Steamship Line for this Route

WILL CONNECT THIS PORT WITH VLADIVOSTOK SAYS TRADE AGENT

Prince Rupert will have One of First Steamship Lines to be Established on Pacific

This is the Statement of W. Findlay, Siberian Representative of the British Engineering Company of London, Eng., on Arrival in Victoria En Route to Ottawa.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, November 21.—One of the first regular steamship lines between this country and Siberia to be established after the war will be between Prince Rupert and Vladivostok, the shortest and most direct route between the trade centres of the Dominion and the undeveloped but rich country on the other side of the Pacific. That is the announcement made here today by W. Findlay, Siberian representative of the British Engineering Company of London, England, on his arrival here from Siberia on his way to Ottawa and London.

"The Allies have a tremendous task ahead of them in Russia," said Mr. Findlay regarding the situation in Russia today. "Absolute chaos prevails everywhere. There is no railway organization to speak of and millions of people face starvation this winter. The Allies will have to start right at Vladivostok in order to clean up the mess."

Mr. Findlay stated that the country offered tremendous possibilities in the way of agricultural development and development of its western mineral resources and he expects to see extensive trade relations established between Canada and Siberia.

100,000 SOLDIERS WISH TO TAKE UP FARMING AFTER RETURN FROM BIG STRUGGLE

15,000 OF THESE WOULD COME TO BRITISH COLUMBIA; 74 PER CENT. HAVE HAD PREVIOUS AGRICULTURAL EXPERIENCE; HALF OF NUMBER WILLING TO WORK FOR WAGES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, November 21.—Over 105,000 members of the Canadian expeditionary force have expressed a definite wish to take up farming in Canada after the war. This figure was obtained by interviewing 230,000 members of the forces overseas and indicates that 43.9 per cent. of these men wish to go on the land. The actual number of men returning after the war will be much greater. If it should be, for example, 345,000, on the assumption that the same proportion holds true the number of men desiring to go on the land will be 157,000.

These facts and a great many details bearing on them have been compiled by the statistical division of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment, from cards issued by the National Service Council to members of the Canadian forces overseas and signed by them.

The facts given represent the men's own statements of their intentions and in most cases there can be no doubt of their sincerity as perusal will show.

BUSH MINE AT STEWART WILL SHIP 2,000 TONS

Preparation for Active Work During Winter; Acres of Ore At Big Missouri.

EASTERN OPERATORS INTERESTED THERE

Stewart, Nov. 21.—The Portland Canal district, which has been under a cloud, following the reaction of the boom days of 1910 and 1911, is again coming to the front, the success of the Bush mine having stimulated development work on other properties, with encouraging results. The Bush mine, formerly owned by the Salmon-Bear River Mining Co., and extensively developed by that company, and later by the Robinson-Plate interests, of New York, was acquired about two years ago, and in a short time one of the high grade ore bodies exposed on the surface was located at depth and crosscut for over 100 feet in width. The ore is a siliceous chlorite schist carrying native silver; and silver sulphides, associated with iron pyrites and in places some galena and averages around \$200 per ton in value.

On Salmon River.
The property is situated on the Salmon River fourteen miles from tidewater on Portland Canal, to which it has been connected by wagon road, built this summer at a cost of some \$50,000, to which the Provincial Government contributed part of the expense for the portion of the road in British Columbia, the major part, about eleven miles, being in Alaska.

At tidewater on Stewart harbor a temporary slipway has been built to facilitate the shipment of ore, and it is expected that at least 2,000 tons will go forward during the winter as soon as a good sleigh road can be formed.

The Dominion Government has planned the building of a wharf to be situated about a thousand feet south of the present wharf at Stewart, to which it will be connected, and also with the present

DOUBLE MURDER IN ALBERTA BY DRAFT EVADERS

James McKay, Jr., of Prince Albert Shot and Car Thrown Over Steep Embankment.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Prince Albert, Sask., Nov. 21.—James McKay, Jr., of this city, sheriff's officer, was murdered last Friday at Steep Creek and his body, along with his car, thrown down a sixty-foot embankment into the Saskatchewan river, and today Corporal Horsley, a member of the posse sent out to make arrests in connection with the shooting, was shot and almost instantly killed.

So far one arrest, that of Dr. Gervais, has been made, but two desperate companions are still at large.

The double tragedy occurred at Steep Creek, 26 miles east of Prince Albert.

Gervais and his companions are said to be from Quebec and are supposed to be draft evaders.

Gervais had a farm at Steep Creek, a wild and lonely place.

Prince Albert, Nov. 21.—Later it is now believed that Dr. Gervais, under arrest here as one of the bandits who murdered James McKay, comes from Shawinigan Falls, Quebec, and that he and the gang were concerned in the reign of terrorism in Montreal during which the home of Lord Atholstane was dynamited.

PROVINCIAL CONFERENCE DISCUSSES QUESTION OF RESOURCES AND SUBSIDIES

EXPROPRIATION OF LANDS HELD FOR SPECULATIVE PURPOSES IS PROPOSED; EACH PROVINCE LOOKING FOR ADVANTAGE IN LANDS OR SUBSIDIES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, November 21.—Divided under three headings, the question of natural resources for Western Provinces, land settlement generally and settlement of soldiers in particular, yesterday's sitting of the Inter-Provincial Conference was the most important yet. Some far-reaching legislation is proposed, one feature of it contemplating steps for the expropriation of lands held for speculative purposes and absolutely unproductive for that reason.

At the morning sitting, without any conclusion being reached, the surrender to western provinces of their lands and resources was further discussed.

In the afternoon there was a sort of an agreement to disagree the decision, unless the question be reopened today, being to refer the matter to the Dominion Government.

Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta want their resources and as well subsidies heretofore paid in lieu of them. The east and British Columbia favor this grant but seek a compensating subsidy of \$5,000,000, the western provinces, apart from British Columbia, not conceding the right of this demand, counter with the proposal that Ontario and Quebec shall not receive any allowance, and if they do then that western subsidies shall be increased proportionately.

DEPLORABLE CONDITION OF BRITISH PRISONERS WHO ARE BEING LIBERATED

London, November 21.—In any question of provisioning Germany the British Government will be obliged to take into account the condition under which British prisoners in Germany are being released, unless the cruel treatment which such prisoners are receiving is discontinued, the German Government has been warned in a wireless message.

The government has been notified of shocking lack of organization in the release of British prisoners in German territory and of their return march on foot, miserably clothed, without food or transport, and with no escort or guides to the Allied lines, with the result that there has been lamentable suffering and heavy mortality.

BATTLESHIPS SURRENDERED THIS MORNING

British Grand Fleet and American Squadron With French Cruisers Took Over Hun Vessels.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Nov. 21.—The British Grand Fleet, accompanied by an American battle squadron and French cruisers, steamed out at 3 o'clock this morning from its Scottish base to accept the surrender of German battleships, battle cruisers and destroyers. A wireless despatch this noon reports that it got in touch with the German ships this morning and that the surrender was carried out according to plans. The point of rendezvous for the Allied and German sea forces was between 30 and 40 miles east of May Island, opposite the Firth of Forth.

The Prince John arrived from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands about one o'clock this morning. Passengers tell of the voyage being rather rough and some heavy seas were encountered.

LATEST APPEAL FOR CLEMENCY BY PRINCE LICHNOWSKY FOR GERMANY

Amsterdam, November 21.—The latest German appeal for clemency addressed by Prince Lichnowsky, former German Ambassador at London, to the British nation and especially to the Marquis of Lansdowne, Viscount Grey and ex-Premier Asquith, appears in the Berlin Vorwaerts. It declares that the aims for which Great Britain entered the war, the protection of Belgium and France and the conversion of Germany into a democratic state, have been attained, and adds: "I cannot believe that lust for revenge and desire to strangle the German people prevail, to the exclusion of sentiments which before the war dominated the British nation."

Power of Advertising Shown in Victory Loan.

It is generally acknowledged that the success of the Victory Loan was due largely to the advertising campaign put up by the newspapers. Discussing this the Vancouver World says:

"The success of the Victory Loan campaign throughout the province must stand forever as a proof of what good organization and zealous salesmanship can do. It is in no way derogatory of these if we say that it was pre-eminently a proof of the power of newspaper advertising and publicity.

Every other means of publicity was practically paralyzed. Public meetings were prohibited, parades were cancelled, even open-air gatherings were discouraged. The pulpits were unoccupied. Dinners and club gatherings were impossible. All the ordinary methods, outside of newspapers, of informing the public mind and of generating enthusiasm were barred. On top of these was the depression due to the epidemic, and most fatal of all in the final days of the campaign, the news of peace.

"Each succeeding difficulty was met by the press of the province with a bigger blast of printer's ink. The work of the editors was rendered peculiarly difficult by a simultaneous order from the government to reduce the consumption of white paper. Every extra column therefore had to be deducted from a reduced space for news. Publicity committees, realizing the situation, used generous paid copy; the merchants backed them up. But the free reading matter donated by the press—editorial and news—was three times as great as in the last loan and has probably never been equalled before in this province, not even in a political campaign.

"If any papers are worthy of special mention it is the weekly ones, whose staffs in many instances were reduced by the influenza, and who gave without stint often when they could ill afford to do so.

"The campaign proved two things: It proved the unselfishness and patriotism of the editors, and it demonstrated beyond question that there is no combination of adverse circumstances which can defeat any worthy campaign behind which is ranged intelligent and adequate advertising."

Erying to Take Sting From Defeat.

The Germans are trying to pull the sting from the Allies by endeavoring to permeate the countries which they represent with the spirit of anarchy and thus make it impossible for them to secure proper retribution for the crimes which have been committed. Bolsheviki methods are being introduced and also it is reported that an endeavor is being made to set the Allies against one another in order to break in peace the combination which held together so well in time of war.

That the Huns will succeed in their recent nefarious design is hardly likely, but democracies are often misled and every effort has to be made to keep contamination away.

Prepare to Fish Coming Season.

The fishing game is something like every other. Those about to engage in it are very apt to leave everything to the last and thus lose a good deal of valuable time in the spring when the market is good and often lose the opportunity to get boats and gear at a reasonable price.

Most boat owners will be using their outfits in the spring, and those boys who sold out in order to join either the British or American forces will be back here and will want boats, some of them at any rate. What preparations are being made to meet this demand? No boats are being built here and none to order for the fishing business at the south coast towns so far as can be gathered. There will be a few boats released by the Imperial Munitions Board, but the owners will still require them.

Those wanting new boats will either have to build or get them built. It is often well to have them built to order, as the individual fisherman knows best what he wants and can work to advantage with a boat that suits him. What we wish to impress is that this is the time to act, not leave it till the spring and then lose half the season while the boat is being made ready.

ALASKA FISH SITUATION IS DISCUSSED

Proposal to Stop All Fishing Near Mouths of Streams in Territory.

Inspector Walker of the Bureau of Fisheries is holding two preliminary hearings in Alaska on the advisability of prohibiting fishing in streams and within 500 yards of the mouths of streams in the Southeastern Alaska district. The first was held at Ketchikan Nov. 1, and the second at Juneau, Nov. 7. The information thus secured will be considered at the formal hearing to be held at Seattle Nov. 25. The proposal to impose such restrictions has arisen from apprehension regarding the future runs of salmon, owing to inroads made on the supply by reason of the rapid increase of fishing operations.

Interferes With Spawning.
In respect to the proposal to prohibit fishing in and near the mouths of streams in Southeastern Alaska, Dr. Hugh M. Smith, U.S. Commissioner of Fisheries, says that for some time past the Bureau of Fisheries has been concerned as to the future of the salmon industry in Southeastern Alaska, because of the alarming heavy catches which have been made recently, this being due in considerable measure to the increased number of canneries and other fishery establishments and the resultant close competition and scouring of all waters to secure as many fish as possible. Much of this fishing has been in small streams, and in some instances almost directly upon the spawning beds of salmon. Under the law, fishing is permissible in streams over 500 feet in width with movable gear only in streams less than 500 feet in width, provided such gear is operated not more than one third the width of the stream.

Narrow Streams.
Nearly all of the streams in Southeastern Alaska are less than 500 feet in width. In fact, most of them are less than 150 feet in width, and as a rule they are comparatively short on account of the mountainous character of the country. Except in the few waters already closed, it is frequently the practice of fishermen to operate in these small streams, this being permissible under the provisions of law allowing the use of movable fishing gear not over one-third the width of such waters. Theoretically this part of the law is wise, but in actual practice its weakness is obvious because almost invariably under the guise of fishing one-third the width of the stream the net is actually set and operated almost the full width of the stream, thus permitting the easy capture of salmon where they are closely confined. It is not uncommon for fishermen to proceed upstream and frighten the fish down into nets waiting some distance below. There are hundreds of such streams in southeastern Alaska, hence it is exceedingly difficult to enforce a law involving the technical niceties of determining exactly whether a piece of fishing apparatus is extended more than one-third the width of a stream.

Purse Seines.
Not only is there fishing in the streams, but considerable fishing is done by purse seines in the zone immediately off the mouths of streams (except within 100 yards of the mouth of any Red salmon streams) as the fish very often collect in schools at the stream mouths before moving up into fresh water above. This is particularly true in seasons of draught when the water in the streams is frequently so low that the fish actually cannot get up, but the instinct which causes them to seek spawning beds is so strong that they persist sometimes for days in their efforts to ascend. It is while the salmon are thus collected off the mouths of the streams that they fall easy victims to purse seines.

Prohibit All Salmon Fishing
It has been suggested that the best remedy for the situation is to prohibit all fishing for salmon, or other fishing in the prosecution of which salmon are taken or injured, in all streams of Southeastern Alaska east of the longitude of Cape Spencer less than 500 feet in width and within a zone of 500 yards outside the

mouths of such streams; also that such fishing be prohibited in lakes or other waters tributary to such streams.

In the report of the grand jury in session at Juneau in January, 1918, the belief was expressed that the salmon of Southeastern Alaska are being depleted and that the annual takes of salmon are exceeding the natural production. The grand jury, therefore, recommended that a hearing be held by the Secretary of Commerce during the year 1918 to determine the advisability of limiting or prohibiting commercial fishing for salmon in all streams of Southeastern Alaska and for a distance outside the mouths thereof of not to exceed 500 yards.

Big Missouri from an ore body that had formerly been deemed too low grade to be worth investigation.

These two properties are located upon the same mineralized zone, the boundaries of which have not been determined, but the surface extent of the mineralization may be reckoned in acres, the greenstone forming the country rock has been silicified and mineralized for hundreds of yards and in some instances the oxidation of the ore has stained the surface with brilliant coloring, prominent features of the landscape which the early prospectors were prompt to recognize and locate, and on which extensive development work had been done for years, but without bringing to light ore of sufficiently high grade to warrant the equipment of a mine.

Other Developments.

The discovery of high-grade ore on these two properties of a similar character to that of the Bush mine lying about three miles to the south in a straight line, has given an impetus to the development of other properties throughout the district, and already a number of claims have been bonded that have been lying idle for years.

In the Bear River section the forward movement has not been so marked as on the Salmon, but a number of properties have been examined, several of them already extensively developed, they are now under consideration, and there is every reason to believe some of them will be reopened during the coming season.

A gratifying feature of the present movement is the great interest that is now being taken in the district by prominent mining operators of the East, many mining engineers representing well-known operators in the mining field visited the camp during the past summer, and were favorably impressed with it, judging from the amount of capital now being invested and forthcoming.

Augment Transportation.

Consequent upon the development of the Salmon River area, transportation facilities will have to be greatly augmented to handle the tonnage of ore from the properties now being opened up wagon roads will serve for a time, but to operate them on anything like a large scale will necessitate a railway, this already being considered in a tentative way.

NEW HAZELTON

Dr. Wynch has sent to the authorities at Victoria a report on the extent of the influenza epidemic. It was prepared November 8 and up to that time showed cases here 150 and deaths 5; cases at Smithers, 60, deaths 1; cases at Telkwa 5, deaths 1; cases at Moricetown 1. These figures do not include Indians.

Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Harris have gone to Vancouver for the winter.

The death occurred here a few days ago of Peter C. Dale, an employee at the Silver Standard mine. He leaves a widow and five young children.

Mrs. J. G. Powell and her mother, Mrs. W. Sortwell, have gone to Vancouver, where the funeral of the late Mr. Powell will take place. Mrs. Powell expects to live with her parents at Steveston.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be pre-empted; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may, at their own request, apply for a proportionate allotment; jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the allotment is made are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

INVESTIGATION INTO SOPHIA'S LOSS IS A DIFFICULT MATTER

It was not difficult for the Government to send Capt. J. D. Macpherson, Wreck Commissioner, a telegram recently ordering him to hold an investigation into the loss of the Princess Sophia in Lynn Canal, but the telegram did not state how it was to be done, and from all appearances it is going to be a difficult matter for such an inquiry to be held.

The inquiry cannot be held at Juneau, the nearest point to Vanderbilt Reef, as that is American territory. Furthermore, no American subjects can be subpoenaed, so that those who stood by the wrecked vessel and could give necessary evidence can only be politely asked to attend the inquiry. If they consented they would have to come from Alaskan points.

There is also another difficulty, which is rather an extensive one. What is the court to investigate? The telegram says, "the loss of the steamer Sophia." The actual loss of the vessel was caused by running on the reef, but as all those who could give evidence regarding this are dead, the cause of the grounding will never be known, although it could be guessed at. From the time the boat went on the reef there was no way in which anything could have been done to save her, so that from that time nobody would be responsible for her sinking. As to the passengers, that does not enter into the inquiry in any way. Practically the only thing that could be done would be to compile facts, most of which are known.

This will be done when the damage claims come before the court. Then, again, there are the claims for services rendered by ships which aided in the search for bodies and stood by the Sophia.

EXPERTS RESIGN

Two Employees of Provincial Department of Agriculture Sever Connection With It.

Two of the technical experts of the staff of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, H. M. S. Middleton, Provincial horticulturist, and H. O. English, chief inspector of the Soils and Crops Division, have resigned their positions and left the service.

Mr. Middleton has been in the service of the Government for the past ten years, first being appointed assistant horticulturist in the Nelson district, where he did excellent work among the fruit-growers until about eighteen months ago, when he was advanced to the head of the horticulturist branch, succeeding R. E. Winslow, Provincial horticulturist, who then resigned.

Mr. Middleton is a graduate of the Queen's Agricultural College, where he took the degree of B. S. A. He intends returning to the interior, where he has a fruit ranch, and for the time being at any rate he will devote his attention to private affairs.

Mr. English is a graduate of the Manitoba Agricultural College and has been in the employ of the Department of Agriculture for three years. He has been in charge of the field crops competitions annually held throughout the Province under the auspices of the Farmers' Institutes and has done valuable work in connection with seed grain work and seed improvement. He is the secretary of the Seed Growers' Association, organized last spring.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 21. With an unanimous vote the Seattle Central Labor Council voted to strike on December 9 unless prior to that time Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of murder in connection with the San Francisco bomb explosion, has been granted a new trial or given his freedom.

An immediate referendum vote on the strike resolution is asked of all labor unions affiliated with the Council.

ARE REOCCUPYING MUCH TERRITORY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Nov. 21.—The Belgians, rapidly carrying out the reoccupation of their country, have advanced more than fifty miles from the lines held by them when the armistice was signed. They have entered Turnhout, 24 miles northeast and Hrenthals 18 miles east of Antwerp.

Both the Americans and British have advanced about 30 miles, while the French have penetrated 40 miles into the former German territory, reoccupying Sarbrucken.

James Henneberry Was Native of Halifax and Only 35 Years Of Age.

James Henneberry, a fisherman, died this morning at the home of J. H. Meagher, 524 Fifth Avenue, West. He was a native of Halifax, N. S., and was a fine young man of 35 years. He was attacked with influenza, which developed into pneumonia, from which he was unable to recover.

GENERAL MANGIN IS THROWN FROM HORSE

Paris, Nov. 20.—General Mangin was injured by being thrown under his horse while reviewing a brigade of French troops at Metz. The General's horse, a thoroughbred and unused to noise was frightened by the band of trumpets. The animal reared and fell on its rider. General Mangin was unconscious when picked up, having been injured about the head and legs. He remained in a state of coma for twelve hours, but is now making excellent progress.

THE CELEBRATION OF THE ARMISTICE

Arrangements for the All Day Holiday Events Well Under Way—Will be Great Spectacle.

Tomorrow evening there will be a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council to make arrangements for the carrying out of their part in the great day of celebration of the signing of the armistice. The different unions in town are determined that they are going to do their part, and do it well.

In the evening, later on, a torch light procession will be formed down town, which will make its way to the Exhibition Building on Acropolis Hill. In the big building there will be a short series of ten minute speeches and after these a huge bonfire will be lit outside. The program as sketched out by the committee is a good one for such a celebration and it is fitting that a public holiday should mark the occasion.
