## FAMOUS SUBMARINES ARE HANDED OVER TO BRITISH IN PRESENCE OF SIR ERIC

**DEUTSCHLAND HAD TWO CAPTURED AMERICAN OFFICERS ON BOARD; U-139 HAD SUNK 126 VESSELS AND HER COMMANDER HAD BEEN GIVEN DECORATION**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Harwich, England, Nov. 25.—In the presence of Sir Eric Geddes, First Lord of the Admiralty, 28 German U-boats surrendered Saturday. This was the most imposing flotilla to haul down the German flag thus far. It included several large submarines and four of the cruiser type, one being nearly 350 feet in length.  
The noted cruiser submarine Deutschland U-153 was among the number. She carried two American officers who had been rescued from the American army cargo ship Ticonderoga, torpedoed on September 30 last. The officers were taken to Kiel by the Deutschland which was returning from a three months' cruise in American waters and, were landed at Harwich. Another surrendered boat was the U-139 which had just returned to a German port after a 64 days' cruise commanded by Lieut.-Commander Arnauld De-Laperriere who in 1916 was awarded the Order Pour Le Merite for sinking 126 vessels. The U-139, however, was brought in by the first lieutenant, who explained that Perriere was too ill to undertake the duty.

Holland has disposed of the Crown Prince. Now she has the Kaiser to deal with.

## NEGOTIATIONS IN PROGRESS FOR TRANSPACIFIC LINE OF STEAMERS FROM THIS PORT

**MANAGER OF GRAND TRUNK STEAMSHIPS SAYS MORE THAN ONE CONCERN AT PRESENT NEGOTIATING AND MAKING INVESTIGATION REGARDING ROUTE**

"Yes, we are negotiating in regard to the establishment of a line of steamships between Prince Rupert and the Orient. The principals are now in this country making investigations and it is not at all improbable that something may come of it." That was the reply of Captain C. H. Nicholson, manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamships, who was in the city yesterday, to a query from a Daily News representative.

Captain Nicholson was quite enthusiastic over the possibility of there being "something doing" here in the near future. He said that it would not take very long to put in a dock, once there was a certainty that the steamships would be coming. In an emergency the present dock could be utilized until the new one was ready.

### The New Dock Site.

The new dock, he explained, would be a jetty running almost at right angles to the shore and would be built at the far end of the townsite beyond Section 2. There piles could be driven and a dock of the right kind built so that the ships coming here would be able to tie up easily.

Discussing the matter of freights the Captain said that of course these were variable. He anticipated no difficulty. Sometimes the balance of trade was eastbound and sometimes west, but the district here ought to provide a good deal of the freight for a line of steamships and the railway would do the rest.

Captain Nicholson said that there were a good many people making inquiries in regard to the route. One new firm that had never taken the matter up before had been inquiring quite recently and he had provided them with all the necessary data. They were now gone to New York and other eastern centres to make inquiries and then intended returning and crossing to Siberia to see what were the prospects at that end.

There was nothing at all sure about these things, but the very fact that people were making inquiries showed that they were looking to this route as the solution of the transportation question insofar as Siberia was concerned, and even with Japan there was a decided advantage in time and cost.

## ALBERTA BANDITS AND MURDERERS ARE TAKEN

**Were Found Hiding in Straw Stack in State of Collapse from Hunger.**

Prince Albert, Sask., Nov. 25.—Victor Carmel and Jean Baptiste St. Germain, bandits, who murdered James McKay and Corp. Horsley, were captured yesterday in a straw stack at the farm of Charles W. Young on the bank of the North Saskatchewan River, six miles east of here.  
They were in a state almost bordering upon collapse from hunger and exposure and were taken without a struggle.

## KING ALBERT MAKES SPEECH FROM THRONE

**Promises Equal Suffrage For All Men of Mature Age in Nation.**

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Brussels, Nov. 25.—King Albert has been received enthusiastically by the inhabitants of his regained capital. He made an important speech from the throne in Parliament, his first utterance in the capital since almost the beginning of war. Near the throne stood General Plummer, representing the British army, General Pershing of the American army and other generals. The Chamber was filled with members and in the galleries was the diplomatic corps.

One of the most vital points in the King's address dealt with suffrage for Belgium and in this connection he said the Government proposes two chambers, to lower by patriotic agreement the ancient barriers and to make consultation of the nation a reality on the basis of equal suffrage for all men of mature age required for exercise of civil rights.

## CANADA WILL HELP REBUILD

**Finance Minister Offers Extensive Credit for Supplies Purchased in This Country to Repair Devastated Lands.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Nov. 25.—Sir Thomas White declares that the statement which has been made that Canada will offer to forego all claim for indemnity against Germany if the bill on dollars expended in Canada for materials be used in the reconstruction of northern France and Belgium, is without foundation.

The question of indemnity as against Germany has no bearing upon the right which Canada asserts of participating with other allies in the business arising out of the restoration by the Allies of France, Belgium and other devastated countries.

The position is that the Prime Minister took with him to England memorandum prepared by the Minister of Finance offering an extensive credit in Canada for the purchase of materials and supplies to be used in the work of construction. In return for this credit which would be expended entirely in Canada, the Government would accept securities of an inter-allied credit or securities of one or more of the nations concerned.

The Salmon Fishermen's Union at its meeting yesterday decided to take part in the big parade on Wednesday and to be represented on the float which is to be prepared by the Trades and Labor Council.

## TO PROTECT MEN WHO WORK IN THE MILLS

At the recent meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council a delegation was received from a mill up the river in the neighborhood of Terrace. The men complained that they found it difficult to secure their checks and then when the checks were obtained they were charged a discount for cashing them.

The Council decided to take legal advice on behalf of the men and to back them up in the matter of getting their grievances adjusted. It was suggested that while it may cost a little money it was best to take up a question of this kind right at the first in order to nip the grievance in the bud.

Alderman Barrie met with a nasty accident this morning, necessitating medical attention. He was moving an automobile which went faster than he expected, causing him to overbalance and fall. His head struck a projection from the machine and a very severe cut was inflicted right to the bone. Mr. Barrie lost a lot of blood before his wound was stitched.

## WONDERFUL SILENCE AND SURENESS OF NAVY MADE FINAL VICTORY POSSIBLE

**CONGRATULATIONS OF ADMIRALTY GIVEN TO SEA FORCES FOR SPLENDID RESULTS OBTAINED DURING LONG FOUR-YEAR CAMPAIGN**

London, November 25.—The Admiralty has addressed a message of felicitation to the Royal Navy and Royal Marines as follows:—"The Admiralty desires to express to the officers and men of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines on the completion of their great work, their congratulations on the triumph to which history knows no parallel. The surrender of the German fleet, accomplished without the shock of battle, will remain for all time an example of the wonderful silence and sureness with which our sea power attained its end. The world recognizes that this consummation is due to the steadfastness with which the navy has maintained its pressure on the enemy throughout more than four years of war, a pressure exerted no less insistently during the long monotony of waiting than in rare opportunities of attack.

Negotiations Regarding Transpacific Line.

The interview given by Captain Nicholson in regard to the inauguration of a Pacific steamship line is very interesting. It is an indication that company is alive to the situation and is leaving no stone unturned in the effort to build up this port. It means everything to them just as it means everything to the rest of the citizens, to have some real business doing here.

It is quite possible that the present negotiations will not be successful and that we shall not see the liners here before Christmas. It is also possible and even probable that before very long there will be more than one line of ships making this port its headquarters on this side of the Pacific. A fast mail service between Vladivostok and London would make great time this way, and the silk shipments from Japan and China would reach the market by this route much quicker than by any other. Most of the transpacific liners almost pass our doors for they go within sight of the Aleutian Islands.

Coal is naturally a difficult problem, but it must be remembered that the liners that used to call at Portland often came across to Comox to get their coal, and Comox is farther from Portland than it is from Prince Rupert.

Christmas Shopping Has Commenced.

Christmas shopping may now be said to be well under way. The stores are already assuming somewhat of a holiday appearance, and by the end of this week buying should be in full swing. It will be well for shoppers to keep in touch with the advertising pages of The Daily News, for this paper will have some interesting announcements to make on behalf of storekeepers. All the best of the merchants' names will be found in the list.

One piece of advice is always in order, and that is to shop early. By the time Christmas week is here the goods will all have been culled over and the best gone. Also there will be such a rush at that time that it will be difficult to secure such attention from the store clerks as is desirable.

Just a Matter of Relative Importance.

We are always hearing of the wonderful work done by the Canadians and the Australians in the war. In the later days the American army has led in the matter of publicity. The Scotch regiments and even the Welsh fusiliers have been to the fore, but to judge from the Canadian newspaper reports England never did anything. For that reason it is rather refreshing to read in the latest issue of Saturday Night, a strictly Canadian journal, that 76 per cent of all the British casualties were English. The Saturday Night says: England is at last beginning to realize that her morbid horror of brag has been a great help in the planting everywhere of the German lie that the people of the British Isles have made fewer sacrifices than those of other Allied nations and of the other parts of the Empire. When Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, a bold and determined enemy of the Germans if ever there was one, visited the Australian front the other day he told the men that 72 per cent of the whole British force come from England, and that 70 per cent of the casualties were English. England's effort has become a matter of course. But grief and anxiety, loss of money and of home, whatever the war has brought, is borne bravely and silently.

Fishermen Minded By False Information.

The absolute necessity of getting the correct information before acting on it, is well illustrated in connection with a meeting of the Salmon Fishermen's Union held yesterday. A map was laid before them which was labelled incorrectly and action which they took based on it makes the fishermen appear foolish in the eyes of the public who know better. The proper information was available, but there seems to have been a deliberate attempt to deceive, or to say the least a gross carelessness which is inexcusable.

The Cow Bay affair is a very small one, and some of the actions of those who have been trying to make capital out of it are even more petty. It seems a pity that when someone tries to make improvements, there is always someone else ready to step in and try to block the scheme.

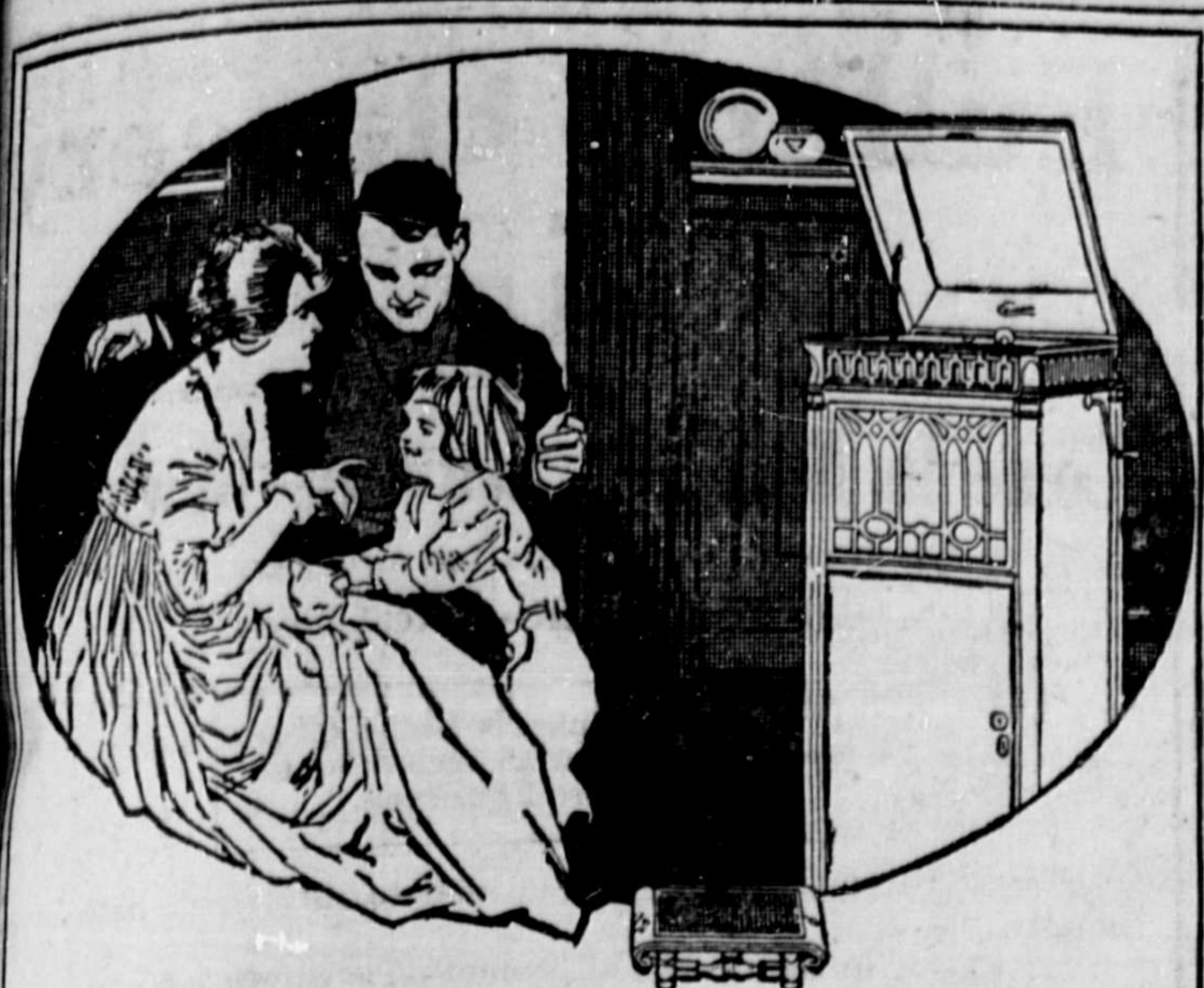

## RECOGNIZES CAPT. WALKER'S BRAVE WORK

Capt. Newcombe of the Malaspina Says Skippers of Vessels that Went to Rescue Deserve Praise.

### TOOK LIVES IN OWN HANDS IN BIG STORM

Men Did Not Hesitate When Asked to Proceed to Sea in Teeth of Gale.

"I want through the medium of your paper to make public recognition of the services rendered by Captain Walters of the trawler G. E. Foster who went out in the face of a howling storm without a moment's hesitation to try to lend aid to the patrol steamer Galiano. He did this even though he rose practically from a sick bed to do so. He deserves every credit for the unselfish manner in which he undertook the task. In doing so he took great risk and I think that public recognition should be made of his work." That was a statement made by Capt. H. Newcomb of the sister patrol steamer Malaspina which is now in port to a representative of The News.

Captain Newcombe went on to say that he included in his recognition the captains of the three steam whalers and also the skipper of the tug Tatoosh, all of whom went at once and took great risks, cruising close to the rocky coast and throwing rockets in order that, if possible, communication might be made with possible survivors of the lost steamer. The captain said that many people did not realize just what this meant. The captains and crew of these boats took their lives in their hands and great credit was due them for the prompt manner in which they had responded.

The Malaspina has for the past week or more been cruising in the neighborhood of where the vessel was supposed to have been lost, that is in latitude 52.11 north and 130.30 west. No sign of wreckage or anything to indicate that there had been a wreck was to be seen. The weather had not been bad but the cruise had been fruitless.

The Malaspina officers and crew are particularly interested in the fate of the sister ship, for eight members of the crew of the Malaspina were on the Galiano at the time she was lost. When the Galiano was in Esquimalt just before sailing on the fateful cruise, eight of the men had been put ashore suffering with influenza and eight from the Malaspina had taken their places.

### G. T. P. WILL CARE FOR STEWART BUSINESS SOQN

Captain Nicholson of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamships, stated to a Daily News representative Saturday that they were preparing to take care of the Stewart business. Just now there was little doing there, and there would not be much stirring until spring. In the meantime they would be able to give them a service that would answer all purposes.

The Islands service will remain as at present until the end of the year when changes will be made. Just what those changes will be is rather too soon to state definitely.

### UNION REPUBLIC

Amsterdam, Nov. 23.—In a proclamation to the Saxon people the new Government of Saxony, according to a telegram from Dresden, declares it is striving for the abolition of the old federal constitution and for the union of the Saxon and German peoples in a republic to include German Austria.

### FISHERMEN MEET

Incorrect Information Leads the Union to Take Action—Will Meet City Council Tonight.

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last week a committee composed of J. H. Meagher, W. H. Montgomery and Bob Hanna waited on the council and tried to persuade them to disapprove the Government scheme for improvement of the Cow Bay frantage. The members refused to be stampeded and decided to take no action without fuller information and consideration. It was decided that the Trades and Labor Council would pledge itself to support the fishermen's combined organizations and to offer any support they could give in assisting to bring about a solution of the waterfront question in the best interest of the fishermen and the fishing industry.

Yesterday the Salmon Fishermen met and decided to meet the City Council tonight to protest against the improvements which the Provincial Government is about to make. This protest is based on some old labels which were placed on the original plans which was drawn by the engineer; to cover the whole scheme and do not at present apply. This was known to some of the members of the Salmon Fishermen's Union, but the false information was put before the members of the union and their opposition to the plan secured.

It is understood that the Salmon Fishermen will lay before the City Council tonight some of the needs of the fishermen in regard to waterfront.

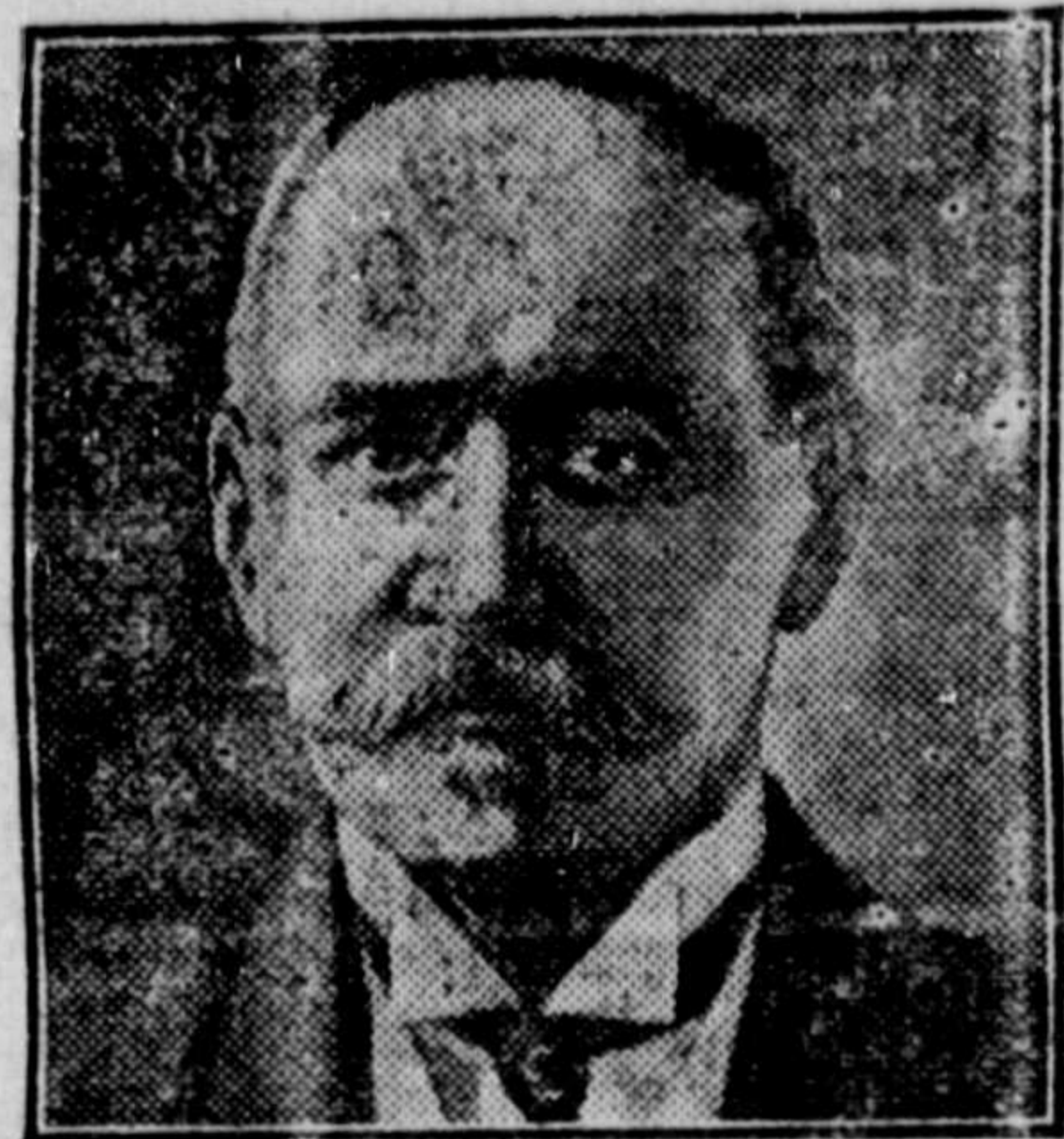

## SIR DONALD MANN ACQUIRES MINE IN STEWART DISTRICT

Big Missouri Property is Near Railway Built by Magnate For Development Purposes.

Sir Donald Mann has acquired, for the second time, the Big Missouri mine in the Portland Canal district, and it is understood that operations on a large scale are contemplated shortly, says the Vancouver Province. This property is reported to be one of the biggest mineral showings in British Columbia. It was located by Dan and Andy Lindeborg some years before the Portland Canal boom. Sir Donald first took the property under an option in 1910, but did not take it up and the property reverted to the Lindeborgs, who have held it since.

While several mining engineers placed their approval upon it, the ore is said to be of such low grade that as a mining proposition only a company capable of working it on an extensive scale can handle it. It is situated just beyond Nona Lake and comprises sixteen full claims and four fractions. The main mineralization and development is on one claim and the assays are in iron, zinc, lead and copper.

The development consists of a series of open cuts paralleling the general trend of the ore zone and proves the ore to extend to a width of 1000 feet on one claim. The average assays from many samples taken will run to the ton 60c in gold, \$1.05 in silver, 2.16 per cent. lead, 0.53 per cent. copper, and 5 per cent. zinc. On another claim a thirty-foot tunnel has been driven into the ore body, which looks better than where exposed by open cutting.

It is understood that Sir Donald Mann intends to put diamond drills at work as soon as possible with a view of determining the depth of the ore bodies. While the mine is located some twelve miles from tidewater it is, nevertheless, close to rail transportation, for in 1910 Sir Donald, as one of his personal enterprises, built a fourteen-mile standard-gauge railway from Stewart up Bear River Valley, and also built one of the most substantial wharves in the northern part of the province.

## TO INSPECT MINE

M. B. Fairlie on Coast in Connection With Property at Windy Arm, Atlin.

A melancholy task has brought to the coast two eastern mining men, M. B. Fairlie, manager of the Mining Corporation of Ontario, and F. G. Stevens, an engineer for the same company.

They are here to fill the duty which brought out the late C. E. Watson and George O. Randolph, both of whom perished in the Princess Sophia disaster, in inspecting and reporting on property in B. C. Messrs. Watson and Randolph were coming south from an inspection of the Engineer mine at Windy Arm, Atlin, together with Captain Alexander, owner of the mine, and his wife, when the disaster to the Sophia carried them all to death.

Mr. Fairlie, whose headquarters are at Cobalt, is disinclined to discuss mining ventures at the present time. He, however, speaks highly of the future of silver mining. While increased cost of production has kept pace with enhanced value of the precious metal, he says the Cobalt camp has done remarkably well. There has been a serious shortage of labor, however, for the past year. His company is one of the principal operators in that area. Influenza has laid its hold recently on the camp, he states.

Mr. Fairlie and his colleague will look into a number of properties in British Columbia, where transfers are pending.

The Engineer mine, which was the immediate cause of their visit has been visited by a number of experts with a view to acquisition prior to Captain Alexander's death. Each of the levels turned away from the shaft on No. 4 vein discloses the ore showing up well, carrying better values than in the surface open cuts. A small force was at work all last year.

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim to another person.  
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same for year before to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.  
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

## TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the first day of October, 1918. An application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

## INTERIOR INDIANS HAVE HARD TIME

Many Die From Influenza and None to Bury Dead in Some Localities.

According to reports from the Clinton section Spanish influenza has about reached the peak of its ravages and signs of improvement are beginning to appear. In the most recent report which chronicled the death, in the midst of his labors, of Dr. McPhail, there were said to be 1,400 cases under treatment all of whom were without medical attention for the time being. By arrangement, however, Dr. Young, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, was able to extend the work of Dr. Newton, who had taken in hand the situation along the line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway to the Clinton end of steel; conditions were thus improved.

In the report of the Provincial Police Officer, made to Deputy Inspector Edens, under whose jurisdiction this section comes, a particularly distressing situation among the Indians is disclosed. Chief Constable Aiken says that information reaching him from Big Bear indicates that in one house a female corpse had perforce to remain for five days, as all the rest of the household were victims of the disease, and totally unable to bury the body. In addition to ministering to the immediate demands of the stricken vicinity the constable dispatched by Chief Aiken was obliged to bury two bodies which had lain for some time.

While at 150-Mile House installing a constable, Chief Aiken—the author of the report to Deputy Inspector Edens—had the misfortune to contract the disease, and was held over an extra day there on account of a case for trial. The justice who sat on the case also contracted the disease on the same day, and has since died of pneumonia following Spanish influenza. Cold clear weather is expected to improve conditions.

The Dominion Government has authorized the expenditure of \$1,500 to relieve the situation among the Shuswap Indians, and the essence of a report from the Provincial Police to the Indian Agent of the locality is that conditions were found to be appalling.

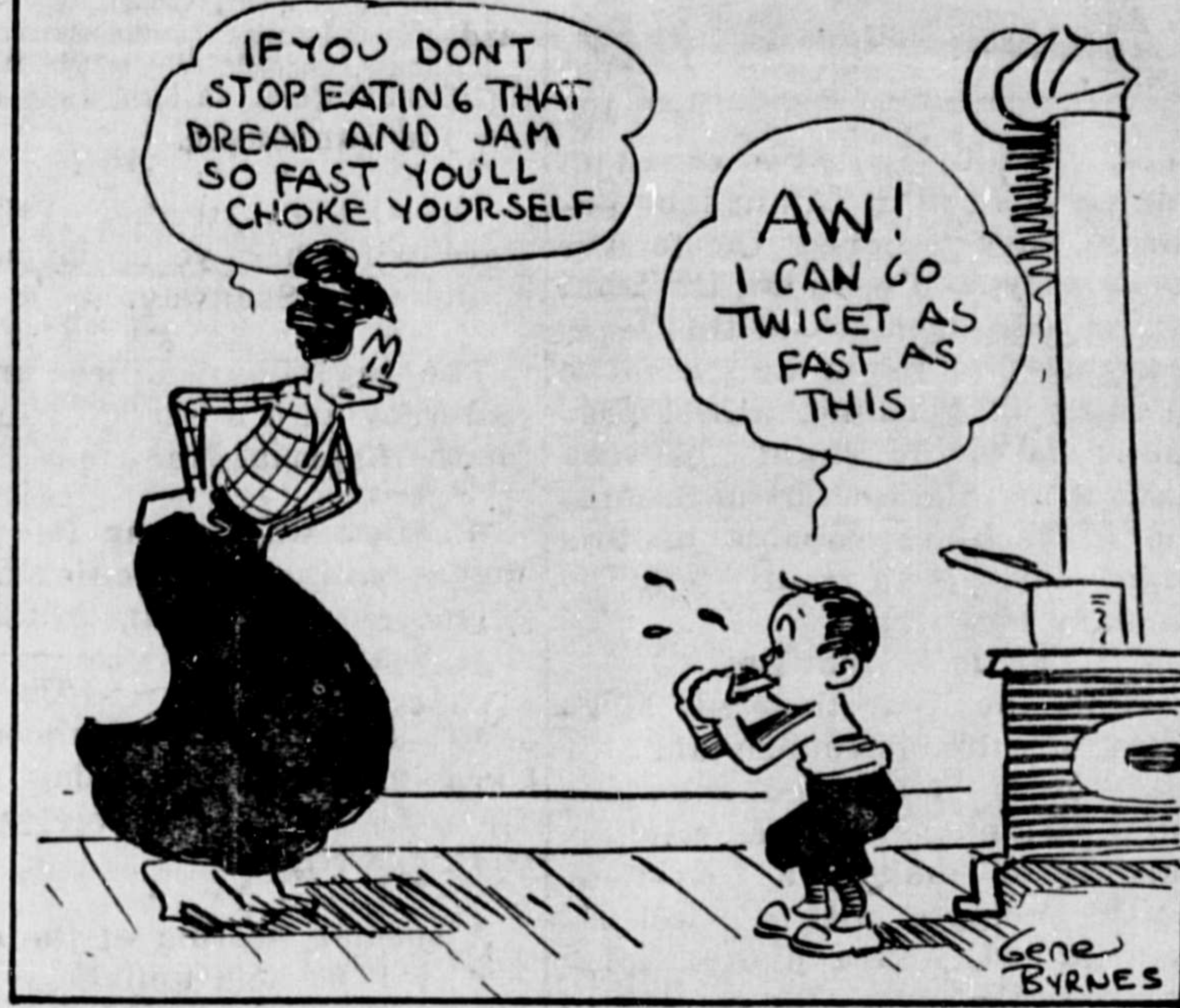

## COST OF LIVING IS STILL GOING UP

Fact Indicated by Ottawa Labor Department's Report for October.

During October, the last full month of the war period, the cost of living in Canada still was ascending, according to figures compiled by the Labor Department. This statement applies both to the index number of wholesale prices, which rose approximately four points as compared with September, and the weekly budget of staple foods. This budget averaged \$13.54 in some sixty cities, as compared with \$13.31 in September and \$11.81 in October, 1917. The retail price of meats was slightly lower than in September, but eggs, milk and butter were higher.

The Department reports that the loss of time on account of industrial disputes amounted to 65,868 working days. This was less than in September, but greater than in October, 1917. The percentage of unemployment among trade unions was less than one per cent. on October 1, but this condition was disturbed by the influenza epidemic.

### MANY USES FOR THE AIRPLANE

**Lieut. Harry A. Farr Says Will Soon Fly Between England and Canada.**

That the aeroplane has come to stay is the opinion of Lieut. Harry A. Farr, one of the original flyers in the Canadian corps, who has just returned to the coast. He says:

"The airplane has come to stay! With the cessation of hostilities and the looked-for slackening off in the manufacture of warplanes, manufacturers are formulating plans for the commercial side of aviation. That this industry will develop into something akin to the automobile industry in the next few years those who are interested financially and from a labor standpoint have no doubt.

**A Modest Start.**  
"No other development in the history of the world has shown such remarkable results as the science of aeronautics in the past ten years. When the Wright brothers built their first successful airplane, the motor, a four-cylinder of their own design, only developed about 25 h. p.

"Today we have engines of 750 h. p. Two, and sometimes three of these powerful motors are installed in the huge weight-carrying airplanes, capable of lifting nearly four tons. It was a revelation to me, who built and flew machines before the outbreak of war, to make a flight lasting over half an hour over the heart of New York recently. The machine a 'Caproni' three-motored and nearly a hundred-foot span, handled like a Packard car, although it was blowing a gale over the city and the machine flying lower than the top of the Woolworth Building. The machine, though capable of carrying ten passen-

gers, had only four, two of whom had never been in an airplane before. They enjoyed themselves immensely, and were not the least bit scared. Airplanes of this type, carrying two pilots and a large quantity of gasoline, will, I predict, make the flight between Canada and England by next summer. Machines capable of this flight have been built both by England and Italy.

#### Value in Industry.

"For the patrolling of large areas of valuable timber land, for exploration and photographic surveys, a moderate sized machine capable of making a four-hour flight, equipped with a wireless-sending set, and a photographic outfit, could cover a large area of our valuable timber lands. The area could be plotted on the map, and each square designated, like an artillery map. A forest fire, once detected, could be reached quickly by airplane, the location sent by wireless to the fire rangers, who, knowing the locality of the fire, could rush all available help there without loss of time. It is well worthy of a fair trial. The investigation by the Commission on B. C. Forest Resources has just brought to light the fact that approximately 665,000,000,000 feet, board measure, has been lost in this province through forest fires, which can be attributed largely to public carelessness. The cost for protection by airplanes, while probably costing slightly more, would, I believe, be fully justified by the results obtained."
