NO TENDERNESS WILL BE SHOWN GERMANY BY ALLIES AT THE PEACE CONFERENCE

PROPOSAL TO DIVIDE HUN WAR SHIPS AMONG ALLIES NOT FAVORED BY PRESIDENT WILSON—COLONIES SHOULD BECOME BRITISH

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, November 30.—The pulse of international politics is visibly quickening as additional issues are cautiously brought out in the formal preliminary peace discussions. The principal new issue is a proposition to divide the German navy among the Allies. It is said this would not be received favorably by the United States which is not deviating from the course that it wants nothing out of the war. At the same time the psychological effect on the world of such division of Boche implements of war would be that it was not in keeping with the aims for which America fought the latter accepted a portion of the surrendered fleet.

London, Nov. 30.—There will be no attitude of tenderness toward Germany in the terms to be demanded by the British, Walter Long, Secretary of State for the Colonies, declared in a campaign speech at Bristol. He advocated a solution of the German colonies question by their inclusion in the British Empire. "I could see no other solution than their inclusion in the British Empire," Mr. Long said. "Where the natives have been consulted they are overwhelmingly in favor of this. As a member of the committee appointed by the Premier to consider the terms to be demanded of Germany I can assure that you have no need of any anxiety that any tenderness will be shown toward Germany."

WITNESSES INVITED TO GIVE EVIDENCE

Wreck Commissioner Communicates With Governor of Alaska Re Sophia Inquiry.

Captain John D. Macpherson, Wreck Commissioner for British Columbia, has communicated with Thomas Riggs, Jr., Governor of Alaska, inviting officers of the United States lighthouse tender Cedar, the power schooner King Winge, and others, who may be in a position to throw some light on the Princess Sophia disaster, to Victoria at the Government's expense, to give evidence before a marine court of investigation. The Wreck Commissioner has not the power to subpoena these witnesses, as they are American citizens. Should they be willing to go to Victoria and testify the Wreck Commissioner will make arrangements to hold the inquiry which has been ordered by the Canadian Marine Department.

LONDON IS STILL FINANCIAL CENTRE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Nov. 30.—London is still the financial centre of the world, notwithstanding the vast loans made by the United States to various countries of Europe, according to a statement issued yesterday by Leopold Frederick, Director of the American Smelting and Refining Co. The bankers of England continue to finance the bulk of the world's trade and have maintained their supremacy notwithstanding the great financial burdens under which the British Empire has been laboring.

SCOTSMEN HOLD REVEL ON ST. ANDREW'S EVE

Time Passes Pleasantly, Beguiled By Music and Story, at Rooms of Local Society.

The St. Andrew's Society opened its winter series of gatherings by celebrating St. Andrew's Day on St. Andrew's Eve, and a most enjoyable event it was. Not only was there music in plenty, including the singing and playing of the folk songs of Scotland, but also there was a skirl of the pipes by a real Macdonald and a lecture on "Pioneering in the West" by Rev. H. R. Grant who for so many years was the skipper for the ranchers and miners of the far western Canada right on the borders of civilization.

Dr. Grant's talk was a more or less personal and familiar one and for that reason it proved doubly interesting. He sketched the conditions of the country under the Hudson's Bay Company, the charter for which was granted them by Prince Rupert in the reign of King Charles. He then told of what Scotland had given to Canada, how most of the Hudson's Bay Company's factors were Scottish, how the Scottish regiments were disbanded in Quebec, the Scottish migration to the Maritime provinces and to Glangary. The high ideals which animated those early settlers were worthy of emulation and their strength of character was something to be admired.

Speaking of the Rebellion of 1837, Dr. Grant said those rebels led by the Scotsman William Lyon Mackenzie were the real reformers of the day. Nearly all the Scotch took a similar stand for liberty and justice.

Ranch Life.

Dealing with the ranch life of Alberta and the fine type of Englishmen among whom he lived, Dr. Grant became more personal and gave numerous incidents to illustrate the life of the people and their law abiding character. Most of them were remittance men, but they brought in the only money there was in the country and the Scotchmen thrived.

As a clergyman the Doctor said he did not believe in being "invisible all the week and incomprehensible on Sundays," so he had mixed in the social life of the people and was at one time sorely tempted to leave the ministry and take up ranching. There was but (continued on Page Four.)

HOHENZOLLERN RESIGNS CLAIM TO THE THRONE

Ex-Kaiser Releases All Officials From Oath of Allegiance; Ill With Influenza.

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—William Hohenzollern has signed a document definitely renouncing the thrones of Germany and Prussia as well as releasing all officials from their oaths of allegiance, according to a Berlin dispatch today. The former Kaiser is reported to be ill with influenza and was unable to greet his wife when she arrived at Amerongen station.

NEW YORK BREWERIES CLOSE DOWN TONIGHT

New York, Nov. 30.—Brewing plants in New York representing an investment of \$200,000,000, will close at midnight tonight in compliance with the law enacted by Congress. The general public, however, will not be without its beer as the breweries have produced enough beer to last at least for two and possibly three months.

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—The republic of Lithuania has been proclaimed at Riga in the presence of the National Council and great numbers of the population. The president is Karl Ullman.

GERMANY STILL IS DISGORGING

Cedes North Schleswig to Denmark; Province Was Stolen After War in 1866.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—A report from Berlin today declared that Germany had ceded North Schleswig to Denmark. Schleswig was formerly part of the Kingdom of Denmark, which was seized by the Prussians in the war of 1866 between the Danes and Germans. After the war the Prussians agreed in the treaty of Prague to return North Schleswig to Denmark provided this was shown to be desired by the population in a plebiscite. The plebiscite was never taken.

PRISONERS STILL ARE BADLY TREATED

Germany Threatened With Renewal of Hostilities Unless Conditions Are Improved.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—The British Armistice Commissioners have threatened Germany that hostilities will be recommenced unless the conditions under which Allied prisoners return to their lines are remedied. A Berlin telegram states that everything is being done by Germany to assure the orderly return of prisoners.

AUSTRIA SOUGHT PEACE IN 1917; LUDENDORFF ABSOLUTELY REFUSED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Copenhagen, Nov. 30.—people of prominence in Vienna, who are in touch with the Foreign Department there, assert that in 1917, when Count Czernin, then Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, sought by Emperor Charles' order to induce Emperor William to conclude peace, he was referred to the Supreme Headquarters.

When Count Czernin pointed out that Austria was exhausted and might be compelled to make a separate peace, General Ludendorff, striking the table, exclaimed: "The same day that Austria concludes a separate peace, it will receive a declaration of war from Germany. That will be our only answer to such a breach."

Count Czernin thereupon returned to Vienna and told the Emperor nothing could be done, as Austria's fate was indissolubly knotted with that of Germany.

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NOTHING NOW TO PREVENT CONSTRUCTION

Word Received From Ottawa that Government Specifications Have Been Accepted by Contracting Co.

Word was received in the city this morning through private sources to the effect that the J. H. Mullen Construction Company, Ltd., have accepted the Dominion Government specifications for the building of two large steel steamships at this port and that everything is now clear and ready for action.

Word comes from Victoria that the steel for the vessels which are to be built for the Dominion Government in that city by the Victoria Machinery Depot, will arrive in January. In that city a site has not yet been chosen and when this is done the necessary machine shops and other work will have to be done, the whole, it is estimated, will cost in the neighborhood of \$300,000. That is to provide for the building of only two ships. Here there will be a number of ships built, contracts having already been awarded to the company up to 60,000 tons, including steel and wooden craft.

The announcement made yesterday regarding the shipbuilding developments here and which was published exclusively in The Daily News was read with much interest and has already stimulated a good many people to prepare for the big business which is bound to follow the breaking of ground.

DR. GERVAIS TRIES TO HANG HIMSELF

Prince Albert, Sask., Nov. 28.—Dr. Gervais, one of the Steep Creek gang of murderers, attempted to commit suicide in his cell here. He took the sheet off his bed, tied it around his neck and fastened the other end to a hook on the wall, then jumped from the bed. He was almost strangled when the jail officials discovered him. He was completely revived, however. He protests that he does not desire to live. He appears to be in great mental distress.

Name was "Thomas" But Nobody Cared.

"What we want is to see the men working. Then we shall believe that ships are to be built here." That is the sort of expression that is heard on the street. To judge from the remarks it would seem as if the shipbuilding programme was being arranged for the special benefit of individuals and they feel sore if it is not carried out, and seem to have a personal grievance against somebody for not carrying it out. That attitude of mind hurts nobody, but it is rather childish.

The whole city will benefit if the shipbuilding goes ahead. There is no doubt about that. At the same time it is not being carried out for anybody's benefit. The Government may have let the contracts for the sake of giving the West a chance, but the shipbuilding company has no such idea in mind. It is with them purely a business proposal. They expect to make money out of it. There is no sentiment and they naturally are quite careless what the people of this city think about it except in that they will become interested after they arrive in living on good terms with the people where their works are situated. To say that we don't believe does not affect them. They do not care whether we believe they are coming or not. They will come when they are ready.

Great Thing for City To Have Industry.

It will certainly be a great thing for the city to have nearly two thousand more men employed right here. Of this two thousand, a great many will bring their wives and families just as soon as they are able to get a place to live. It is probably too early to start building, but as soon as the work actually starts there will have to be a lot of new work both in the way of stores and residences.

Already there have been people here looking into the possibilities of opening a second theatre and they have secured all the data necessary and it is said are awaiting the definite announcement that work is to start before taking action.

Other industries will follow in the wake of the shipbuilding and there will undoubtedly be a busy time here before very long.

Iron and Steel For Shipbuilding.

In connection with the letting of contracts for steel ships to be built at this port and the delays which have occurred in the past because of the scarcity of steel plates, it is interesting to note that the Board of Trade of Port Arthur have recently asked the Dominion Government to establish a plant at that centre for the manufacture of steel plates, and also to give a bounty on all iron ore mined in the country.

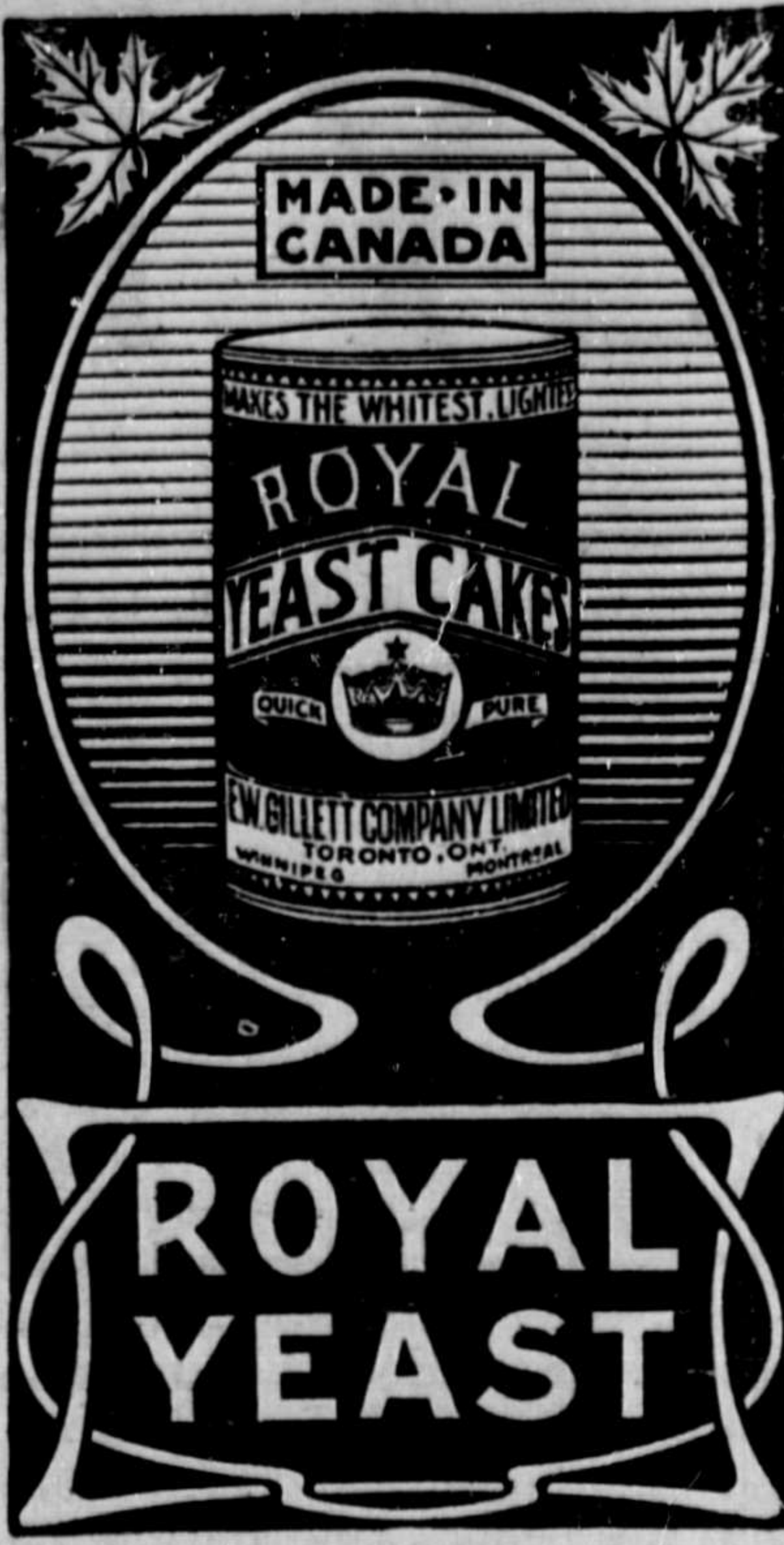
Recently too there was a movement afoot to get the Dominion Government to bonus iron and steel works on the Pacific Coast, but without success. The most the Government was prepared to do was to purchase the product in case a company could be formed that was willing to establish a plant. Efforts were made to secure capital for the enterprise but with no results.

There are numerous iron ore deposits on Vancouver Island and Texada Island, but they are tied up by American owners. It is understood that there is an indefinite amount of ore in sight but in some cases the amount has not been proved and in others the smelting qualities of the ore has not been tested.

The development of these ore bodies and the making of steel plates either at Port Arthur or on the Pacific Coast would improve the prospects of this port becoming a permanent shipbuilding centre.

All Scotsmen Honor Their Patron Saint.

When we fly the Union Jack we do not usually remember that one of the most important emblems on it is the cross of St. Andrew, the patron Saint of Scotland. Today is St. Andrew's Day and Scotsmen throughout the world all worship at the shrine on this occasion. It is one of the ties that help to bind Scotsmen together, to help them to remember the glorious history of their nation, the heroes who have fought and died, and to inspire them to greater things in the future. Local Scotsmen celebrated the occasion last night and they will dance together a few days later also in honor of the great day. It is a great thing to belong to a great people and feel the blood of a Bruce or a Wallace or a Knox coursing through one's veins.

In the Letter Box

Canada and Re-Construction.

To the Editor—

As it is admitted that Canada has done well in the war, for the sake of humanity and fighting for the world's freedom from the ruthless military power of Germany and their allies, now the question arises, what is Canada to do in the reconstruction of that part of devastated Europe?

It is well known that Canada possesses immense natural resources awaiting development and that development can only be obtained in accordance with the amount of available capital. The most urgent requirements are:

(a) The food supply and the products of the soil that can be obtained by intelligent and progressive farming and I am very pleased to learn that the best informed and most progressive Canadian farmers have now come to the advanced stage of foreseeing that mixed and rotative farming will be the best for the future welfare of the farmers of Canada and it appears to the writer that experienced experts in rotative farming should be obtained by the western Provincial Governments to thoroughly explain and promote that branch of farming in the west; also endeavor to introduce farm buildings of a more fire resisting nature than the present timber "matchbox" construction that burns so readily and many farmers lose all they possess in a few minutes, which is both a personal and material loss.

Lumber Prospects.

(b) Next to the production of the land are the immense forests of Canada, growing and producing timber of a very high grade of various kinds, ready to cut and ship and if the lumber companies will only adapt themselves to the requirements of France, Belgium and Great Britain, a splendid trade can be established at once. Something better than the common methods of framed building construction is required and the timber should be cut and prepared to allow for a more substantial class of construction and available for more artistic designs than we see in some of the western cities at the present time, which is the work of the speculating builder combined with ideas taken from some 25 cent books of plans, or the production of some commercial stores in the form of free plans.

During the past seven months the writer has had a splendid opportunity to study the situation in the western provinces and has come to the decided opinion that the northwest district of Canada is able to supply all the soft woods that France, Belgium and Great Britain requires. The northwest timber in the Prince Rupert district is much harder and more durable than the timber grown farther south; it is also smaller in size and in every way more suitable for reconstruction. Progressive mills can produce all the rough and finished work to complete a dwelling house, without sheet iron, metal or plaster, using 3-ply panel boarding for inside wall finishing.

Capital and Energy.

Immense quantities of timber are around Prince Rupert, and in the Skeena River district along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, and all that is required is a little capital, some energy and a progressive spirit and de-

sire to prepare the materials in a way to facilitate construction to meet the natural artistic ideas of the people in France and Belgium who have suffered and lost so much.

At Prince Rupert there is a splendid, large, deep, sheltered harbor, good trading facilities, with large docks at the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway terminals, a good railroad and splendid rolling stock ready and well equipped to carry to any eastern sea port a large amount of freight for shipping to France and Belgium.

Following a careful study of Prince Rupert, its location and natural facilities, surrounded with natural forests and immense mineral deposits, rock of a fire-proof nature, which with suitable Portland cement will make thoroughly fireproof buildings, large deposits of clay, not far from the city, where arrangements are already being made for the manufacture of clay products and portland cement. The large areas of good land on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, between the Rocky Mountains and the Coast Range of mountains, where many good homes may be built in the near future. With such a bright outlook and rare opportunities it appears to the writer that Prince Rupert will soon become the principal western port of Canada and the natural port for the trade with China and other Eastern parts of the world.

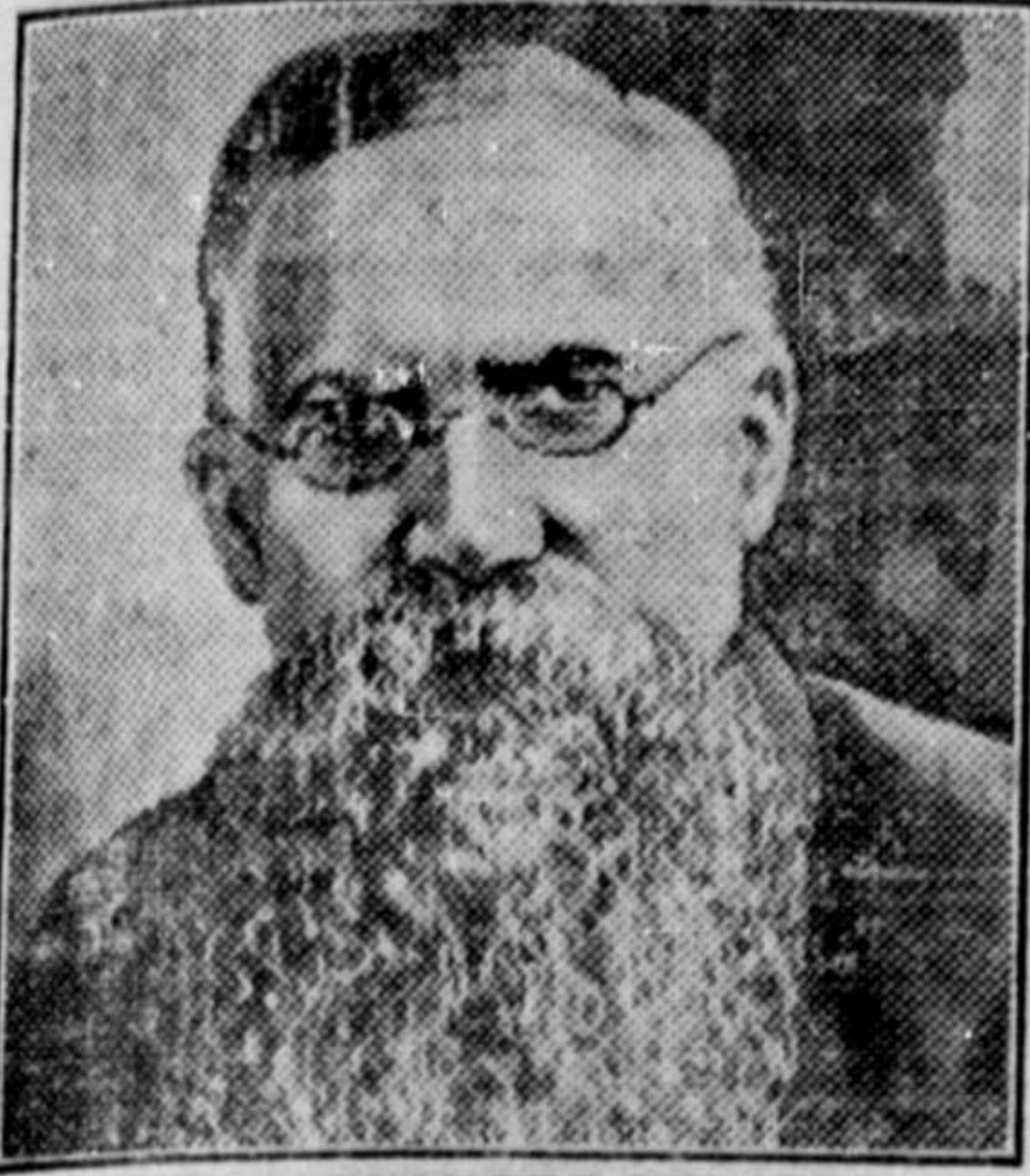

WAR FINANCING WILL CONTINUE

Will Have to Be More Loans to Cover Period Following Signing of Peace

DEMobilIZATION AFTER OTHER GREAT WARS

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—The end of the war does not by any means mean the end of war financing. Further national bond issues on a war scale basis may be expected for some time to come. In Canada it is a pretty safe prediction that next year will see another Victory Loan for the purposes of reconstruction; Secretary McAdoo has stated that so far as the United States is concerned one more, and possibly two more, Liberty Loans may be expected; other Allied nations will have similar problems, while Germany and the other defeated States will face a still more difficult situation from the financial standpoint. The gigantic operations which have been involved in this great war cannot be brought to an end suddenly; we must expect to readjust gradually and deflate as we go. Nothing, of course, approaching the present necessities has occurred before in history, but there are two instances in modern times when large demands had to be met by public financing after the war was over.

Dr. John R. Mott has compiled a table of demobilization periods of several wars from which it will be seen that large armies were kept under arms for some time after the conflict actually ceased. The approximate periods elapsing between the last battle or armistice date and the last muster, in the case of the previous six great wars of modern times, are shown herewith:

- Franco-Prussian War—two years, four months.
- Turco-Russian War—eighteen months.
- Spanish-American War—sixteen months.
- South African (Boer War)—ten months.
- Russo-Japanese War—twelve months.
- Civil War—seventeen months.

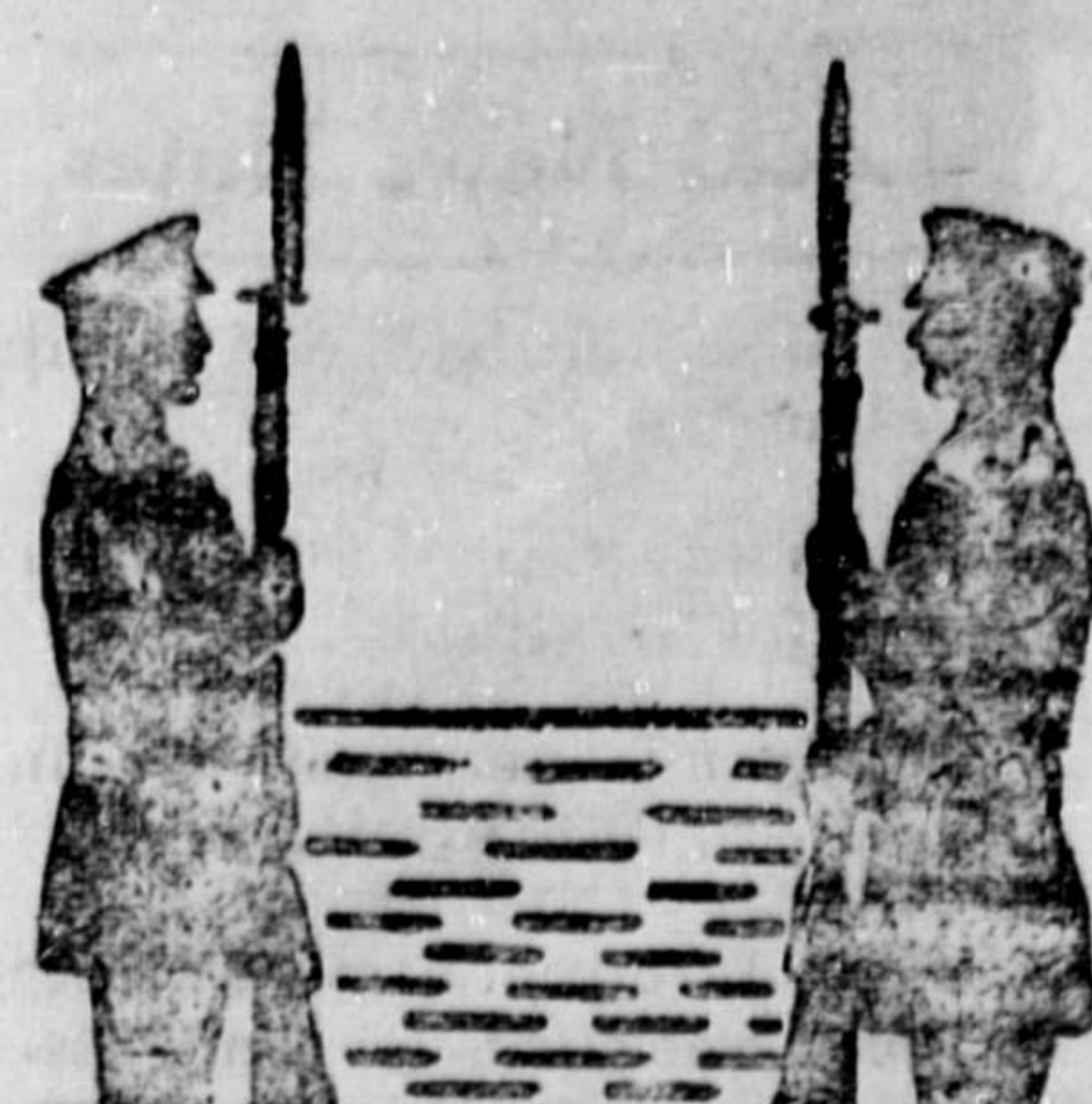

INDEPENDENT SALMON BUYERS LESS NUMEROUS

To a great extent the independent salmon buyer has disappeared from the Vancouver salmon market. This happened right after the Canada Food Board set the price to the salmon fishermen. In most instances the independent buyer chartered his boats to canneries for carriers, as he was sure of some returns on his boat where there was a great question of what he would be able to realize should he go out and get a trip of fish, and then find that he would have to sell at less than what the fish cost him to bring in to the market. In the past the independent buyer kept the fresh fish market supplied by selling to the wholesale houses, and then they in turn sold to the retailer. Although there has been more or less salmon brought in by the independent buyers there has not been the large supply that has been in the market during past years.

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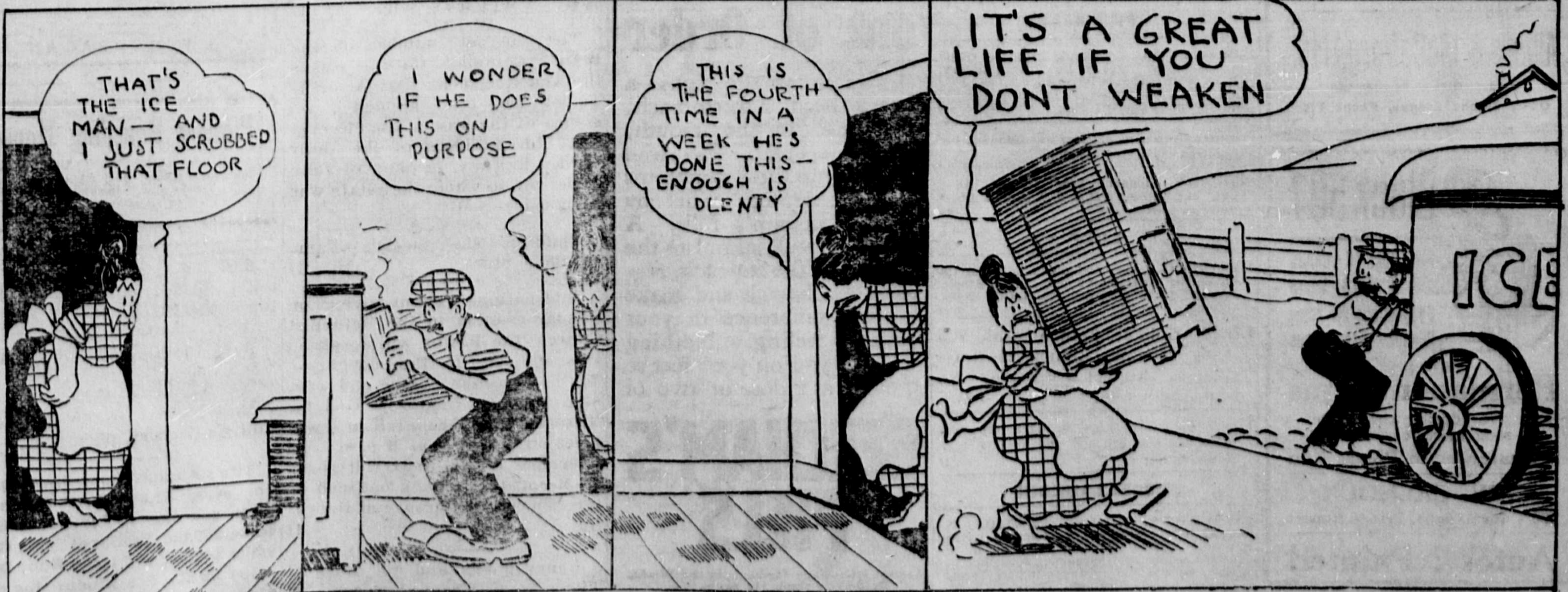
