ANOTHER GREAT VICTORY

GERMANY GETS FORCEFUL ANSWER TO RECENT PEACE PROPOSALS

CAMBRAI IS TAKEN AT LAST AFTER FIERCE FIGHTING AND 8000 PRISONERS WITH IT

Victory Announced on Wide Front and Hindenburg System of Defense Broken and Partly Destroyed by British and American Forces; Tanks Co-operated.]

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, October 9.—Cambrai has fallen! After being re-captured several times previously, the official announcement now made of the surrender of the German garrison holds an important centre of defence to the enemy. The city, or what is left of it, is now securely in the hands of the Allies, and some 8,000 prisoners with the town. And thus another closes in the chequered history of one of the oldest fighting places in Europe. For hundreds of years back, this city of Cambrai has been fought for by various opposing armies. It has been an important place, but never has its importance been so great as it has lately been to the German armies in the West. With its loss the whole of the Hindenburg line is rapidly falling up and the main German armies are seeking a place of more secure.

Operating on Wide Front.
The British armies were operating on a wide front of twenty miles extending from the region of Cambrai southward towards St. Quentin, and they have simply walked through the opposing German positions. They have achieved a great victory which will undoubtedly have far-reaching results, especially at this particular juncture.

The particulars of the great attack have not come to hand in sufficient detail to know that the victory has been won; that the Hindenburg system south of Cambrai has been broken up to considerable depth; that elsewhere the main lines of the Hindenburg system have been penetrated; that the city of Cambrai has been captured with 8,000 prisoners, and the Hindenburg line has been turned by these operations to the south.

Aided By Tanks.
Fast whippet tanks and armored cars are reported to have been in action with great success, and they are said to have exercised the success to the utmost. American forces participated with the British in the centre, and their initial rush forward carried them far more deeply into the German positions than was intended.

REGIAN STEAMER HAS BEEN TORPEDOED

Stockholm, October 9.—The Regian steamship Gjertrud, 1,000 tons gross, has been torpedoed by a German submarine. Members of the crew, including four Swedes, are missing.

SALE OF CITY LOTS TAKING PLACE TODAY

Bidding Brisk at Opening, With E. A. Woods Wielding The Hammer.

The City Council chamber was filled to overflowing at the sale of city lots for taxes this afternoon. The sale was advertised to take place at noon, but with that dilatoriness which is becoming customary in this city, the sale did not start until 12:45.

Before putting up any of the lots for auction, E. A. Woods informed the public that the Custodian of Alien Enemy Property had taken possession of all the property belonging to Alphonso Thorsch, which had been advertised to be sold. The auctioneer also read the conditions of sale, and after that he put the lots up singly. Mr. Woods makes a good auctioneer and his eagle eye misses no bid. The first lot was knocked down to A. P. McCorkindale, and after that bidding became brisk. It is hoped that the sale will be concluded this afternoon.

Washington, Oct. 9.—American shipyards established another world's record in September by delivering 74 vessels, of 362,635 deadweight tons.

AMERICANS ARE PUSHING NORTH

Three Thousand Prisoners Have Been Taken in Desperate Fight—Tropoff Assassinated.

Received 2:45 p. m.
With the American Army Northwest of Verdun, October 9.—The American troops, in company with the French, have captured Brabant, Hautmont, Beaumont and Consenvoy. They are pushing the enemy northward in a desperate fight. Three thousand prisoners have been taken.
Paris, October 9.—The Germans have invented an inflammable projectile for air attacks against which water is ineffective.
Geneva, October 9.—German airplanes attacked a Swiss captive balloon, causing an officer in the balloon to be burned to death.
Stockholm, October 9.—Alexander Tropoff, former Russian premier, has been assassinated.

EMDEN COMMANDER HAS BEEN RELEASED

Amsterdam, October 9.—Capt. von Mueller, famous for his exploits while commander of the German cruiser Emden early in the war, has been released from internment in Holland, owing to the state of his health.

AMERICANS AND BRITISH DRIVE GERMANS BACK ON FRONT OVER TWENTY MILES

ADVANCE MADE OF OVER THREE MILES IN ONE SECTOR; AMERICANS FORCE THEIR WAY FORWARD TWO MILES IN CHAMPAGNE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, October 9.—The Anglo-American attack was resumed this morning on the entire front south of Cambrai and rapid progress is being made.
The British and Americans have advanced to a depth of about three miles along a twenty-mile front in their great attack between St. Quentin and Cambrai.
North and South Carolina and Tennessee troops charged Brancourt and Premont, making an advance in these operations of more than three miles.
Paris, October 9.—Franco-Americans in Champagne have driven the Germans over nearly two miles north of St. Pierre, captured the plateau northeast of Autry and taken numerous prisoners. The French northeast of St. Quentin have captured Fontaine Uterle, Bellecourt Farm, the village of Rouvrois and other important positions. More than 1,200 Germans have been made prisoners in this region.

WILSON SENDS AN ANSWER TO GERMAN NOTE

Refuses an Armistice While the Armies of Central Powers Are on Invaded Soil.

DOES GERMANY SPEAK FOR PEOPLE OR MASTERS?

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, October 9.—President Wilson has met Germany's note with a move which will at one stroke develop whether her proposal is sincere or merely pretension and if pretension it be, fully justify for all time before the world the prolonging of the war to the utmost force without stint or limit. At the same time the president has left a wide open door to peace.

Declining the proposed armistice while the armies of the Central Powers remain on invaded soil, the President called on the German Chancellor to state as an absolutely necessary preliminary to a reply from the Entente Allies and the United States, whether Germany accepts the principles of peace so repeatedly laid down, or merely proposes to accept them as a basis of negotiations, and whether the Chancellor merely speaks for the German military masters conducting the war, or for the whole German people.

Among diplomats here President Wilson's communication is regarded as one of his master strokes.

MUCH DAMAGE FROM A GAS EXPLOSION

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
St. Catharines, Ont., October 9.—An explosion of natural gas in the basement of a large confectionery store on the main thoroughfare here caused damage to the amount of \$20,000. The whole lower part of the building was blown out, rendering the upper stories unsafe. There was a large stock which was scattered all around the neighborhood, and considerable damage has been caused to other business premises and their contents which were adjacent.

CATHOLIC BAZAAR OPENED TODAY WITH MANY ATTRACTIONS

Colorfully Decorated Stalls, where Attractive Ladies Vend All Sorts of Delights—Formal Opening at 8.

The big Catholic Bazaar was open for business this afternoon and a number of people attended but the big formal opening will take place tonight at 8, when Mayor McClymont and Father McGrath will give addresses.

The Italian store is in charge of Mrs. D. McDonald; the United States, of Mrs. (Capt.) Meagher; France, Mrs. McNulty, and Canada presided over by Mrs. Nickerson. Mrs. Dan Morrissey is in charge of a stall of British goods and there is another stall where the prizes for the raffles are exhibited. The wheel of fortune is in charge of Meagher Brothers.

The ladies have been very busy decorating and making the bare hall into a fairyland where today and tomorrow many Prince Rupert people will spend their spare time. It is a big social event as well as a means of making money. Refreshments are served there and it is a popular headquarters for all citizens.

GENERAL ALLENBY'S FORCES ARE DRIVING THE TURKS NORTHWARD IN SYRIA AND CAPTURING MANY TOWNS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 9.—In Palestine General Allenby reports excellent progress. The occupation of the port of Beyrout by the French naval forces has been followed by the capture of Saïda, twenty miles to the north. The possession of Beyrout is of real importance to the Allied forces owing to the direct communication it affords with Damascus and the availability of sea transport for stores and reinforcements.

General Sir Edmund Allenby has also advanced northward of Damascus and has occupied Zahleh and Rayak, 33 miles away. The British are thus well on the way to Aleppo and are apparently encountering little serious resistance.

Rayak is the point at which the enemy broad-gauge railway from the north joins the Metro Gauge System in Palestine. The latter system therefore is entirely in the hands of the British.

Make Victory Loan a Success.

Citizens of Canada will now bend their energies toward making the Victory Loan a success.

When the dispatch came through that the Germans were suing for peace it was the general opinion that no consideration whatever should be given to the proposal. People who feel that way must pay the bills of keeping the army in the field. Practically everyone feels that the sacrifices have been so great that it would be wicked to give away the opportunity to settle the big fight right. The Germans are not yet ready for peace, no matter what their protestations may be. They are not yet in the mood to treat with the Allies in, what we should call, a reasonable manner. It must be "fight on" for some months to come. Another winter probably will have to be spent in the field. Many more victories must be won and many sacrifices made before the end. To do this much money will be required and the Canadian Government is now asking that this money be raised during one big campaign, which is to start at the end of this month and last for several weeks. That the response will be such as to do credit to the district is certain.

Red Cross Will Be Needed For Some Time.

As long as the war lasts and for a long time after the Red Cross must continue its work. It seems trite to mention any of the work that is done by this wonderful organization, so well is it known throughout the world. Here in Prince Rupert the people are doing their share and it is necessary to keep it up. There is a general meeting of the organization advertised for tonight and doubtless the attendance there will be such as to encourage the workers to continue their labors for the good cause. To keep up the enthusiasm year after year is difficult. Now that the end is in sight, however, it is no time to slacken. Let Prince Rupert do her bit in Red Cross work as in every other line of patriotic endeavor.

Pathetic Side of World Struggle.

Well may the poet sing, "that man's inhumanity to man makes countless thousands mourn." Permanent peace may be a dream as described by General von Moltke and it may not be a beautiful dream, but if "war is an essential element of God's scheme of the world," then the time has arrived when such essential elements shall be dispensed with, and the followers of the "God of War" shall suffer by the hands of man.

It may be "the law of life and development in history that where two national civilizations meet they fight for ascendancy." Better far that our generation threw aside all history and brought forth something more prolific of good after two thousand years of so-called Christian teaching. Better far that we all should perish than that such doctrines shall gain the ascendancy through the sacrifices we have made in our day and generation to suppress nations sated with lust for destruction of all we hold dear.

The mountain of Prussianism has labored and has brought forth a mouse! Teuton ideas and ideals have been blasted by the fire of experience, but the seething cauldron required the flesh and blood of the bravest and best to temper the ring of steel that will encircle a world flawless and everlasting.

FRANK MOBLEY TELLS OF ATLIN COUNTRY

Representative of District Enthusiasts Over It and Tells of Mining Operations There.

"The Provincial Government mining engineers went into Atlin with me and they had the time of their lives," said Frank H. Mobley, M.P.P. for Atlin, who returned from his constituency a few days ago. They were very enthusiastic over the visit and said that they would not have believed there could be such extent of country and so much beauty so far north.

They went in by way of the Porcupine at the extreme north-west section of the province on the old Daulton trail and motored all over the country, examining the mines and seeing the district. Speaking of the season, Mr. Mobley says that the output has been reduced 25 per cent. this year on account of the difficulty in securing men. In spite of this however mining is more profitable than it ever has been, because the methods are improved. Whereas formerly it was possible only to make four-ounce ground pay they can now work two-ounce ground and make profits.

Mr. Mobley's own property is operating in a small way; Ruby Creek hydraulic mine has done very well; Boulder Creek, fair; at Birch Creek there has been a scarcity of water, therefore the output has been small; Pine Creek has had a fair season; McKee Creek did practically nothing on account of having to cut through a new channel; Otter Creek has had a good output and all the individual mines have given good returns. The general output, however, has not been more than sixty per cent. of that in former years.

Mr. Mobley brought home with him a fine lot of pictures of the neighborhood, of the lakes and glaciers and rivers and cloud effects and hunting scenes and game and mining operations. Judging from these it must be indeed a splendid country.

THOMSON BECOMES FUR TRADE COMMISSIONER

Winnipeg, October 8.—N. H. Bacon, the fur trade commissioner of the Huron's Bay Company, has resigned his position with the company. He will be succeeded by James Thomson, the company's land commissioner, who will occupy both positions.

Mr. Thomson of the Hudson's Bay Company has many acquaintances in this city and is expected to arrive here some time this month. He has been with the Hudson's Bay Company for many years, and is well known all through this Western and Northern country. James T. Allen, of the Kelly, Douglas Company here, is a nephew of Mr. Thomson's.

Now that the road to the mill is completed the Prince Rupert Lumber Company is ready to deliver lumber to the local trade. Orders may be placed with Albert & McCaffery.



NOT RESIGNING

London, October 9.—There have been reports to the effect that General Sir Arthur Currie is about to relinquish command of the Canadian forces in France. This is officially denied.

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SOLDIERS' DEPENDENTS TO GET MORE MONEY

Major Margison, chairman of the Pay and Allowance Board at Ottawa, has been visiting the west with a view to finding out whether it is necessary to increase the allowance to the dependents of soldiers. He says that the complaints of inadequate allowances have come exclusively from Western points, and therefore the present scale is presumably not an actual hardship in the other portions of Canada. On these grounds he claimed that a heavy increase in the allowances paid throughout Canada would be unjustifiable, there being many districts where such a course is not necessary. In places such as Vancouver, Victoria, Calgary or Winnipeg, Major Margison was convinced that the present scale was altogether inadequate, and he asked the members of the Great War Veterans' Association if they thought a system which placed each district on its own merits as to the amount paid dependents would not be better than a flat rate all over the country. He felt that a small increase was due all the dependents, but that the granting of a general heavy increase would not be justified and that additional payments to those residing in the districts affected by the war industries prosperity would meet the need of the case, without unnecessary expense to the country as a whole for payments to those residing where the present allowances are sufficient, or so nearly so that a small general increase in the monthly cheque will be sufficient.

Thousands of men are urgently needed on farms in this province to make possible increased production of food. Those who could go and yet hold back, should not forget that, unless production is greatly increased, hundreds of thousands of people will die of starvation.

In the War Garden?

By growing vegetables in home gardens or on vacant lots, and thus helping to feed themselves, city and town people can leave the farmers free to grow more food for export. All that is produced in this way is gain and a net addition to the national food supply.

War Garden service is not sufficient for the man whose rightful place is on the farm. But the War Garden does offer an opportunity for tens of thousands of people, whose circumstances oblige them to remain in the city, to have at least a small part as food producers. Interest the boys and girls in the War Garden, for they too can help to grow food. If there is a garden or vacant lot movement in your community associate yourself with it. If no organization exists, do what you can to interest your neighbours in the War Garden campaign.

Registration of United States Citizens

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGES 21 to 30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGISTERED POST with the registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and such CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 and 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the ten days next FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918.

It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, AND INCLUDES ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, OR HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local postmasters for despatch to the proper registrar, under the Military Service Act.

Notice--Military Service Act, 1917 Men Exempted As Farmers

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms which are actually contributing to the national food supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS 1 POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS, which is expiring, and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT, SHOULD communicate with the registrars under the Military Service Act OF THEIR RESPECTIVE DISTRICTS, REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the national food supply.

2. In order to facilitate productive employment during the winter months, MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS SHOULD APPLY TO THE REGISTRARS FOR PERMITS TO ENGAGE FOR THE WINTER IN SOME OCCUPATION OF NATIONAL INTEREST, SUCH AS LUMBERING, MUNITION WORK, ETC. Such permits will serve to enable exempted farmers to pursue other useful occupations for the months during which farming operations cannot be carried on.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may receive another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without improvement condition. Previous statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement condition.
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the allotment from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold in public auction.

INDIAN DRUNK WITH AKSHIMA IS CONVICTED

George Williams and Kate Ryan Had Been Intoxicated for Week When Caught By Police.

Dominion Constable Watkinson and Provincial Constable Logan recently made a raid on the Naas Indians and arrested George Williams of Aiyansh and brought him to town where he was yesterday convicted of having intoxicated liquor in his possession. He was tried before C. C. Perry, Indian agent, and judgment was reserved. He is an old offender, having served six months in a recent occasion.

With Williams when the raid was made was Kate Ryan, the woman who it is alleged makes the liquor. They were at a point about eighty miles up the river and were both intoxicated and in a filthy condition.

The liquor they make is known as akshimal, a native drink manufactured from berries, yeast and sugar, pain killer and other ingredients. It is allowed to ferment and when ready for drinking contains a large amount of alcohol.

Judging from appearances the two Indians had been drinking for a week or more and were in a horrible condition. The woman is of a chief's family and she, in common with a number of the chiefs, are among the leaders in the vice of making and drinking the native liquor. A writ has been issued for her arrest and she will be brought here for trial very soon. At the time when caught she was too drunk to be removed.

FRENCH FARMERETTES CARRY ON DURING WAR

Canada loves to tell of her girl heroes of pioneer days. For generations and even centuries some of the present war farmerette heroines of France will be remembered. Among these is a girl of fourteen living at Morannes in the Loire. Her mother was dead and she was "little mother" to three younger than herself. Her father was called to the colors and marched away, leaving a large farm to the care of this already too-heavily burdened child. She managed the farm so well, however, that the Prefet of the Maine et Loire thanked her publicly.

Two young sisters say their three brothers march away to war and found themselves responsible for a sixty-acre farm, twenty-five cows and five horses. They "carried on" valiantly and cheerfully to the benefit of the community where they lived. At the other end of the line stand the old grandmothers, whose life of heavy toil seemed ended and who were enjoying a well-earned release from responsibilities. Upon these war has laid a heavy hand, and among the ruins of their beloved homes they have planted vegetables; over the shell torn and down-trodden fields they have attempted to guide the plough and sow the crops. That was in 1916, and still goes on, and yet the farmerette is mentioned in Canada as more or less of a novelty in 1918! What a contrast between the flower-bedecked meadows of Canada and the shell-torn fields of France! But surely the spirit that animates the women in both lands is the same.
