MUCH MORE PEACE TALK

TURKEY MUST TREAT WITH GENERAL ALLENBY WILL BE REPLY

GERMANY AND AUSTRIA ARE IN A CHAOTIC CONDITION

TURKEY WILL HAVE TO TREAT WITH GENERAL ALLENBY

AUSTRIA TO BE ASKED TO CUT AWAY FROM HER ALLY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, October 16.—The internal political conditions in Germany and possibly in Austria-Hungary, as well as the military situation are expected to determine the nature and time of the German reply to President Wilson's communication. The President's note has already reached Berlin through the Swiss Foreign Office. Reports reaching Washington through official sources by way of neutral countries not only indicate the existence of almost chaotic conditions in the Central Powers, but it is also said it was Field Marshal von Hindenburg himself who was responsible for the German Government accepting the President's peace terms and seeking an immediate armistice.

Turkey's Position.

London, October 16.—Great Britain's reply to Turkey will be a demand for unconditional surrender. The Turks will be required to negotiate an armistice with General Allenby, commander of the British forces in Palestine and Syria.

Reply to Austria Delayed.

Washington, October 16.—Indications at the White House are that the President's reply to Austria will be delayed several days. There are evidences that when made it will suggest to Austria that if she will disassociate herself from Germany, the United States and her allies will feel disposed to treat her as leniently as possible in the circumstances.

Basel, Switzerland, October 16.—According to Berlin dispatches received here German Socialists have decided in view of the general political situation now to oppose Prince Maximilian of Baden retaining the post of Imperial Chancellor. Advances from Berlin also state that the president of the Reichstag has postponed the sitting of the Reichstag which was to have begun today, reserving to himself the right to summon the legislative body at a later date.

Peace Conference.

Helligoland, October 16.—Brussels is favored as the meeting place for the peace conference.

G. N. R. OIL DOCK GOES UP IN FLAMES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Seattle, October 16.—The Great Northern Railway Company's oil dock at Smith Cove caught fire late last night and at an early hour this morning it was reported would be a total loss. The loss is estimated at several million dollars.

COALITION GOVT. FORMED IN SIBERIA

Vladivostok, Oct. 16.—The coalition of the Omsk and Horvath governments signifies the political amalgamation of western and eastern Siberia. The earliest possible convocation of a Pan-Siberian constituent Assembly and the re-establishment of an anti-German front.

TEWFIK MINISTRY IN TURKEY RESIGNED

Izzet Pasha, a Peace Advocate, is Now Grand Vizier in Place of Pro-German.

Copenhagen, October 16.—The Tewfik ministry in Turkey has resigned and Izzet Pasha has been named Grand Vizier and Minister of War, according to advices from Constantinople received here today.

The Tewfik Ministry was Pro-German and under the dominance of Enver Pasha. Izzet Pasha is an advocate of peace.

The trawler James Carruthers went to sea today after being laid up for about two months.

AMERICANS AGAIN ASSUME THE OFFENSIVE TO NORTH OF VERDUN

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, October 16.—General Pershing reports under date of yesterday: "This morning American troops resumed their advance north of Verdun. They are now operating against positions of greatest strategical and natural strength. Today we passed beyond the towns of Cunel and Romagin. We have patrols in Bois De Bantheville and our attacking line has penetrated positions of St. Georges and Landres St. Georges. About 750 prisoners have been reported taken."

ADVANCES REPORTED BOTH IN SERBIA AND ALBANIA

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, October 16.—Advancing northward from Nish, the Serbian troops on a wide front have captured the heights dominating the banks of southern Moravia, taking 44 field guns. In the capture of Nish a large amount of war material has been seized.

Serbian detachments operating in the Kriva Palanka region report that contrary to the stipulations of the armistice the Fourth Bulgarian Division carried off into Bulgaria approximately 2,700 sheep, 4,000 horses, 13,000 oxen, 1,000 mules and 1,500 wagons.

Rome, October 16.—Italian forces in Albania are storming Austro-Hungarian positions on the heights in front of Durazzo. They penetrated the city yesterday morning taking prisoners and capturing war material.

GERMAN FRONT LINE FLUNG BACK BROKEN AND CONFUSED AS BRITISH DRIVE TOWARDS BRUGES AND ZEEBRUGGE

ADVANCE IN BELGIUM SO RAPID THAT TOWNS ARE LEFT FOR CLEARING UP PARTIES TO DEAL WITH; THOROUT TAKEN AND COURTRAI-BRUGES ROAD IS CROSSED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

British Headquarters in France, October 16.—Since Sunday morning eight of the German front line divisions in Flanders have been flung back broken and confused, while probably all or most of the divisions held in reserve behind them received heavy grueling.

This apparently has not been a battle of limited objectives but rather a drive and where towns resisted at all strongly the line has pushed on, closing again beyond and leaving clearing up parties to finish the work.

With the British Army in Flanders, October 16.—Allied forces driving into Belgium have thrust a wedge across the road from Bruges to Courtrai. French cavalry has swept over Lichtvorde and is advancing to Bruges and the sea.

Haig's men are near Hubourdine, three miles from Lille. Strategic Point Taken.

London, October 16.—In the fighting in Flanders the British have captured Menin, a railway centre of great importance about four miles northwest of Turcoing. The Belgian town of Thorout has been captured by the Allies. Thorout is an important strategic point and is a vital transportation centre. Upon it hinges a large part of the German transportation system.

12,000 Prisoners Taken.

London, October 16.—The British are in the outskirts of Courtrai and have cut the communications of Bruges from the south. Field Marshal Haig's night report on the Flanders operations indicated. Beyond Bruges is Zeebrugge submarine base which is now in imminent peril of capture. Haig has announced the capture of Menin and the taking of 12,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns.

SPANISH INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC CLAIMS MANY MORE VICTIMS

Disease is Spreading Rapidly Throughout Western Canada—Hundreds of Fresh Cases Reported.

The epidemic of Spanish influenza which is sweeping the country has made itself very evident in Prince Rupert, there being many cases which cannot be accommodated in the General Hospital. The number this morning seems to be increasing. Reports received from all over Western Canada disclose the fact that the disease has already claimed hundreds of victims, and the number of new cases reported daily continues large. Reports from various parts is as follows:

Winnipeg, October 16.—Reports received here state that Spanish influenza is spreading rapidly in the prairie towns. There are 150 cases here.

Victoria, October 16.—Eighty-nine new cases of influenza have been reported here, bringing the total number up to 305. The death list remains at 2.

Vancouver, October 16.—Spanish influenza cases here now number 312. There have been eight deaths since the outbreak of the disease.

Anxox, October 16.—There are now over ninety cases of Spanish influenza in this camp. One man died yesterday from the disease.

ITALIAN SQUADRON CROSSES THE ALPS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 16.—A party of hostile planes have been destroyed, six driven down out of control, two brought down and a balloon shot down in flames, was Field Marshal Haig's announcement today.

Rome, October 16.—The Italian War Office announced that an Italian squadron of Caproni airplanes had crossed the Alps and landed at an Italian base in France to be used in conjunction with the Italian forces.

HON. FRANK CARVELL THREATENS STRIKERS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Calgary, October 16.—In an address here Hon. Frank Carvell declared that men who persisted in striking at \$4 and \$5 a day when the flower of the country was fighting at \$1.10 would probably find themselves in khaki if fines and imprisonment did not prove a deterrent.

FRANCE WILL EXACT FULL REPARATION

Foreign Minister Refers Desolation, Devastation and Savagery Which Dishonor German Nation.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, October 16.—During a session in the senate today of the damage suffered by northern France without military justification, Stephen Hichon, French Foreign Minister, reiterated the government's resolution to exact full compensation and reparation. Furthermore, the minister said, this warning has just been given in a decisive form by President Wilson in his admirable reply to proposals from Berlin for an armistice. The President of the United States in whose resolution we have always had entire confidence, has signified that he refuses, like ourselves, to negotiate an armistice with a state whose armies continue to dishonor themselves by acts of desolation, devastation and savagery."

WILSON WILL SUBMIT LABOR POLICY FOR U.S.

Washington, Oct. 16.—President Wilson will soon enunciate a labor policy to be adopted by the Government between capital and workers during the war. He now has before him a report submitted by Felix Frankfurter, the chairman of War Labor Policies Board after conferences between representatives of industry and labor.

According to official figures issued by Ottawa, up to the present thirty-two Canadian soldiers have been awarded the Victoria Cross "for valor." In analysing the total, it is found that of the thirty-two, fifteen were Canadian born, five English, four Irish, six Scotch, one Russian, and one American.

No Peace With Kaiserism, Autocracy Must Go.

President Wilson is a literary man as well as a statesman and some of his utterances bid well to become classics. When he made the momentous statement yesterday that there must be "No peace with Kaiserism" and "Autocracy must go" he used words which will go down into history and will be quoted again and again wherever autocracy and Kaiserism dares to raise its head.

The people of Prince Rupert and doubtless the people of the rest of the civilized world were overjoyed to read the manly message of the head of the great republic. There was a fear in the minds of many that there might be some weakening. Everywhere on the streets people were discussing the probable outcome and the general verdict was "I hope Wilson will hold out for a general surrender and I think he will." That is what he has done. He has practically referred the Huns to the tender mercies of Foch, the only man who is in a position to talk to a Hun in the language he understands.

War Not Won By Any Means.

The war is not won, even though the enemy admits himself beaten. Even if fighting stopped today it would be necessary to foot big bills and provide for bringing the men back and re-establishing them in civil life. To do this those at home must pay and pay well. There is a Victory Loan to be launched soon and all must unite in buying the securities to the utmost of their ability.

In the United States they know how to manage this thing. They found out the men who were not making purchases and they had quiet interviews, quiet but firm, and the result was that big bundles of bonds were purchased by men who were not in sympathy with the war and who did not intend to contribute. The man who does not buy bonds this time is with the enemy. None is so poor that he cannot afford to purchase at least one, and this is the time to prepare. The campaign commences at the end of the month.

Fishermen Want Better Protection.

The fishermen who make this their home port are asking that they be given better protection from the southwest winds that now and then cause a commotion among the smaller fishing boats in the harbor.

The Provincial Government has set aside a sum of money to construct a suitable float where the boats would be protected. They say that they are unable to proceed, however, on account of the fact that they have no title to the land. The Mayor and Council say that they will not consent to the Government getting title to the land unless the city gets a piece of waterfront. Meanwhile the fishermen are running great risks.

Possibly the authorities do not realize what it means to the fishermen to have a safe place where they can tie their boats. They must have it or they will not winter here. What they want is a place right in the city. They also want it now and not at some indefinite future time. This is the time to encourage the fishermen to stay here, instead of taking their boats to Seattle as some of them are doing.

The fishing industry is the most important industry Prince Rupert has. It brings thousands of dollars a year to the city. It is the mainstay of the place, yet little is done to encourage it. It is a shame that some little difference of opinion over the ownership of a lot should be allowed to keep business away from the place and endanger the boats of those who stay here. Possibly a public meeting to discuss the situation might be of benefit. Such a meeting should not be necessary, however. The proper conveniences for the fishermen should be built at any cost and nothing should be allowed to stand in the way.

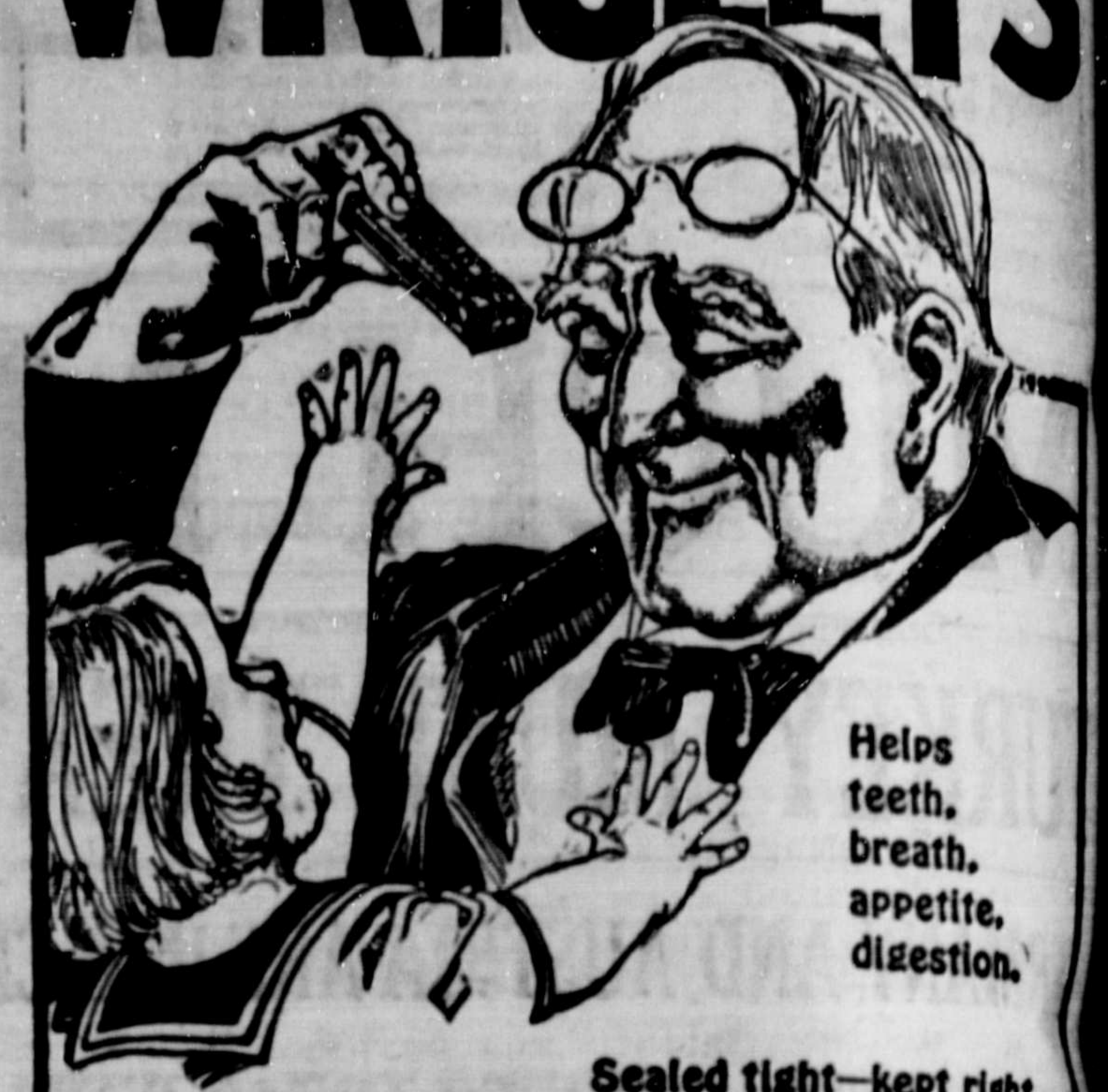

WHALING STATIONS ARE BEING CLOSED

Catch at Naden Harbor is 110 and the Total Kill of the Company is 978.

The whaling season is about over and the station at Naden Harbor is being closed. The catch at that point this year up to a week ago was 110.

All records since the big season of 1911 have been lowered by the whale "kill" this year. Since the beginning of the 1918 season nearly one thousand whales have been taken by the combined fleets controlled by the Consolidated Whaling Corporation, Ltd., with William Schupp, of Toronto, as president; W. A. Lawson, vice-president, and S. C. Ruck, general manager. The operating headquarters of the concern are at Victoria. The big merger, as previously announced, also takes in the American-Pacific Whaling Company, and the North Pacific Sea Products Company. The British Columbia whaling stations are located at Kyuquot, Rose Harbor and Naden Harbor, the other stations being at Bay City, Wash., and at Akutan, Alaska.

How Stations Stand.

The combined catch of these whaling stations for the season to date, announced at the company's headquarters, is as follows: Kyuquot, 245; Rose Harbor, 140; Naden Harbor, 110; Bay City, 183; Akutan, 300; total, 978. As the whaling operations will continue until the latter part of the present month, should good weather continue, there is a healthy prospect of the 1,000 mark being exceeded.

Kyuquot is the big British Columbia station with 245 mammals but this splendid catch has been overshadowed by the remarkable kill at Akutan, in the far flung Aleutians.

Bound for Akutan.

The Consolidated Whaling Corporation has chartered the steamer Redwood of the American-Pacific Fisheries, to make a voyage to Akutan. By the time the Redwood reaches Akutan the Aleutian station will have closed down for the winter. The station crew will go south on the Redwood, which will also carry a full cargo of whale oil.

Unpopular.

An unpopular officer, in the British army one night slipped into some deep water and a private who happened to see the accident pulled him out. The officer was very profuse in his thanks and asked his rescuer how he could reward him.

"The very best way you can reward me," replied the private, "is to say nothing about it."



**WILLIAM MARTIN IS
SANITARY INSPECTOR**

**Received Appointment Last Night
With Two Aldermen Opposing
—Said to Be Fearless.**

At the meeting of the City Council last evening William Martin was appointed Sanitary Inspector in connection with his other duties. The move was recommended by the Works Committee and opposed by Aldermen Smith and Rochester, who favored making the engineer responsible and allowing Mr. Martin to work under him.

Alderman Casey, chairman of the Board of Works, explained that the real head of the department would be a doctor and if the inspector had to refer to the engineer and the engineer to the doctor there would be a double reference which would not make for efficiency.

Alderman McMeekin objected to further delay. Martin was a man who did not care a rap for anybody and that was the kind of man who was needed.

Alderman Smith while acknowledging that Mr. Martin had done good work during the past two weeks, was opposed to opening a new office.

Alderman Rochester said he thought it would be wise to put the offices under one head. The number of officials had been the talk of the town. There was not enough work for a man to do as sanitary inspector. There was no reason why one man should not do all the outside work.

The mayor explained that the inspector had a number of other duties to perform, some of which took him out at night.

**COUNCIL VOTES CASH
FOR THE HOSPITAL**

The City Council decided last night on the advice of the Finance Committee to pay over to the Hospital Board the sum of \$5,000 at once. This amount had been promised if all the taxes came in, and provided the taxes were not all paid the amount the hospital was to get was to be in proportion to the amount collected. The tax collections have been less than seventy per cent. of the total amount but in view of the need of the hospital just now the full amount was paid.

Extra accommodation has to be found at once at the hospital for the patients who are coming in with influenza.

THE POLICE COURT

Two cases at the police court this morning had to be adjourned owing to the ravages of Spanish influenza, which prevented the necessary witnesses from appearing.

Judgment was given in the Chinese gambling case, which was dismissed. The magistrate considered that there was insufficient evidence to prove that the premises were being conducted as a gambling house, within the meaning of the law. It was not denied that the men were gambling, but there was nothing to prove that the house made any gain from the games. The money which was on the table when the raid took place will be returned.

J. E. Umbach, provincial surveyor-general, arrived in town today on his way up country. Mr. Umbach will visit the lakes district between the Bulkley and the Nechaco valleys, and also the areas under the new Land Settlement Board.
