FIGHTING IS NOW AT END

ARMISTICE IS SIGNED AT MIDNIGHT BY THE GERMAN DELEGATES

TERMS OF ARMISTICE INCLUDE EVACUATION OF ALSACE-LORRAINE, LUXEMBERG AND BANK OF RHINE

Rolling Stock, Arms and Equipment to be Left Behind;
Complete Reparation for all Damages; Fighting Stops
for 30 Days.

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)
London, November 11.—The war is at an end. The armistice signed at midnight by German delegates and fighting stopped at 11 o'clock this morning. The surrender terms include:
Evacuation of invaded territories including Alsace-Lorraine and Luxembourg.
The surrender of a vast amount of guns and equipment.
Evacuation of the left bank of the Rhine.
The surrender of all the vast rolling stock in occupied territories.
The abandonment of the Bucharest and Brest treaties.
The unconditional surrender of all the German forces in East Prussia.
Complete reparation for all damage done with guarantees for paying it out.
Indemnities collected from invaded countries to be restored.
The surrender of scores of submarines, etc., and large war vessels.
The concentration of air craft at stipulated points.
The evacuation of all Black Sea ports.
The restoration of Allied and United States vessels.
The duration of the armistice to be for thirty days.

PEOPLE REJOICE AT COMING OF PEACE; PARIS IS CALMLY WATCHING DEVELOPMENTS

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, November 11.—This city is comparatively calm, watching the events in Germany eagerly. Everywhere are groups of people discussing the situation and practically all work is suspended. There is no violent outbursts such as might have been expected. The delay has been so long that people hardly yet realize the momentous events which are taking place.
London, November 11.—There is great rejoicing here. The people have thrown decorum to the winds and are wildly celebrating. Work is practically at a standstill and the people find it difficult to express themselves as they would wish.
People are thronging the places of worship and special religious services are being held in almost every church.
Washington, November 11.—There is great excitement here. The previous hoax it was difficult to get the people to believe that really happened but now flags are flying everywhere and there is a general feeling of relief that the war is over.

CANADIANS CAPTURED GERMANS THIS MORNING

London, Nov. 11.—Monsieur, a Belgian town near the British troops were engaged in bitter fighting with the Germans at the beginning of the morning by Canadian troops under Gen. Horn.

In Edmonton the officials say they think there is some improvement, but on Thursday, the day before the train left, the number of deaths were 21.

ARMIES WILL REMAIN IN THE FIELD AWHILE

Peace Situation Must Be Fully Assured Before Troops Are Taken Home.
(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)
London, Nov. 11.—It is announced from military headquarters that the armies of the Allies will remain in the field for some time until order is fully restored both in Germany and Austria and in the countries being evacuated. The peace situation must be fully assured before there can be any withdrawal of troops and even then the work will not be hurried. It is not expected that any Canadian troops will cross the ocean for some time except those who are now in England and who will probably be sent on at once to make room for those coming from France.

ORDERS TO PROCEED WITH COW BAY IMPROVEMENTS AT ONCE HAVE BEEN RECEIVED

ONLY THIRD OF PROPOSED WORK CAN BE COMPLETED NOW, OWING TO CITY HOLDING UP LAND TRANSFER — FISHERMEN ARE PETITIONING
Word has been received from Victoria that the Public Works Department of the Provincial Government has sent instructions to the local office to proceed at once with the construction of floats and a small breakwater on the Provincial Government property at Cow Bay. The local office has received these instructions and is preparing to commence the work as soon as possible.
The Provincial Government has a frontage of approximately 210 feet adjoining the new wharf which has been erected by the Georgetown Lumber Co. At this point there are already some floats but they are not a sufficient protection against the storms which spring up here and the fishermen complain that when the weather looks bad they are ordered to get away from the floats.
Only recently a number of boats were badly injured because of the lack of protection, and protests were made by the fishermen at that time both through the columns of this paper and direct to those who were considered responsible.
The Position.
The delay has arisen apparently through a misunderstanding. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway has running rights across Cow Bay and can put as many tracks

PRINCE RUPERT WILL SOON GO OVER THE TOP

Sum of \$270,000 Raised Up To Saturday Night and Full Objective May Be Reached Today.

In view of the news that peace has been declared it is suggested that it would be a great move to complete Prince Rupert's quota today and then to pile the dollars for the rest of the week until the real stuff that Rupert is made of is clearly shown.

This morning the committee reported that the sum of \$270,000 has been reached. Of this amount the Colg Storage employees contributed about \$9,000 and the employees of the Prince Rupert Mill \$6,100, and both still going strong.

There are still a good many people who have not taken any bonds, who are being delayed for various reasons. They will all be in line before the end of the week and it is now hoped that the city and district will reach at least the \$400,000 mark. Prince Rupert has benefited by the war a good deal financially, at any rate during the past year, and she is bound in honor to do her share toward bringing the boys home.

Another cremation took place at Fairview Cemetery yesterday afternoon, when Pertab Singh, a Sikh, lately employed at the Seal Cove sawmill, was accorded a funeral service in keeping with his religion. Deceased had been sick since the 25th October, and died November 9 from influenza.

The infant daughter, eight months old, of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Gosnell, of Ambrose Avenue, died at the general hospital on Saturday from influenza.

KAISER AND CROWN PRINCE ARE FUGITIVES IN HOLLAND; SOCIALISTS RULE GERMANY

VERY LITTLE BLOODSHED IN COUNTRY FOLLOWING COMPLETE REVOLUTION — THREE OUT OF FOUR GERMAN KINGDOMS FORM REPUBLICS

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)
London, November 11.—Today Kaiser Wilhelm who ruled his Empire for many years with a mailed fist and has for years had the monstrous dream of a Teutonized world, is a fugitive in Holland. With him is Crown Prince Frederick Wilhelm and practically the entire General Staff at Military Headquarters. Thus completely has militarism been swept away in a few hours from Germany. The entire civil government has also disappeared. The militarist regime has been followed by rule by combination of Social Democrats and soldiers' and workmen's councils, which is now in control of practically the entire Empire. The navy also has come under the new regime.

Saxony, Wurttemberg and Bavaria, three of the four kingdoms of the Empire, have declared republics, leaving all the kings of Germany without thrones.

Frederick Ebert, Socialist, who has succeeded Prince Max as Imperial Chancellor, and Phillip Scheidemann, leader of the Social Democrats, have issued appeals on behalf of the new government, promising peace as early as possible and asking the people to avoid rioting and bloodshed. They promise government of the people by the people.

Up to date the revolution has been attended by remarkably little bloodshed.

BOX FACTORY, COOPERAGE AND GENERAL WOODWORKING PLANT FOR PRINCE RUPERT

F. L. BUCKLEY HAS LEASED PLANT AT DRYDOCK AND WILL PROCEED WITH WORK ALMOST IMMEDIATELY; TO CUT DISCARDED SPRUCE AND OPERATE NIGHT AND DAY

Prince Rupert is to have a box factory, cooperage and general woodworking plant just as soon as arrangements can be made for the work to start.

Coincident with the peace announcement which it was thought might rob this district of some of its industries, comes the announcement from F. L. Buckley, manager of the Buckley Bay and Khyex mills, that he has just completed arrangements to lease from the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway the ship shed at the drydock. The lease is conferred by the Mullen Construction Company which had an option on it in case they might need it in connection with their ship-building plant.

Boxes and Shooks.

The proposal is to manufacture fish boxes and box shoofs of all kinds, both for use in the district and for export; to establish a cooperage for the manufacture of barrels for herring packing and mild-curing of salmon; and to install a regular cutting up and woodworking plant to do all kinds of work in conjunction with and for the purpose of re-manufacturing lumber, and especially to use up the discard from the aeroplane spruce which has been accumulating at all the mills in the neighborhood.

While there is already a good woodworking plant at the dock it is proposed to make a good many improvements, putting in extensive dry kilns and extending the dock up the harbor as far as the tracks so that large ships may be able to tie up there and load for export when necessary. To facilitate unloading transfers and live rolls and chains will be used and electric pilers installed.

Commence Immediately.
Discussing the matter with Mr. Buckley last night just before he left for Vancouver, a Daily News representative was told that it was the intention to start just as

soon as the necessary improvements could be installed. They expected to furnish the Mullen Construction Company with such woodwork as was needed in the construction of the ships they proposed building and to do a general home and export business.

He said that arrangements had been made to take the discarded spruce from all the mills on Massel Inlet, five in number, and to run the plant night and day just as soon as they got under way.

Fishermen Will Get Some Protection.

It is most satisfactory news which is received today to the effect that the small docks at Cow Bay are to be built at once to accommodate the fishing craft which ply out of this port.

The delay has been caused by the action of the City Council in intimating that they would oppose the transfer when it came before the Board of Railway Commissioners.

Immediate Action Might Change Plans.

The News has no inside information in regard to this matter, but the assumption is that if the Council would agree to withdraw their opposition to the transfer of the property at Cow Bay, the Government might be induced to go on with the original scheme.

The 450 feet of waterfront which is to be acquired by the Province in exchange for the yardage is all to be used for the benefit of the fishermen of Prince Rupert.

City is Not Party to Deal.

The deal is not between the city and the Railway Company, but between the Provincial Government and the Railway Company, the city being consulted as a matter of courtesy.

When Mr. Pattullo was here in the summer he discussed the matter at some length with the City Council and he promised on behalf of the Provincial Government that, if opposition was withdrawn, the Public Works Department would undertake to commence work at once on the floats, even though the actual transfer had not been effected.

Fishermen Suffered; City Lost Business.

The result of the delay has been that the fishermen have had to suffer and indirectly the merchants have lost business through many fishermen going to Seattle and Vancouver to winter when they would otherwise have remained here.

It is understood that the fishermen are now taking the matter up themselves and are preparing a petition to the Council which they will ask the merchants and others to sign, requesting the Council to withdraw their opposition to the scheme.

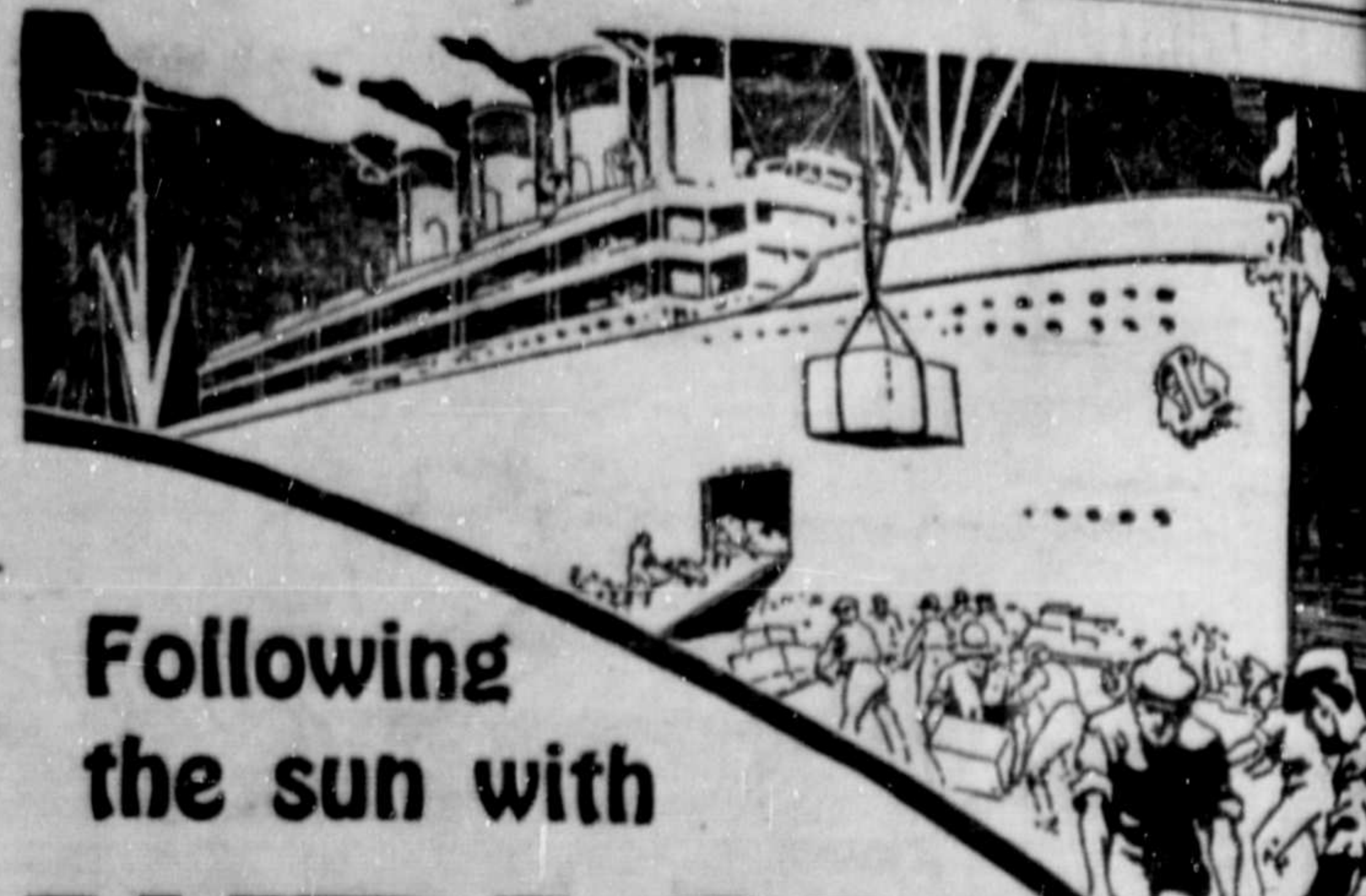

sure craft that frequent these waters.

Opposition.

The Government set aside an appropriation of \$7,500 for the work but it was necessary to get the approval of the Railway Commission before the deal could be finally consummated. Recognizing that the City Council was interested in the scheme, Hon. T. D. Pattullo took them into his confidence and held a conference with them. A majority of the Council demanded that if the deal went through the city should get a part of the waterfront property and said that during a previous campaign Mr. Pattullo had promised that they should get it. This Mr. Pattullo denied, but said that the securing of waterfront by the city had nothing to do with this particular scheme.

As a result of the misunderstanding the Council notified the Railway Commission that when the matter came up they would like to be heard, a request which was tantamount to a notice that they would oppose the scheme.

Fishermen Suffering.

Because the Provincial Government could not get the land, they were unable to proceed with the erection of the floats and the fishermen have had to suffer as a result. The Government engineers reported that it would not be economy to go ahead with part of the scheme and it was allowed to lie in abeyance. The recent losses by the fishermen and the publicity which was given to it has again focussed attention on the need, and as a result the Provincial Government, contrary to the advice of its engineers, has agreed to build as much of the dock as is possible under the circumstances. It is not economy, but the need is great and the public here are anxious that something shall be done.

Not Large Enough.

While the Government is now satisfied to go ahead the fishermen are apparently not satisfied. Some of them say that the proposed dock will not be large enough to accommodate half the boats that would like to use it and that steps should be taken to try to induce the City Council to try to reverse their decision. Accordingly a petition is being prepared which will be passed round for signature and it is expected that ninety per cent. of the people will sign it.

It has also been suggested that the City Council should at once retire from its position and allow the complete work to proceed. The fishermen say that they realize the good motives which induced the mayor and councillors to try to get waterfront for the city, but that just now the needs of the fishermen are much greater than the city's need for waterfront. They think it would be a graceful act for them to withdraw their objection, under protest if they wish, but at any rate to withdraw and give the fishermen a chance to secure that protection which they badly need.

The Complete Scheme.

It is not known whether or not the Provincial Government would again change its plans and proceed with the whole work, but the assumption is that it would, if action were taken before the work proceeded too far. When Mr. Pattullo was here in the summer he then told the City Council that if they would give their promise not to oppose the exchange of properties the Public Works Department would proceed with the work, even though the actual transfer had not taken place.

The property which the Province would get in exchange for the trackage part of Cow Bay would include the part now used by the Yacht Club, the line running through the two small rocky islets on the farther side of it. The property is very desirable and is well suited to the purpose for which it is designed. The frontage would be protected from the wind by a small breakwater and there would be plenty of space for all the boats that would wish to use the floats.

There are also very many people who have not yet bought a bond and others who have bought only one or two. It is expected that committees will be waiting on these and that they will be induced to do better.

At the police court this morning Harry Lascelles again appeared in answer to the charge of theft of two slabs of bacon from Frizzell's Meat Market. The case was adjourned for other three days, owing to the illness of the accused.

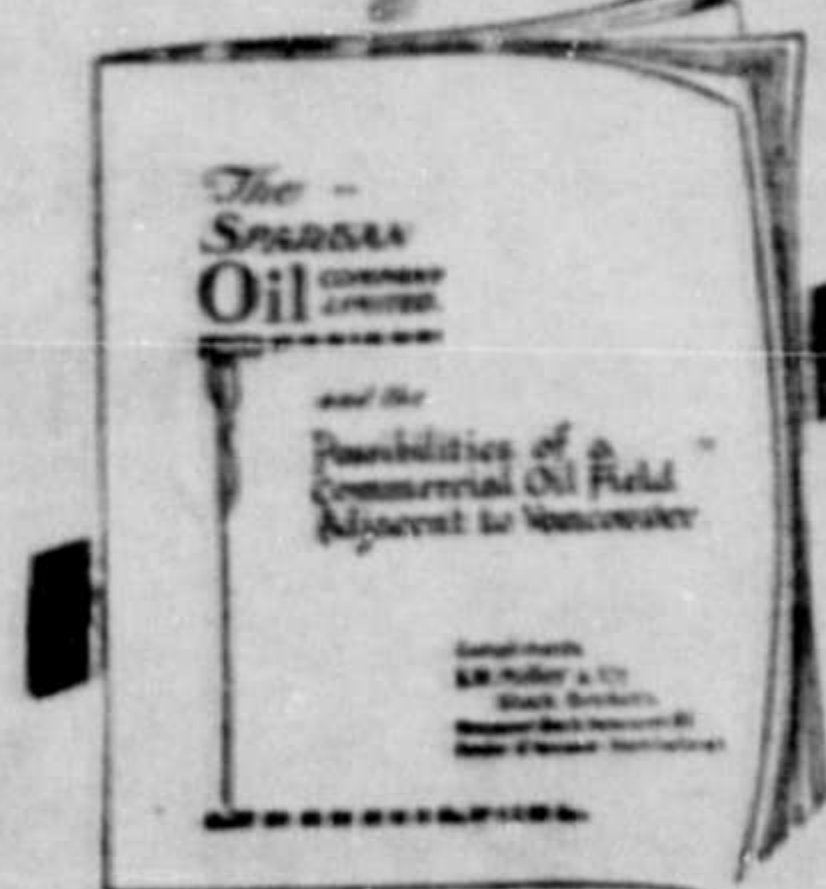

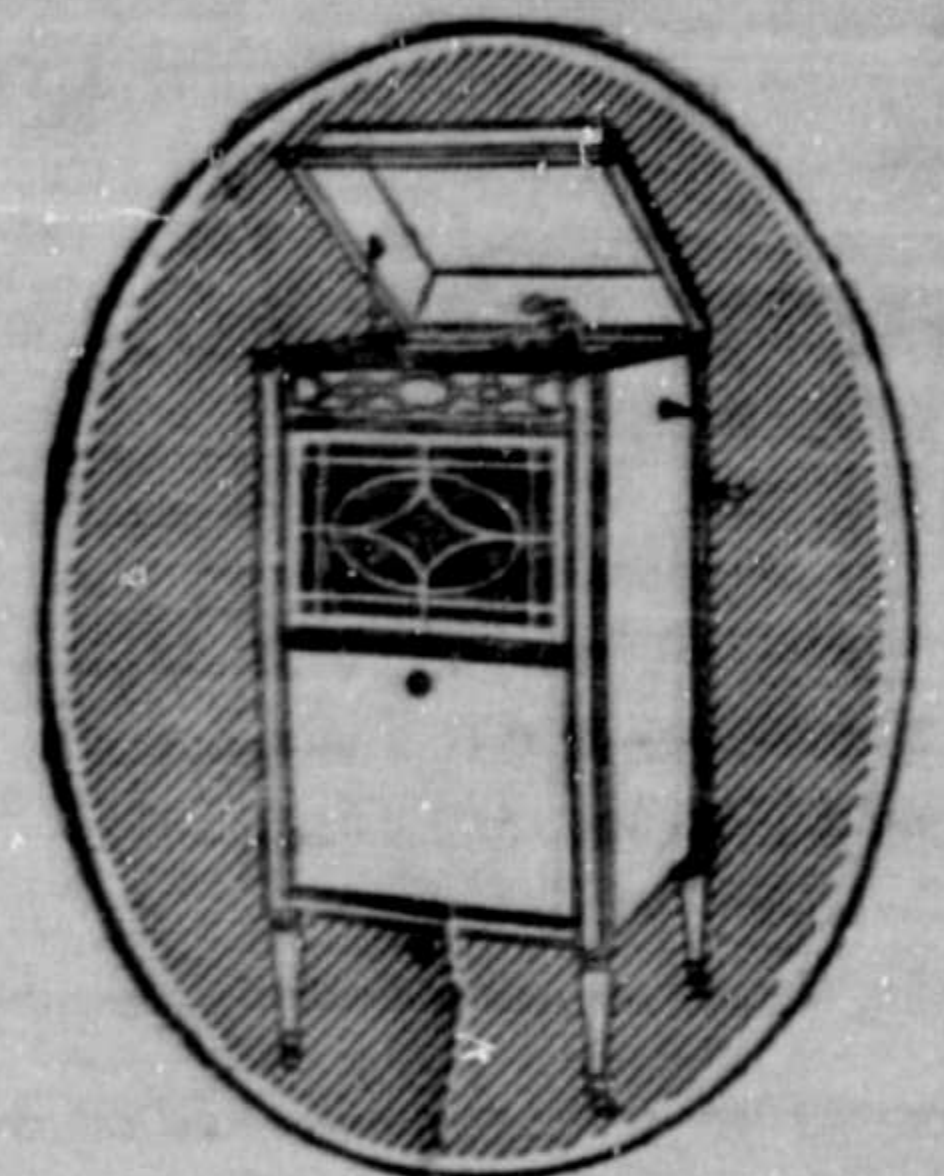

Orient Arrives With 38,000 lbs. of Halibut, the First of the Winter Visitors.

The first of the large winter schooners to make this their home port arrived yesterday when the Orient came in with 38,000 lbs. and sold it at 17c. a pound. It is customary for a number of the Seattle and Vancouver fishing boats to fish out of Prince Rupert during the winter and this is the first of them. Others are expected soon.

The Alten came in yesterday with 30,000 lbs. and the Ingred with 500, all of which was sold at 17c., a higher price than has been reported this year hitherto.

Several fishing boats left some time ago for Seattle to lie up until the influenza is over. They will soon be back and will add to the winter fishing fleet. The small boats have already nearly all tied up to wait until spring.

Reports from Ketchikan say that the influenza is still very bad there. This seems to be keeping some of the boats away from the American port.

MAKES CHANGE IN SCHOOL REGULATIONS

Department of Education Makes Uniform Hours Throughout Year Possible; Home Work.

The Provincial Department of Education has recently made a change in the school regulations, making it possible for those making boards that so wish to have a regular closing and opening time all the year; round instead of shortening the hours in the winter as has been the custom. There are also further regulations in regard to home work which are of interest to all parents. The following is the change:

Clause 1.—The hours of teaching shall be from 9 p. m. to 12 m. and from 1 p. m. to 3:30 p. m. from March to October, inclusive, and from 9:30 a. m. to 12 m. and from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. from November to February inclusive. There shall be a recess of 15 minutes, extending from 10:45 to 11 o'clock in each morning's work during the whole year, and a recess of 10 minutes, extending from 2:30 to 2:40 o'clock, in each afternoon's work from March to October, inclusive.

Clause 2.—The Board of School Trustees of any municipal school district who may deem it desirable to have a uniform time for opening and closing the schools of the district throughout the whole year, shall have the power of fixing, by resolution, the time of assembling and dismissing the schools as well as of determining the duration of the noon intermission. In every such municipal district the schools shall be in session five hours each day (including a recess of 15 minutes in the forenoon) and shall not be assembled before 9 a. m. nor remain in session later than 4 p. m. There shall be an intermission, beginning at 12 m., of at least one hour between the morning and the afternoon sessions.

Clause 3.—First and Second Primer classes may, at the discretion of the Boards of School Trustees, be dismissed at 2:30 p. m.

Home Lessons.

Clause 4.—(a) Each pupil shall be allowed the full time allotted for recess.

(b) In no case shall a pupil be detained after school hours for a longer period than half an hour.

(c) "Home" lessons should be assigned with great care and discretion. Such work should be confined to the language-subjects (memorization of stanzas of poetry, preparation of spelling, etc.), review work in history and geography, collecting nature study material, and getting information or illustrations about topics to be taken up for study in the classroom. Problems in arithmetic and exercises in analysis and parsing, as well as map drawing can be conducted profitably only under the direction and guidance of the teacher in the school-room and should not therefore form a part of the work assigned for home preparation. Few, if any, written exercises should be given to do out of school hours. Home work should not be demanded of lower Grade pupils. How far home work is practicable in the higher classes must depend on the circumstances of the individual pupil. Household and other tasks call for a share of the time and attention of many children. It is therefore suggested that Intermediate Grade pupils be not required to devote more than one hour and Senior Grade pupils no more than one hour and a half to the preparation of home tasks each day.

REPRESENTS B. C. AT LABOR CONFERENCE

Deputy Minister McNiven Will Go to Ottawa Gathering, at Which Important Topics Will Be Dealt With.

Representatives of all the Provinces will be in attendance at a conference which has been summoned to meet at Ottawa by the Minister of Labor on November 19, the same date upon which the conference of Provincial premiers and representatives of the Dominion Government will be held to deal with problems arising out of demobilization.

At the meeting summoned by the Minister of Labor the chief question will be that of the establishment of a system of employment bureaux under the provisions of the Employment Bureau Co-ordination Act, a Federal statute. The idea is to arrive at some plan whereby co-operation between the Provinces and Dominion may be effected, especially in view of the expected early return of the men from overseas.

Deputy Minister of Labor J. D. McNiven will represent British Columbia at the meeting, going east with Premier Oliver, who will attend the gathering of Provincial premiers. Mr. McNiven will take with him a mass of information bearing upon the labor situation in British Columbia, and this will be presented to the conference.

Owing to Mr. McNiven's trip to the east the meeting at Vancouver on the 13th inst. of the Minimum Wage Board, of which he is chairman, has been postponed until December 4.
