

LEADERS ARE AT PREMIUM IN POLITICAL ARENA AS SEEN AT NATION'S CAPITAL

EVERYONE GUESSING AS TO FUTURE LINEUP AND DATE OF ELECTION; SIR WILFRID LAURIER AND SIR ROBERT BORDEN LIKELY TO BE OUT OF RUNNING

Ottawa, December 7.—The political situation here is engaging a good deal of attention. There is considerable speculation as to when the election will be held. It was generally stated on the hustings during the campaign when the present government was returned, that immediately following the signing of a treaty of peace there would be a new election. The coalition cabinet was a war cabinet and it was said would resign immediately the war was over.

Now the members of the cabinet are being reminded of the promise and it is generally understood that an election will be held in the early summer, possibly before. There are those who profess to know however, and say that the election will be held until the autumn by which most of the soldiers will be returned.

Everyone Guessing

What is keeping everyone guessing here is how the parties will line up on election day. A determined effort is being made to hold the Liberal Unionists in line and to appeal to the country as a Unionist Government. This might be done if a suitable leader could be found, but that seems impossible. The Liberals absolutely refuse to follow Sir Thomas White, who is looked upon as the logical successor to Sir Robert Borden, arguing that as he represents all the big interests of the country, a Government of which he was the head could not in any sense of the word be said to have Liberal principles.

Sir Robert for England.

It is generally understood that Sir Robert will go to England when the reorganization takes place as a special representative of Canada. He has never been the real leader of the party and will not be missed to any extent. He has however been able to hold the party together as Sir Thomas White could not.

The position is an interesting one. With Sir Wilfrid Laurier proposing to retire from the leadership of the Liberals and the difficulty of finding a strong leader to take his place, it is most difficult to forecast what is likely to happen. What seems certain is that the present Government will live through the coming session and that an appeal to the country will be taken with a Conservative still as premier.

LIEUT. STEPHEN WAS KILLED IN EAST PERSIA

Saw Much Service After Leaving Here and Was Given Commission With 3rd Buffs.

FORMERLY EMPLOYEE IN LOCAL POST OFFICE

News has been received by R. L. McIntosh of the death in action of Lieut. James E. Stephen, son of Lieut.-Colonel Guy N. Stephen, of the Imperial Army, and formerly an employee in the Prince Rupert post office. The news has been received with great regret, as the young soldier was a splendid lad, and extremely popular here with everyone.

The information is conveyed in a letter from Col. Stephen in London saying that he had received a cable conveying the sad news, and asking that his friends here be notified.

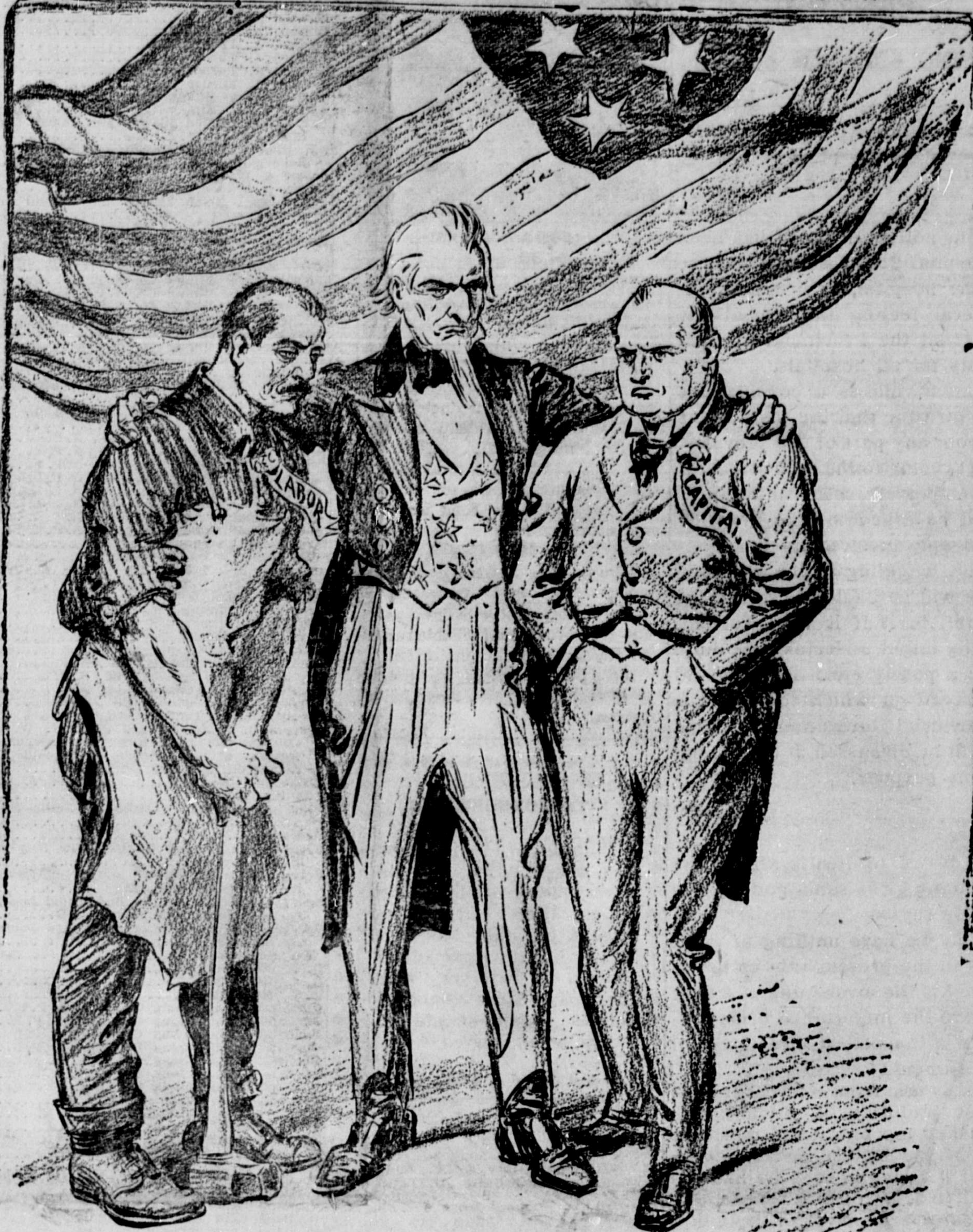
Lieut. Stephen came to Prince Rupert in 1913 and lived here for about two years before joining the 62nd Battalion in July, 1915. He was sent to Vernon and was not long there before he went with his unit to England and was given a commission and attached to the 3rd Buffs, a Kentish regiment. He took part in fighting on almost every front and came through unscathed.

Going to Salonika he was there chosen for service with an Indian regiment. About six months ago he was detailed to take up reinforcements to the East Persia Gordon Field Force. This meant a three months' march through Beluchistan across mountain, desert and cultivated land until he arrived at Meshed, a place with a considerable garrison where a number of European refugees from South Russia and Persia had collected.

From there he left to relieve an officer who was ill with an outlying detachment, four days' march distant. From that nothing was heard of him until word came of his death.

Lieut. Stephen was only about twenty years of age when he left here and his death will be regretted by all his friends. They will know, however, that he died as a soldier and will be sure that he acquitted himself with credit to the service.

TOMMY BURNS HERE AND OUT OF UNIFORM

Says Boxing Match May not Come Off At Vancouver Owing to Difficulty Over Building.

Tommy Burns, ex-heavyweight champion of the world, arrived home this morning after completing his term of military service at Vancouver, where he has been boxing instructor to the soldiers who were preparing to go overseas.

Tommy is again in civvies and looking well, but just a little heavy for a boxer. He says that the proposed match with Mickey King at Vancouver may not come off, as the horseshoe building in which it was to have been held has been condemned. If a permit can be obtained to use the building he will go to Vancouver and fulfill the engagement.

Tommy is back here to look after his cabaret which had to close during the time of the influenza, but which is again running and is as popular as formerly.

SUPPLIES FOR SHIPPING ORE

Hay and Oats Arrive Today, and Horses Next Week, For the Owners of Bush Mine At Stewart.

In fulfillment of the plans laid for the continuous development of the famous Bush mine near Stewart, this morning the G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert brought up a large quantity of hay and oats, and next steamer will have on board a bunch of horses. These will be used in hauling the ore from the mine to tidewater. A new road was constructed this summer over the distance, which is about fourteen miles. Although the mine is in British Columbia, the road winds for the greater part of its length through Alaskan territory, for about eleven miles, and the road building operations have already cost some \$50,000.

When the road is in condition for sleighing, it is expected that at least 2,000 tons of ore will be shipped out to the smelter. The ore is a siliceous chlozite schist, carrying native silver and silver sulphides and in some places galena, and averages around \$200 per ton in value.

GOLD MINE IS BEING OPENED AT SKIDEGATE

A. S. Holmes is on His Way to Meeting of Owners at Calgary To Decide Regarding Future Operations.

Preparations are being made by the South Eastern Mine Co. to further develop their gold mine at Skidegate and to make it a shipping proposition in the very near future. A. S. Holmes, the manager, was in the city yesterday on his way to Calgary where a meeting of the owners of the mine is to be held and where it will be decided just what steps will be taken in connection with the mine in the spring.

The South Eastern Mining Co. is a branch of the Northern Customs Concentrators, Ltd., of Cobalt, Ont., a closed corporation, and they have no stock to sell in connection with their mine at Skidegate.

The property is located about three miles up the coast from Skidegate and a mile from the Government wharf. The ore carries free gold and silver and some lead and copper. A shaft has been sunk to a depth of 100 feet and there is about 600 feet of drifting and cross-cutting which has developed a considerable amount of ore carrying good values.

It is proposed to install a cyanide mill to treat the ore and the meeting at Calgary will decide whether this will be done at once or be deferred until more development work has been done. Operation is still being continued but the shortage of labor and the high prices of everything have resulted in retarding the work. Now it is expected that there will be a change.

Hospital Control To Be Discussed.

In connection with the resolution, notice of which has been given by Chairman Stewart of the Hospital Board, asking that the city take over the management of the hospital, it may be mentioned that there has been a general feeling throughout the province and especially in the cities that the Provincial Government should assume the responsibility for all hospitals.

Already the Provincial Government makes a considerable grant toward the hospitals and in return for that the institutions are supposed to take care of cases from any part of the province. Many people from the outlying districts come to the Prince Rupert Hospital so that it is to some extent a provincial institution.

Whether the Government could be asked to take over the hospitals at a time when they are deeply involved financially is doubtful. The Oliver Government is struggling under a burden of inherited debt and for many years will be unable to undertake many of the duties which should fall to it if it were solvent. Perhaps, while it is recovering, the city might undertake the duty. The question seems to be whether a purely civic body would manage it better than the present board on which the city has representatives and on which the Provincial Government also has its nominees. The whole question will be discussed at the special meeting which has been called for the purpose.

Raise Vitality Of Human Unit.

In the report of the Provincial Board of Health which has just come from the press Dr. H. E. Young gives some good advice to the people of British Columbia. He says:—

"I think I am safe in saying that we have nothing of great importance along public health lines in the present war up to the present time, but what we have gained is the awakening of a very satisfactory proportion of the people to the importance of health-work and to its possibilities. Not in a theoretical direction, but as demonstrated by actual accomplishment.

"We must look upon our health-work from a broader outlook. Formerly it was the highest ambition of public-health workers to show each year a diminished morbidity and mortality rate from certain named diseases. If the Public Health Officer could show that in a brief period of his incumbency he had cut the typhoid death-rate down to one-fifth of its former proportions and had a steadily diminishing rate for scarlet fever or diphtheria, he felt that he had done a great deal. But within the past few years we have had a higher ambition. We have felt that we must deal with more than the negative side of health, and that it was most distinctly within the province of a Health Officer to put forth every effort to raise the vitality of every human unit in his community to the highest point of efficiency. He must no longer be satisfied with the knowledge that from the result of his efforts a number of individuals have survived who might have died from some preventable disease, but he must also feel that he must lay a foundation for the robust citizens of tomorrow, and so our ideals have advanced, taking in not only the previous field of sanitation, but also that of personal hygiene.

Co-Operation With Medical Profession.

"How to reach the individual, however, has been the problem. Health Officers could not personally supervise the daily life of each individual in the community, and he recognizes, therefore, the necessity for educational measures, directed both to the end of securing better understanding, and hence better support to the Health Department, and also to so educate the individual as to furnish him with the knowledge of how to promote his individual health and with the incentive to put that knowledge into effect. To accomplish this we must do as I said in the beginning; that is, to secure co-operation as between the Board of Health, the medical profession, and the public. Our efforts are being directed along these lines, and during the past six months we have been able to secure the active co-operation particularly of the Women's Institutes in British Columbia. Series of meetings have been held, health films for moving pictures and slides for lanterns have been procured, and a great amount of literature is being distributed. During the coming months an active campaign has been outlined, and a constant effort will be made to bring to the people the knowledge of the fact that public health is purchasable, and that 'within natural limitations a community can determine its own death-rate.'"

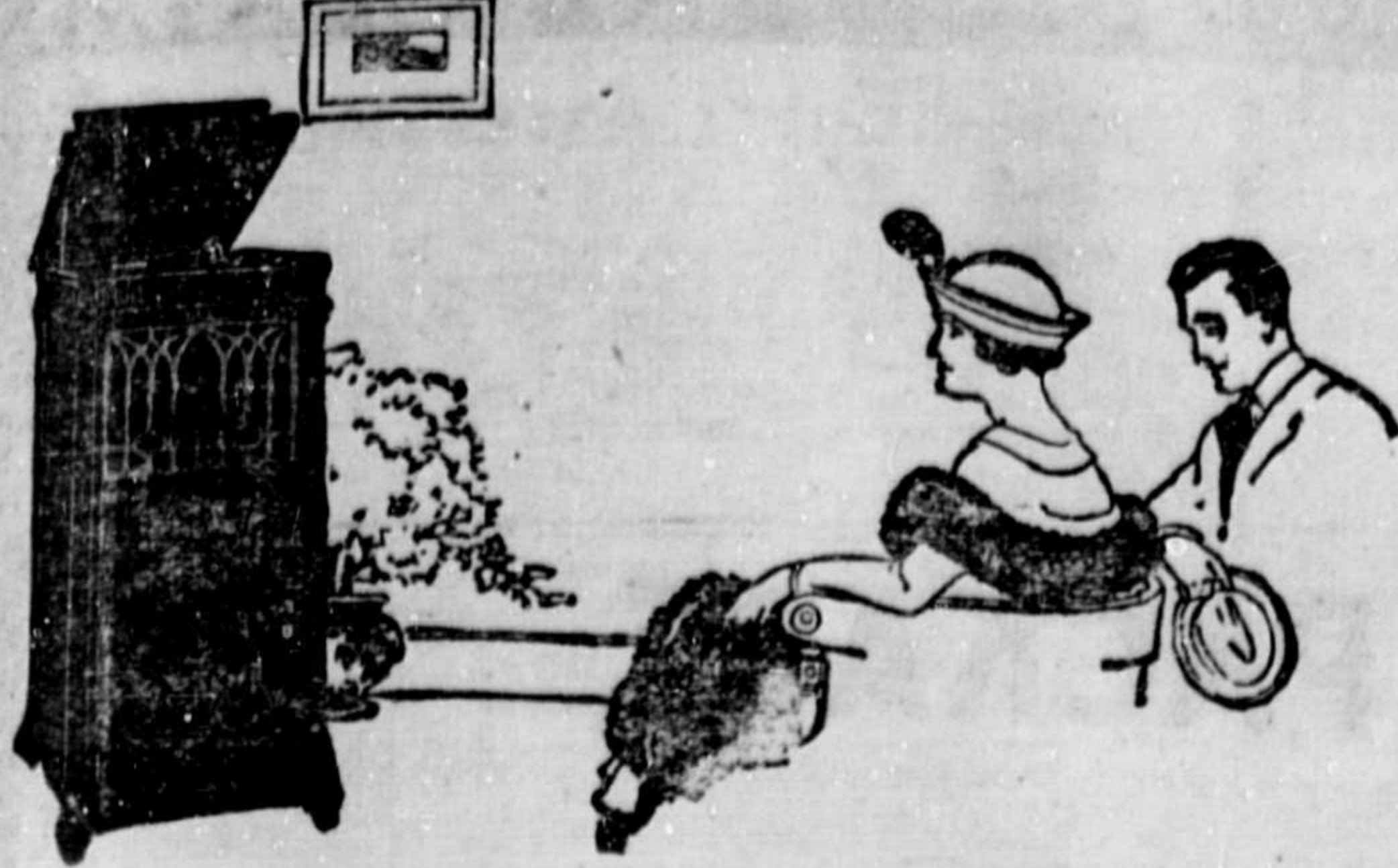

MISS CARMICHAEL HAS RESIGNED FROM GENERAL HOSPITAL

In Accepting Board Expresses Regret At Matron's Leaving; Overworking of Staff Suggested as Reason For Difficulties.

At the regular meeting of the Hospital Board held in the Council Chamber last night the resignation of the matron, Miss Carmichael, was read and accepted after some discussion. It was pointed out that this resignation was the outcome of a recent investigation into differences which arose between the matron and the probation nurses.

W. E. Williams expressed the opinion that they were losing the best matron they had ever had. She was very efficient, but at the same time he thought under the circumstances they had better accept her resignation. He moved that the resignation be accepted with regret and that testimonials of competence be given Miss Carmichael.

In seconding the resolution Mrs. Kirkpatrick spoke of the nursing ability of the matron.

Mrs. Arnold expressed the opinion that the difficulties were largely a result of the smallness of the staff, everyone having to work too hard. The probationers were handicapped in not having enough trained nurses to show them how to do things.

After some further discussion the resolution was passed unanimously.

It was decided to advertise for another matron and also to write the matrons at some of the larger centres asking if there was some person that they could recommend for the position.

It was decided to pay the travelling expenses of Miss Short from Telkwa and return, as she had been engaged by the matron and on her arrival had not been taken on the staff.

A question of reinsurance was left for the finance committee to deal with, it being understood that half of the hospital insurance should be carried by board companies and half by non-board companies.

The resignation of T. J. McManamon was accepted with regret, he having moved to Vancouver. The Provincial Government is to be asked to appoint someone else in his place.

Miss Moore who was under suspension, but who had gone in and worked hard during the time of the influenza epidemic, was on the motion of J. D. McAuley, reinstated. She is now in Vancouver but will be notified at once of the decision of the Board.

Those present at the meeting were, Chairman D. C. Stuart, Mesdames Kirkpatrick and Arnold and Messrs. Williams, McAuley, Gibbons and Clapp.

THE MUNICIPALITY SHOULD TAKE OVER GENERAL HOSPITAL

So Thinks Chairman Stuart of Hospital Board, Who Gives Notice of Resolution Providing for the Change.

As a first step in a movement for the nationalization of hospitals, D. C. Stuart last night at the meeting of the Hospital Board gave notice that he would move a resolution at a later meeting asking the municipality to take over and operate the hospital and engage a competent surgeon whose services would be given free of charge. He explained that the idea was to have the hospital taken care of in much the same way as the schools.

A special meeting of the Hospital Board was arranged for Friday, December 20, for the purpose of considering the resolution which reads as follows:—

1. That the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert take over the Prince Rupert General Hospital.
2. That it employ a highly qualified resident house surgeon.
3. That no charge be made by the hospital for medical service to patients who avail themselves of the services of the house surgeon.
4. That the hospital be managed by a board of five managers to be elected by the citizens of Prince Rupert along the same line as school trustees are now elected together with the appointees of the Provincial Government.

ENEMY DEBTS AND CLAIMS.

By an Order in Council dated the 11th of November, 1918, and to be published in the Canada Gazette of the 30th of November, 1918, a Committee has been appointed to consider the subject of debts due by persons residing or carrying on business in Canada to enemies, claims of such persons against enemies or enemy Governments, and enemy property in Canada. To facilitate the work of this Committee, and pursuant to the Consolidated Orders respecting Trading with the Enemy, 1916, and to the Proclamation of the 12th of February, 1917, concerning British property in enemy territory and claims by British subjects against enemy persons and enemy Governments, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by the Minister of Finance and Receiver General of Canada, as the Custodian appointed by the said Consolidated Orders, and by the said Committee, that:—

1. Every person who holds or manages for or on behalf of an enemy any property real or personal (including any rights, whether legal or equitable, in or arising out of property, real or personal), shall forthwith by notice in writing communicate the fact to the Custodian, and shall furnish the Custodian with such particulars thereof as the Custodian may require;
2. Any person indebted in an amount of \$100 or upwards, which is due, or which had a state of war not existed, would have been due to an enemy, shall forthwith by notice in writing communicate the fact to the Custodian and shall furnish the Custodian with such particulars thereof as the Custodian may require;
3. Every person by whom a state of war not existed, any sum would have been payable and paid to or for the benefit of an enemy, by way of dividends, interest, or share of profits in any business, incorporated or unincorporated, or by way of payment of or of the whole or any part of the capital or principal of any share, debenture, debenture stock or other obligation of any company shall forthwith by notice in writing communicate the fact to the Custodian, and the payment shall be accompanied by particulars in the prescribed form;
4. If before any notice in writing any such sum as is mentioned in paragraph 3 hereof has been paid into any account with a bank, or has been paid to any person, or has been paid to a trustee, the person by whom the payment was made shall forthwith, by notice in writing, require the bank or person to pay the sum or to furnish the Custodian with such particulars of the account, as the Custodian may require; and the bank or other person shall, within one week after the receipt of the notice, comply with the requirements, and shall be exempt from all liability for having done so;
5. Every incorporated Canadian company, Dominion or Provincial, and every unincorporated company which has share transfer or share registration office in Canada, shall forthwith, by notice in writing, communicate to the Custodian full particulars of shares, stock or debentures and debenture stock and other obligations of the company, which are held by or for the benefit of an enemy;
6. Every person having any claim against an enemy or an enemy Government (except claims arising out of illegal warfare, which have been dealt with by a Public Notice of the 18th of November, 1918), or any description whatsoever (including documents of title to property) in enemy territory or held by an enemy, or any interest in such property, is requested to furnish written particulars of such claim or property or interest to the Custodian;
7. Every person, including especially every solicitor, notary, curator, administrator, executor, assessor, tax gatherer, broker and real estate or other agent, who knows or has reason to suspect that any property of any description whatsoever (including documents of title to property) in Canada is owned by, or held subject to any interest therein, or is the subject of an enemy or an enemy Government, is requested forthwith to communicate all the facts within his knowledge and all the grounds of such suspicion to the Custodian;
8. Any person who fails to comply with paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 of this notice is guilty of an offence against the said Consolidated Orders and liable to the penalties prescribed thereby;
9. "Persons" includes both individual persons and also trustees, executors, administrators and bodies of persons incorporated and unincorporated, such as companies, municipal authorities, firms and clubs;
10. "Enemy territory" means the territory of a State or Sovereign at war with

His Majesty (including the Colonies and Dependencies thereof) as such territory stood on the 1st of August, 1914;

"Enemy" means a person (as defined in this Notice) of whatever nationality, who resides or carries on business within enemy territory; and also, in paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 hereof, a person resident or carrying on business elsewhere (except in territory occupied by an enemy State or Sovereign), with whom dealing has at any time since the 1st of August, 1914, been prohibited by any Statute or Proclamation in force in Canada;

10. A large number of persons have already furnished to the Custodian the information called for by this Notice, and such persons may, if they so desire, furnish an amended statement. The forms prescribed for furnishing the information called for by this Notice may be obtained upon application to James R. Forsyth, Department of Finance, Ottawa. The person applying should state under which paragraph of this Notice the information to be furnished by him falls.

CHURCHES ARE WEIGHED AND FOUND WANTING

Archbishop Suggests They May be Curse to Community Instead of Blessing.

LEAGUE WOULD BE BETTER THAN NO UNION

Great Mission of Christ to Bind Together in Brotherly Love and Mutual Service.

In a letter to the editor received yesterday Archbishop Du Vernet again returns to the question of Church Union. He says:— "A half truth is often a practical error. In the Protestant churches there are some who say: 'If we have unity of spirit there is no need for unity of organizations.' The half truth is the fact that unity of organization must be the outcome of unity of spirit. The practical error lies in the fact that unity of spirit as it grows must clothe itself in some organization or else it will be chilled to death.

"The great mission of the Church of Christ is to bind together in brotherly love and mutual service all classes in the community, and ultimately all the nations in the world.

Other Organizations. "Viewed in the light of this mission the denominational churches are weighed in the balance and found wanting. However beneficial in other respects, in one respect at least they are a curse to the community because they cause distinct lines of social cleavage in the community. And so God, through the trend of events is in some degree at least quietly setting aside these denominational bodies and using other organizations such as Patriotic Societies, Benefit Lodges, Trade Unions, etc., to cut across these denominational lines of cleavage and break down these unchristian barriers of prejudice. The great war has shown the weakness of sectarianism. The most hopeful sign is the way in which the Spirit of God is working in the separated denominations creating a demand for some form of organic union.

Labor's Experience. "It may be truly said that Labor though very diverse is one in spirit, but Labor knows well it must have some organic tie if it is to make its influence felt in

the community, but the Protestant Churches march separately into the Great Fight with no organic bond of union.

"If the Churches occupied different territory, as the nations do, it would be in order to press for a league of churches to correspond with a League of Nations, but as these churches cover the same ground with more or less competition a mere League of Churches, though better than no tie whatever, will never prove a final solution of the religious problem. There must be one organic body with different members having different functions. Variety there must be, but variety in unity. All the different members acting in co-ordination under one head, in accordance with one plan, and for one purpose.

Central Brain. "In a democratic age like this a Representative Church Council may well be the central brain receiving impressions from the mind of the Spirit so that Christ is still the head of the Church."

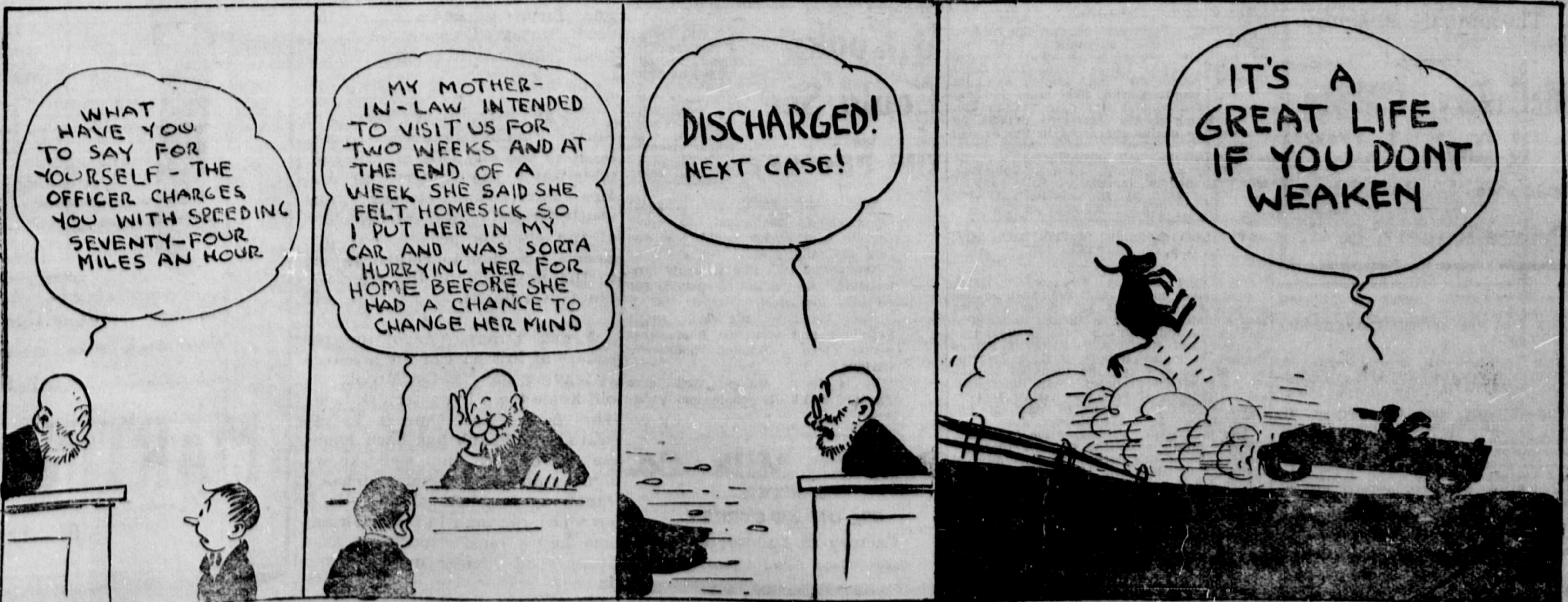
