## ASK THAT COLONEL PECK BE GIVEN SENATORSHIP AS REWARD FOR HIS SERVICES

**RECOGNITION OF VALIANT WORK FOR COUNTRY BY THE  
DOMINION GOVERNMENT WOULD BE GRACEFUL  
ACT—PETITION TO BE PREPARED ASK-  
ING FOR APPOINTMENT**

There is a movement on foot in the city to have the Dominion Government recognize the services to the country of Lieut.-Col. Peck, by appointing him to the Canadian Senate. There is just a vacancy in the Senate for British Columbia, and it is suggested that not only would it be a recognition of the valiant work of Colonel Peck, but also it would add to the dignity of a decided acquisition to the upper house to have a Victoria man there.

It is understood that a petition is being prepared asking the government to give effect to the proposal. It is doubtless that it will be signed by everyone. Mr. Borden is away in Europe and it is thought that no action will be taken until he returns, but it is thought to be the best thing to get at once before the Dominion Government has an opportunity to fill the vacancy. It had been suggested that a member of the British Columbia Government might be likely to get the job, but in the opinion of those who have been made. It is a position which is good for life and one that is eagerly sought. In the past it has been usually a political appointment. The present Government, however, professes not to represent any political party and for that reason the time is thought to be opportune to secure the appointment of a man who has served his country and won the highest decoration in the gift of the sovereign.

Colonel Peck has been on the fighting front practically throughout the war. He was elected to parliament while engaged against the enemy. His wonderfully rapid work won for him first the Victoria Cross, and later the decoration which every soldier covets, the Victoria Cross. It is suggested by his friends here, and they are legion, that there is no way in which the country could so appropriately recognize his services as by giving him the appointment. It would be not only a graceful act, but nothing more than what is due to an officer who has so distinguished himself.

## LOCAL COMPANY HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

The current number of the British Columbia Gazette contains notice of the incorporation of G. W. Nickerson Co. Ltd. with a capital of \$75,000 divided into 250 shares. The head office of the concern is in this city.

The following are the objects for which the Company has been incorporated:—

(a.) To carry on the business of general brokers; to own and operate boats of all kinds; to carry on business as retailers, wholesalers, importers, and exporters, and to participate in any business that comes within the powers of a private company;

(b.) To invest and deal with the moneys of the Company in such manner as the managing director may deem wise;

(c.) To do all things as are incidental to or which the Company may think conducive to the welfare of the Company.

And it is further declared that the word "company" in this clause shall be deemed to include any partnership or other body of persons, whether incorporated or not incorporated, and whether domiciled in the Province of British Columbia or elsewhere, and the intention is that the objects specified in each paragraph of this clause shall, except where otherwise expressed in such paragraph be in nowise limited or restricted by reference to or inference from the terms of any other paragraph or the name of the company.

## POLITICAL EMBROGLIO REGARDING THE UNION

**Mails Bring Interesting Light on  
Movements in Big Centres  
of the East.**

Mail advices in regard to the political disturbances in the east are proving very interesting. On the same day that Hon. Robert Rogers was banqueted at Toronto and came out for higher tariff and the deposition of Premier Borden, there was published in the Toronto Globe Hon. Walter Scott's call to the Liberal Unionists to come out from the Unionist camp and rejoin the Liberal ranks. The Toronto Mail and Empire also carried on the same day a denunciation of the Union Government from F. B. McCurdy. In his address to the Conservatives Mr. Rogers says that it was without consultation with Conservatives that Sir Robert Borden formed his coalition with the Liberals. He scores the Government for their inactivity in caring for the returned men and declares that a progressive national policy, meaning gradually rising tariffs, is the only means of providing employment for those who come back from the war.

In his indictment of the Union Government, Hon. Walter Scott, former premier of Saskatchewan, tells of the way in which he supported the union up to the end of the war. Now, however, he can see no further use for its continuance. He says he would have joined hands with Beelzebub to defeat the Germans, but now he calls on Messrs. Carvell, Crerar, Calder, Mewburn and the rest to "come out from among them" without loss of time.

During a snow shower on Sunday morning, those few who were awake around 3 a. m., were considerably startled to hear one single heavy peal of thunder. Down town there was visible a very vivid flash of forked lightning. This, during a snowstorm, is rather unusual.

## RETAIL MERCHANTS MEET ON WEDNESDAY

Mr. Hougham will address the meeting on many matters pertaining to the interests of each merchant and will endeavor to organize a live branch of the Dominion Association in Prince Rupert.

Every merchant is particularly invited to attend as Mr. Hougham has gone to considerable expense and inconvenience in making this 500-mile trip, and it is to be hoped that his efforts will be successful.

## CUSTOMS RECEIPTS ARE ON INCREASE

There is an improvement in the customs receipts. For the month of November the amount was \$18,938.83, as against \$12,598.71 for October. Last year the November receipts were \$24,598.21, but \$8,000 of that was accounted for by the duty on a big oil shipment that arrived in a tanker. Outside of that amount the receipts for November of last year exceed November of last year.

**Col. Peck Suggested For Senatorship.**

If Colonel Peck would like to receive the appointment of senator for British Columbia there seems to be no good reason why the Dominion Government should not give it him. He is said to be in every way qualified for the position and he certainly has earned it. A man who has deserved a Victoria Cross should get the best the country can give him.

In the matter of securing this appointment for a valued citizen The News would suggest that there be no thought of politics. Liberals and Conservatives, Unionists and Labor men should be a unit in asking the Government to recognize the merit of a Prince Rupert citizen. All former political considerations should be forgotten.

We do not know whether Colonel Peck has been consulted in this matter. It is just possible he would not care for the appointment, but if he wants it Prince Rupert people should see that he gets it. Possibly Vancouver would join in the movement, for it is understood that the Colonel's home is now in that city. At anyrate the returned soldiers' associations in Vancouver and Victoria should be asked to back up the Prince Rupert people in their request.

**Y. M. C. A. May Invade Prince Rupert.**

It is reported that the Y. M. C. A. is considering the advisability of sending an organizer here for the purpose of establishing a Y. M. C. A. The idea seems to be a good one. In a town like this it is very difficult to keep going any institution which stands for the development of the young men. Athletic clubs are established and go out of business. A Y. M. C. A. is more likely to be permanent than any other institution and it is badly needed.

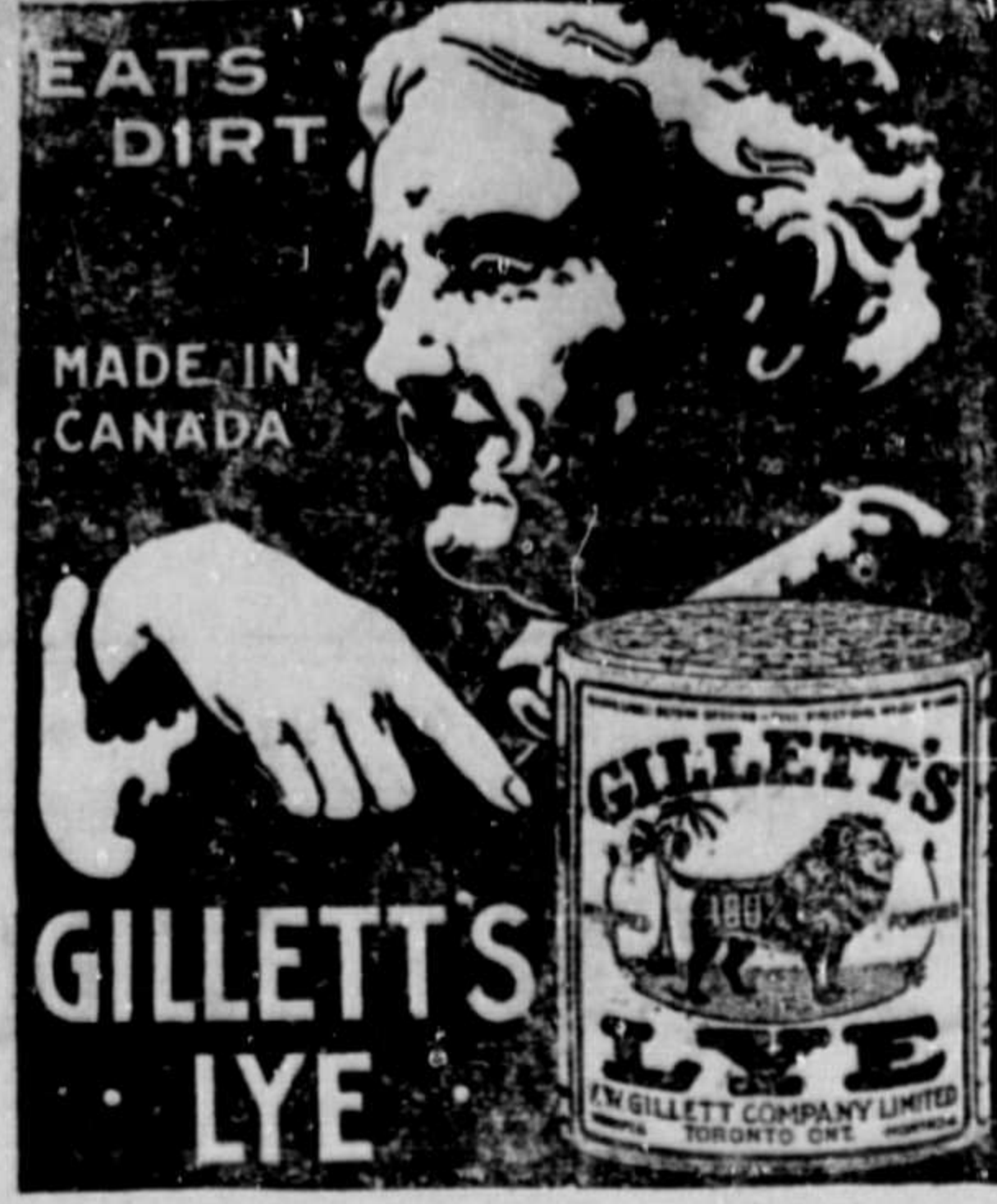
There is at present little opportunity for a young man to keep himself fit. An athletic association has been suggested and very probably the idea will be carried out, but even then there will be room for the other institution.

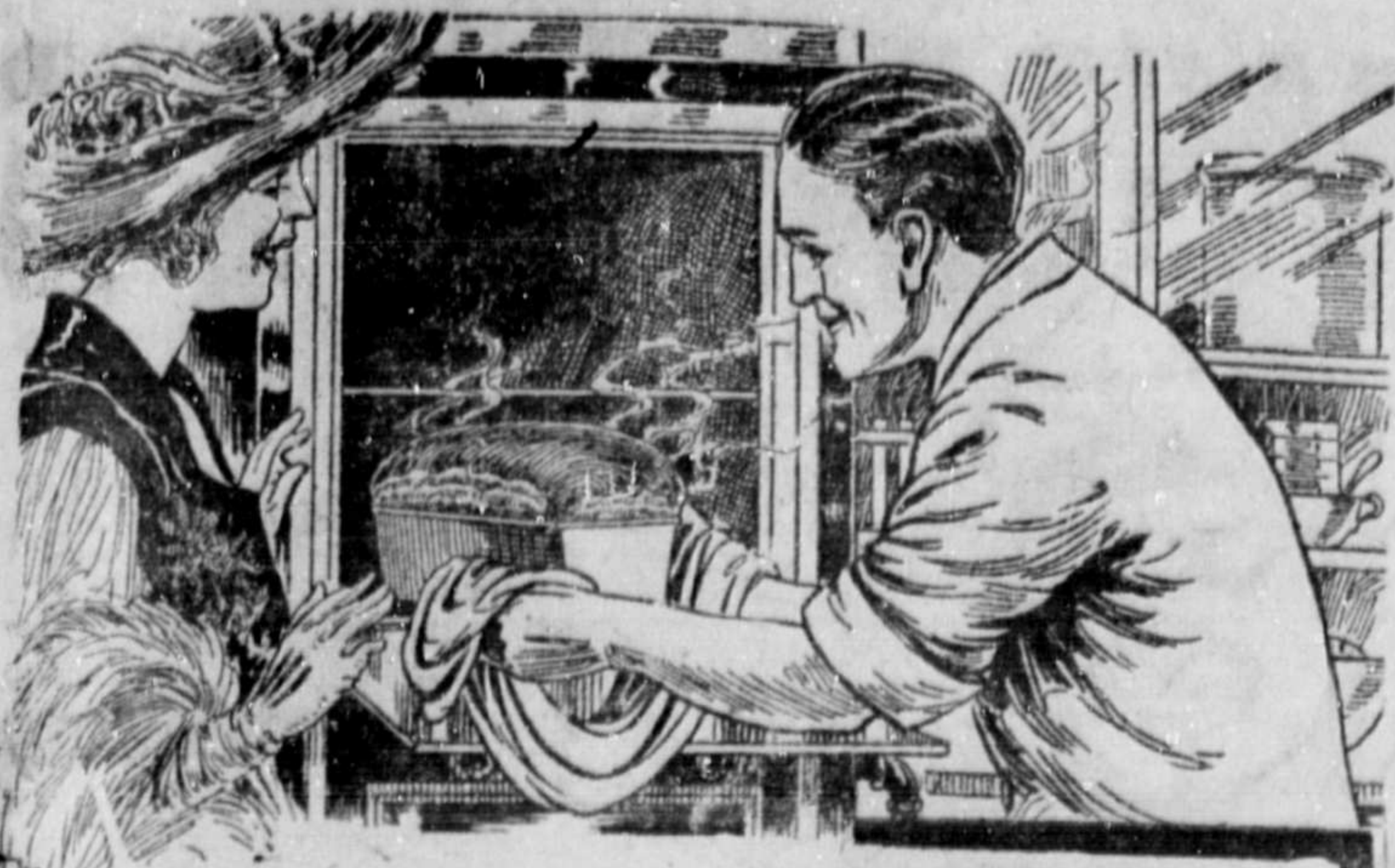

**PROSPERITY FOR N.S. FISHERMEN**

Big Prices Being Secured On Basis of War-Time Food Shortage; Will be Drop Next Year.

Halifax, Dec. 9.—If any class of people in Nova Scotia have reason to be satisfied with conditions it is the fishermen of Lunenburg, who control the bank fishery. They are getting \$14.50 per quintal for their fish ex-vessel—a phenomenal figure. It does not seem so very long ago, though it is some years now, since the price was \$4. The leading exporters of Halifax were asked if it was not dangerous for them to load up at such an extraordinary price as \$14.50. They replied that they did not think so, for one reason because the world's stocks are not sufficient for more than four or five months' consumption and it must be quite that long before Norway can come into the market with next season's catch. One of these exporters was asked if he was much concerned about the fishing industry next year and he replied:

"No, not from the merchandising standpoint. No doubt next year's catch of codfish will sell at much lower prices, but we are quite accustomed to fluctuations in the fish trade, and we worry very little about them as they come about, from year to year. For instance, in 1906, there was a drop of 50 per cent. at the opening of the season, and suddenly, about mid-summer, there was a swing the other way, and prices went up 100 per cent. Of course they shortly broke and some of the trade lost a good deal of money, but by the time next season came around we were ready to start in all over again, and with an entirely new situation, which is just what we will have by the time the first of the spring catch of next year has been placed on the market."

The great question for the fish trade of the future is that of production. Overhead expenses have so increased that fishermen will not be able to sell at the old figures should the world's markets demand a reduction, as they no doubt will. The Lunenburg vessels require much larger gross earnings than formerly in order to pay interest on the investment, but with the prospect that prices must go back to about \$7 per quintal it is difficult to see how these highly capitalized vessels can make a profit.

**FORTY WOODEN SHIPS BUILT IN 181 DAYS**

Delivery of forty wooden cargo carriers to the French Government at the rate of one every four and one-half days will be the remarkable record set by the Foundation Company at its Tacoma and Portland plants on December 24, when the fortieth ship will be turned over to France. This will be the Foundation Company's Christmas present to the French Government.

The last of the forty wood ships was slipped into the water at the Tacoma plant on Thanksgiving day, making a record for launching which the company claims is unequalled in wood ship construction. Beginning on March 20 of this year, when the first of the French fleet was launched, the Foundation Company has put one of the big cargo carriers into the water at the average rate of one every six and one-third days. This included Sundays and holidays. The forty ships were launched in a period of 253 days.

The first wood ship was delivered to the French Government on June 26 of this year and the last will be turned over on December 24 in a total of 181 days.

In the meantime, several of the ships which are of the auxiliary steam-power schooner type, have made the voyage across the Atlantic and have proved satisfactory and free from the defects which frequently develop in wood ships on their first voyage.

**SCOW OF SALMON LOST ON NITINAT SANDBAR**

Cargo Valued at \$87,000 Lost When it Broke Away From Bonilla at Spot Where Renfrew Capsized.

Salmon to the value of \$87,000, fully covered by insurance, the property of the Lummi Bay Packing Co. at Nitinat, was destroyed when a scow broke away from her tug and was wrecked. The tender Bonilla was taking the scow with 15,000 cases of salmon out into the open water when the towline broke while crossing the bar at Nitinat. The tide was falling rapidly at the time, and before the scow could be secured it grounded near the rocks. The weather was clear and fine at the time, but before high tide a very strong gale sprang up and totally destroyed the scow and its valuable cargo.

It was on this bar that the fishing boat Renfrew capsized some time ago, with the loss of thirteen lives. The surf breaks over the sand bar and is very high at times. Great care must be exercised when vessels are crossing the bar, and there is only a certain time that boats may go in and out of Nitinat Lake. The cannery tender Bonilla, which was towing the scow, brought the Renfrew survivors to Victoria. The scow was one that was being chartered from a United States firm and was housed in on deck after the fashion of a houseboat.

### REFRIGERATION IS IMPORTANT FACTOR IN THE FISHERIES

Development of Industry in New Foundland As Result of Modern Methods of Handling.

St. John, December 7. — Refrigeration is proving a most important factor in the development of the fishing industry of Newfoundland, a modern plant having been built by the Newfoundland Atlantic Fisheries, Limited, a subsidiary of the Reid Newfoundland Company. This plant has a storage capacity of 6,000,000 pounds and freezing equipment to handle 350,000 pounds has been installed.

The Newfoundland Fisheries enterprise promises to have an important effect on the business development of the country because of the new opportunities opened out. Instead of the slow process of salting and drying the fishermen may now have the satisfaction of disposing of their catch on the day when it is made. Fishing is being encouraged and many people have been thus spending their spare time to advantage—sometimes making more in a few hours than in their regular occupations. The industry is expected to develop under such conditions.

Then, too, there has been an important elimination of waste. Formerly the cod was supreme and other varieties were usually thrown back into the "briny" when discovered in the fishermen's nets. Now all species of the finny tribe which are good food are welcome to the refrigeration plant. This means extra money for the fisherman and an increased supply of food. Nor is it expected that the development of the business in fresh fish will interfere with the trade in the salt commodity for which there has always been a steady consuming demand.

### NO EXTRA PROFITS ON LIFE INSURANCE BECAUSE OF THE "FLU"

A most comprehensive review of the insurance situation in Canada, in all its branches, was presented at the inaugural meeting of the Insurance Institute of Toronto last week by H. W. Crossin, the new president of the Institute. After pointing with pride to the fact that the Institute was one of a very few which had survived the trying period of the war, he dealt with the unprecedented experience of the life companies in the losses sustained through Spanish influenza.

"The death losses through the war," declared Mr. Crossin, "did not bring the companies' losses up to the expectancy under the mortality tables and I believe that the ratio of war losses this year is possibly not quite as heavy as last. With almost two months to go after the cessation of hostilities, a marked improvement in the loss ratio might have been expected had it not been for the epidemic referred to. The results of that epidemic are such that it is quite likely that an average of one hundred per cent. of the expectancy will be realized by the life companies as a whole this year and, if there should be a continuance of the spread of the "Flue," that expectancy may be exceeded.

**SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT**

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.  
 Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
 Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.  
 Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, in case of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.  
 Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year.  
 Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.  
 Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.  
 Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
 For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.  
**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.  
**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**  
 Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the price of the whole parcels. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. The above apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

**MANY SETTLERS ARE GOING TO TELKWA**

J. J. McNeill Tells of Prosperity of Valley; Killing Beef Cattle For Winter Supply.

That settlers are going into the Telkwa district very fast and taking their outfits with them is the word brought from that district by J. J. McNeill. Just within the last few days two families with their stock and everything necessary for farming operations arrived and this sort of thing has been going on for some time. They buy lands and are permanent settlers.

Besides these the Rattenbury organization is getting a lot of people into the country to settle on their lands. These are said to be the best lands in the country and are being taken up with considerable rapidity.

The past summer has been a very prosperous one for the farmers of the Telkwa district. The people have had the best year since construction days. There was a large crop and while some of it has not been saved in good condition, it all makes excellent feed for stock.

Mr. McNeill says that he has been killing a large amount of Bulkley Valley beef and it will practically all be cleared up this month. There is a great deal of beef raised in that country and every year it is expected to increase.

Speaking of the Telkwa Collieries, in which Mr. McNeill is interested, he says that they are now shipping regularly. The coming of snow makes the hauling easy and regular shipments will be made all winter.

The vein from which this coal is taken is about six feet thick. It is an outcropping on the side of the mountain and is very easily mined. Mr. McNeill says he thinks they have a large quantity of it, but there have been no tests made to show just how much there is or whether it is free from faults. Both above and below the six-foot vein there are smaller veins which in time will probably be worked.

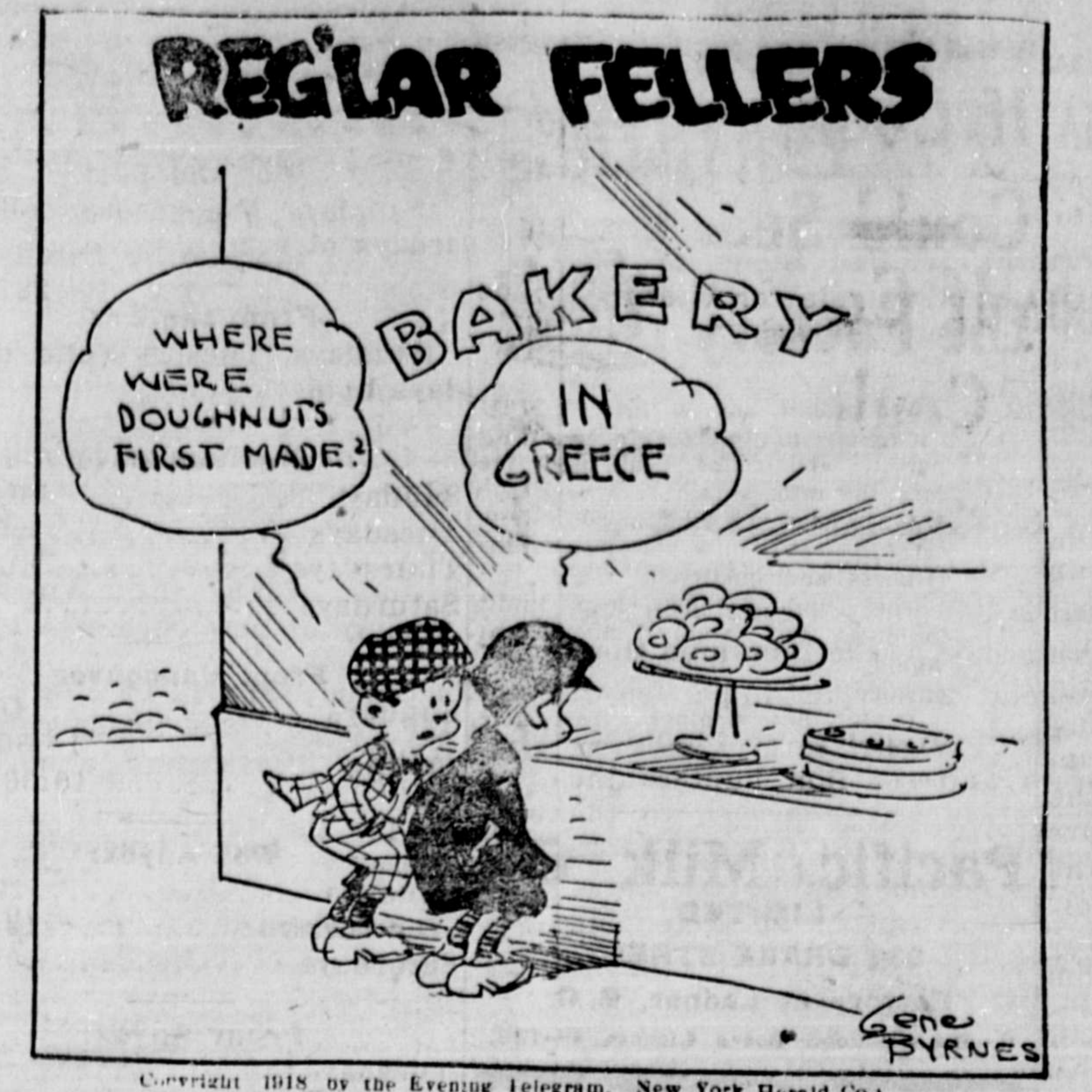

## SEA LION HIDE FOR LEATHER

Proposal to Use Skins of Big Ocean Mammals for Shoes and Gloves.

### FERTILIZER ALSO FROM CARCASSES

A bluebook containing an account of the investigations into the sea lion on this coast has just been issued by the Dominion Government. The report in part says: "From evidence of manufacturers and sea-lion hunters the suggestion was conveyed to the commissioners that there was an economic and commercial value in sea-lion hides, whiskers and carcasses. Under the bounty system the whole carcass of a sea-lion, with the exception of the muzzle, is disregarded, thrown into the sea, or left on the rookeries or hauling-out grounds to putrify, so far as any effort is made by the Government to utilize it. Much time was spent and many persons interviewed in obtaining definite information as to the feasibility of utilizing sea-lion carcasses for commercial purposes, with the happy result, however, of its being demonstrated that the hide of a sea-lion is eminently suitable for tanning into leather, from which durable and serviceable gloves and boots today are being made; that the whiskers have a value of 25 cents a piece to Orientals; and that the flesh can be rendered into oil and guano, for which a good market is ever available.

"While it was impossible, owing to the short time at the disposal of the commissioners, to investigate this side of the problem in an exhaustive manner, on account of the great distances from Vancouver and Victoria to San Francisco and New York, where comprehensive and accurate corroboration of the commercial uses of the carcasses of sea-lions can be obtained, yet sufficient evidence was discovered to point to the conclusion that in killing sea-lions the economic value of their entire carcasses should be taken into consideration, so that, if it were found possible and feasible, then the monetary returns from the disposal of the carcasses in the form of hides, whiskers, oil, and guano would at least equal and possibly, with care, exceed the amount of the bounty offered by the Government. It is in the mind of the commissioners that if such a consummation could be reached, a real service to industry and the country could be rendered. It is in this direction that the commissioners desire to pursue their inquiries during the coming year.

"What turn that inquiry might take is indicated by the fact that W. F. Robinson, president of the Robinson Fisheries Company, manufacturers, producers and distributors of fish oil and fish fertilizer, Anacortes, Washington, writing to the commission under date of August 14, 1915, says: 'We have never yet had the carcasses of sea-lions to use in our fertilizer plant, but could do so if we had them, as we understand they grow to a very large size. Unless the expense of obtaining the sea-lions is too great, or our works are not near the source of production, we believe they could be handled to advantage.'
