


### In the War Garden?

#### USE LESS SUGAR

The Bood Control Board is gradually tightening up on the use of sugar, the latest order promulgated is in part as follows:

No public eating place (except) soda fountain or ice cream parlors) shall use more than two pounds of sugar for every ninety meals served.

No proprietor of a soda fountain or ice cream parlor shall after September 30, 1918, use more than 25 per cent. of the average monthly amount of sugar used during the year 1917.

No person shall use in the manufacture of biscuits, or fruit, pound, layer, wine, sponge cake or; any like product more than 40 pounds of sugar to 100 pounds of


