the conditions governing the registration in Canada of American citizens for military service in the United States, Geo. M. Hanson, the American Consul here, has authorized the following:—

"All American male citizens in Canada, between the ages of 21 and 30 years inclusive, who have not already registered for military service in the United States, must either do so or return to the United States before September 28, unless they prefer to serve in the Canadian army. After registering for military service in the United States all Americans between 21 and 30 inclusive may remain in Canada until they are called for service in the States. Any one who is not called may remain here indefinitely without incurring the liability of military service in Canada. The registration referred to above is under the American draft law of 1917.

### Return or Register.

"The new draft law in the States includes American male citizens who are 18, 19, and 20 years of age and also all those between 31 and 45 years, inclusive. These must either return to the States or register at an American Consulate on or before October 12, 1918. Failure to do so renders them liable for service in the Canadian army.

"After the Americans who are between 18 and 45 inclusive have registered for military service in the United States, they are automatically exempted from the liability of service in Canada. They will be classified by their local boards in the States and called for service as the different classes are reached.

### Must Report.

"It will be the duty of all registered Americans to report to the Canadian registration officer, R. S. Lennie, 736 Granville Street, Vancouver, B. C., either in person or by letter, before October 22, 1918, and notify him that they have registered under the United States Selective Service Act. Those who fail to do so are subject to a heavy fine."

Mr. Hanson says he has appointed five deputy registration officers on the Queen Charlotte Islands, two in Yukon Territory, and one each at Anyox and Prince George, and that every facility possible will be offered to accommodate Americans at the mines and in the lumber camps, so that they will not have to make a special trip to this city.

### Many Americans Here.

On account of the large number of Americans employed in getting out spruce on the Islands it is believed that the number subject to the American draft laws in this consular district will probably reach 3,009.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-umber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.  
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

Local News Notes

Chautauqua season ticket holders will book their seats at Ormes Drug Store.

L. B. Warner, editor and publisher of the Interior News, of Smithers, is expected to arrive here this evening.

The regular meeting of the Trades and Labor Council will be held in Carpenters' Hall tonight. All delegates are requested to attend.

Launch Alice B. for the Sail takes leaves Prince Rupert Boat-house every hour commencing 10 o'clock on Sundays. Round trip 50 cents.

The following fishing boats arrived today with their catches:- Republic, 40,000; Reliance, 15,000; North Cape, 1,000; Sadie, 1,000; Convention, 7,000.

Now that the road to the mill is completed the Prince Rupert Lumber Company is ready to deliver lumber to the local trade. Orders may be placed with Albert & McCaffery.

The tender of H. S. Wallace for four lots in Section 2 for \$580 was accepted by the City Council last night on the recommendation of the Finance Committee. It was pointed out that this was \$30 more than the amount due the city.

The mayor at the council meeting last night spoke very encouragingly of the tax outlook, stating that they were only \$5,000 short of meeting the needs of the city for the year and he thought most of that would come in before the end of the month.

The steamer Princess Sophia arrived this morning from Alaskan points and left again a couple of hours later. She had a full list of passengers and a big cargo aboard. She had been delayed considerably by having to load a quantity of salmon at Ketchikan.

A bylaw in regard to the planking of Emmanuel St. between Fifth Ave. and Sixth was passed through all its stages except the final at the meeting of the Council last night. The city solicitor explained that the bylaw was absolutely useless but it had to be passed to conform with the statute.

J. C. Gavigan mentioned to The News this morning that he had attended a short rehearsal of the Chautauqua performers and that he was agreeably surprised at the quality of the programme which they were offering. He had never heard anything like it. He was sure that they would receive a hearty welcome from the people of this city.

The tender of the Kaien Island Hardware Co. for the supply of 5-in. and 6-in. nails was accepted by the City Council last night, the only other tender was that of J. H. Thompson, his price being \$8 per keg. Two tenders were received for truck tires, one from the Prince Rupert Engineering and Equipment Co. and the other from the Prince Rupert Auto Co., both of them being for the same amounts. The tenders were referred to the Finance Committee or report.

At the City Council meeting last night Alderman Kirkpatrick drew attention to the way in which garbage boxes were scattered around the lanes in the city. She expressed the opinion that if the sanitary inspector was unable to attend to his duties the council should employ someone else. The mayor said that the attention of the inspector had been drawn to the matter several times but without result and he had also seen the owners of the property in regard to it. He would take the matter up again, however.

FINE VEIN OF ORE AT HUDSON BAY MOUNTAIN

G. R. C. Anderson came into town on Tuesday from the Sealy, Hanson and Anderson property, located on Hudson Bay Mountain a few miles up from Lake Katilyn bringing the good news that their cross-cut had struck the vein and opened a fine showing of copper in the full face of the tunnel, says the Interior News of Smithers. A small force has been engaged in running the cross-cut for several weeks, and they broke into the ore at a distance of thirty-three feet.

When Mr. Anderson left for town the tunnel had been driven about three feet into the ore, but the foot-wall had not yet been reached. When the width of the vein had been ascertained, it was their intention to start drifting on the ore, with the object of getting as much out for shipment this fall as possible. For this work they will likely increase the force at the property and work both ways from the tunnel.

Naturally the owners are well pleased and encouraged by the strike, both as to the richness of the ore and extent of the body opened up. They have about three carloads of shipping ore on the dump, which was taken from other workings on the property, and with the striking of the vein this week they should be in a position to make a good shipment before snow flies.

Actual shipping, however, is impossible at present, owing to the fact that a section of the trail was inundated by recent high water and is impassable. Until the trail has been repaired shipments from that section will be out of the question.

There will be no pictures at the Westholme tonight. The Chautauqua Festival is the big thing there for the next few days.
