Nominations to British House ONE HUNDRED AND TWO MEMBERS ARE ELECTED TO COMMONS

22 SINN FEINERS ARE ELECTED TO BRITISH PARLIAMENT AND 69 SUPPORTERS OF THE GOVERNMENT

Lloyd George Opposed by Anti-Conscriptionist in Carnarvon; A. J. Balfour, Austin Chamberlain and Will Crooks Among Those Returned Unopposed.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, December 5.—Yesterday was nomination day for candidates for Parliament in the general election and among the surprises was the appearance of an opponent to Premier Lloyd George at Caernarvon, from which district Lloyd George holds his seat. He is Austin Harrison, editor of "English Review," who is standing on the plank of a League of Nations and abolition of conscription.
Another striking feature of the nomination was the large number of unopposed returns. Thus, out of 707 members to be elected to the new parliament, 104 have already been returned unopposed, 41 coalition Unionists, 28 coalition Liberals, 11 Laborites, 22 Sinn Feiners, one Nationalist and one Independent.
Among those elected are A. J. Balfour, Wm. Bryce, Parliamentary Under Secretary to the Home Department; John Robert Lyons, former Food Controller; Austin Chamberlain, and Will Crooks, Laborite.
Sinn Feiners elected include Professor De Valera for East Clare, Count Plunkett for North Roscommon, and Wm. Cosgrave for Kilkenny.
The success of the Sinn Feiners in securing twenty-two returns out of a total of 105 Irish seats was another of the day's surprises. They had six seats in the last parliament.

CANADIAN MILITARY GOVERNOR OF MONS

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—Captain Ernest Cinqmars, formerly of Hull, Quebec, and at one time editor of the semi-weekly newspaper Le Spectateur published in that city, is now military governor of Mons. Before going overseas he was King's Printer in Quebec.

CROWN PRINCE SAYS HE COUNSELLED PEACE AFTER MARNE BATTLE

Would Be Willing to Work as a Laborer in Factory if Country Became Republic.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Dec. 5.—In connection with the interview given by Frederick Wilhelm Hohenzollern, who still claims the title of Crown Prince, in his cottage home on the Island of Wieringen where he is interned, he said: "Should the German Government decide to form a republic similar to that in the United States or France, I shall be perfectly content to return to Germany as a simple citizen, ready to do anything to assist my country. I should even be happy to work as a laborer in a factory."
"At present everything appears to be chaos in Germany, but I hope things will right themselves."
The Prince declared he and his father did not desire war and that he was in no way consulted. He said he knew the war was lost after the battle of the Marne and asked that peace steps then be taken, but was told to mind his own business.

JOINT MEMORIAL ASKS OF DOMINION MANY REFORMS

ORGANIZED LABOR AND MANUFACTURING INTERESTS HAVE LARGE PROGRAM FOR RECONSTRUCTION DAYS FOLLOWING WAR WHICH THEY PRESENTED TOGETHER

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, December 5.—Organized Labor and the manufacturing interests joined this afternoon in a memorial to the Government. The president of the Trades and Labor Congress was there to represent organized labor; G. M. Murray, general secretary of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association represented the manufacturers' views, and S. Willis McLachlan represented the joint committee of technical organizations.

The memorial advised among other things the appointment of a bureau of public welfare, the establishment of a bureau to take a survey of imports, the refining and manufacturing of Canadian raw materials in Canada, scientific and industrial research, the establishment of a central empire authority on emigration, the prompt commencement of necessary public works, co-operation between the Dominion and the provinces in regard to technical education, the formation of a land settlement policy, the creation of employment bureaus by the provinces in co-operation with the Dominion Government of a comprehensive scheme for the development of waterpower; further that the Government publicity department should begin an optimistic campaign.
Of these suggestions it is pointed out here a number have already been taken up by the Dominion with provincial governments and were in fact under discussion at the recent conference. These comprise such questions as technical education, land settlement and the creation of employment bureaus.
The Government assured the delegation of full consideration of their recommendations.

PROTECTIONIST POLICY FOR RUSSIA DECLARE THE BOLSHEVIKI LEADERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, December 5.—Lenine, casting overboard the ideals of his soapbox days, has come out for extreme protectionism to make Russia a strong industrial nation, semi-official diplomatic advices stated here today. Attempts to flood Russia with agricultural machinery, railway equipment, textiles, leather and clothing will be fought by the Soviet Government it is stated. Russia's infant industries must be protected, Bolsheviki leaders have decreed. Lenine and his advisors have determined upon a protectionist policy as thorough as that of the former Czar.

HUNS TURNED GAS ON PEOPLE

Children Choked When Welcoming British Soldiers, Says Jimmy Parks of Prince Rupert.

Fire Chief McDonald has received a letter from Jimmy Parks, late of the Fire Hall here. It was written from France on November 5, just a week before the signing of the armistice. Jimmy was going strong then, but says that the "flu" was taking toll in France, too. He had it, but "took lots of dope," and kept on going. Several of the men in his section, however, died from its effects. And all the time, he says, they were sitting on Fritz's tail, and keeping him hustling for safety. Dead Fritzes and Fritz's guns were lying all around, while the reception the troops got from the liberated French population was marvellous. In one place where they got in, and when the civilians were all in the streets welcoming the Canucks, the Germans turned on the gas. It was horrible, he writes, to see the poor little kiddies choking. He got one chestful himself, but is none the worse.
When he got to a large town, Valenciennes for a guess, he says it was just like civil life again, the time they had from the population. While he was enjoying himself, he saw a familiar figure staggering through the streets, under a huge roll of wire, which, on closer inspection, proved to be Frank Summers, late of the telephone department here.
At the time of writing, a week before the signing of the armistice terms, Jimmy thinks that the enemy could not stand up to the punishment he was receiving all along the line, and from the speed of his retreat expected the end soon.

HOLLAND GETS LEAVE TO IMPORT GOODS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, Dec. 4.—The conclusion of a trade "arrangement" between Holland and the associated governments, whereby Holland will be allowed to import commodities under license, was announced today by the War Trade Board. Stipulation is made that only Dutch ships may be used, that all shipments must be consigned to the Netherlands Overseas Trust.

DREADNOUGHTS WILL TAKE SOLDIERS HOME

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, Dec. 5.—Ten American dreadnoughts which will escort President Wilson into French waters will turn about immediately after they arrive to carry home a large party of American soldiers and sailors.
The trip will be so timed that men will arrive at a home port by Christmas.
The operations will constitute one of the most extensive movements of battleships for transport purposes ever undertaken.

INFLUENZA TAKES OVER 300,000

Washington, Dec. 5.—Between 300,000 and 350,000 deaths from influenza and pneumonia occurred among the civilian population of the United States since September 15. The epidemic persists, but the deaths are much fewer, according to reports reaching here.

BELGIANS CONFER HONORS ON LEADERS

London, Dec. 5.—The University of Ghent has decided to confer the degree of Doctor on Premier Lloyd George, Premier Clemenceau, President Wilson, Marshal Foch, Marshal Joffre, Admiral Sir David Beatty, General Leman, Defender of Liege, and Cardinal Mercier.

ALLIES WILL OCCUPY GERMANY SAYS BERLIN

Another Ultimatum Sent By Foch Regarding Failure to Deliver Locomotives.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Dec. 5.—Marshal Foch has sent a new ultimatum to the German Armistice Delegates demanding that Germany give up the rest of the locomotives agreed to, according to an exchange telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen transmitting advices from Berlin.
The German newspapers point out that there is no hope of prolonging the armistice and that it is likely the Allies will occupy Germany. No time limit has been put on the latest ultimatum, the despatches state.

Caring for Children Is Latest Movement.

The movement has been made that the various governments, both of the Dominion and the province, were always ready to spend money on the improvement or the protection of live stock, but that when it came to improving conditions for bringing up children they considered they had no duty in the matter.

Now there is a general movement in the big cities to bring to the attention of the Government the claims of the children. A Child Welfare Association has been formed and there is to be a convention next week in Vancouver when the Minister of Education, Hon. J. D. McLean, will deliver an address.

It is curious of how little importance children are considered to be. Even parents grumble at the cost of education or at any steps which are taken to improve the condition of children. The latest moves, however, are to bonus mothers in order that there may be no worries during the critical period when the children are very young; to have supervised playgrounds in every city; to look closer after the ventilation and general conditions of the schools; to look closer to the manner in which children are fed and clothed by their parents or guardians; to see that children have ample playground space and have every opportunity to indulge in healthy games, and in fact to give all children just as much care as is given to thoroughbred hogs or cattle or horses.

Full Public Purse

Must Back Industry.

The backing of peace will not justify any relaxation in our efforts to increase the thrift and economy of the nation in order to keep the public purse filled, says the Bank of Commerce monthly letter. Fighting may soon end, but our men will require to "stand to" for an indefinite period until many difficult international problems have been settled, and in the meantime the war-racked and devastated countries of Europe must be supplied with many necessities. In providing these the burden of the financial aid required will fall upon those of the Allies who are able to supply the necessary funds from their own resources.

The industrial welfare of Canada for some time after the cessation of the war will depend largely upon the manner in which individual enterprise is gradually substituted for the government control of business which has prevailed during the war. During this period of transition the Government will be justified in using its credit on a diminishing scale for effecting the change. Employment for those of our people who have done good service in the manufacture of munitions must be provided by new foreign business, which, pending the determination of the important geographical and political questions arising out of the war, will be controlled largely by the allied Governments. Only if they are backed by a full public purse, can our representatives at the allied councils confidently assume the responsibility for a large share of the rehabilitation which is immediately necessary. If the country is to be saved from a period of serious industrial depression, it is of the utmost importance that our people should not relax their efforts to save, so that they may be enabled to give generous financial support to the Government whenever needed. To provide for the cost of demobilizing our expeditionary forces and for our share in restoring the war-devastated areas, additional Government loans will be necessary from time to time, though on a lesser scale than during the war.

Land Settlement Plan Well Received.

The Provincial Government land policy which has been placed in the hands of the Land Settlement Board under the general supervision of the Minister of Lands, is receiving a great deal of attention in the east following the visit of Mr. Pattullo to Ottawa. The comments on it are generally favorable. It is realized that the situation is a difficult one and that the Government is tackling it with courage. The main thing now to do is to push the work with energy and keep it up without any slackening. Officials that are not making headway with the work, if there are such, must step aside and make way for capable men. The land must be settled and the legislation which has been passed seems capable of securing the desired end if effect is given to it by the Land Settlement Board. All depends upon them. The people are now looking for results and if the Board is not getting results it will have to be improved.

TRAGEDY OF TRAPPER IS TOLD IN DIARY

Charles Spencer Perishes in Lonely Cabin Far From Haunts of Men.

Records in the form of a diary now in the hands of Government Agent Boskins tell a story of the terrible suffering and lonely, tragic death of Charles Spencer, in an isolated cabin between Groundhog Pass and Telegraph Creek, says the Interior News. Spencer was a familiar figure around Hazelton, owning a pre-emption in the upper Kispiox, and more recently being employed at the Hazelton View mine.

Last fall Spencer and Fred Smith, of Hazelton, went in with a winter's supplies to trap. The winter previous Smith had trapped successfully in the district, had blazed the trap line, built a main cabin on Little Klappan and a number of shelters along his line, and then took Spencer as a partner for last winter. In the late summer they packed in their supplies, Smith taking Spencer familiar with the territory and then leaving to put the horses in winter quarters near Hazelton. Spencer liked the new location and when Smith started on the 250-mile trip the former said he could handle the line alone, and advised his partner to take any good job going. Smith therefore took a position on the Yukon Telegraph line, confident that Spencer would have a good season and figuring that his wages would go to augment their earnings. Later Smith went to Vancouver and enlisted.

Fears Well Founded

As weeks passed after Spencer should have come out, Smith got anxious and reported the matter to the militia and asked leave to investigate, but was refused. Smith then enlisted with the Siberian expedition.

That Smith's fears for the safety of his partner were well founded has just come to light.

Early last summer Taylor and Roberts went into the headwaters of the Stikine to survey coal claims, taking John Utterstrom as guide and hunter. The latter had made several trips into that country, on one occasion camping over night with Smith, and when an Indian told of seeing a man and six horses coming in Utterstrom decided it must be Smith and planned to look him up. Consequently, when the surveyors were on their way out via Telegraph Creek, Utterstrom hiked on ahead down the valley of the Kluayez and over a divide to the head of the Skeena, where there was a cabin in which he thought Smith might be camped. Reaching the cabin on the second day he found the door open and noticed at once that the floor was torn up. Entering, he found a body, badly decomposed, lying on the floor and covered with a blanket Utterstrom had left on a previous trip. He did not know of Spencer and thought for a time the body was Smith's. Being alone he did not investigate fur-

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ther and after sleeping all night in a spruce thicket he left next morning, joining the survey party at the junction of the Kluayez and Spatzeezi rivers.

Returned to Cabin.

One night's rest and, with a companion, he returned to the cabin, where they gathered up papers which identified the corpse and buried the body.

Spencer had kept a diary and on one page stated that he had only three matches left. In one of his pockets was found two matches, and from this it is taken he died shortly after. According to the diary Spencer was taken down about the middle of March with muscular rheumatism. Early in May he improved and made an effort to come out. From Klappan to the cabin where he died the distance is thirty-five miles and it occupied five days. The diary further notes:

"I had to leave my sleigh about two miles from this cabin, just about the divide between the Skeena and Spatzeezi rivers. My furs lashed on the sleigh consist of six silver fox, 22 cross fox, 14 marten, 4 linx, 2 wolves, 6 ermine and 1 mink. Whoever finds this please take it out to Hazelton and give it to C. V. Smith, who will see that my bills are paid.

In Cabin a Month.

"I have now been here close on one month, and have not been able to leave the cabin. When I am lying down and warm, I seem to feel no pain, but oh, God, when I get up and try to cook something for myself the pain is unbearable. I have been able to cook but one hotcake a day for myself. If I only had someone to cook for me I might be alright. At times it seems the struggle to live is too hard. Now, whoever finds this, try to find my furs. You can't miss them if you look close. Good luck.

"C. A. SPENCER."

Utterstrom found the furs, most of which were spoiled, but the good ones he packed to Telegraph Creek, turning them over to Government Agent Dodd.

Instead of paying interest twice a year, like a Victory Bond, the interest on a War-Savings Stamp accumulates, and is paid with the principal at the end of the term. Your \$4.00 grows to \$5.00 in the 5 years.

Surrender Privilege

When a person buys his first War-Savings Stamp, a certificate is issued, without charge, providing space for ten such stamps. If circumstances compel him to realize on his investment, his money is available. On the back of the certificate will be found the cash surrender value of the stamps at various dates before the end of the full term.

Registration Against Loss

A certificate with one or more W.S.S. thereon will be registered for you without charge by the Post Master at any Money Order Post Office. This protects the owner in case such certificate is lost, stolen or destroyed. By applying at the Post Office where your certificate was registered, you can have your money refunded.

In order to make it easier to acquire War-Savings Stamps, THRIFT STAMPS are issued at 25 cents each. These do not bear interest, but 16 of them affixed to a Thrift Card will be exchanged for a W.-S. S.

ENEMY DEBTS AND CLAIMS.

By an Order in Council dated the 11th of November, 1918, and to be published in the Canada Gazette of the 30th of November, 1918, a Committee has been appointed to consider the subject of enemy debts and claims against the Government of Canada. To facilitate the work of this Committee, and pursuant to the Consolidated Orders respecting Trading with the Enemy, 1915, and the Proclamation of the 13th of February, 1917, concerning British property in enemy territory, and claims by British subjects against enemy persons and enemy property, I HEREBY GIVE by the Minister of Finance and Receiver General of Canada, as the Custodian appointed by the said Consolidated Orders, and by the said Committee, that—

1. Every person who holds or manages for or on behalf of an enemy any property real or personal (including any rights, whether legal or equitable, in or out of property, real or personal), shall forthwith by notice in writing communicate the fact to the Custodian, and shall furnish the Custodian with such particulars thereof as the Custodian may require;

2. Any person indebted in an amount of 100 or upwards, which is due, or which, had a state of war not existed, would have been due to an enemy, shall forthwith by notice in writing communicate the fact to the Custodian, and shall furnish the Custodian with such particulars thereof as the Custodian may require;

3. Every person by whom a state of war not existed, any sum would have been payable and paid to or for the benefit of an enemy, by way of dividends, interest, or share of profits in any business, incorporated or unincorporated, or by way of payment of the whole or any part of the capital or principal of any share, debenture, debenture stock or other obligation of any company shall forthwith, if the sum or any part thereof has not been paid, pay such sum to the Custodian, and the payment shall be accompanied by particulars in the prescribed form;

4. If before the date of this Notice any such sum as is mentioned in paragraph 3 hereof has been paid into any account with a bank, or has been paid to any other person in trust for an enemy, the person by whom the payment was made shall forthwith, by notice in writing, require the bank or person to pay the sum over to the Custodian, and shall furnish the Custodian with such particulars as aforesaid. The bank or other person shall, within one week after the receipt of the notice, comply with the requirements, and shall be exempt from all liability for having done so.

5. Every incorporated Canadian company, Dominion or Provincial, and every other incorporated company which has a share transfer or share registration office in Canada, shall forthwith by notice in writing, communicate to the Custodian full particulars of shares, stock, debentures and debenture stock and other obligations of the company, which are held by or for the benefit of an enemy;

ROYAL BANK TO OPEN BRANCH AT VLADIVOSTOK

Victoria Board of Trade Takes Steps to Get Business With That Port.

Possibilities of an invasion of the Orient by Canadian banking concerns seems to be foreshadowed in the mission of three gentlemen who sailed for the Far East on the Empress of Japan from Victoria. It is the plan of the Royal Bank of Canada to establish the first branch of any Canadian bank at Vladivostok, and for that purpose three senior officials under the direction of D. C. Rea, Toronto manager, will journey to Russia's most eastern port to investigate the conditions there.

The nucleus of the branch, which will be established if conditions prove favorable, will be composed of R. E. East and Gustave Grenier. The party was joined in the afternoon by another Canadian banker who, having missed the boat from Seattle, chartered a tug and reached Victoria in time to sail.

The expedition will sail first to Nagasaki and from there to Vladivostok, taking with it supplies of food and a portable house. Mr. Rea intends to stay in Siberia for perhaps a year. If it is decided to establish a branch of the bank there he will return and make arrangements in Canada, leaving his assistants among whom is a linguist and who speaks Russian, in the Orient.

Appreciating the enormous possibilities of trade with Russia in the future, the Victoria Board of Trade has communicated with the Royal Bank, requesting that the officials who are going to Siberia may forward any orders for Canadian lumber which may come their way to the mills in the capital.

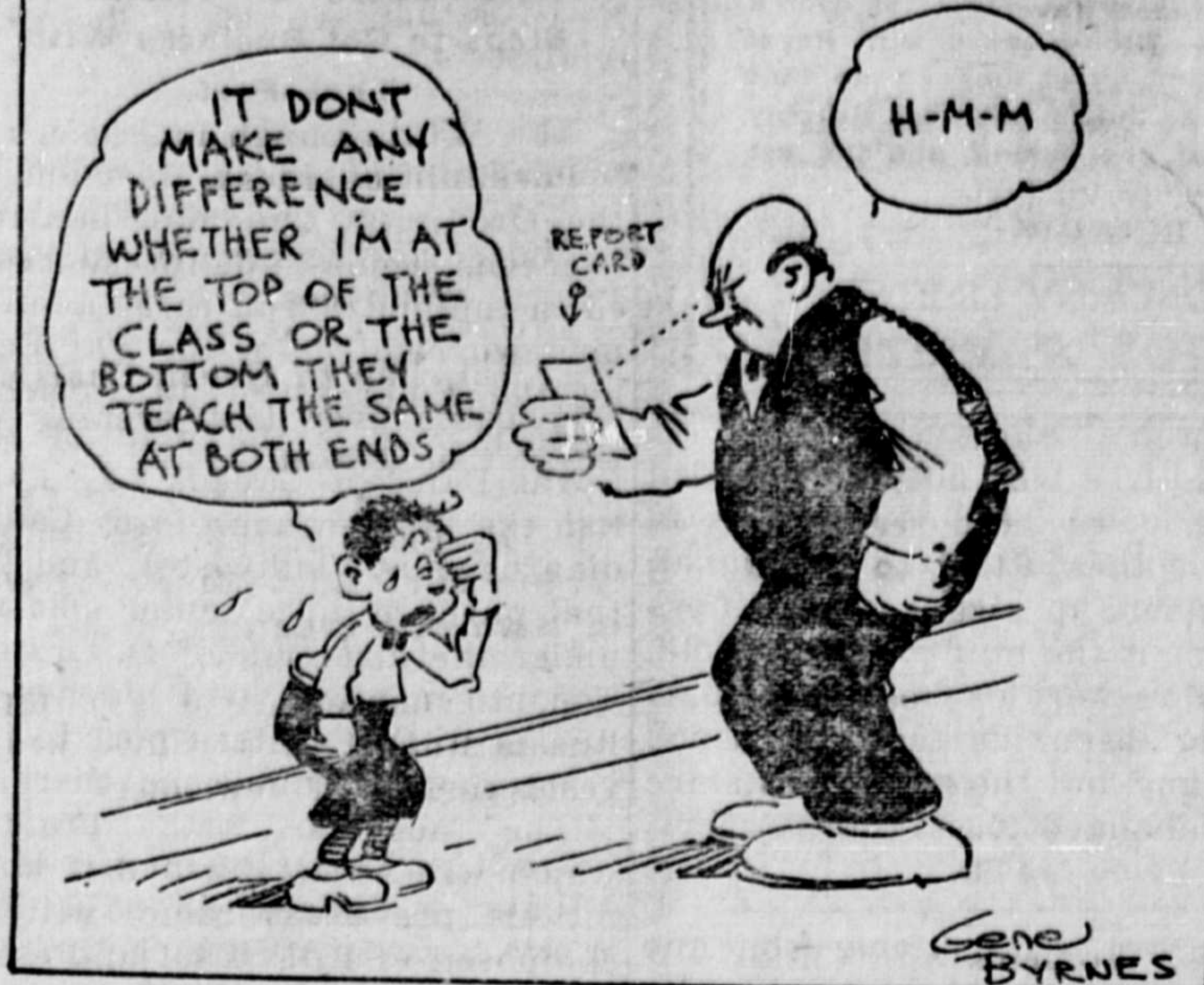

FISH MEAL AS A LIVE STOCK FOOD

In these days anything that will increase the available quantities of cattle food without decreasing the quality is of immense value. Experiments have proven that this is little known in this country, but is used extensively in Europe.

Fish meal should not be confounded with "fish scrap," guano or pomace or other forms of fish by-products used as fertilizers. The fish meal used is more carefully treated and includes, or should include, only fresh, sound fish, or fish offal. The value of fish meal as a cattle food is explicitly set forth in a pamphlet issued by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, and which can be had free on application to the Publications Branch.
