Abdication of Kaiser William 95,000 MORE NEEDED TO REACH PRINCE RUPERT'S OBJECTIVE

KAISER WILHELM STEPS DOWN FROM THRONE OF GERMANY; THE LAND IN THROES OF REBELLION

Expected that Action Forced on Hun Ruler Will Cause End of the War Immediately; Armistice May Be Signed Sunday.

London, Nov. 9; Official---Kaiser William has abdicated. There is revolution everywhere throughout Germany.

It has been anticipated for some time that the Kaiser would abdicate, but that he would do it so quickly was hardly expected. He has had such absolute faith in himself as the savior of his people that nothing but absolute necessity would cause him to give way.

It is to be assumed now that the armistice terms of the Allies will be signed tomorrow or at any rate in the very near future.

FOURTY MILLION TONS OF COAL IS AT TELKWA

Jefferson Tells Government
He Thinks They Will Find
100,000,000 Tons Before
Boring Stops.

When the coal production for the province for the month of October was announced by the Hon. William Sloan, Minister of Mines, and quoted in these columns a few days ago, mention was made of a first shipment from the mine at Telkwa, says the Victoria Times. True, the first shipment did not exceed one hundred and fifty tons; nevertheless the fact that that first shipment was shipped to Premier Oliver by Mr. Sloan, a representative of the mine operating the mine, this morning delays that drilling operations carried out so far over the mountains in that particular locality. It has disclosed the existence of at least forty million tons. It is believed that when the whole of the property has been drilled the total in question anticipates at least one hundred million tons of high grade bituminous coal in the mine. Mr. Oliver promised that the results would be transmitted to the Minister of Mines and he assured Mr. Jefferson of the Government's interest in the development of coal fields in a section of the province now about to enter upon an era of extensive settlement. The Department of Mines will follow the usual procedure and investigate the claims placed before Mr. Oliver this morning.

NO MORE RUM AND VERY LITTLE SCOTCH

That is the Report of Prohibition
Commissioner Findlay in
Regard to Liquor
Situation.

Victoria, Nov. 9.—Every available immediate stock of rum in Canada has been virtually commandeered by Prohibition Commissioner Findlay during the last fourteen days, and so great has been the demand by way of medical prescription that the Government's stock has become well nigh exhausted. It has been possible to secure one or two small parcels of the commodity at Montreal and Winnipeg which will reach the coast during the next week or ten days; but to all intents and purposes the rum supply of Canada is virtually no more.

Mr. Findlay has placed an order with Jamaica for shipment to this country at the earliest possible moment so that while some inconvenience may exist during the present Spanish influenza epidemic future stocks will be taken care of.

Rye Just as Good.
Reference has already been made by Commissioner Findlay to the shortage of imported Scotch whisky in Canada while his appeal to the medical profession to prescribe it in minimum quantities, and in any case not beyond the immediate requirements of the patient in relieving the situation for the time being.

He points out, however, that there is a large supply of Canadian rye whisky in the country at the present time which can be relied to patients requiring it at about one-half of the price asked for imported Scotch. Moreover, the medical properties of rye are high by repute, suggesting that a pause on the prescription of Scotch for the time being would not only conserve the supply and help to stabilize the price, but also still secure for the patient the same curative process.

The recent tremendous demand for Scotch has very naturally lessened an already small supply

Among the most recent large amounts subscribed is \$5,000 from George Frizzell of this city. The work is going well and the committee feel confident that the objective of 300,000 will be reached by the end of next week.

BORDEN STREET HOSPITAL WILL CLOSE MONDAY

Only Fourteen Patients Left and
Making Good Progress; Many
Will Be Discharged
By Tomorrow.

Two patients were discharged yesterday from the Borden Street Emergency Hospital, and none were admitted. This leaves now only fourteen patients receiving care at this institution. Most of them are making a rapid recovery and it is expected that the hospital at Borden Street will be closed by Monday. By that time many of the fourteen now there will have gone home, and the pressure at the General Hospital ought to be relaxed sufficiently to take care of the one or two patients left at that time.

There is only one serious case in Borden Street, Eddie Funk, the G. T. P. yardmaster, is on the road to recovery, and is making good progress, and most of the other patients are doing well.

The Borden Street Emergency Hospital has filled a very pressing need during the epidemic. By the careful and efficient nursing, several of the apparently hopeless cases brought there have made marvellous recoveries.

PRINCE RUPERT HAS PASSED THE \$200,000 MARK FOR LOAN

PORT SIMPSON MAKES GOOD SHOWING AND OTHER
PLACES ARE BUSY — BUSINESSMEN ARE
RESPONDING WELL AND BUYING
ALL THEY CAN AFFORD

Prince Rupert is doing nobly in subscriptions to the Victory Loan, the amount now subscribed being in the neighborhood of \$205,000. It is now practically certain that the flag will be forthcoming and it is confidently expected that the objective of \$300,000 will be reached.

Prince Rupert city has subscribed to the extent of \$170,000, Port Simpson \$5,550 and the other districts together \$30,000, making a total of \$205,550 up to last night.

FISHERMEN DO WELL FOR VICTORY LOAN

Subscribe to Extent of Over Eight
Thousand Dollars to Date
and Expect to do
Better Yet.

Secretary J. H. Meagher of the Halibut Fishermen's Union announced this morning that the fishermen had to date purchased Victory Loan bonds to the amount of \$8,400 and of this amount the Union had taken \$250. The local officials are trying to induce the Union to increase the amount they take. The headquarters are at Seattle and a request to that effect has been forwarded.

Mr. Meagher says the fishermen have nothing like finished their campaign yet, but they will keep at it right to the end and expect to raise several thousand dollars more.

The opinion is that the fishermen are doing their full share. They were among the first to begin the purchase of bonds and there will be fishermen buying right to the end. The bonds being negotiable make a much better investment than keeping the money in the bank and almost all merchants are glad to take them in place of cash in payment for purchases.

SOLDIERS' DEPENDENTS MAY GET INCREASES

Frank Giolma, M. P. P. Elect, Gets
Reply From General Mewburn
Regarding
Matter.

Victoria, Nov. 9.—"There is every probability of early action being taken by the Federal authorities to add to the separation allowances being paid to soldiers' dependents, for I have just received word from Major-General Mewburn, Minister of Militia, that the matter is now actually under consideration," said Frank Giolma M. P. P. elect yesterday.

Mr. Giolma stated that he had communicated with the Minister of Militia at the end of last week, asking whether any action had yet been taken looking towards an increase in the allowances, and reminding the Minister of a pledge of early attention which he had given when he paid his recent visit to this city. The telegram in reply was laconic but satisfactory, for it stated that General Mewburn had brought up the matter before the Executive Council as soon as he returned to Ottawa, and it was under discussion.

The rumor which emanated from Vancouver to the effect that the Minister of Militia favored an increase of \$5 a month was denied in toto by the Minister on his visit here, and he then expressed himself as being in favor of a scheme which would provide for a \$10

The committee canvassing in town states that the businessmen, with a few notable exceptions, are doing nobly. There are very few small bonds being taken and everyone seems to be doing all they possibly can.

Dr. Large of Port Simpson sent word last night that they expected to make their contribution \$10,000 instead of \$5,000. That is the sort of message that is encouraging. It gladdens the hearts of the members of the committee and shows that the people at that point realize their duty.

Two points have not yet been heard from. These are Terrace and Smithers. At the former place George Keith reports that they have been delayed by the influenza but that they are getting to work now and will report in a few days. At Smithers there has been similar cause for delay, but the canvass is going on there and it is expected that the centre of things will not be one whit behind other points along the road. As a matter of fact much is expected of Smithers.

The Canadian Explosives, which has a branch here, has wired from Vancouver that \$5,000 will be purchased at this point.

Taken as a whole the outlook is very good and everything points to the fact that Prince Rupert is doing her duty and also that her people are wise to a good investment.

"The City Which Lies Under a Curse."

An order in council was recently passed by the Federal Government empowering the Minister of Trade and Commerce to appoint a commission to investigate the trade possibilities with Russia.

Prince Rupert has a man of unquestioned business ability, a man who has made good in Canada, who has the interests of Canada at heart, was born in Russia, received his early training in Russia, knows Russia thoroughly, and speaks the language. He also knows Canada's needs as few men know them, and his knowledge and experience would be invaluable to the Government if he were appointed on that commission.

He offered his services without remuneration.

Public men and businessmen in all parts of Canada recommended his appointment, and a delegation consisting of Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Alex. Manson, M. P. P., and J. H. Pillsbury waited on the Minister of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa recently and pointed out all of these qualifications and used every possible effort to have him appointed, realizing fully what it would mean to this port and to Canada as a whole to have such a practical and logical appointment made. A telegram from Ottawa states that "the Minister definitely refuses to make the appointment" and the minister referred to is the Minister of Trade and Commerce, "Hon." George E. Foster, who in a speech a couple of years ago before the Empire Club in Toronto said that Prince Rupert was a city "which lies under a curse."

The people of Prince Rupert, if they did not know before, should know now "who that curse is."

It seems a pity that such powers should be invested in such a bigoted, fossilized "politician" as the "Hon." George E. Foster.

Canada is too big and her business interests too important to be played with by men of such small calibre.

While we have such persons in the cabinet, Canada as a nation and Prince Rupert in particular, can hope for little.

"Hon." George E. Foster would be well advised to do as Tom Crothers has done—resign and make room for a "man."

Mining On Queen Charlottes.

Of late the Queen Charlotte Islands have been much in the public eye on account of the spruce production that has been going on there. Soon it will be in the public eye because of the mining developments. There are richer deposits than those on the islands and also there are larger ore bodies, but the ore there is said to be found in good paying quantities and of sufficient richness to give good returns to the miner. A good deal of it is tied up with crown grants, however.

The Ikeda mine has been working steadily and has a good lot of ore in the bunkers ready for shipment. Soon shipments will be made regularly from the Islands and the miners will come here to spend their money.

This is the mining centre of the north. The Stewart, Alice Arm and a half a hundred smaller camps will all make this the centre for securing supplies and the place to take a holiday. Mining is one of the things we have to encourage as much as possible. It is good business to do it.

Miner Has Own Outlook on Life.

Everyone like a miner. He is always open hearted and open handed. The life in the hills gives him a vision which many of us never see. He has an outlook on life all his own. He sees nature at its hardest and yet he does not grouch. He leads a hard life and yet there are many compensations. The eternal gamble keeps him going. There is excitement in the search for gold or metals, the mining of which will bring gold. That perpetual expectation is the spice of life. It is the only thing that keeps a newspaperman from getting crazier than he is. It is what lured Columbus on. It is what carried Stefansson into the northern wilds. The eternal expectation is the lure of the miner and it keeps him alive.

When the miner comes to town he is a good fellow. Some take advantage of his generosity, if he has struck it rich. Others try to beat him down on the price of his mine after he has found it. In Prince Rupert we want to encourage the miners, to treat them well, to do everything possible to bring them here, and to use our influence to develop the mines of the neighborhood.

Electricity For Heating Homes.

The time will come when we shall have to use some other heat than coal. The supply will become exhausted and then the numerous water and other powers that are at present going to waste will be utilized for heating purposes.

If we could use electric heat generally in our homes there would be a great saving in dirt, in laundry work, in work for the housewives and in doctors' bills. Perhaps it will become possible eventually to use electrical energy for domestic purposes to a much greater extent than at present.

Gas is used a good deal in some cities, but electric energy is carried and laid on so much easier than gas, it is more mobile. The fixtures can be changed to suit household changes. Everything is in favor of electric power except the price, and that should come down in time.

No Wood Fuel Can Be Obtained.

It is curious that in a city built in the midst of woods there should be no wood fuel, or next to none. Wood is used a good deal in most cities and is brought in on the trains and on scoops from points many miles away. The mill wood from Chemainus is taken to Victoria, sawn into suitable lengths and delivered at the homes for fuel. It is curious that no wood is used here.

Coal is cheaper than wood and it is less bother to the person who has to attend the fires. In furnaces it is the only fuel that is worth considering. It will be a happy day for Prince Rupert when some of the nearby coal fields are developed.

Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIMSELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUESTION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION at the time when the employee was taken into his employ, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

REGULATIONS.

"106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not more than One Hundred Dollars, and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he made due inquiry and produced the MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and production of the papers that the man was not a deserter or absent from the force without leave, or in default in respect of any of the

obligations or requirements aforesaid."

"106A. Every person who HARBOURS OR CONCEALS OR IN ANY WAY ASSISTS ANY MAN WHO IS A DESERTER OR ABSENT WITHOUT LEAVE FROM THE CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable upon summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he was not aware and had no reasonable ground to suspect that the man so harboured, concealed, or assisted was a deserter or absent from the forces without leave or in default in respect of any of the obligations or requirements aforesaid."

MILITARY SERVICE BRANCH

ONE THOUSAND MILLIONS CANADA'S WAR EXPENSE

WHAT IT COST US TO DESTROY GERMAN MILITARISM—HOW EXPENSES MOUNTED TO MAINTAIN CANADA'S EFFORT AT HOME AND ABROAD

Canada has been spending over \$1,000,000 directly on the war every day. From the beginning to the present day Canada has spent one thousand millions of dollars. The sum exceeds the total national revenue from 1868 to 1904.

And the cost of the war grew as the army expended. This is the reason why Canada wants \$500,000,000. The actual war expenditure will take nearly 75 per cent of the whole amount. Then there is the interest on war loans, the expenditure on the

naval service and the assistance given to the live stock, grain and dairy interests to enable them to sell their products to Great Britain and her allies. Ship building is a war necessity and assistance is being given to that industry.

Expense Growing Daily.

Our war expenditure grew as the offensives grew. We spent \$175,752,000 during the first six months of this year, and the Canadians did not take the offensive till six weeks after. The war bill this year will be \$360,000,000. The following figures will illustrate how our army has expanded and what this ever-increasing force has cost.

In 1914 we sent to Great Britain and France 30,999 men, and the expenditures amounted to \$25,879,749. In 1915, 84,334 men went overseas and the expenditure rose to \$127,616,300; in 1916 we sent over the ocean 165,553 men and the cost to us was \$248,665,769. In 1917 we had sent about 350,000 men in Great Britain and France and the cost of maintaining that huge army was \$315,094,000. This year with the total sent overseas reaching probably 425,000 the expenditure will hardly be less than \$360,000,000.

Where the Money Goes.

We ask how the one billion

dollars of Canada's war bill has been spent. The following figures up till the middle of 1918 will show:

These items alone total \$814,000,000. The average pay amounts to about \$1.25 per day per man for all ranks. Average cost of rations 50 cents per day in Canada; in Britain 88½ cents. Maintenance of Canadian troops in France works out to about \$2.30 per day per man. The cost per man for clothes is about \$64.00 a year. At the beginning of the year there were 71,000 dependents of soldiers in Canada who receive an average of \$26.75 a month for all ranks.

Even though the armistice is signed money is still required to bring the men home and feed them while there.

PENSIONS

Those Only Who Have Suffered Disability Are Entitled to Aid From State.

Now that the war is over a great many people are interested in the matter of pensions. The following are the regulations in this regard put in succinct form:

(1) Soldiers are not pensionable for service only.

(2) Pensions are awarded only in cases of disablement due to a wound or disease occurring on, resulting from, or aggravated on service.

(3) Disablement is estimated only by the effect it may have upon the soldier's capacity for ordinary work. That he cannot return to his former occupation does not entitle him to a higher pension than the extent of his disability warrants.

(4) If a soldier is so disabled that he is completely incapacitated for ordinary work, he receives a "Total Disability" pension which has been fixed at \$50.00 a month.

(5) If by his disablement a soldier's capacity for ordinary work is lessened, he receives a percentage of the "Total Disability" pension equal to his handicap.

(6) This percentage has been most carefully and thoroughly worked out for every disability, and it is as accurate and fair as it is possible to make it.

(7) The earnings a man may be capable of making, or the amount of his pre-war earnings will not in any way affect the amount of pension awarded. The extent of his disability is alone considered.

(8) Widows of sailors or soldiers who have died are entitled to pension for so long as they do not remarry.

(9) Children of sailors or soldiers are entitled to pension up to the age of sixteen if boys, or seventeen if girls.

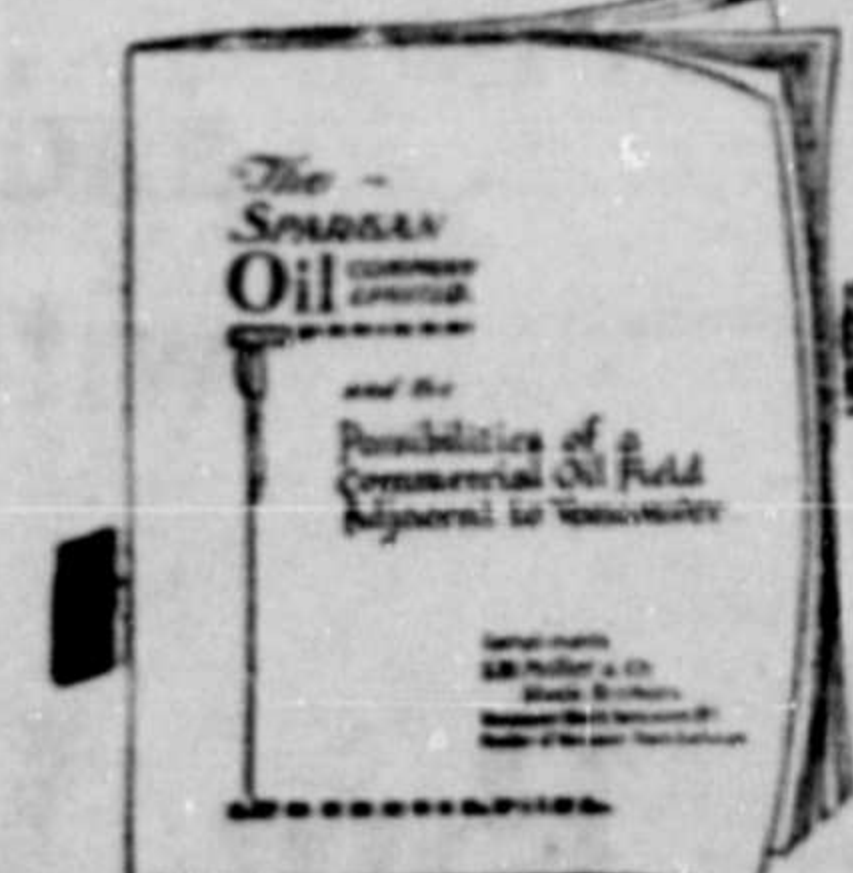
(10) Pension is only granted to the parents of a sailor or soldier when he was their main support previous to his death.

VENTURE ARRIVES ON NEW SCHEDULE

A new winter schedule has been inaugurated by the Union Steamship Company and the Venture which arrived last night was the first vessel to sail on the new time. The Venture will go to the Naas and Port Simpson every week, arriving here from the south on Friday evening and returning south on Saturday p.m.

The Camosun takes the place of the Chelohsin, calling at only the larger ports and reaching here in time to leave for Granby at 7. She returns south sailing from here at 7 Tuesday.

This is a slightly improved service as the Camosun is a bigger boat than the Chelohsin.

MINT HAS DONE FULL SHARE OF WAR WORK

Millions of Ounces of Gold Refined For the Bank of England.

The refining of gold in the Royal Mint, Ottawa, as part of its war work, is described as follows:

When the Mint was opened in January, 1908, the refinery was not yet in being. It was included in the plans, and was to be of rather small dimensions, as the amount of gold expected to come to it was small. As a matter of fact, gold to the amount of 269 ounces was deposited for coinage at the end of the year, and was duly paid in the Mint's sovereigns as the proclamation directed. The assay office had contrived to do the refining.

The same thing happened in 1909 with 8,545 ounces, and in 1910 with 24,347 ounces, a larger amount (37,896) being received, but held over to be refined in the refinery, which began work in 1911. The method used was the electrolytic method practised in the Philadelphia Mint. Nearly 90,000 ounces, chiefly from the Yukon, were received in 1911, 105,569 ounces in 1912, and 212,709 ounces in 1913.

All extension of the refinery, completed in January, 1915, included provision for a chlorination plant, to supplement the electrolytic cells. The advantage of chlorination, the method practised long ago by the Australian mints, but not till then on this continent, is its greater speed. It proved to be a fortunate step, for not only did the Mint easily clear off the accumulations of 1914, but it was prepared to deal with war demands sprung upon it in 1915. In that year, after dealing with 41,000 ounces from ordinary depositors, it began on September 27 the chlorination of a million of ounces of South African gold on account of the Bank of England, a task accomplished in twenty weeks of work by night and day and on Sundays.

CAPT. DICKSON OF UNION S.S. COMPANY BACK FROM FIGHT

Was Engaged on Inland Water Transport Service Towing Supplies to the Allies From England.

Commanding the steamer Ven-
 ure when she arrived from the
 north last night was Capt. A. E.
 Dickson, formerly skipper of the
 steamer. He has recently re-
 turned from overseas where he
 had some interesting experiences.
 Capt. Dickson arrived in Eng-
 land a year ago last spring, hav-
 ing enlisted in the Inland Water
 Transport Service. He did not
 do exactly inland water work to
 begin with, for he was sent to Dover
 to be engaged in towing barges of am-
 munition and supplies across to
 Dunkirk and Calais. Sometimes
 he operated out of Dover and
 sometimes out of Ramsgate.
 One of the exciting experiences
 Capt. Dickson had was being bomb-
 ed from aeroplanes. Fortunately
 the barges were never struck by
 the enemy. They bombed from a
 great height and most of the
 bombs missed their mark. At the
 same time it lent zest to the job

 the captain that he was really
 in the war.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years. Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his records, with the actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residence and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. The following recipe for fumigating a room has been sent in and is published for the benefit of those who may be interested: Take strips of toilet paper, wet them in dish of water and seal up the windows with same. Take a dish of quicklime, being sure to have the bottom of the dish off the woodwork, preferably on top of a tin pail. Slake the lime with water and then pour on half a pint of formalin. NOTICE TO SOLDIERS ON HARVEST LEAVE.

Attention is directed to a recent announcement published in the Press by the Military Service Branch, Department of Justice, regarding extensions to be granted to men EXEMPTED AS FARMERS.

It is pointed out that this DOES NOT IN ANY WAY AFFECT MEN WHO HAVE BEEN ORDERED BY THE REGISTRAR TO REPORT TO Depot Battalions and who have thereafter received leave of absence from the Military Authorities.

Once a man has been ordered to report for duty by the Registrar he leaves the jurisdiction of the Registrar and comes under that of the Department of Militia and Defence, and is to be considered as a soldier. This applies to men of the 20 to 22 Class who have been ordered to report by the Registrar in virtue of the cancellation of exemptions by Order-in-Council of the 20th April last, as well as to those ordered to report in the usual way on refusal of claim for exemption, or on expiration of exemption granted.

All men, accordingly, who have been ordered to report, and are therefore SOLDIERS, and who have subsequently been granted harvest leave by the military authorities, MUST, NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOTICE ABOVE REFERRED TO, REPORT ON THE EXPIRATION OF THAT LEAVE, unless they are notified to the contrary by their Commanding Officer or by general notice published by the Department of Militia and Defence.
