"GALIANO" IN DISTRESS

MESSAGE SENT AT 3.30 A. M. SAID HOLDS FILLED WITH WATER

Turkey and Austria are Asking Peace

ADMIRALTY PATROL STEAMER GALIANO REPORTS BY WIRELESS IN DISTRESS AND ASKS AID

Further Word from Her Gives Impression that She may have Foundered; Steam Trawler G. E. Foster Gone to Make Search.

It is possible that the Admiralty patrol steamer Galiano has gone down with all on board off the south end of Queen Charlotte Islands. The last word heard from her by wireless was that her holds were full of water and she was in distress. That was at 3:30 this morning and nothing has been heard from her since. The steam trawler Foster has gone to the rescue and there is a possibility of her being still afloat, but the silence of wireless is, to say the least, ominous.

At 3:30 this morning at the Digby Island Wireless station one of the operators was "listening in" when he got a call from the Galiano off Cape St. James, saying that the holds were full of water and asking for help. She also reported that the weather was terrific.

The wireless operators at once tried to get in touch with the Galiano at the Queen Charlottes but there was no boat at Thurston or any other point on the islands that could possibly venture out in the terrific gale. Then efforts were made to reach boat after boat here, but with no good result until late this morning when Fisheries Inspector Williams was appealed to and he at once got in touch with Manager Johnson of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., who agreed to send out the steam trawler G. E. Foster, a fine seaworthy boat that can stand any sea. She left at just one hour after being notified that her services were needed. She is in charge of Captain F. R. Walters, an experienced navigator.

The G. T. P. tug Lorne also left this afternoon going south, and will go as far as possible in the direction of the Galiano, to render whatever assistance may be possible. From the gale which is reported raging down the coast, however, it may be impossible for the Lorne to get across the Strait, but if it is at all possible, it will do so.

Hope Not Gone.

The probable loss of the Galiano is the topic of discussion everywhere on the waterfront this morning. It is pointed out that while the storms on that part of the coast are worse than at any other and the gale last night was reported to be a terrific one, yet the Galiano may be floating helplessly and waterlogged and may yet be picked up. It is also possible that she may have been driven ashore and the lives of those aboard saved. Something must have happened to put the wireless out of business. Cape St. James is the southernmost point of the Queen Charlotte Island group, and is exposed to the full sweep of the gales coming from any direction. The coast there is very rocky and bleak.

Sister to Malaspina.

The Galiano is a sister ship to the Malaspina. She was in command of Capt. Pope and Mr. Green Shields was in charge of the engines. She had a crew of between thirty and forty, some of whom were young men who were training in the naval service. The vessel was built at Dublin in 1913 for the Dominion Government fisheries patrol service. After war broke out she was transferred to other boats in the service, taken over by the Admiralty and for some time was stationed at Esquimalt. Of late she has been engaged in patrol duties up the coast. She was 168.8 feet long, 27.1 beam, and 13.1 in depth. Her gross tonnage was 393, nominal tonnage 120 and her engines had a nominal horsepower of 61.

GERMANY MUST SURRENDER HER FLEET, INCLUDING ALL SUBMARINES AND ALLOW THE OCCUPATION OF HER FORTIFIED TOWNS IN RHINE VALLEY, SAYS DISPATCH

THIRD OF FAMILY DIED YESTERDAY

William Church, Eldest Son of Parents Who Were Victims of Influenza.

The death of William Church is reported this morning at the General Hospital. He was a young man aged nineteen years, and it was only last week that his father, George Church, died at the Borden Emergency Hospital, and his mother at the General Hospital. He was the eldest of a family of nine children, and only yesterday his younger brother aged eight was admitted to the General Hospital suffering from influenza also. This boy, William, was born at Victoria, and was employed as fireman at the Cold Storage Company's plant at Seal Cove. He was admitted to the hospital on the 24th, and died yesterday.

A few more cases have been admitted to the General Hospital since yesterday, but they are not so serious as the average cases taken there last week.

Jim Hunter is making slight progress, and W. Vaughan Davis is distinctly better this morning. Among the later patients at the General Hospital are Mr. and Mrs. Pete Linzey, and their condition is favorable.

London, October 30.—The Versailles Conference of the Supreme War Council of the Allies, according to a report current in London this afternoon, has agreed on the main points of the armistice terms which will now be considered by the military commanders. Final peace terms, it is said, will be submitted to Germany simultaneously with the armistice terms.

As part of the terms of the armistice, the Evening Times says it understands the Allied nations will insist upon the surrender of the German fleet, including all German submarines and the occupation by Allied forces of all fortified towns on the Rhine.

Paris, October 30.—The Executive Committee of the German Peace Party has formed a provisional Government, according to reports from Vienna, and has decided to send a separate note to President Wilson.

The Arbitrator Zeitung of Vienna declares Germany and Austria-Hungary will capitulate without delay.

Vienna, via Basel, October 30.—Austria-Hungary through her Foreign Minister, Count Andrassy, has sent a note to Secretary of State Lansing requesting the Secretary's intervention with President Wilson for an immediate armistice on all fronts and the commencement of peace negotiations.

Turkey Also Suppliant.
London, October 30.—Turkey has independently presented peace proposals to the Entente nations, according to a report from Constantinople forwarded by a correspondent at Copenhagen of the Exchange Telegraph Company. Negotiations are expected to end soon.

NEW CABINET AT ARCHANGEL FORMED

Large Majority of Socialists Recently Elected to Duma and Big Bourgeois Vote.

Archangel, Oct. 29.—The Government in northern Russia again has been reorganized and the supreme power again conferred on Nicholas Tschaikovsky. Colonel Luroff will retain his position as Governor General and Military Commander in the region of the north.

With the exception of Premier Tschaikovsky, all the members of the Cabinet belong to bourgeois parties. In addition to the Cabinet there is an Advisory Council of fifteen men, representing all strata of society and all parties.

In Archangel the elections recently held for members of the Duma resulted in a large majority for the Socialists, although the bourgeois vote was larger than ever before.

The new Cabinet meets with the general approval of the Allied diplomatic corps here.

CIVILIANS FLYING IN PANIC FROM VALLEY OF THE RHINE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 30.—(By British wireless). Civilian departures from the Lower Rhine Land and part of Westphalia, which were begun on a small scale, when the first Allied bombs hit Cologne, have developed into a panic flight, according to The Hague correspondent of the Daily Mail. All the banks are being stormed by depositors.

Duke of Devonshire Acts Quickly

His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire wants a share of Canada's Second Victory Loan. The following letter explains why:

BORDEN ST. HOSPITAL IS STILL VERY BUSY

Decrease in Number of Patients With One Death There Since Yesterday.

Four more patients suffering from influenza were admitted to the Borden Street Emergency Hospital yesterday, and one was well enough to be discharged. The newer patients, however, are being received in time before the malady has obtained a fatal hold, and they have very much better chance of making a good recovery.

There was one death since yesterday, that of a Scotchman named Debech, who was very sick when brought to the hospital. All the other patients are in a fair way.

There is now a great decrease in the number of new cases of influenza being reported daily, and every indication that the epidemic is definitely past its worst. The number of deaths is also on the decline, and although possibly the number of sufferers from the

disease is as great as ever, the number of serious cases is very much smaller.

At the Borden Street Hospital, there is still a demand for further help, both in the kitchen and in the wards. Several of the volunteers have taken ill and are suffering from the strain of long hours and the unaccustomed work and the necessity for further assistants to replace these remains great.

Prince Rupert Gets Free Publicity.

Prince Rupert is getting a large amount of free publicity from her industries. The Canada Food Board is featuring the fish products of this port in the "Daily Food Flashes" which they send out, and the Victory Loan publicity department has an article on the spruce industry which goes to practically every paper in Canada and which is interesting. It is headed "New Canadian Industry Through Victory Loans," and is as follows.

"Operations on a huge scale are proceeding in the Queen Charlotte Islands for the recovery of wood for the manufacture of airplanes, and the story makes one of the finest chapters in the history of Canadian industry. The Queen Charlotte Islands are situated in the Pacific Ocean across from Prince Rupert, B. C., and the Imperial Munitions Board has transformed that once lonely land into a scene of wonderful activity. The Board has contracted for 250,000,000 feet of logs, of spruce and fir, and when it is understood that there is a recovery of only 15 per cent. from these logs, for the purposes of airplane building, it is plain that the operation has come to be one of primary importance.

"When the Imperial Munitions Board definitely ascertained that large quantities of Sitka or Silver spruce, the kind required for airplanes, were to be found in Queen Charlotte Islands, it set to work to get the timber out, undeterred by the seeming difficulties in connection with transportation. In the middle of the group of islands lies Moresby Island, into the centre of which runs Masset Inlet, where some of the finest spruce trees are to be found, some of them measuring 12 feet in diameter. Graham and Charlotte City are also islands possessing a vast wealth of this wood, and where the Board has inaugurated its activities. It also operates in six districts on the mainland, Vancouver, Victoria, Quatsino, Swanson Bay, Ocean Falls and Prince Rupert. In fact the operations of the Board cover a distance of 600 miles from north to south as the crow flies.

Transportation Troubles.

"In procuring a sufficient supply of airplane wood the Board had to overcome many difficulties of climate and communication. Roads had to be built through impassable country, new sawmills and new camps had to be set up and old ones renewed. When the operations were begun in 1917 the Pacific coast had to be scoured for tugs, for logging engines and other necessary machinery. There was a dearth of supplies of all kinds and labor was hardly to be got. Wireless stations were erected.

"The work was entrusted to Major Taylor, Director of Aeronautical Supplies of the Imperial Munitions Board. Serving without remuneration, he threw into the task an enthusiasm which is characteristic of the volunteer. Three of Major Taylor's senior officers also serve without pay. He is assisted by an Advisory Committee consisting of some of the leading citizens of British Columbia. There is also a Fir Emergency Committee.

Work by Experts.

"For administrative purposes the work is divided, there being an officer for ocean transport and another for inland transport; also one each for logging operations, sawing, wireless stations and general equipment. All of these are experts in their particular lines. The greatest care must be exercised in the selection, falling and sawing of the spruce. There must not be the slightest blemish in the wood selected for airplanes, and only about 15 per cent. of the good tree is useful for this purpose. To date probably 50,000,000 feet of logs have been cut.

"Of the timber for airplanes about 70 per cent. is spruce and 30 per cent. fir. Each of the 69 camps is being speeded to the limit, and in September 6,000,000 feet of airplane timber was produced. This goes by rail to the Atlantic seaboard and 95 per cent. goes to Great Britain.

"This is a fine record of push and energy. It was possible to do this largely through the last Victory Loan. The moral is: Help to make the next Loan such a success that the work of war winning will not be hampered."

Gilt Edge and Profitable

The campaign for the big Victory Loan is being launched today almost everywhere throughout Canada. Owing to circumstances the local committee has decided to postpone its activities along this line for a few days.

Preparations can be made, however, by those who are in a position to purchase bonds, and the main thing to calculate is how many can possibly be bought and paid for. The money is necessary if the war is to go on, and no one here would ask the Government to make an ignominious peace.

As an income-bearing security the loan is probably the best there is in the world today, and it is free from income tax. That does away with one of the petty annoyances which the war taxes are placing on us. The whole of the revenue produced from the bond goes to the owner of the bond and the rate of interest is high.

Another feature about the Victory bonds is that they are good collateral. The banks take them at any time and loan money on them, and most merchants will take them as currency. They are gilt edge and highly profitable. There is little else that can be said.

FESTIVAL OF ALL HALLOWS

When Witches Ride Broomsticks Accompanied by Black Cats.

An ancient festival is to be celebrated tomorrow night, the evening of October 31. Although the real history of the occasion goes further back, right into the mists of dim European antiquity, the eve of All Saints' Day has long been famous for its merriment.

With that adaptability which was characteristic of the Roman Catholic Church during the times of its temporal power, in the earlier centuries, the old Pagan Festivals gained a new significance. The first two days of November, which in Britain were celebrated with bloody sacrifice in Druidical times, were converted into Festivals of the Church. The first day of November became All Saints' Day—a feast dedicated to all the Saints—and November 2 was changed to All Souls' Day, when prayers were offered for the souls of the faithful deceased—presumably to the exclusion of the deceased "unfaithful."

All Hallows' Eve, commonly known as Hallowe'en, however, still retains its ancient characteristics and is even more widely celebrated than the religious festivals following. It is an occasion for joyousness, for feasting, and for indulgence in the good things provided by the bountiful harvest season just past. The tradition marks the boundary between autumn and winter.

Witch World.

In many European countries, even to this day, the powers of darkness and evil are supposed to be abroad on this occasion, as on Walpurgis night, the eve of the first of May, when the old Pagan witch-world holds high revelry, particularly in certain places.

The old ladies with Welsh hats and moustaches ride their broomsticks over the tree tops, always accompanied by their black cats. And all sorts of things were supposed to happen. We know better

now in this country in this twentieth century, although on Hallowe'en all sorts of things do happen, which makes the people to whom they happen guess quite a bit.

Customs Remain.

But if the unfounded beliefs of past ages are gone, still some pleasing customs remain. Tomorrow night the family washtub will be brought into the living room, half filled with water, and rosy-cheeked apples floating therein. The pleasurable delights of childhood will come back to the grownups, and they will "dook" for apples with their quondam zest. Then there will be mashed potatoes with the dime, and the bachelor's button and the china doll, and other interesting articles hidden in their midst. There will be pumpkin lanterns carved into inhuman features, and to celebrate the festival properly the "guisers" will be out in force.

Mythical Characters.

In the country districts of Great Britain, historical and mythical characters are even yet represented on Hallowe'en. King Arthur and his Knights of the Round Table and many others appear in the plays enacted, which have been handed down from one generation to another. One of the most popular of these Knights was one who introduced himself: "And I'm Galashan!"

If this statement was doubted by his antagonist, Galashan proceeded to tell him that "I'll slash you, sir, and dash you, sir, in less than half an hour."

Going from house to house in England and Scotland, the guisers contributed much innocent amusement to the festivities of the evening.

Even in this time of war and with sickness prevailing, the gentle merriment brought by a festival of this sort ought to be productive of good.

B. C. STOCKMEN MAKE BIG BUYS IN EDMONTON

Seven Carloads of Heifers and Steers Being Sent This Week To Bulkley, B. C.

Edmonton, October 28.—Seven carloads of heifers and steers are being shipped this week from Edmonton to the Bulkley valley in British Columbia. Three live stock associations from that place have been on the market for some time and found the present a propitious time to make their purchases. About two-thirds of the stock is young steers, bought for long feeding, the majority of them being yearlings and calves.

It is the idea of the association in buying a good proportion of their stock in steers that they will be able to finance the proposition more quickly. The undertaking is being backed by the B. C. Government, which is loaning the money on the security of their land. W. T. McDonald, live stock commissioner for British Columbia, has been watching the purchases for the government.

Of the seven cars, four were bought at Innisfail and the rest at the stock yards in Edmonton. Of the stock bought at Innisfail, the men were able to get some especially well bred animals that they feel will respond quickly to feeding.

The three associations buying are Glentanna, represented on the market by J. F. Wilson; Telkwa, represented by F. Short, and the Northern Interior Breeders' Association, represented by C. Barrett. About 25 farmers are represented in the deal.

INFLUENZA CLAIMED POPULAR RAILROADER

Arthur Rice Passed Away at the Hazelton Hospital on Thursday After Short Illness.

To his many acquaintances along the railway, news of the death of Arthur Rice will come as a great shock, says the Interior News. Attacked by Spanish influenza last week, he tried to fight it off and it was not until early in this week that he was taken to Hazelton Hospital. By then the disease had such a strong hold that it could not be shaken off, and he passed away on Thursday morning.

Arthur Rice was a young man of but twenty-seven years, and possessing a most rugged constitution it will surprise many to know that he fell so easily a prey to the disease.

The late Arthur Rice came to this district about five years ago and took a position as brakeman out of Smithers, but lately had been in charge of a work train operating at South Hazelton. Of very agreeable and pleasant disposition, he had many friends who will be sorry to hear of his death. His home was in Cape Breton and he had four brothers, most of them well known in this district, serving at the front.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or to record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres may be leased as allotments; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, including residence after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due to the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown, said at public auction.

It is most comforting to know that Canadian prisoners in Germany will all receive food this Christmas. A special parcel costing fifteen shillings will be sent to every Canadian prisoners.

PIPER WINS VICTORIA CROSS FOR BRAVERY

Piper Richardson of Chilliwack was killed when playing his men to victory. Since his death he has been awarded the Victoria Cross.

Prior to the attack he obtained permission to play his company "over the top." As the company approached its objective, it was held up by a very strong wire and came under an intense fire, which caused heavy casualties, which momentarily demoralized the formation. Richardson, realizing the situation, strode up and down with the greatest coolness. The effect was instantaneous. Inspired by his splendid example, the company rushed the wire with such fury and determination that the obstacle was overcome, and the position captured.

Later, after participating in bombing operations, he was detailed to take back wounded comrades and prisoners. After proceeding two hundred yards he remembered that he had left his pipes behind. Although strongly warned, he insisted on returning to recover his pipes. He was never seen again and is accordingly presumed dead, through lapse of time.

Richardson's father is the chief of police at Chilliwack, B. C.

War Efficiency and National Prosperity

More than a billion and a half dollars distributed in Canada for exported agricultural produce and the products of labor in the fiscal year ending March 31, 1918, has kept Canada busy and prosperous in spite of the war.

Over six hundred and thirty-six million dollars for exported farm products alone!

AND the workers of Canada also shared greatly in Canada's export trade.

For their products there was distributed in Canada, during the year:—

Table listing products distributed in Canada: Munitions (\$450,000,000), Metals (\$92,083,000), Vehicles (\$22,776,000), Wood Pulp and Paper (\$59,599,000).

These huge sums were spent in Canada by the Allies.

Canada's own war expenditure for the fiscal year 1918 was \$342,762,000.
