Local Shipbuilding Program

STEEL AND WOODEN VESSELS TO BE CONSTRUCTED AT THIS PORT

MORE SHIP CONTRACTS SECURED FOR PRINCE RUPERT, AMOUNTING TO 66,000 TONS, STEEL AND WOOD

Superintendent Pillsbury Announces He has Received Word that Large Amount of Work is to be Done Here; Stock Taking will Commence in Near Future Preparatory to Turning Yards Over to Mullen Construction Co.

An enlarged shipbuilding programme for this port is the very latest announcement. The Mullen Construction Company have arranged to build both steel and wooden ships here, the total tonnage of the contract taken amounting to 66,000 tons. J. H. Pillsbury, superintendent of the drydock, has received word from Pittsburgh to that effect. While he is not today prepared to give out the details of the new programme he says that it is much larger than that originally intended.

The steel ships will be laid down on the graded land this side of the drydock, the slips for which will be prepared very soon. The wooden ships will be built on the slip at the dock and will be launched sideways. They will be protected while building by the overhanging shed and will be convenient to the woodworking shops adjoining. Everything is in readiness for this work to proceed.

Large Program.

The Mullen Construction Co. is prepared to make an initial expenditure here of about half a million dollars on plant and improvements. This will comprise, among other things, plate and angle ships, assembling shops and sheds to build over all steel shipways and a great deal of additional equipment.

Prince Rupert people will doubtless feel elated at the prospect of so large a program of new construction work at this port. The two ship contracts originally secured from the Dominion Government did not amount to more than about 20,000 tons, probably less. The latest announcement, therefore, shows that three times that amount of work is to be done and that two industries instead of one are to be added to those already here. The building of wooden and steel ships are not in any way related, yet both will be done here.

Preparing to Take Stock.

There are those here who will not believe the ships are to be built until they see the gangs of men at work, but everything now looks most hopeful and Superintendent Pillsbury says that they are preparing to take stock prior to handing the yards and docks over to the J. H. Mullen Construction Company who are to undertake the work.

Men to Be Employed.

Just how many men will be employed at the works it is too early yet to guess, but it has been stated that at least 1,500 will be employed on the steel contracts and when Mr. Oleson was here recently in connection with a proposal to build wooden ships he said his concern would employ at least 200 men on the wooden ship contracts if they went ahead with the work. That looks as if not less than 1,700 men would get employment from the new work alone.

Repair Work Also.

It is understood that the Mullen people intend to go extensively into the ship repair work and have leased the floating drydock for that purpose. The dock will not be used for building ships, but it is expected that when the organization is complete it will include ship repair work, and that this will be a permanent business that will be continued indefinitely as one of the important industries of the city. At present there is no place north of Seattle where a large ship can dock. Even the British ships of war have to go to a foreign port to get necessary repairs and overhaul. All this will be changed with the advent of the shipbuilding industry here. Prince Rupert will become a shipbuilding and repair centre that will keep her name prominently before the world from this time on.

Increased Business.

As soon as transpacific trade starts from this port the work of the drydock will become even more important than it is today. Ships will come here regularly from the Orient with their silk and tea and other products and carry back machinery and fish and other food products as well as lumber. When repairs are needed they will dock here and everything will be grist to Prince Rupert's mill.

Those who have already heard of the most recent proposal are most enthusiastic over the prospects. Apparently it has all resulted from the visit of the local delegation to Ottawa recently and will be a distinct feather in their caps. Prince Rupert people and the people of the districts contiguous will remember their work in connection therewith.

AUSTRIA WANTS TO BORROW FROM ALLIES

Former Minister of Finance Asks That We Be Generous and Help Country to Recupérate.

Vienna, Nov. 29.—The Austrians are anxious to get a loan from the Allies in order to build up the country again. The former Minister of Finance Dr. Redlich, urges that the Allies be generous. He says that the country should be helped back to a productive basis in order that it may be in a position to pay its debts.

MOONEY'S SENTENCE IS COMMUTED TO LIFE

Governor Stephens of California Saves Labor Leader from Noose in Response to Popular Demand.

Sacramento, Nov. 29.—Thomas J. Mooney is not to swing. Governor Stephens of California has commuted his sentence, changing it to life imprisonment. The case is a famous one, Mooney having been sentenced to hang for participating in a dynamiting case at San Francisco at the time of a preparedness parade in that city about two years ago. There was a great deal of dissatisfaction expressed at the manner in which his trial was conducted and at the character of the witnesses who gave evidence against him. As a result his cause was taken up by labor unions in different parts of the country and the present action of Governor Stephens is the result of the agitation which has been carried on.

EXACT FULL RECOMPENSE FOR CRUELTY

Germany Warned by Great Britain That She Must Not Ill-Treat Prisoners of War.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Nov. 29.—The British Government has notified the Germans that full recompense for any cruelty to prisoners will be exacted. No excuse will be accepted. This action on the part of the Government has been made necessary through the recent action of the Germans in turning prisoners loose in a destitute condition almost unclothed to shift for themselves. Many of these men are wholly unable to care for themselves even under the best conditions but in a hostile country their condition is terrible. Numerous complaints have been made to Great Britain and the United States, but especially to the latter. It is against the British that the Germans feel most bitter, as they are blamed for the humiliating defeat which that country has suffered.

KING GEORGE WELL RECEIVED IN FRANCE

Paris, Nov. 29.—King George is visiting France and is receiving a warm welcome from the people. Everywhere he goes the populace greets him with cheers as the representative of the British nation.

CELEBRATED WELL BUT NOT WISELY

At the police court this morning before Magistrate Carss, a man named Cole appeared to answer a charge of being drunk on the day of celebration. He was found by Constables Bailey and Watkinson in the lane behind the Savoy, and on recovering consciousness did not know how he got there. He had evidently fallen a distance of about fifteen feet to the ground and was very badly bruised and cut up. He was not known at the hotel and had evidently wandered into the lane during the night. On account of the man's sorry appearance the magistrate considered that he had suffered enough and imposed no penalty.

What Alsace and Lorraine Are Worth.

To Germany as a military power Alsace-Lorraine was worth a great deal. To Germany a real democracy with no ambitious project of conquest the question of riches does not make much difference. From those provinces Germany derived the greater part of the iron ore, coal and potash which kept her munition works going. Eighty per cent. of the ore used in German foundries came from Lorraine. From her own mines Germany gets but eight million tons of ore a year.

Alsace is rich in potash. The mines were discovered thirteen years ago and since that time Germany has been almost dependent on the potash salts of that region. In fact there are no other mines like them in the world.

With no particular need for ammunition Germany may not miss the mines of the freed provinces, but industrially they are worth a good deal, and the stuff which is at present used for killing men may be put to a more useful purpose.

France will find the iron and potash very useful and very little of it will be allowed to find its way into German territory for many years to come.

Still Some Knockers Around the City.

There was a visitor in the city yesterday who had been here for a few days. He had met a good many people and talked a good deal about the prospects of the town and the district generally. It was his first visit and he was open to impressions. On being seen just before leaving one of his first remarks was: "You seem to have a lot of knockers in town. I never knew such a place for running down everything from the climate to the prospects. I don't see anything wrong with the place, but if you would believe some of your citizens it is not a fit place to live and it never will amount to anything."

Unfortunately the lethal chamber is illegal except for cats and dogs and hanging has a degrading effect on the rest of the community. There seems no other fate suitable for people who make their living here and yet continually hold up the bad points of the place to public view and refuse to see the good points.

When the shipbuilding starts up within a few weeks and new people begin to come in, the knockers will find themselves in a hopeless minority, but just now they seem to have so much influence that they hold the place back. They ridicule everybody's efforts and refuse to believe that any good thing can come to the city. They refuse absolutely to see things as they are, but instead they see them through blue spectacles. They have cultivated the pessimistic habit until today it is almost impossible for them to think hopefully.

It has been suggested that the Mayor call a meeting and arrange to charter a special train, round up all the pessimists and ship them out of town to Prince George or some other point up the line where they may enjoy themselves. This is no place for them. When things get going here they will have a bad time.

Cattle Ranching In the Interior.

There is no place better suited for cattle ranching than the lands of interior British Columbia, especially the lands included in the area set apart by the Land Settlement Board for their experiment. Much of the land is very lightly timbered, often having nothing but a few small poplars on it. These can be easily slashed and if the land is grazed by cattle the underbrush can be kept down and in a few years the roots will rot and may be easily removed. That is what experts say.

The difficulty with most of the farmers up the valley is that they are not depending on farming for a living, and they have not enough cattle to stock their farms. The Provincial Government recently helped them to purchase stock on the prairies and over five hundred head were shipped in. The result will be that some useful herds will be started, but there were not half enough cattle introduced for the amount of feed in sight.

It will be a great cattle country undoubtedly and Prince Rupert will be able to secure the greater part of her beef and dairy products there some day. In the meantime anything which can be done to help bring that district to the fore should be encouraged.

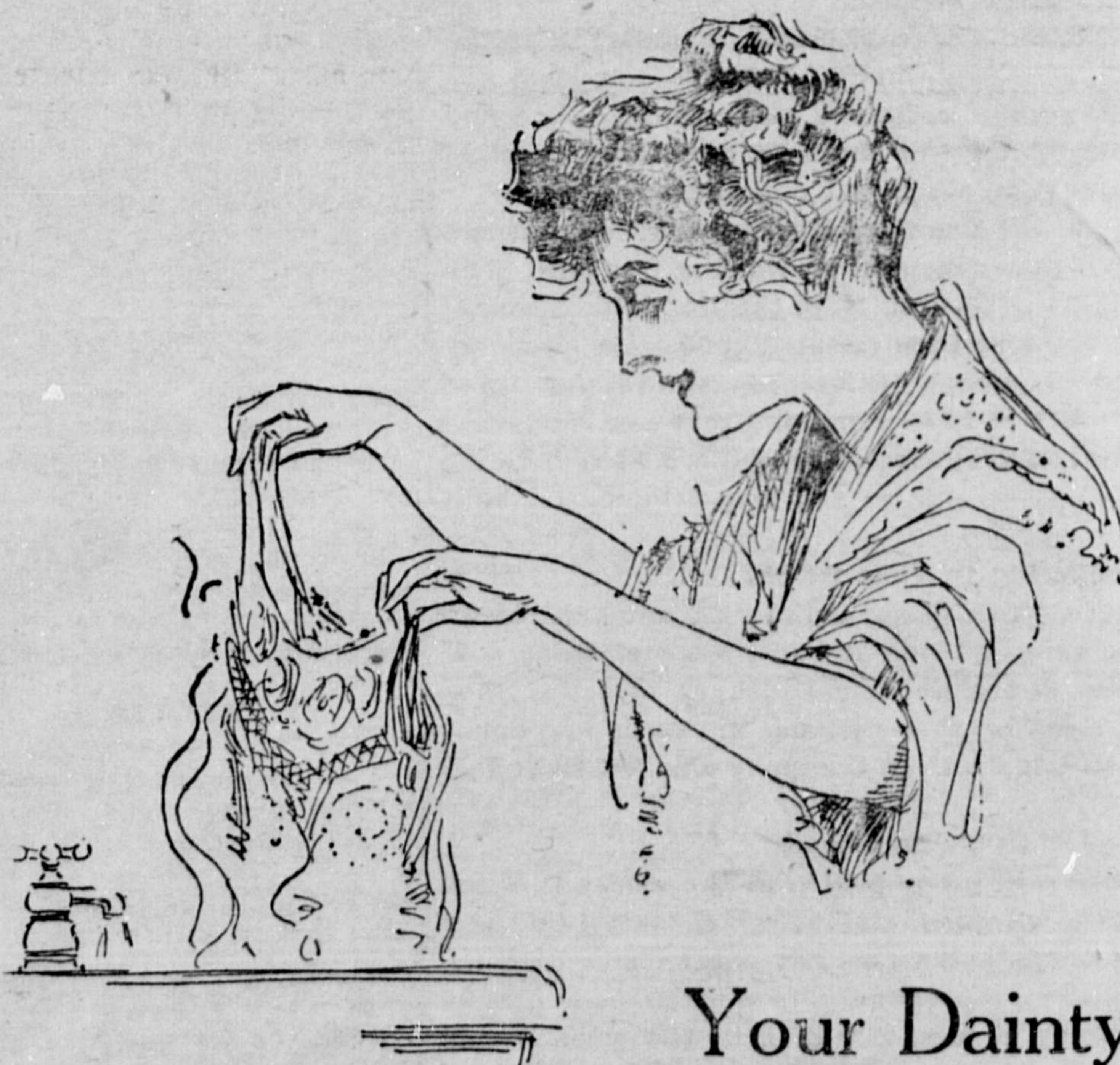

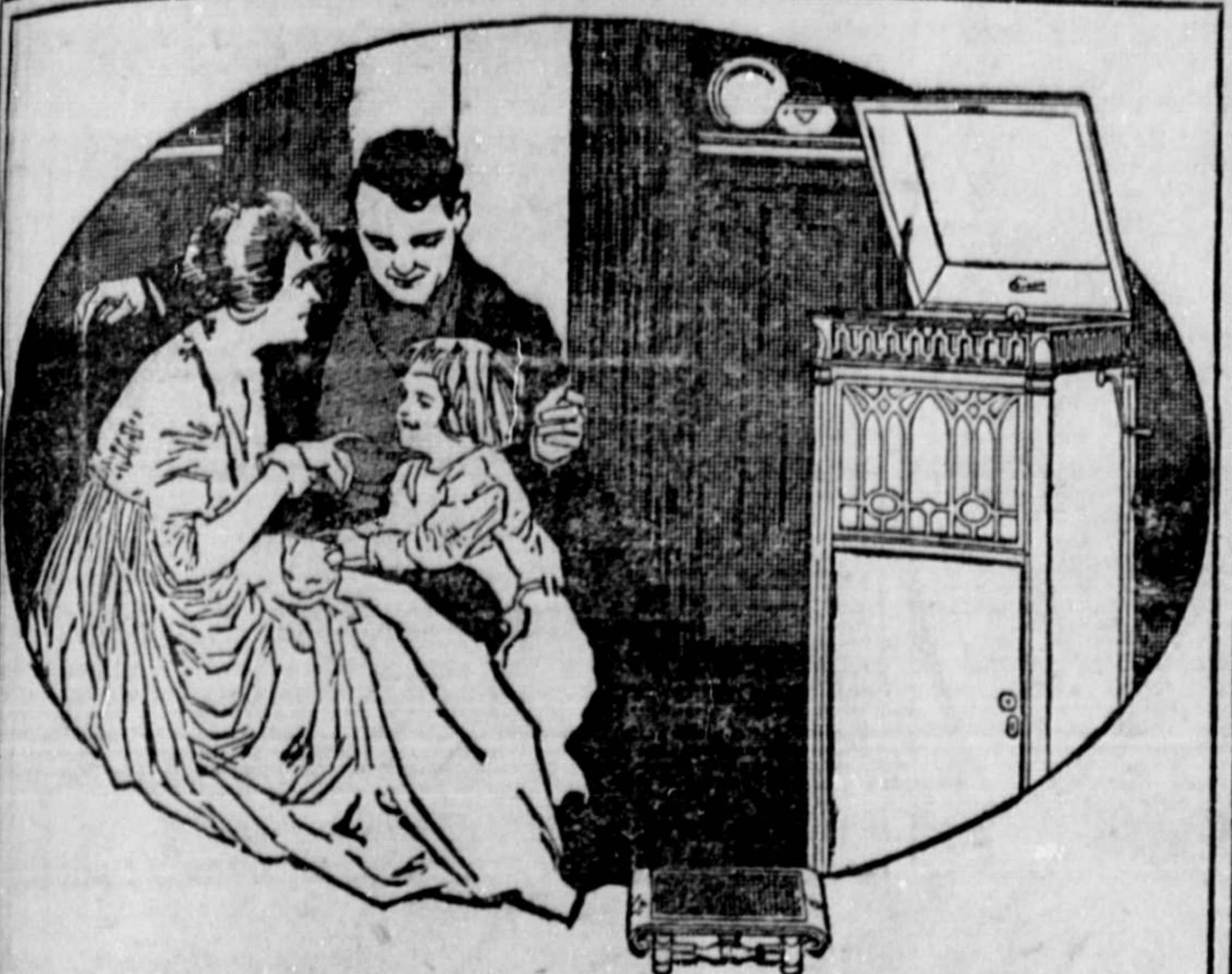

SIR RICHARD MCBRIDE'S END WAS A TRAGEDY

So Writes Newspaperman Who Knew Him Well and Who Honors His Memory.

SAYS HE DIED OF A BROKEN HEART

Victim of Dagger of Brutus and Traitorous Tongue of Judas; Deserted and Pauperized.

In a letter to the Victoria Daily Colonist (Conservative), C. H. Gibbons, a former British Columbia newspaperman now of Toronto, writes of the late Sir Richard McBride in part as follows:
"I know of no parallel in political history for the case of poor Dick."

"A native-born British Columbian, with all the big-heartedness, the broad-mindedness, the sunny optimism and the chivalrous courtesy and generosity of the traditional West, the man who was the youngest premier in any British colony or dominion, who brought order out of political chaos in his beloved home province, whose kindness and inability to think ill of anyone provoked his financial and political ruin, he is today held in affectionate regard by the best men of England and by the leaders of Canadian thought and public policy as quite the ablest man our West has as yet produced."

Target for Abuse.

"His latter days in office found him the target for abuse, malignment, misrepresentation, the shafts of self-seeking political climbers missing en bloc both his mental and his heart qualities. He was charged as a thief because he sensed the menace to Vancouver and Victoria cities from German naval power at the war's outbreak and boldly took the requisite immediate steps to checkmate the enemy, for which he has received the due acknowledgment and the sincerest thanks of the Home authorities. He was accused of having 'made his pile', through certain railway deals and withdrawn to London to enjoy his millions. He was charged with having betrayed the province to the railway interests, thereby inviting British Columbia's ruin."

"History will record that fundamentally his railway policies were sound under obtaining conditions. As a matter of simple fact, every step in the development of his railway policies was first submitted to and endorsed by the people at the polls, and any advantage that may have been taken of the province by the railways was not within his cognizance and occurred through inefficiency or carelessness on the part of subordinates, to whom he necessarily looked for the checking of details and who failed to measure up to their responsibilities."

Victim of Betrayal.

"Sir Richard McBride died quite as much of a broken heart as from the stated cause of his untimely end. He died the victim of betrayal at the hands of those for whom he had done most, politically and personally. Their reward of his trust and his constant kindness was the dagger of the puny Brutus and the traitorous tongue of the Judas. He had given his all to and for British Columbia. He had given it place

in the estimation and thought of the Empire it would never otherwise have held. He died deserted by almost all of those for whom he had done so much, misrepresented and slandered to the last, blind for drear weeks, pauperized and virtually alone in a land of strangers.

Most Pitiful.

"The tragedy of Dick McBride's career and its end is the most pitiful individual tragedy of Canadian history."

"Is it not time that his native province should make a beginning at least in fixing responsibility for that tragedy and in doing deserved honor to a great man's memory and to his incessant efforts in British Columbia's behalf?"

PERU APOLOGIZES

New York, Nov. 28.—Difficulties between Peru and Chile, which resulted yesterday in the withdrawal of consular representatives by each nation from the principal cities of its neighbor, has been overcome by an apology on the part of the Peruvian Government, it is officially stated here.

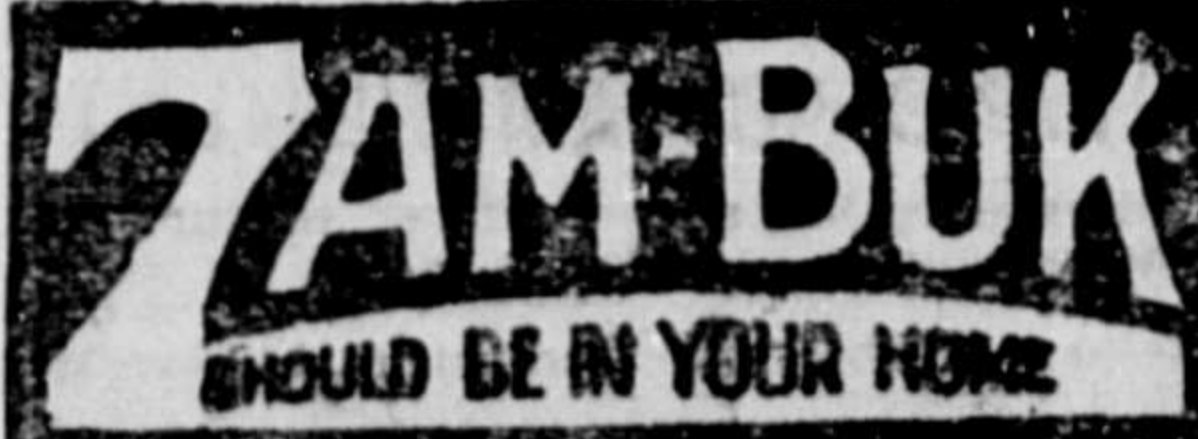

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partially pre-empted lands abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 10 years has made moderate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title will be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase money has been paid in full are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

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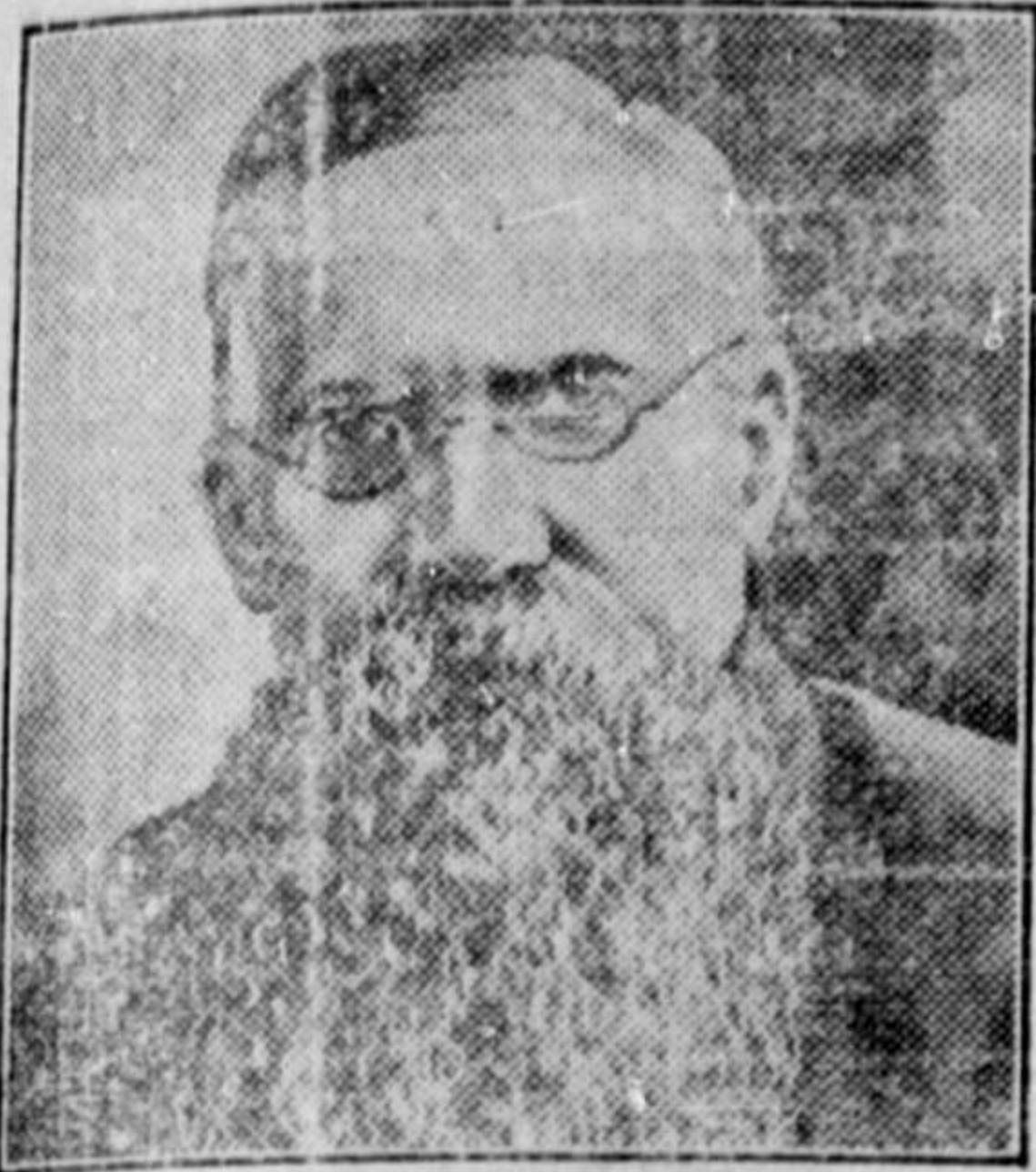

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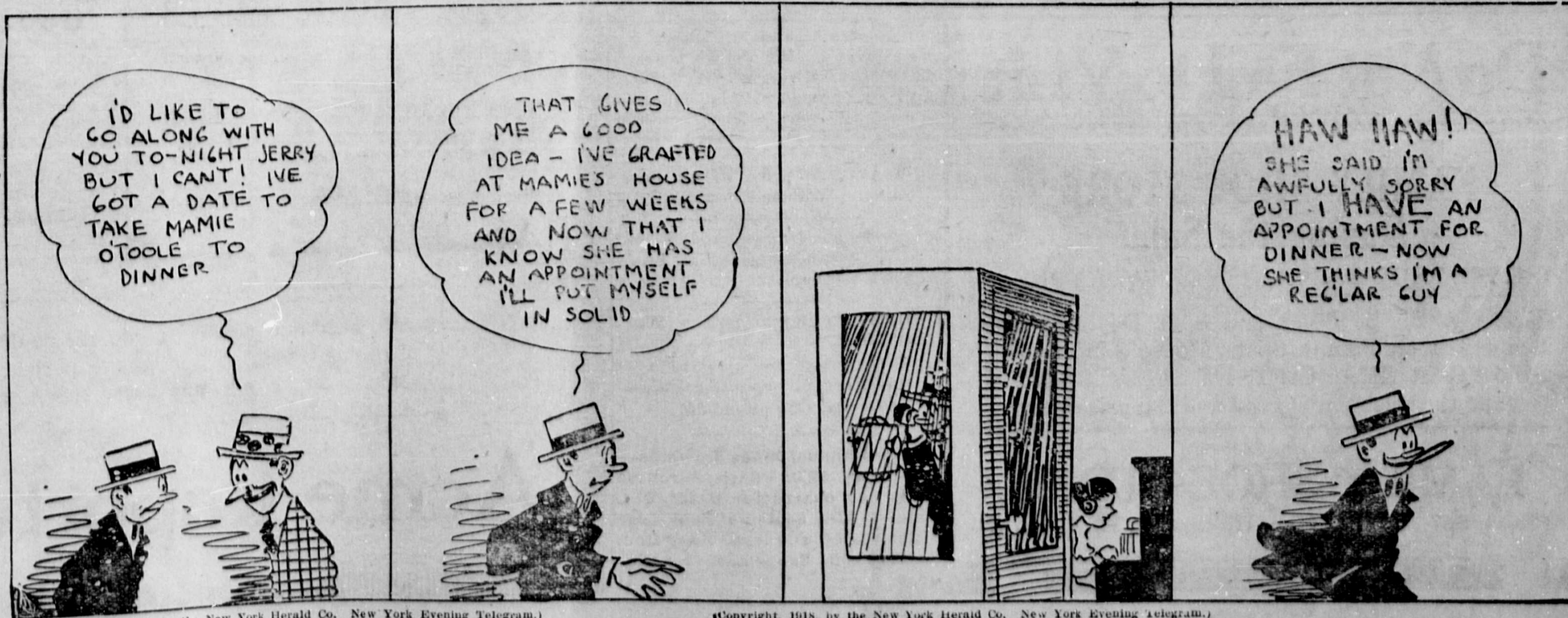
