Crown Prince Still Hangs On

HOUSING QUESTION TO BE DEALT WITH BY HELP OF DOMINION GOVT.

CROWN PRINCE DECLARES HE HAS NOT RENOUNCED HIS CLAIM TO THE THRONE

CONTENT TO RETURN TO GERMANY AS PRIVATE CITIZEN IF REPUBLIC IS FORMED IN THAT COUNTRY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Dec. 4.—"I have not renounced anything and I have not signed any document whatever," said the former Crown Prince in the course of an interview with the Associated Press yesterday. If a republic of Germany is formed, however, the Crown Prince contends that he will be content to return to Germany as a private citizen.

The little secluded island on which the Crown Prince is interned has become quite a centre of attraction, as there are always a great many people who are attracted by anything which smacks of royalty.

The unanimous decision of the representatives of the Allies at the meeting yesterday to demand that Holland hand over to the Allies the former German Emperor and the Crown Prince seems to have caused quite a flurry in Germany where many of the people still are loyal to the Hohenzollerns. It is generally accepted that under pressure Holland will give way to the demand and that the ex-Kaiser and his son will be put on trial, the former at any rate.

The British people seem determined that there shall be no weakening in regard to the treatment of the German royal family. To allow them at large is dangerous and both the father and son must be put in a safe place where they will not meddle with European affairs.

PRESIDENT TO BE MET BY A LARGE ESCORT

Fleet Will Proceed 1,500 Miles to Sea to Bring Wilson Safe to Europe.

ROOSEVELT SAYS STATES SHOULD STAY BY ALLIES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Dec. 4.—A large fleet will meet President Wilson in mid-ocean and convey him back to England. He will be escorted by American warships until the Allied fleet picks him up about 1,500 miles from here.

The Grand Fleet is being assembled at Brest, France, and Portland, England. Dreadnoughts in this fleet comprise the largest ships on this side of the water, including the New York, Oklahoma and Nevada, under Admiral Rodgers. The destroyer contingent will number 24 vessels.

Washington, Dec. 4.—In connection with his visit and with his declaration that he is about to take a determined stand at the Peace Conference for the ideals for which the United States has been fighting, ex-President Theodore Roosevelt asserts that the United States has not done nearly as much as the British Navy and the British, French and Italian armies to bring about the downfall of Germany. He therefore declares in a statement which he has issued that it is "our business to stand by our allies at the Peace Conference."

He said it should be "instantly conceded" that Great Britain needs the world's most powerful navy, and that it is "sheer nonsense" to say the American army was fighting for President Wilson's famous "Fourteen points." "The British Empire imperatively needs the greatest navy in the world, and this we should instantly concede," said the Colonel. Our need for a great navy comes next to Britain's and we should have the second navy in the world. Similarly, France needs greater military strength than we do, but we should have all our young men trained to arms, on the general lines of the Swiss system.

OUT AT LAST.

WAS DECORATED FOR GALLANTRY

Lieut. H. W. Tooker of Prince Rupert Gets the Military Cross for Exceptional Leadership.

Word has been received from Staff Sergeant G. S. Turner of Witley Camp to the effect that Lieut. H. W. Tooker of this city and now of the Cheshire Regiment had been decorated with the Military Cross. It seems that, according to the official account, it was granted "For exceptional leadership and gallantry during an attack, when he gained his objective, taking many prisoners, and consolidating the position in the face of heavy fire. Later, he took command of the whole outpost line, and held it against hostile counter-attacks, after heavy gas bombardment."

Lieut. Tooker is well known here, where he lived for a number of years and where he was employed in the engineering department of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, both on the original townsite work and also on the terminals under Assistant Engineer Lucas, who was killed at the front.

Lieut. Tooker is a son of Capt. Tooker, R.N., of Cowichan. He has been wounded twice, the first time in 1916 in the hand, and again last spring in the foot when he was the only officer left after a charge. He is still in hospital

GOVERNMENT SUPPLIES TO BE DISPOSED OF

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—Authority is granted the war purchasing committee to dispose of all stores, whether used or new, for which the Department of Militia has no further use. The Department also finds that a great many articles for which contracts have been made, in order to ensure ample supplies during the war, are not now required. Notices of cancellation have been sent to the various contractors, many of whom are not able to accept complete cancellation owing to goods being in process of manufacture. The order in Council also gives the war purchasing commission authority to deal with and settle all questions arising out of the cancellation of orders.

ARGENTINE'S GREAT GRAIN CROP WILL BE MOVED TO EUROPE SOON

Washington, Dec. 4.—Negotiations between the Argentine and Great Britain and France for the delivery of Argentine's great grain crops to these two countries have been about concluded, according to official information reaching Washington today. In order to facilitate payment for the crops, the Argentine government has offered to loan to the British and French governments the sum of \$24,000,000 for two years.

Washington, Dec. 4.—That the guaranteed price for 1919 wheat, fixed at \$2.26 a bushel on the Chicago basis, will stand even though the Lever Act, under which the price was fixed, should become inoperative through the conclusion of peace, is the opinion of the Food Administration. Wheat growers in many parts of the country, it was said, have become apprehensive that the guaranteed price for the 1919 crop might be rescinded through the conclusion of peace.

DOMINION GOVERNMENT SETS ASIDE \$25,000,000 TO BE USED FOR HOUSING SCHEME

LOANS WILL BE MADE TO THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS OF SUMS TO BE USED BY THEM, OR RE-LOANED TO THE MUNICIPALITIES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, December 4.—Better housing is to be taken up throughout Canada and the Dominion Government is to cooperate with the provinces in financing the scheme.

It is just announced here that the Dominion Government has created a fund of \$25,000,000 which will be available by way of loan to the several Provincial Governments in conjunction with the carrying out of their program for better housing, either through municipalities or by the Provincial Governments direct.

Housing is being taken up in Great Britain and it is understood that the incentive for the move comes from that country. Just how it will affect the West does not seem clear here. It is understood, however, that every province will be treated alike in proportion to its needs and that if British Columbia needs help along these lines she will get a share of the big fund loaned to the Provincial Government and through them to the cities or smaller municipalities.

KITSELAS MT. MINE AT USK IS SHOWING WELL

Six Veins Carrying Copper, Silver and Gold, and Also Free Gold of Varying Values.

TRIAL SHIPMENT TO TACOMA SMELTER

Manager A. J. Thompson, Who is in City Tells of Work Being Done on Property.

One of the important mining districts that is bound to come into prominence in the near future is that running east from Terrace, of which Usk is perhaps the centre. The whole region is highly mineralized and considerable development work has been done on some of the properties, but none of them have been proved to any considerable extent.

Among the visitors to town from that district is A. J. Thompson, manager of the Kitselas Mountain Copper Co., of Usk. He is on his way to Portland to spend the holidays and incidentally to discuss with other members of the company the developments which it will be necessary to undertake in the spring in connection with their property. Mr. Thompson is rather reluctant about telling of the mine and its possibilities but in conversation with a Daily News representative last night he gave some of the facts in connection with it.

Close to Railway.

The property is on the south slope of the Kitselas Mountain, only 800 feet from the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway about a mile from Usk. The ore is solid bornite containing copper, silver and gold and in the veins, of which there are six, is free gold of varying values. The free gold will have to be taken out by the use of a mill, and it is possible that one will be erected there before long.

There is one of the finest surface showings of the property that could be seen anywhere and so far as the development has gone it looks very promising. There were four veins clearly shown on the surface, but on driving a tunnel two more blind veins were cut which proved to be equally as rich as the others. The veins are all parallel with each other.

500 Feet of Tunnel.

The owners have done five hundred feet of tunnelling including drifts. The original No. 1 vein has been cut but does not show any great results. They are now drifting out, however, and (Continued on Page Six.)

Canadian Women And Reconstruction.

It is difficult to estimate what will be the value of women's work in the period of reconstruction which is now upon us. In the East a Canadian Industrial Reconstruction Association has been formed and Miss Marjorie MacMurchy has charge of the women's department. She has issued a pamphlet dealing with this important subject and she concludes it with the following: "The Canadian women elector must become an active helper in national productive efficiency. Merely to refrain from definite economic thought and action, or from becoming as personally efficient as is within our power, is to fail the country. The only safety for the future is in a common unity, based on fair dealing, justice and a fair opportunity for all, supported by the honest best work and intelligence of every citizen. These are political, social and economic questions which, one is certain, the woman elector will not fail to learn by heart. The world is to be made safe for democracy, but the world must be made safe for family life which is another, perhaps better, word for democracy.

"Expectation of intelligent help from Canadian women in the problems of reconstruction is justified. There has never been any division between men and women in Canada. No one is as proud of the part Canadian men have taken in the war as Canadian women. The men of Canada have been as profoundly moved by the labors and sacrifices of their countrywomen. The war has revealed inexhaustible resources of national character. It is a natural conviction that enfranchised Canadian women will apply themselves intelligently and with energy to the basic economic problems of national existence, production, the development of natural resources, the compensating balance of industries, national solvency, export trade, education, and a fair economic standard of living for all which cannot be secured except through the solution of the first named problems. It is only through the help of women that the future can be made secure. The co-operation of Canadian women in industrial life and reconstruction is indispensable."

War Savings Stamps for Sale.

The Dominion Government is now making an appeal to the small investor for funds by selling war savings stamps and thrift stamps. The war savings stamps are sold at \$4 now and in 1924 will be redeemed by the Government at \$5 each. Each certificate has a space on it for ten of the stamps costing in all \$40 and for this the Government will pay \$50 in 1924. The rate of interest, therefore is slightly over four and a half per cent. so that it becomes a good investment.

There is another plan under which the Government sells thrift stamps for 25c. each and cards covered with four dollars' worth of these can be exchanged for a war savings stamp.

The whole idea is one to raise money in small amounts to help with the general scheme of financing consequent on the war conditions. The plan of going to New York or London to borrow has for the time being been discarded. It has been found better to borrow from the people of Canada and let the people get the interest on the money instead of sending it away. In that way the people here are enriched and the matter of borrowing is simplified.

DANGERS OF FISHING TOLD BY LECTURER

The dangers of the halibut fishermen who go out in northern waters in winter to fish were pointed out by Dr. Gilbert in a recent lecture. He said: "Good-sized gasoline boats, and even small steamers, get so loaded up with frozen spray that they founder out at sea, 'without a trace.' A vessel heads into the wind; the seas come over the bow and freeze there; the efforts of the crew to chop away the ice are not equal to the twenty and thirty below zero; gradually the boat sinks lower and lower, and the spray comes faster, the screw leaves the water and the rudder is useless. Leave them there and turn to the fish market, where housewives maul and speak of war profiteers and the outrageous price of halibut. "The story is told of one vessel which hoisted her sail to help the straining engines. The ice froze the canvas like a board, and it could not be lowered. Yes, they eventually reached port."

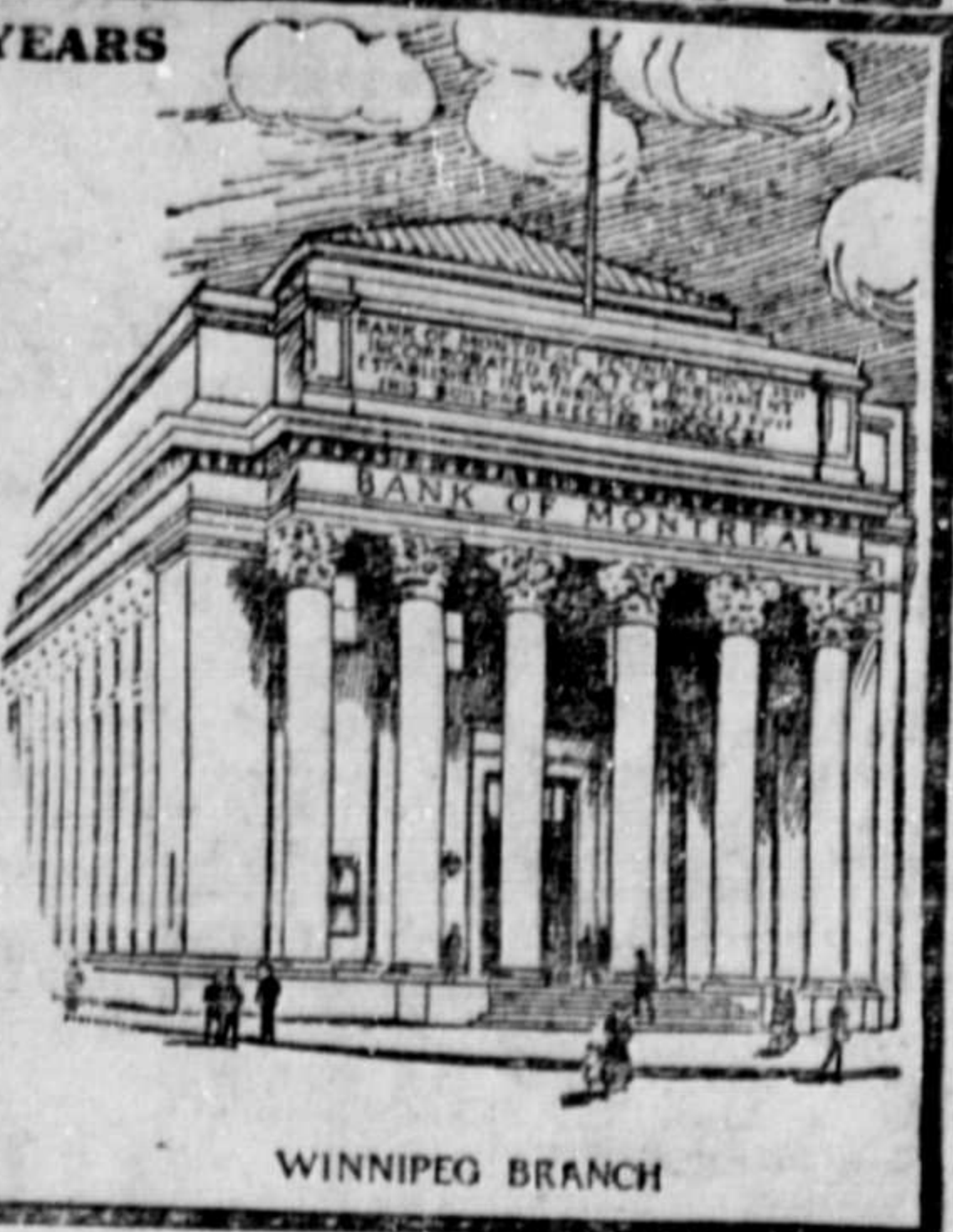

LAND POLICY OF PROVINCE IS DISCUSSED

Ottawa Paper Deals Editorially With Efforts to Get Rid of Speculators in This Province.

The Ottawa Citizen of recent date has a column of editorial comment on the land policy of the British Columbia Government which gives an idea how outsiders view the efforts which are being made by the Minister of Lands to deal with the vacant lands of the province and particularly in relation to the lands held for speculative purposes. It is headed British Columbia's Example and is as follows:

"British Columbia is conscientiously engaged in getting rid of idle land speculation in the province. Premier John Oliver is putting into effect the cleaning-up policy, determined upon after the late premier, H. C. Brewster, formed the new provincial government.

"The British Columbia minister of lands, T. D. Patullo, recently explained the government's policy with regard to land settlement. British Columbia apparently recognizes that one of the first steps towards assisting Canadian returned soldiers to settle on the land must be to free the large tracts of desirable land, at present withheld from use by speculators and idle landholding corporations. The minister of lands gave an indication of the provincial government's policy as follows:

The Policy.

"These large tracts of lands alienated by speculators are all being appraised and the owners required to list them for sale. If they refuse to sell at the appraised value they will be required to do settlement duties, in default of which they will be subject to a super tax which will in time become so burdensome that they will soon be compelled either to use the lands or allow them to be returned to the government, to be sold to bona fide settlers."

This eminently sane and just method of restoring the land to productive use should do much to commend the province of British Columbia to the men of the Canadian overseas forces who desire to make homes for themselves by their own industry under fair conditions.

The last Conservative Government in British Columbia left the province heavily in debt, with practically all the valuable natural resources handed over to absentee landlordism. Several years ago M. B. Cotsworth, F. G. S., an experienced British statistician gave the evidence of millions of acres of British Columbia resources, withheld from use by speculating syndicates, controlled, as he stated, from Seattle, Portland, Spokane, San Francisco, Chicago, New York; also London, Berlin, Paris and other European centres of finance.

American syndicate, have uncovered the fact that thousands of acres of Canadian lands were owned by Kaiser Wilhelm. More than a year after the beginning of the war, it is claimed, the Kaiser's properties in Canada were transferred to American agents as nominal holders. The properties are described as follows: Fifteen valuable timber tracts on the Pacific coast; a large number of mineral lands, both in operation and undeveloped, located in the interior of Canada; fourteen timber tracts on Vancouver Island which the Canadian Government had wished to buy to complete the Strathcona Park reserve; a block of timber lands reaching from the Canadian Pacific coast far into the interior and worth approximately \$9,000,000.

Some of this information will not be new to readers of The Citizen. It has been discussed periodically during the war, without finding any Canadian Government authority as keen to extirpate German vested interests in land idleness, as it has been to pass orders to draft strikers and extirpate other troublesome workers.

According to information understood to be in the possession of the United States bureau of investigation and war intelligence agents, the Canadian land transactions for the Kaiser were originally carried out under the company name of "Alvo von Alvensleben, Limited," with headquarters at Vancouver, and branch offices at Victoria. M. B. Cotsworth's pamphlets, "The Crisis in B. C.—An Appeal for Investigation," stated plainly, more than three years ago, that Fleishhacker Bros. & Johnson, San Francisco, held 79,999 acres of pulpwood land in British Columbia. He published this information from the official records, and added that "the German firm of Fleishhacker Bros. of San Francisco, along with Alvo von Alvensleben, control vastly more than the 80,000 acres here recorded, (Continued on Page 5.)

HUDSON BAY MOUNTAIN ORE BEING SHIPPED

Arrangements Made by Pete Schu-fer with Silver Standard To Mill It.

Pete Schufer returned to town last Monday from New Hazelton, where he was completing arrangements with the Silver Standard management for milling the ore which he and his partner, Lou Wood, have mined from their property on Hudson Bay mountain during the past summer, says the Interior News.

The ore has now been shipped to New Hazelton, and consists of about thirty-four tons. Last year the boys made a similar shipment from the same working, and as the actual smelter returns on that shipment netted the partners well over two hundred dollars per ton, they have something upon which to base their expectations of two hundred dollar ore in the present lot.

Last year's splendid returns were in the face of many penalties imposed on the ore on account of the heavy zinc content. The smelters not only refuse to pay for the zinc contents of ore, but they actually penalize the copper or silver values when this refractory element is present. By having this ore treated at the Silver Standard mine and having the zinc separated, the other values will be realized in full, while instead of being an object for penalty the zinc will now be paid for.

Mr. Schufer, in talking of this latest shipment, said: "The zinc runs pretty high in this ore, and from assays we estimate that in first putting our ore through the concentrator the returns will be two thousand dollars greater than would have been returned had the shipment gone direct to the smelter, and in addition the Standard people handle the whole transaction."

although the British Columbia records do not show how much."

Socialist Too. In the list of idle landholders are names such as Ebert a name lately featuring in the news as the first Socialist chancellor of Germany, with 30,720 acres; Heisterman with 56,177 acres, Bauman & Keiher (operating in Seattle) 15,600 acres.

British Columbia has apparently decided that the withholding of valuable land from use is wrong in principle. With the task of reconstruction ahead, it is time the national government arrived at a similar state of enlightenment. Whether 90,000 acres of valuable coal in the Canadian West are withheld from use by Sir Sam Hughes, or Mackenzie and Mann, William of Hohenzollern, or Kobes & Beaton of Chicago, does not affect the principle. No man, nor group of men, should be allowed to hold such tracts of Canadian land in idleness. The land should be worked, and the state should collect the community-created value from it annually, for community purposes, or it should be restored to the state. The land and natural resources of Canada are the birthright of the people of Canada. They should never have been alienated. Where they are held in idleness, they should be taken back.

expect to find a large ore body. There is from eighteen inches to two feet of quartz and from three to eight feet of limestone and iron which carries some silver and gold. What makes the prospect encouraging is that the lime and iron are the two best minerals as a matrix for ore.
