

It was only when the hard times hit Canada and the railway began to lose money for the country that criticism commenced. He was accused of extravagance and, possibly, he was rather slow to adapt the system to the changed conditions, thus laying himself open to greater criticism than might have been the case.

In regard to Sir Henry's attitude toward Prince Rupert, there is little to say except that so far as could be seen, this terminal point was promised much but received little. Whether that was the fault of Sir Henry or of the powers behind the scenes, no one can be sure. It is certain that, during the ten years of Sir Henry's presidency, this city made little progress and a few of the railway offices left by a former regime were taken south. The opinion was general in Prince Rupert that the port might have received much greater encouragement than it did from the railway head.

In spite of this purely local view, it must be said of Sir Henry that he was a great man in his way-spectacular, realizing the value of publicity, autocratic, but a man with vision much beyond the ordinary. Some think that he was overpaid but he did good work and has earned the respect and gratitude of the people of Canada.

THE UNIVERSITY OF B.C.

The University of B.C., like other educational institutions, has been much under fire of late. In the time of cur- in at least one-half of their team's tailment the university was slow to change and the somewhat radical professors proved to be intensely conservative in regard to themselves, their pay and their work They hated to change. Under these circumstances, friction prevailed at the seat of learning and Judge Lampman of Victoria was appointed to investigate. The full text of his finding has been received by the Daily News and it seems to exonerate the president of blame and to place the cause of the trouble chiefly on the cumbersome system of administration by which there is divided control between the senate and board of governors. The Judge recommends that there be only one governing body and that the number of members be greatly reduced.

The activities of the student body come in for rebuke. | Moran S. The Judge says:

He mentions that, at a time when the life of the university was in the balance, it was surprising to find a movement for increased expenditures in this department. In this connection he says: "In the art of getting associations to pass resolutions there is no one to equal the person whose salary is in jeopardy. I am suspicious of all such resolutions."


