

REVOLUTIONARY ELEMENT IS MUCH IN EVIDENCE ON SURRENDERED SUBMARINES

PRUSSIAN EAGLE MISSING FROM OFFICERS CAPS AND SOME OF CREWS INTOXICATED; FIFTY-NINE SUBMARINES HANDED OVER SO FAR

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, November 23.—Twenty more German submarines were surrendered to Admiral Tyrwhitt off Harwich this morning. This makes a total of 59 submarines thus far handed over. There would have been 21 surrendered today but one sank during the night.

Harwich, England, Nov. 23.—Most of the submarines surrendered today were commanded by sub-lieutenants. One of them said his senior officer did not come because he had been mentioned in the British press as a marked man. The U-boat which was the victim of rough weather.

When the Germans arrived it was notable that the revolutionary element was decidedly present. Some of the officers had removed the Prussian eagles from their caps and replaced them with a sort of red badge, the recognized authority of the Sailors' and Soldiers' Council. There seemed to be little discipline among the lot. Men took little notice of anything their officers said to them. One "No officer, no Kaiser." The of one submarine, with the exception of an officer, were all intoxicated. The ships were in a filthy and demoralized condition.

VICTORY ON A WAVE OF OIL

Millions of Motor Trucks Made Movements of Allied Troops Possible With Railroads Congested.

OIL MEANS MORE THAN COALFIELDS

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Nov. 22.—Earl Curzon, member of the British War Cabinet, presided tonight at a dinner given by the British Government to the delegates to the Inter-Allied Petroleum conference. In toasting the French, American and Italian delegates, Earl Curzon declared that the Allied cause had been "floated to victory on a wave of oil." "Be sure," he continued, "that if it had not been for the great fleets of motor trucks the war could not have been won. In the last eighteen months the council has dealt with 13,000,000 motor vehicles of all kinds."

Senator Berenger of France said that the Germans thought to win because they owned coal and coalfields, but the Allies won with oil. It was a victory of automobiles over railroads. The United States by its ready response to the needs of the Allies never would be forgotten. Lieut.-Commander Burstow replied on behalf of the United States.

PAYS TRIBUTE TO BELGIANS

French Deputy in the Chamber Congratulates Liberated Belgium, the Friend of France.

WAR AND SUFFERING CEMENT FRIENDSHIP

Paris, Nov. 23.—At the beginning of the sittings of the Chamber of Deputies yesterday Paul Deschanel delivered a speech warmly felicitating liberated Belgium and paying a glowing tribute to the king and queen of the Kingdom.

M. Deschanel said France had been happy to receive during the German invasion the government of a people animated with the same ideals as France and who had fought and suffered with her. The blood of their respective sons, shed in the hard struggle, had cemented a friendship which would last as long as honor and justice obtained.

RAILROADS ARE TO GET THE READY CASH

All Shippers, Both Large and Small, Must Pay Cash for Freight.

PROMPT PAYMENTS REDUCE ACCOUNTING

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Montreal, Nov. 23.—Big shippers and little shippers alike must after next New Year's day, pay cash to railways for services rendered or furnish a bond covering the amount involved. Under bond, however, only 96 hours credit will be allowed. An order bringing the Canadian railway system into line with American railways in this respect is to be issued by the Canadian Railway War Board. The new order goes into effect next New Year's day.

DUTCH COULD NOT KEEP OUT KAISER

Had Abdicated Before Applying For Entry and Was Treated Just as Any Other Person.

Paris, Nov. 23.—The Dutch legation today published a note containing a declaration by the President of the Netherlands Council of Ministers and Chamber of Deputies, saying that the former Emperor entered Dutch territory after his abdication as a private personage. The note says that the kind of refuge granted to him is similar to that given all foreign refugees and that the Government could not make any exception on account of his former position when he asked to be admitted to Dutch territory.

WESTERN MAN GETS GOOD APPOINTMENT

Vancouver, Nov. 23.—Word was received in the city today of the appointment of P. J. Clarke, superintendent of the Bank of Montreal in British Columbia, to the position of general manager of the bank, with headquarters in Montreal.

NEW TRANSPACIFIC LINE WILL OPERATE

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—With the return of peace conditions a trans-Pacific steamship service is shortly to be re-established. It is announced here that the Canadian Robert Dollar Company will operate monthly mail and steamship service between Vancouver and Shanghai, Hongkong, Manila and Singapore.

The moral health of Prince Rupert remains good, as this morning there was nothing for the attention of the magistrate at the Police Court.

GREAT EXPENDITURES ON U.S. RAILROADS

Hundreds of Millions of Dollars to be Expended this Coming Year on Improvements and Equipments.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Programme of \$909,000,000 of expenditures for railroad additions and betterments and equipment already ordered but not delivered for remainder of this year and next year was announced today by the Railroad Administration. This does not include cars and locomotives which may be ordered next year.

SERIOUS AGITATION GOING ON IN CHILE

Buenos Ayres, Nov. 23.—Serious demonstrations against Peruvian business houses have occurred in Antofagasta, Chile, as a result of a false rumor that the Chilean Consul at Calao had been assassinated by Peruvians. The police were forced to use sabres in quelling the riots. There is reported to be a great agitation throughout Chile.

CAPT. SAUNDERS IS APPOINTED AS COMMODORE

Marine Parade on Wednesday is Expected to Be Biggest Affair of Its Kind Yet Held Here.

Capt. F. T. Saunders of Digby Island has been appointed commodore of the fleet at the big Marine Parade to be held on Wednesday morning next as part of the big peace celebration. The other members of the executive committee are: Fred Stork, chairman; T. H. Johnson, manager of the cold storage; R. Beaumont, superintendent of the G. T. P. steamships, and J. H. Meagher, secretary of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

Mr. Beaumont announces that for the occasion he expects to have the Prince George, the Prince Albert, the Tillamook and the tug Lorne here and that all will take part in the parade. The Cold Storage will have ten boats lined up, and every other institution at the port is expected to join and put in as many boats as possible.

The Commodore will arrange the order of precedence and in order that this may be properly worked out it is asked that entries be made on or before noon on Monday.

This is rather a novelty in local celebrations and it is hoped to make it an imposing affair.

CONFERENCE OF PREMIERS DISCUSSES MANY VITAL SUBJECTS AND ADJOURNS

QUESTION OF CONTROL OF NATURAL RESOURCES LEFT OVER FOR THE PRESENT; HON. GIDEON ROBERTSON INTRODUCES DISCUSSION ON TECHNICAL EDUCATION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—One definite result of the conference of Provincial Premiers with Federal Ministers is that for the present at least the Dominion Government will continue to administer the natural resources of the three prairie provinces.

The contention of the Western provinces that they should not be deprived of subsidies in the event of the handing over of the resources because these have already been to a great extent alienated, coupled with a demand on the part of Eastern provinces that they should be given at least \$5,000,000 in subsidies, made a solution of the question by the conference impossible.

The matter now rests with the Dominion Government, which, through Sir Thomas White, indicated at the opening of the conference the willingness of the Dominion to hand over to the provinces such resources as they might desire to control.

As already announced, the conference discussed the land colonization scheme prepared by Hon. J. A. Calder and the Soldiers' Settlement plan based on legislation passed last session and explained by Hon. Arthur Meighen. The demobilization plans of the Department of Militia were laid before the Ministers by Major-General Mewburn, while Hon. Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor, at yesterday's conference, brought up the question of technical education. This was further discussed at the closing session, the consensus of opinion being that the control of education in all its branches should remain with the provinces.

LUXEMBURG'S QUEEN SEES THE HUNS DEPART

Welcomes United States Troops To Her Capital, on Heels Of Retiring Germans.

LITTLE STATE WAS IN BONDAGE FOUR YEARS

Grand Duchess never Gave Way To German Authority Though Practically a Prisoner in Own Land.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Luxemburg, Nov. 23.—With General Pershing, the commander in chief of the United States forces, at her side, the youthful Grand Duchess of Luxemburg, from the balcony of her palace watched the American troops march into her capital yesterday. Only twenty-four hours before, the Grand Duchess had seen long columns of grey-clad German soldiers depart for their own country, after the occupation of her duchy for more than four years.

The Grand Duchess has been virtually a prisoner in her own capital since the beginning of the German invasion of the neutral territories, yet notwithstanding that the Germans were in possession of her little state from end to end, they were unable to bend her proud spirit, and obtain permission formal or otherwise from her for their invasion of her sovereign rights.

Although the Grand Duchess was unable to prevent the passing through her territory of the German armies, and although pressure was brought to bear upon her from all sources open to the German authorities, she spurned all attempts to gain her authority for the presence of foreign troops on her country's soil.

DEATH RATE FROM THE FLU

Higher in United States Than Eastern Canada, Says Ontario Health Officer.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, Nov. 23.—Statistics compiled by Dr. McCulloch, chief officer of health for Ontario, indicates that in none of the cities of this province was the death rate from influenza and complications as great as in United States centres. Toronto's death rate is given as 327 per 100,000. Kingston was the hardest hit in Ontario, the rate being 644 per 100,000; Winnipeg, 281; Camp Sherman, Ohio, where 33,000 soldiers were encamped, had the heaviest death rate of all, it being 2,551 to 100,000 of population.

Celebration to Be A Big Event.

The celebration of peace which is to take place here on Wednesday will be a big event. Undoubtedly the Prince Rupert people will throw themselves into the spirit of the thing unreservedly. A gay abandon is what is looked for, when everyone will give themselves up unreservedly to enjoyment. It will be an occasion when we can forget the cares of business for a time and be frivolous.

There will be events to appeal to all classes. Those who have boats are asked to join the boat parade, no matter what the class of boat owned. Plenty of bunting will help to make it picturesque. It is hoped to have well over one hundred boats in the marine parade, and everyone with a craft that will float is expected to join.

Gigantic Lumber Company for Soldiers.

It is a pretentious scheme, that returned soldiers' lumber company. Something of the sort was mooted a year or so ago, but was rather frowned down by the Great War Veterans' Association committee that investigated it. Now apparently it is being done independently of any association. If it can provide a good living for 1,500 returned men it will be worth doing, especially as it has to do with the exploitation of the natural resources of the country.

The officials of the company are well known capitalists but whether or not they are to share in the profits of the company has not been stated. If it is purely a scheme to make money out of the returned men it will fail as it deserves. Its activities will be watched with interest, especially in view of the fact that this is somewhat of a lumbering district.

Millions of Dollars' Worth of Junk.

There are millions of dollars' worth of junk lying in the Firth of Forth today. The British navy is already big enough without German additions. More ships are not wanted. No other nation wants them, except perhaps Japan, and it would not be good policy for her to have them.

If the League of Nations can so arrange matters, there seems no good reason why the navies of the world should not be reduced to the size of a police force. Japan is the only nation that has any power to object, and with the United States and Great Britain standing together, there is no reason to believe she will object.

No Need of Navy To Subjugate the World.

Japan has a stronger force than the navy. She has what Germany once had, but which she had not sense enough to stick to. She has an industrious and skilled people that are willing to work for low wages. With that weapon she can subjugate the world. She can undersell every other nation and capture every market. Like the Germans the Japanese are virile people and very ambitious.

Japan is the most to be feared of any nation in the world. The only hope in the situation is that her people will become wise to the situation and will demand wages just as high as those paid here. It is not likely that this can happen at once, but the workingmen should see to it that they are educated along this line, for the danger is greater to the laboring classes, so called, than to any other. There is some awakening already but with Japanese seamen paid little over \$20 a month it is quite clear that Canadians at 60 to \$80 a month cannot compete. In every other line of endeavor there is a similar difference.

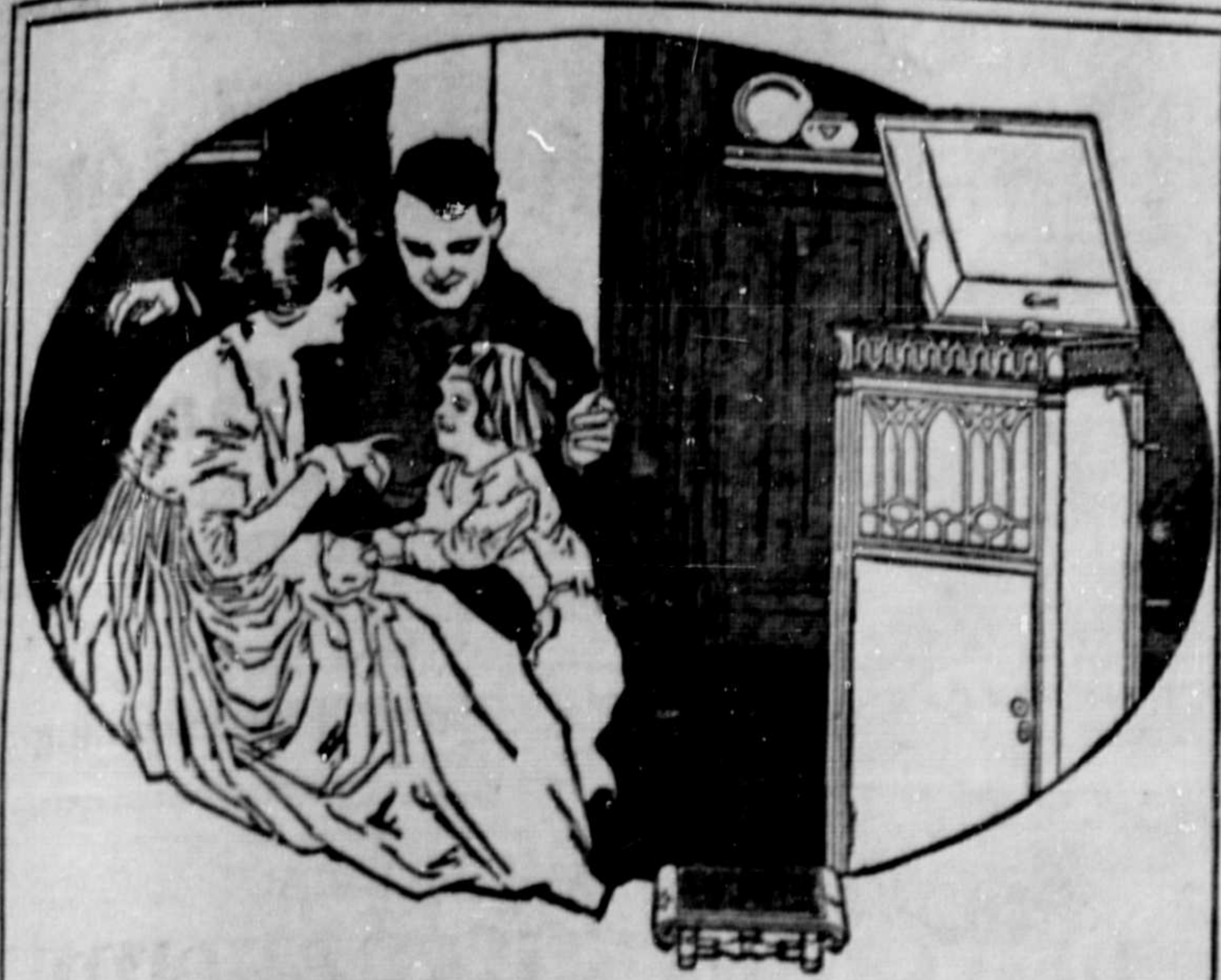

Splendid Showing of Properties in The Valley Warrants Greater Consideration.

WHARF IS NECESSARY TO CONDUCT OF THE WORK

Stewart, Nov. 22.—People here are on edge wondering when Sir Donald Mann is to start to open up his properties. He has some very highly mineralized claims here, probably the best that can be found, and he promised that as soon as the war was over he would commence to open them up and operate the railway which was built some years ago. Although he was offered a good price for his rails, much more than he gave for them, he refused to sell and now everything is ready once some little repair work has been done, to commence operations.

is out securing horses and outfit with which to haul the ore from his mine to the wharf. He is expected to arrive back soon and bring the stuff with him and then the activity will commence. The Provincial Government, it is understood, has spent about \$7,500 in helping to build the road from the Bush property to tide-water, but the Dominion Government has not done its part by providing a wharf. This may be rectified in the spring, but in the meantime the place is badly handicapped. Some development work has been going on all summer at the George Copper Mine up the Bear River above the Redcliffe property. This ore will have to be shipped over the railway, however, and until it is in operation no large amount of work can be done.

Copper Showing.
Across the valley from the George mine is the Red Top group. There is a big copper showing but little work has been done on it so far. It is altogether probable, however, that this property may prove very valuable and it will add to the shipping capabilities of the district. There is a galena prospect above the copper which has not yet been developed.

Antimonial Lead.
Jimmie Nesbett and Andy Archie, two old prospectors who are well known in the district, have an antimonial lead property at Glacier Creek above the Portland Canal mine. This is a part of the Ruth-Francis group. It has a six-foot face of solid ore. At the Lakeview group the Granby people ran a tunnel but with no results. The general opinion seems to be however that there is yet plenty of ore there if it is developed. Another property owned by

Nesbett and Archie that some day will be investigated is the Prince John just above Stewart on the Bear River. There is a very promising showing of low-grade copper ore and it is close to transportation. The owners have a crosscut tunnel running 100 feet.

Molybdenum.
There is a fair showing of molybdenum on a property just across from Stewart townsite on the opposite bank of Bear River. This might develop into a mine.

In view of the showings made by these properties and the prospects of great development work now that the war is over it seems queer that the Government should delay over the little matter of repairing the dock which at present is quite useless.

COMPANIES ADOPT SIMPLE BOOKKEEPING

(Special via C. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, Nov. 22.—Packing companies, whose sales exceed \$100,000,000 a year, have agreed to adopt the new simplified system of bookkeeping, so that the Food Administration can keep a closer supervision of the profits.

Such supervision continues under the Federal Trade Commission despite the signing of the armistice and the consequent relief in the food situation. Changes do not affect the percentage of profit packers are permitted to make upon food.

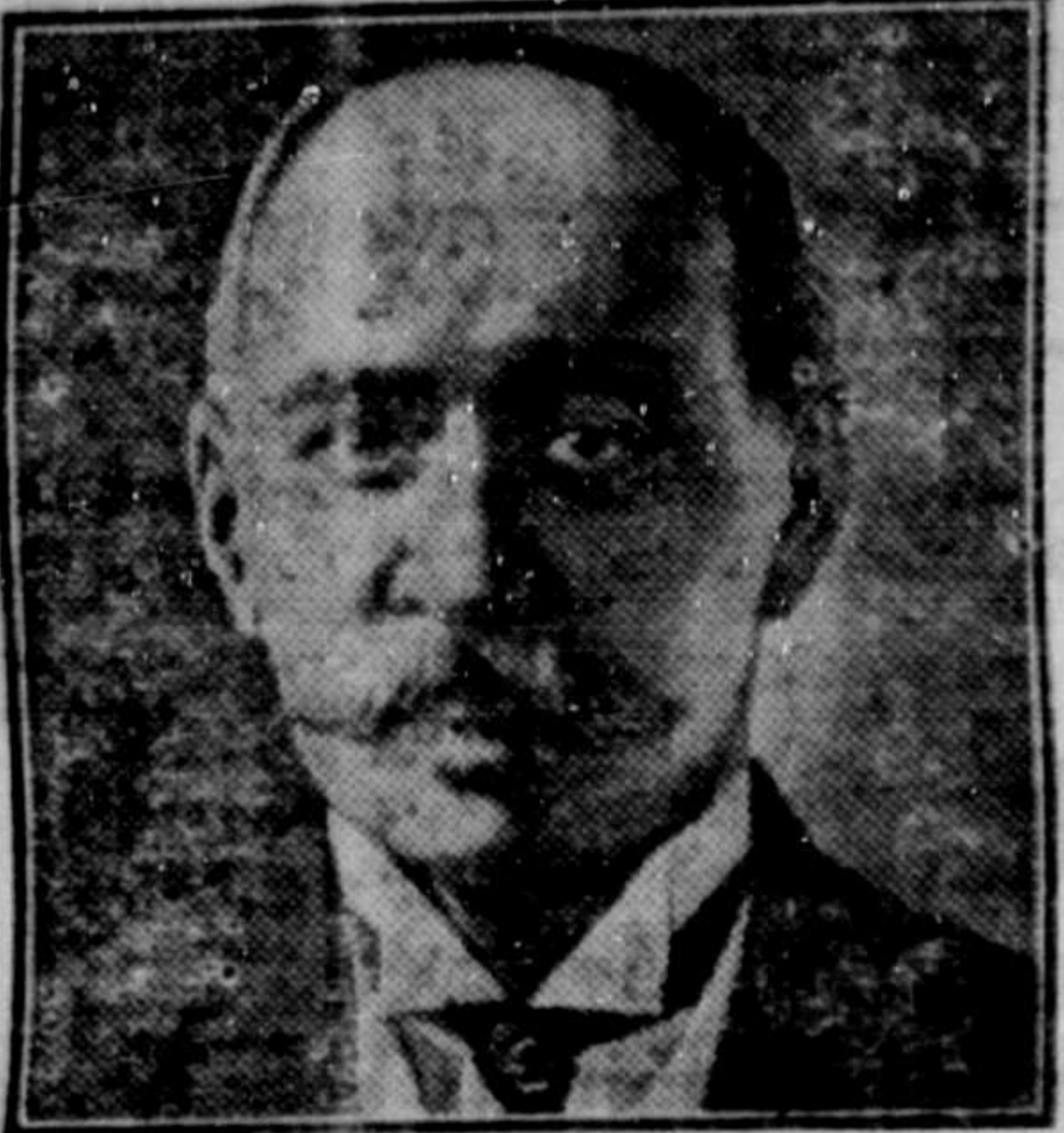

FORMAL COMPLAINT AGAINST MAGISTRATE BY POLICE OFFICIAL

Local Commissioners to Meet Mr. Carss on Monday and Discuss Matter With Him.

At the meeting of the Police Commission yesterday afternoon Sub-Inspector Adams of the Dominion police laid a formal complaint against the manner in which cases had been tried by Magistrate Carss, and particularly against the smallness of the fines which had been inflicted.

The inspector said that he had made a complaint to the Attorney General, explaining that it was useless for him to secure evidence and bring cases up when the fines inflicted were so small that they were no deterrent. The Attorney General advised that the matter be taken up by the local Police Commission and a meeting with Magistrate Carss has been arranged for Monday next to discuss the whole matter of convictions and fines in the police court.

There are other local cases which it is understood that the commissioners will take up at the same time, especially some complaints in regard to liquor cases.

MUCH LIVE STOCK HAS BEEN IMPORTED INTO THE INTERIOR

R. A. Hunt, representing the Land Settlement Board, arrived from Victoria during the past week, and has been at Telkwa on business connected with the shipment of cattle recently brought from the prairie under the lead of the board, says the Interior News. That the importation of cattle was considerably larger than reported was the announcement made by F. S. Short, while in Smithers this week. Mr. Short was buying representative to the prairie for the Telkwa-Round lake ring, and he returned in charge of six carloads of stock, five for purchasers through the Land Settlement Board and one which he and J. W. Anderson brought in for sale.

The stock is practically all yearling heifers of the beef class and the shipment will be distributed as follows:—F. M. Dockrill, 21; W. F. Wakefield, 20; R. E. Wakefield, 10; E. Lemieux, 5; R. E. Williams, 20; Wm. Croteau, 20; F. S. Short, 22; Ira G. Short, 15; J. Bakke, 15; E. C. Barger, 15; Jos. Bourgon, 15.

Under the same plan Messrs. Wilson and Barrett each brought in four carloads for the Glanlanna and Houston farmers respectively. At the same time one carload was brought in by private enterprise, and dropped off at Burns Lake for sale to the ranchers in that section, making a total importation of fifteen carloads of cattle to the Bulkley Valley during the past two weeks.

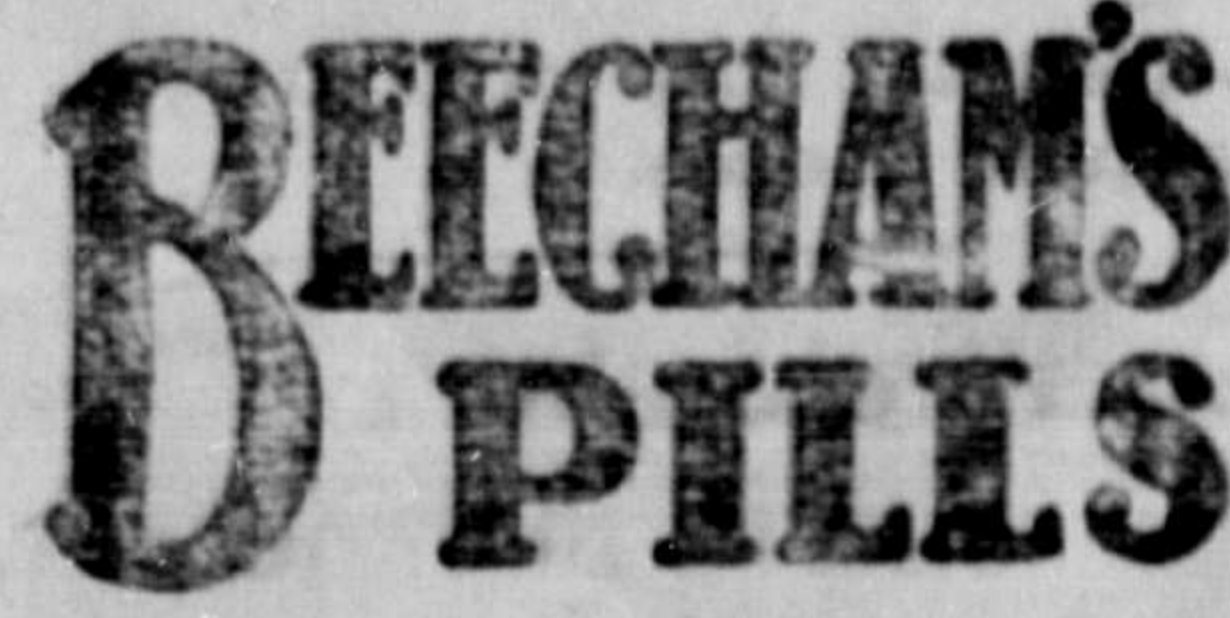

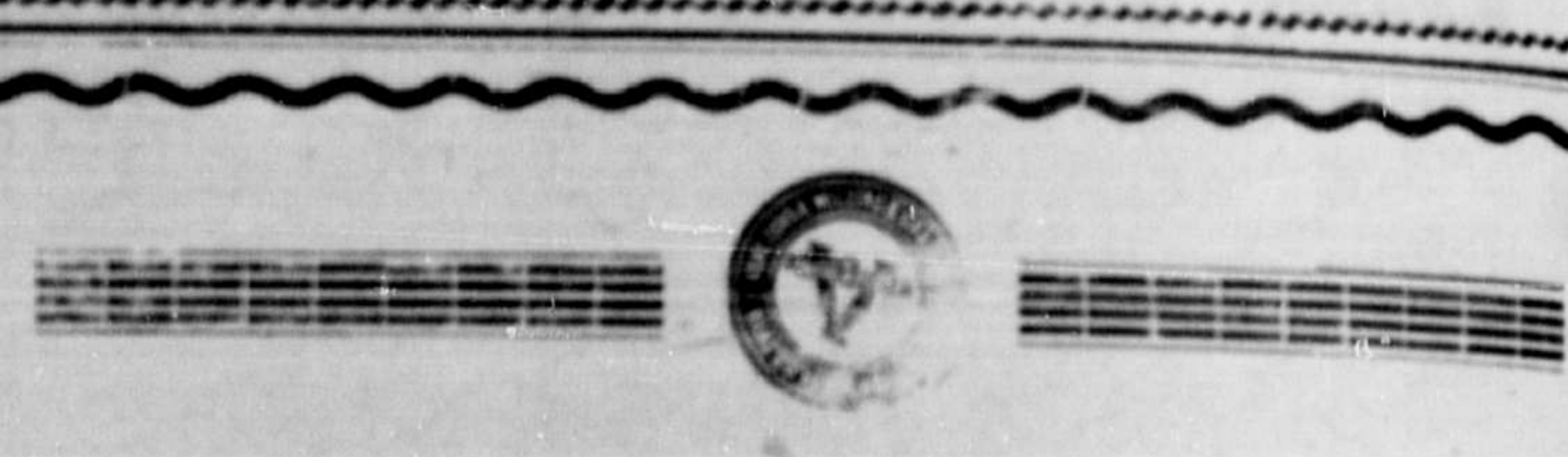

UNITED STATES LOST 354,449 TONS IN WAR

Total of 145 Vessels and 775 Lives
Lost Through Acts of
The Enemy.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, Nov. 22.—The loss of 145 American passenger and merchant vessels of 354,449 tons and 775 lives through acts of the enemy during the period from the beginning of the world war to the conclusion of hostilities on November 11, is shown by figures made public today by the Department of Commerce Bureau of Navigation.

The report does not include several vessels, the loss of which has not been established as due to acts of the enemy.

Nineteen vessels and 67 lives were lost through acts of torpedoes, mines and gunfire prior to the entrance of the United States into the war.

SENDING SOLDIERS TO GET ON THE LAND

Bills to Be Introduced At Next
Session of House to Give
Effect to Conference
Plans.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Introduction of bills at the next session of Parliament to enable land colonization and soldiers' settlement schemes (discussed at the Conference of Provincial Premiers here) to be brought into effect is considered likely. The first of these projects, introduced to the conference by Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration and Colonization, involves the purchase by the provinces, with money lent to them by the Dominion, of privately owned, undeveloped land, and the sale of this land on easy terms to settlers.

The second scheme suggested by Hon. Arthur Meighen, Minister of the Interior, provides for giving additional aid to returned soldiers desirous of settling on the land.

GREENWOOD SMELTER

On account of having found that the pay-grade ore in the Mother Lode mine, is a little greater in quantity than anticipated, the C. G. Co. is still able to ship ore from the mine and keep the smelter running, says the Greenwood Ledge. It is not possible to estimate the exact date when the smelter will have secured all this ore, and will continue to operate, possibly for two weeks more.

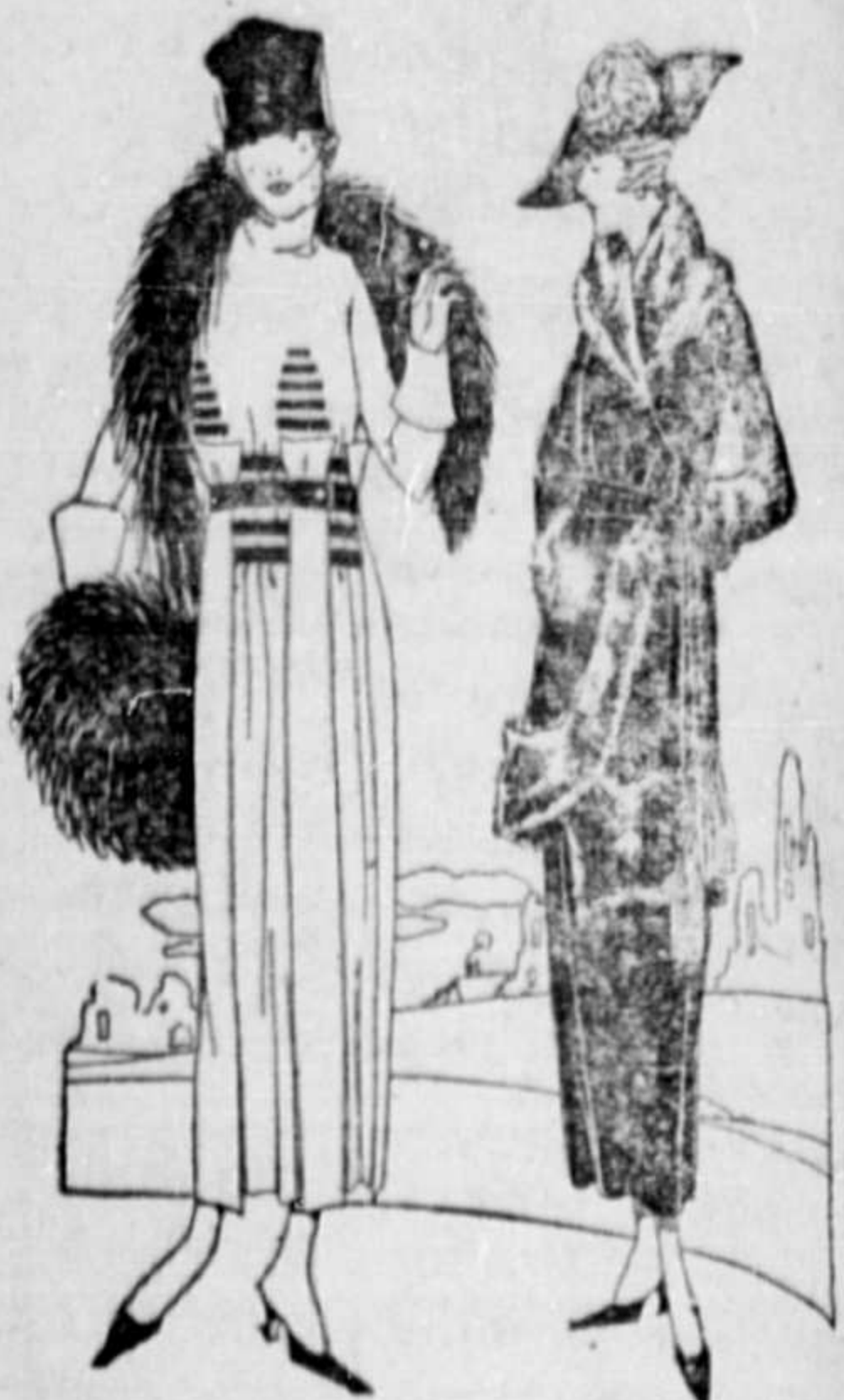
