## British Are Now In Germany

### NAVAL SQUADRON HAS TAKEN POSSESSION OF BATTLESHIP VOLGA

#### ALLIES ON GERMAN SOIL STILL ADVANCING; SHIPS IN BLACK SEA TO BE USED

WITH AMERICANS AND BRITISH CROSS FRONTIER AND FOLLOW PRUSSIAN REAR GUARD IN DIRECTION OF RHINE — NAVAL SQUADRON AT SEBASTAPOL

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, December 2.—Allied troops have now reached German soil and the occupation of that country has commenced. Naval vessels have also entered the ports on the Black Sea and taken over such ships as were found there. Both on land and sea Germany is now practically in the hands of her former enemies and all hope of ever making any resistance has gone.

American troops yesterday crossed the frontier into Prussia behind the Prussian rear guards. Treves is the most important city thus far occupied.

General Plumer of the British Fourth Army advanced with his troops across the German frontier yesterday between Beho and Eulien and advanced towards the Rhine. By evening the troops had reached the general line of Hung. Rouland, Rullingen and Mont Jois.

The Allied naval squadron which arrived off Sebastopol a few days ago took possession of the Russian battleship Volga, one destroyer and fourteen German merchant ships which were found in Black Sea ports and will be used by the Allies for transports.

Eight more German submarines surrendered yesterday, making a total of 122, which have been taken over by the Allies.

#### STRAINED RELATIONS BETWEEN COUNTRIES OF SOUTH AMERICA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Dec. 2.—The strained relations existing between Chile and Peru seem to be near the breaking point and it is not unlikely that war may result. In Peru the army reserves have been called to the colors.

Three more Chilean consuls sailed for Valparaiso yesterday and there is a general feeling on both sides that the abatement of arms will have to be resorted to.

#### BISHOP CONDUCTS THANKSGIVING AT PORT ESSINGTON

A National Thanksgiving service was held yesterday morning in the Anglican church at Port Essington, conducted by Bishop Du Vernet, which was largely attended.

Immediately after the service the Bishop by request presided at an open air gathering in front of the Government building when the honor flag in connection with the Victory Loan was unfurled. The school children sang the Maple Leaf; the Bishop explained that the quota was \$5,000, but more than \$21,000 had been subscribed. He congratulated both the people and also the committee; Messrs. Harris, Perkins and Noel on this splendid achievement.

G. W. Morrow, a former resident, followed with a brief speech. Mrs. Adams, as president of the Red Cross Society, handed the Bishop the sealed packet sent by the Governor-General of Canada, which he opened and presented the flag to Citizen Moray who with a sailor's skill hoisted it on the Government flagstaff and when it broke out in the breeze all joined in singing the National Anthem.

#### EIGHT CASES OF RYE SEIZED BY THE POLICE

Found in Two Large Trunks in Baggage-room at Dock; Liquor in Custody.

With the return to town of Constable Adams the municipal stock of liquor is again replenished. There are eight cases of Canadian rye in the police office this morning, which is reported to be selling at or around \$15 a bottle, in breach of the Prohibition Act. At this price, the value of the seizure made would be over \$1,440.

Constable Adams had a search warrant this time to guide him, and he made his way to the baggage room of the G. T. P. where he saw two large and heavy trunks. He waited to see if anyone would claim them, but they did not, and eventually he opened the trunks and found therein four cases of whisky in each trunk, packed in with coal sacks and pieces of 2-inch plank. The trunks were fairly hefty pieces of furniture in themselves and would be worth a dollar or two. The liquor is now in custody.

#### MILITARY MEDAL FOR PTE. H. E. GILLINGHAM

Local Boy's Conspicuous Bravery Rewarded by Authorities; Expects to Be Home Soon.

Pte. Hiram Earl Gillingham, son of Mrs. E. Gillingham of Victoria and brother of Miss D. B. Gillingham of Dr. Kergin's office in this city, has been awarded the Military Medal for conspicuous bravery on the field. He was wounded on September 5th in the battle of Amiens, is now progressing favorably and is expected to be returned to Canada shortly.

Pte. Gillingham, who is twenty-three years of age, left Victoria with the C. A. M. C. in 1916, and has been in France in the intervening time, being twice wounded, the first time in December, 1916, the second time on September 5, this year. On the latter occasion he "went over the top" with thirteen men, and proved to be the lucky one of the ill-omened number by being the only one to come out of the charge alive.

Before he went overseas Pte. Gillingham was employed in the Parliament Buildings at Victoria, having been in the health department for six years. He has innumerable acquaintances there, as he was educated at the North Ward School, was a member of the Y. M. C. A. and was well known in Victoria as a football player.

He also lived in Prince Rupert for some time and is well known here.

Two brothers are overseas, Edward with the American air forces in France, and Theodore, who is with the Canadian Regimental Band stationed in France.

#### DUTCH GOVERNMENT HAS APPOINTED COMMISSION TO REPORT ON LEGAL POSITION OF KAISER IN HOLLAND

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, December 2.—The Netherlands Government has appointed a commission to report on the position which the former Emperor occupies in Holland. Inquiry will be made into the relationship of the Dutch Government to legal questions that may arise.

This inquiry is the result of representations which have been made to Holland by the Allied Governments and to the discussions which have taken place as to the rights of foreign nations in relation to a fugitive from justice.

The Kaiser has been indicted as a murderer in connection with the deaths which occurred on the S. S. Lusitania and there are plenty of other charges that could be brought against him. Just what will be the outcome is uncertain, but the trend of opinion is that eventually he will have to be handed over and tried before a court of law and punished if found guilty.

#### MACKENZEN'S ARMY TO BE INTERNED BY HUNGARIAN PEOPLE

Following Demand of the French Government, 170,000 Soldiers Will Be Disarmed in Hungary.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Dec. 2.—The whole of General von Mackenzen's army is to be interned. That is the decision of the new Hungarian Government. The army of 170,000 under Field Marshal von Mackenzen will be placed in a position where they cannot again take part in the war. The French Government made representations to the new Government with the result that it has been decided to carry out their wishes.

#### FISHING STEAMERS RESUME VOYAGES

The Canadian Fishing Company steamer Imbricaria, which was tied up at Prince Rupert because all the crew were down with the "flu" has resumed fishing operations, according to word received by A. L. Hager. The steamer New England, which was quarantined at Ketchikan with nineteen cases of "flu," also got away. The New England intended to sail from Vancouver on November 13 with only 13 in the crew, but this was considered too daring so she did not clear until the following day. She had to put back to effect some engine-room repairs and finally got away to the grounds on November 15.

#### CROWN PRINCE NOT ABDICATED

Thought in London That He Still Expects to Become Ruler Over the German People.

London, Dec. 2.—It is believed in London that the German Crown Prince has not relinquished his claim to the Hohenzollern throne. Ex-Emperor William's pronouncement, in which he announced on November 29 his abdication speaks for himself only.

In the meantime the Crown Prince is resting quietly, exiled but expectant that a call will come from the German people to take him back to be their ruler.

#### WHO STARTED WAR?

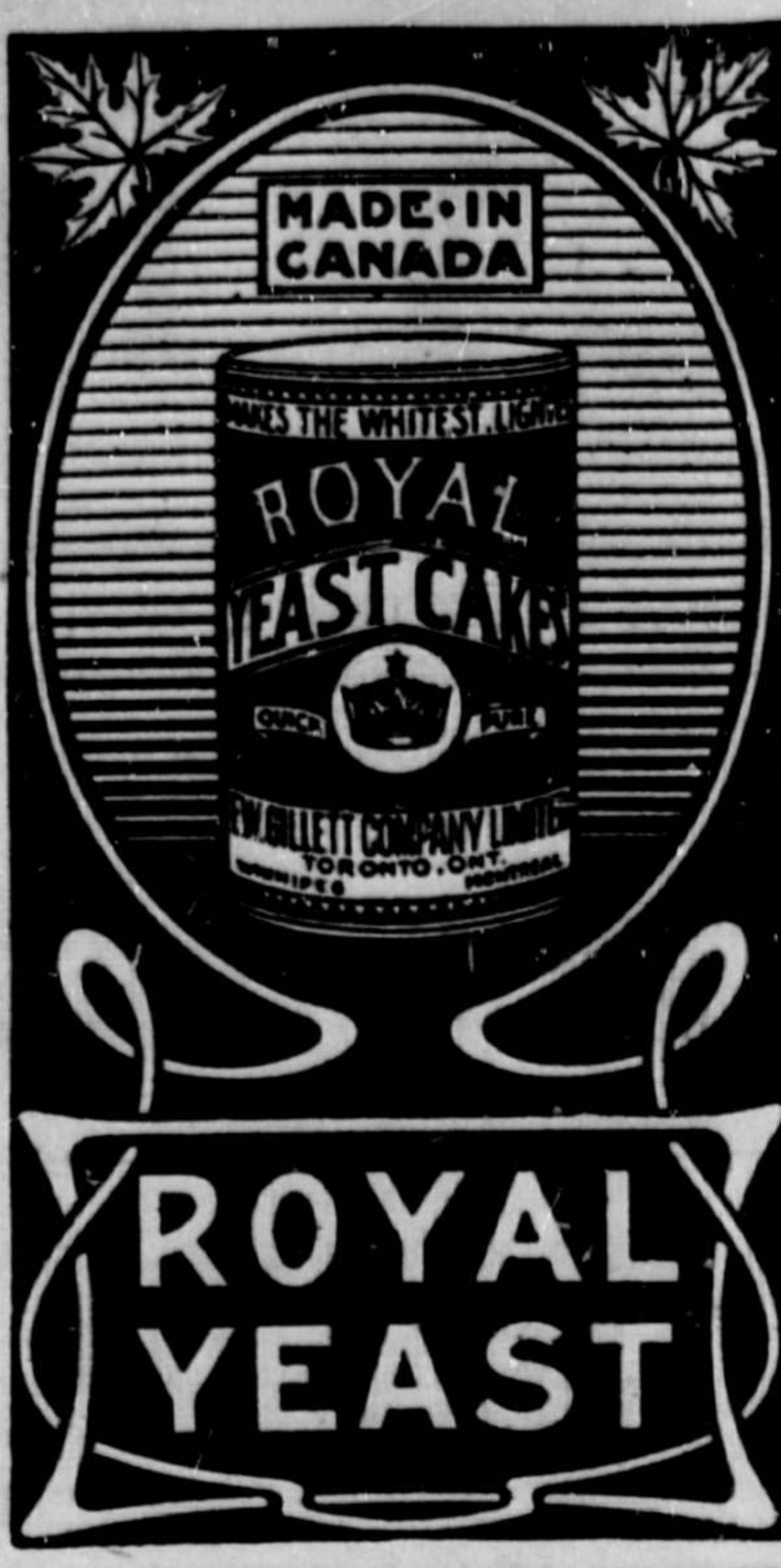
Sometimes Impossible To Explain Everything.

MINING NEWS OF CARIBOO DISTRICT

Henry Boursin, the well known miner, returned last week from a trip to Barkerville, and from him the Prince George Citizen gleaned the following items from the once famous old mining camp:

The output from the hydraulic mines this year was less than that of last year owing to a shorter water season and scarcity of labor, although the clean-up of the Stout's Gulch mine was more than usual, due to the discovery of another channel of pay gravel. Stout's Gulch is a small stream just above Barkerville. The yield of gold from the Gulch, first by drifting and later by hydraulic, amounts to \$2,500,000. The width of hydraulic pay (more than 600 feet) is extraordinary for such a small stream.

C. W. Moore, acting for American capitalists, has bought the locally-owned Waverly hydraulic mine on Grouse Creek, four miles from Barkerville. Although the Waverly is one of the oldest hydraulic mines in the province, it doubtless contains more gold than has been washed out of it, as the head of the sluice-flume is 30 feet above the bottom of the pay gravel in the main channel, and the gravel below the flume is known to be rich.

F. J. Tregillus, T. A. Blair and Pat Carey are sinking a shaft on the nine-foot gold-bearing vein on their Warspite claim at Proserpine Mountain, four miles from Barkerville. At the present depth, 14 feet, the shaft discloses an excellent showing of visible gold, while the rock in which no gold can be seen shows a nice string of flour-gold when mortared and panned. The vein on which this work is being done has been exposed at intervals by trenching and open cuts a length of more than 8,000 feet and is believed to be the mother lode from which the \$20,000,000 placer of Williams Creek and the \$2,500,000 placer of Grouse Creek had their origin.

The creeks mentioned drain the western and eastern slopes respectively of Proserpine Mountain, and the strike of the vein closely approximates the upstream limit of rich placer on each creek.

The Lightning Creek Gold Gravels & Drainage Company is drilling with a Keystone on Lightning at Wingdam. This company was promoted by C. H. Unverzagt of New York. Last summer an agent of the United States Government was sent out to the property to see how it tallied with the advertisements. The result is that Mr. Unverzagt is under investigation by the federal grand jury at New York.

The Tertiary mine at Cottonwood Canyon, Fraser River, 17 miles north of Quesnel, is closed for the season. The milling system installed last summer, was tested by working a considerable quantity of gravel and was found satisfactory, the mill-run showing a higher average value than was indicated by the sampling. This is the cemented gold-gravel property purchased from Don Killam by a Chicago syndicate.

UNDER ITALIAN FLAG.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Rome, Nov. 30. — The entire mercantile fleet of the Austrian Lloyd Co., with headquarters at Trieste, is now under the Italian flag.

SAW "MOVIES" OF NORTHERN TRAWLER

How ground fish and cod are caught on the banks of Prince Rupert by the steam trawler James Carruthers and are prepared large number of fishing men and for the market was shown to others interested in the marketing of cheap fish through the medium of motion pictures at the Canadian Fishing Company's big warehouse, says the Vancouver Province.

The films which were taken on the northern banks under the direction of Capt. F. W. Wallace, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Fisheries Association, and an official of the Canada Food Board are being shown throughout the West under the direction of the Food Board in a campaign to increase the consumption of British Columbia fish. Through the courtesy of A. L. Hager, the warehouse of the Canadian Fishing Co., Limited, was temporarily fitted out for the purpose of exhibiting the films on Wednesday. An appreciative audience was in attendance.

The pictures, the photography of which is exceptionally good, show every phase of trawling, starting with the first cast of the trawl to the disposal of the fish to the purchaser on the prairies. The plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Limited, at Prince Rupert, one of the largest and most up-to-date fish and cold storage plants on the continent, was shown. The James Carruthers, the company's big steam trawler, was placed at the disposal of the Food Board for the taking of the pictures, and every phase of the industry was "filmed" even to the breaking away of a trawl of 10,000 pounds of fish.

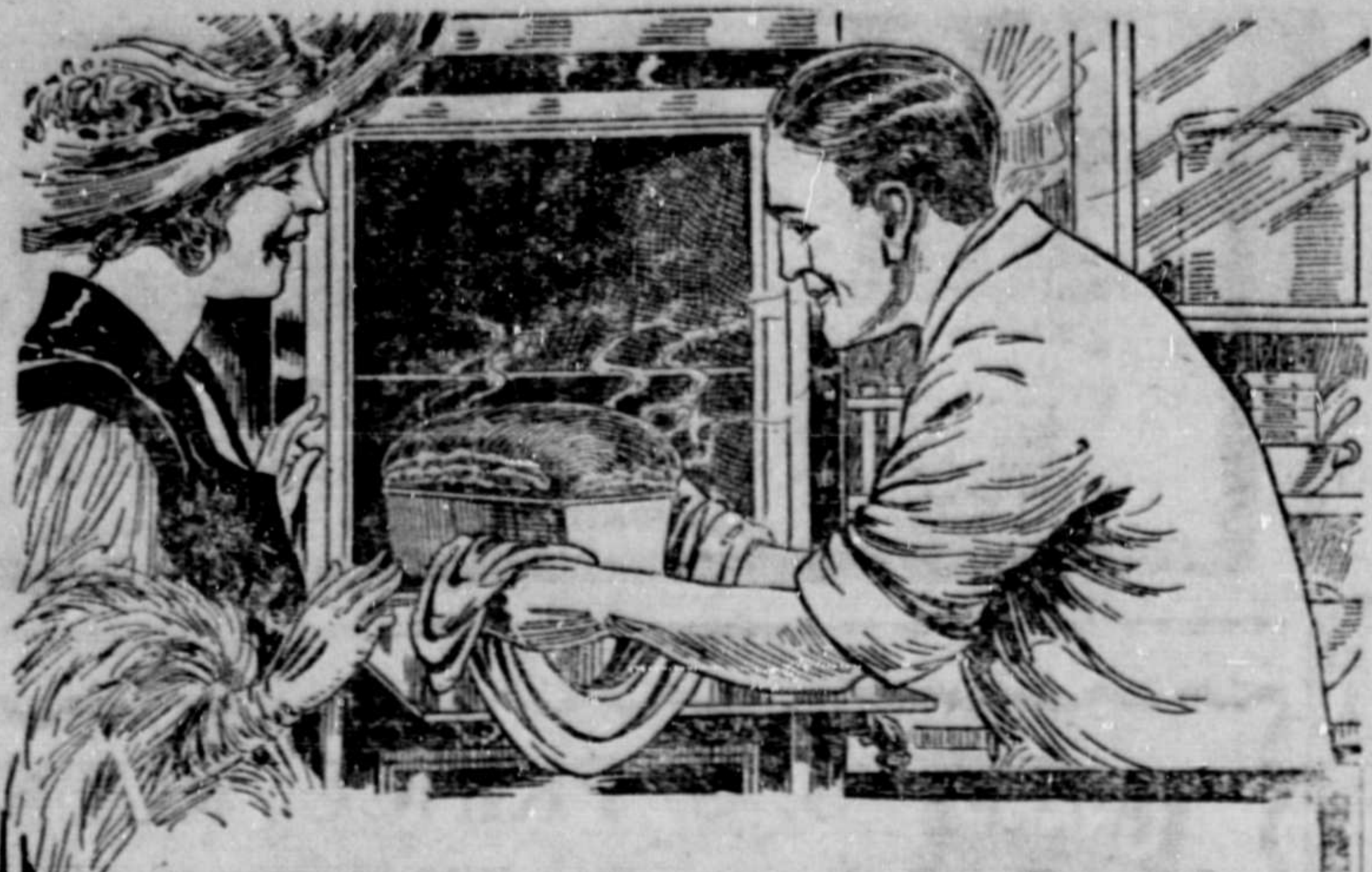

News in Brief

It is stated in Vancouver that the salmon pack this year is valued at close to ten million dollars.

Work is being pushed on the Thane property at Juneau. Manager Jackson says that just as soon as men can be secured extra shifts will be worked and it is expected the output will be trebled before long.

The Victoria Daily Colonist publishes a picture of the Prince Rupert drydock and shipbuilding site and explains that two government ships are to be built there and that negotiations are on for the establishment of a transpacific steamship service from this port.

At the offices of the Development Association in Victoria a visitor inquired if two people could come over from Washington State and get married without any trouble. "There is no trouble in getting married," was the reply of the spinster secretary, "the trouble comes afterwards."

The Halifax Shipyards Limited has secured contracts from the Dominion Government to build two steel ships of 10,500 tons each for \$197,500 a ton.

The Rossland Miner, which for many years has been published daily, has now reverted to a weekly.

The Provincial Government made an effort to save the Greenwood smelter from closing by offering to guarantee the bonds on a plant to treat the concentrates from Copper Mountain, but the management did not consider they were justified in going ahead. The smelter will close this week.

PAULINE FREDERICK IN "MADAME JEALOUSY"

"Madame Jealousy," which is to be seen tonight at the Westholme, is one of those intensely interesting allegorical morality plays that have had such a vogue. The Paramount people have chosen it as the vehicle for displaying the art of Pauline Frederick and they have made a happy choice.

Added to the big film is a delightful comedy, "Never Lie to Your Wife," which is said to be well worth the price of admission in itself.

ALASKA-JUNEAU TO BE MUCH IMPROVED

The Alaska-Juneau Gold Mining Company will shortly issue \$3,500,000 in bonds for the purpose of raising money to put it on a practical working basis. About \$500,000 of this sum will be used to improve the mill of the property so that the mining cost can be reduced. This is a statement made to the San Francisco Examiner by F. W. Bradley, president of the company.

Mr. Bradley told the Examiner that he believed that Juneau would be one of the first cities in Alaska to feel the impetus of peace conditions, and that he is convinced that the government will do something to stimulate gold mining in the United States.

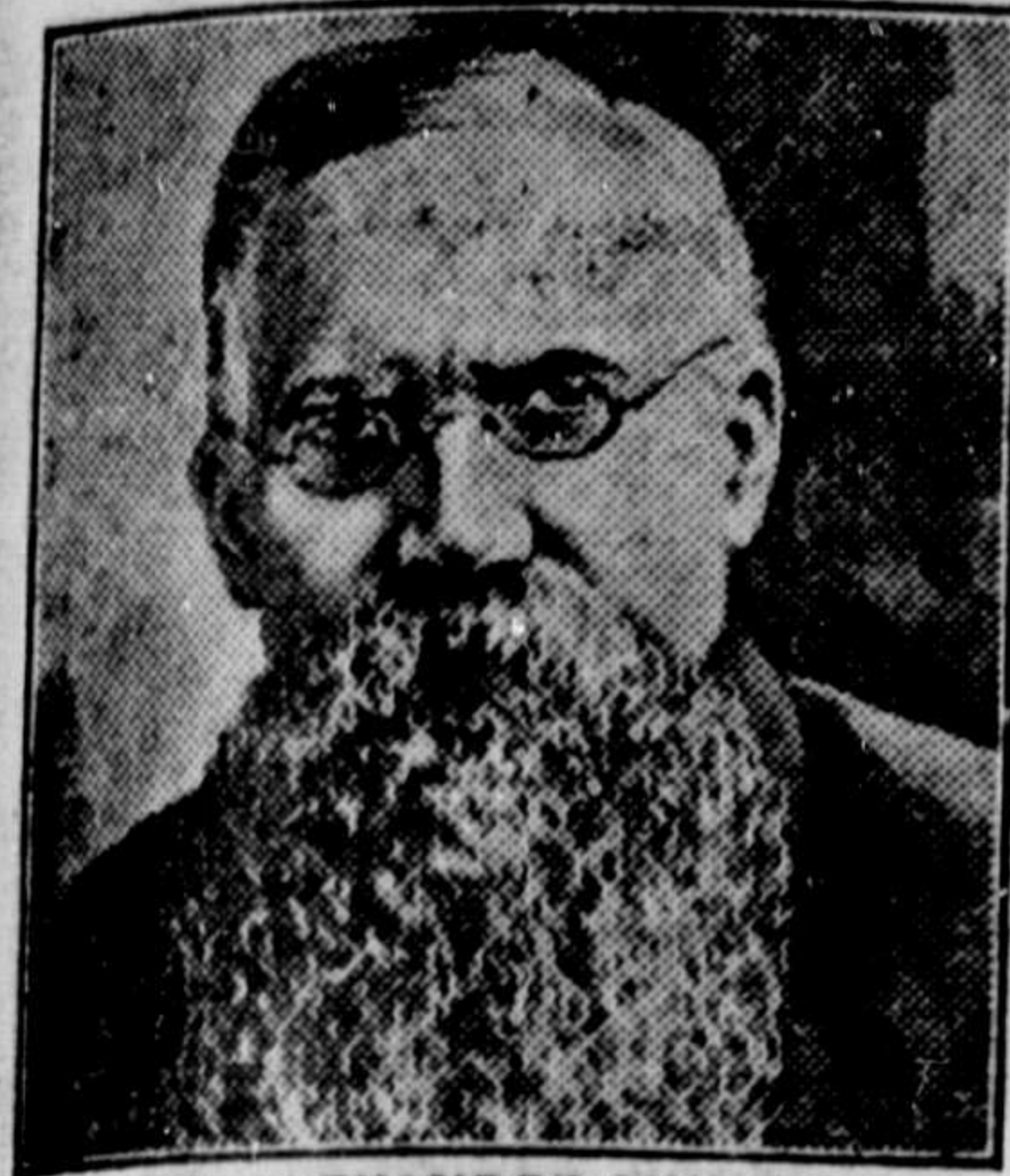

## EMPRESSES COMING BACK TO THE PACIFIC

Big C. P. R. Liners to Be Released From War Service.

The C. P. O. S. liners Empress of Russia and Empress of Asia are to be released from war service and will soon return to Vancouver to resume the Pacific run.

In 1914 every C. P. R. ship was commandeered for war service and for twenty months Vancouver was without the C. P. R. service. The Russia, Asia and Japan were armed and did a good deal of patrol work and were in action in the Red Sea, while the Monteaule was used to carry Indian troops to Egypt. It was the Russia which received Commander von Muller and the survivors of the Emden from H. M. A. S. Sydney and took them to Colombo.

The Empress of India was bought by an Indian rajah and turned into a hospital ship called the Loyalty and she is still plying in this service.

In 1918 the admiralty released the vessels and they returned to Vancouver and resumed their peaceful voyages in the Orient. Then the Monteaule was commandeered again and she went to Siberia and picked up the remnant of the Serbian army. These men were paid and equipped by the British and the Monteaule carried them most of the way to Saloniki, the little force having practically wandered right around the world.

Then came the big German drive in the spring and every available ship was taken over to carry American troops. The big liners Russia and Asia were among the ships and they have since transported many thousands of Americans to Europe.

The carrying trade of the Pacific has practically passed into the hands of the Japanese for the Blue Funnel freighters have also been on war service and have only made irregular calls and even while the big Empresses were back in 1916-17 they were busy carrying Chinese labor battalions.

New York, Nov. 30.—Labor leaders here declared today that agitation for a world strike to be held December 9, as a demonstration against the failure of the California Governor to pardon Thos. J. Mooney would commence.

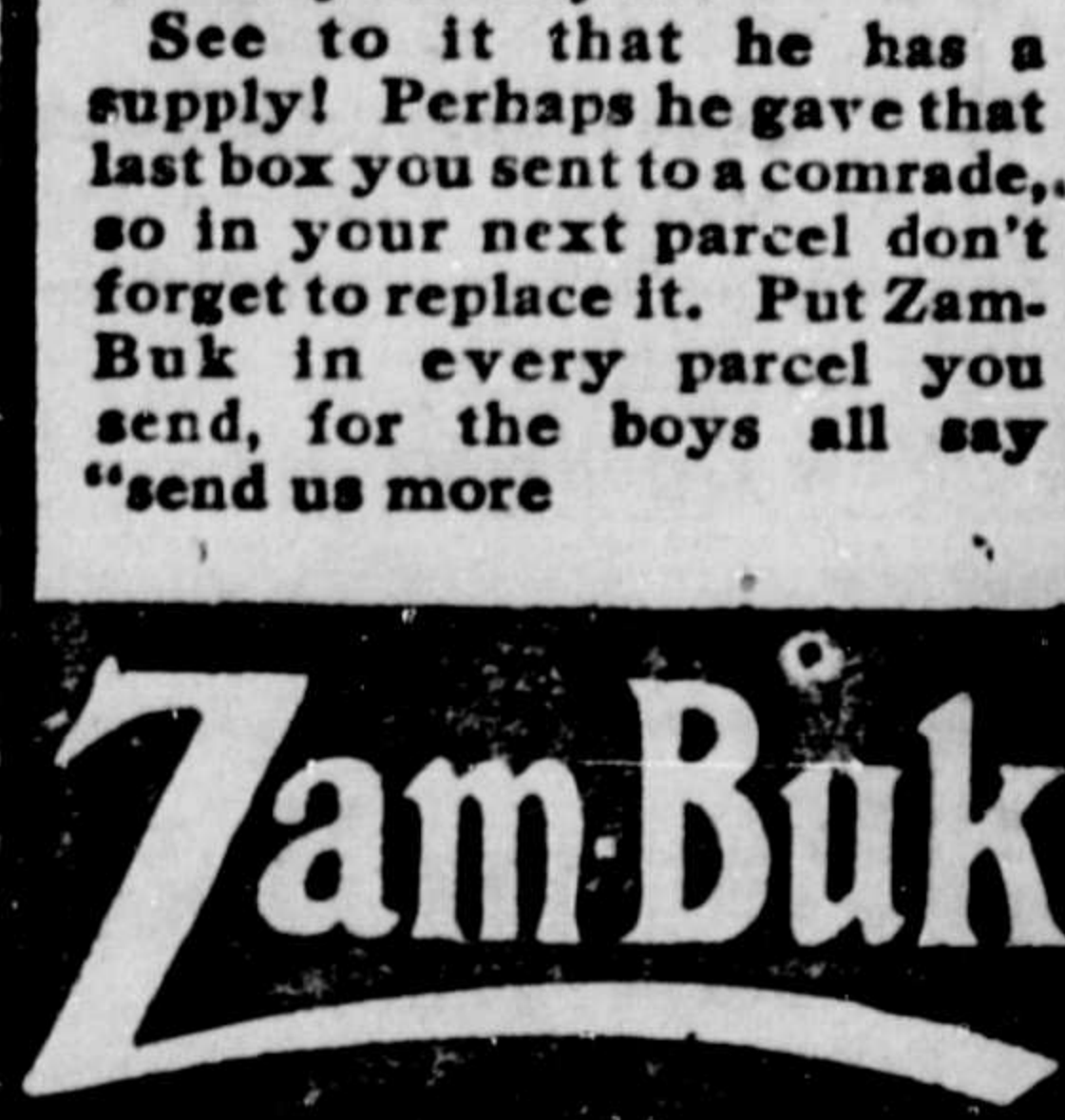
