## Big Sum Has Been Subscribed

### EXCESS SUBSCRIPTION IS ANNOUNCED AS THIRTY-FIVE PER CENT.

#### VICTORY LOAN SURPASSES HIGHEST EXPECTATIONS; TOTAL NOW \$676,027,217

PROVINCE SURPASSES ITS OBJECTIVE AND BRITISH COLUMBIA STANDS VERY HIGH IN AMOUNT SUBSCRIBED CONSIDERING THE POPULATION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, November 19.—None of the most sanguine estimates of the success of the 1918 Victory Loan came anywhere near the realization, as expressed in an official despatch of an announcement at a great meeting in Massey Hall here last night.

In three weeks' drive Canada subscribed the great sum of \$676,027,217 which means that the loan is over subscribed by more than 35 per cent. The Dominion total for the whole campaign last year was \$420,000,000.

Every province in the Dominion went over its objective, most of them by substantial margins. The totals are: British Columbia, \$3,306,667; Alberta, \$18,189,600; Saskatchewan, \$23,889,000; Manitoba, \$43,639,900; Montreal (city and island), \$143,433,050; Quebec (outside Montreal), \$32,000,000; New Brunswick, \$16,000,000; Nova Scotia, \$30,000,000; Prince Edward Island, \$2,000,000; and Ontario, \$329,679,000.

#### TELEPHONE RATES ARE INCREASED BY REDUCING DISCOUNT

By a slight adjustment of the amount it is going to be possible to make the telephone pay running expenses another year. That adjustment was made last night at the meeting of the City Council when a bylaw was passed through its stages reducing the discount from one dollar a month to five and a half per cent. or seven per cent. if paid six months in advance.

Alderman Kirkpatrick put up a fight for cheaper residence phones and higher business rates, where he contended that most of the saving was done. She particularly asked for a cheaper rate for those whose husbands were away with the military forces.

The mayor pointed out that many of the residence phones were used just as much as the business phones. Last year there was a profit of only \$52 on the telephone service and advances in the rate had absorbed that and they were going behind, a condition that could not be allowed. It was impossible to increase wages and at the same time increase the cost of the telephone service. By making this change they hoped to break even.

In addition to the reduction of the discount rate the deposit of three dollars on the installation of a new service becomes a fixed charge.

#### SCHOLARS GET A WEEK MORE

School Board Closes Down Schools For Another Week, Till Last Germ of Influenza Is Killed.

SCHOOL BOYS ENJOYING ENFORCED HOLIDAY

At the meeting of the School Board held last evening, it was decided, in view of the widespread feeling of insecurity among the parents of the children, that the schools will be closed for another week, until the epidemic of influenza has entirely disappeared. While influenza may be said to have gone, even at this date, still there are many patients not yet fully recovered, and it was considered that it would be well not to take any chances whatever. The King Edward School, therefore, did not open today, and neither did Borden Street School, and the youngsters are having a week of fine hard weather for sleighing.

Dr. McNeill was in attendance at the meeting last evening, and recommended, in order to satisfy public opinion to the fullest, that the Borden Street School be Kalsomined again from top to bottom, even although it was done but recently. The school building has already been fumigated, and this course, he considered, ought to be followed with regard to the school books as well. Desks and all the other appurtenances of the school will be cleansed with carbolic, under medical supervision, so that there will not be the slightest chance of any germs surviving within the walls of the late emergency hospital.

The Board of trustees concurred in this view, and the work will be pushed forward with all speed, so as to enable the scholars to take their accustomed places next week.

Mrs. W. C. Orchard, Miss Orchard and Fred Orchard all arrived early this morning from Edmonton where they have been down with influenza.

#### COMMENDATION FOR ALL GOOD WORKERS

Vote of Thanks Passed by Council To All Who Helped During Influenza Troubles.

At the Council meeting last night a vote of thanks was passed to all who in any way helped to look after the sick or, in any way to relieve the suffering during the recent influenza scourge.

Alderman McTae said that while much had been made of the work of those at the Borden St. Hospital, nothing had been said of those who gave their services freely at the General Hospital.

The mayor mentioned the good work done in the early stages by Mrs. Vickers and Miss Davies.

Mr. Peters said the clergy had mentioned with commendation the services rendered by Henry Smith, the caretaker at the cemetery.

Alderman Kirkpatrick spoke of the splendid work done by women in their private capacity in looking after neighbors. She thought the women of Prince Rupert had shown up in a grand manner.

#### TOMO MUNIZABE WAS WELL KNOWN AT MILL

Funeral Took Place This Afternoon, Rev. Canon Rix Officiating—Wife and Two Children Left.

The death occurred at the family residence, Eighth Ave., on Saturday of Tomo Munizabe, craneman at the Prince Rupert mill, one of the best known and most popular of the employees of the company. He leaves a wife and two children.

The funeral took place this afternoon from the Haynor chapel with Rev. Canon Rix officiating. There was a large attendance and a good many floral emblems were sent by friends.

#### CANNERS TAKE ISSUE WITH CANADA FOOD BOARD OVER DISPOSITION OF THE PACK

ONLY FOUR PER CENT USED SO FAR; REMAINDER VALUED AT \$8,000,000 IS STILL ON THE COAST WAITING SHIPMENT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, November 19.—The salmon canners of British Columbia are making strenuous efforts to have a fully authorized representative of the Food Board sent here to investigate a state of affairs alleged to exist on account of the requisitioning of the salmon pack, which, it is contended, is not only deplorable with regard to the present pack, but inimical to the prospects of the industry in future.

It is declared that in spite of the claims that the salmon of British Columbia is needed for the civilian population of the old country, and was commandeered, only four per cent of the commandeered salmon has been shipped, while the remainder, valued at nearly \$8,000,000 is still here.

It is pointed out that is not so much a matter of price, but the manner in which the business is being delayed, at which canners complain.

#### MARSHAL FOCH TO HEAD ENTRY TO STRASSBURG

Allied Troops Steadily Moving Into Evacuated Territory as Germans Withdraw; Turks Loot Before Leaving Baku.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Nov. 19.—The Allied forces are moving gradually into the territory which is being gradually evacuated by the German troops under the terms of the armistice.

Field Marshal Haig reports:—"The second and fourth armies continue their march today. Our advanced troops reached the general line of Florrens, Clarlenoy, Senefle and Hal.

It is officially announced that the French troops led by General Poin will enter Metz today. Subsequently Generals Cateleau and Magin will follow with their armies.

The entry into Strassburg, which will be headed by Marshal Foch, will take place Sunday or Monday.

The Russian seaport of Baku on the west coast of the Caspian Sea was recaptured by British and Russian forces on Sunday, it is officially announced. The Turks before evacuating the port looted it. This has already been brought to the attention of the Turkish Government as a violation of the armistice and reparation will have to be made.

#### DUTCH GOVERNMENT SURVIVES THE STORM

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Nov. 19.—The Dutch Government seems to have survived the storm. The revolutionary party took advantage of the presence of the Kaiser in that country to try to cause a movement against the Government of Queen Wilhelmina. This morning W. H. DeBeaufort, Charge d'Affaires at the Dutch Legation here, received the following cable message from The Hague:

"The means taken by the Netherlands Government to preserve order have been entirely successful, and the people of the country have proven their loyalty and patriotism in the present situation."

#### S. S. PRINCESS MARY ON HER INITIAL TRIP

Captain Slater Speaks Appreciatively of His Reception at Juneau at Trying Time.

The C. P. R. Princess Mary arrived in port yesterday, bringing a very small list of passengers and not much cargo. Those disembarking here were A. Smith, R. Barnes, Mrs. R. Brown, S. N. May, and Mr. Stevenson.

Captain Slater who was in command had command of the Alice on her recent trip as a death ship from Juneau to Victoria with the bodies of those picked up from the wrecked Sophia.

Speaking of the trip, Captain Slater said it had been an exceedingly trying one, but he found the customs and other officers at Juneau most helpful, everyone doing all they could under the circumstances. He also said that it was generally understood there that everything possible had been done. He received none but the most cordial treatment from everyone.

#### WOULD MAKE PRINCE RUPERT MINING CENTRE

D. B. Morkill Proposes Opening Office Here in the Spring; Hazelton View Mine.

That Prince Rupert should be a most important mining centre is the view of D. B. Morkill, mining engineer and surveyor, who is in the city for a few days before proceeding to Vancouver for the winter. So impressed has Mr. Morkill become with the desirability of this city from the mining point of view that he is talking of opening an office here next spring and making it his base of operations for the north country. He says that not only is the great interior tributary to this city from a mining point of view but the Stewart revival will be operated largely from here. The Observatory Inlet Mines and the various island operations all can be served from this one centre.

There has to be a converging point in all mining districts where the mining men can get the latest mining news and where prospectors and miners will compare notes and swap yarns. Such a place should be the city of Prince Rupert. It has the location, and its growing commercial importance makes it desirable as a centre.

Mr. Morkill has been in charge of the development work on the Hazelton View mine, but has turned the work over to "Duke" Harris, who is also well known in the district. Work will be continued throughout the winter, supplies having been ordered until June next. By that time the work will have shown what the next step will be.

There are two ore bodies on the property, one a gold-cobalt and the other molybdenite. A car load of the molybdenite was shipped during the summer but no returns from it have been received yet. There is also at the mine ready for shipment a carload of the gold-cobalt ore. These high-grade ores are being shipped more or less as tests.

Two tunnels are to be driven during the winter and on the result of this work will depend the future plans of the owners.

#### QUEBEC CITY FLOODED BY A GREAT TIDE

Easterly Gale Sweeps Waters Through the Lower City; Contents of Business Houses Ruined.

DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT MILLION DOLLARS

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Quebec City, Nov. 19.—Damage which may reach to a total of over a million dollars were caused here within the space of an hour last evening, when a huge flood tide, swept in by an easterly gale, blowing at the rate of over seventy miles an hour, flooded the streets of the lower town, as well as the basements of the wholesale flour, grain, provision and other merchants' stores.

Great damage was also caused along the river front at other points, as well as in the streets of the city. The inundation of the river in the lower town was greater than has been experienced in many years. The waters continued to rise long after the high water mark was reached, and the waterfront streets were quickly submerged, with every basement filled with water. For a whole hour, the waters continued to rise higher and higher, as the river was dammed back by the force of the gale.

So far no loss of life has been reported.

#### FORMER VANCOUVER PASTOR FOR OTTAWA

Toronto, Nov. 19.—Rev. J. W. Woodside, pastor of Chalmers Presbyterian Church, Toronto, has received and accepted a call to Chalmers Church, Ottawa. Mr. Woodside came to Toronto from Vancouver four years ago. He will receive a salary of \$4,500 a year, with six weeks' vacation.

#### TELEGRAPH OPERATORS WIN IN WAGE FIGHT

Montreal, Nov. 19.—The operators for the Great North West Telegraph Co. have won out in their struggle with the Railway War Board. They have been placed on the same basis as the C. P. R. operators by the Wage Board. The increases in salary they will receive will date back to September 1.

#### Must Keep Faith In Our Own City.

Sometimes we are a little inclined to deprecate and apologize for Prince Rupert. The city needs no apology. To hear of its prospects it is often necessary to go outside. A visitor who has been here for a few days said he was surprised at the pessimistic spirit he found here in certain quarters. People outside have faith that this will some day be a great city. There are knockers of course occasionally on the outside, but the knockers should be heard no longer within. There is no room for them. The same energy expended in knocking might start something if used otherwise. Let us keep faith in the city and work for it, and in that way help ourselves.

#### Union Government Likely to Break Up.

Some Prince Rupert people think they see in the granting of the ship contracts to Prince Rupert the coming of the Dominion elections. In England they propose bringing on the elections at once, but in Canada there probably will be no hurry. When there is an election the present Union Government will never ask to be returned to power. It will break apart and the members will probably find themselves opposed to each other on matters of policy. There is no strong man among them as in England. There is no one that has distinguished himself as a statesman, that has saved the nation or that the nation will look to as the man of the hour to carry the country over the reconstruction period.

There are able men in the cabinet. There are men who might grace any cabinet, but the one man, the leader, is not there, or, if he is there, he has not yet let his light shine so that the world may see it.

#### Will the British Support Lloyd George?

Like the real democrat that he is the little Welshman, Lloyd George, is determined to have a general election in Great Britain at the earliest possible moment. The war is over and now the work is peace, and it looks as if peace would be almost as difficult as war.

There is still but one man to whom the Empire looks for a lead, and that man is David Lloyd George. While all the world has been thinking of war, and he has had more to do with it than any, so much that the strain has almost broken him down on several occasions, he has also been thinking of peace and preparing for it. No sooner is the ink dry on the armistice agreement than this wonderful man is ready to state the general lines on which he is ready to deal with the matter of reconstruction. He has taken the initiative in asking his former opponents who have stood by him in war, to now stand by him still and carry on for the good of the nation. Possibly these men have come to realize his greatness by now and will stay with him. Even if they do not stay with him it would seem as if yet the British people would not desert the little democrat, the only man who could set a howling mob to making munitions or riotous miners to digging coal. It is not a matter of gratitude, but a matter of trust.

#### Eliminate Boundary Line.

Now that Canada and the United States are such good friends what a splendid idea it might be to cement that friendship by establishing something like a customs union between the two countries, eliminating the boundary line in so far as customs dues are concerned.

How much inconvenience such a movement would relieve, how many useless officials would be spared and how much more equitable would become our living rates on either side. We would still be Canadians and they would still be Americans, but American capital would flow in this direction like water and our industries would be developed at a rapid rate. The great markets to the south would be open to us and the little population of eight millions would soon become eighteen.

The customs barrier is a fearsome thing. It is an excuse for an official molesting your person, overhauling your bedgown, turning inside out your trunks, causing you to lie and turn sneak and possibly halting you to jail. That it is perfectly right to pilfer duty from a customs officer is practically admitted by the state when it refuses to punish for such an offense.

Customs duties are an invention of the evil one to enrich those who are already wealthy, to pester the weary traveller, to make it harder for the poor to live, and to give enjoyment to the few who indulge in the pleasures of smuggling.

## LOGGERS WILL HAVE TO BE LESS DAINTY

Pruning down the luxuries that loggers indulge in is the majority of the logging camps in British Columbia is the task which the Federal Food Control Board has set itself to accomplish, says the B. C. Lumberman. In this matter it has sought the assistance of the members of the B. C. Loggers Association which was to have met to discuss the question towards the end of October, but due to the embargo imposed by the Provincial Government consequent on the "flu" scare, there was no meeting. It is probable, however, that a meeting will be held in the near future to deal with the subject and it is also probable that the scale which the Food Controller has laid down will be adopted.

The sceptics who disbelieve all that The Lumberman has stated regarding the food that the loggers are getting should read the following which will give them a pretty good idea of the daily menu. Here is what the writer says:

"I spoke of our eats. Well, we get \$5 per day and pay \$1.05 for board, and we couldn't get such board anywhere else for \$3 per day. Our dinner menu, and all the meals every day are equally as good, mashed spuds and gravy, roast beef, sliced tomatoes, sliced cucumbers (all the sauces, mustard, catsup, etc.), corn on the cob, fruit salad, cake, chocolate pie, pudding, celery, tarts, besides coffee and bread and butter, then grapes, bananas, peaches and apples."

A new bill of fare has been drawn up and it is said will be enforced.

### SYNOPSIS OF

#### LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-forest land.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-forest land. Farmers' pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and industrial purposes.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 240 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

#### TOWNSHIP ACT ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

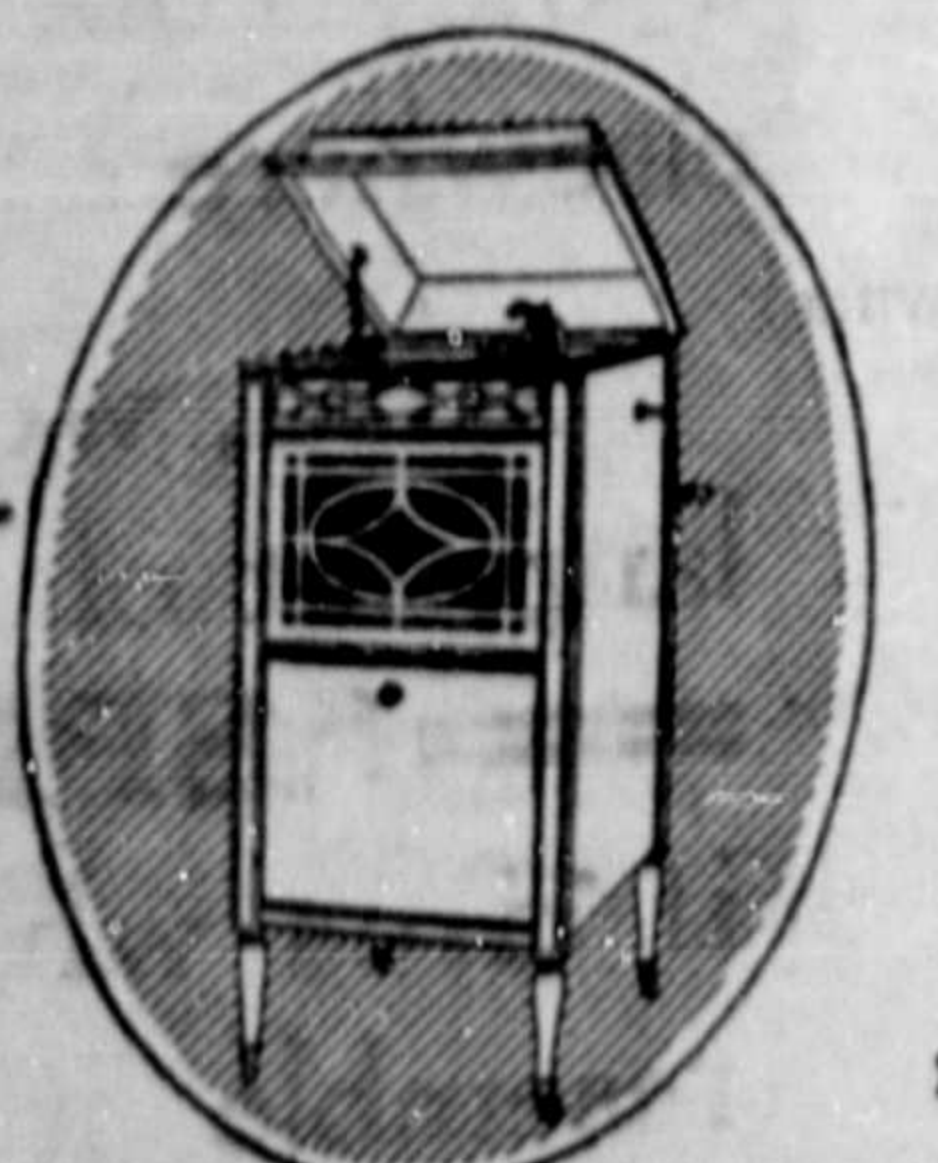
