## ENEMY RETIRES SLOWLY

### KING ALBERT AND QUEEN ELIZABETH ENTER BRUGES TO-DAY

#### BELGIAN RULERS ENTERED BRUGES THIS MORNING; NEW DEFENSE LINE OF ENEMY

ALL AVAILABLE RESERVES OF GERMANS HAVE BEEN  
ENGAGED AND SHORTAGE OF HIGH EX-  
PLOSIVE SHELLS HANDICAP  
THEM

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

British Headquarters in Flanders, October 19.—Belgian in-  
fantry forces entered Bruges today. King Albert and Queen  
Elizabeth of Belgium entered the town at 10 o'clock this morning.  
The French have captured Thielt in Belgian Flanders, West  
Flanders, and have passed on 2,000 yards east of the town. The  
enemy is still resisting strongly all along the line between Bruges  
and Cambrai, but retiring slowly northeast of Leferre.

British Headquarters in France, October 19.—A new German  
line of defense from Antwerp through Namur to Sedan is under-  
stood to be in course of construction. It is considered likely that  
the main bulk of the German armies or rather what is left of the  
main bulk in this section of the front is on the way to the Wotan  
line, though it is quite possible it may try to make a stand  
somewhere on this side of these positions. If a stand is made,  
however, the Germans will have to depend upon what troops they  
now have in Belgium. All these appear to have been engaged  
recently, and some have suffered terrible losses. From informa-  
tion received yesterday afternoon, it seems that all the available  
reserves of the enemy north of the river Lys have now been en-  
gaged.

Few, if any, divisions can be spared from any other section  
of the front. Moreover, it is now certain that the Germans, in  
addition to their other difficulties, are seriously handicapped by  
shortage of high explosive shells.

#### SIZES POSTPONED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

#### VOLUNTEERS ASKED TO AID IN COPING WITH INFLUENZA

Borden Street School to Be Equip-  
ped Temporarily as Hospital  
—Beds Are Expected  
Monday.

There was a joint meeting last  
evening in the City Hall of the  
City Council, the Hospital Board  
and the Medical Association, to  
consider ways and means of best  
taking care of the situation  
brought about through the spread  
of the influenza epidemic.

The Hospital Board has ordered  
more beds, which will arrive on  
Monday. Not only will every inch  
of their accommodation at the  
hospital be filled but as this is  
insufficient it was decided to uti-  
lize the Borden Street school as  
an auxiliary hospital.

The Immigration Department  
have some twenty-five beds avail-  
able, which have never been used  
and they will be turned in, and  
Dr. Young, the provincial health  
officer, has been wired to send  
five graduate nurses and three  
trained male orderlies.

There are numerous cases in  
the city where whole households  
have been laid up, and there is no  
one left to attend them. Volun-  
teers are being asked to cope with  
the situation, and those house-  
holds who have spare beds which  
might be loaned for the occasion  
are asked to notify the hospital.

The number of cases reported  
continues to increase, and from  
the reports being brought in from  
the outside districts, the epidemic  
is claiming many more.

A request has come to the  
mayor for assistance from Thur-  
ston Harbor, where there are many  
patients and a shortage of both  
help and accommodation.

Gus Wick of White Lunch Was

Gus Wick was the owner of the  
White Lunch, the popular little  
restaurant near the corner of  
Sixth Street, and was well known  
in town. In 1912 he was cook in

completion of the work at the  
drydock in 1915, and had a wide  
circle of acquaintances.

As well as the White Lunch, he  
also conducted the Kaien Rooms  
on Third Avenue.

Wick and her little son in their  
bereavement.

### CITY OF PRAGUE SEIZED BY CZECHS AND THEIR FLAG FLIES OVER CASTLE

Copenhagen, October 19.—The rebellion seems to be on in  
earnest in Bohemia against the Austrians. This section of the  
country has been half hearted throughout the war and now at  
last it has broken away.

The Czech forces are masters of Prague, according to a  
Berlin dispatch to the Berlinke Tidende. A provisional govern-  
ment has been formed there and already Czech money is in  
circulation and the Czech flag waves over Hradschin Castle.

This outbreak is the culmination of a long period of ferment.  
By strenuous efforts the Austrian Government has been able to  
hold the Czechs down, but their opportunity has come and they  
have at last broken away.

### BRITISH STRAIGHTEN LINES AND MAKE CONSIDERABLE GAINS TO THE EAST OF DOUAI

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

British Army Headquarters in France, October 19.—Once  
more have the Germans been forced out of wide strips of land  
all the way from the North Sea to the region east of St. Quentin.

The greatest Allied gains today seem to have been made east  
of Douai where the British have cut off a slice of the Lille salient.  
Last reports received indicate that the British have reached posi-  
tions close to the junction of the Senee river and Lescaut canal,  
north of Cambrai and gained ground about five miles east of  
Douai. Steadily and not without some rapidity the battle line is  
being straightened and Lille salient shortly should be obliterated.

### FORTY HAVE JOINED CANADIAN FLYERS

Some Will Be Trained at Once;  
Others Placed on Reserve  
List.

The establishment of an air  
service in Canada, intended pri-  
marily for the defence of the  
Canadian coast during war, has  
been completed by the Naval De-  
partment.

Early in 1918, in view of anti-  
cipated activities along the Cana-  
dian coasts by German subma-  
rines, the Government considered  
additional protective measures ad-  
visable. It was decided to estab-  
lish an air service to operate in  
conjunction with the Naval patrol.  
The organization of the new ser-  
vice was placed in charge of the  
Naval Department. An experi-  
enced air service officer was bor-  
rowed from the British Admiralty  
to investigate thoroughly the best  
means advisable to put the new  
force into action. Acting upon  
his recommendations, the Naval  
Department obtained the services  
of additional flight officers from  
England, and also of an experi-  
enced civil engineer from the  
United States. These officers ar-  
rived in Canada on Dominion Day  
and have since been working out  
the detailed organization in con-  
junction with the Naval authori-  
ties at Ottawa.

The new service is known as the  
Royal Canadian Naval Air Service  
and the ranks of officers and men  
are the same as those formerly  
in use in the Royal Naval Air Ser-  
vice. A large number of applica-  
tions have been filed with the Air  
Section, Naval Department, Ot-  
tawa, for entry as Flight Cadets.  
About forty cadets have already  
been accepted and will commence  
training immediately. Other ap-  
plicants are being interviewed,  
and if accepted, will be sent to  
England or the United States for  
training. For the first enlistment  
of cadets, efforts are being made  
to give each province the propor-  
tion due according to its popula-  
tion. Suitable applicants whose  
services are not required im-  
mediately will be placed on the re-  
serve list for future call.

#### DAYLIGHT SAVING MAY BE CONTINUED

Should the bill passed by the  
United States Senate providing  
for the continuance in force of  
the daylight saving law after Oc-  
tober 27 become law, it is prac-  
tically certain that the Dominion  
government will take similar ac-  
tion.

The United States bill is de-  
signed to effect economy of fuel  
and, apart from the inconvenience  
that will result from a difference  
in time in the two countries, Can-  
ada has adopted practically all  
fuel conservation measures made  
effective in the United States.

#### PRICE OF WHITEFISH

The price of whitefish at the  
interior lakes of the prairies has  
been set by the Canada Food  
Board at from seven to eight and  
a half cents a pound. The re-  
tailer is allowed to charge three  
cents a pound over and above  
these prices in addition to the  
freight charges.

## Bolshevism And Ignorance.

It is estimated that ten per cent. of the Russians are Bolsheviks, ten per cent. Royalists and the other eighty per cent. are non-extremists who want a stable form of government, but will not stand for the excesses of the Royalists or the Bolsheviks. It is only the excesses of the Royalists that has made the rule of the Bolsheviks possible.

Just now Russia is the happy hunting ground of the professional agitator, the man who refuses to work but who lives by playing on the emotions of his fellows.

The Bolsheviks resemble very closely the syndicalists of England and the I. W. W. of America. They believe in the rule of the ignorant and the least fit. Their pet method is to cause confusion everywhere in the hope that the mob may get a chance to plunder at the expense of the intelligent. That is what happened in Russia, but it was possible only because the Russians had had no training in self government. Where the people have been taught to think for themselves, to reason things out, and to arrive at sane conclusions there is no danger of Bolshevism getting a foothold. It is among the ignorant that it flourishes.

## Education the Cure For Ills of State.

Education is the cure for all the ills of the State. Education of the right sort give the citizens ballast, makes them intelligent and puts them on their guard against the professional agitator with his suave manner and persuasive method. With an educated people, educated in self government and with practical experience along those lines, the people realize that they have all the power there is and that they can do better by constitutional methods what the syndicalists would do by destructive agencies.

## TRUE Education, Not Book Learning.

It must not be thought that mere book learning is education. It is simply a means of education. Boys and girls are taught to read, write and cypher so that in after years they may be able to educate themselves. A smattering of education may be given with book learning, sometimes a great deal, but reading and writing are merely the tools which the man uses as he develops his own intelligence.

Education is something which cannot be imparted. It is imbibed and developed by the person himself. By providing the necessary aids the process can be made comparatively easy. By providing the urge, action is likely to follow. Stimulus is the great thing, and personal contact does more to provide it than all the institutions in the world. One live educator in a community is worth all the schools in the country. The educator is one who rouses the community to its needs, who stimulates young and old to read and study, to see things from the right angle, to develop the mind, to get out of the slough of carelessness and predisposed habit.

## Age of Reason And of Reform.

He would be an ignorant person who would try to argue that the present state of society is all right, that there are no abuses to be sloughed off, no methods to be reformed. Barnacles have to be scraped from the ship of state now and then, and sometimes it is necessary to rebuild the ship, but that is no excuse for building a square ship nor a round one. The general form must be the same, although the lines may be improved and the machinery which is installed should be up to date.

It is quite possible, even probable, that after the war there will be changes. To stick one's head in a hole like an ostrich will not prevent them coming, neither will stubborn opposition nor manifestations of autocracy. This is an age of reason and if the mass of the people do not reason right, it is largely the fault of those who have had the opportunity to put them in the way of educating themselves but have failed.

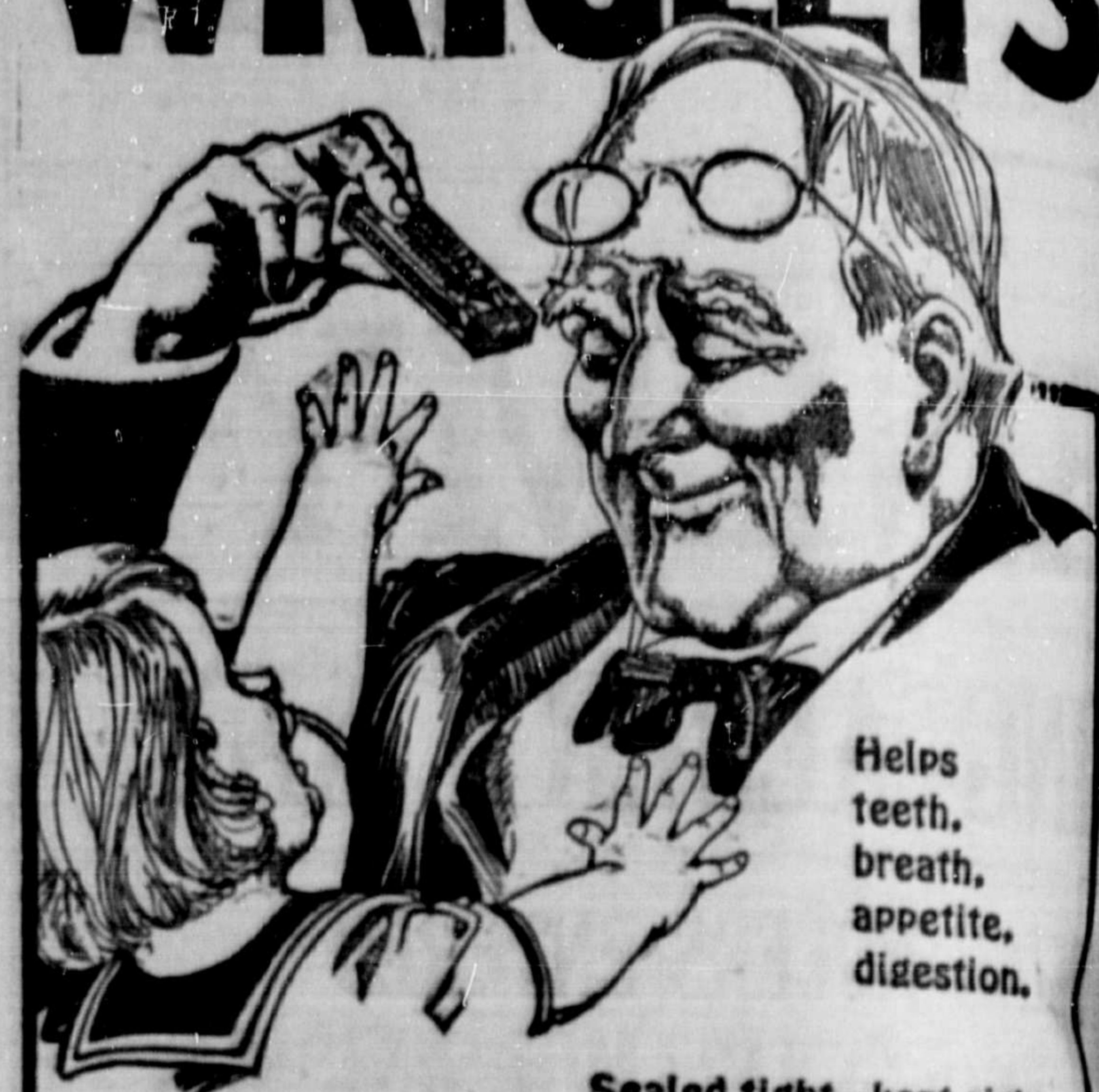

The present situation is that among church leaders there is a strong tendency towards Church Union, but what is holding back the movement is the denominational pride and the unreasonable prejudice of many among the rank and file of church members. It requires careful teaching to remove this hindering prejudice, and wider vision to overcome this isolating pride.

It may help on the great cause believing world is the price we are paying for a divided Christianity.

### Co-Ordination Needed.

It is now more widely recognized than formerly that mere unity of spirit is not enough. This unity of spirit which is invisible must manifest itself in some visible organic form. There may be many different parts, each part with a different function, but the body, however complex, must be one. Co-operation alone is not enough, there must be co-ordination of different parts under one comprehensive plan.

It is now almost universally conceded that by Church Union is not meant any such thing as the absorption of one church by another church. The result of bringing the various denominations into organic union will not be the aggrandisement of any one of the existing churches, but the creation of a great comprehensive church such as will gladden the heart of Christ.

### Valuable Contribution.

It is now clearly understood that the leading characteristics of the various denominations are not to be obliterated, but they are to form the valuable contribution which each church is to make to the great comprehensive body. All the leading Protestant churches hold the same great essentials of Faith, but they differ in minor particulars. In the olden days these minor particulars were considered important enough to vigorously maintain even to the point of separating from the existing body and forming a new organization, but in the course of centuries the value of these peculiar views have in most cases been recognized by the others so that the need for the separate sect has ceased to exist. Barriers are now crumbling which once were considered insurmountable.

### Getting Together.

As an illustration of what is meant we have on the one hand the Presbyterian Church and the Methodist Church taking more kindly to the occasional use of liturgical forms, and on the other hand we have the House of Bishops of the Anglican Church in Canada sanctioning under certain limitations the use in church of extempore prayer.

The Anglican Church has long made provision for both adult and infant baptism, and also for baptism by immersion as well as by effusion.

### Bridge the Gulf.

The most recent development among church leaders in England has been the discovery that even in the matter of Church Order which has been the great difficulty in the way of Church Union between the Anglican Church and other Protestant Churches there is the possibility of bridging the gulf by the candid recognition of two great facts without going into any explanation of these facts. The first is the fact of the Episcopate in the greater part of Christendom as the recognized organ of the continuity of the Church "which members of the Episcopal Churches ought not to be expected to abandon." The second is the fact that "there are a number of Christian Churches not accepting the Episcopal order which have been used by the Holy Spirit in His work of enlightening the world, converting sinners, and perfecting saints."

### Paying the Price.

If we could only get the rank and file of our various churches to follow their leaders, laying aside their prejudice and their pride, and endeavoring to "get together" it would not be long before the spirit of unity which is undoubtedly growing amongst us would manifest itself in some outward form of Church Union. As it has been well said an-

Independent Workers of the World, the Russian Social Democrat party, the Russian Revolutionary party, Russian Social Revolutionists, the Russian Workers' Union, the Ukrainian Social Democratic party, the Social Democratic party, the Social-Labor party, the group of Social-Democrats of the Bolsheviks, the group of Social-Democrats of anarchists, the Workers' International Industrial Union, the Chinese Nationalist League and the Chinese Labor Association.

The military and civil authorities will take immediate steps to suppress the activity of these organizations in Canada or of any organizations which are affiliated with them or which have similar reactionary aims and objects.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Records cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 5 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

### TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## AMERICANS CREATING MERCHANT SERVICE

Are Remodelling Ports and Preparing to Run Ocean Fleet With Lowest Rates In World.

"A good many people assume that when peace comes again and the war needs for ships have been met, the 160 new shipyards which have been created under the United States Shipping Emergency Fleet Corporation will have nothing to do," says Edward Hurley, chairman of the United States Shipping Board. "That is a mistaken assumption. We are not anywhere near the end of this shipbuilding job—we are only beginning. Think of the 25,000,000 tons of merchant ships which are being built under the present program. That represents something like 3,000 vessels, most of them modern steel steamers."

"They say the Kaiser boasted that every time the Vaterland returned to Germany with a passenger list of American tourists it brought \$150,000 to the German people. We are no longer going to pay shipping fares and tolls to Germany. We will pay them to ourselves through the American merchant marine. We are remodelling our ports and preparing to run our ocean fleet as we run our railroads—with the lowest freight and passenger rates in the world and the best service and a reasonable profit for people who put their money into them. Several hundred thousand young Americans are going to sea as officers and sailors in this merchant marine. Millions of dollars of American capital are going to be invested in foreign countries to develop their resources and create export and import trade."

What you say about there being no place to tie up safe from the southwest wind is right enough but then we are only fishermen and no one takes any notice of us and what we want does not matter in this town.

I thought you did not publish letters from common people like us, but seeing as you do I want to ask just this one question. Is it the mayor and council what is holding up the fishermen's float or is it the Provincial Government? If it is the council I must have a word with Alderman Casey about it because he is chairman of the Board of Works here and he is going to get it in the neck at election time if he does not get us a float. He always stands up for us workingmen, so I hope he will do the same this time when we want it. Cow Bay is the place to build the float and Mr. Casey is the man to get it for us.

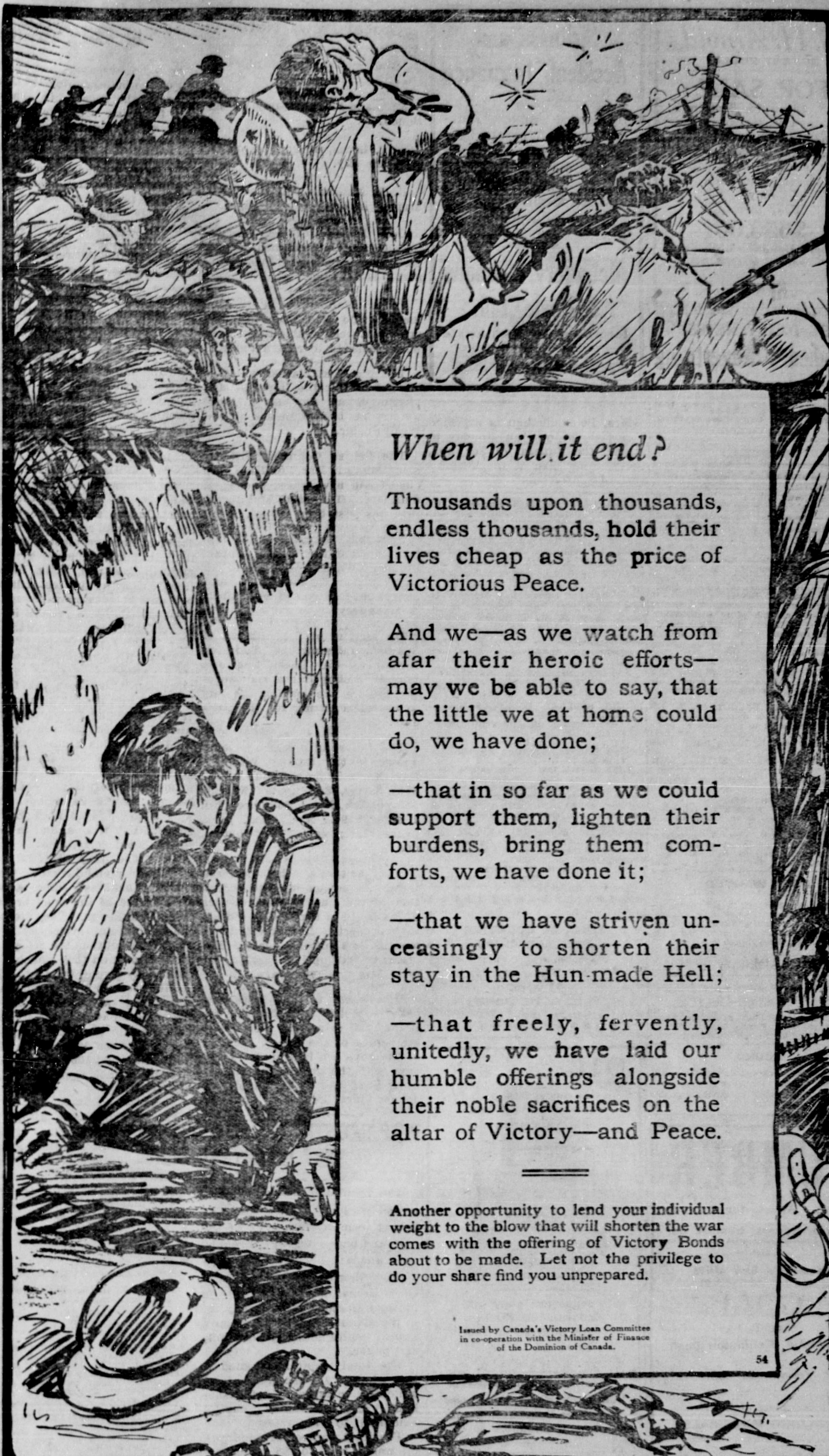

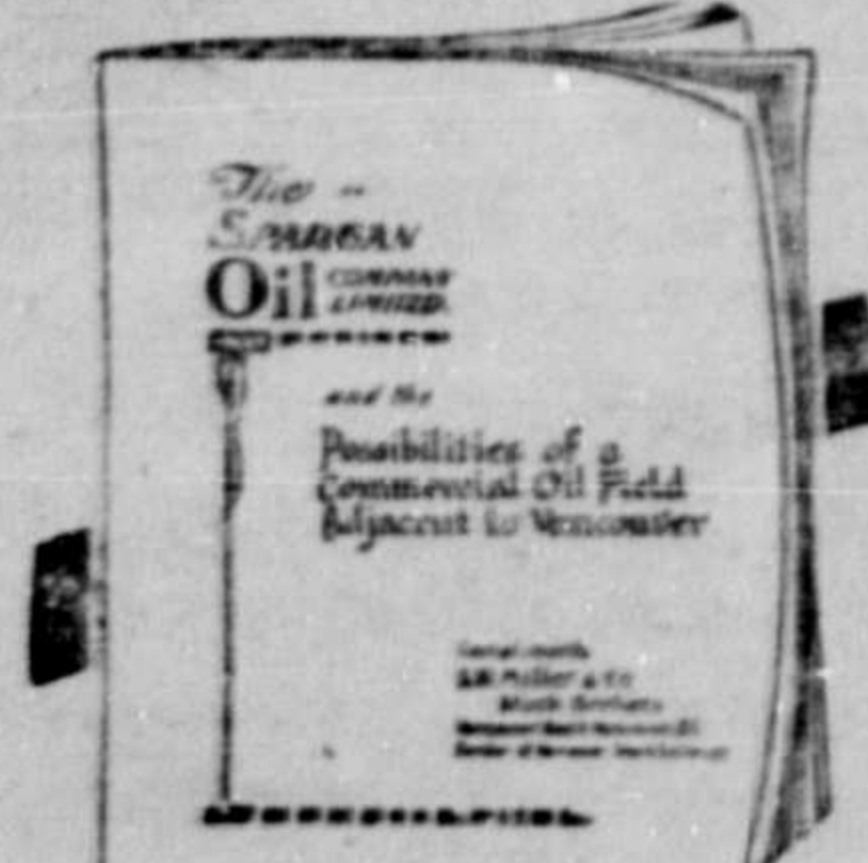

Geo. McAfee, of the Georgetown Spruce Co., returned to town from Vancouver by the Prince Rupert this morning.

Judge Mallory, of Port Clements, who has been in town since last week unable to get back home, expects to return today.

The tug boat Masset which is being built for the Imperial Munitions Board for use in these waters, has been launched at New Westminster.

The British Columbia Government offices in Hazelton have been closed and new offices opened at Smithers. The staff and furniture has just been moved.

Now that the road to the mill is completed the Prince Rupert Lumber Company is ready to deliver lumber to the local trade. Orders may be placed with Albert & McCaffery.

On account of the outbreak of Spanish influenza at Thurston Harbor on the Queen Charlotte Islands, Bishop Bunoz and two of the Sisters are leaving the city to assist in caring for the patients.

The following prices are being quoted in the Bulkley Valley: Hay, No. 1 Timothy, \$30; wheat, \$75; barley, \$80; oats (No. 1), \$65 per ton, No. 2, \$60; beef, No. 1 steer, 19c., cow, 18c.; pork, prime, 25c.; eggs, 75c.; butter, 60c.

The editor of the Omineca Herald is advocating the reduction of the time allowed owners of land sold at tax sale to redeem their property. He suggests three months as a suitable period. The present redemption period on farm lands is two years.

### PULP INDUSTRY IS VERY IMPORTANT

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has just completed the following census for 1917 of the pulp and paper industry throughout Canada:

Altogether the census embraced 80 concerns, of which 31 were in the manufacture of pulp only, 26 in the manufacture of paper only, and 23 manufacturing both pulp and paper.

The total capital invested in this industry, including land, buildings, machinery, stocks on hand, and "working" capital, amounted to \$186,374,905.

The total number of employees on wages was 20,685 males and 671 females; on salaries, 1,345 males and 218 females. The total salary and wages bill was \$20,344,286.

The aggregate value of production in 1917 was \$96,248,824. The census covered altogether 36 products, of which the more important are as follows:—

"Canadian troops have achieved a success which brilliant and important in itself may have far-reaching consequences."

"The Canadian Corps who were responsible for the breach are still advancing."

"The Daily Express."

"The news of the breaking by the Canadian forces of the Drocourt-Queant switch line astride the Arras-Cambrai road is beyond doubt by far the most important item that has come to hand for many a day, and, taken in conjunction with the co-ordinated movement advancing along the Bapaume-Cambrai road, it acquires still greater import."

"The Daily Graphic."

"From the strategical viewpoint the capture of Queant is even more important than the fall of Lens. It means that we have broken through the Drocourt-Queant line of defence, and are now behind the famous Hindenburg line. As regards our own troops, it is gratifying to note that, while the prime glory of this great event belongs to the Canadians, there were also engaged both English and Scottish troops, and in addition a naval detachment."

"The Daily Sketch."

"Those splendid trusting troops—the Canadians—have accomplished one of the most brilliant feats of the war. They were on the left of our attack on a 23-mile front between the Scarpe and the Somme, and they smashed the immensely strong Drocourt-Queant line beyond repair. The Canadians made a breach in the famous Wotan switch-line six miles wide, despite the fiercest opposition, no fewer than seven divisions—say 90,000 men—being thrown against them on a five-mile front."
