BINDING TO START SOON

Prairie Grain Crop is Coming Along Rapidly and Cutting About to Start

WINNIPEG, July 23:-Warm weather, interspersed with scattered showers, has brought grain along very rapidly and, early next month, the whirr of binders and putt-putt of tractor-drawn combines will resound over the whole of the grain growing areas of the prairies, according to the weekly crop report of the agricultural department, Canadian National Railways. In the more northerly districts, rank, heavy growth will delay ripening and an early frost would cause havoc although at present damage from devastating hail, wind, drought, soil blowing, insects and rust has affected a very small percentage of the western acreage.

In Manitoba, weather has been exceedingly interspersed with thunder showers and grain is maturing rapidly. Cutting will commence in some districts the beginning of the week, while in others early fields will not be opened until the first week of August. The wheat crop appears heavy but in many of the more southerly districts the oat and barley stands are being damaged by grasshoppers. Farmers are now busy haying and the supply of fodder for the coming winter should be ample.

In Saskatchewan weather has been warm with heavy showers which have improved conditions. Wheat is ripening fast and it is expected the first binders will start operations about August 1. Farmers are hoping for another good rain before harvest as many of the fields require more moisture for normal berry filling.

In Central and Northern Saskatchewan conditions remain promising and, although some points in the central area could stand more moisture, this is not true of the northern districts where moisture is now so abundant that lodging persists and maturity will be delayed. Rust is now appearing at several points but it is not general.

South-Central Alberta conditions continue favorable and from many the present crop gives indications of heavier yields than crops harvested for the past few years. Warm weather is required to hasten late crops as maturity will vary greatly. In Central Alberta all grains are progressing rapidly and prospects appear excellent. Weather has been warm and showery with light hail storms reported but no intensive damage has resulted.

In the Grande Prairie territory recent showers have improved crops but grain is still badly in need of more rain and warm weather whereas, in the Peace River district crops, are more promising.

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THE NEW POLICY

Premier Bennett seems to have adopted the new policy. of diplomacy. He has placed his cards on the table at the beginning of negotiations. Not only that but he did so openly and publicly so that all Canadians might know exactly what he was doing.

The Bennett policy seems to be a good one. It is strictly modern and looks like a winner. Everybody hopes that it will be successful, except possibly a few old time party men who are better party men than they are Canadians.

We suggest again, as we have suggested before, that today Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett is the Prime Minister of Canada and as such should receive general support in any national or international crisis, whenever it is possible to do so. We should rejoice in his success for it means the succes of the whole country.

There seems to be a division of opinion in Canada in regard to the new St. Lawrence Waterways Treaty. On the one side the project promises to reduce the cost of conveying wheat to market and thus should benefit the farmers. It would be the logical consummation of the scheme! already started by the deepening and widening of the Welland Canal. If the work starts soon it will give employment and help to bring both Canada and United States. back to a more prosperous condition.

The opposing views have been summarized by Premier Taschereau of Quebec. He says the scheme will give the United States power to the extent of a million horsepower for use on their side of the boundary whereas if the scheme were held back the industries would come to the Canadian side where cheap power is already available. The scheme will add millions of dollars to Canada's debt at a time when the people are already taxed more than they can bear. Ontario will benefit from the project at the expense of the other parts of Canada, particularly from getting cheap power. This is unfair to other provinces and to existing M. M. Stephens & Co. Ltd. power companies that are paying high taxes. The fourth objection is that if the waterway ever became useful for Rates navigation by sea-going vessels it would bring about severe competition with the railways which are already at the end of their tether and unable to operate profitably. Mr. Taschereau concludes by declaring that the building of the waterway would be a national crime.


