## OUT OF NORTH FRANCE

### GERMANS HOLD LITTLE TERRITORY EXCEPT TO SOUTH OF CAMBRAI

#### BRITISH AT VALENCIENNES; GERMANS ARE VERY NEARLY OUT OF NORTHERN FRANCE

**SALENT IN DIRECTION OF DOUAI IS ALL THAT REMAINS  
IN POSSESSION OF THE HUNS — INDUSTRIAL  
AND RAILWAY CENTRE**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, October 23.—It is probable that by this time Valenciennes has fallen. At the last account the British troops had entered the suburbs of the city and were surrounding it with the intention of cutting off supplies. Big guns are being trained on the enemy communications and it is impossible for the city to hold out.  
With the taking of this industrial and railway centre the Germans are practically driven out of northern France and the greater part of Belgium. Valenciennes is but a few miles from the Belgian border and farther north the Allies have gone beyond Lille and are well within the Belgian border. There is a backward trend in the direction of Douai but this salient will not likely remain long.

London, October 23.—The Allied armies are still before Tournai in Belgium west of Lille where the Germans continue to resist most strenuously. The Allied forces are at a disadvantage owing to the conformation of the ground, the hill to the east of the city being occupied by the enemy.  
The country east of Tournai is strongly fortified and the enemy is making a stubborn attempt to hold that part of the front.

#### NO HELP COMING FROM VANCOUVER

**Dr. Young Wires That All Nurses,  
Male and Female, Are  
Needed in South.**

In response to the telegram dispatched to Dr. Young, the provincial health officer, asking to send up five trained nurses here from Vancouver and three male orderlies to assist in overcoming the influenza epidemic, word has been received that this is impossible owing to the demand already existing in the south for nursing help. Dr. Young advised that the hospital authorities here ask for volunteer help, which they have done with success. Volunteers have come forward, and sufficient assistance is available to cope with the increased number of patients.

This morning there are two deaths reported at the hospital from pneumonia. Oscar V. Magnuson, of 25 Cordova Street West, Vancouver, aged 32, born in Sweden, was admitted October 19 and died yesterday. Thos. Pedersen, fisherman, 893 Borden Street, born in Denmark, aged 34, was admitted on October 20 and died this morning.

#### BORDEN ST. HOSPITAL IS WELL ORGANIZED

**Mesdames Reilly and Murray in  
Charge With Many Willing  
Helpers.**

Two deaths are reported this morning from the Borden Street Auxiliary Hospital among the patients suffering from influenza and its after effects. They were Willard J. Watts, barber, with the Empire Baths, and another man named Church. W. J. Watts was very well known around the city. He came from Kansas, and was universally liked. Both men died during the night.

The organization of this emergency hospital has been brought to a high state of efficiency very quickly, and reflects great credit upon the parties concerned. Mrs. L. W. Reilly has been acting matron by day, and Mrs. Murray, late of Hazelton, by night. Many willing workers have come forward and with experienced supervision are proving of great help.

There were also two more deaths among the Indians yesterday, one from the Salvation Army Citadel, and Baby Ryan.

#### FRENCH TROOPS CONTINUE TO MAKE GAINS, DRIVING NORTH FROM CITY OF LAON

**CZECHO-SLOVAKS FIGHTING WITH FRENCH RETAKE THE  
VILLAGE OF TERRON — TWO TOWNS  
TAKEN BY ALLIES**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Paris, October 23.—The French forces are still driving northward from the city of Laon and taking a number of small towns. The Germans are resisting fiercely, but every mile gained is a danger to the salient between Laon and St. Quentin.  
The town of Chalandry to the west of the Laon-Vervins railway has been captured after heavy fighting and Grandlup-et-Fay to the east of the railway has also fallen. The French pressure is continuous and there are a good many casualties.  
The Czecho-Slovak forces which have been fighting side by side with the French have captured the village of Terron which had temporarily fallen into the hands of the enemy.

#### ALDERMAN IS A VICTIM OF THE EPIDEMIC

**R. J. D. Smith Dies After Short  
Illness—Was Well Known  
and Highly Respected  
Citizen.**

The people of Prince Rupert heard with regret last evening that one of their fellow townsmen R. J. D. Smith had fallen a victim to pneumonia following an attack of influenza. He had been ill but a short time but his constitution which was none too robust was unable to withstand the attack of the dread scourge.

Mr. Smith was sole proprietor of the firm of Smith & Mallett, of which he was formerly senior partner, which has been engaged in the plumbing business here since 1909. He was progressive in his methods and had built up a prosperous business when death called him.

As a public spirited citizen Mr. Smith is well known and highly respected. He has always taken a keen interest in the welfare of the place. In the council, of which he has been a member for nearly three years, his advice was always sought and carried weight. He was also a member of the Board of Trade, the Prince Rupert Club and other organizations. In fraternal circles he had a wide connection, being a member of the Masonic order, of the St. Andrew's Society and of the Sons of Canada.

Few men could better have been spared to the city than the late Mr. Smith, and general regret was expressed everywhere when the ill news was spread that he had been one of those that the dread reaper had taken at this time.

The funeral will take place on Sunday next with Rev. Dr. Grant officiating, and the Tsimpsean Lodge A. F. and A. M. in charge of all arrangements.

Mayor McClymont when seen this morning expressed appreciation of the work of the late alderman. He said: "Little did I think, when I mentioned to the late Alderman Smith only the other afternoon that there would be a meeting of the Board of Works that evening that it was to be the last time we would meet on earth. His services and advice, especially that pertaining to the Board of Works, will be missed by the Council Board, where he sat for the last three years."

#### UNUSUAL CEREMONY OF CREMATION HERE

**Hindus to Burn Body of Country-  
man at Fairview Cemetery,  
According to their  
Religious Rites.**

An interesting ceremony, at least interesting in a way, because of its unusualness in Prince Rupert, will shortly take place in connection with the death of Harry Singh, the Hindu who recently died at the Borden Street Emergency Hospital. This man was brought in already suffering from pneumonia, and put up a great fight for his life, but, however, the disease proved too deep-seated for his recovery.

His fellow countrymen in town will dispose of his body according to their own religious rites, which do not permit of the ordinary burial. Their religion does not permit of the corruption of the body after death, and it must be burned with fire. Therefore, the cremation will take place at the cemetery. The Indians proceeded to Fairview and built the funeral pyre, and will proceed thither with the body and will burn it to ashes. There are ten Hindus in town employed in the lumber business, and they will conduct the funeral according to their own ideas. Permission has been secured from the city officials for this unusual ceremony.

#### ELEVEN DEATHS FROM INFLUENZA AT GRANBY

Anyox, B. C., October 23.—The epidemic of Spanish influenza is taking its full course here, there having been something like four hundred cases since it started. To date, there have been eleven deaths, and several people are very seriously ill.

**Was Popular Employee of Royal  
Bank in This City; Sympathy  
Expressed.**

Miss McKinnon only left high school last season and was starting out on a business career, being engaged with the Royal Bank branch here. Taken with influenza last week, she was getting well rapidly, but got around too soon. She suffered a relapse and died this morning about 7 o'clock.

#### DOUBLE MURDERER HAS BEEN CAUGHT IN LEDUC DISTRICT

**JOSEPH CAMERON WHO SHOT TWO MEN AT EDMONTON  
NOW IN TOILS, HAVING BEEN ARRESTED BY  
PROVINCIAL POLICE**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Edmonton, October 23.—Joseph Cameron, alias J. A. Campbell, alias Joe Haders, who committed double murder here on Thursday last and made a sensational escape from the Northern Hotel, has been caught in the Leduc district where he obtained work with a threshing gang. The provincial police effected the arrest last night.

Cameron is regarded as a desperate criminal. The police in all towns throughout Alberta had been notified to be on the lookout for him and a description of him had been given to all railway men, barbers and others who might be likely to notice a stranger. Vacant barns and outhouses were searched with care and every possible clue was followed, with the result that he has been run down at last and will now have to stand trial here on the double charge.  
The two men whom Cameron shot were Frank Beeves and Sam Zappler. The latter was known to be in the habit of carrying large sums of money on his person, and Cameron, who is known in Alberta, is thought to have come to Edmonton expressly for the purpose of robbing him. Beeves is the man who tried to stop the murderer, and who was shot by Cameron in getting away.

#### CHIEF JUSTICE BECOMES LIEUT. GOV. OF QUEBEC

**Sir Charles Fitzpatrick Gives Up  
Judicial Position and is  
Followed By Sir Louis  
Davies.**

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—Right Hon. Sir Charles Fitzpatrick has resigned the chief justiceship of the Supreme Court of Canada and has been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec in succession to the late Sir E. Leblanc.

The vacancy in the Chief Justiceship has been filled by the appointment of Sir Louis Davies.

Sir Charles Fitzpatrick was born in Quebec in 1853 and was educated in the province. He was created a K. C. during the Governorship of the Earl of Aberdeen and later became professor of criminal law at Laval University. He was the chief counsel for Louis Reil who was convicted of high treason and executed at Regina in 1885.

Sir Charles has held many important positions. He represented the Dominion Government before the Privy Council in England in the famous Fisheries case in 1897 and was one of the British members at The Hague Peace Tribunal in 1908. He represented Quebec in the Dominion House of Commons and was Minister of Justice from 1902 to 1906 since which time he has been Chief Justice of the Dominion.

Sir Louis Davies, K. C. M. S., who succeeds him has been a member of the Supreme Court of Canada for a number of years. He was born in Prince Edward Island and received most of his education there. He has had a very distinguished career and is looked upon as the logical successor to Sir Charles Fitzpatrick.

#### History of Influenza.

Influenza, which is now sweeping over Canada from one end to the other, is a very old disease. It was known in ancient times and as early as 1510 it over-ran the whole civilized world. The last great world epidemic was in 1889-1890 when it was generally known by the French name of la grippe. The disease has always travelled from east to west. The following is taken from a report just to hand from Ottawa sent out by the Commission of Conservation:

#### Symptoms of The Disease.

The symptoms are similar to those of a heavy cold; more or less severe headache, cold in the head and throat, fits of sneezing, flushed face, chills, aches and pains in the back and limbs, pains in the eye-balls and behind the eyes, general physical depression, and temperature rising to between 101 and 104 degrees.

#### How to Prevent It.

As it is such an old disease, doctors have naturally learned a great deal about its prevention and treatment. The first principle of prevention is to keep away from those infected, and the second, to build up the germ-resisting parts of the body by eating nourishing foods, dressing comfortably, getting lots of sleep, and by living in the open air and in bright, well-ventilated rooms as much as possible. The mouth, throat and nose should be systematically and frequently disinfected by antiseptic inhalations, sprays and washes. Such preparations as chloretone and listerine are well adapted for this purpose.

In fighting previous epidemics, doctors found quinine a useful preventive. One grain of sulphate of quinine mixed with (but not dissolved in) a wineglassful of cold water makes an excellent antiseptic gargle. The anti-microbic properties of quinine are well known and its use as described above at once relieves the symptoms of sore throat, which result from the strain of the fight between the white blood corpuscles and the invading germs in the tonsils—the body's first line of defence. Quinine is also given internally with success as a preventive. In one of the more recent outbreaks in Europe an experiment was tried in which the men of one squadron of a regiment of cavalry were given 7½ grains of quinine in ½ ounce of whiskey daily for 22 days, whilst those of the other squadrons were given none. The latter squadrons had from 22 to 44 cases each of influenza, whilst the squadron treated with quinine developed only 4 cases. Inhalations of oil of eucalyptus, thymol, oil of mountain pine and the like are also valuable as preventives.

#### How to Treat It.

When a person is struck by influenza, only one course lies open. That is to take to bed with the least possible delay and call a doctor. Rest, warmth and quiet are three sovereign remedies of the primary disease, and the best preventive of its more deadly complications, of which pneumonia is the most frequent. While there is no specific for influenza, yet there are many drugs which play a useful part in relieving it, such as quinine, aspirin and various tonics, anti-neuralgic, antiseptic and heart medicines, to be prescribed by the physician in charge.

The dietetic rules which apply to any fever apply equally to influenza. Liquid foods at first, solids a little later on in a gradually ascending scale from lightly boiled fresh eggs to chicken, roast joints, etc. Water, cold or hot, may be sipped or "egg water" may be given. This excellent dish is prepared by blending with a pint of cold water the whipped whites of from 2 to 4 eggs, flavored with salt or cinnamon. Then the animal broths may be given. There are many cases in which even the lightest foods are spurned with loathing and common sense must be used in adapting diet to the particular case in hand.

#### Precautions Against Epidemic's Spread.

- (1) The sick should be separated from the healthy. This is especially important in the case of first attacks in the household.
- (2) Discharges from the nose and mouth should not be allowed to get dry on a pocket handkerchief or inside the house, office or factory. They should at once be collected in paper or clean rags and burned. If this cannot be done, they should be dropped into a vessel containing water.
- (3) Infected articles and rooms should be cleansed and disinfected. Use disinfectants everywhere. Wash the hands frequently.
- (4) Those attacked should not, on any account, mingle with other people for at least a period of ten days from the commencement of the attack. In severe cases, they should remain away from work for a longer period.
- (5) Special attention should be given to cleanliness and ventilation. Warm clothing should be worn, the feet should be kept dry and all unnecessary exposure avoided.

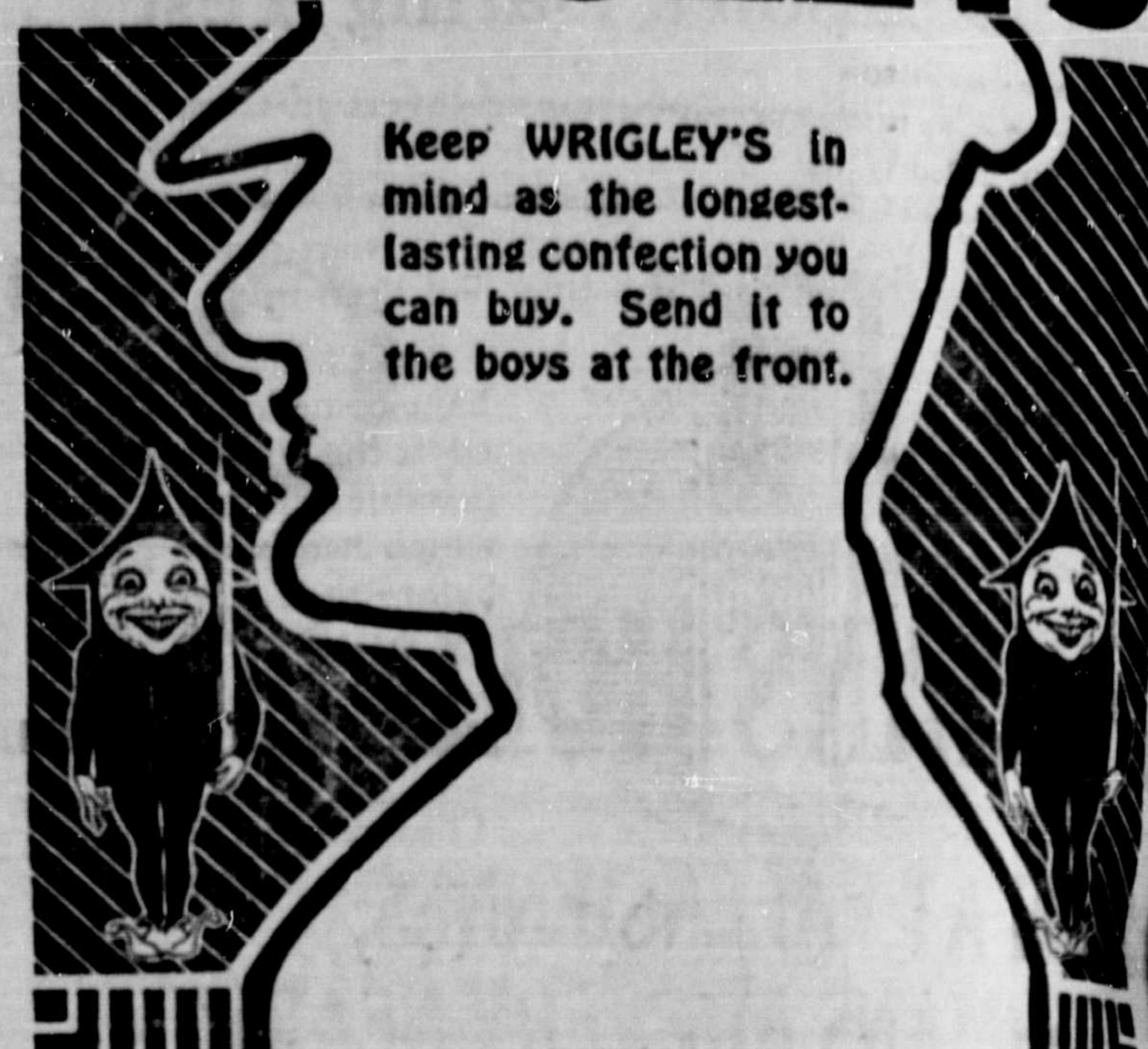

## PRINCE RUPERT MAN MAY GET VICTORIA CROSS FOR VALIANT WORK ON FIELD

### SERGT.-MAJOR WOODS RECEIVES NOTIFICATION THAT HE HAS BEEN RECOMMENDED FOR HIGHEST OF ALL DECORATIONS IN GIFT OF THE KING

Word has been received by Sergt.-Major A. E. Wood who a few weeks ago went south from this city, to the effect that he has been recommended for the Victoria Cross. Naturally he is keen to know if this will be granted, as the Victoria Cross is the most coveted decoration a soldier can receive.

Sergt.-Major Wood as already explained in these columns, has already received nine medals. The Croix de Guerre, the highest award of the French Government, has been bestowed upon him. He has the Royal Humane Society Gold Medal, in addition to his army decorations, for saving life at sea, the King and Queen's South African medals with seven clasps, the Persian Gulf Medal with clasps, a long service medal for eighteen years' continuous service without a stain on his character, the Military Medal and Mons Star.

#### Only One Left.

His personal record is one of the most amazing stories of the war, and that of his family one of the saddest. One of a family of ten brothers, he is the only one left and his mother and father too have died during the great struggle, his mother passing away while the body of her husband was in the house awaiting burial. Seven of his brothers have paid the supreme sacrifice on the fields of France and two laid down their lives in the South African campaign. The Sergt.-Major himself landed in France with the first draft of British soldiers who have since won undying fame and served continuously until February 4, 1918, when he was discharged as the result of four wounds and the effects of gas. In July, 1918, he returned to Canada but on September 17 he again offered his services and was accepted as a member of the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force. During the short time he was in civilian life on this side he was engaged in war work, cutting aeroplane spruce in the camps at Queen Charlotte Islands.

#### The Courageous Act.

The valiant act which caused Sergt.-Major Wood to be recommended for the Victoria Cross took place at La Bassee while he was Sergt.-Major of C Company of the 2nd Battalion Lancashire Fusiliers on September 25, 1916, and with a full complement of officers, with the object of taking a line of trenches. With the forces against them completely overwhelming and their ranks thinned by heavy casualties, the little party were unable to retain their objectives, but every officer had been wounded or killed and only seventeen were left of the party when they arrived back to their own trench. Of the seventeen, some were wounded. Enemy machine gun fire was directed with deadly aim on the little band and the Sergt.-Major who had assumed command earlier in the action upon the officers becoming casualties, again braved the perils of No Man's Land and the German lines and, maddened by the destruction of his company, made a fierce attack on the machine gun positions. He put three guns out of action and brought back five prisoners, but not before he had two shrapnel wounds and a bayonet wound in the thigh.

#### Was Once Torpedoed.

Returning home from the Dardanelles, suffering from the effects of gas and troubled with a previous wound which necessitated his leg being put in a splint, the Sergeant-Major was on a ship which was torpedoed. The ship sunk in seven minutes and many of those on board were unable to get to the boats. Sergeant-Major Wood, who was in one of the boats, saw two nurses and some wounded men in the water and leaning the splint from his leg leapt from the boat into the water and succeeded in rescuing the two nurses. It was for this act that he won the Royal Humane Society medal.

#### Brother Died in His Arms.

The saddest experience of the many Sergeant-Major Wood experienced was at Plugsteert in the early days of the war. Of all the horrors of war Plugsteert is probably the most outstanding in the minds of the men who responded to the call in time to take part in the fighting in that section and

the Sergeant-Major had an added experience to make the memory even sadder. He was helping in the recovering of the wounded from No Man's Land and had brought in two men. A third man whom he went to rescue proved to be his own and youngest brother, shot through the lungs and wounded in the head. So serious were the wounded man's injuries that he expired in his brother's arms, after he had been brought back to his own trench.

Sergeant-Major Wood had returned to Prince Rupert with the idea of getting again into civilian life when he heard the call for men for service in Siberia as brought by Corporal Nelson. He responded at once and is now at the Willows Camp, Victoria, where he is helping to lick into shape the men who are preparing for the Siberian campaign.

## DOCTOR WRITES COMMENDING BISHOP'S VIEWS

Dr. Ernest Mall Sends Letter of Approval to Victoria Paper Regarding Prince Rupert Man's Article

The article of Bishop Du Vernet on Clergymen and Doctors, which was published recently in The News was also published simultaneously in the Victoria Colonist. In a recent issue of that paper appears a reply by Dr. Ernest Hall, one of the leading physicians and surgeons of the province, who welcomes the suggestion of the Bishop and asks for an occasional sermon on the message to the body. Following is the letter:

Sir—Re your correspondence from the pen of Bishop Du Vernet in yesterday's issue, allow me in support of his claim to state that our profession recognizes but to a limited extent the loss to the community resulting from the lack of co-operation which he deplores. True a few leaders have measured up to the Bishop's ideal—but only a few. Read this extract from the writings of Dr. Hyslop, Professor of Psychological Medicine at St. Mary's Hospital, London: "As an alienist and one whose whole life has been concerned with the sufferings of the human mind, I would state that of all the hygienic measures to counteract disturbed sleep, depression of spirits and all the miserable sequels of a distressed mind I would undoubtedly give the first place to the simple habit of prayer. Let the child be taught to believe in an anthropomorphic God the Father, or in an all-pervading medium of guidance and control, or in the integrity of a cosmic whole, with its transmutations, evolutions and indestructibility. It matters little for they all lead in the same direction. Let there but be a habit of nightly communion, not as a mendicant, nor a repeater, of words more adapted to the tongue of a sage, but as a humble individual who submerges or asserts his individuality as an integral part of the greater whole. Such a habit does more to clean the spirit and strengthen the soul to overcome mere incidental emotionalism than any other therapeutic agent (Continued on Page Five).

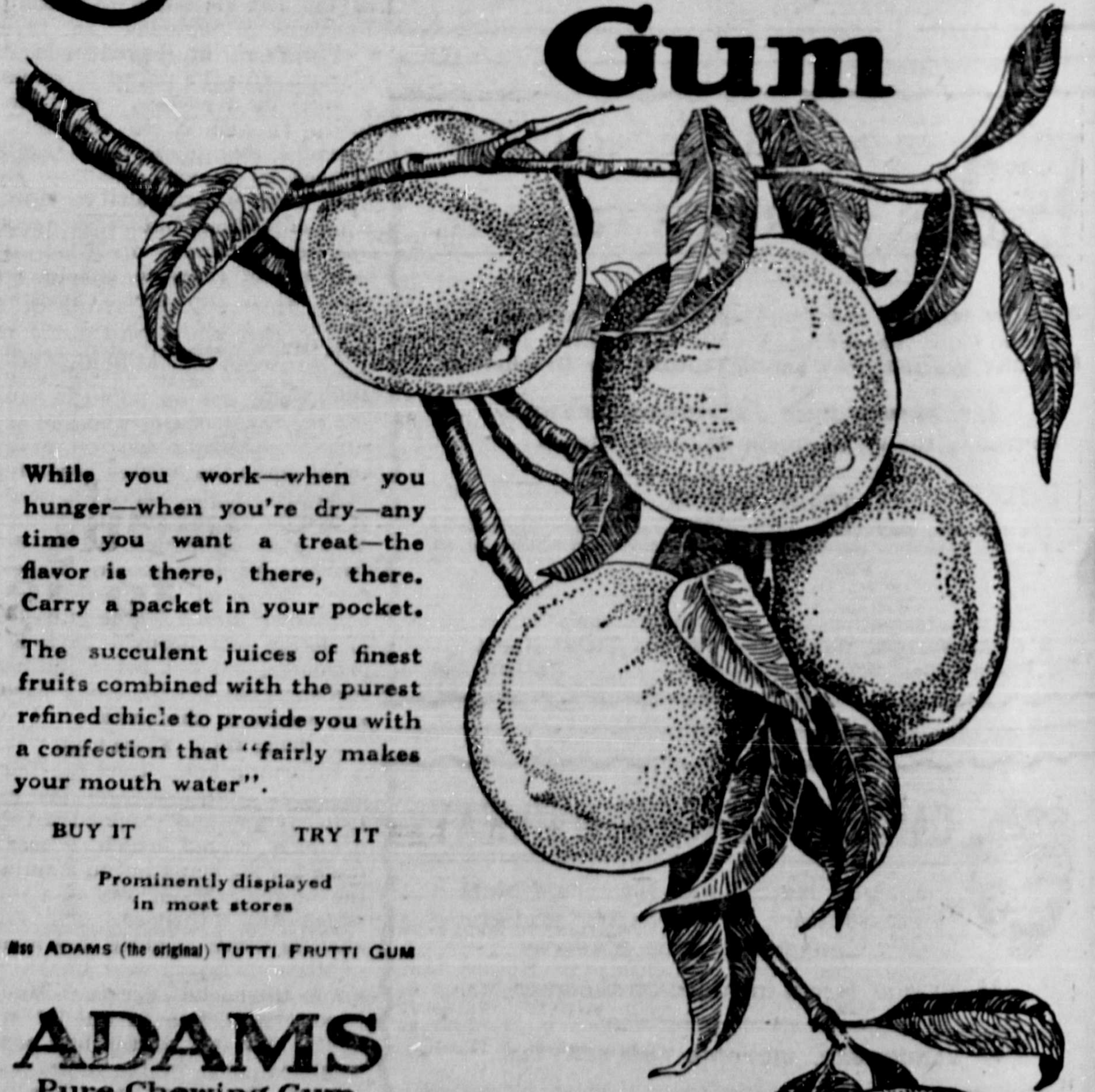

Canada's fisheries will yield, in addition to the above, during the present year, about \$9,000,000 worth of export.

In addition to the forest items 248 million feet of aeroplane spruce timber averaging over \$20 per thousand is contracted for in British Columbia as the result of Canada's financial assistance to Great Britain.

Not ranking as exports, but nevertheless directly financed by the Victory Loan 1917, is 446,000 tonnage of ships valued at \$70,000,000 which will be completed by the end of this year. These ships use millions of dollars worth of lumber and steel which again circulates vast sums among the workers of Canada.

Among the visitors to the city from Alice Arm are Jas. McAleenan, W. J. Crawford, G. W. Brugg, V. E. Lad, and Robert Moore.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Dyer took place this afternoon from Haynor's funeral chapel, Rev. W. S. A. Crux officiating. Interment was at Fairview cemetery.

Mrs. Spurr, who graduated as a nurse in England, has gone to Thurston Harbor to assist in taking care of the influenza patients gathered there from the logging camps.

The tug Commodore arrived in port yesterday afternoon from the Queen Charlotte Islands, bringing the bodies of five loggers who fell victims to the influenza epidemic. None of them are local men.

There was snow on the hills yesterday for the first time. That is about the usual time. The News' record shows that it has varied from the 21st to 26th of the month over a number of years.

Harry McLeod was among the passengers returning to the city last evening from up river, where he has been spending a few days' holiday. He was at the Prudhomme ranch near Telkwa and has come back with the tan of the outdoor life, and feeling fit.

The doctors in town are very much overworked and it must not be expected that they can answer every call promptly. An effort is being made to attend the worst cases and others have to await their turn. The medical men are trying to look after all regardless of their ability to pay or otherwise, and the fact that a man has money does not entitle him to preference.

When the "Northern Cross" visited Kitkatla last week, Rev. Rural Dean Rushbrook found that several of the Indians were down with influenza and one or two had already died. He has therefore decided to cancel his trip north to Alice Arm and return to Kitkatla with medicine, and help minister to the natives there who are without either doctor or nurse. Kitkatla is an Indian village on Dauphin Island about forty miles south from here.

The funeral took place this morning from the chapel of the B. C. Undertakers of several Indians, victims of the epidemic of Spanish influenza. The Rev. W. S. A. Crux conducted the service. Many friends of the deceased congregated at the chapel this morning to attend the service, and burial took place at Fairview. The deceased were Chief Swanson and his wife of Port Simpson, Samson McDonald of Kitimaat, Hester Nelson, Baby Morrison, Baby Ryan and Mrs. Carrie Mahony.

**In the Letter Box**

**Wants Whisky.**  
To the Editor:—  
At the present moment the laity, and we think some at least of the medical profession, is recommending the free use of alcoholic stimulants for the amelioration, if not the cure, of the influenza. We may think that the victim of the flu is mistaken in thinking that a bottle of good liquor would cure him. But the Creator has given to each of us the care of his own body, and if a man's mind directs that he use whisky for the cure of his ills, are we, the balance of the community, so cock sure that he is going to poison himself that we are justified in forcing him to resort to illegal methods to get the whisky that he thinks he needs? And poor stuff is readily obtainable at \$16 per bottle if one knows where to look.

The provision in the present prohibition law that alcoholic liquors may be obtained on a doctor's prescription is inadequate, because the doctors have neither the time nor the inclination to write prescriptions for everyone who thinks he needs them, in this emergency.

To my mind it seems plain that the Government should take immediate steps to make it possible for a man to get a bottle of good liquor at a reasonable price without any red tape whatever.

**SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT**

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agriculture purposes and which is non-forest land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties to such pre-emption, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claim for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 3 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same every year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvement of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential requirements and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.
