## WONT HAVE HUN PEACE

### UNITED STATES SENATE AND BRITISH SOLDIERS ARE OF SAME MIND

#### GERMANY'S PEACE OFFER SPURNED BY UNITED STATES SENATE AFTER A DEBATE LASTING TWO HOURS

**Declared to be Insidious Attack by Leaders of All Parties; British Soldiers Demand Victory Before Peace; German Populace Become Excited and Declare for Peace.**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, October 8.—Germany's peace offer was peremptorily spurned in the Senate in a spirited discussion of the latest enemy proposals. Senators participating in a two-hours' debate declared it an insidious attack and voiced the common demand for its immediate rejection, inveighing especially against the proposal for an armistice. Speakers were unanimous in declaring a military victory must be had. Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Republican Leader Lodge of Massachusetts, ranking Minority Leader of the Committee, Senators Poindexter of Washington, Cumber of North Dakota, Pittman of Nevada, Ashurst and Smith of Arizona, Nelson of Minnesota and Reed of Missouri were among the speakers representing both political parties.

With the British Army in France, October 8.—Soldiers of the allied armies want peace, but no peace except a completely victorious one. This was the opinion expressed by officers and men alike. Victory first, then peace, declare French civilians who have returned to their shell wrecked homes in Northern France when the subject of an armistice is discussed.

London, October 8.—The Lokal Anzeiger, Berlin, counsels rejection of President Wilson's points as to separating Alsace-Lorraine from Germany, incorporating Prussian Poland and independent Poland. The Fatherland party opposes the peace offer of Prince Maximilian.

Amsterdam, October 8.—Excited crowds in the streets of Berlin yesterday evening tore from vendors the special editions of newspapers containing the speech of Prince Maximilian, the new Chancellor. Everywhere shouts of "Peace has come," "Peace at last," were heard.

#### ELEVEN FINED FOR NOT HAVING PAPERS

**Austrian and German Charged  
With Failing to Report;  
Others are Dismissed  
By Magistrate.**

Yesterday when the police court sat at 2 p. m. there were eighteen military and alien cases for the consideration of the magistrate. Of the men rounded up by the military police for being without the necessary papers to prove their origin, nine were fined \$10 each and costs, two were fined \$5 each and costs, two were dismissed and one adjourned; while yet two were remanded for medical examination. They were all foreigners, and did not have either naturalization papers, certificate of birth, or of their country of origin. The city police also brought up one Austrian and a German subject, who were charged with failing to report.

#### NO SECONDER

After bringing what he considered to be satisfactory evidence to show that the answers of the superintendent of public utilities to a series of questions submitted by him recently were not only evasive but untrue, Alderman Casey last night moved that the official should be asked for his resignation. There was no seconder to the motion, which was allowed to drop.

Alderman Casey admitted that he had been misinformed on one matter but claimed that in the others he was right and two letters were read to prove his contention. The other members of the Council, however, did not seem to take the matter seriously.

#### DECLINE OF GERMAN MAN POWER MAKES NECESSARY SHORTENING OF HUN LINES

**BELGIANS BEING TORN FROM HOMES AND FORCED TO  
DO MILITARY WORK — WOMEN TAKING  
THE PLACE OF MEN ON  
COMMUNICATIONS**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 8.—The shortening of the German lines is being made necessary by the decline in man power of the enemy. On every hand there are indications that the Huns are at last beginning to consider the conservation of their men.

Washington, October 8.—Evacuation of the Belgian ports of Zeebrugge and Bruges, which it now appears certain the German leaders have decided upon, will not affect materially the submarine situation whatever its military result ashore may be. This is the judgment of both American and allied officials.

#### LIQUOR CASE AGAIN ADJOURNED FOR WEEK

**Claim Made By Witness That the  
Liquor was in House Since  
Pre-Prohibition Days.**

The case of Elsie Carr, charged with keeping liquor for sale was heard before Magistrate Carss this morning in the police court and adjourned until Tuesday next.

Frank McCoy, witness for the defence, was put on the witness stand. He testified to being the husband of Elsie Carr, and had been in the hotel business in Edmonton. It was his intention of coming to Prince Rupert and, knowing that prohibition was coming on, he asked his friend, one named Cordele, to put in a stock of whisky for him. This was in 1917, and this liquor is the whisky in question. The presumption of the city solicitor was that this was a strange story, and he put it up to the magistrate.

"We are always hearing new ones," remarked Magistrate Carss. City Solicitor Peters was accusing the witness of breaking the prohibition law insofar as he kept liquor in another person's house, which question was objected to by counsel for the defence, L. W. Patmore. "You can't convict a man out of his own mouth," he objected, and claimed the protection of the Court, for any statement witness might make.

Adjournment was asked by Mr. Peters, so that the previous tenant of the house might be called to rebut the evidence as to the liquor being stored in this particular house behind the post office since 1917.

"This witness is not the accused in this case," pointed out Mr. Patmore. "The charge is against the woman. It was not her whisky. She has already been fined for taking the liquor out of the house. She did not keep the whisky. Wherein has she broken the law?" he asked.

The case, however, was adjourned until Tuesday next, awaiting the return of the witness from Vancouver.

#### LOSS OF BEYROUT IS SERIOUS BLOW

London, October 8.—The Turks have suffered a serious blow in the loss to the French of Beyrouth, the capital of the Vilayet of Syria. The occupation of this seaport on the Mediterranean by a French naval division gives the Allies a base for the landing of men, who can operate in all directions against the Turks over roads radiating from it.

Washington, October 8.—Field Marshal Douglas Haig, commander of the British forces in France, has been awarded the Cross of Honor for conspicuous and notable service to humanity. The medal last year was given to Marshal Joffre.

#### SPANISH INFLUENZA SPREAD VERY RAPIDLY

**Hundreds of Deaths Have Occurred  
From Malady; Only a  
Few Cases in West.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, October 8.—Varying reports from the towns and cities in Eastern Canada regarding the epidemic of Spanish influenza make it impossible to estimate accurately the number of victims that have been claimed since the malady became general little more than a week ago. Since that time it has spread with remarkable rapidity, and while all precautionary measures have been taken by medical health officers, it is safe to say that there have been hundreds of deaths, while the number of cases requiring medical attention number many thousands.

There are only a few cases in the west.

**LULL IN FIGHTING ON BRITISH FRONT IN LILLE SECTOR;  
FRENCH CAPTURE BERRY-AU-BAC  
NORTHWEST OF RHEIMS**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, October 8.—The latest official report from the front says that northeast of Rheims the French have continued their successful advance and reached the outskirts of Conde sur Suipe, northeast of Berry-au-Bac, captured Bazancourt and penetrated the Isles sur Suipe.

With the British Forces in France, October 8.—British troops in the Lille sector and in Beaufort district are reported to have made further slight advances, but these were mainly in the nature of line-straightening operations. have captured Berry-au-Bac. **Huns are Beaten  
And They Admit It.**

The Huns are licked and they admit it. The war is not over but it has got to a point where the Allies can dictate terms. The enemy is on the run and everything seems to indicate that they will continue on the run.

It is a great thing for the Huns to realize that they are beaten. They are now trying to save themselves before it is too late. It is hardly likely that the Allies will be deceived over the latest proposals. They cannot talk peace as long as German armies are on French or Belgian soil. Even after that it is doubtful if they will be ready to talk terms unless the enemy capitulates and leaves it to the Allied Governments to decide the terms.

The question of returning the German colonies is one that certainly will not be conceded. Whether they will ever again control any of them is doubtful. It would not be fair to the colonies for they are the most governed among the colonies of the world. If the Germans are ready to pay for all the wilful damage they have done to Belgium and France then the question of returning the colonies might possibly have consideration, but the Huns do not expect to do anything like that.

The other suggestions are not worth the paper they are written on. A scrap of paper to a German is nothing. To talk glibly of a league of nations is just camouflage. It is meant for the purpose of deceiving the peace party in Great Britain, but it will be ineffective.

**Dangerous Precedent  
At City Hall.**

Alderman Casey is establishing a dangerous precedent. He admitted last night at the council meeting that as chairman of the Board of Works he had secured a foreman for road work and sent men to the City Hall to get jobs. That on the face of it seems innocent enough, but such action as that is at the bottom of all the ward politics and graft which for many years was prevalent in the big cities of the United States.

Members of the City Council should have no more say in the employment of men than any other citizen of Prince Rupert. The system is bad and leads to all sorts of boodling and graft. By doing that sort of thing an alderman is often able to keep himself in the Council and hold a job for which he may be wholly incapable. The city engineer is the man to engage the staff, and if he is not competent to do it, he should be let out and another put in his place. If each alderman were to send his friends to the engineer to get a job, during dull times for instance, there would soon be a lot of hangers on trying to find themselves work at the expense of the city.

This question has come up in all big cities and it has had to be settled definitely. In Victoria at one time men were kept on the job simply because they were proteges of some particular aldermen. They openly boasted that they could not be fired. The thing became a scandal and the system was abolished. For a man who is elected to find jobs for the men who support him is at the bottom of all the municipal scandals on this continent.

Alderman Casey is quite innocent of any ill intent. He was undoubtedly working in the interests of the city, but the system is dangerous and should not be allowed to get a start. Aldermen should keep quite clear of the employees. The heads of departments are the only ones competent to be employers and if they are not competent they should be changed. That is business. Make the heads of departments responsible and expect results.

**Condition of Lockup  
Unsuited for Women.**

At the Council meeting last night Alderman Kirkpatrick introduced the question of provision for women at the city lockup. It is to be hoped that there will be no occasion to use the city lockup for women, but if there is need it might be better to let the prisoner go free than to shut her in the cells under such conditions as were described by the Alderman. She says that the Grand Jury recommended a change. Doubtless when the Grand Jury sits again this month it will again investigate and have something to say. Attention must be drawn to conditions such as these or they are likely to remain a scandal to the city.

## NEW JAPANESE COMPANY WILL INVADE COAST

Uchida Trading Co., Ltd., to Operate Number of Ships Across North Pacific.

A new Japanese shipping company is to invade the north Pacific. This time it is the Uchida Trading Company Ltd., of Tokio and Kobe, Japan. The company owns a number of steamships which it has chartered to other shipping companies. Now it proposes to operate these themselves. The company is capitalized at \$37,500,000.

It is not yet announced where the headquarters of the company will be on this continent, but Seattle is to be one of the important ports of call. It is understood that this is one of the companies that had representatives visit this port during the summer with a view to investigating the possibility of running a line of steamers from here across to Japan, Korea and Siberia. The other company was the Osaka Shosen Kaisha, whose representative when here recently told The Daily News that a new company had been investigating the possibilities and that one of the companies would be sure to come here before long.

The Uchida Trading Company has a number of small steamers of about one thousand to five thousand tons, any of which would be suited to initiate a service to a new port. It also is building a number of new ships.

everybody was doing well. There were three express trains a week and a daily freight out of Prince Rupert for the east and a special spruce train could be made up every day. Getting out airplane spruce was giving work to an army of men on the Queen Charlotte Islands and the output was in every way satisfactory, so far as Mr. Johnson could learn.

## TELLS VANCOUVER OF PRINCE RUPERT

T. Johnson, Manager of the Cold Storage Company, Gives interview in Southern City.

The shortage of cold storage space all over Canada has resulted in the laying up of the steam trawler James Carruthers at Prince Rupert, and a consequent lessening of the supply of flat fish for the prairie market," says T. H. Johnson of Prince Rupert, who is at the Hotel Vancouver on his return from a visit to eastern cities, says the Vancouver Province. He is the manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company at Prince Rupert, which has been providing the prairie and eastern market with its supply of cheap fish.

With regard to the conditions of storage at the northern plant, in further explanation of the tie-up of the big trawler, Mr. Johnson goes on to say that, being a government-subsidized cold storage, the company is compelled to give preference to the general public over its own goods, with the result that the general public, including the competitors of the company, are making use of the cold storage, precluding the handling of the usually large catches brought in by the big trawler.

"However," adds Mr. Johnson, "the trawler will be placed in operation again as soon as the situation improves. Up to the present we have had very good fishing, the Carruthers as a rule coming in with a full cargo. She has brought in as much as 80,000 pounds of fish within forty-eight hours after leaving our wharf. Although this is a tremendous amount of fish, we are able to handle it, with out perfected machinery, within a few hours. The machinery cleans the fish, heads them, removes fins and tails and, as a matter of fact, when we ship the fish they are ready for the pan.

**Ship to Prairies.**  
"Our shipments of flat fish extend over the greater part of Canada, from Vancouver to Montreal. Our chief market, however, is in the four western provinces. The aid of the government makes it possible to ship at such great distances. The government pays two-thirds of the freight to popularize the fish. The result during the past few months has justified this foresight. It will be recalled that this was the recommendation of Mr. H. B. Thomson, present food controller, when he was a member of the fisheries commission.

"The flat fish are sold at a fixed price of 5 1/2 cents per pound, f.o.b. Prince Rupert, and all varieties of codfish for 6 1/2 cents per pound, f.o.b. point of shipment.

"This has been a most strenuous fishing season, what with strikes, tie-ups and the difficulties of getting supplies. The halibut pack has been below normal as far as Canada is concerned. On the other hand the government-controlled fish catches have been the biggest on record. We had a good run of salmon, speaking generally.

**Halibut Disappearing.**  
"A reason for the smaller pack of halibut is the steady depletion of the banks, but the chief reason is the difficulty in securing fishing crews for our boats. A further reason is that many boats were diverted to other fishing lines, as in the case of the trawler Carruthers, which used to make record halibut catches."

Asked regarding the government embargo on canned salmon, Mr. Johnson said there was a pack at Prince Rupert worth \$250,000 but the owners were prepared to trust the Canada Food Board and believed they would get a square deal. "I am sure it will work out in the end to everybody's satisfaction," said Mr. Johnson. Speaking of conditions in the north generally, Mr. Johnson said

## Registration of United States Citizens

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGES 21 to 30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGISTERED POST with the registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and such CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 and 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the ten days next FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918.

It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, AND INCLUDES ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, OR HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local postmasters for despatch to the proper registrar, under the Military Service Act.

## Notice—Military Service Act, 1917 Men Exempted As Farmers

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms which are actually contributing to the national food supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS 1 POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS, which is expiring, and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT, SHOULD communicate with the registrars under the Military Service Act OF THEIR RESPECTIVE DISTRICTS, REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the national food supply.

2. In order to facilitate productive employment during the winter months, MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS SHOULD APPLY TO THE REGISTRARS FOR PERMITS TO ENGAGE FOR THE WINTER IN SOME OCCUPATION OF NATIONAL INTEREST, SUCH AS LUMBERING, MUNITION WORK, ETC. Such permits will serve to enable exempted farmers to pursue other useful occupations for the months during which farming operations cannot be carried on.

## ALDERMEN ARE MUCH WORRIED

At Council Meeting Last Night They Discussed Their Own Seeming Lack of Authority.

ALL THEIR ORDERS ARE BEING COUNTERMANDED

To be or not to be, that was the question which agitated the City Council last night. Is the Council to be an effective body or is it not? The Council wants to know. It meets with suitable gravity and decorum each Monday evening, and with all the dignity of a legislative body it passes resolutions or bylaws, only to find that no effect whatever is given to their resolves. That is the complaint.

Councillor Rochester set the ball rolling last night and it gained momentum as it went until Alderman McMeekin rose in his wrath and wanted to know how it was that when the Council resolved to put men to work on the roads, none were there.

Condition of Roads.

Alderman Rochester complained, very bitterly of the condition of the roads and asked if anything had been done and if not, why? He wanted to know who was responsible, whether it was the Board of Works or the city engineer. Time was when the city engineer was there to give information but that time had gone. All were looking for the betterment of the roads but were not getting it. Third Avenue was worse than it had ever been before. If it had ever been crushed rock the road would be better if it were only scraped.

Alderman Casey, chairman of the Board of Works, said that the Board must be held responsible because it was the body that authorized the engineer to do the work. He had planned to have the work done and had sent men to the city hall to get work on the job. He had also secured a competent foreman and took him to the city hall only to find that the work had been abandoned. He had come to the conclusion that the Board of Works was not big enough to hold its job or it would find out wherein lay the trouble.

Countermanding Orders.

Alderman Rochester again took part in the debate by asking who it was that was countermanding the orders. They had heard nothing but fairy tales for the past three months and it was high time they were getting something done. It would be easy to improve the roads, but they could not do it by putting ashes on them. They should be scraped in order to get the mud off.

Alderman McMeekin wanted to know what use it was to come up there and talk if the work was not being done. The roads were getting so bad that they would have to spend a lot of money to get them into shape.

Alderman Dybhavn, who was acting mayor, suggested that the Board of Works find out what was wrong.

The Council then adjourned and the Aldermen gathered to discuss their grievances informally.

The question of housing is one that I have heard discussed here and I think that Prince Rupert is well situated to overcome that problem, perhaps, in a more efficient manner than most Canadian cities.

Timber or lumber structures always considered to be more or less of a temporary nature and as Prince Rupert is surrounded with good timber and many saw mills perhaps the citizens may take full advantage of that fact for additional housing, conserving and using the timber in an artistic manner corresponding to the rustic and natural beauties of the available building sites.

With solid log corner posts, log slabs prepared for siding, the small timber used for wall heads, verandahs, balconies and railings, also for the trimmings of doors and windows to obtain rustic designs, by the use and application of the small timber a very pleasing effect can be obtained and the houses made warm and substantial, the insides finished with composition boards ready made to fix if the plastering is too expensive and labor scarce. Following the principles and construction used by our forefathers, it is not necessary to use any

sheet iron at the wall-heads and roof valleys as lumber has been and can be used for roofing purposes without metals.

When the time arrives for the erection of fireproof buildings suitable rock is lying on the ground waiting to be crushed and mixed with cement for concrete and some of the intelligent prospectors may locate a deposit of clay or dog mud in a dry river bed or elsewhere suitable for the manufacture of Portland cement and deposits of clay may also be found near the city suitable for brick-making and ornamental terracotta, to finish the outside of ornamental buildings.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$15 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a claimant in occupation not less than 5 years and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or proportionate improvements results in forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$15 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the pre-emption from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

In the absence of Mayor McClymont, Alderman Dybhavn last night was chosen as acting mayor, the city clerk calling the meeting to order.

The Great War Veterans Association is making preparations for a big dance on Friday, Nov. 1, the proceeds in aid of Soldiers' obacco fund.

A report of the Board of Works in regard to the appointment of the Sanitary Inspector and also a letter from R. E. Walker were not read to the Council last night but held over until the next meeting.

Miss Florence Swanson of Anox returned a few days ago from a round trip to Alaska on the Princess Sophia. She expects to return home on Wednesday and in the meantime is staying at the Hotel Prince Rupert.

The sale of two lots in Section Two were formally confirmed at the City Council meeting last night. Lot 14, Block 6, was sold to Annie N. Killas and J. N. Killas for \$393; while lot 48, Block 3, was sold to Jas. N. Killas for \$146.

Prince Rupert people are likely to suffer very considerably. Something has happened which will prove a great hardship. Two cars of beef have failed to arrive and for at least a day and perhaps more there will be no sirloin steak or rump roast.

Tenders were ordered to be called for repairs to the garbage wharf, at the meeting of the City Council last night. An offer to do the work for \$550 had been received from Mr. Meuse but it was considered that to let the job without calling for tenders would be contrary to the principal adopted by the Council.

PRINCE JOHN WILL DOCK IN THE SOUTH

CHEQUE CASE IS ADJOURNED

Accused Came to Town to Have Teeth Fixed But Found Liquor and Got into Trouble.

JUDGE YOUNG ASKS FOR FURTHER EVIDENCE

"I am not going to dispose of this case, if it takes a hundred years," exclaimed Judge Young, sitting in the County Court this morning, "until the matter has been thoroughly sifted. I cannot dispose of criminal cases in any such slipshod manner. Some effort ought to have been made to find out who this J. C. Martin is, who drew this cheque, or S. Hamilton, who endorsed it. And the onus lies equally with the prosecution as with the defence."

This remark closed the hearing of the case against H. Durade, who appeared before the judge this morning charged with passing a worthless cheque, on a Chinese restaurateur of Second Avenue. The prosecution was in the hands of H. Young, of the firm of Fisher & Wharton, while L. W. Patmore appeared for the accused.

Cheque Identified. F. A. Saunders, of the Royal Bank, identified the cheque, and told of its being presented after hours by the Chinaman. Kwong San Chong told how he had given an advance payment of \$15 on the cheque and on going to the bank found that there was no account there.

The accused, in the witness box, told of his having come to town from Alice Arm, where he was earning \$160 a month as a cook in the camps, to have his teeth fixed. He had about a month's wages on him on his arrival here, but instead of having his teeth fixed as he intended he spent the time otherwise, as after cashing this cheque which he got from Hamilton over a week after he had been in town, he had only about \$4 left.

A Second Bottle.

Accused had known Hamilton since April and had apparently met this same man every time he came to town. The day he cashed Hamilton's cheque he had a bottle and Hamilton had a bottle, and after that was finished, they were able to club together to send out for another bottle, which, according to the testimony given, the waiter in the Chinese restaurant brought.

"Drinking seems to be your chief occupation when you are here," remarked Judge Young, "drinking in a prohibition town." "Did you get your teeth fixed?" asked the prosecution. Witness sadly shook his head. "He went on a toot," interjected Mr. Patmore.

"Write your name here, requested the judge, handing the prisoner a sheet of paper. "Write J. C. Martin's name, write S. Hamilton's name. "Write thirty-five."

After this was done the handwriting was compared with the cheque and handed to counsel for comparison. Points of similarity were seen and disputed.

Asked where Hamilton was now the accused said he did not know. "Did you make any effort to restore the \$15 to the Chinaman?" asked the judge. "I never had a chance," replied the prisoner. "I told him if he would wait for half an hour I would get right after the thing, but I was locked up, and have been ever since."

Hamilton, who is reputed to be a fisherman, has not turned up so far, and he said he worked for J. C. Martin, who gave him the cheque.

No One Knows. No one in court, however, knew Martin, and no one except the accused knew Hamilton. "It is just possible," remarked Mr. Patmore, "that Martin has drawn the cheque on the right bank, but on the wrong branch. It is numbered 161, and seems to be a bona-fide cheque." The Court agreed, but inquired what had been done to find out who or what manner of man Martin was. Judge Young was not satisfied that everything had been done to bring out all the facts of the case. "Sufficient information is not before the Court," he said. His Honor held that if the accused were innocent, his story was a very simple one, but that, on the other hand, were he not, to permit counsel to dig up more it was an equally simple matter information.
