## Are Huns Using Bolsheviki TRYING TO DESTROY ALLIES' UNITY AND CAUSE TROUBLE AT HOME

### GERMAN ACTIVITIES HAVE NOT YET CEASED SAYS SIR GEORGE CAVE IN LONDON

**WORKING IN HOUSE OF LORDS HE SAYS CLOSE ALLIANCE EXISTS BETWEEN GERMANY AND BOLSHEVIKI; PROPAGANDA MATERIAL IS BEING SENT OUT**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, November 20.—Sir George Cave who recently resigned from the position of Secretary of State for the Home Department in Lloyd George's Cabinet and was elevated to the peerage, in speaking in the House of Lords last night said that although there was a pause in hostilities the enemy's activities had not ceased.  
"Germany has already begun to try to destroy the unity of the Allies and our unity at home," he said. "I believe there is a close alliance between the Bolsheviki and Germany. I have had evidence of this during the last week." Regarding the press bureau Sir George said he saw no reason why it should be abolished. He said he saw only the other day press cables from Russia which were "Obviously false and intended for propaganda purposes."  
"We ought not to relinquish weapons provided by the Defence of the Realm Act for dealing with the Bolsheviki," he said. "A bill continuing the Aliens Act of 1914 should be introduced in the next Parliament enabling the Government to impose restrictions upon the landing of enemy aliens," he concluded.

### COMMUNISTIC PLOT UPSET

**Plans to Seize Public Buildings in Vienna and Proclaim Bolsheviki Government.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Copenhagen, Nov. 20.—A great communistic plot has been uncovered in Vienna, according to reports received here today. Plans had been laid to seize all public buildings and to proclaim a Bolsheviki Government. The authorities, however, got wind of the proposed uprising, and made several hundred arrests.

### LATE BERT PEARCE BURIED TODAY WITH MILITARY HONORS

There was a big turnout this afternoon to the funeral of the late Bert Pearce, a returned soldier. The service started from the B. C. Undertakers' chapel at 2 and headed by the Metropolitan band marched up Third Avenue and to Fairview Cemetery, where the returned soldiers accompanied.

### SIR WILFRID TO CALL NATIONAL CONVENTION FOR PEACE PROBLEMS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Nov. 20.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the veteran chief of the Liberal party in Canada, while speaking at a banquet given here to celebrate his seventy-seventh birthday, announced his intention of calling a National Convention of Liberals in order to discuss the problems placed before Canada and the Empire with the coming of peace.

### MINING NOTES FROM HAZELTON DISTRICT

That an eastern concern has taken options on practically the whole of Nine Mile mountain and that if the present plans work out successfully there will be very considerable activity in that neighborhood in the spring is the most recent word from Hazelton. There has been a good deal of stripping and other work done during the summer and autumn and those in a position to know say they think the options will be taken up and in all probability work will be going ahead soon.

It is pointed out that in order to overcome the handicaps of transportation the only method is to co-operate or to unite. In either case the cost of working is lessened very considerably. Co-operative work in mining has not been a success. There is too much possibility of overreaching each other that owners are always more or less suspicious. If the new owners take working leases or purchase the properties included in the group on Nine Mile they should be able to make the production profitable.

### NO MORE INDIVIDUAL PRISONERS' PARCELS

**Needs Being Attended to By the Canadian Red Cross, or Similar Society.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Nov. 20.—A telegraphic advice has been received by the Canadian High Commissioner in London to the effect that on account of the repatriation of allied prisoners of war all individual parcels for the use and comfort of prisoners of war have been stopped. The needs of the prisoners are being attended to by the Canadian Red Cross Society or a similar society.

### NAVAL INVESTIGATION INTO GALIANO LOSS

While on the way north the Malaspina passed the whaling tender Gray, which will be here about Sunday, said Saturday's Daily Colonist. Capt. Billington, of the Gray, as he passed the naval craft noticed the skylight, and states that the one picked up off Cape St. James is identical with that on the fore-castle of the Malaspina, showing that it was evidently that of the Galiano. It was first believed that the skylight was off the engine room, then officials later claimed that it could not be off the Galiano at all, as the iron bands holding it down to the deck would have caused it to break to pieces instead of floating off in one piece. The naval investigation into the loss of the Galiano will proceed as soon as the Gray reaches Victoria.

Eli Pavich, a Montenegrin, was this morning charged at the police court before Magistrate Carrs under the Idlers' Act. His case was adjourned for five days to enable him to secure some occupation.

### VICTORIA CROSS WON BY LIEUT.-COL. PECK WHO DID BRILLIANT WORK AT FRONT

**MEMBER FOR THIS DISTRICT WILL LIKELY TAKE HIS SEAT IN HOUSE OF COMMONS AT COMING SESSION; WAS SLIGHTLY GASSES RECENTLY AND IN CASUALTY CLEARING STATION**

Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck has been awarded the Victoria Cross, the highest honor in the gift of the nation. That is the word that was received yesterday. The award had been gazetted, but unfortunately in sending out the report the name was wrongly spelled and the wrong place of residence was given, hence a delay in publishing here.  
Colonel Peck left here right after the outbreak of war and has been in the fighting or as near it as he could get practically all the time since. He was acting captain when he left here, but his ability was soon recognized and he became a major; when in England.

Once the Colonel was wounded, in February, 1915, at Festubert, and only recently there was a report to the effect that he had been again wounded but it was later found that he had been slightly gassed and was still at his post. It seems probable that since that he was in action.  
A recent letter received by J. McCutcheon from Lieut. Wilfrid Macdonald says that he recently heard from Colonel Peck, who had been in the casualty clearing station slightly gassed, but he added that he thought he was back with the old battalion. ### FIRST BATCH OF SUBMARINES REACH ENGLAND

**They Will Proceed to Harwich in Charge of Own Crews Who Will Return to Germany.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, Nov. 20.—Twenty German submarines surrendered to Rear Admiral Reginald W. Tyrwhitt, thirty miles off Harwich this morning at sunrise, according to the Press Association despatch. These are the first U-Boats to be turned over to the Allies by Germany. Admiral Tyrwhitt received the surrender of the German craft on board the Flagship British cruiser. The surrendered submarines will proceed to Harwich in charge of their own crews. The U-Boats will then be boarded by British crews and interpreters and proceed to Parkstone quay nearby. The Germans will leave the submarines there and embark on transports for their return to Germany.  
Twenty additional submarines will be surrendered on Thursday, and twenty more on Friday. The remainder of the U-Boats to be handed over in accordance with the armistice terms will be given up later.

### FREEDOM IS AGAIN COMING TO CANADA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The passport order for the Dominion of Canada has been annulled, and passports are now no longer necessary for travellers coming into and going out of the Dominion. People are now as free to leave the Dominion as they were before the war.

### ALARMING RUMORS PROVE UNFOUNDED

**No New Cases of Influenza in City Except Where it is Passing Through Whole Family.**

There have been some alarming rumors going the rounds for the last day or two regarding a recurrence of the epidemic of influenza, which according to the medical health officer, Dr. Cade, are absolutely without foundation. There have been absolutely no fresh cases reported in the city since last week. One or two new patients have been attended by one of the doctors, but in each case the patient had been ill for some time before calling for medical attention, and every such case has occurred in families where the influenza is simply going round them all.

The fact of the King Edward School being closed again after being open for only one day is apparently regarded as justification for the truth of the rumors, which, as usual, become inflated and enlarged as they pass along. There is every reason to believe that the epidemic has run its course, according to the authorities, although its effects are still apparent. With the continuation of the necessary precautions and strict attention to hygiene which ought never to be relaxed in any case, in either public or personal affairs, the public mind may be reassured of their safety.

### FARMERS URGED TO PRODUCE MORE BEEF

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Nov. 20.—Canadian farmers are being urged by the Canada Food Board to make every endeavor to increase the supply of livestock throughout the Dominion.

After four years of fighting there is a great scarcity of cattle the world over, and particularly in Europe, where herds had to be killed off as much because of the lack of fodder as for food.

### PRINCE GEORGE

The order forbidding public gatherings has been rescinded here and the place is once more back to normal. There are still 42 cases of influenza in the hospitals but all are becoming convalescent.

The name of Wallace McMullen of Prince George recently appeared in the casualty list. His wife here has received word that his injuries were very slight and he is once more on duty.

Myles Andrews has been killed in France. His is the latest casualty reported and it is hoped it will prove to be the last.

The death occurred here a few days ago from influenza of Mrs. Unruh. She leaves a husband and two children.

Otto Gross who recently arrived from Alberta died here from influenza. He was 24 years of age. A younger brother at the hospital is recovering.

Two draft evaders, J. O. Essen and J. Jobson have been arrested here and fined. Essen paid \$5 and Jobson \$20 and costs in each case.

### KING AND QUEEN OF BELGIANS ENTER ANTWERP

**Crowds Flock Through Streets To Welcome Sovereigns Amid Clamor of Bells of Cathedral.**

**LITTLE DAMAGE DONE TO THE GREAT PORT**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Antwerp, Nov. 20.—King Albert and Queen Elizabeth entered the city of Antwerp yesterday morning amid a clamor of Cathedral bells and the shouts of the liberated people. The streets were thronged with the gay crowds. People packed the windows and sat on hastily improvised galleries on the streets despite the rain and the city was gaily decorated with the Belgian and allied flags. The property in the city itself has been damaged but little. The inhabitants have been comparatively well fed, and the shops are filled with great varieties of food and sweetmeats.  
With the re-assumption of the civil authority, arrangements are being carried out for the re-establishment of manufactures of the pre-war days, and the work of rebuilding the trade and commerce of Belgium's great port is already commenced. While the destruction of property and requisitioning by the Germans in Antwerp has not been carried out to the same extent as in other places in Belgium, there is still great work to be done in getting rid of the effect of the German occupation.

### VIGILENCE UNRELAXED BY THE ALLIED TROOPS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
With the American Army of Occupation, Nov. 20.—The United States troops continue to advance into the territory evacuated by the retreating German forces, and are now nearing the German border. The troops will continue to advance over the border and into Germany, until they reach the bank of the Rhine.  
So far there has been little fear of German treachery, but the vigilance of the Allies never relaxes, and no chances are being taken for the safety of the troops.

**Highest Honor In the Empire.**

The very highest honor that can be bestowed upon a civilian has been won by Lieut.-Col. G. W. Peck of Prince Rupert. It is with pride that his fellow citizens speak of his recognition and every Prince Rupert man must feel that he shares somewhat in the reflected glory of the man who has performed gallant deeds of daring.

The Victoria Cross is awarded sparingly and only for outstanding deeds. Only a few Canadians in all have received the coveted decoration, officers and privates competing on equal terms for the one mark which singles them out as men of high daring and bright intellect.

The News is glad to be able to add its quota to the congratulations which the gallant colonel must be receiving. Like General Currie, Col. Peck seems to have been one of the big men of the Canadian army, an army which is full of much splendid material. We hope that the Colonel will return home very soon to receive in person the proper recognition from the citizens which it is quite certain will be given such splendid work for the Empire. When he comes there must be no half hearted celebration. It must be full and complete and will be joined in just as heartily by those who happened to be opposed to him politically as by those who elected him. Winning a Victoria Cross has nothing to do with politics. It is heroism of the highest kind.

**Make Prince Rupert Centre for Mining.**

D. B. Morkill in an interview yesterday spoke from professional experience when he said that this was a natural mining centre. At the same time Prince Rupert people may easily help this along. They may give every encouragement to mining visitors to get in touch with those whom they would like to meet and in time it is quite possible that a mining exchange might be established.

**Entry Into Strassburg To Be Imposing Ceremony.**

The entry of Marshal Foch into Strassburg is to be an imposing ceremony. It seems necessary that an impression should be made, especially in a province which has been under the domination of the Germans for so many years. This is to be the great occasion, apparently and it will be spectacular.

Marshal Foch has not been a spectacular general. There has been nothing with him but real scientific modern fighting, strategy of the highest kind and result getting. That is in line with modern business. Now we find him making a change but doubtless it is with the same purpose. He never does anything without a reason. There is no childish delight in display that can turn him aside from his main purpose.

**Asiatic Question Again to Front.**

In the Okanagan there is a movement against allowing Asiatics to own land. The farmers are getting nervous. They were some years ago howling to have the Orientals introduced to provide coolie labor on which they could make profits. Now the coolie labor refuses to remain coolie labor and instead becomes proprietary.

The whole gamut of human selfishness is run in the double attitude of the Okanagan farmers. What they really wanted was a lot of slaves, but they could not say so. At any rate they wanted a subservient class, which is the next worst thing to a slave class. Now they object because the subservient class is not subservient.

The Oriental question is going to be the one difficult one following the war, because the standards of living in the Orient are so far below those here. Efforts will undoubtedly be made to introduce Hindus and Japanese and possibly Chinese, and to this there would be little objection if the standard of living to which they were accustomed were as high as the standard of living here.

The people of India have been fighting the battles of the Empire side by side with our men in the trenches; the Japanese have been Allies and their ships have been a protection to this coast at a time when protection was needed. With this in view the Oriental question becomes a most seriously difficult one and it will need wise handling to prevent serious friction, injustice or an appearance of ingratitude.

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

In regard to the others, the work is going on as usual and there is no lessening in the output so far, following the signing of the armistice. That is the message brought by H. R. McMillan who has charge of the spruce production work for Northern British Columbia.

Mr. McMillan says that had the war continued much longer there would have been a decided shortage of spruce. They found it difficult to keep up the supply of logs as it was, as most of the places where they are operating is practically logged out. There is plenty of other timber, but not aeroplane spruce.

The influenza is now practically a thing of the past in the camps. Mr. McMillan was taken with it himself and has but just recovered. He came over with Dr. M. T. Culbertson of Dawson, who has been there helping to fight the dread disease and has had an attack himself.

Dr. Culbertson came down on the Princess Sophia on her last trip south. On the call for doctors being sent out he thought it his duty to respond, so he left his wife at Calgary and as soon as possible he intends to rejoin her and continue the journey east.

Dr. Ward of Vancouver, who also went to the camps to help, is expected out in a few days.

## DIRECT TAXATION TO BE DISCUSSED

Conference of Premiers May Challenge Right of Dominion To Levy Income Tax

Several matters of importance at issue between the Dominion and the various provinces, which have been allowed to lie dormant while more pressing business occupied the Federal ministers, will be due for settlement in the near future. One which affects British Columbia is that of the right of the Dominion to levy direct taxation within the province after the war.

This matter will probably be brought up at the convention of Provincial Premiers to be held in Ottawa this week. The Hon. John Hart, Minister of Finance, who is in charge of taxation matters, has wired Premier Oliver asking him to introduce the subject for discussion.

The item of direct taxation to which reference is specifically made is the income tax now being levied by the Dominion, in addition to the income tax which has been one of the large sources of British Columbia's revenue for over thirty years.

While this heavy burden of double taxation has been cheerfully borne so long as the war continued, protests may be expected from taxpayers after the Peace Treaty has been signed and difficulties in paying two income taxes begin to make themselves felt on the return of normal conditions.

With the heavy charges which have to be met by British Columbia for public debt and necessary development work, to which must be added some share of the cost of post-war responsibilities, the Minister of Finance regards it as of the utmost importance that all sources of provincial revenue be conserved and protected.

Doubtless with this in view Mr. Hart has reminded the Premier by wire so that the matter may be discussed at the inter-provincial conference table, and in consideration of the fact that the Federal Cabinet will now have some time to devote to matters other than purely war business.

## COLONEL RETURNS

Lieut.-Colonel A. Bruce Powley has reached New York on his homeward journey, and according to a telegram received by his wife, Mrs. Powley of Victoria, will spend a few days visiting his brother in Toronto, and then continue his journey to the coast.

## PAPERS NOW TALK OF PRINCE RUPERT

In these days when the demand is so large for fish and more fish, some details of the halibut catch for one month in the waters about Prince Rupert, B. C., will be interesting, says a southern contemporary. The halibut fishing industry of the North Pacific dates back for a score or more of years, but its immense development dates back to the birth of Prince Rupert and the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, which afforded a port close to the fishing grounds and a direct railway line for the fast transport of this immensely valuable product, to the large markets in the East, both in Canada and the United States. The report for the month of September shows that in all a fleet of between eighty and a hundred vessels are occupied in halibut fishing in these waters, and during the month 128 fishing vessels arrived at Prince Rupert, bringing in a total catch of 1,094,000 pounds of halibut. The vessels in the fishing business, operating out of this port, make from one to three trips a month, and when it is considered they get from 8c to 15c per pound for their catch, according to quality, the importance of this industry to the country may be readily estimated.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

## PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

## TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1915. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

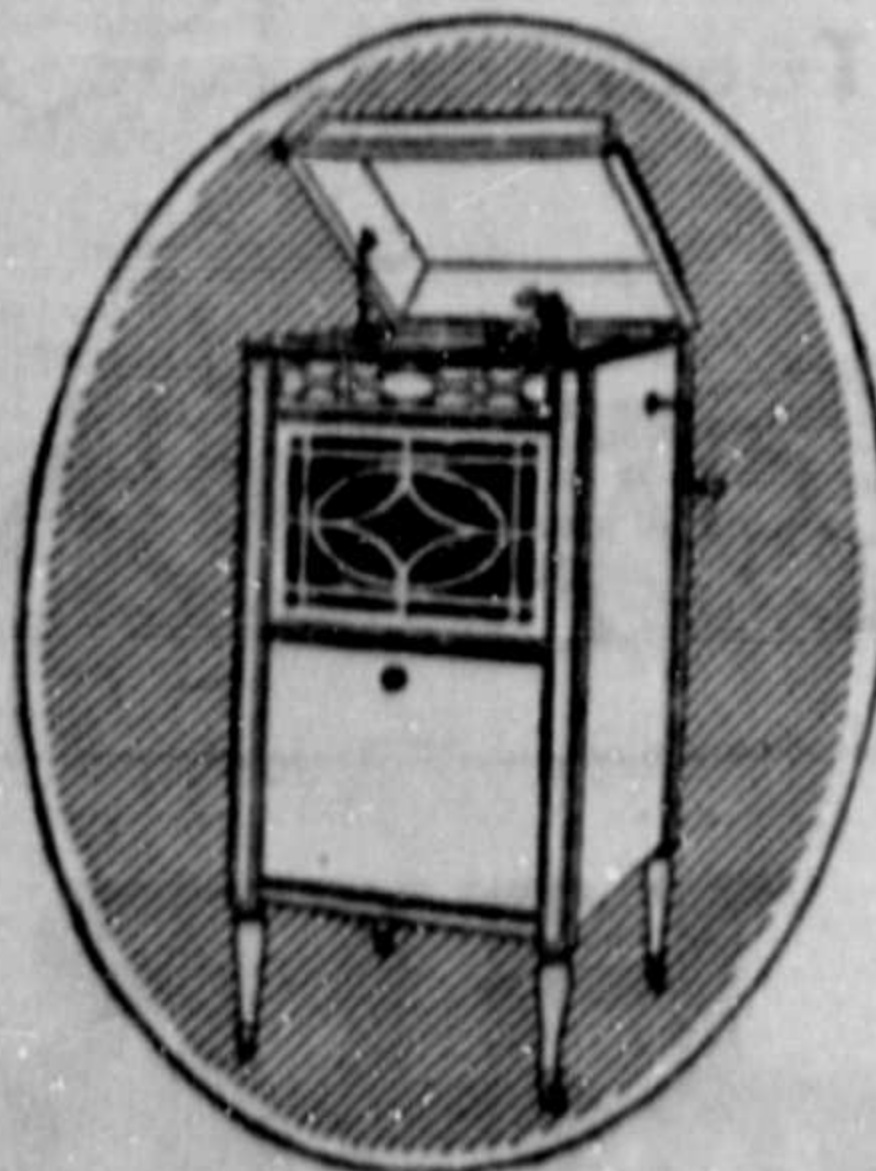

## Red Cross Notes

Four more acknowledgements of food parcels have been received from Arthur Bristow, prisoner of war in Germany.

It is hoped to renew the Friday Red Cross sales in the hut a week from Friday. For the next few months there will be great need of help for the homeless refugees as well as the soldiers, and the society earnestly hopes that these sales will continue to receive the support the public has given so splendidly in the past.

A donation of \$6.25 for the Prisoners of War Fund from Miss Rothwell is acknowledged with many thanks.

It is expected to put on the concert in aid of St. Dunstan's Hostel for blinded soldiers at the earliest opportunity after the ban is lifted on the theatre, as those unfortunate men are in need of all the help the public can give them.

The Victory Loan Drive as well as the influenza epidemic have hampered Red Cross work to a certain extent for the past few weeks. The society hopes to continue to work until the last prisoner is given up by Germany and until help is no longer required by the wounded men and the homeless refugees now being released by the Allied armies.

## DISLOCATION OF STUDY WILL BE CONSIDERED

On account of the dislocation to study occasioned by the enforcement of the Spanish Influenza regulations and the effect on the pupils' advancement from one grade to the next, the Hon. J. D. MacLean, Minister of Education, has announced that the Department will take due cognizance of the fact at the end of the year.

In this connection, it should be noted, a request was recently sent to the Minister by the principals of the various schools asking that the course of study for High School entrance be somewhat modified in view of the loss of time by reason of the epidemic.

Particular reference was made in the communication to such subjects as literature, history and geography, and in his reply Dr. MacLean makes clear that he will bear the suggestion in mind when considering the whole question as already decided upon by the Department.

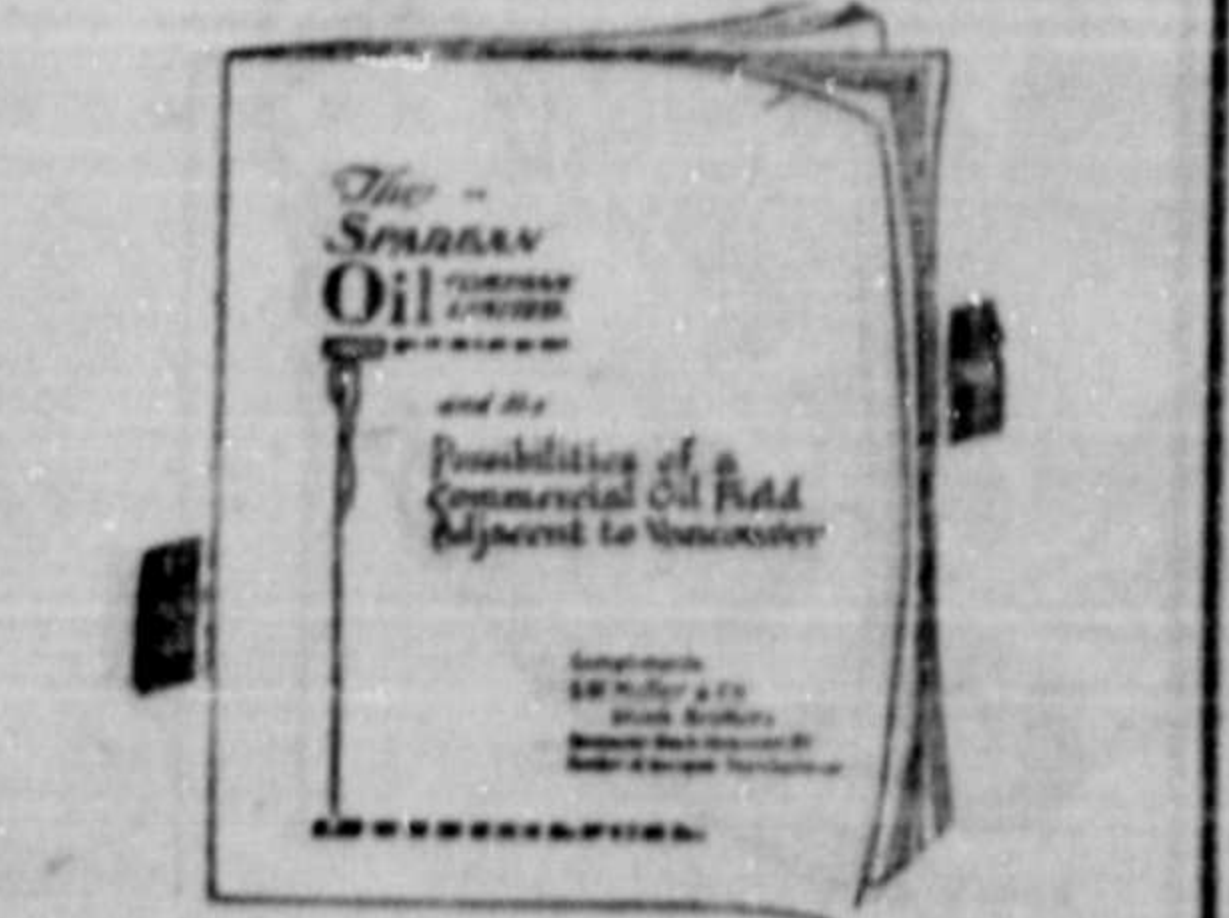
