KING CHARLES OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY GIVES UP THRONE

Copenhagen, November 13 .- The abdication of King Charles of Austria-Hungary is officially announced from Vienna. The young king and his empress have found their period of rule to be extremely exacting. They have fled from Vienna to one of their estates, where they are living in seclusion, so far as seclusion is possible within the borders of the disrupted Dual Monarchy.

Karl Quits Cold.

Paris, November 13 .- The late Emperor Charles of Austria has issued a manifesto declaring that he is forsaking all participation in public affairs of German Austria, as well as in the other portions of his empire.

Austria Seething.

London, November 13 .- From reports received here from various parts of Austria-Hungary, the conditions of the population of these countries is desperate. Famine, revolution and anarchy are rife everywhere. The poor are without food and the new provisional governments of the various states into which the two countries are now divided have so far been unable to relieve the situation to any appreciable extent, notwithstanding all their efforts.

They have sown the wind and are reaping the whirlwind as the biblical scholar would say. Retributive justice it is to be hoped will not pass them over lightly.

NEARLY THOUSAND WHALES ARE CAUGHT

Only One Short of Round Number By Whole Fleet; Most Successful Season in History.

all the steam whalers of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation are now back to port for the winter.

From the number of mammals captured the past whaling season has been one of the most successful in the history of the whaling industry. Nine hundred and ninety-nine whales have been taken this year, the catch of the various stations being as fol-

British Columbia stations-Kyuquot, 246; Rose Harbor, 140; Naden Harbor, 114.

At the Bay City station 189 mammals were taken; the Akutan station, located in the Aleutian Islands, taking the plum with a catch of 310.

The whalers stayed on the grounds longer than was scheduled in an effort to land that elusive whale and thus round out the year's catch to the thousand mark, but the weather became bad and they were forced in.

The steam whalers White, Blue, Black and St. Lawrence are already in port at Point Ellice, the William Grant is at Naden Harbor awaiting coal, while the three whalers, the Brown, Green and Orion, are still patrolling the waters south and east of Cape St. James in search of bodies from the Galiano.

The Kodiak, blue ribbon vessel of the fleet, which bagged a total iii big mammals during the summer, has arrived in Seattle from Akutan. The vessel's crew killed twenty-nine blue whales, eight sperm whales and seventyfour finbacks and humpbacks during the season. Officers of the Kodiak said that unfavorable weather was experienced early in the summer, but later in the season the weather improved and a fine record was made.

The Unimak bagged eightyseven, the Tanginak forty-two and the Paterson seventy-eight of the big mammals. The vessels operating off the Aleutian Islands in Behring Sea and the North Pacific near Unimak Pass. The largest mammal killed during the season was a blue whale eightynine feet in length which weighed more than eighty tons.

This other stuff the councillors peddle is just so much election dope, but I don't think it will work. The fishermen know what they want.


