

# BIG SCHEME LAUNCHED TO START **RETURNED SOLDIERS IN LUMBER** BUSINESS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Options have been Taken on Eight Large Mills and Limits Containing Five Billion Feet of Lumber; None but Returned Men to be Employed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs,

Vancouver, November 22.—To complete arrangements for the BANDITS MAKE launching of 1,500 returned soldiers in the lumber business in British Columbia, Sir Douglas Cameron and Thomas Meredith leave Vancouver soon for England, where they will make personal selection from men coming home from the war zones.

A Federal charter is being sought for a Returned Soldiers' Co-Operative Lumber Co., Ltd., with an authorized capital of \$10,000,000 and paid up capital of \$1,500,000.

Mills will be operated on a co-operative basis, soldiers having a full share in the management.

It is explained that each of 1,500 returned men should take \$100 in stock. and the

Returned men only will be employed in the mills and camps and in the agency which the company proposes to establish throughout Canada, the United States, Europe and elsewhere.

# CANADA'S GREAT RECORD IN CONDUCT OF GREAT WAR; **418,980 MEN TOOK PART**

#### Paris, Nov. 22 .- in discussing STARTED WITH ONE DIVISION AND ENDED WITH THREE, IN ADDITION TO MANY OTHER SERVICES; THE CASUALTIES NUMBERED 211,000, WITH OVER 50,000 DEATHS.

Ottawa, November 22.- The following statement, showing death of millions should enjoy what has been accomplished from a military point of view by the Dominion since the beginning of the war, was issued yesterday by the Militia Department.

> When Canada entered the war on August 4th, 1914, she had a permanent force of only 3,000 men and an active militia of 60,000.

> When hostilities ceased on November 11, 1918, Canada had sent overseas 418,980 soldiers.

> At first Canada supplied a division. This was increased until by 1916 she had in France an army corps of four divisions, a cavalry brigade and numerous other services, such as line of communication troops, railway troops and forestry corps.

> On September 30, 1918, Canadian troops in France numbered 156,250. A cavalry brigade included a strong draft furnished by the Royal North West Mounted Police.

> The Canadians engaged in United Kingdom and France in constructing and operating railway lines and in cutting down

### SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making neces-sary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for

five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant

emptor in occupation not less than a mears, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per an-num and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may guires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, pro-vided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land
