According to the account published in the Labor Gazette, two coal miners were refused admission to a union and as a result they were unable to secure employment. Not being able to sue the union because it was not incorporated | the men sued the officers and members of the union individually with the result that they secured damages to the amount of |* \$435.62 for loss of wages and \$100 general damages with costs. |* The argument used in trying the case was that they were wrongfully excluded contrary to the constitution of the union and were deprived of a civil right as a consequence. This seems to place the trades union in the light of a public institution with a public duty to perform.

Work for Men at Front Done Locally.

The summarized reports of the local Red Cross societies is a splendid record of work done to help the men who are fighting our battles. The total money raised, including the amount sent to the prisoners of war, amounts to \$15,835 and all the expense incurred in doing it was only \$115. Added to that is the work done by the ladies and donated which is valued at over \$3,000 and the car load of sphagnum moss which commercially is valued at not less than \$2,000, making a grand total of approximately \$21,000 for this district alone for Red Cross purposes during the year just completed. It was hardly to be wondered at that the society should return to office the men and women who had done such fine work, the exception being in the case of Mr. Conway and being in the Municipality of the City who found it impossible to continue as secretary. The society needs no congratulations. The work speaks for itself.



Bewhiskered and bedraggled after weeks of travel in the great silent wilderness of the sub-Arctic, Tom Burns, veteran prospector of three continents, blew into Dawson and is back to stay with the upper Yukon country, says the Dawson News. Burns traveled 560 miles over mountain, muskeg and tangled river bottoms and through dangerous streams in order to get back to Dawson. He came from Nenana, Alaska, the inland terminal of the new American government railway in Alaska.


