## Victory Loan Drive Starts To-Day

### FRENCH AND AMERICANS ARE MAKING SLOW PROGRESS IN GUISE AND MEUSE SECTORS

VELLY FIGHTING BY YANKEES AMONG WOODS — BOIS BELLEU TAKEN IN SUCCESSFUL ATTACK; FRENCH MOVE FORWARD NORTH-WEST OF GUISE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, October 29.—Still further progress has been made by the French to the northwest of Guise. They have moved forward to the east of the Peron River beyond Pargny Wood. The pressure here is steady but there have been no spectacular movements.

Washington, October 29.—The American forces are still engaged in a big struggle in Meuse sector. The country is all wooded and it is difficult fighting. Bois Belleu to the east of the Meuse is now completely in the hands of the American troops as a result of a successful attack carried out yesterday. Further lively fighting is taking place in the eastern portion of the Meuse.

### EDMONTON MURDER TRIAL ON THURSDAY

The Edmonton murder trial will resume on Thursday. Last Friday at the resumed preliminary hearing of the case against J. A. Campbell, alias Joe Madore, who is charged with the murder of Sam Zappier, H. H. Parlee, K. C., counsel for the accused, continued his objection to the court, admitting as evidence the unsolicited statement made by the accused to Detective Matheson in the guard room after his arrest, and the case was again adjourned until Thursday, October 31.

While Magistrate Primrose had not the slightest doubt or hesitation about the admissibility of the statement yet he decided that in all fairness to the prisoner, the man who conveyed the message from him to Detective Matheson should be (the accused) wanted to see that Matheson should be produced in court. ### FRENCH ACTIVE IN AEROPLANE RAIDS

Paris, Oct. 29.—French aviators have dropped bombs at many points across the German lines, destroying railway stations, transport and aerodromes. The increase in the number of aeroplanes is beginning to tell on the enemy who are unable to keep pace with the enormous production of the Allies.

### ALLIES PRESS HUNS BACK TO SOUTH OF VALENCIENNES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 29.—The British are still pushing the German lines back to the south of Valenciennes. There has been stiff opposition by the German forces but in spite of this the gains have been considerable and the pressure continuous.

While the British forces a week ago entered the outskirts of the city of Valenciennes they have not yet entered the city, it having become a settled policy recently to avoid destroying the cities as the Huns are driven out. To take the place by storm would necessitate doing much damage.

### CZECHO REFUGEES LIVE IN CELLARS AND CROWDED CAVES

United States Sending Aid in Money and Supplies to Different Points in Siberia.

Vladivostok, October 29.—The United States has contributed \$5,000,000 to President Masaryk of the Czechoslovak Republic. President Wilson advanced an additional \$3,000,000 worth of supplies for the Czechoslovak armies. These sums, together with the advance payment by the War Trade Board at Washington of \$5,000,000 for the economic relief of Russia, total \$13,000,000 which the United States has advanced to help the destitute and disorganized Russians and the hard-pressed, tenacious Czechoslovak armies.

Relief Work.  
Add to this the Red Cross and Y. M. C. A. relief work, and the ship tonnage placed at the disposal of August Hoid, the War Trade Board representative, for November and December, and there is concrete evidence that America does not intend to leave the Czechs in the lurch as an active propaganda throughout Siberia and in the interior of Russia maintains.

The Czechs understand the importance of America's concentrating armies in France this year, and also the Siberian Railway situation, which would endanger the presence of a large number of forces on the Volga until the Allies can assume control of the Transiberian.

Red Cross Special.  
Another evidence of America's intense sympathy and support of the Czechs is that a Red Cross special sanitary train is expected to leave soon for the interior, and will distribute supplies en route to the front. The train will carry clothing, food, boots, blankets, furs, medical supplies, doctors and nurses.

In Harbin appear all sections and classes—Russians, Czechs, Poles, Armenians—refugees traveling in box cars to escape the barbarous Bolshevik advance.

The Red Cross is now considering dispatching two trains to Cheliabinsk to aid the people before winter. Medical attention is desperately urgent. A typhoid epidemic has broken out in the Czechoslovak headquarters. Even members of the municipal hospital staff are affected. While there is no evidence that the epidemic will spread to the Czech forces, who are quartered in schools, stores, and clubs, the Red Cross is rushing assistance to check the disease.

Living in Cellars.  
This condition is not confined to the interior, but is found in Eastern Siberia, where refugees are living in overcrowded cellars, caves, or abandoned houses.

The Red Cross is caring for 5,000 in Vladivostok. Many thousands of others are scattered along the Siberian Railway. Fortunately winter has not set in, but within another month thousands of lives will be in the hands of the American relief expeditions.

### FLU CONDITIONS ARE IMPROVING ALONG RAILWAY

Train Brings Cheerful News From Various Points in Regard to Progress of Epidemic

Reports from up the line seem to indicate that the Spanish influenza has very nearly run its course. Most of those who were first attacked have recovered and business which was very much disorganized is again becoming more or less normal.

At Smithers and Hazelton where there were a number of cases a good many are recovered but there are still a number who are more or less seriously ill. No place seems to have been missed.

At Prince George when the train passed through the condition was much better. The town had been hit very hard as may be inferred from the following from the last number of the Prince George Citizen:

"At a special meeting of the city council held Wednesday night it was decided to open the school on the Millar Section as a temporary hospital, and Miss Sutherland, a graduate nurse, has been placed in charge. Dr. Lyon was appointed medical health officer for the city."

"Several severe cases of influenza are reported from the lumbering districts east of here. At Aleza Lake the little daughter of Postmaster Davidson died yesterday, though it is not stated that the child's death was due to influenza. Another victim was a man named George Hendrickson, employed at one of the mills."

"At Giscome Mrs. Sims, wife of a section foreman, died yesterday. Other cases at Giscome are reported recovering."

"A young man named Lockyer, on leave from military training camp, died yesterday at Salmon River, north of the city. He was on a visit to his parents. Other members of the family are reported seriously ill."

"An Austrian who had been brought in from Hutton Mills in a serious condition, died in the city Tuesday night."

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### INDIAN PATIENTS AT SALVATION ARMY ARE RECOVERING

Many ill at Metlakatla and Tucks Inlet, But Conditions Steadily Improving.

The condition of the influenza patients in the Salvation Army tracks is continuing to be satisfactory. There are some seven Indians there now, and all are making good progress. Five others have already been discharged. There are still other fifty-five among the Indians in town, who have not been taken to the hospital and in their case, too, satisfactory recoveries are being made.

Captain Hanson of the Salvation Army, who has been nursing since the outbreak of the epidemic, is being attacked herself with the flu, and is receiving attention. Miss Klippert, the Indian school teacher from Metlakatla, has come over to help in the work, and good assistance has been given by Mrs. Lamb and Mrs. La Fortune, of this city.

In Metlakatla there are twenty cases of influenza, and at Tucks Inlet cannery the patients number ninety-eight, making in all nearly two hundred cases among the Indians. Indian Agent Perry has been very active in looking after his wards, and a good response to his advice and nursing is seen in the condition of the patients.

There are hopes that every patient will recover, as there are only one or two who are at present within the danger line.

At Tucks Inlet cannery this morning the little daughter of a Green died, but with every care and attention being given the others, it is hoped that no more fatalities will occur.

### CAPTAIN AND CREW OF BOAT IN HOSPITAL

Imbricaria Laid Up While Six Men Recover from Influenza at Borden St. Hospital.

The condition of the patients at the Borden Street Emergency Hospital continues to be satisfactory. Three patients were discharged yesterday, well enough to go home. Seven other cases were admitted of which only one was a local one. Six came off the fishing boat Imbricaria, which belongs to the Canadian Fish Co. of Vancouver. This vessel was in here last week and put off two of her crew suffering from influenza, but had to come back again yesterday. Her skipper, Captain Hanson, the engineer and the cook, together with three of the fishermen are all now in the Borden Street Emergency Hospital, and so far doing well.

There have been no deaths there since yesterday, and the condition of the majority of the patients is such that their recovery is certain.

There is still a considerable shortage of help at the Borden Street Hospital. Several of the former volunteer nurses are now confined to home, either with influenza or being run down through overwork, and so far others have not come forward to take their places. Although the epidemic has been countered, the patients still suffering require nursing and everything possible for them will have to be done.

### Gilt Edge and Profitable

The campaign for the big Victory Loan is being launched today almost everywhere throughout Canada. Owing to circumstances the local committee has decided to postpone its activities along this line for a few days.

Preparations can be made, however, by those who are in a position to purchase bonds, and the main thing to calculate is how many can possibly be bought and paid for. The money is necessary if the war is to go on, and no one here would ask the Government to make an ignominious peace.

As an income-bearing security the loan is probably the best there is in the world today, and it is free from income tax. That does away with one of the petty annoyances which the war taxes are placing on us. The whole of the revenue produced from the bond goes to the owner of the bond and the rate of interest is high.

Another feature about the Victory bonds is that they are good collateral. The banks take them at any time and loan money on them, and most merchants will take them as currency. They are gilt edge and highly profitable. There is little else that can be said.

## How About Germany After the War?

What will happen in Germany when the war is over is one of the things that is being discussed a good deal just now. Will there be revolutions, riots, upheaval and crime, or will the people settle down to work after their mad revel of blood?

A good many people prophecy that there will be all sorts of trouble. They say that the military autocrats, the junkers and the men of wealth and position will all have to go and that the reign of democracy will be preceded by an upheaval that will make the French Revolution look as small in comparison as the Battle of Waterloo is compared with some of the battles in the present war.

If the Germans should take a notion to fight among themselves it will certainly be better than having them fight against our men.

## Getting Settlers On the Land.

Thomas Jefferson once said: "Our people will remain virtuous so long as agriculture is our principal object. When we get piled on one another in large cities, as in Europe, we shall go to eating each other as they do there."

In Northern British Columbia an attempt is being made to interest people in agriculture, but so far it has not proved very satisfactory. Possibly it is too soon to anticipate what the Land Settlement Board is likely to do. They are not a colonization organization. They can draw up the plan and possibly advertise, but they can hardly have much compelling force in the way of bringing settlers in and getting them on the land. It is for the Board to provide the land and to look after the settler when he arrives.

There are colonization companies that have agencies throughout the United States and who are in a position to do more than the Government ever can do in the way of advertising the northern lands and inducing the right class of people to come. It is well worth considering whether it might not be well to place the colonization in their hands and pay by results. Advertising will have to be done, and even then there is doubt about getting results. If payment were made for results only to some organization willing to take it up the province would be the gainer.

In making this suggestion it must not be thought that we would place ourselves as a province in the hands of any private concern. It is simply this. We have the lands and we want those lands to be producing. In the ordinary course it will take generations to get the people on those lands. Why wait all that time if results can be obtained quicker?

## Poverty an Offense To Poor and Rich.

George Bernard Shaw once wrote an article on poverty and in it he spoke of poverty being offensive to him. That is quite the right point of view to take. We read and talk too much about socialism. What we want to do first is to abolish poverty. There is no need for it. In a well governed country, or possibly it would be better to say in a properly self-governed country there should be none so rich as to be able to oppress and none so poor as to suffer by reason thereof.

Poverty cannot be got rid of by the giving of alms nor by the distribution of property. Charitable organizations have absolutely no place in a well administered country. The only value in charitable organizations is to provide a pleasant occupation for some old ladies and a few men and to give them an opportunity to patronize the poor. It is a form of gloating that is not pleasant for the person who happens to be the unhappy victim. In getting rid of poverty it is necessary to preserve the self-respect of all. Charity does not do that. It demeans and pauperizes.

The Provincial Government is attempting to regulate things to some extent by establishing a minimum wage for women. They are investigating conditions and they propose to see that no girl is asked to work for less money than will keep her decently. The idea is good and it will probably be a first step toward a better condition. The experiment will be watched with interest.

## National Fish Day On Thursday Next.

Thursday next is Canada's national fish day. It is selected for the purpose of drawing special attention to the fish resources of the Dominion and also to induce people to use fish more regularly as an article of diet.

Fish is an excellent food. It is light and nourishing and should be eaten at least once a day. Many people use fish for lunch; others prefer it for breakfast, while not a few make it the main feature of the evening meal several times a week.

Every fish meal saves so much meat and is another bullet for the boys who are fighting the Huns. Just what Prince Rupert has done along this line it is almost impossible to estimate. She has saved enough beef to feed a battalion and done it continuously.

Prince Rupert people should observe fish day just as much as others. Sometimes on account of our nearness to the source of supply we are apt to overlook this valuable food. It is served in so many different ways and there are so many varieties that it is well to try them all in order to suit our individual tastes.

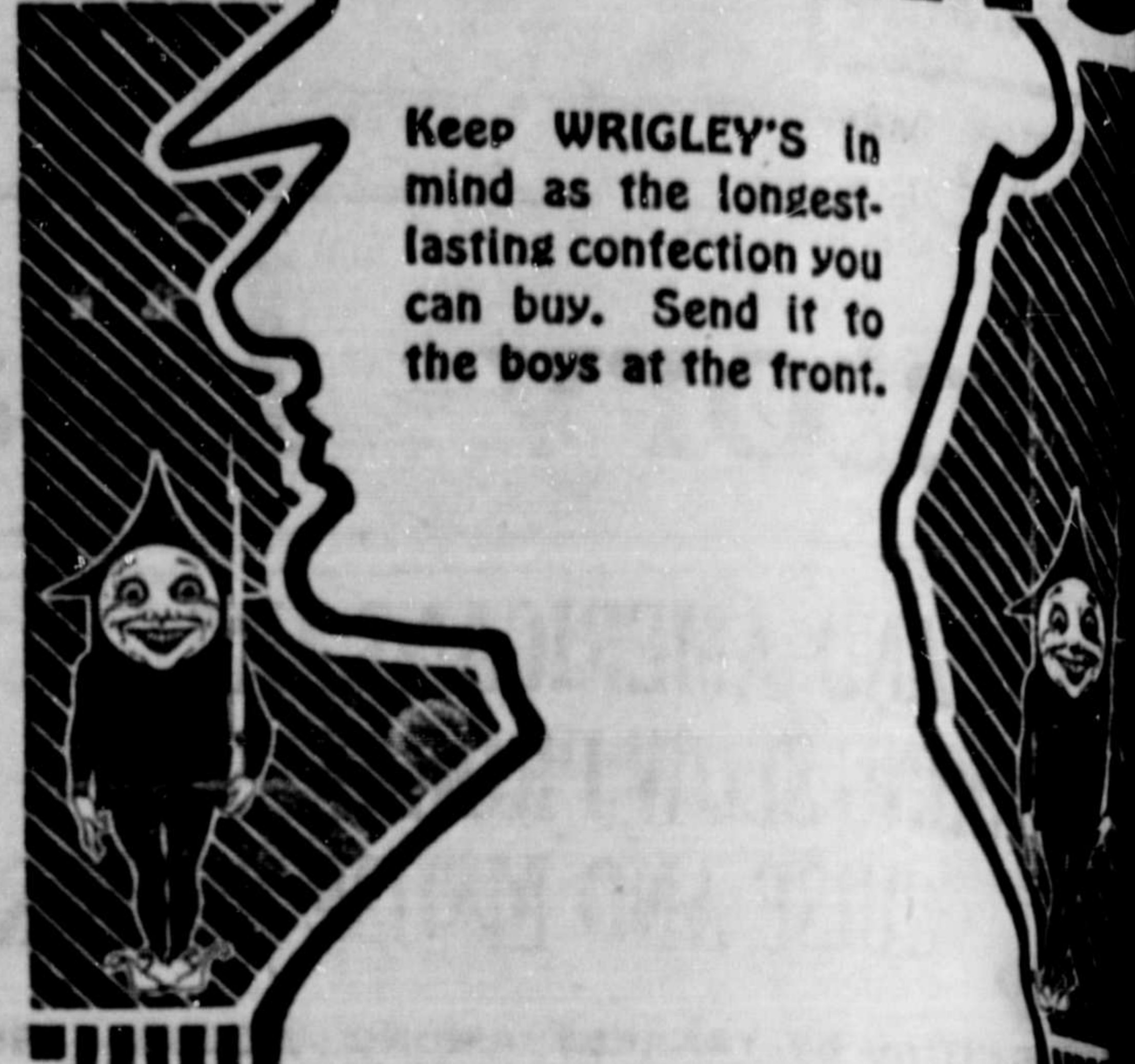

## GERMANY'S FINANCES ARE IN PARLOUS STATE AND INFLUENCE PEACE OFFERS

NEW LOAN NOT BEING WELL RECEIVED IN THAT COUNTRY  
—FUTURE SAVINGS OF PEOPLE BEING  
MORTGAGED TO MEET  
OBLIGATIONS

New York, October 26.—Germany's financial position is believed to be approaching the breaking point, and this is one of the reasons why Germany is so anxious to bring about peace. She is engaged at the present time in raising her ninth war loan, and such information as has come through adjoining neutral countries indicates that it is not going well.

The German people were induced to subscribe to previous recent loans on the theory that they were to be Victory and Peace Loans. But this comforting consolation cannot be held out now, with the German front crumbling in the west and the position of the Central Powers in the Balkans and elsewhere extremely precarious.

The "Victory and Peace" argument had a highly stimulating effect when Germany floated her previous loan last spring. The Kaiser told his people that the German army was to make a break for victory on the western front, to bring about a termination of the war and a German peace this year. On the strength of this promise subscriptions were obtained to the eighth loan of \$3,690,000,000, exceeding by \$437,500,000 the previous record loan, the sixth, raised in the spring of 1917.

### Thirty-four Billions.

After Germany raised the eighth war loan, her national debt is estimated approached \$29,000,000,000. It is fair to assume that since then it has reached thirty-three or thirty-four billion dollars. On June 23 last, the Reichstag passed a vote of credit of 15,000,000,000 marks, approximately \$3,750,000,000 under normal exchange, which, it was then declared, would raise Germany's war debt to 139,000,000,000 marks or \$32,000,000,000.

Assuming that her debt stands now at \$33,000,000,000, or 143,000,000,000 marks, Germany has mortgaged therefore two-fifths of her national wealth, estimated at \$80,000,000,000.

That this figure is approaching Germany's limitation in the war is indicated from remarks from time to time by authorities in Germany. At one time Rudolph Havenstein, president of the Reichsbank, is reported to have said that Germany must collapse when her war expenses reached 100,000,000,000 marks. When the war costs exceeded this figure the limit was placed higher. In March of this year, George Bernhard, editor of the "Vossische Zeitung," declared in a lecture he delivered in Berlin when the eighth German war loan was going on that Germany's debt after the war would be thirty times what it was at the beginning. He said that at the end of the war Germany probably would have a debt of 150,000,000,000 marks, as against 5,000,000,000 marks before the war.

### Taxation Burden.

As an indication of what German people are facing Bernhard said that 14,000,000,000 marks (about \$3,220,000,000) would have to be provided annually after the war through taxation. He estimated the empire's national wealth at 400,000,000,000 marks, a large part being state and municipal capital. As he did not favor a single levy on capital and in order that small capital should not be taxed too hard the larger fortunes would probably have to pay taxes as high as 50 per cent. annually on their income to meet the debt charges.

The extremity to which the German people were put to meet the requirements of the previous loan is shown by the offering of a device by which a person might mortgage his prospective savings for the next ten years by means of a special insurance policy.

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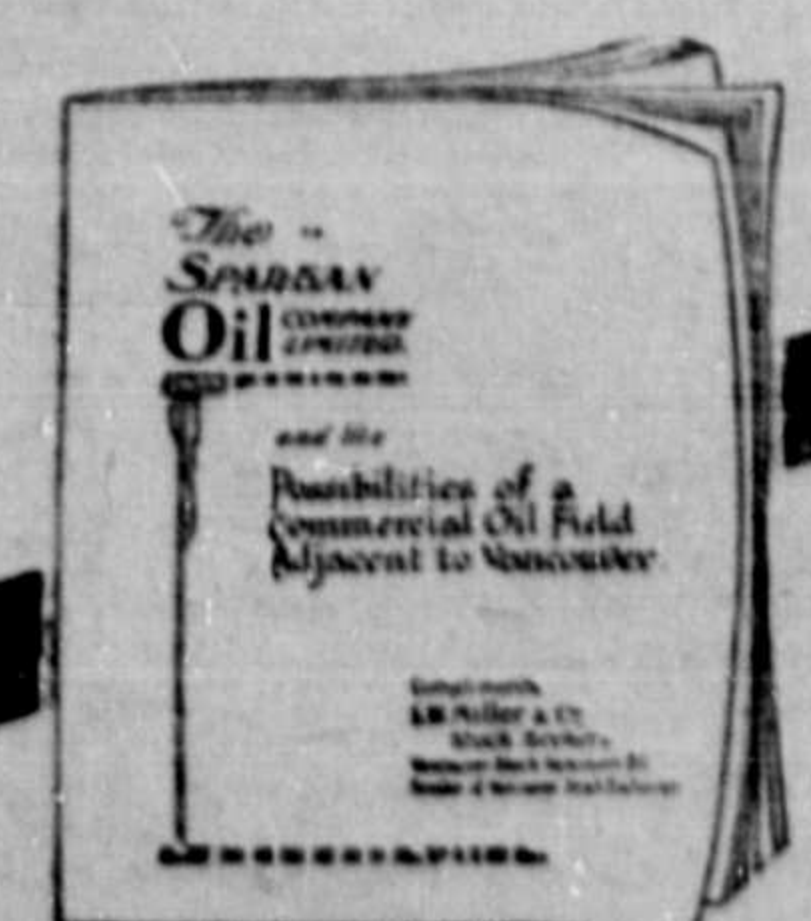

## FISHING SEASON IS ABOUT OVER

**Many Canneries Closed—Big Pack Of Dog Salmon—Market Uncertain.**

The 1918 fishing season is now practically over, says the New Westminster Columbian. Many of the canneries have already completed their operations, and the others will all finish their pack for the season within a week or two. There are still some cohoes being caught in the river and a few steelheads. Dog salmon have been practically non-existent this year so far as the Fraser river is concerned, but great catches have been made by purse seiners on the west coast. The Liverpool cannery, which has a seining concession, had 20,000 fish on the floor last Saturday, and has been getting from 12,000 to 20,000.

Great numbers of dog salmon or chums have been packed this season; the New England Fish Company, it is estimated, has put up a hundred thousand cases. The cannery who have packed a lot of chums are somewhat uneasy as to how they will get rid of it. There is no local market for this variety, and shipping facilities are still uncertain.

The government has not taken over the dog salmon pack as it has taken the pack of other varieties. There is some talk that Italy may take this variety, but the question of transportation is unsettled.

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title must be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he records land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; use to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for a title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of holding such Agreements. Two or more persons may jointly and severally make such agreements and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase money from the Crown has been paid are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the allotment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 31st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## BANK OF FRANCE AND WAR CRISIS

Advances to State Amounted to Over Sixteen Billion Francs.

Philadelphia, October 29.—How the Bank of France sensed the European war as early as 1913 and took measures then to checkmate Germany's increasingly threatening financial policy by raising its gold reserve and circulating small notes to take the place of metal currency, thus enabling the institution to successfully carry its many war burdens, is set forth by the Paris Chamber of Commerce in a communication just received by the Philadelphia Bourse.

After pointing to the expansion by the bank of its gold reserve from 3,194,000,000 francs in 1913 to 4,141,000,000 francs in 1914, and the arranging of steps to be taken by all its personnel "in case of war," the communication of the Paris commercial organization read as follows:

"During the financial crisis which reigned in all the belligerent countries during the last week of July, 1914, the bank was able to rise to the occasion and meet unhesitatingly all the demands that the country made upon it. By degrees, as the withdrawal of deposits from the banks increased, the amount of commercial bills presented for discount rose from 1,583,000,000 francs, July 27, to 3,430,000,000, August 3. In spite of the coming into force of various moratorium decrees, and notwithstanding the demands created by a paper currency notably on the increase, it continued to discount commercial bills, and so enabled banks and private individuals to gradually meet their liabilities. It made the treasury for the first expenses of the war an advance of 2,900,000,000 francs, to which were added 100,000,000 advanced by the Bank of Algeria. Owing to the prolongation of the war and the heavy expenditure of all kinds resulting from it, and in spite of the success of the national defence emissions, the total sum of the advances made by the bank to the state increased, little by little, until it exceeded 16,000,000,000, April, 1917, not including 3,500,000,000 in treasury bills discounted by the bank as loans to our Allies."

## CANADIAN PAINTS MOUNT SIR RIDER

Toronto, October 28.—F. M. Bell-Smith, the dean of Canada's landscape artists, has just returned from the Rockies after fulfilling an interesting commission. Two years ago Sir Rider Haggard, the English novelist, made a trip through Canada on his way home from Australia travelling over the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. The Geographic Board of Canada on that occasion named a splendid peak near the Grand Trunk Pacific line in British Columbia "Mount Sir Rider" and the glacier on the mountain "Haggard Glacier." The famous author appreciating this honor, commissioned Mr. Bell-Smith to make a painting of the mountain for his English home and for exhibition in Great Britain, and Mr. Bell-Smith has now completed this work.

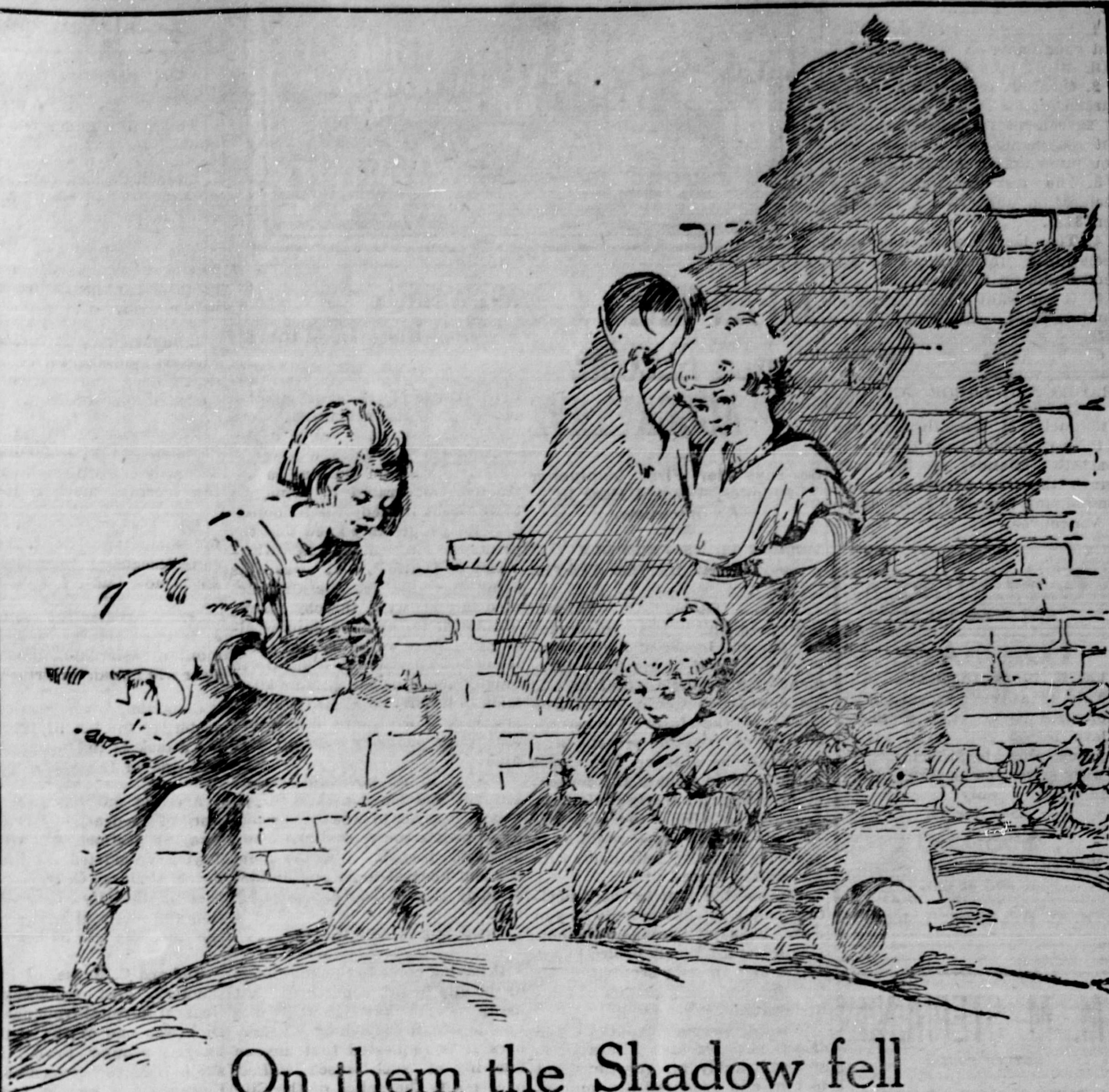

JAPAN WILL  
NOT BECOME  
AGGRESSIVESo says Her First Commoner  
Premier, Takashi Hara in  
An Interview.WISHES TO BE FRIENDLY  
WITH THE UNITED STATES

Tokio, October 28.—Takashi Hara, Japan's first commoner premier and leader of the Seiyukai party, said in his first statement of his policies, that he and his colleagues would constantly labor on the future questions arising out of the present war. Although the alliance with Great Britain would remain the cornerstone of Japan's foreign relations, he said, he wished to emphasize that his special effort would be to promote friendly relations with the United States.

"Please tell that to the American people as convincingly as you can," he said, "because my colleagues and I keenly desire to see Japan and America brought closer together and every shadow of misunderstanding removed."

With democratic simplicity and directness, Premier Hara discussed frankly all questions put to him and produced the impression that Japan, which for the last fifty years has been largely ruled by bureaucrats, has entered upon a new and significant period of constitutional progress, in which popular opinion is more effectively to guide the nation's policies.

## Was Reporter.

Beginning life as a newspaper reporter, Hara's attainment to the premiership is regarded as proving that the time has arrived when in Japan, as in America, any citizen can hope to climb to the places of highest responsibility.

previous attempts to establish the party system of government had been made, but called attention to the fact that the present ministry was the first to come into power on so clearly based an idea of parties.

"I will make it my aim to develop party government into consonance with the age in which we live," he said.

Requested to explain his views on some criticism that Japan, like the German military autocracy, may sometime become militarily aggressive, Premier Hara declared that he was amazed, on visiting America eleven years ago, to hear the fears voiced by some Americans that Japan's military plans were designed against America.

## Only Defense.

"This is, of course, absurd," he said. "History shows that Japan has never engaged voluntarily in wars. It is admitted that our war against Russia was purely defensive. We have no ambition or intention of aggression or conquest. The present war has shown that our agreements were defective and this will be remedied, but Japan has no idea except to be in a proper condition for defense."

"Our victories in the Chinese and Russian wars naturally led the Japanese people to admire their army, and this, in turn, may have led to a misconception abroad of the importance which Japan gives to armaments."

"The military influence is not so dominant in Japan as outsiders may believe. Our constitution is still young, and some of our people may favor a similar form of government to the German system, but the present ministry is united in the determination to secure the constitutional development of Japan along the popular lines which the war has so indisputably demonstrated as the world's tendency and the desire of the peoples of the world."

"The voice of the people must be obeyed and the press is the great medium for that voice. I have in mind several measures calculated to embody this popular movement in concrete form."
