IN CONTROL OF BULGARIA ALLIES GET THE RAILWAYS AND RIVERS TURKEY WILL BE FORCED TO PEACE DECLARES MINISTER TO U.S.

RAILWAYS AND RIVERS IN BULGARIA ARE CONTROLLED BY THE ALLIES IN FUTURE

Over Danube No Longer Controlled by Enemy; Communication with East by way of Balkans is Cut Off.

London, Oct. 1.—Bulgaria is definitely out of the war. Seeing eventual defeat staring her in the face through the swift progress of Serbian, Italian, British, Greek and French troops in the re-claiming of Serbia and the invasion of Bulgarian territory, the Bulgars begged for an armistice, reserving to themselves no conditions. All the territory now held by King Ferdinand's men is to be abandoned. The Bulgarian army is to be demobilized and all means of transport inside the kingdom, even along the Danube, to be given over into Allied hands. The armistice is purely a military convention and contains no provisions of a political character.

London, Sept. 30.—Speaking at the Guildhall today, Andrew Law, chancellor of the exchequer, said the Bulgarian convention had been signed by which hostilities ended today at noon. Bulgaria by the terms fixed gives up completely control of the railways which the chancellor pointed out gives control of Bulgaria. This convention means that communication between Germany and the East in that direction has been cut off.

CITY OF CAMBRAI BEEN SET ON FIRE; HUNS TRYING TO STEM AMERICAN TIDE

Heavy Fighting Results in Continued Successes by Allied Forces in Belgium and France; Cleaning Up Hindenburg Line.

London, Oct. 1.—The city of Cambrai has been set on fire by the Germans. British troops last night continued their closing in movements, capturing Provill and Alley. On the front between Cambrai and St. Quentin the town of Vondehulle has been taken and Lovongies, north of St. Quentin.

London, Oct. 1.—German reserves are being rushed into the battle between the Argonne forest and the Meuse, where the Americans are engaged.

Americans on this front have been engaged in heavy fighting throughout the day. A large number of Germans have been killed.

ALDERMAN CASEY QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Replies were given at the City Council meeting last night to the set of queries of Alderman Casey, and the replies were not acceptable to the alderman, who said that he could show reasonable proof that some of them were untrue while others were untrue. Alderman Kirkpatrick also took

exception to one of the answers. NEW WAGE SCHEDULE FOR ELECTRICAL MEN

Union Waves Some Provisions Which Are Suited to Larger Cities and Agreement Is Passed

A new schedule of wages for the electrical workers employed by the city was adopted by the Council last night on the recommendation of the finance committee and the chairman of the utilities commission. Alderman Dybhavn explained the changes which showed some slight advance over the old one. The agreement was for 30 days only, for while they wished to have it longer the union as a whole refused to be bound to a long period.

The mayor explained that Prince Rupert was in a different position from Vancouver and other large cities. There had been therefore a number of points in which the Vancouver agreement would not be suitable here. They had found the representatives of the electrical workers very reasonable in regard to this. They and now he heard that others had allowed for apprentices to be were being exempted. TURKEY WILL BE FORCED TO PEACE SAYS MINISTER 10,000 MORE PRISONERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, Oct. 1.—Turkey will be forced to peace, the Bulgarian minister here declares.

Paris, Oct. 1.—Col. Allenby's troops, two and a half miles from Damascus, and French troops are advancing on Beyrout. A Turkish force of 10,000 have surrendered in Palestine.

London, Oct. 1.—The official statement says: In Palestine during Sept. 29 the northward movement of our cavalry and armoured cars from the Tiberius Deraa area continued. A large Turkish force, including the elements composing the Turkish garrison on the Hedjaz railway between Amman and Maan, surrendered at Ziza station. This force is said by its commander to number 10,000 men and to be part of the second army corps of the fourth Turkish army.

GERMANY THREATENS TO KILL AMERICAN PRISONERS OF WAR IF SHOTGUNS USED; THE REPLY

Washington, Oct. 1.—The American government in reply to a German threat to execute American prisoners of war found in possession of shotguns, has given notice that if Germany carries out any such threat suitable reprisals will be taken.

Secretary Lansing's reply declares that the use of shotguns is sanctioned by the Hague Convention and that in comparison with the weapons now used in modern warfare the shotguns used by American troops cannot be the subject of legitimate or reasonable protest.

50,000 AUSTRO-GERMANS ARE DISARMED ON REACHING HEIHO

Tokio, Oct. 1.—Fifty thousand armed Austro-German prisoners from Blagovestchensk reached Hei Ho on September 18 and were disarmed.

Japanese and Chinese troops which have been on duty on the Amur river entered Blagovestchensk with the main force of Japanese cavalry when that city was taken by Allied forces.

Railway Employees Get Wages Increases Up to \$22,000,000

Eight Hour Day Ordered in Freight Sheds to Take Effect October 15.

Montreal, Oct. 1.—Seventy-five thousand stenographers, clerks, office boys, messengers, watchmen, sectionmen and others in the employ of the Canadian railways were granted an increase in wages amounting to over \$22,000,000 a year on the present pay roll, at a meeting of the Canadian Railway War Board yesterday. At the same time in view of the demands of organized labor it was ordered that hereafter an eight hour day shall prevail in all Canadian railway freight sheds. This goes into

effect Oct. 15th. Saturday is made a half day.

Prince Rupert's Moss Donation

This excellent substitute for absorbant cotton in making dressings for our wounded men on the battle fields of Europe grows profusely on the hills about Prince Rupert.

At the request of the Red Cross authorities in Toronto, the citizens of Prince Rupert recently devoted a day to the collection



of sphagnum moss, with the result that a full car load was obtained and sent forward by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

The value of sphagnum moss as a dressing for wounds was learned from the Indians of the North Country, who for centuries have made various kinds of dressings from this moss. Sphagnum mosses are found almost anywhere between Owen Sound and near the Arctic Circle in Canada. For a long time Scotland was depended upon almost solely for this commodity, but it is now being prepared and sent in large quantities from Canada, thereby saving thousands of tons of cotton.

Preparing for Next
Big Victory Loan

The organization for the launching of the Victory Loan campaign is being formed and residents of the district will be called upon at the end of the month or the beginning of November to do all they can toward swelling the total which will be subscribed from this district. Preparations for that event are now in order as it will be necessary to make the subscription a large one if the war is to be brought to a satisfactory conclusion. The right kind of peace can only be brought about by providing the means for carrying on the war.

C. P. R. Plans for
Trade on Pacific

Baron Saughnessy says that his company is looking toward Siberia for their future trade. It is rumored that the company has ordered several big steamships for the Pacific trade after the war and that some of them will run to Siberia. The Liverpool Journal of Trade and Commerce discussing this says: "One of them, a vessel of 9,400 tons carrying capacity, is, or was, in course of construction on the Tyne, while arrangements have been made for the building of others on a cost and percentage basis, two of them to have a length of 605 feet and a speed of at least twenty knots each. Lord Shaughnessy is, I believe, very hopeful about future prospects on the Pacific, and is not by any means pessimistic as to the result of Japanese competition, and the temporary breakdown of Russia. He is of opinion that, although it is difficult to be specific about plans, there will be some big developments on that ocean before very long. As a highway of commerce and travel it is gaining in importance every day, and it is only a question of time before the Atlantic will have to look closely to its laurels, or it will carry traffic second in volume to that of the Pacific. The awakening of the Orient and the development of the West Coast of North America will force the shipping companies to increase their transport facilities very considerably."

Siberia Almost
Unknown Land

Siberia is a land of possibilities. Since recruiting started for the Siberian Battalion a great many people have been talking about the country. It is one that is at present very much in the eye of the people. Curiously, about eighty per cent of the inhabitants of the country come from Ukraina and the neighboring states. These Ukrainians might be spoken of as the founders of Russia. They are the strongest force in the country today and they are mostly pro-Ally.

The steppes of Russia correspond somewhat with the prairies of Canada. They have the same extremes of heat and cold and sometimes they suffer from summer frosts. The country is an immense one and not well known to Europeans and those who live on this continent. Owing to the Russian methods and the commercially closed door, outsiders have felt that they were almost forbidden the country. Now it is confidently expected that Siberia will be opened to trade and commerce and development and that this town will be in close touch with all the movements there.

Baseball Club Must
Be Reorganized

It would appear as if there must be a reorganization of the baseball club before another match is played. It has been suggested that there should be a meeting called of all those interested in the game and that they should at once take matters in hand. As the season is nearing its close, however, it may possibly be best to leave the meeting over until early spring and then reorganize for the coming season. Possibly by that time it will be possible to get more than one team in the field and possibly to organize a league which will provide good sport throughout the summer. The next thing to look to will be the winter games. This is where football, hockey, or basketball comes in.

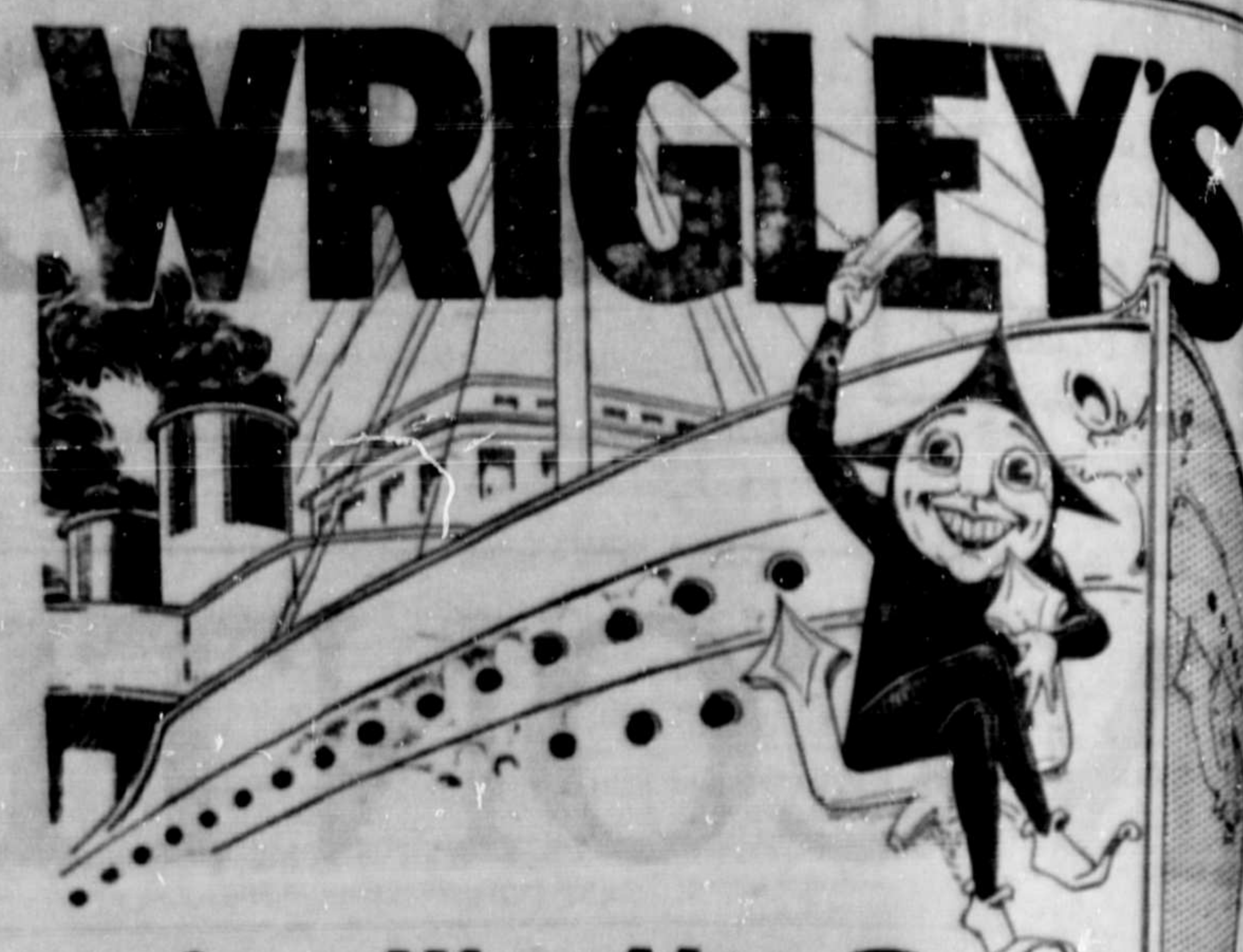

NET FISHING IN THE INTERIOR LAKES

Arrangements Have Been Made For Fishing With Nets in The Big Lakes of the Interior.

The new order further provides that "in the Fort George, Omineca and Cariboo districts, trout and charr weighing not less than one-half pound dressed, may be sold, except during the months of March and April of each year, until one year after the termination of the war."

The former order opened only the waters of Stuart, Fraser, Francois and Babine lakes to net fishing for the capture of white fish, charr and lake fish only. The numerous other lakes in the Fort George and Omineca districts, though extensive and teeming with fish, were not opened. Now all the lakes in those districts, that are not less than four miles in length, are opened, and sturgeon may be netted in Babine, Fraser, Stuart and Francois lakes.

News in Brief

The Anxox Cabaret Club is preparing to give an entertainment at Anxox on Halloween and it is possible that they may be induced to come to Prince Rupert and give their entertainment here. All the best musical talent of the town has been enlisted in this company of artists and it is said that when they show they will be a surprise. If they come to Prince Rupert it will probably be under the auspices of the Red Cross, to which all the funds will go.

There is a big exodus from the north this year. Wages are so high in the shipyards and other industries on the coast that the residents of Dawson and Alaskan points are trekking to a warmer climate where they can work all the year round and get good wages. Every boat south carries numbers of workmen who have been in the habit of staying in for the winter but who this year are migrating south.

The Provincial Government has issued an order making it illegal to move hives of bees from one locality to another without permission from the Department of Agriculture. There has to be an inspection before the hives are moved. This action is taken to prevent the spread of foul brood, the one bad disease from which bees suffer.

There is a movement among the lumber mills of the south to induce the Government to help them market the rough lumber, as this is accumulating to such an extent that it is a serious drain on the finances of the millmen.

Another employee of the Grand Trunk Pacific coast service has been wounded. This time it is Pte. E. R. Hill who was formerly an engineer on the Prince George. He is known here because of his frequent visits on the steamer. His home is in Victoria.

**SYNOPSIS OF
LAND ACT AMENDMENT**Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements shown and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For trading and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war, during which privilege is also made retroactive.**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has been agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

Editor Daily News:

It is to be hoped that we have heard the last on the matter of strikes until the war is ended. The feutons make a great deal of anything that will assist them in prolonging the war, and to strike while the armies are struggling to right things for the whole world means another day and perhaps another year of conflict.

The writer knows something of hard times in B. C., and has worked for different scales of wages, but has never asked for more pay or struck, tying up any concern. It was my privilege to resign, when dissatisfied with wages and conditions, which is the privilege of any man, be he good, bad or indifferent.

When times were harder than they are now the Provincial Government paid only \$40 a month and board to road workers. Our soldiers are fighting our battles for \$1.10 a day and board. It seems preposterous for foreigners—and some of them alien enemies—to ask for and compel the payment of the highest kind of wages during this time of stress. It looks like taking advantage of our difficulties.

When the Masters and Mates handed in their resignations they carried out a law that should be general. If we are not satisfied we should quit and ascertain whether our employers are able to fill our places.

It is unfair to the employer and also to the government of a country to close down any necessary work. The majority of the people pay the increased wages anyway. Tying up the streetcar traffic means that a few desire to benefit at the expense of the many. A raised fare means a daily raised rate to streetcar travellers. It is the same on steamers. We, the majority of the people, are willing to do our duty by those who are aggrieved in the way of receiving small returns for their services, or returns that they are dissatisfied with but it should be our privilege to have some say in the raising of our passenger rates, be it on street cars or any other conveyance. Forcing the Government or a municipality to take a stand, one way or the other, is like a boycott on those representing us.

The writer also is not an employer, or the member of any fraternal society or union. It has been my privilege to be both an employer and employee. I claim the right to think and act for myself, under all circumstances. The world has been large enough to give employment, for many years, even when we had worse conditions, so far as a living is concerned, than we have now. It is in no spirit of "heroics" that one states that common labor, so called, receives more pay than the writer receives. Consideration was given to the pay of the soldier and the chaotic condition of things since the inception of the war. If another man can earn more than I can and is paid higher wages, so much the better for him. The world's misfortune has been his opportunity; but failed in my case.

Let us be optimistic. We are facing hard times, the whole of us who are no better off than four years ago. We should not be downhearted. Many others, especially in France and other countries, are far worse off than we are. We are creatures of circumstances, at best, with a short journey ahead to a land where, we trust, our long home will provide something better than we have here. We take mighty little with us when we go "West" and we are taught that money will not buy either a front pew or anything else in the land where they have no strikes or wars.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Several marriages are on the tapis and will be celebrated during the coming month.

The "murder mystery" on the Ain river has been investigated and the result is that the remains are prehistoric.

Logging operations will continue throughout the winter. The snowfall is so light on the islands that it will not interfere with the cutting of spruce.

The idea of constructing a railway line on the Yakoun river for the carrying of aeroplane spruce has been abandoned. Although there is a large quantity of spruce on the largest river the returns would not warrant an expenditure at this time to bring the timber to tide water.

Dog salmon are running in the inlets and a number will be canned at the south end canneries. Birds and bears are gorging themselves on the remains of the humpback salmon in the small rivers and streams. In the history of the islands no such phenomenal run of fish has ever been known.

Messrs. Harrison and Barge were the winners of more prizes at the Prince Rupert fair than any other individual exhibitors. The two "justices" are proud of the number of prize tickets in their possession and may be counted on to make increased exhibits at the 1919 exhibition.

Charles M. Adams and Nigel Sherwood, both of the Masset contingent at the front, have written to their many friends informing them that they are still "going over the top." Jasper Amos, a native son of Masset, is ill in England.

A number of recruits will leave in a short time for the front. The islands have contributed a larger number of residents, according to the population, than any other part of the Dominion. Settlers have gone out; shut up their pre-emptions and sacrificed their lives without waiting for conscription to spur them on. There are many small clearings on the islands which will never again be occupied by their original owners.

JOSEPH ROGERS IS VISITING WINNIPEG

The following item of news in regard to Joseph Rogers of this city is taken from the Winnipeg Free Press:

Among the guests at the McLaren this week is Joseph A. Rogers, who was in the early days one of Winnipeg's leading business men. He left here 22 years ago and has since been living in British Columbia, where he is interested in mining and other enterprises. After the California gold rush of '49 the name of Rogers became famous in America and Europe in connection with northern and western furs, and the old fame still survives. Mr. Rogers and his brother, who are successors to the founder of the house, being among the largest buyers and shippers of furs in Canada. Mr. Rogers now makes his headquarters at Prince Rupert, where he represents some large old country and American houses for the purchase of certain classes of furs. He is meeting with a warm welcome from old Winnipeg friends. He is en route home from a business trip to New York.

WHETHER it be food, coal, wool, steel, leather, labor or transportation, the result in all cases is the same. Whoever competes with the nation by freely satisfying his own desires, selfishly appropriates to his own use that which is so urgently required for our fighting men in France.

For the sake of your country and the boys "over there," spend cautiously. Think of what Lord Kitchener has said, and ask yourself first, "Is this something I really need or can I do without it?"
