## OTTOMAN EMPIRE IS OUT TURKEY FIRST OF CENTRAL POWERS TO THROW UP HER HANDS

### VICTORY BOND CAMPAIGN IS NOW UNDER WAY

Local Committee at Meeting Last  
Night Decides to Commence  
At Once in Spite of  
Handicaps.

The Victory Loan Committee met last night in the office at the War Veterans' rooms and decided to open the local campaign for selling Victory Loan bonds immediately. While it is not expected that much business will be done along that line for a few days, yet it was felt that the work should begin.

This city expects to make a record and not only to exceed the quota allotted to the city and district but also to make Granby look like ten cents. There is considerable rivalry between the two towns and it will be a lively race to see which will raise the larger amount.

Yesterday Mayor McClymont sent the following wire to W. J. Hanna, president of the Imperial Oil Co. at Toronto:

"Regret our city is not mentioned in the press as one through which your company is subscribing for 1918 Victory Loan, and in consideration of our city being one of your principal distributing points we consider we are entitled to at least fifty thousand dollars of your total subscription."

### CANNERY TENDER WAS ASHORE ON DIGBY ISD.

The Togo Maru, the cannery tender belonging to the Lockport Canning Co., is today in the drydock for survey, having gone ashore two days ago on the south end of Digby Island. The vessel was returning from Georgetown with a load of box shoeks to be sent across to the Islands with the Prince Albert, and rounded the southern point of Digby Island too closely, with the result that she struck the rocks, somewhere in the neighborhood of Delusion Bay. The buoyancy of her cargo of boxwood, together with some fuel drums which she had on board, her bottom having been badly holed.

Her crew managed to row in their dinghy across to the railroad track somewhere about mile 6, and from there walked into town, where they reported the occurrence. The tide runs out to a great distance in the vicinity of Delusion Bay, and the Togo Maru was left dry as the tide receded. As the tide rose and the vessel filled with water, she finally floated and yesterday was towed to the drydock, where she now is for repairs.

The Togo Maru has been in and out of the harbor all this summer and has at various times excited comment upon her lines. Tapering away to a narrow stern, and always kept in a spick and span order, the vessel looked the product of trans-Pacific workmen.

### TURKEY SURRENDERS IS LATEST WORD FROM LONDON RECEIVED IN BRIEF MESSAGE; SIGNIFICANCE

Expected that Collapse of Ottoman Empire will Mean General Peace Before Christmas; Austria will Likely Follow and Germany Cannot Hold Out Alone.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, October 31.—The latest word here is that Turkey has surrendered and her army and navy will be handed over to the Allies for their disposal. This is the first surrender of the big powers and means the breaking up of the Central Empires and the possibility of peace before Christmas.

The news was received with acclamation in London, but there is no longer any great enthusiasm such as would have greeted similar news a year ago.

Military men look on the latest news as a sure harbinger of peace. Austria is bound to follow within a short time and Germany cannot well hold out alone. Events are likely to follow rapidly from this time on.

### TELKWA COAL IS NOW BEING SHIPPED HERE

Manager of Mine Says Work  
Commencing at Once and  
Fifty Tons a Day to  
Be Sent Here.

That the Telkwa Collieries, Ltd., will be shipping coal to Prince Rupert at once is the message brought from the mine by Roy Hobart, representing the Giant Powder Co. who returned on the train Tuesday from an extended trip along the railway. He visited the mine and found that everything was going well and the last word he got from the manager was: "Tell the people in Prince Rupert that we shall begin hauling coal tomorrow and that we shall be able to ship them fifty tons a day throughout the winter."

The spur has been put in by the railway company, the road built by the Provincial Government and everything possible done to help the owners to become shippers. The mine is five miles from the railway and for the present the coal will be hauled to the railway with teams. Later, doubtless, there will be some more up-to-date method of transportation installed which will make it possible to deliver the coal at the lowest possible price to the consumers.

If the hauling of coal commenced as promised there should be loaded cars on the siding there now ready to bring to this city.

News has been received from Hazelton of the death of J. G. Powell, assayer at the Silver Standard mine, from influenza.

### FULLER RAMMED AND IS SUNK

Mexico Maru runs into fishing boat at Elliott Bay in dense fog.

Seattle, Oct. 31.—In a dense fog the trans-Pacific liner Mexico Maru rammed and sunk the fisheries bark A. J. Fuller in Elliott Bay. No lives were lost. The Mexico Maru was steaming a slow speed but it was too late to change the course after first sighting the smaller vessel.

### IT WOULD BE GOOD BUSINESS TO PROVIDE DOCKS FOR FISHERMEN

This is Canada's National Fish Day and in view of the importance of the event an interview was sought with T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., who willingly expressed his views on what should be done in Prince Rupert to develop the industry. He said:

"When the war is over the port that is best equipped will get the fishing business. I think we can best celebrate this day by drawing attention to the absolute need of a dock for the fishermen where they may safely tie their boats during the bad weather and a place where they may keep their nets during the winter months.

"There should also be a dock where the fish may be packed by the merchants who purchase from the fishermen. All these things are needed if the business of the port is to be developed. The place with the facilities will get the business.

"If I were the general manager of all the fishing business of this port the first thing I would do would be to provide these facilities because it would be good business.

"If I were the mayor and aldermanic board I would get that dock as soon as possible, if not at Cow Bay then at the next most suitable spot. I should like to see the mayor and aldermen and other leading citizens make an excursion around the harbor and pick out suitable sites and make somewhat of a public demonstration of the event.

"If Prince Rupert is to advance she must have facilities for the fishermen."

### ITALIANS HAVE GAINED GREAT FINAL VICTORY

Allied Forces in Sunny Kingdom  
Force Enemy Back—33,000  
Prisoners Captured.

Washington, Oct. 31.—Thirty-three thousand Austrian troops, hundreds of big guns and innumerable machine guns have been captured by the Italian and Allied forces on the Italian front within the last few days. The enemy is unable to stop the advancing forces.

### CAPTAIN KNIGHTALL OF THE "KELLY" DIES AT BORDEN HOSPITAL

Captain Charles Knightall, of the steam trawler Kelly belonging to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., died this forenoon at the Borden Street Hospital, whither he was removed yesterday from his own home.

### NO WORD RECEIVED FROM THE GALIANO

Nothing in the Message Received  
From Her to Indicate That  
She Was Ashore.

No word had been received today up to the time of going to press in regard to the patrol boat Galiano which reported by wireless off Cape St. James that she was in distress. There was nothing in the wireless message that was sent to indicate that she had gone ashore although a great many people assumed that was what happened.

Those who know the place where she reported and who are familiar with the boat do not give much hope of ever finding her, but there is always a possibility that she may yet be floating about helpless and unable to communicate.

The G. E. Foster, which went out to look for her yesterday has no wireless aboard and would not be able to communicate until she returned. The weather is still bad and the Foster would not make very good progress in her search. In fact it would be like looking for a needle in a haystack to search for the Galiano if she is helpless, as she might have driven miles away by the time help arrives.

The whaling boats might have gone out to her aid, but there was no way of communicating with them as they had no wireless at Naden Harbor.

The last message that was heard from the Galiano was at 3:30 yesterday morning.

### WORK RECOMMENCES AT USK GOLD MINE

Car Load of Ore on Dump at the  
Kitselas Copper Company's  
Property, Owned By  
Local Man.

Work has recommenced on the property of the Kitselas Mountain Copper Co. at Usk, according to information brought by Roy Hobart of the Giant Powder Co., who has just returned from up the line. The property was bonded about a year ago by Jimmie Wells of Prince Rupert to some Portland people, with A. J. Thomson in charge. A few months ago work was discontinued, but it has started again and there is a car load of ore on the dump.

Mr. Hobart visited the camps east of Prince George and he says that when he was there the influenza had hit them very hard. Hardly a place was missed. The work had shut down in many places owing to the people being all ill.

### DOLLY VARDEN RAILWAYMEN HAVE ASSIGNED

Taylor Engineering Company of  
Vancouver Place Affairs in  
Hands of Creditors.

WORK AT ALICE ARM  
WAS ALMOST COMPLETED

The Taylor Engineering Company of Vancouver, the concern that was building the Dolly Varden railway at Alice Arm, has assigned for the benefit of its creditors. The assignee is John Anderson, the secretary of the company. A meeting of creditors has been called and doubtless a statement of the condition of affairs will be made soon.

It is understood that nearly half a million dollars had been spent on the railway and that in about a day and a half it would have been finished to such an extent that shipping of ore would have been possible. The men refused to work any longer, however, without their pay and the shutdown followed.

The railway was built to connect the Dolly Varden mine with Alice Arm for the object of shipping ore. It was also expected to serve a number of other properties in the valley and great mining development was expected to follow its construction. The Alice Arm camp was looked upon as one of the most likely in the north country, and the failure of the construction company it is hoped will not have the permanent effect of holding the development back.

### FISHERMAN DIES

Andrew Leroux of This City Is  
Well Known Among Fellow  
Workmen.

The death occurred at the General Hospital this morning of Andrew Leroux, a fisherman who is well known here. He was taken to the hospital October 24 suffering from influenza.

Leroux was born 31 years ago in Minnesota. His brother, Louis, lives in this city at 1908 Sixth Street and is an engineer at the Cold Storage.

### Good Start Made In Other Cities.

The cities of Canada have practically all made a good start with the Victory Loan campaign. They have gone into it with a vim. The regular newspaper advertisers have donated all or part of their space to the loan committees and in some places squads of girls have been organized to canvass.

Powell River made a big burst the first day by exceeding its quota, but, while that may be possible in a small community, it is not possible in a large one. Much depends, however, on the vim and snap which is put into the game.

It looks as if with so attractive a proposition, and with so much at stake just now there should be little need to canvass. People should be tumbling over each other to get in on the loan for fear there might not be any of it left for them by the time the allotment is made.

Prince Rupert starts her campaign today and while there will be some handicap because of the prevalent sickness, the influenza is fast passing and people are getting back to work.

### Securing Recognition Is Always Difficult.

Prince Rupert is but a small town and she has to fight her way until she is properly recognized. It is the same with a city as with a business or with a person. Position does not bring recognition, neither does merit. It takes years of struggle to get a place in the sun.

Prince Rupert has had her dull days. She has had a long struggle and during that time has made little headway. Now the force of circumstances has brought her prominently to the front and by her energy she must keep the good work going. She has to make her own way in the world and every inch of ground will be contested.

It is the same in all walks of life. Competition is keen and there are always rivals to knock everything that is done. The great thing is never to show the white feather but to persistently forge ahead and refuse to admit defeat.

### Will There Be Peace This Year?

Judging by the press despatches it would not be surprising if peace were declared this year or at any rate before the winter is over. The enemy nations seem to be trying which can be the loudest suppliant. It must be admitted, however, that while they are asking for peace they are still fighting like demons. There is no walkover on any front as yet. In Germany the populace seems to be getting more outspoken every day and within a few weeks the contagion may have spread until the whole of the people are not only asking for peace but almost ready to fight for peace, just as the British and French through all these long years have had to fight for peace.

### Dolly Varden Mine And Railway Fiasco.

The tying up of the Dolly Varden mine and railway on account of financial difficulties, when only a few more days of construction work would have seen the railway complete, is greatly to be regretted. The workmen will secure their pay, undoubtedly, but they may have to wait for it. The miners and railwaymen are already scattered almost all over this north country, some of them in the interior, and are bending their energies to developing other than Alice Arm properties.

Now that the construction company has assigned it is to be hoped that something will be done as quickly as possible to finish the railway and to put the mine on a producing basis.

## ARRIVES HOME WITH ONLY ONE LEG AFTER SEVERAL BIG BATTLES

Sergt. J. Jardine of Prince George Taking Orders for Souvenir Book in Interests of Club.

To raise money for the members of the Amputation Club of British Columbia is the errand of Sergt. J. Jardine of Prince George, who is in the city taking orders for "Gold Stripes," a Christmas souvenir which is being published in the interests of the Club.

Sergt. Jardine comes here direct from Shaughnessy Hospital at Vancouver where he has been convalescing until such time as he gets his new leg. The original leg was left in England as a result of a wound from an explosive bullet during the big charge at Vimy Ridge. Every effort was made to save the leg, but it was found impossible to do so. Considerable time was spent in hospital at King's College, London, and at Buxton and Liverpool.

Sgt. Jardine left Prince George in July, 1915, and went overseas with the 54th Kootenay Battalion and was with them at Ypres Salient when the Canadians saved the day for the whole British army. He also took part in the fighting down the Somme before being put out by the barbarous explosive bullet of the Hun.

Sgt. Jardine left Prince George a private and he was given his stripes after the action on the Somme. He expects to do a good business in taking orders for and selling advertising in the book which his club is bringing out. All the proceeds go to the men who have lost their limbs and for that reason its appeal should be strong to everyone.

## POLITICAL CAMPAIGN IN THE UNITED STATES

Control of Congress Depends Upon Elections to Be Held There Next Month.

Washington, October 31.—The great biennial "drive" in American politics—the Congressional elections—is on.

September marked the close of state primary elections and nominating conventions, leaving their train of "lame ducks" and other political cripples. Leaders of all parties now are in the midst of the campaign which precedes election day in November.

The lines of battle are fairly well defined. Upon the results of the balloting depends political control of the Sixty-sixth Congress, which convenes in December, 1919, unless sooner summoned by President Wilson. Dependent upon the returns are the fates of aspirants for nearly two-score seats in the Senate and 435 in the House.

Like the Presidential election of 1916, when California's votes, after a week's wait, determined finally the nation's President, the Congressional result, according to private statements of prominent Republicans and Democrats in Washington, is expected to be close. The Democrats now have fifty-two Senators against forty-four Republicans, while in the House the respective strength is 210 and 209. Seats of all of the latter are involved in the present campaign, while twenty-one Democratic and fifteen Republican Senate seats are at stake.

Election Over in Several States.

For all practical purposes the election is over in a number of states—in the "solid South," where nomination on the Democratic ticket is equivalent to election. Primaries and conventions in these states, however, although changing present personnel in Senate and House from several states, have not affected the final result. For some Republicans, without opposition, the primaries also have meant certain election in November; these also do not change present line-ups in Congress, incumbents being named for re-election.

Socialist, Prohibition and other parties also have their candidates in the present campaign. Coalition of Democratic and Republican forces against the Socialists has occurred in some localities, but the campaign now is being conducted largely between the two leading parties in an effort to secure unquestioned control of the Senate and House without intervention of any "balance of power" from the minor organizations.

## FEWER PINK SALMON ON ACCOUNT OF FLU

As a result of the influenza epidemic prostrating the entire force of the Seton Lake hatchery, thirteen million pink salmon eggs, supplied to the Dominion hatchery service by the provincial government for the purpose of experimenting in the propagation of this species have had to be planted in Cayoose creek while still in the "eyed" stage. Chief Inspector F. H. Cunningham has so advised Hon. William Sloan, provincial commissioner of fisheries. As a result, it is unlikely that nearly so many of them will survive as would have been the case had there been a supply of trained operatives which would have permitted the original plan to be carried out.

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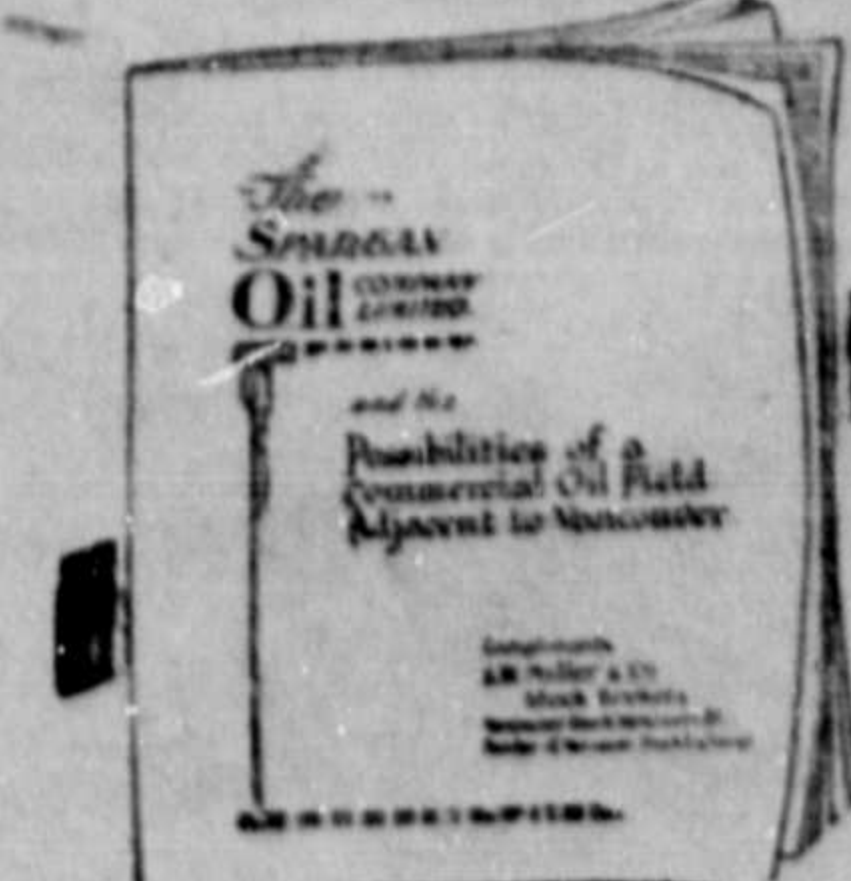

## PREMIERS WILL MEET NOVEMBER 19 NEXT

The Premier and Prince Rupert's Member Will Represent British Columbia at Ottawa.

It had been the original intention of Sir Robert Borden to call the Convention of Provincial Premiers in accordance with the suggestion of the Premier of British Columbia for Friday, November 16, but on account of the Victory Loan Campaign intervening it has been decided to postpone this important event until Tuesday, November 19. The following wire addressed to Mr. Oliver has been received:

"On account of Federal loan campaign it is thought inadvisable to call the proposed conference of Provincial Premiers before Tuesday, November 19, and it has been summoned for that date. We trust that this slight postponement will not occasion any inconvenience. In view of several important subjects requiring consideration, we have decided to summon the Premiers of all the Provinces for the date above mentioned and formal notice goes out today.

### Broad Policy Wanted.

It will be recalled that Premier Oliver wired to Sir Robert Borden on September 27 last suggesting to the Prime Minister that such a conference should be called in order that a broad Canadian policy might be formulated directed towards an effective settlement in connection with the demobilization of Canada's army.

Mr. Oliver has always maintained that the whole question requires the closest possible uniformity of procedure as between the various Provinces and the Dominion, and to this end the conference is now called. Questions which will be discussed will deal very largely with the development of natural resources, more especially in view of the problem allied with general demobilization and the absorption of the soldier into civilian calling once again.

### Mr. Pattullo Gone East.

Not unconnected with the conference is the trip of the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, who left for Ottawa a day or two ago. While important matters of a departmental nature and affecting the future development of the lands of the Province are taking the Minister eastwards, he intends to gather a good deal of preliminary information in connection with his branch of the Provincial administration which may have connection with the subjects to be dealt with by the conference. Mr. Pattullo will meet Mr. Oliver in Ottawa, and discuss with him the result of any investigations that may be found necessary to make.

The Minister of Lands will stay over in Toronto, and go as far east as Montreal. It is understood that Mr. Pattullo will also take up the government matters affecting this constituency.

### ENGINEER APPOINTED

The announcement is made by the Hon. William Sloan, Minister of Mines, to the effect that the Provincial Government has appointed A. G. Langley, Resident Engineer for Mining District No. 5, as its representative to assist the committee selected some months ago, and charged with an investigation into the fairness or otherwise of ore smelting charges at the Trail Smelter.

### SYNOPSIS OF

### LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvement on respective claims. Pre-emption must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvement, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

### TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## HAPPY BOND HOLDERS WHEN RATES COME DOWN

Aside altogether from the element of patriotism involved in the purchase of the next Victory Loan its potentiality as an investment security is of outstanding importance. This is particularly true of the fifteen-year maturity. Not only is the 5½ per cent. rate of interest which it yields much higher than that it was possible for an investor in the securities of any stable Government to obtain in pre-war days, but the Victory Loan is gilt-edged in the fullest sense of the term. As no public meetings could be held Dr. Grant met with committees of presbyteries and outlined the plans he had in mind. A few weeks ago Dr. Grant was in Washington, where he met President Wilson and other members of the government in this connection, and he will shortly go overseas to Britain and France to study the situation at first hand there. Dr. Grant's son, Oswald, a young student of bright gifts, fell in action in France some two years ago. He went out with a Toronto regiment.

W. W. White, of Fort Fraser, arrived in town yesterday from Vancouver on his way east.

J. M. Dempsey, of Vancouver, who is interested in logging on the Queen Charlottes, sailed for the Islands this morning.

Mrs. J. T. Chauner Williams will have charge of the sale of home-cooking for the Red Cross in the hut on Third Avenue tomorrow.

Captain Knightfall of the "Kelly" the steam fishing vessel belonging to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., was admitted to the Borden Street Hospital yesterday suffering from influenza.

Mrs. Arthur Spurr was among the passengers on the Prince Albert this morning sailing for Thurston Harbor to undertake nursing duties again in the logging areas among the victims of influenza.

Two men who had been trying to fortify themselves against the influenza by taking liquor to a larger extent than was wise were this morning fined five dollars each by Magistrate Carss in the police court.

The Prince Albert arrived in port last evening about 9 o'clock from Port Clements, and sailed again at 9 this morning for the southern ports of the Queen Charlotte Islands. She will return here instead of going to Vancouver.

Mrs. Philp arrived in town yesterday from Vancouver and left again this morning for Thurston Harbor, where her son, Charles, is down with influenza. Miss Philp of the Port Simpson schools who is assisting in Orme's Drug Store, is her daughter.

Father McGrath is confined to home these days as a result of his strenuous labors during the last few days caused by the influenza epidemic. None worked harder than Father McGrath, and it is hoped that his attack of influenza will be a slight one.

Five patients were discharged yesterday from the Borden Street Hospital and two new cases were admitted. There was one death since yesterday morning. Tom Kukinich, a Serbian aged 43 who was one of the old timers around this part of the coast, died from the results of influenza. He was a miner.

Orangemen in this city will learn with regret of the death of J. W. Whiteley of Vancouver, who was grand secretary of the order for British Columbia. He was a past master of the Grand Chapter and in connection with his position often visited the outlying parts of the province, including Prince Rupert.

Mr. Munn, who is logging at Cumshewa on the Queen Charlotte Islands, arrived in town yesterday and sailed for Cumshewa this morning by the Prince Albert. His son, Emerson, is very sick there with influenza. Accompanying Mr. Munn was Mrs. Cotton, of Vancouver, who is a sister-in-law of Emerson Munn.

The local food board has been notified of an order in council recently passed which makes it compulsory for grocers in selling flour to sell with it one pound of substitutes for each four pounds of flour. The substitutes according to the new order are confined to corn flour, oat flour, barley flour or rye flour. The order is already in force.

Captain Haan and C. Haan, of Skidegate, and E. R. McCormick, of Queen Charlotte City, of the "Gannet" which has been employed in patrol on the Islands by the Fisheries Department, sailed this morning for their homes by the Prince Albert. They brought their vessel to town, where it has been handed over to the military police officers.
