TERMS SENT TO GERMANY

ARMISTICE SIGNED BY ALLIES AND FORWARDED TO THE HUNS

ARMISTICE IS NOW IN HANDS OF GERMANS READY FOR THEIR ACCEPTANCE OR REJECTION

Harmony Among Allied Powers Over Peace Terms; Will Be Much Like Those Accepted by Austria and Turkey.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, November 5.—The terms under which Germany obtained an immediate armistice and the end of the war, were dictated yesterday and signed in Paris on behalf of the Allied governments. Secretary Lansing announced the fact last night in a statement, adding that complete diplomatic harmony has been achieved by the Allies and the Americans at the conference in Versailles.

That the terms follow closely those under which Austria-Hungary surrendered yesterday and passed out, leaving Germany in the presumption in official circles. It is understood that the document will be in the hands of the German Government in less than twenty-four hours.

Naturally there is much speculation as to whether Germany will accept the terms offered. It is assumed by some that she will make a counter proposal, but it is made very clear to her that she is not the one to make proposals but only to accept a peace.

There is a large circle who believe the Kaiser will fight to the end, but those who know the Germans better do not anticipate such struggle. They know that they are beaten and even if there is a slight delay the expectation is that within a very short time the end of the great war will have arrived.

TORN LOAN GETS \$80,000

is the Amount Subscribed to Date and the Good Work is Still Going on.

The Victory Loan campaign is making good progress. The contributions are nearly all working and the total has now mounted to \$80,000 so far. This is well, but it is not yet quite enough to win the pennant. Within a few days, however, the subscriptions will come in.

The city will invest all its sinking fund in the loan. This will amount to between seven and ten thousand dollars. A number of people are paying in their subscriptions through the banks and these are not all recorded so that it is difficult to find out the exact amount subscribed to date.

The wonderfully inspiring news from the front ought to stimulate people to do their utmost as a shot at the Kaiser, their only method of hitting him and hitting hard.

Some purchasers of bonds are holding back as they are not quite sure how many they can take. Everyone seems to be making an effort to go the limit in order that the district, which is a wealthy one, may make a creditable showing.

WHISKEY IS FOUND IN ROOMING HOUSE

Archie Albert Pays \$50 for Having Liquor in Possession contrary to Act.

Last evening about 11 o'clock Chief Vickers, in company with Constable Adams and Phillipson, paid a visit to the Belmont Rooms on Fraser Street, armed with a search warrant. On going through the premises they found part of a bottle of whisky in the kitchen and on the landing, inside the garbage can, and behind it they discovered five other bottles of Sanderson's "Glenleith" Scotch.

This morning Archie Albert, the keeper of the Belmont Rooms, was charged before Magistrate McMullin with contravention of the Prohibition Act, in being in possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than a dwelling house. The accused pleaded guilty, and was defended by L. W. Patmore. Counsel for the defence put forward the plea that as this man's wife was sick, this was not an inordinate quantity of liquor to have around. The court imposed a fine of \$50 and costs.

This morning five Chinamen who were charged yesterday with being inmates of an opium resort appeared before Magistrate McMullin in the police court. They all pleaded not guilty and from the evidence it appeared that only one man had been smoking, and that the room they were in was a general sitting room. The court could not find that the place was an opium resort, within the meaning of the Act, and the charge was dismissed.

A block of Victory bonds was taken yesterday by the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., the amount being \$5,000. This was credited to the New England Fisheries, which is the parent concern, the Atlin Fisheries being the name of the local subsidiary company.

BORDEN ST. HOSPITAL SOON TO BE CLOSED

At the City Council meeting last night Mayor McClymont reported that 75 patients had been cared for at the Borden St. Emergency Hospital. Of these fourteen had died, forty had been discharged and twenty-two were still there. Of the total, forty-three had been residents of the city and the others had come from outside points. By the end of the week he hoped that they would be able to close up, as there were very few cases now coming in. One arrived yesterday, but he hoped that would be the last.

300,000 AUSTRIANS WERE TAKEN BEFORE THE SURRENDER TO ALLIES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, November 5.—According to an official dispatch received here from Rome, the victorious Italian armies captured three hundred thousand Austrian prisoners and not less than five thousand big guns of all calibres, before the armistice went into effect at three o'clock yesterday afternoon.

These figures include all the captures made from the enemy by the Italian and British troops since the great offensive began again on October 14.

The soldiers of the once powerful Austrian army continue to flee in disorder. All semblance of discipline has disappeared, and each and every soldier is seeking his home, or some other place of refuge. Since the offensive started, sixty-three Austro-Hungarian divisions have been put out of the combat, and the loss in killed and wounded suffered by the enemy has been tremendous.

CONVERGING MOVEMENT FOR PURPOSE OF DRIVING HUNS OUT OF INVADED TERRITORY

MANY PRISONERS TAKEN AND VILLAGES LIBERATED IN THE LATEST MOVEMENTS ALONG THE WHOLE WESTERN FRONT — GUNS IN DOMINATING POSITION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, November 5.—Over a front of 30 miles in north-western France, Huns delivered a mighty blow against the Germans, and tore into their positions, capturing important strategic points in the enemy line and taking more than 10,000 prisoners. Of particular value in the general plan of driving the Germans out of invaded territory was an advance of more than three miles across the Cambre Canal, which leaves Haig's men on good ground for a further dash.

The French and Americans on the southern part of the line are keeping up intensive operations in a great converging movement, which, if it continues, is likely to end in a big battle before the Germans reach the border.

The Americans opposite Stenay in the Meuse Valley have an excellent footing. They have made further progress up the river toward important German lines. In the centre the American lines stand twelve miles south of Sedan.

TWO BODIES FROM GALIANO PICKED UP

Taken to Swanson Bay and Will Be Sent South on First Steamer.

Two more bodies from the wrecked Admiralty Patrol steamer Galiano have been picked up and taken to Swanson Bay. No details are available. One of the steamers going south will call and pick them up and take them to Vancouver.

No further word has been received in regard to the steamer. She is probably broken up and her wreckage will be drifting on the beaches and will likely be reported from time to time.

FISH ARRIVALS

On Sunday the Republic brought in 45,000 lbs. of halibut; the Seattle came in yesterday with 26,000 lbs., and today the Fisher arrived with 10,000 lbs.

The skipper of the Republic brought word that the New England had put into Ketchikan with 25 sick men. This boat would carry a crew of about 30, so that practically the whole company was down with flu.

AUSTRIAN MUNITIONS WILL BE USED AGAINST GERMANY IF KAISER CONTINUES WAR

FINAL DISPOSITION OF TERRITORY LEFT FOR PEACE TABLE — EXECUTION OF ARMISTICE GUARANTEED BY THOROUGH BEATING JUST BEFORE SURRENDER

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, November 5.—Austria-Hungary passed out of the world war yesterday under terms of abject surrender.

Not only have the armed forces of the Empire laid down their arms to await the end of the war and a dictated peace, but Austro-Hungarian territory is open for operations against Germany. Austrian munitions are to be used against the armies of the Kaiser if Germany continues the war.

The terms which stopped the victorious advance on the Italian front were accepted by the Austrian commander in chief in the name of the Vienna Government and execution is guaranteed by the thorough beating already administered, which converted the defeated army into a fleeing horde.

The terms imposed previously upon Bulgaria and Turkey were hardly so drastic as those which Austria has been bound to accept. The Austrians are compelled to retire from a wide strip of territory within the borders of the Empire on the Italian border, and the question of the final disposition of territory is left to be settled at the peace table.

OIL TANKER BRINGS CARGO FROM FRISCO

Capt. Doran Who Has Been With Her Six Years Brings Her to Port.

With 1,360,000 gallons of oil for the Imperial Oil Co., the tanker Capt. A. F. Lucas, commanded by Capt. O. C. Doran, arrived in port early yesterday morning, discharged her cargo, and is leaving this afternoon for San Francisco. First officer Billing and Second Officer Pearson were both down with influenza and were visited by a local physician while here.

Just before coming north the Lucas had been sent to pick up a barge which had broken away from the Richmond, a steamer which is well known here. She was on her way to Panama towing the barge when a terrific gale made it so unpleasant that she let the barge go and it was picked up by one of the Shipping Board vessels and towed to Acapulco. The Richmond injured her stern post and had to pump out 25,000 gallons of oil to protect herself. The barge also pumped out 15,000 gallons for the same purpose.

The Lucas is a ship of 3,257 tons registered, is seventeen years old and Capt. Doran a Norwegian with an Irish name, has been on her for the last six years, during which time he worked up from second mate.

CARD OF THANKS

A petition which has been circulated here asking for the appointment of an official liquor vendor at this point has been signed by 700 citizens. This does not ask for any privileges not enjoyed by some other cities. It simply means that in filling orders for liquor under medical prescriptions the best possible quality may be secured. At present the stuff often has to be purchased from bootleggers at enormous prices and the quality is very poor.

INFLUENZA CASES BECOMING FEWER

Vincenzo Rossi, an Italian, Died At the Hospital Last Night; Mate of Tanker Comes In.

That the epidemic of influenza is decreasing is the report on all hands this morning, and this fact is borne out by the figures showing the small number of new cases being reported, and the increasing number of patients recovering, both at their own homes and in the hospital.

There was one more death at the General Hospital last evening when Vincenzo Rossi, an Italian, died. His address was Seventh Avenue and he was aged 45 years. He was admitted on October 28.

The second mate of the oil tanker Lucas was taken off his ship last evening and brought to the hospital. Very few other cases have since developed.

**Surrender of Austria
 Ends All Doubt.**

There is no longer the slightest doubt as to how the war will end. Many have always had faith that it would end right, but at times their faith received several jars that came near breaking. Now it is no longer a matter of faith. With three of the allied enemy countries out of the fight, and with the last one being steadily driven within its own borders and surrounded with enemies who are not only victorious, but who feel that they have the Huns whipped, there can be but one result. It would not be surprising if peace came within a month, at least before the end of the year.

Many people have predicted that when the end came it would come with great suddenness. That prophecy seems to be true. The end is a great surprise to many. Some can hardly realize it yet.

**No Waving of Flags
 When Austria Capitulated.**

It is noticeable that no one has suggested the flying of flags or the decoration of the streets or the ringing of bells to celebrate the victories. The whole thing is too grim to rejoice over publicly. There may be glory in the victory but we do not feel it. We feel rather thankful that a murderer has been executed, than that a glorious deed has been accomplished. All chivalry has gone out of the war. It has been too full of horrors to inspire anything but the thought that a great wrong is checked, a wrong which can never be wiped out even with blood. It is a sober world that heard the news of the great Austrian surrender, a world that has been sobered by suffering.

**Rupert's Telephone
 Service is Excellent.**

At the City Council meeting last night Alderman Dybhavn gave a preliminary notice that there would be some changes in regard to the telephone charges in the near future. He also made some comparisons showing how much better the telephone service is here than in Seattle.

Alderman Dybhavn might have gone very much further and said that there are few if any telephone services on the continent that are as good as the one in Prince Rupert. It is very seldom that anyone here has to wait long for an answer to a call for central, whereas in some services it is the rule to have to wait. In some cities it is almost as quick to walk a block and make a personal call as to use the telephone. In Prince Rupert there are no long waits. The operators try their best to serve the public and they seldom make mistakes. As one visitor to the city recently remarked after being here a few days, "It is the best service on the continent."

**Boys Should Buy
 Victory Bonds.**

Here is a great opportunity for a boy or girl to help the country and at the same time invest a few dollars for himself. Five dollars down and five dollars a month will buy a bond on the instalment plan if you don't happen to have the cash by you. If you have the money make it more. Boys who sell newspapers could buy bonds with the proceeds and there would be little difficulty in making enough to do it. Team Work Needed for Few Days

While the people of Prince Rupert, in common with the people in almost every part of the world, are being sorely tried just now it must not be forgotten that the men at the front have been in much more difficult situations than confront us and they have come through with colors flying.

With courage we must all face the issue and keep cheerful. By helping our neighbors we can best help ourselves. Team work and community work is the order of the day.

It must not be forgotten that in spite of our difficulties here it will be necessary for us to continue our preparations for providing money for the men at the front. Victory bonds will be on sale commencing October 28 and we shall all have to do our best when the sale opens, even though we have needs of our own to supply.



MASSET LOSES LANDING WHARF

Large Quantity of Groceries, Mail And Lumber Goes Down When Being Discharged.

APPEAL BEING MADE TO BOARD OF TRADE

A few days ago the wharf at Masset, which has been in bad repair for some time past, gave way suddenly and a large quantity of groceries, mail and lumber was lost. The residents now are left without any means of sending out or receiving supplies and they are naturally much worked up over it.

In connection with this the following letter from C. Harrison of that place has been received, and a similar letter has been sent to the Board of Trade:

"On behalf of the residents of this district I wish to draw the attention of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade to the shameful manner in which we are being treated by the Public Works Department at Ottawa in regard to our wharf at New Masset.

Last winter one of the Grand Trunk steamers broke two of the fender piles at the northwest corner. No repairs were caused to be made and no further notice taken of the damage done. Later the Munitions Board tugboat with rafts and scows of lumber tied up to the wharf and further strained it. Other piles were broken by the steamers as they approached the wharf until at last the north half hung low down without any outside supporting piles. This happened in the month of March. The representative of the Munitions Board drew the attention of the acting Dominion engineer to the damage done, and at that time in his opinion \$500 would have replaced the broken piles and placed the wharf in condition to last a year; or two longer. Nothing was done. From that time to the present we have sent letters, telegrams and petitions to Ottawa urging the repair of this wharf, and when the minister was at Prince Rupert this matter was personally brought to his notice, but nothing has been done.

Suddenly Collapsed.

Last night it was blowing a gale, and the G. T. P. steamer was tied up to the wharf unloading freight, and had most of it discharged, when the wharf suddenly collapsed, dragging the freight shed full of goods with it. The wharf also was full of No. 1 fir lumber and aeroplane spruce. Everything was lost. The total loss is over \$10,000 in groceries, hardware, machinery, personal effects and lumber. Nothing could be saved, as it was blowing a strong gale.

"The people cannot stand this heavy loss, as it will make some of them bankrupt. An owner of any private wharf is responsible for the safety of the goods unloaded thereon. This wharf is the property of the Dominion Government, and likewise they should be responsible; therefore, we would ask your board on our behalf to obtain from the Government compensation for the losses sustained and to erect a new wharf at once, otherwise the residents will have without wharf facilities to leave the district.

Mail Complaint.

Another matter we wish to bring to your attention and that is the careless handling of our mail. The G. T. P. Steamship Company is supposed to carry the incoming mail from the wharf to the post office and likewise to carry the outgoing mail from the post office to the wharf, when it is taken charge of by the proper steamboat official. The night of the accident our mail was carried to the wharf by the man paid by the G. T. P. for that purpose at 6 p. m. and placed inside the freight shed. As the shed was filled with freight the five mail sacks were placed outside in the rain and went down when the wharf gave way at 10 p. m. and nobody knew where they are. One of the sacks contained the registered letters and about \$3,000 in notes that were being sent to the banks. It is stated that the mail carried about \$15,000 in cheques, post office orders, postal notes and bank notes. All these amounts were lost. Had any thief been prowling around the freight shed last night he could easily have

stolen the registered mail sack and secured the notes.

Changes Wanted.

"We bring these matters to your notice in order to let you know how we are treated by the Public Works Department and the post office authorities, and sincerely hope that you will cause drastic changes to be made at the earliest possible date, and compensation for those who have had such serious losses through no fault of their own.

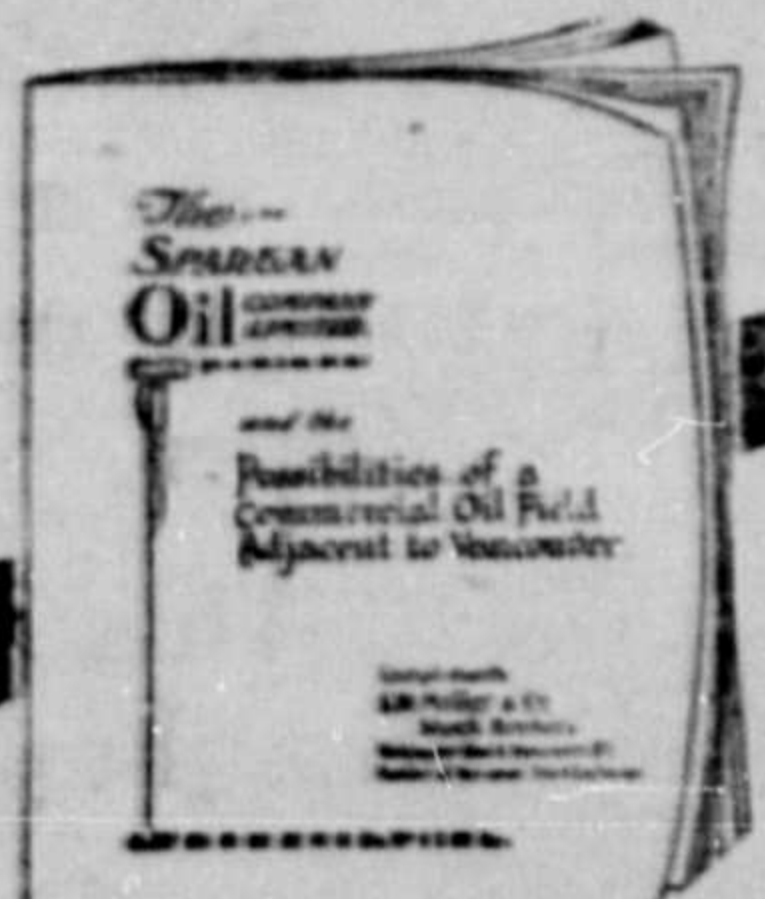

NOTICE TO SOLDIERS ON HARVEST LEAVE.

Attention is directed to a recent announcement published in the Press by the Military Service Branch, Department of Justice, regarding extensions to be granted to men EXEMPTED AS FARMERS.

It is pointed out that this DOES NOT IN ANY WAY AFFECT MEN WHO HAVE BEEN ORDERED BY THE REGISTRAR TO REPORT to Depot Battalions and who have thereafter received leave of absence from the Military Authorities.

Once a man has been ordered to report for duty by the Registrar he leaves the jurisdiction of the Registrar and comes under that of the Department of Militia and Defence, and is to be considered as a soldier. This applies to men of the 20 to 22 Class who have been ordered to report by the Registrar in virtue of the cancellation of exemptions by Order-in-Council of the 20th April last, as well as to those ordered to report in the usual way on refusal of claim for exemption, or on expiration of exemption granted.

All men, accordingly, who have been ordered to report, and are therefore SOLDIERS, and who have subsequently been granted harvest leave by the military authorities, MUST, NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOTICE ABOVE REFERRED TO, REPORT ON THE EXPIRATION OF THAT LEAVE, unless they are notified to the contrary by their Commanding Officer or by general notice published by the Department of Militia and Defence.

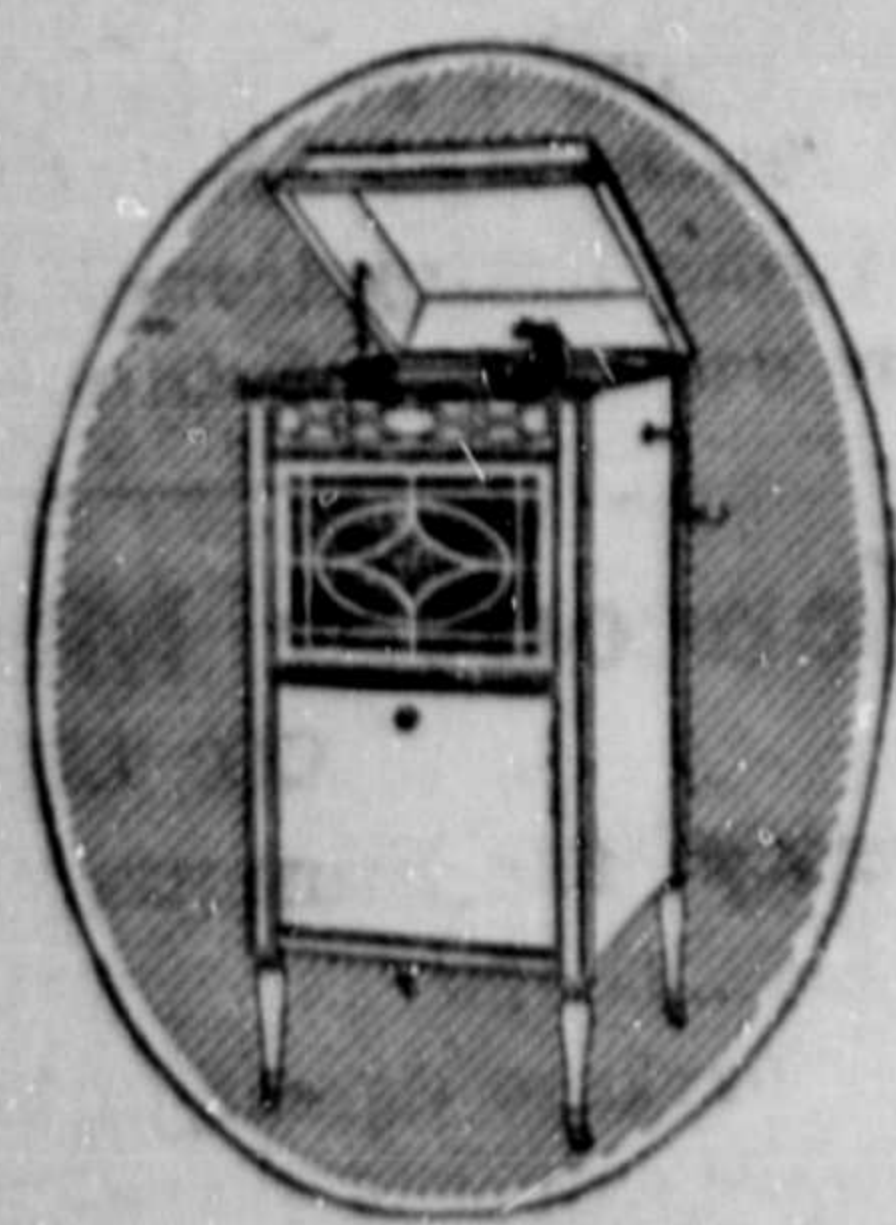

TELEPHONE CHANGES MAY BE EXPECTED IN NEAR FUTURE

Chairman of Utilities Committee Prepares the Public Mind For a Change.

At the meeting of the City Council last night, Alderman Dybhavn told the Council that in the very near future it would be necessary to put in a new switch-board system in the telephone department. The present system had been installed nine years ago by a few citizens and was intended to be but a temporary arrangement. The business of the city had increased to such an extent that it would be necessary to do something soon.

The Alderman explained that at present there were 825 services in the city and only three operators. For this reason it was plain that during the busy hours of the morning there must sometimes be a little delay. This was not the fault of the operators but of the overcrowding of the system. He thought the public should know what the condition was.

On a recent visit to Seattle he found that the charges were higher than here and that the service was nothing like as good. The minimum charges were \$2.75 for residential services and up to \$7.00 for business. Here the range was from \$2 to \$6.50. When there he paid five cents for each call and in 75 per cent of the cases got the wrong number after having to wait a long time.

Alderman Dybhavn said he hoped to lay before the Council a proposition for some slight changes in the near future.

Mayor McClymont said that here the average telephone users was very high, one in six using the telephones as against the general average of cities of one in ten.

LONGSHOREMEN WILL HELP VICTORY OLAN

Endorse Appointment of Canvassers and Purchase Bonds from Union Funds.

The Longshoremen's Union met last night and formally endorsed the appointment of Capt. Groves, W. H. Montgomery and W. A. Pilford, secretary of the union, as a canvassing committee to solicit subscriptions for the Victory Loan from among members of the Union.

In order to show in a practical way their sympathy with the movement and their desire to help the Union ordered the purchase of \$700 in bonds. When it is considered that their total fund amounts only to about \$1,000 this is an extremely large amount to invest, and the action of the Union will doubtless be appreciated by the community.

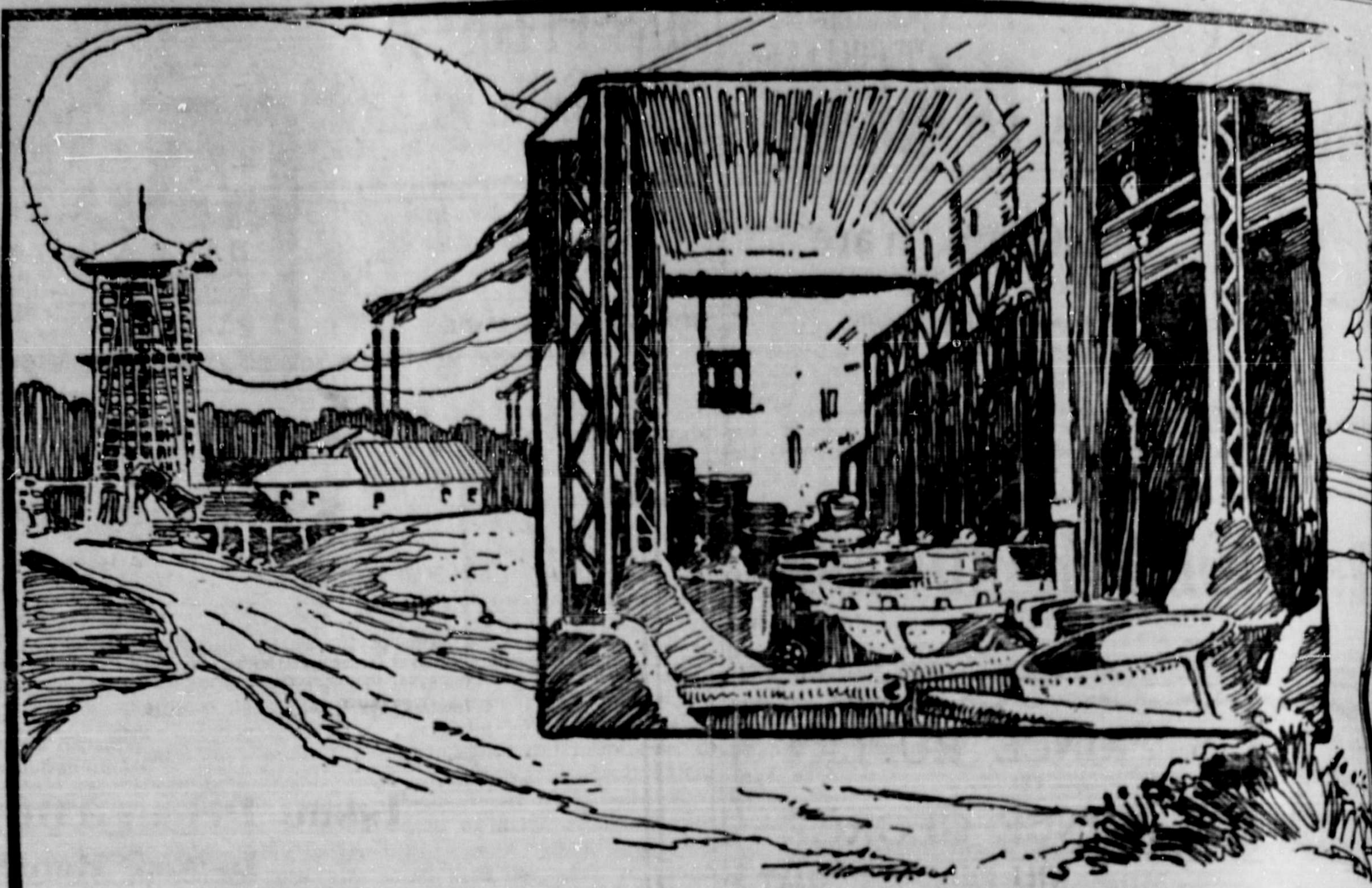

DOUKHOBOR RESERVES ARE BEING LEASED

All cultivated lands formerly a part of Doukhobor reserves in the vicinity of Kamsack, Veregin, Canora and Yorkton are being leased on crop shares by the Soldiers' Settlement Board. These valuable lands comprise 66 parcels, with a total area to be cultivated of approximately 2,700 acres. Preference will be given to returned soldiers who are residing in the adjoining districts who have facilities and who are prepared to operate the land. Leases will be restricted to a quarter section each, unless circumstances otherwise justify, and applicants will be required to cultivate the respective areas that have been under cultivation.

All applications from returned soldiers will receive the preference of 24 hours and must be filed with the commissioner of the Soldiers' Settlement Board at Kamsack, Sask., on or before 9 o'clock Friday, Nov. 8.

Providing that returned men fail to make application for all parcels to be leased, applications from civilians in the district will be received on the following day, Saturday, Nov. 9. In the case of applications from civilians, it will be necessary for each to tender a cash bonus, in addition to the stated rental fee of one-third share of the crop, and the board reserves the right to refuse such applications, providing it is felt that owing to the lateness of the season or otherwise the land may be again offered for lease early in the spring of 1919.

Nearly all of this land has been under cultivation this year, and the policy of the government is that, while the lands are being held pending disposition to returned soldiers, the land should be kept in a high state of cultivation and at the same time assist in greater production.
