British Headquarters in France, October 16,-Since Sunday morning eight of the German front line divisions in Flanders have been flung back broken and confused, while probably all or \* most of the divisions held in reserve behind them received heavy \* gruelling.

This apparently has not been a battle of limited objectives but rather a drive and where towns resisted at all strongly the line has pushed on, closing again beyond and leaving clearing up parties to finish the work.

With the British Army in Flanders, October 16 .- Allied forces driving into Belgium have thrust a wedge across the road from Bruges to Courtai. French cavalry has swept over Lichtorvolde and is advancing to Bruges and the sea.

Winnipeg, October 16 .- Reports received here state that Spanish influenza is spreading rapidly in the prairie towns. There are 150 cases here.

Victoria, October 16,-Eightynine new cases of influenza have been reported here, bringing the total number up to 305. The ...... death list remains at 2.

Vancouver, October 16 .- Spanish influenza cases here now number 312. There have been eight deaths since the outbreak of the disease.

Anyox, October 16 .- There are now over ninety cases of Spanish influenza in this camp. One man died yesterday from the disease.






