Part of Hun Navy Surrendered UNDERSEA CRAFT THAT CAUSED MUCH DAMAGE ARE TAKEN OVER

FORMAL SURRENDER OF WAR VESSELS BY GERMANY WAS ARRANGED ON SATURDAY

DELEGATES FROM SAILORS' AND SOLDIERS' COUNCIL AND PEOPLES' COUNCIL MET BRITISH NAVAL REPRESENTATIVES TO COMPLETE FORMALITY; ALL SUBS AND MANY SURFACE SHIPS TO BE TRANSFERRED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, November 18.—The meeting of German delegates with British naval representatives took place on Friday afternoon off Rosyth on the coast of Scotland, and concluded Saturday evening.

The German representatives consisted of three delegates from the Sailors' and Soldiers' Council and four delegates from the Peoples' Council, including Rear Admiral von Meurer.

Surface warships which are to be surrendered have to be ready to leave German ports seven days after the signing of the armistice. That is to say on Monday, November 18 (today) submarines which are to be surrendered must be prepared to leave German ports immediately on report of wireless at port of surrender and are to be handed over with full complement in the port specified by the Allies and United States within fourteen days after the signing of the armistice. That is Monday, November 25. All submarines are to be surrendered. Of surface warships, ten battleships, six battle cruisers, eight cruisers and fifty destroyers of the most modern type are to be given up.

NEWFOUNDLAND SWEEP BY BIG TIDAL WAVE

Southeast Hurricane Sweeps West Coast of Oldest Colony and Does Great Damage.

RAILROAD TRACKS ARE WASHED OUT OF SIGHT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

St. Johns, Newfoundland, November 18.—A southeast hurricane, blowing at the rate of ninety-five miles an hour and accompanied by a great tidal wave, swept all the West coast of Newfoundland on Saturday, causing heavy losses. Virtually all the waterside property in the vicinity of Curling, including that occupied by the Gorton Pew Fishing Company of Gloucester, has been swept away.

Huge seas swept over the Channel Headlight House blinding the light, which stands more than a hundred feet above the level of the sea. At Grand Bay, the railway tracks have been torn away. The damage known so far is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars.

WELL KNOWN MINER AND PROSPECTOR IS THE LATEST VICTIM

Louis Cleveland Knauss, Owner of Fiddler Creek Property, Stakes Last Claim.

The death occurred yesterday at the hospital of Louis Cleveland Knauss of Dorreen, B. C., one of the best known miners and prospectors of the northern district.

Mr. Knauss was born in Iowa, U. S. A., 35 years ago and so far as is known his only relative in British Columbia is a sister, Mrs. H. F. Dack, of Victoria, B. C. Only recently he visited Victoria with the intention of joining the overseas forces but was turned down.

Mr. Knauss was the owner of a valuable mining property at Fiddler Creek which had been bonded, and it seemed likely that he would realize on it soon. The long-awaited reward of the prospector was not to come, for he was taken with influenza, entered the hospital last Thursday and early yesterday morning passed to the unknown.

FORCES IN CANADA TO BE REDUCED FIRST

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—A drastic reduction of the military establishments in Canada will take place at once, preceding the demobilization of the overseas forces. The following will be affected, in the order named:

Returned soldiers who can be spared and are desirous of discharge. Married men who can be spared and who are desirous of discharge. Men in lower categories who have been held for various duties in Canada and who can now be spared. Men who can be spared whose occupations are such as to make them urgently required in civil life for economic reasons. All other men whose services are not required. Orders have already been issued that all have already been issued that all men serving in Canada, and who so desire, and who were railway employees upon enlistment or who were called up for service, are to be discharged immediately.

HUN SAILORS WERE SCARED

Final Orders for Fleet to Fight Caused the Mutiny Which Started Germans in Revolution.

FLEET ORDERED TO FIGHT TILL LAST SHIP WAS SUNK

Copenhagen, November 18.—Friday afternoon edition of Vorwaerts, the Berlin Socialist newspaper, declares that the report is true that the German fleet was ordered out on October 28 for the final battle, which was to be fought "until the last ship was sunk." The Pan-Germans believed that such a battle would re-animate the German people with the spirit of 1914. It is said that the order to the fleet spoke merely of a "manoeuvre cruise," but the report that sacrificial battle was intended, spread like wildfire, and a general mutiny followed. "This," says "Vorwaerts," "was the real start that kindled the revolution."

Sunk Training Ship.

Copenhagen, Nov. 18.—Two hundred cadets, and one hundred and three other sailors aboard the training ship "Schlesien," were drowned when that vessel was sunk by two German battleships flying the red flag.

VICTORY LOAN RETURNS ARE NOT COMPLETE

Prince Rupert District Made a Splendid Showing—Well Over Half Million Mark.

The returns as received up to noon today in regard to the Victory Loan Campaign show the Prince Rupert district as having subscribed \$535,000, but there are other amounts to come in and it is not impossible that it may reach twenty or thirty thousand more before the books are closed.

Several points such as Hazelton, Smithers and Essington have not yet made their final returns but by tomorrow a pretty accurate account should be available.

The local record to date but incomplete in many respects gives: Prince Rupert\$422,000 Hazelton 49,900 Port Simpson 12,600 Terrace 26,250 Pacific 3,400 Telkwa 7,500 Smithers 34,100 Essington unknown.

FRANCE IS EVACUATED BY GERMAN TROOPS; ANTWERP CELEBRATES HER FREEDOM

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

With the Allied Troops in France and Belgium, Nov. 18.—The Allied armies have begun their march toward Germany. Belgian forces have already occupied Antwerp, which was evacuated by the enemy on Friday and immediately taken over. Brussels was expected to be free of German soldiers today. The withdrawal from Antwerp was accomplished without incident and when the correspondent visited the city today people were in the midst of the celebration for their deliverance. The burgomaster has left Brussels for Ghent to visit the king.

With American Army North-east of Verdun, Nov. 18.—Russians, Italians, French and Roumanians by thousands, all released by the Germans streamed into the American lines Sunday. The question of feeding and housing them is taxing the facilities of the army and the various organizations which have been furnished by the Americans with luxuries.

Paris, Nov. 18.—The official statement of the advances of the Allies along the front says that the French army, quitting the conquered positions on the day of the armistice resumed yesterday its forward march to occupy regions evacuated by the enemy. Crossing the frontier on the whole of the front, our troops penetrated Belgium and the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine. At the present time there is not a single one of the enemy on our national territory. The liberated population everywhere received the troops with rejoicing.

WORK OF SUBMARINES DURING THE COURSE OF GREAT WAR GIVEN OUT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, November 18.—Details can now be given of the part which British submarines played during the war. This service destroyed the following enemy warships: Two battleships, two armed cruisers, two light cruisers, seven destroyers, five gunboats, twenty submarines, and five armed auxiliary vessels. One zeppelin, three battleships and one light cruiser were torpedoed but reached port badly damaged. Other enemy craft destroyed were fourteen transports, six ammunition and supply ships, two storeships, fifty-three merchant ships and 197 sailing ships. In no case were merchant ships sunk at sight and care was taken to see that the crews of all vessels got safely away.

In addition to carrying out these attacks on enemy war craft, submarines played an important part in convoy work. In the third year of the war one of the British submarines commanders carried out 24 cruises, totalling 22,000 miles, which probably constituted a record for any submarine. In the first and second years of the war seven British submarine commanders carried out a total of 120 cruises extending for 450 days, all of which were actually spent in the enemy theatre.

PREMIER LLOYD GEORGE APPEALS TO BONAR LAW TO CONTINUE COALITION

SHOULD BE FRESH PARLIAMENT AUTHORIZED TO DEAL WITH RECONSTRUCTION PROBLEMS DURING DIFFICULT TRANSITIONAL PERIOD AND TO NEGOTIATE PEACE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, November 18.—Premier Lloyd George has sent a letter to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Bonar Law, leader of the Unionist party, outlining his policy regarding the general election and the principal problems of today.

The Premier says he is convinced that there should be a general election, his principal reason being that it is essential there should be a fresh parliament, possessed of authority to deal with the difficult transitional period which will follow the cessation of hostilities.

Lloyd George considers it should be a coalition election, the constituencies being invited to return candidates who will undertake to support the present government, not only to prosecute the war to the final end and to negotiate peace, but to deal with the problems of reconstruction.

The Premier says he is desirous to see this carried through on personal grounds, for during the last two years he has received the whole hearted support of the Unionist party and the Government has had unity both in aims and action, which has been remarkable in a coalition Government.

THE FISHERMEN GET TOGETHER

Will Take Combined Action to Obtain the Improvements Necessary for Their Industry.

SALMON AND HALIBUT FISHERS TO CONFER

It was decided at the meeting of the Salmon Fishermen held yesterday to get in touch with the halibut fishermen and together formulate plans regarding their requirements in the matter of waterfront accommodation. A committee was appointed and on Tuesday night the conference will take place. The requirements of the fishermen as a result of this meeting will be placed before the City Council and the Provincial Government, and every other body that has any interest whatever in the matter of waterfront, and the development of the fishing industry.

In a fishing town when the fishermen speak with one voice that voice may be said to speak with authority. Both the salmon and halibut fishermen know what they want, what they need and what their industry requires for its development. To a large extent the development of Prince Rupert depends upon their industry, and it must receive every encouragement. And the fishermen themselves are possibly in the best position to know what is required really, for the expansion of their trade. Action by them ought to receive the consideration of the whole community.

TRAIN DELAYED

Mud Slide at Tete Jaune Blocked Line Temporarily and Killed Three Workmen

At a point where the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is improving the line at Tete Jaune the contractors were using several steam shovels when a slide came down, caught one of the shovels and killed three men who were working on it and injuring two others. The west-bound train was blocked and as a result did not arrive last night.

In order to convenience the local traffic a special was put on at Smithers which arrived, bringing in the local mails and passengers.

The delayed train is expected to arrive soon after midnight, 1:30 being the time scheduled.

MAJOR DICK BURDE ALBERNI CANDIDATE

It is understood that Major R. J. Burde, M. C., has reached a decision to become a candidate in the forthcoming by-election to fill the vacancy in the Alberni constituency occasioned by the untimely death of Richard P. Wallis.

The Major has announced his intention to take the field as a returned soldier, as quite independent of all political parties. In reply to a query regarding the significance of a report to the effect that he would probably receive the support of the Conservatives on account of a previous identification with their district organization, Major Burde declared that he knew nothing of the source of the inspiration of the report.

Very naturally, added the Major, he would be pleased to receive the support of both Liberals and Conservatives, but he would neither seek nor accept any such support except on the distinct understanding that it would in no way commit him to party obligations.

The real thing came from Ottawa on Saturday morning when the wire brought the joyful message that the offer of the Dominion Government to the Mullen Construction Co. to build two steel vessels for them had been accepted.

It is just possible that the Government is beginning to realize that the new general manager of the railway is what is slangily known as a "live wire" and that it is just as well to give him some encouragement.

The Delegation Deserves Thanks.

Whether we get ships built here or not the delegates who hurried to Ottawa, quietly and without ostentation but with great promptness, deserve and should publicly receive the thanks of the whole community for their effective work.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, perhaps more than any other, is to be congratulated on his efforts. True he is the representative of the city, but he is also the Minister of Lands which makes him the representative of the whole province.

Mr. Manson also was up to the eyes in work. His calls to remain at home seemed almost imperative, but above everything Mr. Manson is public spirited. He sees visions and dreams dreams.

Mr. Pillsbury also made up his mind quickly and his expert knowledge and perfect understanding of the whole case helped to make things easy.

President Wallace of the Board of Trade found it absolutely impossible to leave, but was keen on sending the right men and in getting them away on time.

And then the aldermen of the city endorsed the action of the others without a murmur and did themselves credit and will be glad of it from now on.

What Does It Mean To Build Ships?

OPEN LETTER

The Mayor and City Council.

Dear Sirs:—Permit me, as one having a vital interest in the improvement of Cow Bay and one who is fairly familiar with the attitude of the fishermen, to express my views, which are based entirely on the question of providing accommodation for the fishing fleet of Prince Rupert.

The fishermen and some of the local men have invested money in fishing boats rather than in real estate, thus showing a marked contrast to the ones who were in evidence at the last tax sale, namely, the class of citizens who have put their money into non-productive channels, awaiting someone who is willing to take a chance in the natural resources of the northern country to create a market for their real estate.

The fishermen of Prince Rupert have never received the encouragement they were entitled to from any city council. Last year the city council were asked to send a delegation to Ottawa to combat the influences of the canneries men and endeavor to throw the fishing open to the people of Northern British Columbia. This would probably have cost about one thousand dollars, yet your body were not public spirited enough to furnish the funds for this delegation. The principal reason seemed to be that you were afraid someone might get a trip at the expense of the city. No doubt if this delegation had included the entire city council it would have gone.

Now that the Government is coming through with a concrete proposition for the improvement of Cow Bay, for the accommodation of the fishing fleet, (plans for this can be seen at the office of the Public Works Engineer, Mr. Carruthers,) the completion of which depends upon the obtaining from the Grand Trunk some four hundred feet of water frontage, you endeavor to block it. You have not been open enough to come forward and lay an open objection before the Railway Commission but have adopted the back door method of suggesting that the Commission notify you when this comes up for hearing. You then have the audacity to say, "Why don't the Government go ahead?" Do you consider that it would be a good business proposition for the provincial Government to go ahead and expend this money on property that will not be theirs should the Railway Commission decide that Cow Bay cannot be closed? The feasibility of the inside Cow Bay for commercial purposes is not to be considered. The Georgetown Sawmill Company went to considerable expense in making arrangements for handling lumber at that point. In view of the fact that they have abandoned their improvements and put in a wharf on the outside goes to show that it was entirely impractical. It is quite true that small scows containing gravel might be handled at Cow Bay. This in itself is not sufficient reason for keeping it open.

Now if the City Council are prepared to come forward with a concrete scheme for improving a certain portion of the water frontage at Cow Bay such as building a wharf and installing a cold storage plant. I have every reason to believe that the Provincial Government will give them whatever water frontage they require for that purpose. They, however, I understand, take the position that when they have a scheme for improving this water frontage for the benefit of the fishermen, they do not propose to give a portion of it to the city who have not come forward with any concrete proposition for the improvement of same. They cannot see who they should abandon work so badly needed, for the sake of giving you a piece of property to lie idle.

The fishermen feel that the time has arrived when something of a substantial nature has got to be done to cater to their business, as it is today, there is not a place where a man can leave a boat with any degree of safety. I know of three fishermen who moved their families here and moved them back a few months ago to Seattle because there was no place to moor their boats in the winter. Several Vancouver boats also have quit making this their headquar-

CANADIAN MINISTERS ARE NOW IN BRITAIN

Will Take Part in Discussing the Peace Terms of the Allies For Germany.

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—Premier Sir Robert Borden, the Hon. A. L. Sifton, Sir George Foster, Frank P. Jones, Dr. Robertson and Col. Biggar left Ottawa on November 8, and sailed for Great Britain from New York on the following day. The Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, left yesterday.

The Canadian ministers will take part in the peace negotiations and the majority of the party will be absent probably for some months.

PUBLIC MONUMENT TO EDITH CAVELL

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—It is proposed to erect in Ottawa by public and private subscription a monument to Edith Cavell, martyred in Belgium at the hands of the Huns. Under the patronage of the Governor-General, a model of the structure has already been completed by Hamilton McCarthy, R. A. C., Ottawa, sculptor.

The policy you are pursuing is purely one of "the dog in the manger." You will do nothing for the fishermen yourself, nor permit others.

Regarding the regulations governing the salmon fishing. I understand that the Minister of Marine is about to make regulations for the coming year. It would, therefore, seem that your body should make some effort to lay before the Honorable Mr. Ballantyne the changes that are so urgently needed.

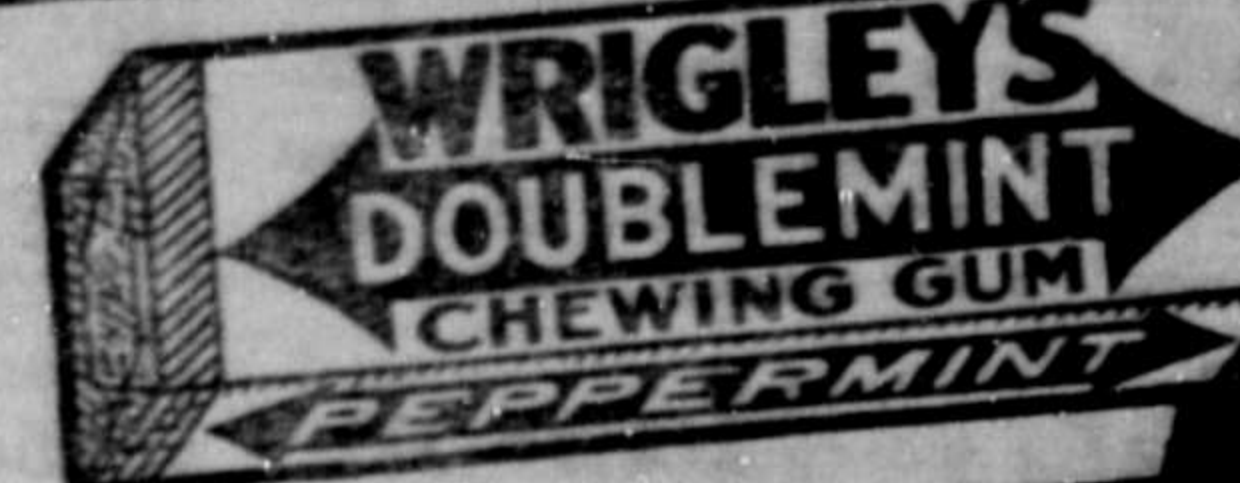

WAS WAR FOR DEFENCE OF BRITAIN OR BELGIUM?

Legal Point Raised by Order of Foresters in Disputing the Paying Insurance of Soldiers Killed.

Kingston, Nov. 16.—The Canadian Order of Foresters is contesting a claim for \$1,000 insurance on the life of a soldier killed in action, on the grounds that the deceased was not killed in defence of the British Empire, but in the defence of Belgium. It is claimed that as the rules of the Order say payment may not be made to beneficiaries of any man belonging to the Order who is killed while engaged in the defence of any country other than the British Empire, the Canadian Order of Foresters is not liable.

UNEMPLOYMENT IS BEING DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—The Governmental policy for handling unemployment will be brought before a series of conferences to be held here this week, concurrently with the gathering of Dominion and Provincial Ministers.

Unemployment conferences will be attended by officers of various employment exchanges in each province and by officers of two Federal employment exchanges now in process of formation. The labor sub-committee of the cabinet will be in touch with the proceedings throughout.

Among the subjects for determination are:

1. Creation of advisory committees, representative of employers and employed, in all provincial centres.
2. Preparation, as far as possible, of full lists of various Dominion, provincial and municipal public works proposed for the coming year.
3. The adoption of a common basis of trade classification.

300,000 A MONTH IN AMERICAN VESSELS

New York, Nov. 18.—Herbert Hoover, food administrator, and Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the U. S. Shipping Board, sailed for Europe Saturday on the White Star liner Olympic. Hoover is going abroad to take charge of the huge task of feeding the hundreds of millions in the war devastated countries.

Hurley's mission is to arrange for the homeward voyages of America's troops overseas. Hurley declared he believed the men can be transported home at the rate of 300,000 a month in American vessels.

GOVERNMENT WILL PREPARE CLAIM LIST

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—The Government has directed the preparation of a list of claims by Canadians arising out of illegal methods of warfare by the enemy during the war. These claims arise through torpedoing of ships without warning, aerial bombing of undefended places, and commandeering or requisitioning without compensation, destruction and similar illegal acts not mentioned, claims relate to loss of life as well as property.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year of failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase price has been advanced by the Crown are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to townsites and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

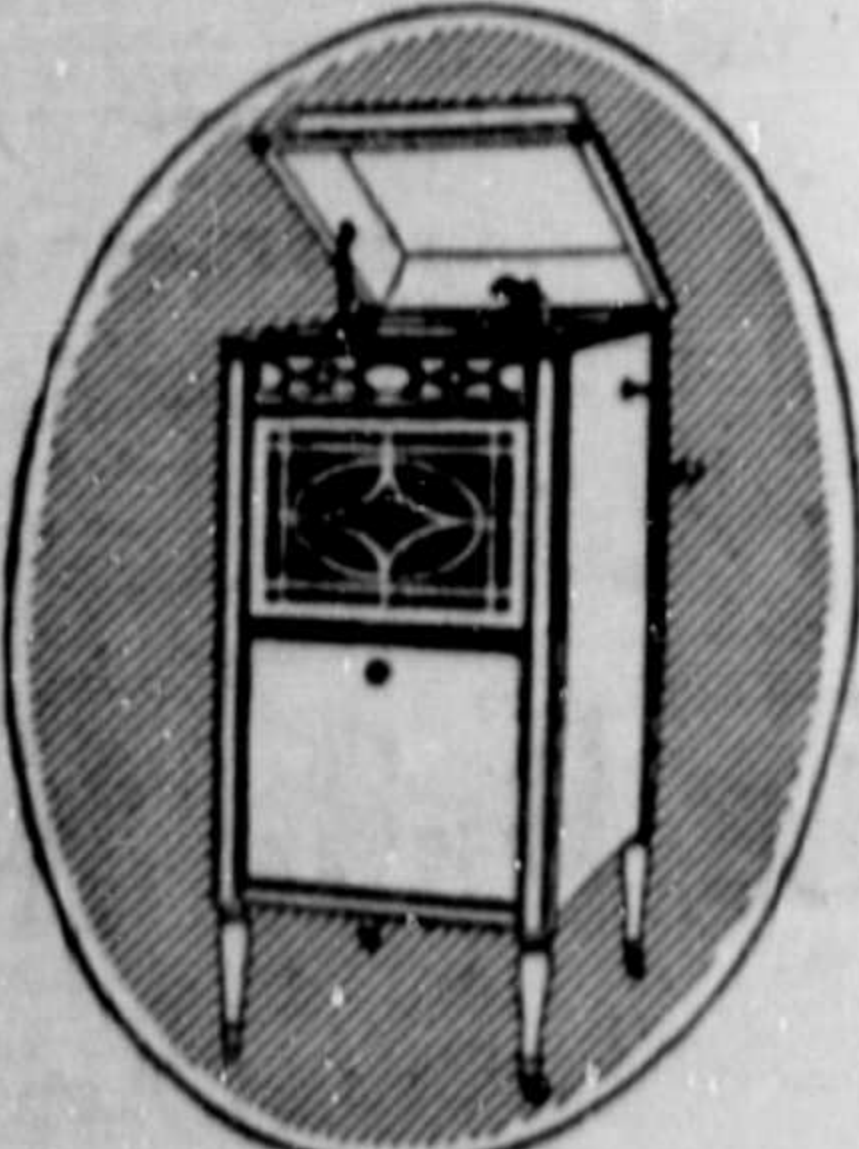

BOER GENERAL TAKES PART IN WORLD POLITICS

Smuts Entertains the American Editors for British Government, and Suggests New United States Policy.

EUROPE MUST BE SAVED FOR WELFARE OF WORLD

London, Nov. 18.—A party of United States editors were entertained on behalf of the British Government at the week end by Lieut.-General Smuts. After the banquet the famous South African addressing the guests said: "The greatest and most fruitful fact of the great war has been the coming together of Europe and America. Old Europe is dead and a new world is slowly emerging. In the upbuilding of this new world the co-operation of America is essential. It is for the good of both America and Europe that the former will henceforth take an active place in the councils of the old world and take up her burden in world politics.

"When the great American Republic joined up in the struggle it was not only with material but with all that moral reinforcement which came from the splendid vision and moral enthusiasm of President Wilson. Speaking on behalf of the people of the United States, his was the great vision of the League of Nations and our main concern now must be the saving of Europe for the welfare of the world.

"The position is tragic in the extreme. The whole world order is passing away. There is danger of things going too far and giving Europe a setback from which she will not recover for generations. The evils bred by hunger threaten not merely the old institutions but civilization itself. We saved the soul of civilization; now let us care for its sick body. Not only the liberated territories of our allies; not only our small neutral neighbors, but enemy countries themselves will require our helping hand. Let us extend it in all generosity and magnanimity."

SHIPBUILDING NEWS ALMOST UNBELIEVABLE

People Dubious After Previous Disappointment—Short History of Negotiations Leading to Final Success.

G. T. P. ACTIVITY UNDER LATEST MANAGEMENT

The definite information that ships are to be built in Prince Rupert as conveyed through the medium of the Daily News Saturday was received much in the same way as the final peace report. There had been previous disappointments and naturally the people were a little inclined to be dubious.

The Prince Rupert floating drydock and shipbuilding plant was a part of a comprehensive scheme of the late Charles M. Hays, who, together with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, was largely responsible for the All Red Line known as the National Transcontinental and G. T. P.

Planned Big Things.
Insofar as Prince Rupert is concerned the late Mr. Hays had planned many big things, including a magnificent hotel, splendid rail and ocean terminals, grain elevators and connecting transportation lines. His tragic death with the sinking of the Titanic and the exit of Sir Wilfrid Laurier from power on the issue of reciprocity, changed everything. It looked for a time almost as if Prince Rupert would be only a shadow of what was planned. Of all the plans laid out so carefully that for the drydock and shipbuilding plant was the only one with which progress was made and it was about completed on the outbreak of war.

Finest of Kind.
The floating dock was, and possibly is yet, the largest of its kind on the Pacific coast, and the shipbuilding plant one of the best equipped.

When the call for ships came the citizens of Prince Rupert believed that the local plant would be among the first put to use, but they were doomed to disappointment, and four years of idleness passed before the plant became known as Canada's greatest slacker.

When that word came Mayor McLymont and President Wallace of the Board of Trade both realizing that immediate action was necessary, called together a few representative citizens on the same evening that the telegram was received and this group decided that a delegation must go to Ottawa, and the City Council backed the mayor up in his stand. Hon. T. D. Pattullo was wired to the effect that the citizens expected him to go, and at great inconvenience to himself and the upsetting of other plans, took the train immediately to the east. Alex. Manson, M. P. P., and J. H. Pillsbury were the local representatives. They went at considerable personal sacrifice and at a time when it was not easy to leave home in the face of an epidemic such as had never before been known here.

Prospects Very Bright.
The result of the representations at Ottawa are well known. Although keels are not yet laid, it seems much more certain than at any time heretofore that the plant will at last be put in operation for the benefit of Canada and this young port.

As recorded last week the wood-working plant has been leased to F. L. Buckley, who in a statement made to The News just before leaving for Vancouver said that he intended to use it for a cutting up plant for a box factory, and for a cooperage and general wood-working establishment. He will, it is understood, provide the finishings for the steel ships which are to be built by the Mullen Construction Company.

Official Action.
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Final Clean Up is Being Made of "Flu"
At the General Hospital within the last two days a large number of influenza patients have been discharged and others will follow each day until by the end of the week it is expected that the last will be seen of the plague which has caused such devastation here.
