## CLOSE TO VALENCIENNES

### GERMANS DO NOT TAKE WILSON SERIOUSLY IN REGARD TO PEACE

#### GERMANY STILL TRIES TO STAVE OFF NECESSITY OF COMPLETE SURRENDER TO ALLIED FORCES

##### Declares She Has Committed No Illegal or Inhumane Acts and Denies Purposely Destroying Passengers on Ships

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)  
London, October 22.—Germany's reply to President Wilson's has been received by wireless. It says Germany hopes the States will approve of no demand which will be irreconcilable with the honor of the German people, and with the way peace of justice. She protests all references to illegal and inhumane acts, denies that the navy purposely destroyed lifeboats and proposes that the facts be cleared by neutral commissions. Orders were despatched to submarine commanders precluding the torpedoing of passenger ships. The note that opportunity be brought about for fixing the details of the situation of occupied territories.  
London, October 22.—Lord Northcliffe commenting on the note says: "A hasty perusal reveals truly Prussian selfishness. No mention is made of Turkey, or Austria. It seems to me the document may mean either to gain time or is a confession of state of affairs economically worse than we know."  
The note in reply to President Wilson says the German Government will not be able to take or hold office unless it possesses the confidence of a majority of the Reichstag. Germany claims the violation of international law in carrying out the destruction of property during retreats, and says the troops are under strict instructions to spare private property, and care for people. Where aggressions occur the guilty are being punished.

#### LESS THAN TWO MILES FROM CITY OF VALENCIENNES ARE FORCES OF MARSHAL HAIG

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)  
London, October 22.—British forces fighting north of Leclap have captured Amerval according to an official report from Marshal Haig's headquarters in France tonight. The British are now two miles from Valenciennes. The text of the statement says: "During night and early morning sharp fighting for possession of village of Amerval which we captured during attack yesterday determined attacks to regain the village were repulsed. The morning enemy made unsuccessful attempts to drive in our advanced troops in the region of Cambrai-Bavaria road. We secured a few prisoners. East and north of Delain our progress has been hindered in the face of considerable opposition. We are less than two miles from Valenciennes and have reached the general position of Sentinelle, Strongy and Taintegnis. We hold the west bank of the Scheldt and several miles north of Pontachin north of Tournai."

#### STAIN NORD WAS A LUCKY SKIPPER

#### DR. WESBROOK DIED; WAS ILL LONG TIME

Vancouver, October 22.—Dr. Frank F. Wesbrook, President of the University of British Columbia, died Sunday after long illness.

Dr. Wesbrook was one of the most widely known educationists in the Dominion. Born in Canada he took his arts and medical courses at the University of Manitoba. It was while serving on the staff of a university in one of the western states that he was offered, and accepted, the presidency of the University of British Columbia.

#### STEPS THAT WERE TAKEN TO COPE WITH INFLUENZA SCOURGE

##### Mayor Explains to Council What Was Done and Defends the Closing of Amusements

In explaining to the City Council what had been done to cope with the influenza Mayor McClymont last night said that they had fitted up 23 beds at the Borden St. School and now they were about to use the upstairs. Alderman Barrie had helped out by supplying six beds and the ladies had done splendid work. Several trained nurses who had retired from the profession had come forward and offered their services. The mayor said that he had been criticised for closing up but the more he found out about the influenza the better he was pleased that he had acted promptly. There was no doubt that the preventive methods adopted had helped a good deal. In Vancouver amusement places had been kept open with very bad effect.

#### DOCTOR COMES.

The mayor further stated that he had wired Dr. Large asking him to come because he found that the local doctors were being much overworked. Owing to the bad weather the doctor had been delayed, but Mr. Johnson of the cold storage had sent a boat over and the doctor was now here looking after the Indians and also was ready to attend private cases where it was found necessary.

#### ASK GOVERNMENT FOR DISPENSARY

##### Alderman Casey Suggests Liquor is Essential Element in Prevention of Disease; Ald. Kirkpatrick Dissents.

That the Provincial Government be asked to open a dispensary here for the sale of alcoholic liquors under the provisions of the Prohibition Act was a resolution that was passed by the City Council last night. The matter was brought up by Alderman Casey, who explained that part of the prohibition law provided for the opening of dispensaries in different parts of the province. So far, however, these had been opened in Victoria and Vancouver only. He thought if one was warranted anywhere it was here. He suggested that liquor was one of the essential elements in coping with the influenza and moved the resolution asking the government to act.

#### ALDERMAN DYBHAVN TALKS SHIPBUILDING

The wooden shipbuilding proposal seems to have fallen flat. Alderman Dybhavn returned yesterday after a visit to Seattle where he interviewed the men who were proposing to come here and he found that they had given up the idea for the present. They had received a cable from Norway to withhold action until they got further instructions. Word is expected by mail there before long, but it is thought that the peace proposals have affected the situation.

#### HELGOLAND IS AT THE BOTTOM OF THE HARBOR

##### Struck by Steamer Admiral Watson at Ketchikan and Sunk in Thirty Feet of Water.

The skipper of the Panama brought word this morning that the schooner Helgoland had been run down by the steamer Admiral Watson of the Alaska Steamship Co. at Ketchikan and was now lying in thirty feet of water.

It seems that the Helgoland was going out of the harbor when she met the Watson coming in. Just what went wrong with the signals is not known but the big vessel cut the schooner amidships and, keeping straight ahead, carried her on her bows into shallow water. Had the Watson stopped the schooner would have gone down where she was struck.

#### SEYMOUR TOWED HELPLESS TO PORT

##### Picked Up Few Miles South of Seymour Narrows Flying Signals of Distress.

The fishing boat Seymour which left here Friday last bound for Seattle in charge of Skipper Olson had engine trouble and was drifting helpless when a tanker came along and gave her a tow. Everything went well until they reached Seymour Narrows and attempted to go through on the flood tide. Half way through, the tow rope parted and the tanker, unable to manipulate in the swift current, kept right on. The Seymour drifted around for some time and her distress signals were finally seen by the Princess Sophia which was bound north and arrived here yesterday. She threw the Seymour a line and towed her to the wharf at Campbell River on Vancouver Island and left her there.

#### REVOLUTION IN SOFIA

London, October 22.—Revolution has broken out in Sofia. There is street fighting between Bolshevik troops. Police report more than three thousand killed.

#### MANY BOATS WERE INJURED IN THE GALE

##### Fishermen Deprived of Means of Livelihood Owing to Lack of Protection for Small Boats in Harbor.

In connection with the sinking of the gas boat Iris, mention of which was made yesterday, Bert Hanson, who operates the boat for A. O. Franks, says that the fishermen are up in arms over the lack of accommodation here for their craft. He says that they all pay harbor dues and then when bad weather comes they are turned away from the floats.

Mr. Hanson says that one night previous to the one on which he lost the Iris he was up all night looking after her and on that night he went away to get a few hours' sleep. When he returned she had sunk. He says he makes his living from the fishing business and he thinks that something should be done at once to provide accommodation for them. If nothing is done it means that they will have to go south for the winter where there is proper protection.

#### ANOTHER BOAT SUNK

The Royal Fish Co.'s boat Walborg which was tied at the Government float grounded and sank this morning. There was no proper accommodation for her at the float, hence the trouble.

#### FISH ARRIVALS

Four fishing boats arrived in port since yesterday. They are the Panama with 50,000 pounds; Volunteer, 2,000; Ringleader, 1,800, and P. Doreen, 4,000 pounds.

Weird Rumors are In Circulation.

If the rumors current on the street are to be believed nearly every prominent man in the city is now at the undertakers' waiting interment. Rumor has dozens of people dying, thousands ill, conditions simply unbelievable. Every story is exaggerated in the telling and every time it is repeated it grows.

The mayor at the Council meeting last night said he thought the epidemic had reached its worst point and would soon begin to improve. Many of those who have been very ill are steadily recovering. People who have had double pneumonia are practically well again and there is a general feeling that from now on conditions will improve. The best way to keep well is to keep happy and look on the bright side of everything. Those who are most susceptible have already had the malady and those who have not yet had it are not likely to if they keep the body toned up and the mind free from worries.

How easy it is To do Without.

A month ago if anyone had told us we should have to do without practically all our amusements we should have scoffed at the idea as almost impossible. Here we are, however, getting along without moving pictures, poolrooms, cabarets, concerts, church services, and social gatherings of any kind and no one is suffering very much as a result, except those who make their living from providing the amusements.

It would not do to go on very long without some outlet for the activities of the people, but when the necessity arises it is wonderful how easy these deprivations are. There is one consolation for Prince Rupert people and that is that in every other part of the country conditions are very similar. In Vancouver they have been using the schools for hospitals for some time, and, although they were slow in closing the amusements some of them are now wishing they had done it before.

Tackled a Very Difficult Situation.

Mayor McClymont is to be congratulated on the courageous manner in which he tackled the situation at first. Many people thought he was too previous in closing up, but had he not done so the conditions here might have been far worse than they are. The mayor has been active also in providing facilities, especially in sending to Port Simpson for Dr. Large, who was good enough to answer the call.

It is quite impossible to speak of the wonderful manner in which people are helping each other. The clergy, the nurses, the officials of various kinds, and the Salvation lassies are all doing their part. Most men and women are trying to help some others and the spirit of helpfulness is contagious.

In this city there is an unusually large proportion of men and many of them live alone. This has necessitated moving a great many to the hospital and makes the proportion of cases seem large. It has also made it necessary for neighbors to help each other more than would be the case ordinarily. Happily the folks here have risen to the occasion and are to be congratulated on the effective work done.

How Hindenburg Took London.

"Hindenburg's March to London," a book which sold in Germany to the number of 4,000,000 copies, conveyed to the German masses the end that militarism sought. The following is a quotation:

"It is a memorable moment when Hindenburg with his staff comes riding up the hill, and see from the heights south of Croydon the roofs of London for the first time! A town of seven and a half millions is lying at his feet. The capital of a country which has been able to subdue one-fifth of the human race, and the extent of whose colonies spreads over a surface equal to thirty-two German empires. This proud city that was the world's banking house, the world's exchange, the world's wharf, the world's guardian. Hindenburg is riding slowly on and thoughtfully he glances at the Canaan of the German dream of conquest. At last, at last! He has succeeded in subduing that English commander reputed far more mighty, more skilful, more experienced and more successful than he. Hindenburg has conquered the lie. Comrades, the Lord has done great things! He has blessed our arms and has given over to us the proud city before which we now gratefully lift up our hands to God. And now the pointed helmets are marching in." Comment is superfluous.

Team Work Needed for Few Days.

While the people of Prince Rupert, in common with the people in almost every part of the world, are being sorely tried just now it must not be forgotten that the men at the front have been in much more difficult situations than confront us and they have come through with colors flying.

With courage we must all face the issue and keep cheerful. By helping our neighbors we can best help ourselves. Team work and community work is the order of the day.

It must not be forgotten that in spite of our difficulties here it will be necessary for us to continue our preparations for providing money for the men at the front. Victory bonds will be on sale commencing October 28 and we shall all have to do our best when the sale opens, even though we have needs of our own to supply.

## A Plain Man's Argument for Church Union

"Feed the flock which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind. Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock."

Dear Sir:—

Far away as we in Prince Rupert are from the centres of thought, theological and otherwise, the argument put forth in favor of Church Union by the Rev. Bishop Du Vernet in your Saturday's issue proved to be interesting and stimulating to many trained from their youth up as Christians.

So far as this city is concerned, the average man in the street, should he by any chance visit the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist churches consecutively, would be unable to discern any difference; nor even in the Episcopal Church, except that he, being a stranger, would probably be unable to find the place in the prayer book.

### Half-Filled Churches.

He would wonder wherefor the four churches, each less than half filled at each service and, did he know all, none of them financially self supporting, nor able to afford to pay their pastors reasonable stipends.

If ever there was an argument for Church Union the city of Prince Rupert affords it. To have four buildings, lighted and heated once a week and shut up for the other six days is an economic waste, which ought to be tolerated no longer. The money invested in the lots and buildings, together with upkeep year by year could be put to much better advantage otherwise. There is no just reason for the multiplicity of church buildings and pastors.

### Example Here.

To come to practical matters, what is to hinder Church Union here and so set an example to the remainder of Canada? It is safe to say that even were the church members, who form only a small proportion of the church goers, to question themselves it would be found that very few were members of any particular church from conviction. Because they were brought up so; because their friends went there, or because they liked that particular preacher would be found to be the chief reasons.

In this new city why could not they submerge their superficial Methodism or Baptist or Presbyterianism or Episcopalianism in one common Christianity?

A little calm and serious thought by the church members might be prolific of much good. Let the people think for themselves.

### Think for Themselves.

The writer does not agree with the Rev. Bishop Du Vernet when he says "If we could only get the rank and file to follow their leaders."

If the rank and file, if such a simile be permitted, would only take the trouble to think a little for themselves instead of accepting opinions ready made, greater progress would be made.

Luther, John Knox and John Wesley and many more thought for themselves and them we have to thank for our present day freedom of conscience. Indeed, had Luther not had some independence of thought and action we might still be buying indulgences for our sins and that good Methodist Sir Joseph Flavell would for one have a cinch on heaven.

A divided Christianity is the price we are paying for an unthinking church membership, the responsibility for which lies largely with the preachers.

### Who Will Start?

For the sake of church union in Prince Rupert, which two preachers are prepared to sacrifice their positions, and which two congregations their premises for two churches are ample to accommodate churchgoers in this city at present. Is the Episcopalian ready to worship in a church which lies north and south, rather than east and west? Is the Presbyterian ready to endure prelay; or the Baptist to sit with the un-immersed; or the Methodist to deny himself a love feast?

When the plain people will overlook such trifles for "the things that are more excellent," the time will be ripe for Church Union.

The fact of the Episcopalians arrogating to their own particular style of worship the idea of its

being the "only recognized organ of the continuity of the Church" is a fact which other Christians would bear with, provided the Episcopalians do not expect other denominations to believe it. The pharisaical "I am better than thou" attitude, so common among Episcopalians, especially in certain parts of England, where dissenters are ostracised even to this day, is the greatest hindrance to Church Union there is.

The quiescence which characterises the churches in Prince Rupert at the present time would justify the matter of congregational union being put up to the church members, who as distinct from church goers would be the only ones having any right to vote on the question. If the leaders of the various flocks are wishful of this consummation, they will do so. And when the spirit of Christianity has permeated the church membership even partly, they will vote for it.

## CORPORAL SLAVIN KILLED IN ACTION

Son of Ex-Prize Fighter Was Formerly in the Yukon Where he was Well Known.

Corporal Frank Charles Slavin, son of the ex-prize fighter who now lives in Victoria and who also has been overseas to do his bit, has been killed in action, according to word just received.

Corporal Slavin was born in England twenty-six years ago and came to Victoria when he was 8 years of age. When the war broke out he was in the Northern Country, coming down with the Yukon Company, and transferring to the 231st Battalion, which after reaching the Old Country supplied reinforcements to the 72nd. He was a year in France and was through all the heavy fighting of the last 12 months.

A student of mining engineering, he had been in the Klondike for a time, and was engaged in dredging work in the Yukon. He had also been in the Coal Creek district, and all over the province had hosts of friends among prospectors and mining men, who will regret to learn of his death while carrying arms against the enemy.

## Just Camouflage

What a place Prince Rupert is for kickers. The latest kick is that while all other places of amusement are closed the City Council is still allowed to continue its sessions.

According to the old story women always wanted the things that were forbidden. Eve stole the apple just because she was told to leave it alone. Later on she was told she should not vote, and she went after it and got it. It is not noticeable that women are particularly fond of apples now that they can get them whenever they want them, but it is noticeable that they do not care particularly for the vote. There are but nine people registered so far as licenseholders or householders in the city and not one of these is a woman.

Alderman Kirkpatrick has no faith in the efficacy of whisky as a medicine. Apparently she thinks the men who are applying for liquor to keep away the flu, are just looking for an opportunity to get a jag on contrary to the provisions of the Prohibition Act.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$250 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in connection with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased for agriculture; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For granting industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

JUVENILE COURT JUDGE LECTURES

Presiding Officer of the Vancouver Court Talks About Boys That Come Before Him.

Judge Shaw of the Juvenile Court at Vancouver, in an interesting address before a New Westminster audience on his work explained that not punishment, but reformation is the work of the juvenile courts. It is one of the greatest things that has been done for the benefit of the boys of the nation.

He explained very clearly that the boys which come before him are not criminals, and should never be treated so. These boys in most cases were undernourished, ill treated and have very few opportunities in life. It would be a miracle if they did not fall, he said, under such circumstances. In all the cases he has dealt with he has wondered at their effort to become better.

"Now we come to the point when we as citizens do nothing more for these boys," he said. One of the most pathetic things in my work is to throw these boys into the same environment as the washing them instead of helping them further." Here he made the suggestion that a particular school be formed in the country where they could be educated, learn trades, thus enabling them to become useful citizens.

The speaker told of the industrial school and its very useful work, and he pointed out that once a boy has been there he is stamped and naturally feels that he has been treated as a criminal. It is imperative that there should be a new educational system for the boys. "This war is teaching us that the individual belongs to the nation, and it is absolutely cruel to let a large number run wild and expect them to become good citizens when they grow up."

The Judge spoke of the "institutional system" as it is carried out in the Old Country and the cottage system in the United States, which is working out satisfactorily. He urged in conclusion upon the women as a club to cooperate and use their influence in bringing this matter before the government and to work with brains, money and hands to show that an educational system is needed for these delinquents.

After an interesting discussion at the close of the Judge's address a motion that a "Child Welfare Association" be formed with a view of having a juvenile court in New Westminster and Fraser Valley as one of its principal objects was endorsed, and the secretary was instructed to forward it to the Local Council of Women to be acted upon.

Pte. Forsman, of the 1st Canadian Pioneers, who is on furlough in the city yesterday on his way back to his old home at Terrace, Pte. Forsman was gassed at Passchendaele.

An honor roll of the four hundred or more employees of the Granby Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. is being prepared and copies of it will be on exhibition at the different Granby centres.

The postmaster announces that this is the time to send parcels to men overseas who are stationed on the Macedonia front or in Mesopotamia. Last year many of the parcels arrived very late because they were not posted in time.

The C. P. R. steamer Princess May is still lying unrepaired in Esquimalt harbor. Some time ago she was taken there and tenders called for some necessary work. The tenders were considered high and she was accordingly tied up and her service cancelled.
