Great Strategist Is Acclaimed

FOCH GETS GREAT RECEPTION FROM PEOPLE OF LONDON, ENGLAND

MARSHAL FOCH ON VISIT TO LONDON IS ACCLAIMED EVERYWHERE BY POPULACE

London, December 3.—Marshal Foch who is visiting London has been acclaimed everywhere by the people. On his way to and from a meeting with the Premier and Ministers at Downing Street people lined the streets and gave him a splendid reception.

It is announced that the preliminaries of the Peace Conference have been arranged and that everything is now in readiness to proceed.

The matter of what to do with the late Kaiser was discussed, but no statement in that regard has yet been made. It is generally accepted, however, that a demand will be made on Holland that he be given up and brought to trial.

TELEPHONE BYLAW HAS BEEN REVISED

Change in Amount of Rebates Made Before Corporate Seal Attached to Document.

At the Council meeting held last night the chairman of the Public Utilities Committee, Alderman Dybhavn, reported that at a special meeting of the Council at which the newspapers were not present the telephone bylaw had been revised and passed through all its stages and finally adopted. This provided for a rebate of 75c. in place of the present \$1 rebate and when payment is made for six months the rebate is to be \$5 instead of \$7 as formerly.

There is nothing to indicate who is responsible for the change, as the details of the discussion and the movers and seconders of the resolutions were not made public.

Mr. Peters announced that the corporate seal of the Council had already been affixed to the bylaw and it was now in force.

INFLUENZA HAD BAD EFFECT ON FISH CATCHES

Months of October and November Show Marked Reduction Over Same Months in former Years.

Owing to the influenza epidemic the fishing record of the present year will be lower than that of last year or the year before. The months of October and November have shown a marked falling off in the catch and even yet conditions have hardly become normal. Some of the best fishermen have died from the epidemic and this has had the effect of tying up the boats.

In October, 1917, the catch was 1,025,000 lbs. and the year before that it was 1,780,000 lbs. This year in October the catch was only 653,500 lbs.

For November of last year the catch was 1,048,000 lbs., and for 1916 it was 1,080,000 lbs. This year it was only 619,000 pounds. The falling off is chiefly due to influenza but also it is due in part to the calling up of a number of fishermen by the Canadian and United States Governments for military service.

While the catch will not be as big this year as last the value of the catch is almost double that of last year, as the price of halibut has been so much higher than in former years. MEAT PACKERS CONTROL PRICES

It is not an uncommon thing for business houses to agree to certain prices but when it is done by the big concerns it becomes a menace.

The remedy is said here to lie in the hands of the Government, who may have to step in and set the prices at which food commodities shall be sold.

Sam Fagerland Was Well Known Here, Where He Was for Some Time Mate On Kelly.

News was received in town yesterday of the death in California on November 13 of Sam Fagerland, formerly mate on the trawler Andrew Kelly and a well known fisherman of this port. He lived here for several years and those who knew him speak most highly of him as a man who was "white all through." He left here some little time ago to go to Harrison Hot Springs and from there he went to a hot springs in California, where he died.

Yesterday Miss Lena Fagerland a sister of the late Mr. Fagerland, arrived on the steamer Princess Mary accompanied by Miss Mary Billings for the purpose of looking after her brother's affairs here.

The case against Miss Martin, who is charged with an infraction of the Prohibition Act, was further adjourned this morning in the police court.

POTLATCH IS CURIOUS OLD INDIAN CUSTOM

Ceremony is Simple in Conception But Hidden Meaning is Profound, Says Rev. J. B. McCullagh.

Rev. J. B. McCullagh, C. M. S., of the Naas river, who is a deep student of Indian native life and language, in a series of articles to one of his missionary journals recently has the following:

The full-blown flower of Indian life is undeniably the far-famed "potlatch." It formed the chief corner-stone of heathenism in the old days, and its spirit today is the chief stumbling block to progress among the Christian communities. The word, I think, is of Russian origin, and belongs to the Chinook jargon, which seems to be a conglomeration of words borrowed from various Indian and European tongues (principally French and English), and strung together in a very simple manner for trading purposes. "Potlatch" means to give, and is transitively applied to the Indian custom of giving away property at feasts: in the language proper of each tribe, however, this custom has its own name. In Zimshian it is Yaok; in Gitikshan and Nisga, Yuk. But this Yuk is like an iceberg in mid-ocean, a comparatively small part of it only is visible to the observer, while the greater part of it lies hidden beneath the surface. People having just seen the feast, the dance, and the distribution of gifts have gone away imagining they know all there is to know of the Indian "Potlatch," little suspecting the underlying existence of a profound conception, and that what they have seen has been only the uplifted ends.

Strictly, and actually in the old days, only men of noble birth—chiefs and sub-chiefs—could celebrate the Yuk. But now every ordinary individual tries to win for himself, if not the actual social standing of a chief, at least the deferential treatment due to that position; for the Yuk is essentially an appeal to the suffrage of the people. Thus it is by means of this custom that a chief maintains his status, and continues to hold his various titles to hunting grounds, or fishing streams, as also his right to the crests and the totem which go with the name

PRESIDENT WILSON HOPES TO TRANSLATE INTO ACTION IDEALS OF UNITED STATES

Washington, December 3.—President Wilson in his address to Congress said that he had considered it his paramount duty to attend the Peace Conference. He hopes to translate into action the ideals of the United States in the war.

The President paid a glorious tribute to the American forces for their splendid services and to the people at home for their enthusiastic war effort.

he bears. To this end all the men and women of class in the tribes forming the confederacy are invited with much formality to the village of the chief who is about to celebrate the Yuk, where, on the appointed day, they assemble in his large house (more recently in a large public hall), each seated according to rank.

From this point the principal features of the Yuk are:

1. Gigenuh-l Wau, or prayer to the guests. This consists of a very formal and at the same time intreating address; the idea seeming to be the removal of prejudice, opposition and hostility. In no other sense is the word Gigenuh-qu used; to no other function but that and the worship of God is the word applied. Thus the first feature of the Yuk is prayer.

2. The feast comes next, and, if the celebration be on behalf of a dead chief (which is the true basis of the custom), the guests partake of "the offerings of the dead."

3. After that, the chief (who has taken the dead man's place, and is celebrating the Yuk) proceeds to declare himself—he will go into the details of his descent—he will boast of his ancestors—he will recite the traditions of his family—he will exhibit the crests he is entitled to wear—he will enumerate the items of his estate, hunting and fishing places—and he will sing his Lim-Aui, the ancient song of his line. If all the assertions he has made, and all the claims he has advanced, pass muster unchallenged he will then proceed to make his vows with regard to his policy (shall we say) and position in the future. He promises what he will do and what he will not do.

4. Finally come the gifts, offerings made to each person present according to his or her rank, and each offering or so-called gift is lifted up and handed to the recipient the celebrant cries with a loud voice, "Dum ur-bah'-yes So-and-so," (pronouncing the name of the dead. I have always interpreted this Bah'-mag, therefore as meaning the putting up of the soul. The Indian cannot tell you what significance is attached to the word; he is only uttering a shibboleth handed down to him from the past. But I take it that the hidden meaning of the custom is the putting up of the soul of the dead, and the making of offerings on his behalf; the use of the prefix "um" shows that. Originally these were pledges, held for a time and returned whenever the recipient had occasion to celebrate himself, the purpose they served being that of public avouchment of social and public standing, as if to say, "You have heard my claims and passed them unanimously, and in return I publicly avow you in your rank and position." In its conception the Yuk was certainly a most wonderful system for holding scattered and perfectly free communities together in their ancestral and family rights, and of keeping those rights, titles, tra-

What About a Co-operative Cold Storage?

There is to be a meeting of fishermen tonight for the purpose of discussing the question of a fishermen's cold storage. The committee which has had the matter in hand has put it up to the fishermen with the idea that they, being the most interested parties, might like to go ahead with the scheme.

If the fishermen want an independent cold storage this is their chance. There is a good deal of money needed but doubtless the merchants and others would take stock in the concern. It is necessary, however, that those most interested in the business should undertake the work and when it becomes a going concern they will be the people who will support it.

Time Now Ripe for Athletic Association.

The invasion of influenza has had the effect of cutting off all the winter activities of a social nature. There had been a proposal to form an athletic association with a view to securing the use of the Agricultural Building for games and sports during the winter months.

Now there is again some interest being taken in the proposal and the movement is worthy of all support. It is during the winter the institution is needed. Men both young and old become soft and flabby from lack of exercise.

With a hall for games and sports, with men's gymnasium classes two or three times a week, even the older men might easily get the exercise which they need. It is true that until after Christmas many of them will be very busy and possibly may not be able to take part.

Smelter Proposal Not a New One.

The question of erecting a smelter here has been agitated from time to time, but there is nothing like keeping it up. No great improvement has been secured except by being persistent and going after what is wanted with a determination to succeed.

In an interview with a mining man published yesterday it was set forth clearly that the one logical point for a smelter was Prince Rupert. It was shown that not only would it serve the mines of the north and south coast if built here, but it would also be convenient for the miners of Omineca.

What the mining man failed to state was that on the Queen Charlottes there are a number of producing mines that would add their quota and help to keep a smelter going.

There is a large deposit of low-grade ore controlled by the Granby Company up the Estall River. A good deal of boring has been done and it is said to be an even larger deposit than the one at Hidden Creek.

LOCAL LAND LAWS AHEAD OF DOMINION

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Gives Interview in Vancouver on His Return From East.

After attending the conference of provincial ministers at Ottawa and engaging in his first airplane joyride near Toronto, Hon. T. Dufferin Pattullo returned this morning and went on to Victoria, says the Vancouver Province. Hon. John Oliver, who also attended the Ottawa meeting, but who is a trifle aged for the airplane class, is one day behind Hon. Mr. Pattullo. In an interesting discussion of the conference the minister of lands said: "The main value of the conference at Ottawa lies in the exchange of views of the various representatives from all parts of the Dominion. A large number of questions and the viewpoints of the various provinces obtained.

"While the all-important problem from the standpoint of British Columbia was the re-construction period which is now upon us and a thorough and adequate provision for the rehabilitation of returned soldiers into civil life, nevertheless we took the opportunity to present British Columbia's claim for the return of the railway belt and the Peace River block.

Insisted Upon It.

"The federal authorities did not appear in a receptive mood in respect to our claim, but it will not surprise the people of British Columbia to learn that their representatives insisted upon the consideration by the conference of the claims of British Columbia, and I am glad to say that the conference viewed these claims with every sympathetic favor.

"In respect of the land settlement proposals of Hon. Mr. Calder, we, of course, in British Columbia, are a long way in the lead in legislation upon land settlement. I was so bold as to say some time ago that we have in British Columbia the most progressive land legislation in the world. Having spent some time in the east and having visited New York and Washington in addition to Eastern Canadian centres, gathering all possible information on this and other problems, I am doubly confirmed in the opinion which I have formerly expressed in connection with our land policy.

"I earnestly hope that Mr. Calder will unremittently pursue his announced policy of encouraging immigration. It is absolutely essential that we should have more people in Canada in order to develop our resources, and thereby lessen the burden of the heavy 'overhead' with which we are confronted. Particularly does this problem confront British Columbia, and as far as the British Columbia Government is concerned we purpose doing everything possible to encourage development of our natural resources which will mean, of course, increase of population.

A Federal Duty.

"Members of the Ottawa Government made it very clear that

the Dominion Government looks upon the soldier settlement problem as being the especial duty and function of the federal administration. The latter proposes to carry out its operations with regard to assistance to returned soldiers through the Soldier Settlement Board, and such action as is taken will be through the medium of the board and with its approval. On our part we are ready to transfer to the Dominion board for soldier settlement purposes any vacant crown lands suitable for soldier settlement. The details of co-operation between the Dominion Soldier Settlement Board and the provincial authorities will require to be worked out, but we propose to cooperate to the fullest possible extent by rendering available, so far as is in our power, land which the Dominion board may desire for soldier settlement purposes.

"I am glad to say that the acting Prime Minister, Sir Thomas White, indicated that the Dominion Government would cooperate in some scheme of providing homes for soldiers and widows of soldiers. I left with Sir Thomas a memorandum setting forth just what we in British Columbia had done to date with regard to purchasing lots in South Vancouver and elsewhere, which we were giving to returned soldiers free of charge. I asked the acting Prime Minister if he would indicate at the earliest possible date just what form the assistance to be given by the Dominion Government would take, and I am sure that he will give the matter immediate consideration. The principle has been approved. It is a matter of working out the details.

A Flight at Toronto.

"Many other matters of importance came before the conference which I need not mention, as Hon. Mr. Oliver will no doubt make a statement upon his return. During my visit I paid a visit to the aviation schools and the aerial works in Toronto. I had also opportunity of making a flight with an expert pilot, Lieut. Parks, formerly of Yale, B. C., who told me that if the evolutions made me sick to put up my hand. As I did not put up my hand I think he tried hard to force me to do so, for he went through all the evolutions known to flydom, and it was all very interesting.

Canada may well be proud of her work in connection with the aerial service. It must be said that under the direction of Sir Joseph Flavelle, who called to his assistance a bunch of live-wire young business men, a remarkable organization was built up in a remarkably short space of time."

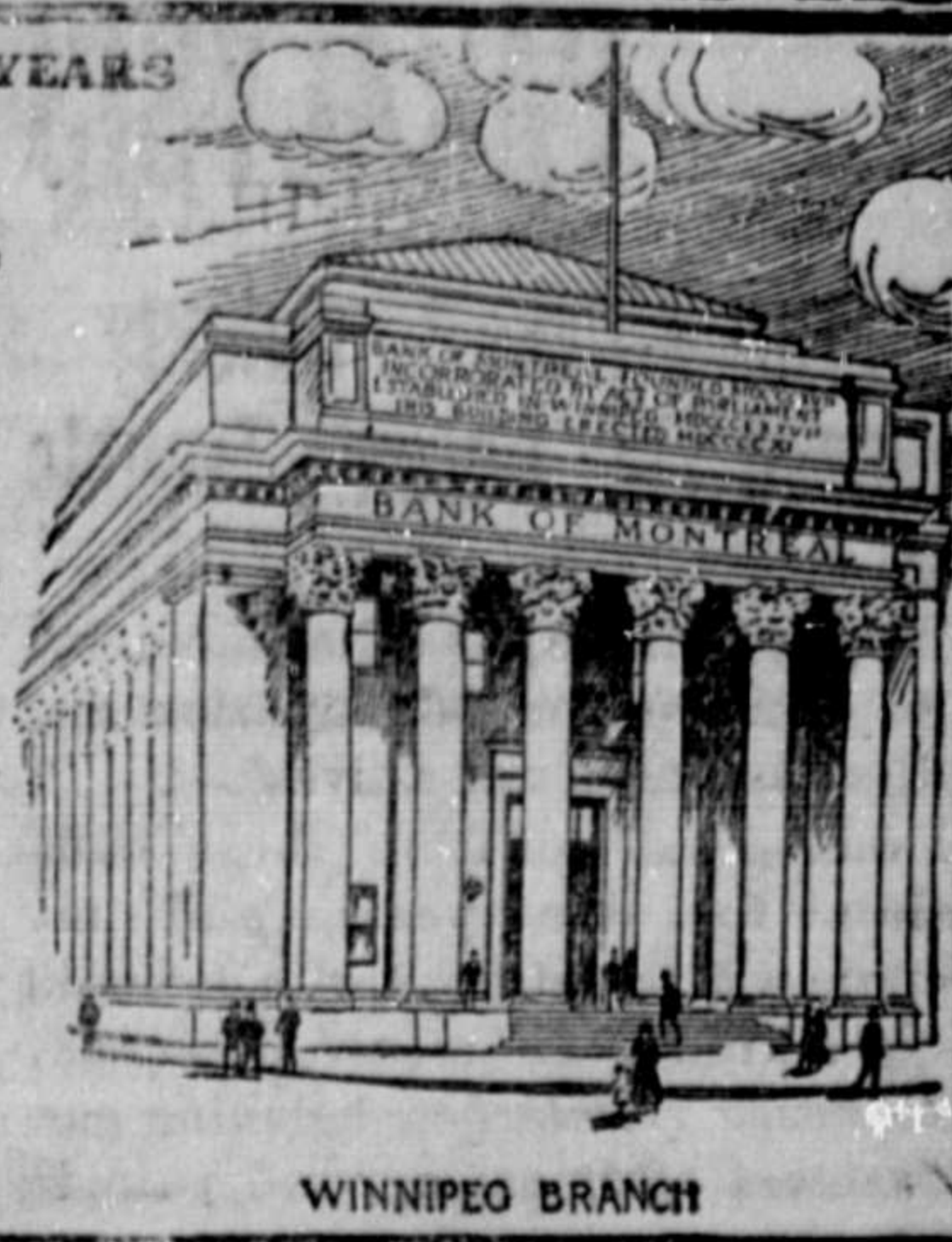

SUPERINTENDENT OF UTILITIES REFUSED INCREASE OF SALARY

A recommendation from the Utilities Committee that T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, be granted an increase in salary of \$15 a month was refused by the City Council last night on a vote of four to three, Aldermen Dybhavn, McRae and McMeekin voting for the increase and Aldermen Casey, Barrie, Rochester and Kirkpatrick opposing.

Immediately on the proposal being made by the chairman of the committee, Alderman Casey was on his feet to protest. He did not think that the superintendent had given such service as to warrant special consideration. Not only did he object to the increase but to the superintendent holding the position.

Alderman Rochester opposed the increase on general principles. He did not consider the cost of living had gone up to such an extent as to warrant two advances in one year. Already he had been advanced \$25 and now he came back with a request for another \$15 which would make his salary \$240 a month.

The vote was then taken.

Each proposal must be accompanied by an accepted bank cheque or certificate of deposit on a chartered bank of Canada, made payable to the Honorable the Minister of Public Works, for a sum equal to 20% of tender, which shall be forfeited if the party tendering decline to enter into contract when called upon to do so, or if he fail to complete the work contracted for. The cheques or certificates of deposit of unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon the execution of the contract.

Tenders will not be considered unless made out on the forms supplied, signed with the actual signature of the tenderer and enclosed in the envelopes furnished, accepted.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to be also protected. The decision of the Minister or Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

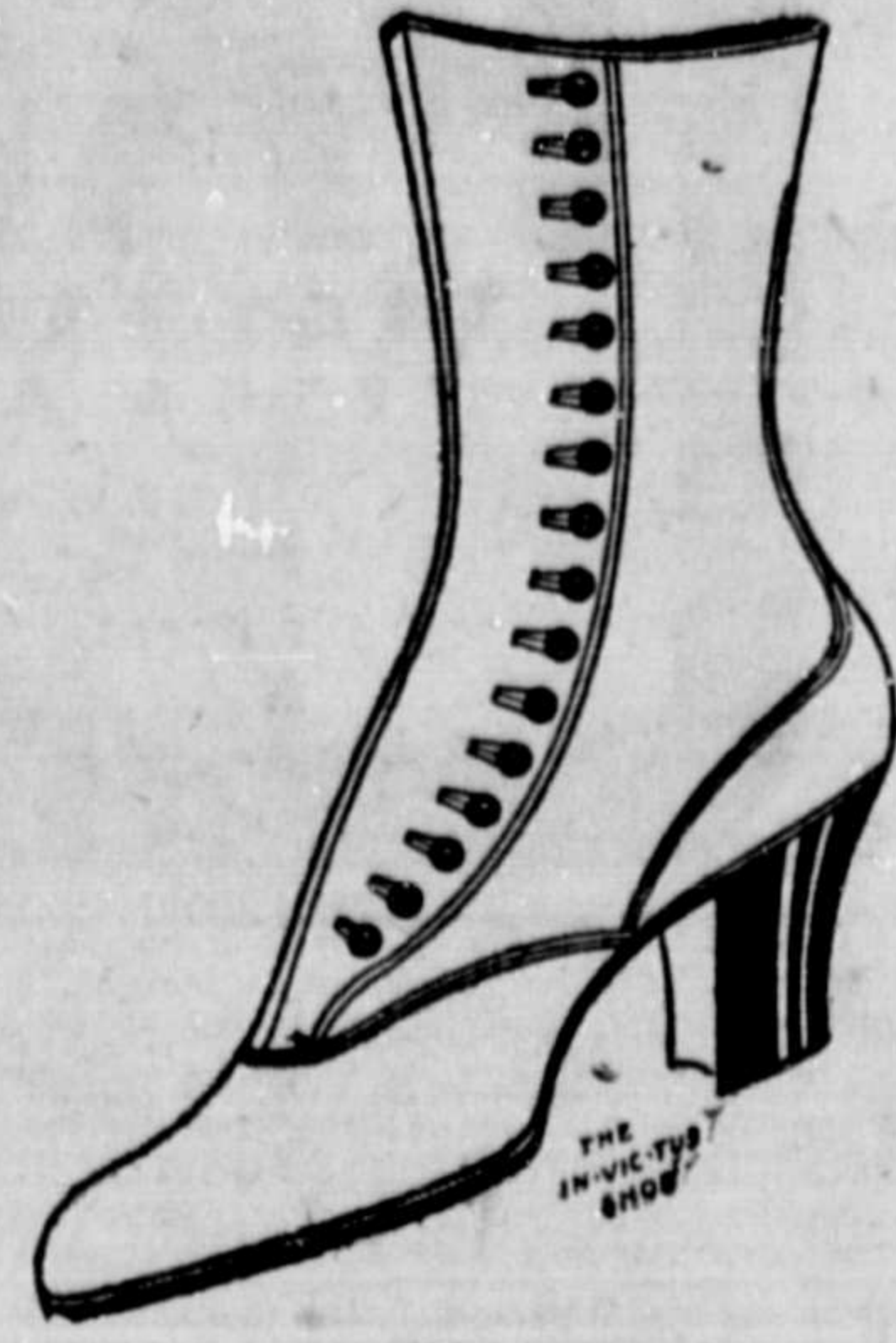
