Returned Soldiers to Combine Splendid Service Given by Canada Set Forth in Statement

BIG SCHEME LAUNCHED TO START RETURNED SOLDIERS IN LUMBER BUSINESS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Options have been Taken on Eight Large Mills and Limits Containing Five Billion Feet of Lumber; None but Returned Men to be Employed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, November 22.—To complete arrangements for the launching of 1,500 returned soldiers in the lumber business in British Columbia, Sir Douglas Cameron and Thomas Meredith leave Vancouver soon for England, where they will make personal selection from men coming home from the war zones.
A Federal charter is being sought for a Returned Soldiers' Co-Operative Lumber Co., Ltd., with an authorized capital of \$10,000,000 and paid up capital of \$1,500,000.
Mills will be operated on a co-operative basis, soldiers having a full share in the management.
It is explained that each of 1,500 returned men should take \$100 in stock.
Returned men only will be employed in the mills and camps and in the agency which the company proposes to establish throughout Canada, the United States, Europe and elsewhere.
Workers will live in community settlements and will be paid current lumbermen's wages.
The company has secured an option on eight large sawmills in British Columbia with a capacity of 150,000,000 feet yearly on timber limits aggregating 5,000,000,000 feet.
Provisional officers of the company are Sir Douglas Cameron, President; R. W. Gibson, Victoria, Vice-President; Thomas Meredith, General Manager.
Mr. Meredith stated today that he had interviewed many Canadians in France in regard to the proposal and from brigadiers to privates they were most enthusiastic.
No intimation has been given as to where the mills are on which the options have been taken, but it is very probable that they include some of the mills on the Queen Charlotte Islands, where the contracts under the Imperial Munitions Board have just about expired.

WESTHOLME OPENS TOMORROW NIGHT

The Westholme Theatre which has been closed since the beginning of the influenza epidemic will open tomorrow night with a spectacular secret service drama "The Spy." It is said to be a great play and doubtless will draw a record crowd.

Colonial Secretary Has Written to Agent-General of New South Wales on Subject.

Walter Long, Colonial Secretary, has written to the Agent-General of New South Wales, in reply to an inquiry as to the future of German colonies, stating that Premier Lloyd George has authorized him to say that the whole support of the Government will be given to the claim of the dominions on this subject. Mr. Long says that Premier Lloyd George has already made this clear to representatives of the Allies at Paris.

BANDITS MAKE ESCAPE FROM THEIR DUGOUT

Associates of Dr. Gervais, Who Were Implicated in Double Murder at Steep Creek, Are Gone.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Prince Albert, Sask., Nov. 22.—The Gervais bandits, Victor Carmel and Jean Baptiste Stgerman, who murdered the sheriff's officer James McKay last Friday at Steep Creek and yesterday shot and killed Corporal Charles Horsley of Clinton, Ont., one of a posse of soldiers, have escaped from the dugout in which they were entrenched and have eluded the police who were hunting for them.
Another man is missing, a farmer named James Surgara, who lived half a mile from Gervais' cabin. He has not been seen since last Friday and it is suspected that he has been murdered by the bandits following the McKay killing.

POLISH SOLDIERS AND WORKMEN IN POWER

Amsterdam, Nov. 22.—The town of Posen and the greater part of the province in Prussia, are in Polish hands, according to Verlin Vorwaerts. The police in the Soldiers' and Workmen's organization have taken the reins of power and are forming a legion. They are in possession of the munitions and provisions.

WAR VESSELS VALUED AT \$228,000,000 TAKEN OVER BY ALLIES FROM GERMANS

VERY FEW SHIPS OF LARGER CLASS LEFT FOR HUNS AND NOT ONE SUBMARINE — IS CRIPPLED AS NAVAL POWER

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, November 22.—Vessels surrendered: Battleships, 9; Battle Cruisers, 5; Light Cruisers, 7; Destroyers, 50; Submarines, 19. Total, 90.
At 9:30 yesterday morning Germany surrendered to the British Grand Fleet a total of seventy-one surface ships of war, including fourteen of her super-dreadnoughts and monster battle cruisers. This leaves the Huns with very few war vessels of the larger class and not one submarine and has completely crippled Germany as a first class naval power.
The cost of the German warships to be surrendered under the armistice provisions is estimated to be at least \$228,000,000.
The names of the vessels actually handed over today were not given out.
Another flotilla of German U-boats surrendered today to a British squadron off Harwich. There were nineteen submarines in all, the twentieth, which should have come today, broke down on the way.

CALLS ON HOLLAND TO EXPEL KAISER

Le Temps Says It is an Outrage That He Should Enjoy Peaceable Existence.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, Nov. 22.—In discussing the position of the former German Emperor, Le Temps says: "The Government of Holland has always power to expel undesirable guests. Let it use this power. Nothing can excuse the outrage that the man who caused the death of millions should enjoy peaceable existence in a country which would have lost its independence if we had been defeated," declares the paper in conclusion.

RED CROSS SUPPLIES FOR WAR PRISONERS

Large Supplies Sent to Neutral Countries for Comfort of Liberated Men on Way Home.

In connection with the situation of the prisoners of war held by Germany, and who are now being sent home to their own countries, a telegram has been received by the local Red Cross Society from the head office in Toronto which reads as follows:
"The following cable has been received today from the Red Cross Chief Commissioner Overseas: 'In conjunction with the Central Prisoners Committee, food and clothing for 50,000 prisoners has been sent to Holland. Also today large supplies of drugs, medical comforts, invalid food supplies sent Denmark and Switzerland. Communication and authentic information most difficult. Everything possible being done.'
From Denmark, Holland and Switzerland the Allied prisoners now in Germany and on their way out will be succored, and every attention will now be given them after their long exile.

CANADA'S GREAT RECORD IN CONDUCT OF GREAT WAR; 418,980 MEN TOOK PART

STARTED WITH ONE DIVISION AND ENDED WITH THREE, IN ADDITION TO MANY OTHER SERVICES; THE CASUALTIES NUMBERED 211,000, WITH OVER 50,000 DEATHS.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, November 22.—The following statement, showing what has been accomplished from a military point of view by the Dominion since the beginning of the war, was issued yesterday by the Militia Department.
When Canada entered the war on August 4th, 1914, she had a permanent force of only 3,000 men and an active militia of 60,000.
When hostilities ceased on November 11, 1918, Canada had sent overseas 418,980 soldiers.
At first Canada supplied a division. This was increased until by 1916 she had in France an army corps of four divisions, a cavalry brigade and numerous other services, such as line of communication troops, railway troops and forestry corps.
On September 30, 1918, Canadian troops in France numbered 156,250. A cavalry brigade included a strong draft furnished by the Royal North West Mounted Police.
The Canadians engaged in United Kingdom and France in constructing and operating railway lines and in cutting down forests and milling timber about 50,000.
Of the Royal Air Forces, some 14,000 or 15,000 were raised and trained in Canada. In addition, many joined after going overseas in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces.
On October 31, 1918, the casualties numbered over 211,000. There had been over fifty thousand deaths; 152,000 had been wounded and when hostilities ceased the prisoners of war numbered 2,800.

LLOYD GEORGE ISSUES ELECTION ADDRESS

Says Military Institutions Must be Dependent on Needs of Empire and Preservation of Peace.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Nov. 22.—Lloyd George and Andrew Bonar Law have issued a long election address to the country. For the most part it follows the lines of speeches made recently by the two political leaders in outlining preparations for a preference to the colonies. It says, however, that until the country has returned to normal industrial conditions it would be premature to prescribe a fiscal policy intended for permanence.
"We must endeavor," the address says, "to reduce the war debts in such a manner as to inflict the least injury to industry and credit. The military institutions of the country must necessarily be dependent upon the needs of the Empire, its prospective requirements and necessities of the League for the Preservation of Peace."

LOST A LOT OF SUBMARINES

London, Nov. 22.—It was revealed today in connection with the armistice negotiations that Germany had lost 80 more submarines than the Allies were certain had been sunk.

WILL LEAVE GERMANY

Amsterdam, November 22.—All members of the Hohenzollern dynasty will leave Germany in the near future, according to a Frankfurt dispatch. Their destination is not yet known.

PARLIAMENT IS ADJOURNED

King's Speech Urges Continuance of Exertions Until Ravages of War Repaired.

London, Nov. 22.—Parliament was prorogued yesterday. The King's speech, which was read by commission, owing to his absence in Scotland, expressed "Humble thanks to Almighty God for the success with which it has pleased Him to crown our arms."
The King urged a continuance of "Exertions which have carried us to victory until the ravages of warfare are repaired and the fabric of national prosperity is restored."

**This Port in the Eye
 Of the World Commercially.**

The story that came through over the wire yesterday in connection with an ocean steamship service to run between Prince Rupert and Vladivostok may have been just so much talk, but even the fact that English visitors to the Orient are talking of such a thing seems to show that it is feasible and likely to become a reality before very long. Talk usually has to precede action, and this is the talking period which it is hoped will be followed by the real thing.

The trade relations between Prince Rupert and Siberia are pretty sure to be very close, following the war. With the opening of that country to the world there will be great developments there, and the people will need a great many of the things that we can supply. Prince Rupert stands a good chance of developing the ocean port business to a very large extent. It was what made Vancouver a big commercial port and it can do the same for us.

**Soldiers Wanting
 To Become Farmers.**

It is a surprise to hear that over one hundred thousand soldiers would like to go on the land as soon as the war is over. There were many who thought that no soldiers would wish to farm. There is of course the expectation that the Government will be prepared to deal liberally with the returned men. They have given their all to the country and it is only natural to expect that they will get a good deal in return. The fifteen thousand men who have chosen British Columbia should be easily accommodated. There is plenty of land, and if it is held by speculators, those people will have to disgorge. The soldiers must get their lands and other people who want to farm must get it.

So far the Provincial Government has made a commendable effort to open the lands of Northern British Columbia to settlers. The Land Settlement Board has just issued a pamphlet dealing with the northern lands containing a map of both the Bulkley River and the Nechako Valley areas. Before those are anything like exhausted there will be other areas ready. Telkwa and Vanderhoof are the railway centres of these lands respectively, and it is expected that as soon as spring opens there will be a movement to secure the lands on the terms offered by the board.

**Stewart Should Have
 Wharf and Steamer Service.**

There are few places with all the riches to be found at Stewart that have not a proper steamship service and a wharf at which to land freight and passengers. Stewart is very rich in mines bearing gold and copper and galena and molybdenum and silver and many other minerals, some high grade and some low. In many cases we are assured there are large ore bodies that will prove profitable to those who work them.

Bearing this in mind and seeing that nothing can be done unless facilities are provided it seems a pity that something cannot be done to give the people of that district what is so badly needed. If preparations are made at once to build the wharf it will not be ready much before spring, and in the spring there is going to be a rush to the Stewart camp that will be a surprise. The goods are there, and undoubtedly the miners will be after them.

**More Sport than
 Ever After War.**

There will be more sport than ever after the war is over. That is the opinion of those able to judge, and on the face of it seems probable. Since the war there has been a temporary cessation in the playing of games. The war has been so serious a sport that it has taken away all wish to frolic. The best of the young men, who formerly were to the fore in all games have taken part in the big game overseas and many of them will not return, sad to say. In spite of this, however, there will be somewhat of a revulsion from the too serious aspect of life and ball games and all sorts of sport features are likely to come back as soon as the boys come home.

GERMAN SHOT VICTORY LOAN CANVASSER

Party Visited House Late in the Evening to Try to Induce Him To Buy Bonds.

Mails arriving yesterday bring word of the shooting of a Victory Loan canvasser at Drumheller by a German who is supposed to have been formerly an officer in the German army. According to the account received an inquest was held on Wednesday night and the jury returned a verdict that Tip Blaine came to his death by gunshot wounds from a gun fired by Albert Arnold.

The shooting took place at Arnold's farm, which was visited by Blaine, accompanied by five other residents of Drumheller, named Steele, Wilson, Bishop, Hoaglund and Cunningham, who were canvassing the district for purchasers of Victory bonds.

The party had previously visited another German home, neighbors of Arnold, and they had purchased Victory bonds. This neighbor had warned the party about going to visit Arnold, as it was said that he was a bad one.

Enter House After Knocking.

Upon arriving at the Arnold place after dark, the party knocked at the door, and receiving no answer knocked again, and still no answer being made, entered, and opening an inner door, through which they went to Arnold's bedroom. Blaine was leading, having the Union Jack draped over his breast. Suddenly a shot was fired and Blaine fell. Arnold was then heard to shout, "Keep away, I am an expert shot," and immediately three more shots were fired, which scattered the party.

"I Am an Expert."

After the shooting of Blaine, Steel went back and asked if he could see the body of Blaine. Arnold compelled him to come in, his hands above his head, and then made him light a lamp. Arnold examined the body of the murdered man and said, "I guess I killed him. I am an expert with the rifle." He then ordered his guest to leave the premises, saying, "I will be gone in five minutes." Steele did so.

Find Blaine Dead.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel.

Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

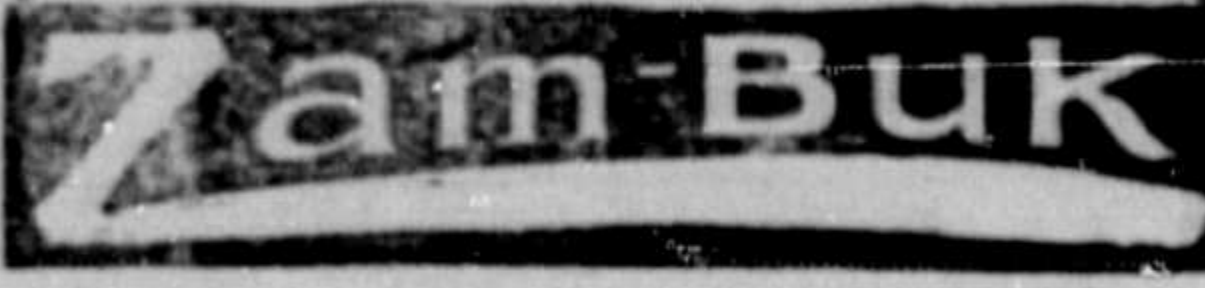

WAR RESTRICTIONS ON SECURITIES HAVE NOW BEEN REMOVED

(Special by G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, Nov. 21. — An announcement from Ottawa yesterday is to the effect that war-time restrictions on the issue of Provincial and Municipal securities has been rescinded and as a result Winnipeg bond dealers state there will be keen demand for money from western municipalities during the next year. Much work has been put off during the past four years awaiting the end of the war and the desire exists to have improvements made. Attention is called to the fact that there is more than one hundred million dollars' worth of municipal work left undone in Western Canada which would have been done if war had not intervened.

LUMBERMEN WILL TAKE CARE OF SOME TEN THOUSAND MEN

(Special by G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Nov. 21. — A favorable aspect of the labor situation is expressed in an effort of the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, to give employment to 10,000 men. The Association in a circular letter to its members says: "The Dominion Government had called upon this Association to assist in a demobilization scheme and the proposition is to find employment for 10,000 men, which is the number which it is estimated can be absorbed in the lumber camps throughout Canada east of Fort William. We have intimated to the Government that to be of any use at all for this purpose, men must be forthcoming within a week or ten days at the outside. Going wages for lumbermen are to be paid."

PLENTY OF SCOPE FOR INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITY

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 21. — Belgium will need raw materials, machines and railway equipment, France will need a million plows and other agricultural machines, and England and America and all other nations which have been opposed to Germany will need tens of thousands of houses.
