PEACE CELEBRATION CLOSED WITH A GREAT GATHERING OF CITIZENS LAST NIGHT

LOYAL AND PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES STRIKE RESPONSIVE CHORD IN AUDIENCE — ANNOUNCEMENT MADE THAT RETURNED SOLDIERS' BUILDING WILL BE ERECTED

A great crowd gathered last evening at the Exhibition Hall to take part in the celebration and to show their appreciation of the work of the men who had gone overseas and attained such wonderful results. A number of fine addresses were delivered, but possibly the most interesting announcement was that made by Captain McNeill in regard to a memorial to those who had fallen. He stated that the War Veterans had asked the city for a piece of land on which to erect a building to be used as a clubhouse for returned men. It was to be an imposing structure and on its walls was to be engraved the roll of honor of those who had gone overseas, those who had been wounded and those who had paid the supreme sacrifice.

The Mayor had looked with approval on the scheme and later he announced that a plebiscite would be held at the same time as the election in which the citizens would have an opportunity to express their opinion regarding the scheme.

The Metlakalla band which led the procession to the hall and which played a number of patriotic selections was well received and added much to the effectiveness and enjoyment of the occasion.

Mayor McClymont presided and in a few well chosen words called the gathering to order and asked Fred Peters, K. C., to give an address on The Navy.

Fred Peters, K. C.
Mr. Peters spoke of the recent surrender as the greatest event the world had seen. There never had been such a war as that which had just been won when the greatest military empire the world had seen was lowered to the dust. The

TELEGRAPHERS' STRIKE IN CANADA AND STATES IS QUITE PROBABLE

Chicago, Nov. 28.—A vote favoring a strike of railway telegraphers on all roads in the United States and Canada was cast in Chicago by general chairmen and secretaries of the fifty-one divisions of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers in the western and middle western states. At the Chicago meeting were representatives of 45,000 government employees, who were dissatisfied with the supplement to general order No. 27, affecting wages and working conditions. It was voted to reject all these and telegrams were sent to meetings in other cities, asking similar action.

TO INSPECT B. C. HERRING

Great Increase in Herring Pack on B. C. Coast Makes Inspection of Packing Methods Necessary.

PRINCE RUPERT MAN RECEIVES APPOINTMENT

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Nov. 28.—The Department of Naval Service has confirmed the appointment of William Wilson, of Prince Rupert, B. C., to advise and instruct western packers of herring and to inspect and brand their cured product during the coming herring season. The new inspector, who has had thorough training in barrel making and herring curing, will have headquarters at Nanaimo. Up to the present time it was not considered necessary to maintain an inspection officer on the Pacific coast because herring curing here before has been carried on in small way by people having sufficient knowledge of business to enable them to sell their output readily on the strength of their own trademark. Conditions arising from the war, however, have greatly stimulated this branch of the fishing industry in British Columbia and a number of packers who lack the necessary knowledge and experience are being drawn into it. In order, therefore, to protect the reputation of British Columbia herring it is necessary that a system of inspection be established.

Wm. Wilson, who is a returned soldier, left Prince Rupert for his new headquarters several days ago. Born and brought up on the Moray Firth in Scotland, he has followed the fishing business all his life, and his knowledge of the Scotch cure of herring which is proving its superiority to other styles of packing this delicate fish, should be invaluable.

WILL WAGE WAR ON ALL FOOD PROFITEERS

New York, Nov. 28.—The Federal Food Board will begin today to wage war on food profiteers, and will put out of business any retailer charging more than the prices allowed by the Food Administration, declared John Mitchell, chairman of the State Food Commission in an address here yesterday.

MANITOBA EDITOR GOES TO CONFERENCE

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—J. W. Defoe, editor in chief of the Manitoba Free Press, has gone to England on behalf of the Department of Public Information. In this capacity he will be attached to the Canadian delegation which is to represent Canadian interests at the Peace gatherings. Defoe will keep the Canadian people advised of developments by special cables.

HALF MILLION ARE READY TO STRIKE DEFENSE OF MOONEY

San Francisco, November 28. Approximately 500,000 workers in the United States have taken action favoring a strike for Thomas I. Mooney and thousands are expected to follow the International Workers Defense League, which is handling the Mooney defense announced here.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS TO COME UP FIRST

Paris, November 28. —A League of Nations is likely to figure before the Peace Conference at a very early stage of the proceedings instead of being relegated to the close after the territorial aspirations of various powers are settled.

POLICE RAID

Montreal, Nov. 28.—Thirty disorderly houses were raided last night by the police, netting 284 prisoners and over a thousand bottles of beer and other liquors.

GUARDING AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI MOVE

New York, November 28.—Military Police patrolled the streets here yesterday to guard against "Bolsheviki" meetings. It is understood that the Provost Guard is to be reinforced and that the navy will establish its own police.

WHALING STEAMER HALCYON IS GONE

Vessel That Figured in Jack London's Famous Story Went Adrift at Aleutian Islands.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Seattle, Nov. 28.—The famous whaling steamer Halcyon which furnished inspiration for Jack London's story of "Sea Wolf" has gone to her end in the far north. She went adrift at Akutan, Aleutian Island, in a big storm on November 14, while the captain and crew were ashore. The Halcyon was built at San Francisco in 1887 and was purchased about two years ago by the North Pacific Sea Products Co. at Seattle.

IS PREPARING FOR COUNTER REVOLUTION

Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—General Von Der Marwitz, former aide de camp to Emperor William and later commander of German forces on the Verdun front, has arrived at Teves with a big army and appears to be preparing for a counter revolution, according to a sensational despatch from Berlin filed there November 21.

EXTRADITION OF FORMER KAISER

Possibility is Being Considered by Law Officers of Crown in Great Britain.

ALLIES ENTITLED TO TRY HIM FOR CRIMES

Holland Takes View She Has no Power to Surrender Him Without Germany's Consent.

Amsterdam, Nov. 28.—Efforts to secure a statement to the press from the late Kaiser failed. The late Emperor is in constant touch with the German embassy at The Hague.

LONDON, NOV. 28.—IT IS UNDERSTOOD THAT THE QUESTION OF EXTRADITION OF THE FORMER GERMAN EMPEROR IS BEING CONSIDERED BY BRITISH LAW OFFICERS OF THE CROWN, WHO ARE WORKING IN CLOSE CO-OPERATION WITH FRENCH AUTHORITIES. ACTION WAS TAKEN IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE FLIGHT OF THE FORMER EMPEROR TO HOLLAND.

The Evening News says it understands the law officers have concluded that the Allies are entitled to demand the extradition of the former Emperor and that this applies also to individuals who have committed or given instructions for the committal of extraditable crimes.

It is added that Holland takes the view that she has not power to surrender such persons without the consent of Germany.

greatest army had been absolutely defeated and had to acknowledge it. "Bitter must be the feelings of the late Emperor and Hindenburg, but not half as bitter as I could wish them to be," said the speaker.

The British navy which had been second only to our own was now mostly in British waters. It was a proper thing that we should set aside a day on which to rejoice that the horrid cloud had been removed. The great work the soldiers had done made them deserving of thanks and the best the country could give them. Had it not been for the navy, however, their work could not have been carried out. Within a few weeks after war was declared the German mercantile marine had been swept from the seas. Besides that the troops had been carried safely to France and food in abundance. The great overshadowing thing, the British navy, had made victory possible.

Canon Rix.

Canon Rix gave a happy address on "The Allies," in which he showed that the doctrine of "right is might" had been controverted. The peace they had fought for and won was not the peace of Lansdowne. Every man who had helped to start the war was either a fugitive from justice or had gone to give an account to a higher judge. The casualty list was one of the sad things in regard to the war. They must remember what they told the men before they went away. They were the cream of the community and deserved everything. When Col. Peck, V. C., and his men returned he should have a welcome that would make him glad he went away.

Lieut. Halliday.

Lieut. Halliday spoke of the Royal Flying Corps and the wonderful work that had been done there. He referred especially to the splendid work of Major Bishop, V. C., and Lieut. Commander Ray Collishaw.

Rev. H. R. Grant.

Rev. Dr. Grant, whose voice gave way as he talked, expressed the appreciation of the gathering at the effective work that had been done by women in the great war. He paraphrased the old song "We've got the ships, we've got the men, we've got the women, too." The war never could have been won had it not been for the work of the women who took the places of the nine million soldiers who had gone overseas. They were the second line of defence. He gave instances of what they had

done and spoke of the work that had been done in this community and of what some of them had lost. The very best conditions should be secured for women in the future.

Sergt.-Major Adams.

Sergt.-Major Adams eulogized the splendid work of the infantry and mentioned the significant fact that the labor unions had taken so prominent a part in the celebrations.

Fred Stork.

Fred Stork mentioned the inspiring nature of the occasion. Nowhere within the confines of the Empire could they have had a more patriotic celebration. The ideal event had wound up in an ideal way. In the midst of their rejoicing, however, there was a tinge of sorrow at the memories of those who had gone, not to return. He spoke of the greatness of the occasion when the German navy had surrendered. It was too great an occasion for cheering, but it did not become us to remain silent now. "The flag still floats and, praise God, the end is not in sight. John Bull was never as magnificent as he was in the big struggle. Today he is the champion of right and civilization."

Capt. McNeill.

Captain McNeill, speaking of the Honor Roll of those who had died honorably and bravely, spoke of the proposal to erect a building here and asked everyone for support for the project. It would take several thousand dollars but they expected to get in the district.

Closing with an eulogy of Col. Peck, Dr. McNeill spoke of him as one of the bravest of the men who had gone to France.

Two recitations by J. C. Brady were most effectively given and well received. The gathering closed with the national anthem, after the sounding of "The Last Post."

THREE YEARS' JAIL FOR ROBBING ESTATE

London, Nov. 27.—Apuil Bonaventura Devolpi, a Canadian sergeant, has been sentenced to three years penal servitude for systematically robbing the estates of Canadian soldiers. The defalcations amounted to \$6,000. The prisoner was formerly an hotel manager in Canada.

MARINE PARADE MOST SUITABLE AND EFFECTIVE

About Fifty Boats Took Part in Display and the Whole City Was Out to See It.

Seldom has a more suitable and effective spectacle been staged than that which opened the peace celebration yesterday morning. Practically all the city was out to see the Marine Parade and they were not disappointed. The gaily decorated ships and boats emblematic of the chief industry of the place dipping their flags as they passed the Union Jack on the wharf where the Mayor and Aldermen were grouped for the occasion was a happy and suggestive manoeuvre.

Soon after ten o'clock the boats began to gather in the neighborhood of the Cold Storage, but it was eleven before the Prince George, with all her flags flying and followed by the Prince Albert, swung into the line and the parade started.

The Malaspina, as representing the British navy, led the way. She was followed by the Prince George flying the signal "Victory." The flags of the Prince Albert set forth the emblem "Britannia Rules the Waves," and the tug Lorne which followed carried the signal "Canada Forever." Tugs and trawlers from the cold storage, pleasure boats and fishing craft followed to the number of about fifty and many of them were gaily decorated.

Unfortunately most of the fishing boats were laid up for the winter and were undergoing overhaul or repairs of some kind which incapacitated them from taking part. In a few cases the owners were away otherwise at least double the number of boats might have been in the line. As it was, however, it was a spectacle seldom seen and its inception and carrying out reflects much credit on the organizers. The work of Captain Saunders, who was commodore of the fleet, was highly appreciated and also that of the officers and crew of the Malaspina which remained over for the occasion. Captain Newcombe was to have left on Tuesday, but in order to take part he kept his craft here.

The bonfire kindled on the Recreation Grounds last evening to mark the windup of the peace celebration, proved to be a great attraction. There was a good breeze, without any rain, and the young ones got as close to the big blaze as they could. Many of the grown up youngsters had not seen a real bonfire since the times of the Queen's Birthday celebrations two reigns ago.

WAR VETERANS' BIG PARADE IS A GREAT SUCCESS

Fine Display of Floats and Good Turnout of Union Labor Representatives Add to Effectiveness of Celebration.

Yesterday's parade which was in charge of the Great War Veterans' Association was one of the finest ever held in Prince Rupert. Unfortunately just as it was about to start a lively shower rather marred the effect, but that was soon over and the parade went on and was a great success.

The features of the parade were the numbers of fine floats that were entered; the presence of representatives of the navy in the person of officers and crew of the Malaspina which is at present in port; and the large turnout of representatives of union labor to take part. The returned soldiers were much in evidence as was quite fit and proper and they carried a banner on which were the words, "Col. Peck, V.C., D.S.O., our Hero." Behind this banner was the Kaiser hanging to a gallows.

A number of little girls, each representing one of the Allied nations, followed a big peace float, a finely decorated affair and eminently suited to the occasion.

The Sons of England had a fine float with John Bull in the centre and a sailor to the right and a soldier to his left. In front was a Union Jack with an English bulldog standing on it.

The St. Andrew's Society float carried the pipers and inscribed on the outside were sayings from Robbie Burns.

The Sons of Canada had one of the most striking floats of the day. It showed Britannia sitting opposite Miss Canada and grouped around were representatives of the chief Canadian industries, agriculture, lumbering, mining and fishing.

The Trades and Labor Council had an interesting grouping; the International Longshoremen's Union, which was out in great strength, carried a banner with the following legend: "International Longshoremen's Union, Enlisted, 58; wounded, 20; made supreme sacrifice, 10."

The local Japanese colony had a fine warship, the Izumo, which must have cost them a lot of money and labor in the construction and which proved very effective. It was fitted with guns and everything necessary to the proper equipment of a warship.

The Fishermen's Union float represented a fishing boat draped with the national colors.

The Boilermakers' Union float was a small shop on wheels with the men engaged in welding. The sign on the float was, "Boilermakers and Iron Shipbuilders, ready to build ships."

The Metlakatla band enlivened the proceedings with music.

There was also Red Cross, Daughters of the Empire and other floats. The unions were well represented and the fraternal societies and also groups of representatives of the nationalities which were on the side of the Allies in the war. The whole was an imposing spectacle and reflected a great deal of credit on those who organized it.

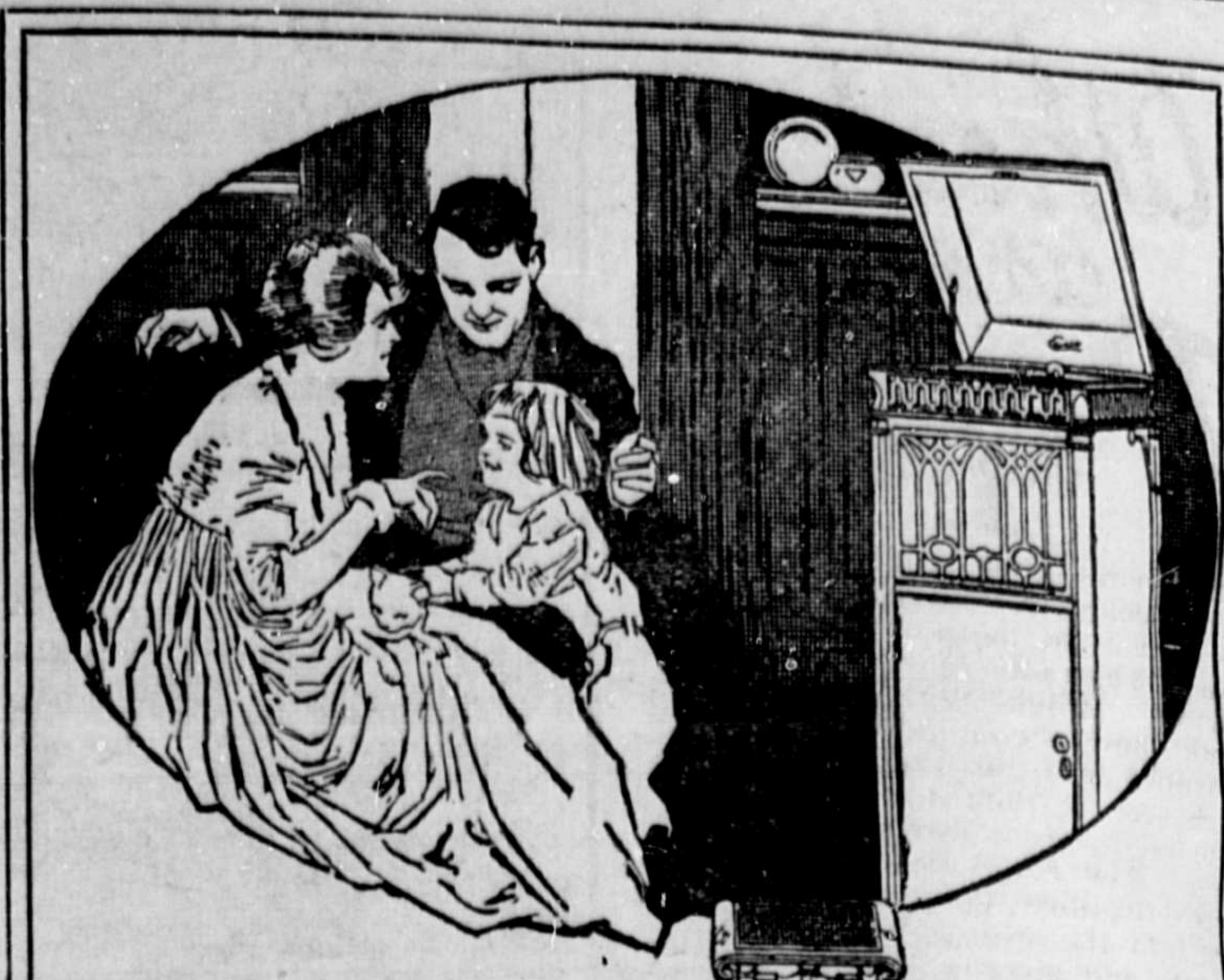
